Leaders Needed

By Canada.

"The urgent need in Canada at present is a strong government under strong leaders, which may mean consultation of the people of the Dominion by means of a general election." So says the London Times. Conservative as that paper is, it recognizes that just now the Union Government is like a flock of sheep without a shepherd. Mr. Borden is ill with little hope of recovery, and there is no one to take his place.

It is easy to read into the editorial note of the London Times the suggestion that on the other side of the House is a leader, W. L. Mackenzie King, and that he will be the man who will step into the breach. He must, however, have the authorization of the people before he can take the position. The suggestion that Hon. Arthur Meighen or Sir Henry Drayton be chosen is simply a temporary arrangement until the appeal can be taken to the country.

Will the United Farmers organization develop into a big political machine? That is a question that a good many are asking. It is difficult to judge of the new movement from the brief despatches received, but it would seem that the United Farmers is at least a semi-political organization. 




