## Hon. T. D. Pattullo Assured No Change in Regulations

### Emphatic Protest to Minister of Marine Against a Continuation of Monopoly; Received Immediate Reply From Mr. Ballantyne.

Yesterday afternoon S. E. Parker, president of the Board of Fisheries, received a telegram from Hon. T. D. Pattullo stating that he had received a wire from the Minister of Marine assuring him that no changes in the new fisheries regulations were contemplated.

This morning the following wire was received from Mr. Ballantyne:

"On Saturday, February 28, I wired the Hon. the Minister of Marine and Fisheries as follows: 'As provincial member for Prince Rupert I most emphatically protest against the action of the Board of Fisheries in continuing the monopoly in the fisheries regulations for 1920. Southern interests have been neglected for long enough, and with the necessity of supporting the Grand Trunk Pacific through the building up of northern interests, the people of the north, who are doing the pioneering and actually developing northern resources should be given first consideration.'

"I received the following reply: 'Replying to your telegram of February 28, I beg to inform you that no changes are contemplated in the new fishery regulations for 1920.'

## FRANCE STRIKE TROUBLE LEFT TO MILLERAND

of France Will Decide  
Between Disputants in  
Railway Embroglio.

## CAR SITUATION IS RELIEVED

All Boats in Have Now Sold;  
Refrigerator Cars Beginning  
to Arrive.

The car situation is a little better today but there are no more cars on hand than will be needed for immediate demands. Three refrigerators arrived on yesterday's train, one will be in today and five more are expected tomorrow. Private advices received from Vancouver and Seattle say that a number of the cars that should be used in carrying fish have been requisitioned for the carrying of a big shipment of silk for eastern points. There are no cars available there for fish.

The following boats sold yesterday and their catches are being loaded on the cars at hand:—Pauline, 8,000 lbs.; H. and R., 5,000; Director, 4,000; Atlin, 10,000; Ingrid, 10,000; Haysport No. 2, 7,000; and Pair of Jacks, 7,000 pounds. These boats all sold to the Pacific Sea Products at 10c and 6c.

The Viola sold 3,000 lbs. to the Royal Fisheries and the Molly May, 1,000 lbs., to the Cold Storage both at the same price.

The following boats sold today:—Albatross, 26,000 lbs., to the Pacific Fisheries at 13c and 6c.

Alfa, 11,000 lbs., Lebanon, 11,000 lbs., Volid, 5,000 lbs., sold to Booth Fisheries at 12.9c and 6c. W. and F., 11,000 lbs., Thelma, 12,000 lbs., Ethel June, 2,000 lbs., sold to Cold Storage at 12.9c and 6c.

Reynold, 7,000 lbs., sold to the Royal Fisheries at 13c and 6c.

The James Carruthers arrived yesterday with 20,000 lbs. of halibut and 20,000 lbs. of sable fish for the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co.

## ANOTHER CLASS TALK AT COUNCIL MEETING

Board of Trade Granted Sum of  
\$900 for Work of Year.

The City Council has granted the local Board of Trade \$900 for the year 1920 payable in monthly instalments of \$75. All the aldermen except Alderman Casey favored the grant but he maintained that the Board of Trade was a "class" organization, that is, of business men and the Central Labor Council or the Trades and Labor Council were as much entitled to a municipal grant as it.

## PRINCE ALBERT IN WITH FULL CARGO

Machinery for Marine Ways and  
Premier Mine; 115 Tons  
of Ikeda Ore for  
Anyox.

The Prince Albert arrived from Vancouver via lower Queen Charlotte Island points at 10 o'clock this morning. The vessel brought a full cargo and was loaded to the waterline. Among the cargo is the machinery for the Seal Cove Marine Ways which is being unloaded today. There is a large amount of general freight for Stewart including concentrating machinery for the Premier Mine and a big shipment of hay.

The Prince Albert picked up 115 tons of ore at the Ikeda Mines for smelting at Anyox smelter. Before returning south the Albert will make two trips to Stewart and Massett this week and next and will also go to Swanson Bay for a cargo of freight.

## LOCAL NEWS ITEMS

The mayor and aldermen will receive the same indemnity this year as last, namely, \$1,500 and \$300 respectively. This was decided at last night's council meeting.

Aldermen McLennan and Murray have been appointed to represent the City Council on the Memorial Committee. The Board of Trade is also to be asked to appoint two members before active work will commence.

