Murder and Rapine Reported In Ireland With Reprisals

Three Men Killed in Different Parts of Country; Train Held Up and Robbed; Viscount French's Letters Stolen.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

DUBLIN, March 4.—The killing of three persons in various parts of Ireland has been reported during the past 24 hours. Shaw Taylor, a landowner, was shot at Atheney, County Wick, by an unknown man died as the result of wounds received yesterday evening, and Roger Marsh was killed at Cork by a party of armed men.

DUBLIN, March 4.—A score of armed men entered the Rathfriland railway station Tuesday night on the arrival of the Londonderry train. They seized the train master and porter and bound them with ropes, then they went to the waiting room.

When the train arrived the raiders pulled revolvers and placed the engine and the fireman under guard, and then ransacked the train. The passengers were not disturbed. The cashbox on the train was the only booty secured.

DUBLIN, March 4.—The military and police raided Liberty Hall, headquarters of Larkin's transport workers, and the Gaelic League Hall, headquarters of another organization, and the rooms of the Leinster College of Ireland, and numerous houses. The principal arrest known is that of William O'Brien, leader of the transport workers, who was prominent in the corporation and recently successfully demanded the removal of the mayor and sword from the city hall.

The theft of the letters of Viscount French has caused great excitement. All the houses in the district have been searched and numerous arrests made.

CHANGE MAKES NEW MARKETS

able for Canadians to Trade
ere Dollar is Nearer Par
Than in United States,
Says Senator.

OTTAWA, March 3.—In the Senate, the Opposition leader, Mr. Bostock, averred that the situation of the Canadian dollar in the United States might be a disadvantage to many Canadian merchants elsewhere, where they receive more approximate value of the Canadian dollar. "It might be advisable," the senator said, "to deal with countries who accept our dollar at a higher valuation than placed upon it by our immediate neighbors. The present situation ought to stimulate trade between Canada and the other parts of the Empire, where the change is normal."

AL SCHOONER SEIZED IN SOUTH

us Which Cleared from Here
st Week Had Unmanifested
Whiskey; Crew Arrested.

Federal authorities in Seattle seized the halibut schooner Ura last Saturday. Its cargo of 100 pounds of halibut was seized and Captain Carl P. and two members of the crew put under arrest following the discovery of five cases of Canadian whiskey aboard which were not listed in the manifest. The vessel cleared from Prince Rupert on February 24 bound for Seattle. He was not satisfied with the price offered for fish.

The law provides for the confiscation of both the vessel and the cargo if it is shown that the fish was carried unlawfully.

CARVING THE TURKEY

Supreme Allied Council Continues
Process in Vogue for Last
Sixty Years.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

LONDON, March 3.—The Supreme Council of the Allies has decided that in future Turkey shall have no navy and only a few revenue vessels shall be left for patrol purposes. The Turkish army will be dealt with tomorrow. Although the Council is silent as to just what areas of territory will be left under Turkish sovereignty, it is understood that the subtractions to be made from her present territories will decrease her population from 30,000,000 to 6,000,000. This course of action will necessitate an entire re-adjustment of the Turkish debt. The disposition of the Turkish fleet has not yet been decided upon.

ENTERTAINING PRINCE COST COUNTRY \$100,000

OTTAWA, March 3.—A statement of the Governor General's warrants issued since last session show that out of a total appropriation of \$120,000 allowed, the Federal Government expended \$101,790 in connection with the visit of the Prince of Wales. The statement was tabled in the House.

SPECIAL SESSION OF STATE LEGISLATURE

SEATTLE, March 3.—Governor Louis Hart has called a special session of the Washington legislature to consider the federal suffrage amendment and to provide funds for state schools.

\$1,000 A MONTH FOR CANADIAN AVIATORS

VANCOUVER, March 3.—Ten Canadian aviators have been hired at \$1,000 a month by the Chinese Government to teach aviation to Chinese students. Among the applicants are two Vancouver boys.

Discursive Debate in Commons French Canadians Prominent

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

OTTAWA, March 4.—The debate on the speech from the throne is following stereotyped lines with the exception of one or two breezy interludes. The speeches and the debate were largely in French and the benches were pretty well deserted. The attendance of Government members at one time got down to 10.

