## Parliament Opens with Pomp And Formality of Before War

### Speech from Throne Mentions Unimportant Laws to be Passed and Franchise Act; Canada's Position Fixed in League of Nations.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

OTTAWA, February 27.—With all the glories of pre-war pomp and formality Parliament was opened yesterday afternoon by the Duke of Devonshire, in the Commons chamber of the new buildings. Ladies in evening gowns occupied seats on the floor and filled the galleries, while here and there were parliamentarians in brilliant court uniforms. The sun streaming through the west windows made the interior of the chamber a sea of color.

The Government legislative program outlined in the speech from the throne comprises a bill to provide for the Dominion franchise, a bill respecting copyrights, a bill providing for the amendment of the Patent Act, of the Loan and Trust Companies Act, of the Indian Act, and the Exchequer Court Act. There will also be a bill to ratify the International Opium Convention.

The speech from the throne referred to the ratification of the Peace Treaty between the Allied Powers and Germany and the formal constitution of the League of Nations. "It is satisfactory to note," the speech significantly remarked, "that the status of Canada as a member of the league has thus been definitely fixed."

"In the European economic field," the Governor-General continued, "clear vision is still impossible. The unsettled state of the exchange, the lack of international credits, and the inflation of the paper currency, combined with scarcity of raw materials and the demoralization of labor and transport united to retard production and restrict the rebuilding of waste caused by the war. But it is cause for thankfulness that of all countries affected by the war, Canada has maintained a record of social order and industrial and commercial prosperity second to none."

## BOLSHEVIKI ADVANCING

### Have Reached Chinese Frontier and Demand Surrender of Russian Prisoners.

LONDON, Feb. 27.—The Bolsheviki advance in Siberia is continuous. Troops have reached the Chinese frontier in the Ili district and have demanded that the Chinese governor give up Russian refugees. Failing compliance, the Reds threaten to occupy the province.

## RAILROADMEN ARE ON STRIKE

### Double Commenced at Paris and Men Out at Nice.

PARIS, Feb. 27.—The railroadmen at Eastern Station ceased work at seven o'clock this morning and the strike situation became worse at Northern Station. The railroad service to suburban districts has been further diminished.

The railroad workers at Nice have struck.

## SIX MONTHS AND FINE FOR SELLING

### Paul Massari of Port Clements, Sent Down for Supplying Indians.

PORT CLEMENTS, Q.C.I., Feb. 27.—Tried before Magistrate Malpas, Paul Massari, the local forekeeper was sentenced to six months imprisonment and fined \$50 for selling liquor to Indians. The prisoner will be sent to New Westminster on the next boat.

The case caused a great deal of excitement here. A good deal of liquor was received from outside by express on the last boat and many of the mill crew and others were the worse for over-indulgence.

## METLAKATLA BAR WILL BE DREDGED

### Will Make a Clear Passage for Gasoline Boats Between Here and Outside.

The Department of Public Works is calling for tenders for the dredging of Metlakatla Bar, which will be another great improvement and aid for the smaller boats passing through Metlakatla Passage and outside by Tugwell Island. At the present time this bar can only be crossed at the higher stages of the tide and much time is lost. The larger gasoline boats cannot pass over it at all.

The long sand bar extends right across the channel between Tugwell Island and the mainland forming a barrier to Metlakatla Passage except at high tides. The dredging of this bar will be in line with the improvements and aids to navigation that are being placed in Metlakatla passage. The work is to start before March 25.

## FISHERMEN WERE DISSATISFIED AT EXCHANGE TODAY

The refrigerator car shortage threatens to send many of the American fish boats away from port with their catches because the buyers cannot bid as high as if the fish were to be shipped fresh. As it is what fish is being bought today has to be frozen and the price offered is not at all suitable to the fishermen, many of whom were expressing dissatisfaction this morning with the local situation. At 2 o'clock the following boats were registered for sale locally although none of them had sold at that time: Livingstone, 18,000 lbs.; Agnes, 15,000; Presho, 4,000; Mable A., 4,000; Magnhel, 10,000; Grayling, 5,000; Atlas, 25,000; Nautilus, 7,000; Agnes B., 10,000; Nuba, 6,000 pounds.

