

## Erb-Mullen Trial March 22; Must Put up Costs or Lose

Lawyer Stated They Accused Erb of Deliberate Theft; Case Will be Tried Before Jury and Money Must be Put up at Once.

(Special to the Daily News via Government Telegraphs.)  
VANCOUVER, B. C., February 28.—The Mullen interests in Prince Rupert Dry Dock lawsuit yesterday before Mr. Justice Morrison succeeded on several important points. Trial of the case was set for March 22 and Mr. Meyers' request for a trial by jury was granted. In making the request Mr. Meyers said "as I accuse Erb of deliberate theft, I think Your Lordship will agree with me that it is a case for a jury."  
Douglas Armour, K. C., acting for the Erb interests, argued that there was an appeal pending in the Court of Appeal against Mr. Justice Morrison's last order refusing to strike out certain paragraphs of the statement of defence, it would be impossible to get on with the case before about May 1.  
Judge Morrison said the principal reason for him fixing an early day for trial was that both parties at one time had been offering for a speedy trial.  
Mr. Meyers on behalf of the Mullen interests asked for \$5,000 additional security for costs. Judge Morrison said the \$500 already ordered to be deposited by Mr. Erb must be paid into court within two days or the case will be dismissed. He reserved his decision on the request for \$5,000 additional security.

## GOVERNMENT AUDIT REFUSED

Mr. Erb Orders Accountant to Stop Work When New York Books Asked.

## ORDER SOUGHT COMPELLING AUDIT

On the request of the shareholders of the Prince Rupert Dry Dock & Engineering Co., the Governor in Council yesterday passed an order appointing Mr. F. S. Foster, of Vancouver, to audit the books of the company. Mr. Foster came here and worked on the books for several days and then advised that the New York books of concern be either sent on here or audited by a firm of chartered accountants acceptable to him.  
On receiving this request Mr. Foster yesterday wired orders to the accountants to stop the audit and that no one have access to the books without his permission.  
An order of the court is now being sought compelling the company to produce the books for auditing or the taking of an account there by approved accountants.

## ALFRED STORK SKETCHES LIFE OF STRATHCONA

St. Andrew's Society Hear Address on Great Scottish-Canadian Empire Builder.

The feature of the entertainment given in the St. Andrew's Club rooms last night was the address by Alfred Stork on "The Life of Lord Strathcona." There was a large attendance of members who showed their appreciation for the illuminating sketch given of the great empire builder, doubly interesting to the society because of his Scottish birth.  
As simple Donald A. Smith, a poor immigrant, Strathcona came to Canada at the age of 17 years and became a clerk in the Hudson's Bay stores. His advance was rapid and brilliant and he rose to the governorship of the great company. During the Riel Rebellion of 1870 he was appointed a special commissioner in the Red River country and was instrumental in obtaining the exile of the famous half breed rebel.

### Railway Builder.

The feature of his career was, however, his connection with the Canadian Pacific Railway. On the incorporation of British Columbia as a province in the Dominion, the agreement had been made that the western province must be connected with the east by a transcontinental railway. The government of Sir John A. MacDonald had started the road but finally the "Pacific Scandal" overthrew his government and the Mackenzie government came into power. After five years of failure Smith was called in and he brought the road to successful completion. As the fitting appreciation of his invaluable work in Canada he was made a peer and High Commissioner at London. He attained the grand age of over 90 and died in England.

### Program.

Besides the address of the evening an excellent program was presented last night. The society orchestra was present and provided fine instrumental numbers. Vocal selections were rendered by Mrs. J. ## WESTHOLME LUNCH BURNED

Place Ruined by Effects of Fire and Water—Some Insurance.

Damaged by fire and water, the Westholme Lunch in the Albert Block, belonging to Miss May Billings, is today a ruin as the result of a blaze that started on the premises at midnight last night. The alarm was turned into the fire station at 11:50 and the force was immediately on the scene. The back of the restaurant was, by that time, in flames and the roomers from the Westholme Rooms above, alarmed by the clouds of smoke entering their rooms, were in the street in various stages of dishabille. The place was locked and entry was forced by the fire brigade by breaking in the front window. With the play of the high pressure hose the fire was soon extinguished but with disastrous results to the plastered walls and furnishings of the cafe. The only part actually burned is the end of the counter nearest the kitchen, which was badly damaged.

## JACK DEMPSEY TO BE INDICTED

Charge of Conspiracy to Have Fighter Avoid Selective Draft.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal. Feb. 28.—Jack Dempsey, heavyweight champion of the world and his manager, Jack Kearns, will be indicted by a Grand Jury on the charge of conspiring to avoid the selective draft, according to a responsible federal official here. The indictments will be filed in court today.

