NOT ENOUGH COFFINS TO BURY PETROGRAD DEAD SAYS REPORT

Early in January Deaths Numbered as High as 3,000 a Day; Bodies Left in the Snow or Dropped into River.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
HELSINGFORS, Finland, February 25.—Reports of serious conditions at Petrograd have been received by Professor Mann Zeidler of Viborg, showing that typhus, cholera, and influenza are taking a heavy toll.
Reports state that up to January 15 the deaths in Petrograd numbered 3,000 a day. Coffin factories could turn out only 1,000 daily and for this reason most of the bodies were being left in the country on sleds and left in the snow. Many were dropped through the ice into the River Neva. Funerals were prohibited owing to the scarcity of horses.

ASQUITH IS ELECTED MEMBER FOR PAISLEY

Premier Returned over Labor and Coalition Candidates; Great Interest Taken in Contest for Scottish Constituency.

LONDON, February 25.—Hon. Herbert H. Asquith, formerly minister of Great Britain, was elected to Parliament to represent Paisley constituency in the by-election.
Mr. Asquith was defeated in the constituency of East Fife at the general election, going down with many of his followers in the wave of enthusiasm for the coalition government following the war.
He was opposed by a strong labor man and a coalitionist. His return brings to the House of Commons once more one of the great statesmen of Great Britain, a man who has held the confidence of a large section of the British people for over a quarter of a century.
Great interest was taken in this election both here and throughout the kingdom. The statement that the country looked to Asquith for a lead and that whichever way Paisley went the rest would eventually go, focused attention on this contest.

NEWSPAPERMAN IS ARRESTED

Looking for Copy and is Now Awaiting Court Martial.

DUBLIN, Feb. 25.—A dozen newspapermen were arrested after midnight appearing on the streets. The arrests include a Dublin newspaperman seeking for copy and how the law could be broken. He is now awaiting court martial.
The quiet of the city was disturbed last night by some tanks moving through the streets. The Dublin Trades Council passed a resolution calling upon workers to refuse to apply for jobs.
The police have removed their identification numbers from their uniforms.

RUSSIA IS TO FORE AGAIN

ment of London Papers on Recent Developments Regarding That Country.

LONDON, Feb. 25.—British comment on the Allied situation is mixed. The press bitterly attacks Lloyd George for compromising Europe. The Daily News and Chronicle say that the latest move is a step towards peace. The Express voices approval but condemns the insincere diplomacy outwaging the split between the Entente nations.

INDIA MUST HAVE VOICE

So Says Chief Secretary Montague in Regard to Turkish Settlement.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
LONDON, Feb. 25.—Hon. E. S. Montague, secretary for India, in a statement to the Evening Standard, on the question of turning the Ottoman Government out of Constantinople, said that if the taking of Constantinople from the Turk was to be the necessary result of the war "I respectfully suggest that you ought not to have asked the Indians to take part in the war against Turkey."
The Secretary for India considers that the wishes of the people of India should be consulted in the matter, particularly as Indian soldiers and materials play a prominent part in response to the Empire's needs.
"From one end of India to the other," he declared, "all those who have expressed an opinion on this subject, of whatever race or creed, believe that non-interference with the settlement of the Caliphate is indispensable to the internal and external peace of India."

Mr. Montague is of the opinion that the rumor has spread that Turkey was to be destroyed and deprived of its capital and this has been one of the prime causes of the recent Armenian massacres.

WOMEN'S POLITICAL ORGANIZATION IN U.S.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25.—The newly organized League of Women Voters will open headquarters here in connection with their new political activities. The League promises to be a powerful political organization.

ARE FINED FOR HAVING LIQUOR

Sweet and Lipsett Plead Guilty to Minor Charges and Pay \$100.50 Each.

John Hoskins, Harry Lipsett and George A. Sweet appeared in the police court this morning charged with infractions of the B. C. Prohibition Act. Hoskins pleaded not guilty of the charge of having liquor in his possession other than in a private dwelling in which he resided and was remanded until tomorrow morning.
The charge against Harry Lipsett was that he did an act and did not and did counsel one George A. Sweet to keep intoxicating liquor in a place other than his own private dwelling in which he resided, to wit, in the residence of Harry P. Lipsett. Mr. Lipsett pleaded guilty and was fined \$100.50.
George A. Sweet pleaded guilty on the charge of having liquor wrongfully in his possession in other than a private dwelling in which he resided and was also fined \$100.50.