## Webb Dismissed on Charge Of Wounding; Threatened To Hang Him, He Declares

George Webb, charged with wounding David Dion in a fracas with knife play involved, was dismissed by Stipendiary Magistrate McMullin this morning. In dismissing the accused the magistrate stated that he had given a lot of thought to the matter and had hesitated about his decision on the point as to whether Webb had used more force than was necessary in defending himself. However, seeing the crippled condition in which he was, he was probably justified under the circumstances. L. W. Patmore acted in defence of the accused and Chief McInty did the questioning for the crown.

In giving his evidence yesterday afternoon George Webb told of a spectacular experience he had gone through in connection with the affray. According to his story there was a malicious feeling against him on the part of the employees of the camp generally and they were far from pleased from his attitude in regard to his labor affiliations.

In beginning his story Webb told that he had just been out of the hospital for about three months. He had undergone serious operations and had been warned by the doctors not to do any heavy lifting or engage in any scuffles. Besides this, due to a quarter of beef falling on his hand, every bone in it had been broken and he was unable to close his fist.

"I went to work at Goose Bay last Saturday," he continued, "and within an hour of my arrival there I was approached and asked if I belonged to the O. B. U.

I was told that every man in the camp belonged and I would have to join up. I stated that I would not join as I was opposed to their radical ideas.

**Trouble Brewing.**

"I took hold at the camp on Sunday about noon. I saw Dion, the engineer, for the first time on Sunday night when he asked me if I could have breakfast ready for him at 7:15. I inquired if he was asking this because I was a new man and he replied that he had had it there before. I then said it would be alright. He came in for breakfast on Monday morning and I gave it to him at that time. After breakfast, on inquiry, he said that he was well satisfied. He did not mention that it was later than he wanted it.

"On Monday afternoon the foreman, who is a rabid O. B. U. man, brought Happy (Martin) Rogers to be my dunkey. I gave him brief instructions as to deal."

## FIERCE RAIDS MADE ON IRISH CONSTABULARY

### Many Dead Found After Midnight Seige—Attempt to Burn Barracks.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

DUBLIN, Feb. 27.—Two constabulary barracks at Timmo-league and Mount Pleasant, County Cork, were subjected to a seige which prolonged till well after midnight. Large bodies of armed men were employed and the besiegers made use of their usual tactics of blocking the roads with trees and cutting the telephone connections.

The attacks lasted more than two hours, during which time attempts were made to burn the barracks by piling hay against the doors and setting fire to it. The assailants were finally driven off. The bodies of several killed civilians were found, the dead men being members of the raiding party. There was also found a wounded man who declared that seven other wounded men had been carried away.

## GUARANTEES WHEAT GROWERS BIG PRICE

## FARMERS' ORGANIZATIONS TO UNITE THEIR FORCES

### Decision at Victoria to Absorb Farmers Institutes by United Farmers of British Columbia; Trading Branches to be Formed.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

VICTORIA, B. C., February 27.—The Farmers' Institutes of British Columbia will likely pass from the agricultural life of the province before next year and will be merged into the United Farmers of B. C. to form one great independent farmers' organization free from all government strings and control and thus end the feud between the institutes and the United Farmers.

This is the result aimed at by an executive committee consisting of representatives of both sides which came to a unanimous decision in favor of amalgamation.

H. W. Wood, president of the United Farmers of Alberta, presided over the peace conference. He declared that government aid to the amalgamated body could be accepted without sacrificing independence. Before amalgamation is achieved the United Farmers will have to become fully incorporated as the farmers' institutes are, because it would be impossible for the institute to join with a non-incorporated body.

The name of "The United Farmers of British Columbia" will be adopted. Commercial and trading branches of the institutes will be put under control of each local group or possibly be put into district groups.

J. W. Berry presiding over the agricultural conference urged the delegates, when they returned to their locals, to use the word "amalgamated" and shun the expression "that the institutes were to be absorbed by the United Farmers," as that might irritate institute men and impede amalgamation.

## LOGS PURCHASED FOR LOCAL MILL

### E. F. Duby Buys Ten Million Feet From J. R. Morgan Co. at Islands.

### LOGGING CREW IS GOING IN AT ONCE

### Four Donkey Engines are to be Utilized in Getting Product Into the Water.

Ten million feet of logs have been purchased by E. F. Duby for the Prince Rupert Lumber Co. to be cut at the local mill, the purchase being made from J. R. Morgan Co. Logging will commence at once and it is expected that some of the logs will be here by April 1.