Mr. Trahan, of Nicolet, who opened the discussion yesterday, spoke on Mr. Gauthier's reference on Tuesday to "The Hour of Quebec" and when Quebec would be prepared to confer with the other provinces. Mr. Trahan deprecated any idea that Mr. Gauthier might have intended his remarks as a threat or that they implied revolt but that they merely reflected the opinion of Quebec. "Personal dignity and pride of conscience," said Mr. Trahan, "have made Quebec take the method of taking the lead in proposing the associations intended in order that it may better be controlled."

Farmers Dangerous.

W. F. Cockshutt, of Brantford, struck at the Farmer Movement. "It is a dangerous movement for Canada," he asserted, "and those who embark on it will find it out later. He also expressed the opinion that prohibition had not succeeded as it should have although it had been somewhat successful."

F. L. Davis of Nepawa thought the opposition would not find the western members in favor of a general election now or until the census had been taken next year.

In the Senate.

In the Senate, Senator Dandurand made an attack on Sir Robert Borden, saying no French-Canadian worthy of the name would serve under him.

Senator Pope defended the premier and condemned the making of party speeches in the Senate. Senator Roche dissented from the view of Senator Proudfoot that the status of Canada had advanced in the matter of autonomous government by becoming a member of the League of Nations.

Senator Schaffner adjourned the debate until Thursday.

ECONOMIC PROSPERITY RESTORED TO GERMANY

Council of Allied Premiers Inclined to Treat Delinquent Nation with Generosity.

LONDON, March 4.—Premier Lloyd George's plan for a more liberal attitude toward Germany, both in the enforcement of the Treaty of Versailles and in commercial and economic rehabilitation of the German nation, has begun to bear fruit. Germany will be restored to economic prosperity according to the Council of Premiers.

AUDIT ORDER IS REFUSED A. M. MANSON

Judge Macdonald Says that
It Would be Invasion of
Civil Rights.

(Special by Government wire.)

VANCOUVER, March 4.—Judge Macdonald in the Supreme Court chambers today refused to grant an order compelling the Drydock Company to allow A. P. Foster, auditor, appointed by order-in-council under the Company's Act, access to the books and accounts on the ground that it would be an invasion of civil rights and that proper notice should have been given to the Company before the order-in-council was signed.

The application was made by A. M. Manson, M. P., who is a shareholder in the company.

POSTAL DEPARTMENT SHOWS NEAT SURPLUS

Postmaster General has Presented
Statement for Fiscal year
of 1918-19.

OTTAWA, March 3.—The report of the Postmaster General presented to the Federal House showed a net revenue for the fiscal year 1918-19 of \$21,602,712.62, an increase of \$257,318.20 over the year previous. The expenditure of \$19,273,583.94 shows an increase of \$1,227,016.04. The surplus of revenue over expenditure for the year was \$2,329,128.04.

PRINCE RUPERT OLD TIMER DIES IN SOUTH

The death occurred on February 24 at a Vancouver hospital, of Headly Fenwick Sinnott, formerly of this city in his 46th year. Mr. Sinnott was well known in this town, being one of the pioneers. He left about four years ago and resided for a time at Revelstoke before moving to Vancouver. He leaves to mourn his loss a widow who is also in Vancouver. They resided in their own home here on Fifth Avenue East near Hays Cove Circle. Interment took place in Vancouver last Thursday.

WANTED TO CAPTURE LABOR EXCHANGES

MILAN, March 3.—Several hundred anarchists who attempted to capture the labor exchanges here were last night dispersed by the police.

FISH ARRIVALS

The King and Wing arrived in port yesterday morning with 75,000 lbs. of halibut for the National Independent Fisheries. The Clara also arrived yesterday with 3,000 lbs. This morning's arrivals included the Harvest with 4500 lbs., Norlund, 30,000 lbs., and Clara N., with 2500 lbs. These boats will await tomorrow's fish sale at the Exchange.

Steamship Line to Oriental Countries

Captain C. H. Nicholson Gives Notable
Address Before Board of Trade
Showing Possibilities of
Service.

"The millions of dollars spent in the construction of the Grand Trunk Pacific railway would have been futile if its object were attained by the completion of the line simply to Prince Rupert, without the tremendous advantages of traffic from the sea, brought to feed the line." Those were the words of Captain C. H. Nicholson used in the course of an address to the Board of Trade at a luncheon on board the Prince George yesterday afternoon. The speech was a very clear and concise argument in favor of a steamship line between this port and the Orient and was well received.