BERLIN, Feb. 24.—Great chemical plants in the lower main district, which were forced to close recently because of lack of fuel, have been enabled to resume operations as a result of deliveries of American coal.

SIR ROBERT BORDEN IS RETURNING HOME

Expected to Reach Halifax Tomorrow on Carmania.

OTTAWA, Feb. 25.—The Carmania, carrying Sir Robert Borden, is expected to reach Halifax on February 26 on her way to New York. It is rumored here that Sir Robert may disembark at Halifax.

FIGHT OCCURS AT THURSTON HARBOR

Firefly Came in this Morning with One Man for Hospital and Other One for Jail.

The Whalen launch Firefly arrived from Thurston Harbor this morning with Dave Diom, who was taken to the hospital suffering from severe knife wounds about the hands and back, and George Webb, who now reclines in the city jail. A fracas occurred last night between Diom and Webb, who is the cook at a camp over there, with the result that Diom was badly cut up. A charge is to be laid against Webb by the provincial police.

CO-OPERATIVE STORE FOR PRINCE RUPERT

Is Proposed by the Trades and Labor Council—Addressed Last Night by Official.

J. Somerville, western representative of the International Association of Machinists, gave an interesting address to the Trades and Labor Council last night on "The Co-Operative Movement in the East" based on his own personal observations.
The local Trades and Labor Council is discussing the advisability of establishing a co-operative store here with a view to bringing down the high cost of living. No action was taken last night but the matter was laid over till the next meeting.

Troops Are Being Sent to Montesano During Trial of I.W.W. Accused of Killing

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
MONTESANO, Wash., February 25.—The sending of troops to Montesano to remain until the end of the trial of alleged I. W. W. members accused of Centralia Armistice Day killing, was authorized by Lieut.-General Hunter Leggett, commanding the western department of the army, upon the request of Governor Hart of Washington.
The Governor's action followed a request for troops by Prosecutor Herman Allen, "purely as a precautionary measure." His recommendation, Mr. Allen says, was the result of, what he termed, an invasion of radicals at Montesano, now the focal point of I. W. W. interests, coupled with vague rumors and threats, which have reached the ears of counsel for the state.

Direct Action Says Thomas Richards is Road to Revolution

Secretary of Wesh Miners' Federation Speaks out plainly in Regard to Abuse of Power by Workers.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
CARDIFF, Wales, February 25.—In connection with the agitation among certain elements of the miners to use direct action to enforce their demands, much prominence is given to a speech by Thomas Richards, member of the House and general secretary of the Welsh Miners' Federation, in which he declared that the working class needed a talking to. "Workers," Mr. Richardson said, "were beginning to boss the show and boss everyone." He appealed to them to be careful how they used their power. "The direct actionists are heading the country to a revolution," he asserted. "The British workingman is the freest subject on God's earth and to follow direct action will ruin him and put back progress one hundred years."

FORMAL OPENING ATHLETIC CLUB FRIDAY NIGHT

Enthusiastic Meeting of Members in Board of Trade Rooms Last Evening.

A very enthusiastic meeting of the Prince Rupert Amateur Athletic Association took place in the Board of Trade Rooms last night. The prospects for an active athletic season despite the late start, are still bright and, at last, the commencement is in sight. Financial matters are not yet in the best of shape but the members are very hopeful that the city will come to its aid with a substantial grant to put the association on a sound financial footing. The formal opening of the quarters at the Agricultural Hall will take place on Friday night, which the members of the City Council have been requested to attend. A doubleheader basketball game will be the feature of the evening. The first game will be between the Callies and the Dry Dock in a regular Senior League match. Another game is to be arranged among the Junior League teams—Met City Council.

At last night's meeting H. S. Wallace reported, on behalf of a delegation that interviewed the City Council that that body appeared to favor a grant of \$500 but that they could not furnish free water, light and telephone. A financial statement was also presented which showed that \$1,978.41 had already been expended on improvements and \$300 was still owing in outstanding accounts. There was very little gymnastic equipment yet obtained and considerable would be needed which would run into money. Up to date only \$22.75 has been expended towards this equipment. The president reported that all carpenter work, plumbing, heating and wiring was completed. Repairs have also been made to the roof of the hall by the Agricultural Association so that it could now be used.
J. D. McAuley was appointed permanent secretary of the Association.