A second indictment charging Dempsey with actual evasion of the draft through falsification of his draft records, also will be led this official said. Warrants will be sworn out after the jury reports and the men will be arrested upon their expected arrival here from Los Angeles.

## DARING AVIATOR FELL FIVE MILES, THEN PLANE RIGHTED

Major Schroeder was Apparently Lifeless When Machine Landed and is Now in Hospital Blind and Paralyzed; Made New Record.

DAYTON, Ohio, February 28.—An aeroplane carrying Major R. J. Schroeder, chief test pilot at McCook Field, fell over five miles after reaching an altitude of 36,020 feet, said to be 2,020 feet higher than the world's record. The officer is now in the hospital suffering from shock and temporary paralysis and blindness.

Instruments in the machine indicate that it fell more than five miles and while yet 2,000 feet above the earth, the plane righted itself and glided to a graceful landing.

The pilot was discovered sitting erect and apparently lifeless. The plunge was witnessed by thousands.

Instruments on the machine told the story of the aviator's experience. The thermometer registered at the highest altitude 5.5 below zero centigrade or 67 de-

grees below zero Fahrenheit. The altitude figures indicate a height of 37,000 feet, and showed an official altitude of 36,020 feet, a new world's record. The sudden change in the air pressure from less than three pounds at 36,000 feet to 11.07 lbs. at sea level crushed the gasoline tanks on the plane and caused them to collapse.

## Railway Strike is Revolutionary Says Premier of France

Bill Passed by Chamber of Deputies Authorizing Requisition of Means of Transportation: Official Orders.

(Special to the News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

PARIS, February 28.—Orders for a general strike have been issued by the National Federation of Railwaymen.

The railroad strike, from which France is now suffering, was characterized as a "revolutionary" movement by Premier Millerand in the Chamber of Deputies.

The Premier, speaking on the bill introduced by M. Letrocquer, minister of public works, authorizing the requisition of automobiles, trucks, and airplanes in case of interruption of railway traffic by the strike said: "We are facing a political, or calling it by its name, a revolutionary movement under a puerile pretext." The bill was adopted by the chamber.

M. Millerand, in supporting M. Letrocquer in his demand for the immediate passage of the measure, referred to the strike in England as having been beaten through the co-operation of the public. "The French public is no less ardent and no less ingenious. No organization, no matter how important, has the right to put itself in opposition to the nation," M. Millerand declared. He said the Government had resorted to mobilization and would resort to mobilization whenever necessary.

The Premier asserted that the railway strike was not a union or professional movement.

## Labor Conscription Plan Outlined by Leon Trotzky At a Congress in Moscow

(Special to the News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

LONDON, February 28.—Leon Trotzky, minister of war of Soviet Russia, addressing the Third Circassian Congress held in Moscow, January 25 last, outlined a Bolshevik plan for converting the Red Army into an Army of Labor, according to reports of his speech reaching here.

Referring to the work of the Red Army, Trotzky said: "They (the soldiers) have learned under the very hardest conditions to lead hundreds of thousands of organized masses and have led armies into battle. They will be trained officers. There is still one way open to reorganization of national economy by uniting the army and labor and changing the military detachments of the army into detachments of a labor army."

### Fight Against Ruin.

"Now that the soldiers have been released from military duties they must fight against economic ruin and hunger and must work to obtain fuel, heat, and other necessities," said Trotzky. "They must take part in building and repairing roads, building sheds, grinding flour, etc. We have organized several of these armies and they have seen all these tasks demanded. They must obtain foodstuffs for workmen of the districts in which they were formerly stationed and they must cut wood, cart it to the railways and repair engines."

"Another army will help in laying down of railway lines for the transport of crude oil. A third labor army will be used to repair agricultural implements and machines and in spring will take part in the working of the land."

### Labor Conscription.

"Labor conscription means that the workmen who leave the army must take their work books and proceed to the places where they are required, where their presence is necessary to the economic system of the country. We must feed these workmen and guarantee them the minimum food ration."

## JAPANESE WOMAN DIED YESTERDAY

The death occurred yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock of Mrs. Guichi Hinada, a Japanese woman. She was 24 years of age and has been in the city for three months, having come from Skeena City. The funeral will take place Monday at 1 o'clock from the B. C. Undertakers' parlors, the Japanese Mission having charge of the services.

## MRS. FRANK MORIN PASSED LAST NIGHT

Wife of Laundry Engineer Succumbs to Brief Illness.