On the recommendation of the Board of Works and the city engineer, it was decided at last night's council meeting to purchase 10,000 board feet of select No. 1 spruce from Albert & McCallery at \$32 per M. f. o. b. yards.

A letter from the city clerk of the city of Kamloops advocating the commencement of operations on a highway in the southern interior was read at last night's council meeting. The support of this council was asked but the letter was not considered to have much to do with this so it was filed.

## STOLE BRICKS AND DOOR FROM HOUSE OF HIS NEIGHBOR

O. Dominatto, a tall Italian of the fair type, appeared in the police court this morning for summary trial before Magistrate McMordie on the charge of stealing 200 bricks and a glass panel door to the value of \$18 from Jim Postulu. L. W. Patmore appearing for the accused, stated that strictly speaking the offence had been committed but that it seemed hardly right to press the charge of theft.

There was no element of crime in the man's action. The old brick had been lying outside an old deserted chicken house next to the house he was building. He had made no attempt to conceal either the brick or the door and had not used them. When Postulu had come and claimed the stuff he was willing to pay him or return it. Instead Postulu had reported to the police. Even now he wished to withdraw the charge. The accused was a hard working man and had a wife and three children who would suffer if he were incarcerated. Mr. Patmore recommended that he be let off with a bond or on suspended sentence.

The magistrate was inclined to be sympathetic but at the same time he thought that there was too much of this open-face stealing going on about town.

"Why," said Mr. Williams, prosecuting, "if a person doesn't stand guard over such stuff in this town, other people seem to think they are justified in taking it. They do not seem to know that it constitutes theft."

The magistrate remanded Dominatto until tomorrow morning so that he might look up what course was open to him in dealing with the accused.

## VANCOUVER WINS

(Special via G. T. P. Telegrams.) VANCOUVER, March 2.—Vancouver defeated Seattle by a score of 5 to 2 last night at hockey.

Principal A. M. Macdonald reports that the total actual attendance in the city schools for March was 608. The average actual attendance was 527.23, showing a percentage of 86.7. The total attendance shows an increase over January which was 580, but the actual attendance was a few points lower due to sickness among the children.

## Leyland Liner Struck and Broke in Two; Passengers Were Four Hours in Boat

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegrams.) HALIFAX, March 2.—The Leyland liner Bohemian, which went ashore on Ambrose ledges, is pounding heavily and the prospects of saving the ship are very poor. The four forward holds are full of water.

The passengers have been landed here from the tug Roebing, which had delivered them from the open boats wherein they spent four chilly and anxious hours.

There was no panic when the vessel struck. The passengers were told to go below and clothe themselves warmly. Then the lifeboats were lowered. The traditional rule of women and children first held, but husbands were allowed to accompany their wives. Blankets were also taken along for warmth.

HALIFAX, March 2.—(Noon)—The Citadel signal station reports that the Leyland liner Bohemian which stranded on Ambrose Ledge early yesterday morning and was later abandoned, broke in two this morning and sank.

## Mackenzie King Calls For Election

### Charges that Neither Cabinet nor House of Commons Represent Canadian People and is Not Trusted.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegrams.) OTTAWA, March 2.—The early passage of the promised Franchise Bill and constitutional steps toward the holding of a general election were urged in an amendment to the reply to the address moved by W. L. Mackenzie King, leader of the opposition, in the House of Commons last night.

Mackenzie King asserted that neither the House of Commons nor the cabinet represented the Canadian people. There was no minister from the Maritime Provinces and, therefore, a large section of the people were without a voice in cabinet matters. He claimed that the Government no longer trusted the people, therefore it was time to secure a representative House and Cabinet.

Sir George Foster, acting premier, in reply made an impressive reply on behalf of the Union Government and its accomplishments.

## Features of Session.

The following were the features of yesterday's session of Parliament:

Mackenzie King was told that the Jellicoe report would shortly be given to the House. The opposition leader was also informed by Sir George Foster that the Grand Trunk agreement would be given to the House.

Hume Cronyn of London, and R. McGregor, of Pictou, moved and seconded the speech from the throne.

Sir George Foster made a spirited defence in reply to the Liberal Leader's criticism of the Government.

The acting premier said that Sir Robert Borden was still Premier and would again take the helm should Providence give him health and strength.

## TRANS-PACIFIC POSSIBILITIES

Captain Nicholson Will Address  
the Board of Trade on  
This Subject.

At the Board of Trade luncheon tomorrow Captain Nicholson will address the Board of Trade on "The Possibilities of Trans-Pacific Transportation and Trade Development." As this is the one subject that Prince Rupert people are interested in above everything else, there should be a record crowd at the luncheon.