CAILLAUX IS BEING TRIED

Finds Difficulty in Clearing Himself From Complicity With Bolo Pasha.

FRENCH EX-PREMIER
CHARGE OF TREASON

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
PARIS, Feb. 25.—Former Premier Joseph Caillaux, charged with treason and with dealing with the Germans and conspiring to bring about a dishonorable peace, gave testimony before the Senate sitting as a High Court.
Caillaux's explanations of the relations with Bolo Pasha, Pierre Lenoir, M. Duval and Miguel Almeraya, three of whom expiated their crimes on Execution Hill at Vincennes, while the last named died under strange circumstances in Fresnes prison, occupied the whole session.
Caillaux disposed of Lenoir, Duval, and Almeraya with nonchalance and in a comparatively short time, but the ghost of Bolo Pasha hovered about the ex-premier for long hours and the accused seemed to realize that the crucial point of the examination had been reached and he experienced greater difficulties in clearing himself from his social relations with the executed traitor which he now apparently feels were too intimate.

PROPOSALS TO SOVIET RUSSIA

Allies to Suggest They Abandon Propaganda and Recognize Loans.

LONDON, Feb. 25.—The Soviet Government will be asked to abandon its propaganda and to recognize existing loans. While the Allies do not propose to encourage the border states to make war on the Bolsheviks.
The Allies will decline to deal with Soviet Russia until they have arrived at the conviction that the Bolshevik horrors have come to an end.

INDIAN NAVY IS LATEST PROPOSAL

Lord Jellicoe Visited that Country in Order to Make Recommendation.

LONDON, Feb. 25.—It was officially stated in the House of Commons that Admiral Lord Jellicoe visited India to consider the formation of an Indian navy. His report is now under consideration and "it involves very serious consequences."

Daylight Saving

Subject of Controversy.

There is a difference of opinion as to the desirability of again adopting daylight saving throughout the country. Here it does not matter much as our days are very long in this northern clime. Those who like to enjoy outdoor games and sports find the extra hour in the evening a distinct advantage. To farmers and painters and others getting up early is a disadvantage. To children attending school the tendency to stay up at night is not good.

So far as we are concerned much will depend on the action of the railway companies. If the railways decide to put the clocks on, we shall probably follow suit as it would be very inconvenient to have two times in a town this size.

Vancouver Paper
And Fisheries.

In a recent number of the Vancouver World is a long article under a Prince Rupert date line giving the Prince Rupert point of view in regard to the salmon fisheries. It gives much praise to Lieut.-Col. Peck as being the champion of the people's rights at Prince Rupert and takes a fling at Hon. William Sloan in connection with his proposal to have the Government take over the fish.

The World is the only Vancouver paper that has given Prince Rupert's view and for that reason deserves the thanks of the people here. The field is well covered and even if some of the despatch does not meet with approval, it is worth a good deal to have this plea published in Vancouver.

Unionism Almost
Thing of Past.

Unionism is almost a thing of the past. Gradually there is a breaking away by those who feel that the purpose for which the Government was formed has been fulfilled. It is safe to say now that there will be no unionist party. It may be called unionist but there will be no union.

The action of A. K. MacLean in withdrawing leaves the Government more Tory than ever, and it was always strongly impregnated with Toryism. It is to be assumed now that Mr. MacLean will line up behind W. L. Mackenzie King.

HUGE CONTRACT

MORSE CREEK BRIDGE PLANS

Show Substantial Structure Suit-
able for Needs of West End
for Years to Come

The plans for the new \$18,000
Morse Creek bridge are now in
the city engineer's office awaiting
the approval of that official as
soon as the rush of duties in con-
nection with the Court of Revision
are over. They were received
from the office of the Chief Engi-
neer of the Grand Trunk Pacific
Railway at Winnipeg last week
and bear the signatures of J. A.
Heaman, assistant chief engineer,
and J. G. Legrand, bridge engi-
neer.