The luncheon was well attended, the capacity of the big dining room being taxed to the utmost. President Parker was in the chair and introduced the visitor and a hearty vote of thanks moved by W. E. Williams and seconded by Mitchell Albert was carried with enthusiasm.

The speaker made a general survey of the Oriental countries, giving facts and figures of great interest to Prince Rupert people. Then he said:—

"Certainly the natural advantages, both of location and trade possibilities are very great. Japan and China are our next door neighbors to the westward. Canada situated at the north of this continent, which extends so far westward as compared with the lower portions, certainly is not at a disadvantage, at least so far as the United States is concerned, and in this respect Prince Rupert has a desirable position and natural advantages over any other port on the Pacific coast, either in Canada or the United States. Lying 465 miles nearer the port of Yokohama than any other Pacific port gives it an advantage which will be of great value in intercourse with these Oriental countries."

Control Situation.

"With the magnificent grades on which our railroad is constructed, with the extensive and valuable harbor lying at our doors, capable of accommodating a vast volume of water-borne traffic, geographically at least, Prince Rupert is destined to become a gateway which will be competitive in the extreme with any other gateway already established. This means that when the railway line is put in first-class condition to permit trains running at the speed its grade and small curvature would warrant, it can compete (even with smaller and slower ships and consequently lower operating costs) with other transcontinental lines not having these advantages, for the great silk and tea trade from these countries. I have always considered the Grand Trunk Pacific would ultimately control the rate situation both on transcontinental and export traffic as well as on grain when it begins to move westward by reason of these things."

Original Idea.

It was, as you know, one of the original ideas in constructing the line and making this city its terminus, that a steamship service on the Pacific should be established. Certainly the millions of dollars spent in the construction of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway would have been futile if its object were attained by the completion of the line simply to Prince Rupert, without the tremendous advantages of traffic from the sea brought to feed the line.

It may have been a cause of wonderment in the minds of you gentlemen who are located in Prince Rupert why this line has not been established long ago.

VICTORIA, March 4.—The Erb interests got another jolt in the drydock case in the Court of Appeals here when an attempt to set aside Judge Morrison's order fixing the date of trial in the case for March 22 was dismissed.

The ground of appeal was that an appeal in regard to striking out certain paragraphs in the statement of defence should be first heard. This had been set down for hearing in April, but had not yet come up.

MOVIE STAR GETS DIVORCE

Mary Pickford Legally Freed
From Owen Moore on Ground
of Desertion.

RENO, Nev., March 4.—Mary Pickford, motion picture star, was granted a divorce here from Owen Moore on the ground of desertion. She has been living at a ranch at Genoa since February 16.

Moore was not in court though he was at Minden Monday. He was represented in the proceedings by an attorney.

Optimistic Over Future of Port.

Captain Nicholson is optimistic over the future of the port of Prince Rupert and expects it to be a big "gateway" to the Orient, rivalling the other gateways to the south. There are across the Pacific millions of people and magnificent cities. He wonders if Canada is alive to the situation and ready to take advantage of the awakening of the Orient.

Japan Developing On Industrial Lines.

In his address to the Board of Trade yesterday Captain Nicholson said:—

"With the abolition of the feudal system and the introduction of modern methods of government and life generally, we have seen the cost of living advance in Japan proportionately with other portions of the world. We have seen the laboring people becoming burdened to the extent that they are asserting themselves in the new freedom given them by this form of government until the rice riots and consequent strikes of 1918-19 have been the result. We find in Japan the spirit of trade unionism developed to a remarkable degree, that the various crafts are organizing themselves, walking delegates are being appointed, and a federation of unions is about to be established. As the change from the cottage to the factory system and the introduction of labor saving machinery in England in the eighteenth century brought about great changes in labor laws and conditions of the laboring class, it is reasonable to expect the same thing to happen in Japan and ultimately in China. In fact already labor of various classes has advanced in cost within the last three years from 150 per cent to 300 per cent. Consequently, it would appear that the competition in the cheaper operation of steamships is one which will probably disappear within the next few years. This will mean the operation of vessels by Canadian and American lines on more nearly the same basis, but I do not believe that this in itself will, when rates become normal, be sufficient to equalize conditions which must be met. We must do everything in our power to reduce the cost of operation in our ships.

Diesel Engines Are Economical.