It is generally recognized that the next big step in local development will be the inauguration of a service with the Orient. Anything that will keep this question to the front or shed light on it will be of interest here.

## PREMIER HAS CONFERENCE AT NEW YORK

Sends Message to Parliament by  
Calder and Reid, Then Goes  
to Sulphur Springs.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegrams.)

NEW YORK, March 2.—After spending the late afternoon in conference with Hon. J. D. Reid and Hon. J. A. Calder on his arrival from England on the Carmania, Sir Robert Borden is resting at the Hotel Pennsylvania. At 2:15 this afternoon the Prime Minister left for White Sulphur Springs, West Virginia, with Lady Borden.

Sir Robert had nothing to say to Canadian and American newspaper reporters who were waiting for him when the Carmania docked.

It is understood that important matters of policy to be placed before Parliament, now in session, were discussed and that the two ministers carry back with them messages to Parliament from the Prime Minister of far-reaching political consequence.

## GETTING A LIFT

Major Godwin was Killed When  
Riding with His Friend.

VANCOUVER, March 2.—The coroner's jury yesterday afternoon found Motorman Greer blameless in the accident on Saturday when Major W. G. Godwin was killed and John Hanbury, the well known millman, was badly hurt.

Hanbury is recovering though still in the hospital. He was driving his auto towards the city when he was struck by the inter-urban electric car.

Presumably Hanbury did not see or hear the car until too late. He had picked up Major Goodwin to give him a lift to town and the interesting legal question now arises as to what is the possible liability of the auto driver under these circumstances.

## Open Fisheries Seems Real Thing.

The wire received from Hon. T. D. Pattullo sets at rest the fears that the open fisheries proposal may be set aside for another year. The first section of the new regulations defining the areas have been received at the Daily News office and may be seen there by anyone interested. A summary of it was given in yesterday's paper.

It is very satisfactory to know that the combined efforts of the Board of Trade, the Dominion member and the Provincial member have been successful in securing this change. There was a lot of effort put into the work. Delegations went to Ottawa in respect to it and letters and telegrams were sent. For several years the agitation had been kept up and this year there was a grand finale made possible largely through the co-operation and activity of the member for Skeena. Now it seems to be an accomplished fact.

## Board of Trade And City Grant.

Objection was made last night to a grant being made to the Board of Trade for publicity and other purposes. The board is composed largely of business and professional men and to a large extent it looks after the publicity in connection with the city. It answers correspondence and tries to put intending investors in touch with those who wish to establish industries here. It also takes up such matters of public concern as the recent fight for open fisheries which affects every class in the community.

Another matter it has striven to obtain and is still working on is the right to use gas boats on the Skeena River. All the members of the labor unions favor this, but it is the Board of Trade that keeps it to the front, sends delegations to Ottawa in regard to it, telegraphs resolutions and lets the people at Ottawa know that it is a live question here.

The Board of Trade has a great deal of influence when it takes up a public question as it is supposed to be representative of the interests of the city as a whole. Its members not only pay a fee of ten dollars a year but also do a lot of work gratuitously. They feel that the least the city can do is to support them. This the council decided to do at its meeting last night, but it would have been pleasant for the board to feel that its efforts were appreciated by the whole community, not only by seven-eighths of it.

## Public Library Is Live Question.

It is to be hoped now that the estimates are being prepared by the City Council that the matter of a public library will not be left out again this year. We suggest that those who are interested in this matter get together and meet the City Council and talk the matter over with them. There are many calls made on the city but a public library is of first importance.

Many people imagine that a costly building is necessary in order to get the library going. Such is not the case, however. All that is needed is a trained librarian, a place to keep the books and enough books to form a nucleus on which to build. A library is not a building, it is an institution.

It is absolutely necessary to have a librarian who knows the business. An enthusiastic librarian is worth a great deal to a community. Most people know little about books and they have little idea of choosing. It is the work of the librarian to make the selections and give the people what they want and try to induce them to read the better class of literature.

## FEBRUARY WAS RECORD MONTH FOR BUILDING

Value Was Greater Than Any  
Former February—Totalled  
\$27,710.

The building permits issued last month from the building inspector's office in the city hall show a big increase in erection of houses in the city. The permits issued total \$27,710 divided into \$8,985 for soldiers' houses and \$18,725 in general building. All the moneys allotted for the erection of houses for returned soldiers has been granted but there are several more permits to be issued for these houses.