Mr. Duby and Mr. Morgan returned on Wednesday night from Masset Inlet and concluded the deal whereby the timber should be taken over by the Prince Rupert Lumber Co. and be logged by them. A camp will be established at once at Shannon Bay not far from Port Clements, and a crew of men will be up on the next boat to go to work there. Some men have also been engaged locally.

The mill is being used at present by the Prince Rupert Spruce Mills, Ltd., who are engaged in cutting up the last of their logs, and as soon as that work is finished the mill will be taken over by the other concern with Mr. Duby as manager.

Mr. Duby says that he has contracted for a quantity of logs, about enough to last a year.

The equipment used by J. R. Morgan Co. previous to the shutdown of the Government work following the close of the war, is still on the ground at Shannon Bay. There are four donkey engines and everything else necessary for logging so that work can commence immediately.

## LONDON TIMES ON SITUATION

### Suggests General Election in Order to Secure Strong Leaders.

The urgent need in Canada at the present moment, says the Times, is a strong Government under strong leaders, which may mean consultation of the people of the Dominion by means of a general election.

## LOGS PURCHASED FOR LOCAL MILL

### E. F. Duby Buys Ten Million Feet From J. R. Morgan Co. at Islands.

### LOGGING CREW IS GOING IN AT ONCE

### Four Donkey Engines are to be Utilized in Getting Product Into the Water.

Ten million feet of logs have been purchased by E. F. Duby for the Prince Rupert Lumber Co. to be cut at the local mill, the purchase being made from J. R. Morgan Co. Logging will commence at once and it is expected that some of the logs will be here by April 1.

Mr. Duby and Mr. Morgan returned on Wednesday night from Masset Inlet and concluded the deal whereby the timber should be taken over by the Prince Rupert Lumber Co. and be logged by them. A camp will be established at once at Shannon Bay not far from Port Clements, and a crew of men will be up on the next boat to go to work there. Some men have also been engaged locally.