The death of Mrs. Ethel Morin, wife of Frank Morin, engineer at the Pioneer Laundry, occurred last night at 9:30 at their home over the laundry, after a brief illness. The late Mrs. Morin, who was quite well known in the city, was a native of England and was 28 years of age.

The funeral of the late lady and an infant child will be held from the B. C. Undertakers' parlors on Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock. The death was a very tragic one and general sympathy will be felt with the sorrowing husband.

### Leaders Needed By Canada.

"The urgent need in Canada at present is a strong government under strong leaders, which may mean consultation of the people of the Dominion by means of a general election." So says the London Times. Conservative as that paper is, it recognizes that just now the Union Government is like a flock of sheep without a shepherd. Mr. Borden is ill with little hope of recovery, and there is no one to take his place.

It is easy to read into the editorial note of the London Times the suggestion that on the other side of the House is a leader, W. L. Mackenzie King, and that he will be the man who will step into the breach. He must, however, have the authorization of the people before he can take the position. The suggestion that Hon. Arthur Meighen or Sir Henry Drayton be chosen is simply a temporary arrangement until the appeal can be taken to the country.

### Will There be Farmers' Machine?

Will the United Farmers organization develop into a big political machine? That is a question that a good many are asking. It is difficult to judge of the new movement from the brief despatches received, but it would seem that the United Farmers is at least a semi-political organization. If this is the case, would the Provincial Government be justified in making grants to a political organization? The institutes are being partly supported by public funds, but if the institutes amalgamate with the United Farmers and go into politics the grants could hardly be continued without making a public scandal.

Suppose the Farmers were to be returned to power and form a Government and their political organization be supported from public funds there would be an uproar immediately. That is the position that will be brought about if there is an amalgamation of the two farmers' organizations. The work of the institutes is educational and social, the work of the United Farmers is largely political.

### Athletic Hall To Be Utilized.

After being idle for about eight years, except for a few days in the summer, the Agricultural building on Acropolis Hill is to be used by the citizens. Last night was the opening and a good crowd gathered to watch the basketball games. It was great to see the young boys fiercely contesting a game and then rush to the dressing rooms, there to stand under the warm water shower baths, rub down and come out feeling splendidly fit. Those who had been responsible for fitting up the rooms and organizing, felt amply repaid for the work they had done, even if the building were used only for the boys and girls to play in.

### Public Spirit of Cup Donor.

The Gilhuly Cup was presented to the winning team last night and the boys from the dry dock are naturally proud of their silverware and especially of their prowess in winning it. Mr. Gilhuly is to be commended for his public spirit in presenting the cup. It is understood that he is to give another for a similar purpose in some other line of sport. These are the little things that help sport along.

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

### LOCAL BOARD ON FISHERIES

Writes Letter of Protest to Vancouver Board of Trade Asking for Fair Deal.

#### WOULD CONSERVE AND ENCOURAGE INDUSTRY

The Prince Rupert Board of Trade has sent a letter of protest to the Vancouver Board in regard to their action in the fisheries question and suggesting that they investigate conditions on the ground. The following is the text of the communication:—

"It has been brought to the attention of this board by press despatches that your board is taking an active part in the fishery question, which to us at the present time is of the utmost importance. In a late press despatch we observe that a commission, headed by your president, Mr. Chris Spencer, has been appointed to thoroughly canvass the situation in this province with a view to obtaining evidence and data to be laid before the Government in the matter of the appointment of a fisheries commission to take over control of the fisheries on this coast.

"As the bulk of the fish are caught in this district, and as most of the operations take place here, we feel assured that your learned commission will call on us in the very near future with a view to obtaining data and with the further object of obtaining our views, supported by proper facts. While the press despatches would indicate that your board was taking a very active interest in requiring the honorable minister, Mr. C. C. Ballantyne, to withhold the application of the proposed changes for 1920, we feel, and hope we are correct in feeling so, that you have been misquoted. We can hardly realize that a body such as yours, the first Board of Trade in the province, should take any stand in the matter of endeavoring to waylay the application of such regulations until you had a proper opportunity of gathering the true facts.