The new bridge will be a very
creditable appearing structure
and one that should serve the
needs of the west end of town for
some years to come. It is to be
built with a special view to dura-
bility and long life and all the
joints will be tarred, which en-
sures its lasting. It will be con-
structed on the northern bound-
ary of Second Avenue or the side
nearest the harbor. The purpose
in building it thus is that it may
not be disturbed when a perma-
nent bridge is put in. The
city is to stand \$12,000 of the
cost and the Provincial Govern-
ment \$6,000.

The plans show that the bridge
will be about 500 feet long from
end to end. The trestle will com-
mence a short distance from the
present extremity of Second Ave.
in Section 1 and will join the
grading of the same street in
Section 2. The width will be 32
feet with an 18-foot roadway and
two sidewalks of six feet in width.
The sidewalks will be amply pro-
tected with guard rails. There
will be about 20 concrete piers
and three spans of 77 feet to allow
for the passing of five sets of
railroad tracks below. The high-
est elevation is 53 feet where it
passes over Morse Creek. With
the exception of the concrete
piers the entire structure will be
built of fir timber.

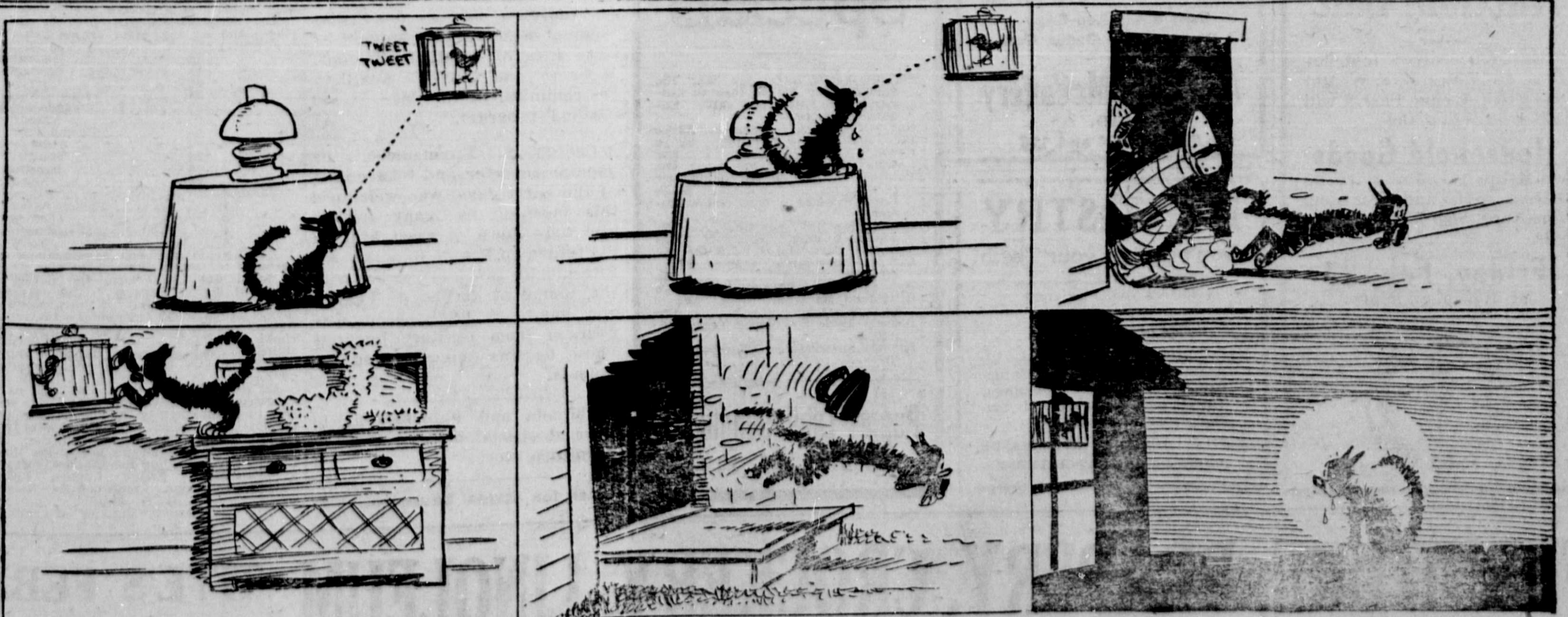