As compared with other years the record for this month is highly satisfactory. The permits issued in February of other years is as follows: 1919, nil; 1918, nil; 1917, \$4,150; 1916, \$10,050; 1915, \$4,400; 1914, \$14,050; 1913, \$5,175; 1912, \$7,715. Eleven permits made up the value of buildings built here last month.

## FISHING BOAT IS WRECKED ON WEST COAST OF ISLANDS

No Trace of Crew to be Found;  
Evidently Engine Trouble was  
Cause of Distress.

The gas boat "Golden West" was found on February 19 wrecked and ashore at Ingraham Bay on the west coast of Queen Charlotte Islands. No trace of the crew has been found and the engine was in a dismantled condition with the cylinder head gone. Judging from appearances it would seem that engine trouble had been experienced and the boat had been driven ashore. The matter has been reported to the Seattle police, the boat being of American registry at Seattle.

## SURVIVOR OF KARLUK WEDDED IN VICTORIA

Chief Engineer of the Newington  
Marries Miss Maude Owen;  
Will Live at Digby Island.

A wedding ceremony of local interest was celebrated at Victoria last Tuesday when John Munro, son of Captain John Munro of Argyshire, Scotland, chief engineer of the lighthouse tender Newington, and Maude Ethel, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. James Kennedy Owen, of Toronto, were united in marriage by Rev. J. Gibson Inkster, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church.

The honeymoon is being spent in Seattle. On their return to Victoria Mr. and Mrs. Owen will reside for a short time there, later intending to come north to Digby Island.

One of the most famous of the polar expeditions is recalled by this wedding, the bridegroom having been chief engineer on the ill-fated Karluk, the vessel which left Victoria in the summer of 1913 with the Stefansson exploration party, and was ultimately lost in the ice of the Arctic. Mr. Munro was one of the party who were marooned on Wrangel and went through trying experiences before being rescued. When he returned to civilization the war was on and he immediately volunteered for navy service. He served four and a half years as lieutenant engineer on H. M. S. Patucka and saw service in the Mediterranean and North Sea, returning to the Pacific coast after the signing of the armistice.