#### Oriental Labor

"We observe that certain principals, who are connected with canneries, and who are no doubt members of your board, are putting forth a seemingly honest plea that their efforts are solely prompted by what they term the conservation of the product. Certain cannery presidents have publicly quoted themselves as entertaining grave fears promoted by the feeling that the new regulations would tend to deplete our fisheries by allowing white Americans to come over here and buy our fish. Surely this condition, if it ever did come about, would not be any worse than the present day methods as fostered by the cannery monopoly and closed fishing regulations. For some years past Orientals have packed hundreds and hundreds of tons of salmon caught in waters adjacent to Queen Charlotte Islands, which salmon was packed by Oriental labor and shipped to southern ports for trans-shipment in Japanese steamers to Japan. This huge volume of product was taken out of the water by Japanese fishermen, fishing in closed areas under licenses held by certain favored ones, and we believe we are correct when we say that your commission will investigate this feature fully with a view to proving beyond a doubt that such regulations have tended to foster Oriental labor and shut the white fishermen out.

#### Eastern Example.

"We will take you on an imaginary trip to the Atlantic coast and show you dozens of towns along the Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland coasts which are flourishing fishing centres populated solely by white fishermen—not an Oriental to be found anywhere. Our board has made earnest effort from time to time to bring a certain part of this population to this coast to encourage the industry here, and while we have been successful to a large extent in having them engage in the deep sea fishery, it has been impossible for us, owing to cannery monopoly and closed fishing regulations, to get them a footing in the salmon fishing.

#### Unjust Laws.

"The fisheries of this district are rich beyond words; Hecate Straits can be compared favorably to the North Sea; yet, travel along this northern coast, and

outside of the city of Prince Rupert, you will not find a single village, town or city which can be properly termed a fishing port. Why does such a condition exist? The cause, which we have touched on many times, is brought about by the unjust fishing laws which have been in existence for some time.

"Your board, representative of the entire business pursuits of your city, must necessarily depend to a large extent on fostering outside business, and as boats arrive here from your city carrying hundreds of tons of merchandise for this district shipped by business houses of your city, you must realize that our interests are yours, and that you must give way to arguments made by men who have been on this ground for years and who are thoroughly conversant with the entire fishery situation.

#### True Conservation.

"We believe in the conservation of this valuable product, but we do not believe that we can conserve same by having the canneries fill their packs during the season and go away from here without taking any further action towards assisting in the conservation. The way to conserve this product is to multiply the fish in the waters, and, if we are to do this, a more elaborate scheme, such as we have recommended to the minister, at Ottawa, must be carried out. Fresh water creeks, which are natural spawning grounds, must be cleared out so that the salmon may ascend to spawn; strict regulations must be enforced to prevent fishing these streams during the spawning season, and, if necessary, the time of fishing must be shortened. The cannery men have for years reaped the harvest, nature doing the sowing, they not having taken any action whatever to help in the seeding process.

"We hope your commission will give due cognizance to this letter, and we know that if your research work is to be complete, you will call on us in the very near future, when we shall be pleased to put before you, supported by positive facts, conditions which we are sure will enable you to agree with us."



LARGE COTTON COMMERCE MAY ARISE IN EAST

British Investigator Reports That Results Obtained There Exceed Production in Egypt and America.

BRITISH RAILWAYS AND CANALS TO OPEN IT UP

BLACKBURN, Feb. 28.—"When Mesopotamia and the Soudan are opened up by canals and railroads by the Imperial Government, it is probable that a large commerce in cotton from those countries will arise," says Fred. Hodgkinson, who has just returned from a trip of investigation in the East on behalf of the British Cotton Growers' Association. "The results obtained in experimental farms already established in Baghdad, Mesopotamia, and in the Amara region of the Eastern Soudan have shown a yield of more than double that in Egypt and three times as much as that in America."

NO EMBARGO ON SECURITIES

Complicated Financial Condition Follows Raising of Exchange Rates.

OTTAWA, Feb. 28.—The question of embargoing the import of securities has got no further than a suggestion emanating in particular from the bond people. No action has been taken by the Government and Sir Henry Drayton, minister of finance, will not say whether any is in contemplation. Canada, he pointed out, has always protected the investor. Canada held overseas amounts to a very large sum, conservatively estimated at \$1,250,000,000. These securities of railway, municipal and government issues of pre-war days were purchased by the overseas investors, many of them at as low a rate as four per cent. These securities are being returned in order that the profits, which the rate of exchange today yields, may be secured. Many of them are railway securities guaranteed either by the provinces or the Dominion. They would yield 6.10 per cent. It is obviously impossible to continue bond stabilization at par on securities yielding only 5 1/2 per cent when a like obligation, namely the credit of the Dominion, can be purchased at a rate to yield 6.40.

Proper financing by the provinces also becomes impossible. Railway securities guaranteed by different provinces have in a like manner been sold out at rates yielding from 6 1/2 to 6 5/8 per cent.