"While not entirely familiar with the plans of the Government in connection with the Canadian Merchant Marine, I should think it advisable to investigate the possibilities of installing Diesel engines rather than steam as a means of effecting economical operation. To give an example of the economies thus to be obtained: In a comparative statement of costs between a steam driven and a Diesel engine driven ship of relatively the same size, for a voyage consisting of 236 days it is stated that with the additional carrying capacity by reason of the saving in space in bunkers and boiler room and the lesser crew carried and cost of pay and maintaining same, the Diesel engine ship was operated for this period at a saving of \$33,614. Taking the standard ship, as being built in our yards at Prince Rupert, roughly I estimate that if they were equipped with Diesel engines the operating costs per month would be reduced about \$4,500, and the increased cargo earnings from the same thus saved would amount to \$11,000 per month or between \$185,000 and \$200,000 in twelve months' operation. This in itself would go far to equalize competitive conditions, and, on the other hand, if, as is done by the United States Emergency Fleet Corporation, the Government carries its own insurance, interest charges and depreciation, fixed charges will be reduced to that extent and Government owned vessels will be that much more successful competitors in the great struggle which lies before us in the next few years."

Steamship Line to Oriental Countries

(Continued from Page One.)

but I think it is fair to say that its importance has not been lost sight of, nor has there been any lack of endeavor towards the establishment of trans-Pacific connections. I do not think it is any breach of confidence to say to you that negotiations have been entered into in various directions with such an object in view. These include practically most of the existing lines capable of undertaking such a service, such as the Cunard, White Star by our people in the east, while my own files contain negotiations with the Blue Funnel, Royal Mail, O. S. K. N. Y. K., T. K. K., Trans-Oceanic, Chinese Mail and Harrison lines. Several of these companies have had their officials up here looking over the ground, but owing to the completion of the railway at about the time of the outbreak of the Great War, the resultant stoppage of money supplies, the demands on tonnage for war purposes, and many other considerations of which you gentlemen are well aware, these negotiations have not proved up to the present time successful.

Port Facilities.

The lack of proper port facilities has entered into this question, and this too has been the result of the same conditions which prevented successful completion of the negotiations sometimes so strongly carried on with those various transportation industries. Now, however, the situation is rapidly changing; the world war is ended and peace has been finally and officially declared, and every country is actively engaged in re-establishing itself on a firm commercial basis and stabilizing its industrial and civil interests.

There is no reason, in my opinion, why a line cannot be successfully operated between Prince Rupert and these Oriental countries. I have never lost faith in the idea. We have the natural resources and the raw materials which these people want, whether it be lumber and pulp, iron and steel, fish, grain and flour, or manufactured articles; Canada is capable of producing these in vast quantities and in some cases vaster quantities than any other country. The Province of British Columbia alone exported to Japan last year more pulp than all other countries together.

Imports.

"On the other hand, we have in the Orient cotton, silk, tea, ore, oils (both vegetable and mineral), rubber and many manufactured articles which have already found an extensive market in our cities; and further, in view of the agricultural limitations of the Japanese Empire it has become the announced policy of its government that the attention of its people must be directed to manufacturing, and we shall find before long the Japanese manufacturers competing with the Americans and Canadians in the marketing of many products of our factories situated within our own border.

"With the change in world conditions, with the cessation of war activities, come to us great changes which have occurred under Government influences in our transportation systems. It is not my purpose to discuss this question in general, but merely to say that whatever may be the opinions of our citizens on Government ownership of railways, I believe there is less diversity of opinion as to the wisdom of our Government launching out into the construction and operation of steamships on the various world's trade routes.

20th Century is Canada's.

"As is well known, the Japanese and even the Chinese have great aspirations in that direction. It has been stated by one of our leading statesmen that 'the twentieth century belongs to Canada.' We have felt and hope that this is true. It is a fact that the great development in transportation of the last century occurred on the Atlantic. It is equally true that the future field of activity will be on the Pacific, and consequently the development of trade on the Pacific will belong to the twentieth century; and does it not suggest itself to you that as our shores border on this great field of enterprise, Canada will assume an important place, demand and receive her full share of the fruits of the

struggle for supremacy which is rapidly developing on this western ocean.

Japanese Competition.