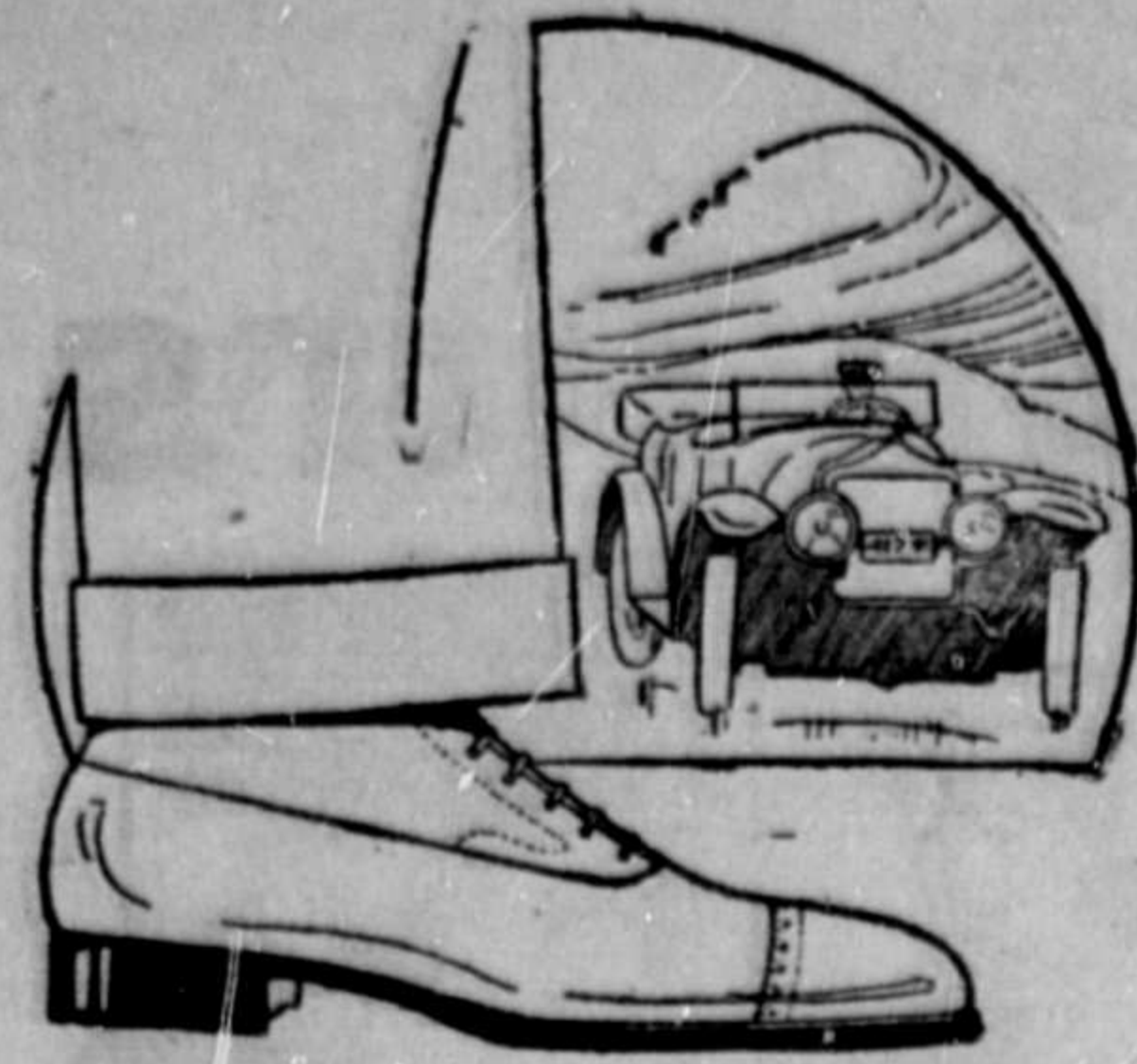

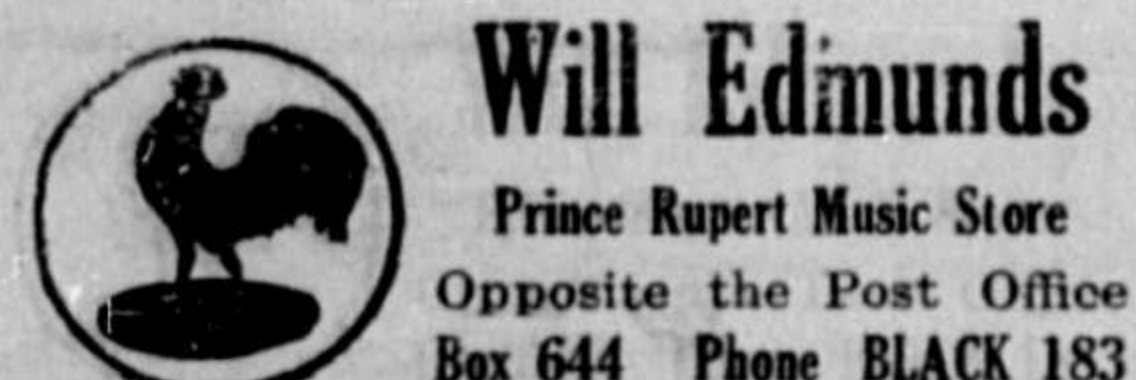

WEBB DISMISSED ON CHARGE OF WOUNDING; THREATENED TO HANG HIM, HE DECLARES

ing with the men and he said: 'Never mind the men, I'll attend to them,' in a tone of voice from which I could see there was something behind it all. Later there was some criticism as to my not being an O. B. U. man and I said that I was a member of the International Brotherhood of Cooks, and that I had a wide experience as a cook.

Was Attacked.

"On Tuesday I was getting breakfast ready for Dion and, in fact, was preparing to dish it up when he started to talk about when he was ever going to get his breakfast. I went back to the work table to get it when he came running towards me shaking his fist. He called me offensive names and his fist touched my nose. I then told him that I was in no condition to fight and told him to go back to the table where he belonged, pointing the knife in the direction. I had no intention whatever of hitting him, but he picked up a cup and I shielded myself with a coffee-pot. He then came running towards me with a poker.

Struck Butcher Knife.

"I saw then that I would have to step out and shield myself from the man. Making a swing with the poker he brought himself up against the butcher knife which I was then holding in my hand. I made some passes at his hands with the knife as I knew that if he ever got in a blow at me with the poker I would be a dead man. As soon as I could I started for the door of the kitchen and he hung onto me until he fell exhausted from the loss of blood sustained from the knife wounds. I believe that, had it not been for his collapsing, he would have killed me." Webb had cuts and bruises to show where he had been struck by the poker.