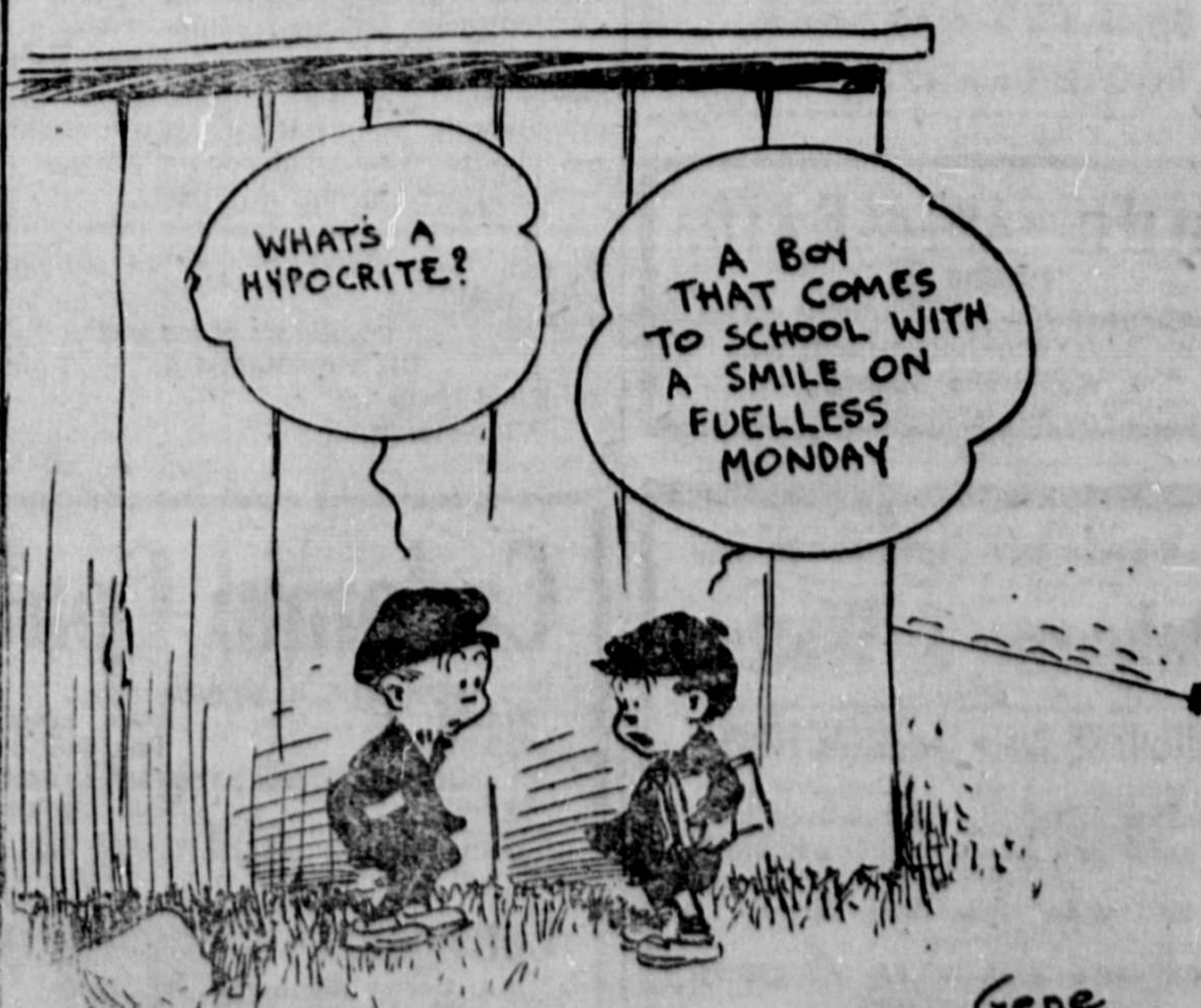

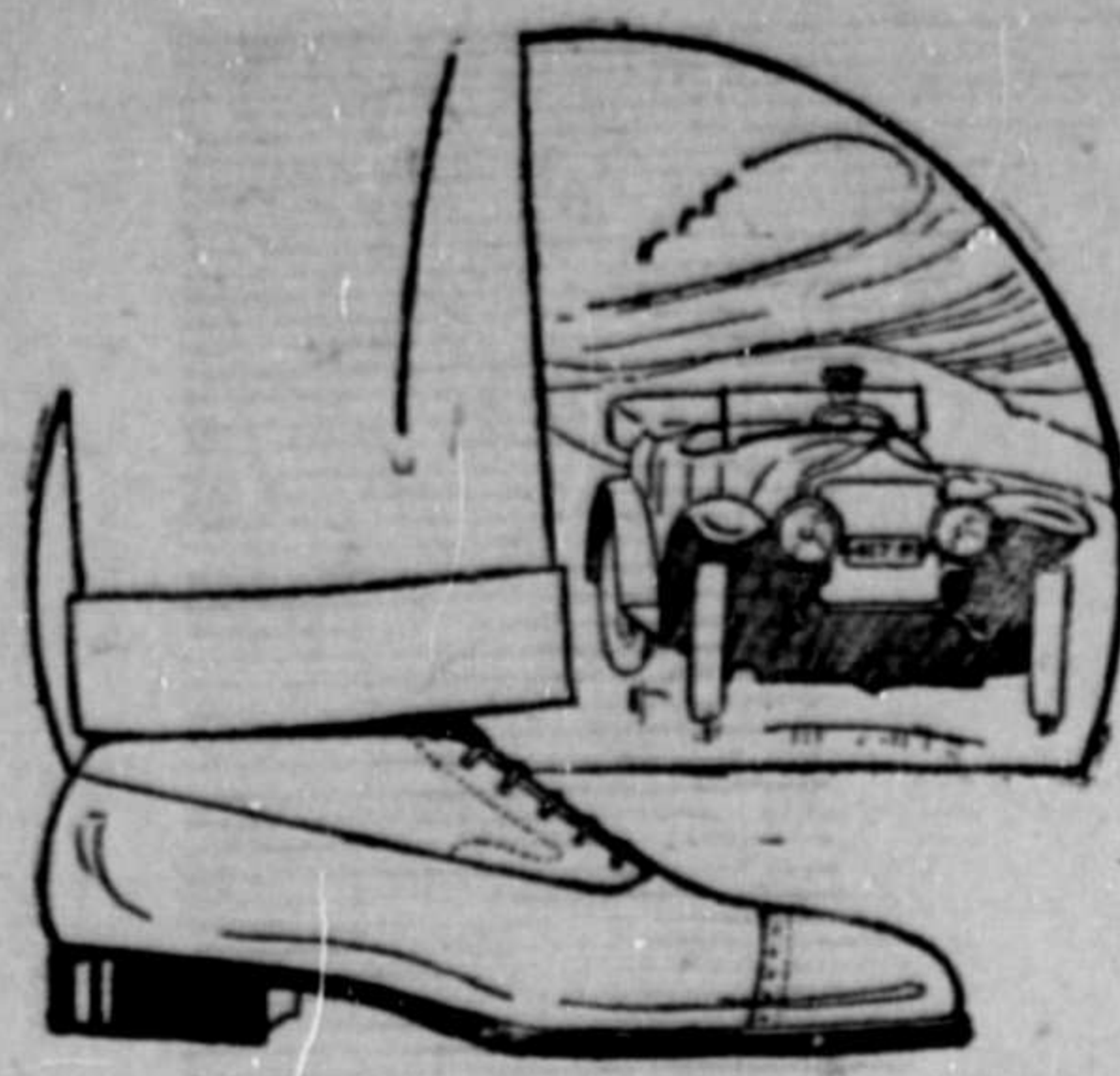

ATHLETIC CLUB  
SOLICIT FUNDS

Have Asked City Council for \$500  
to Aid in Sports for Juvenile  
Population.

Principal J. C. Brady and Dr. W. T. Kergin, as a delegation from the Prince Rupert Amateur Athletic Association, appeared before the City Council last night soliciting a grant of \$500 for the organization. The matter was referred to the Finance Committee for report at the next meeting of the council.

Mr. Brady explained that the Association was desirous of obtaining the services of a janitor at the Exhibition and Athletic Hall who would combine with such duties the conduct of training classes of boys and girls. His stipend would be paid with the \$500 asked for, substantiated by further money allotted by the Association. Mr. Brady emphasized the importance of such a step in the welfare of the younger people of the community and expressed the hope that the city would come to the aid of the association to this end. For the first time in his eight years as a resident of Prince Rupert he felt proud of the elevating work that had been done by the public-spirited citizens who had launched this worthy project.

## For Boys and Girls

Dr. Kergin explained that he was not a member of the Athletic Association but had been appointed a delegate to the city council. The idea of benefitting the young men by this association was good but he had particularly in mind the welfare of the boys and girls. The children in Prince Rupert have not the natural advantages that are the privilege of the children in most places and there is not even a Y. M. C. A. Healthy sport would make healthy bodies and clean minds and the appointment of a caretaker and instructor for their guidance would help to keep them away from influences that are not good. No expenditure could be better warranted or more important in the welfare of the city as a whole.

FISH CAUGHT  
IN FEBRUARY

1,140,000 Pounds Halibut Brought  
in—Sixty Tons of  
Herring Bait.

BIG SEASON WILL  
COMMENCE IN MARCH