Owing to the peculiarities of the location of Japan and its isolation from the scene of strife, it has taken advantage of the opportunity and developed in a most rapid and perhaps alarming manner its position in the Pacific carrying trade. With their lower costs of living and their lower rates of wages, with their intense feeling of loyalty to their own enterprises, they do and will form a competitive feature which must be taken into consideration. It is my opinion that transportation enterprises on the Pacific, in view of these conditions, can only be undertaken by the most powerful combination of business and financial interests. No small institution can hope to live in the face of this keen competition. Consequently, it seems to me a wise move on the part of our Government that they should undertake as they have done, the construction of ocean-going ships to be owned by the Government and controlled by the great transportation system which is about to be established. We have known of the immense subsidies which the Japanese Government has given to their steamship lines, practically giving them the control of rates, and this has been a deterrent factor in the success of successful steamship operation on the Pacific heretofore. This is one of the conditions to be faced by the Canadian Merchant Marine which is being established.

"Gentlemen, let me say in conclusion that while the experience of the last few years has been a discouraging one as far as the outlook at Prince Rupert and our line is concerned, I look forward to better times and a brighter future, and I believe that with the active co-operation of such bodies as the Prince Rupert Board of Trade and our indomitable and energetic representatives in the Federal House, the dawn of a better day is already crimsoning the horizon, and soon we shall find ourselves bathed in the glorious sunshine of noon-day prosperity, and Prince Rupert as a city and port will come into its own and achieve the destinies which its founders, through their foresight and business wisdom, predicted and prophesied for it."