Tied Him Up.

"I then went out of the cook house and about 22 men, I should judge came and trussed me up, saying that they were going to hang me. In fact one of the men put a noose around my neck. I thought they were surely going to do so, so I asked that they, at least, let me write a letter to my wife. However, they tied me up and threw me onto a bunk, leaving two men to guard me. All this time they were calling me all manner of vulgar names and the witnesses heard this morning knew it, too. On my request they gave me a cup of coffee.

"Taking me down to the boat, they tied me to the rail and told me that I would be kept that way until I reached Rupert. On getting out of sight, though, the captain, who had seen what had gone on released me. I went as far as Thurston Harbor on that boat and then was transferred to the Fir Leaf and brought to Prince Rupert. The witnesses examined this morning did not tell half the circumstances of the case."

Counsel for Defense.

L. W. Patmore, acting in the defence, then argued for the accused. The man had done what any ordinary man would have done. The engineer, in shaking his fist, had committed the first assault. Mr. Patmore was satisfied that there was some premeditated plan to make the man's life miserable and, eventually, drive him from the camp. The engineer only got what was coming to him and what anybody would have given him. Webb was released on his own bail and required to appear this morning for sentence.

**FASHIONS DO NOT SUIT THE FARMER LEADER**

Montreal Editor Discusses Latest Pronouncement of R. H. Halbert

Reformers strive where queens have tried and failed. Canada has one such. He is R. H. Halbert, one of the leaders of the Farmers' party of Canada, and his particular target in the wake of reform now sweeping over the Dominion is fashions for women. He is shocked at the decollete costumes worn by city women and intimated that their country sisters are to set the fashion for them in the future.

What other daring politician is there who would even attempt such a move as to tender advice to women on their mode of dress? Not only would those whose constituency included women voters shy at such a declaration of principle, but even those who depend solely upon the men of the community for their political life unquestionably would hesitate to take part in such a discussion.

The Eastern newspapers are having more than a little fun with Halbert. They point out that Queen Victoria failed utterly in her attempt to dictate fashions by setting an example herself in the Court of St James and ask themselves what chance a mere man has to put over high necks and trailing skirts when a Queen found it impossible.

"Extreme" Gowns Predicted. Newspapers point out that Canadian women are buying more fashionable decollete gowns now than ever they did and one, "The Montreal Star," predicts that an extreme gown soon will find its way to the market under the name of "The Halbert." "The Star" says in part:

"A new 'agitation' threatens the devoted people of Ontario. They have had a long, dry spell, relieved at the moment by 'occasional showers.' The Sunday forums are hunting the 'Capitalists.' Reds and Moderates contend for supremacy at the labor temples. Democrats are threatening to abolish Government House because too much coal is consumed in its furnaces. Sliding on Sunday is prohibited. A group of crusaders are slowly mobilizing against cigars and cigarettes. A Farmer-Labor government has turned the Tories out of Queen's Park, and only a few weeks ago even the right of Thomas Church to be mayor of Toronto was rudely challenged.

But a far graver project is afoot. R. H. Halbert, farmer member of the House of Commons for North Ontario, and the first leader of the United Farmers of the province, announces that the time has come for farm women to set the fashions, and declare that henceforth 'there will be less of this decollete business.'

Mr. Halbert has a sweeping and tempestuous vocabulary and drives Grits and Tories to cover as a boy drives steers to market. But what does he know about fashions or what fashions women will set? Does he know what is 'decollete' from what is last-

century Puritan? The mere suggestion from Mr. Halbert that women in the cities dress differently from those of the country probably will precipitate an uprising among rural women to have, hold and enjoy all the styles of their town sisters.

"All the women reformers of whom one has ever heard wanted high skirts or obtrusive trousers but never 'high necks' or trailing dresses. It is man who covers his eyes and shouts 'decollete' more because he is disagreeable than because he is good. And the more man shouts the less women obey. Mr. Halbert has said a word which may bring him politically in sorrow to the grave, and even disrupt the United Farmers. Women now have votes, and any suggestions that the members of the Women's Councils are less fashionable than the Daughters of the Empire is as mean as it can be, and a gross slander besides.