The catch of 1,140,000 pounds of halibut landed here last month exceeds the catch landed in the same month last year by 181,000 pounds and also the catch of January this year which was 854,200 pounds. Besides the catch of halibut the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Company brought in 60 tons of herring, which will be used as bait. The excellent weather prevailing for the best part of last month made fishing good and only four days were lost by bad weather on the banks. The catch for the month is considered exceptionally good for this time of the year.

The prospects for the coming month are excellent. At the present the most of the halibut boats are out and some big catches ought to be landed here very soon. It is this month that the fishing season really commences and the slack season of the winter months may now said to be over. Salmon fishing will commence about March 15. The Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Company expect to bring in 150 tons more herring for bait purposes.

LOCAL UNION WAGE  
SCALE IN ERECTION  
MORSE CREEK BRIDGE

A delegation from the Central Labor Council, consisting of Fred. Shaw and George Rudderham, met the City Council last night with the request that in soliciting tenders for the erection of the Section 2 bridge the council embody in the call for tenders a clause providing for the payment of the local union rates of wages to workers. On motion of Alderman Dybhavn, seconded by Alderman Rochester, the matter was referred to the Board of Works who have the matter in hand for their consideration. A letter supporting this petition was also read from the Trades and Labor Council.

George Rudderham explained that labor in the city was not looking for trouble but, at the same time, they would stand for no labor skinkers coming in and cutting wages. It was for this reason that the deputation appeared before the council so that there could be no trouble arise. Fred. Shaw substantiated what was said by Mr. Rudderham.

Alderman Wilson Murray felt that the point was well taken and that besides protecting local labor it would protect the local contractors from lower wages prevailing on the outside where tenders might arise.