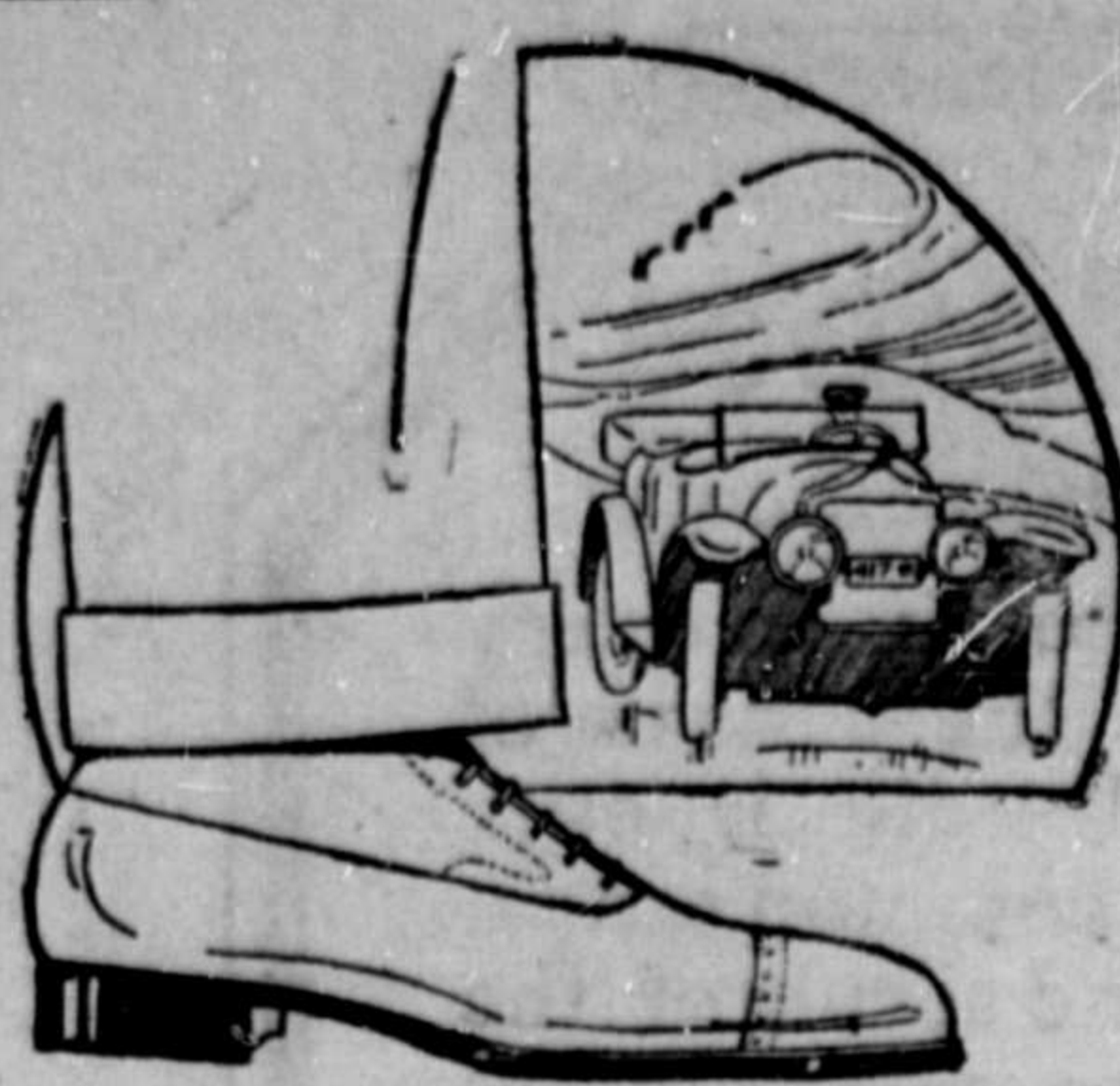

"I am instructed to inform you that the executive board of this branch of the Great War Veterans' Association, at their last meeting unanimously decided to lodge a protest with you regarding the using of returned soldiers as stool pigeons and request the discontinuation of same.

It is pointed out that, owing to the nature and severity of the service rendered by some men, their mental balance has not been all that could be desired since their return and it is felt that to employ such men in this capacity is not in keeping with the best interests of the community."

PRINCE RUPERT READY

Will Replace Prince George Tonight, Sailing for South at Midnight—George to Dock.

**"IF BOY GOES TO JAIL,
YOU SHOULD GO AS WELL"**

Judge Young Says to Chinese
Father Who Wants Boy to
Go to Penitentiary.

The case of Rex versus Lee Wong, charged with wilful damage in breaking a plate glass window in his father's store, came up before Judge Young in the Court House yesterday and the accused was remanded until 3 o'clock this afternoon. Constable McGlinchy, who made the arrest, Lee Nan, clerk in the store, and Ah Lung, who held the accused down till the police came, gave similar evidence to that given in the preliminary trial in the police court. W. S. Fisher testified as to \$134 damage done which the father refused to pay.

The accused, who is only 16 years of age, was heard in his own defence. About two weeks ago he had slept outside one night and the next day came back to the store for the key. This he afterwards came to return but Lee Nan, the clerk, did not see him. Later Lee Nan asked him for the key and when he would not give it to him Lee Nan got a knife, about the size of his finger, and hit him on the head, laying him out. The accused was thrown out and he got a bottle with which to hit the clerk. Before he got a chance to do so, Ah Lung tried to take it away from him with the result that the window was broken in the tussle.

Denied Knife.

Lee Nan denied the story about the knife saying that there was not even a knife on the premises. He had thrown the boy out and he had deliberately thrown the bottle at the window, making two shots before he was successful.

Lee Wong, Sr., the father, was also in court. He told that he wanted the boy to go to school but he refused to do so. On one occasion he had taken an axe and was going to strike him. On another, when the father was in the hospital, the boy had stolen \$70. He would not pay for the window and wanted Lee Wong, Jr., to go to the penitentiary.

Judge Young inquired about the boy's mother, why he had come to Canada and how he had come by the terribly withered arm. The father explained that the boy's mother was in China. He had brought his son out to Canada so that he could learn English. His arm had become withered as a result of the smallpox. He would not go to school here but wanted to go to Victoria.

Judge's Reprimand.

The judge in remanding the case urged that Dr. Cade, medical health officer, give him a thorough examination and that he would decide as to the sentence by tomorrow. The boy was guilty and the breaking of the window had no doubt been done deliberately. "The father wants him to go to the penitentiary and wants to force him onto the government. If I send the boy to jail the father ought to go too. It is his duty as a father to give him medical attention and put him on the right track. This, it seems, he is averse to doing," concluded the judge.