When Queen Victoria Failed. "Has Mr. Halbert ever attended 'Canada's Great Fair,' which is an annual exhibition held at Toronto and so described with the modesty for which Toronto is distinguished? If so, could he tell from their dress which of any two groups of women were from the country and which from the city. If he could, he could do what no one else has been able to do for, lo, these many years. One other question for Mr. Halbert! Did he ever know a girl from the country in a contest over a youth, however well favored, require to take lessons from a girl in the city? In dress, in poise and in general management of the enamored and helpless male the metropolis could teach the township nothing.

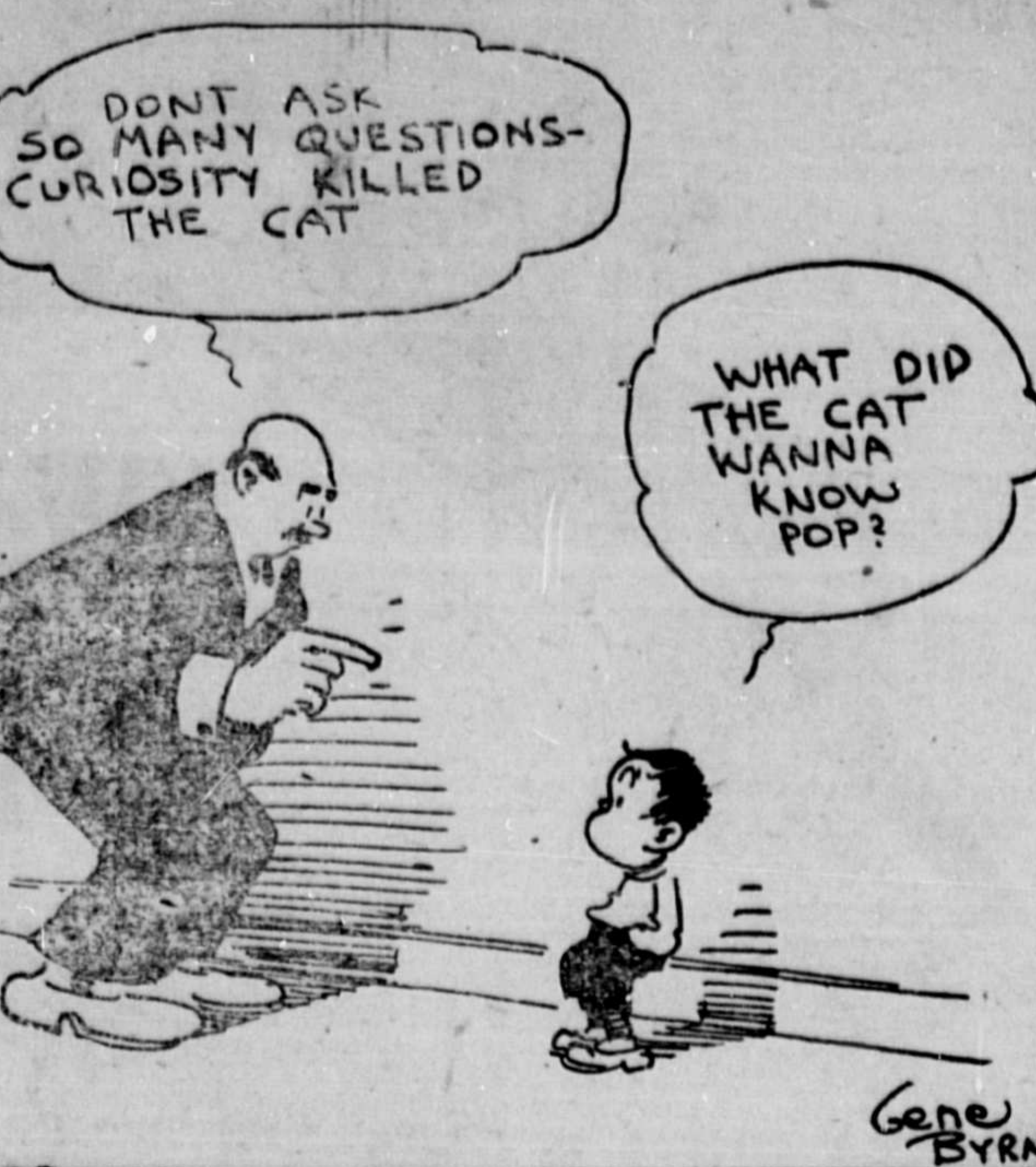