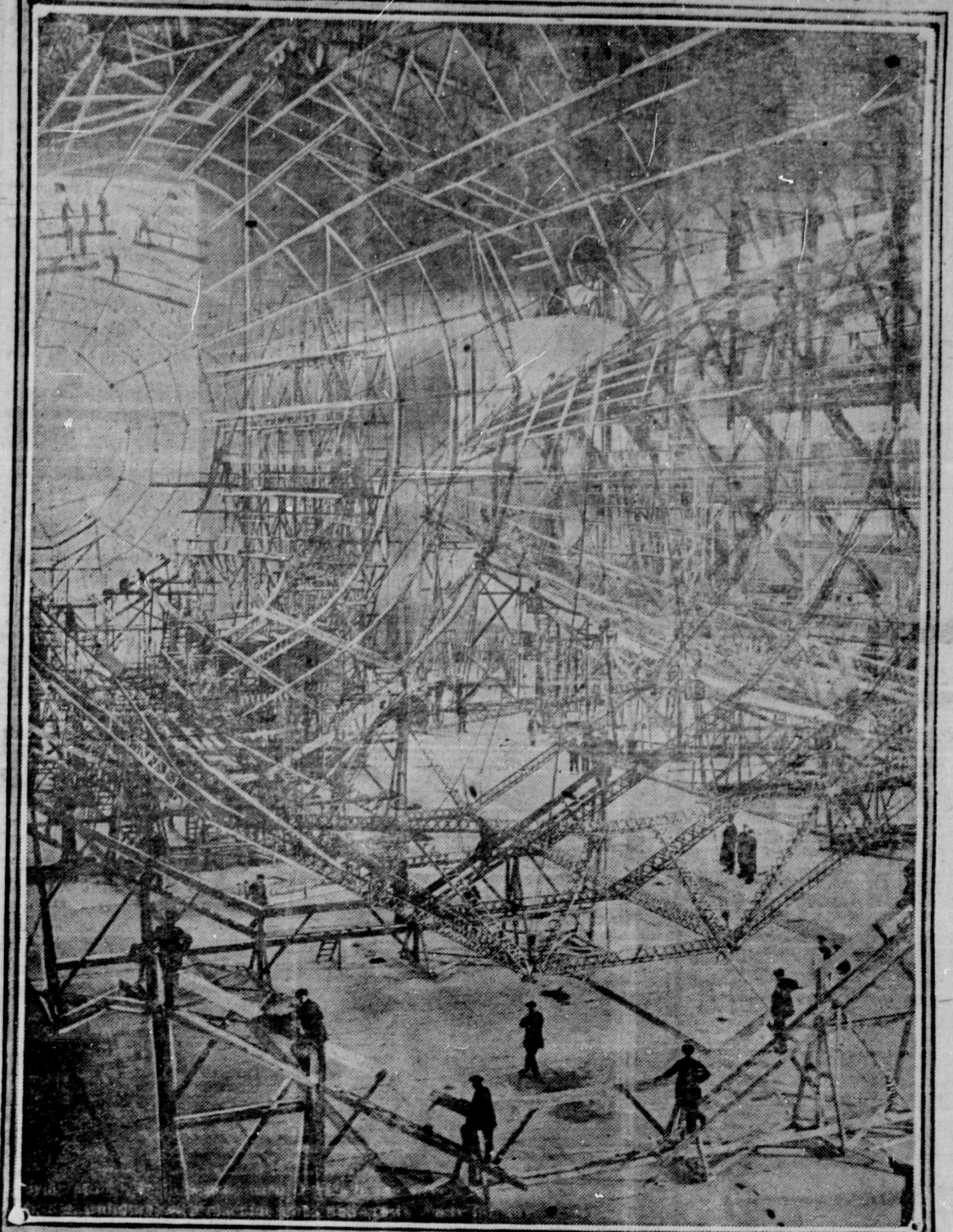

HERRING FISHING AT CAPTAIN'S COVE

Are Trying Out the Pounding Scheme—1,000 Tons Objective

The herring fishing is going along steadily at present and the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. has already bought 100 tons for bait purposes from Don Yelf and Jack Bradbury who are operating two boats, the Navigator and Reveille, at Captain's Cove, 40 miles south of here on Pitt Island in Ogden Channel. Purse seines are being used with good success and the objective is 1,000 tons.

The herring fishing will continue until the end of May when the boats will start fishing for spring salmon. Messrs. Yelf and Bradbury have twelve men employed at Captain's Cove. The herring, it is expected, will sell for about \$25 a ton. A much talked of scheme, the pounding or trapping of herring, is being tried out but as yet none of the fish caught in this manner has been brought in. By this method the nets are stretched across the mouth of the cove and the fish are thus trapped and gathered up. It is a much simpler method to that used by Indians and others in trapping the run of spawning salmon going up streams in the late summer. Messrs. Bradbury and Yelf are going ahead with the scheme and consider it will be successful.
