Dominion Government Replies To Representations of Labor

Cognize Right to Organize in Industrial Field but not for Those in Service of State; Eight Hour Day.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
OTTAWA, March 5.—Replies to the demands, requests and suggestions of the Dominion Trades and Labor Congress have been forwarded by the secretary of that organization. Regarding the right to organize, the Government points out that this has been recognized as far as industrial workers is concerned, but to request that this principle be applied to Government employees is refused. This is definitely conveyed in the following: "Employees in the service of the Federal Government are in a different category. Inasmuch as there is no incentive

the standpoint of money to impose unfair or onerous conditions or rates of pay cannot be conceded that service employees shall be brought to the control of any organization or federation of industrial workers and benefit in industrial disputes."

Collective Bargaining.
Reply to the suggestion that Government recognize the principle of collective bargaining substituting it in its own departments wherever practicable. The initiative in establishing councils in industries organizing trades unions as the principle of representation, the Government states:

"The administration of the Government of Labor, the minister of that department has on more than one occasion recognized the wisdom on the part of employers and employees in such cases or as groups in a given industry, of meeting together and negotiating with a view to the settlement of differences existing between them."

48-Hour Week.
The request for the adoption of the forty-eight hour week for an eight-hour day. It is explained: "The Peace Treaty demands the adoption of a forty-eight-hour week for an eight-hour day. It is a firm purpose to give legal effect to the terms so agreed upon."

Further question as to whether necessary legislation within the jurisdiction of the Federal Parliament of Canada or of the provincial legislatures is now being considered in view of reaching understanding with the provinces on this subject.

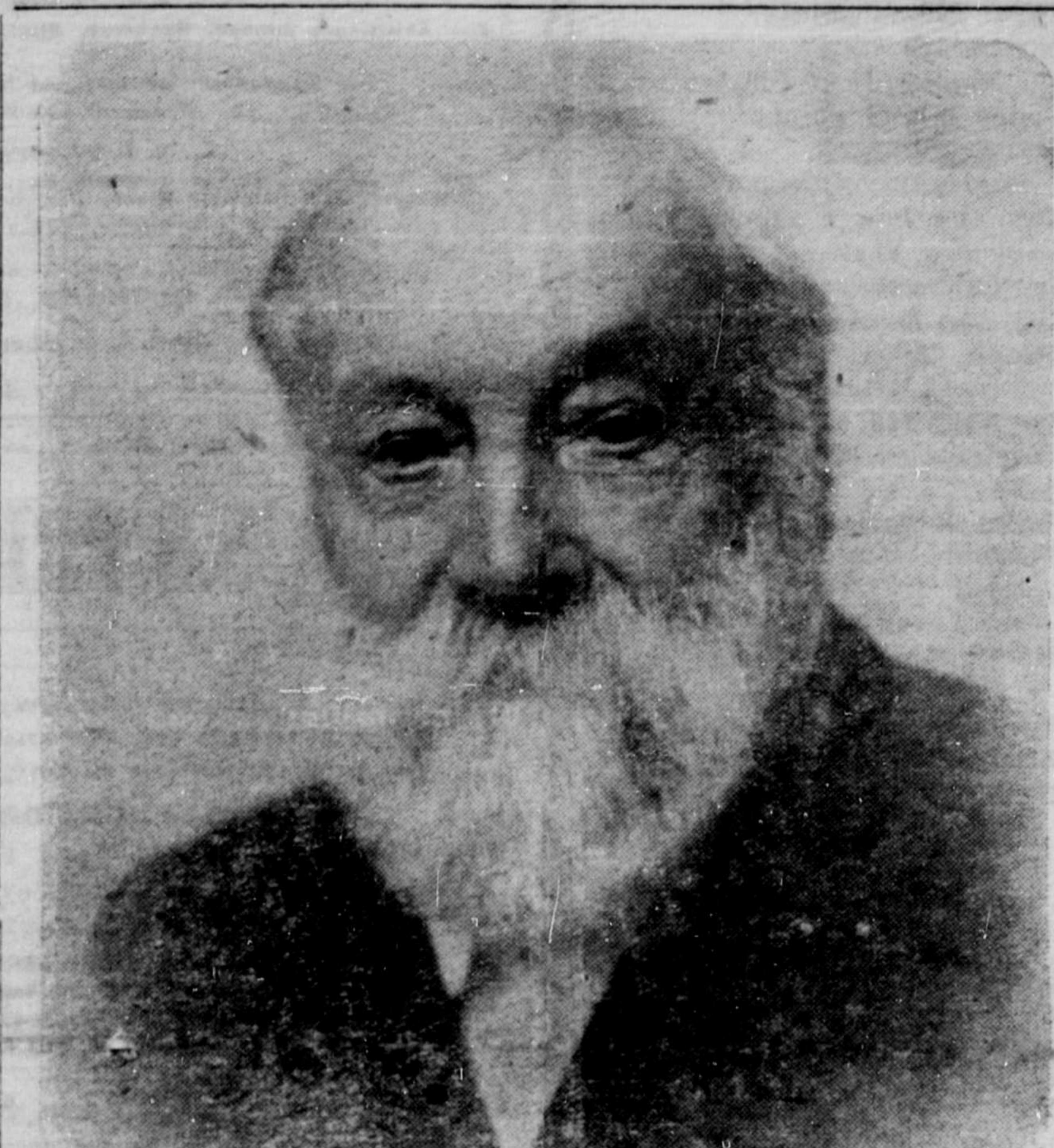

Turkey to Be Shorn of Territory But to Keep All Her Sacred Places

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
LONDON, March 5.—Turkey is stripped of virtually all her territory in Europe but retains the sacred places by a treaty now being completed by the Conference of Foreign Ministers and Ambassadors.

Thrace has been awarded to Greece, but the present conference is charged with the task of working out plans whereby Turkey will keep control of the sacred places and Adrianople. Smyrna will be placed under Greek control.

Premier of Italy Is Not Satisfied With Peace Treaty

PARIS, March 5.—Premier Nitti of Italy has formally demanded the revision of the Hungarian Peace Treaty. It is stated that Lloyd George is inclined to support Nitti in his demand.

BIG DOG DERBY MARCH 16 NEXT

Field of Twenty-one Entries is Expected in 100-Mile Non-Stop Race.

THE PAS, March 5.—The 1920 Hudson Bay dog derby will be started on Tuesday, March 16, with a searchlight, and huge bonfires lighting up the banks of the Saskatchewan River. A field of 21 entries is looked for.

The race is a 100-mile non-stop. The trails are reported to be heavy and drifted in spots and the race managers, it is expected, will send out a few teams the day before in order to break such parts of the trail as need it.

UNION CAUCUS NEXT TUESDAY

Message From Sir Robert Will be Considered Then.

OTTAWA, March 5.—While much interest is being taken in the forthcoming first caucus of Unionist supporters in the House of Commons, it is intimated that such a gathering will not take place before Tuesday. Then it is expected that some sort of message from Sir Robert Borden will be given to members by Hon. J. D. Reid as a result of their meeting with the Prime Minister in New York.

Major of Mounted Police Has Died AT HAWAIIAN CITY

VANCOUVER, B.C., March 4.—A cable received here from Honolulu says Major J. E. Fitz-Horrikan, of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police for B. C., is dead. Major Fitz-Horrikan went to Honolulu for the benefit of his health. He joined the Mounted Police in 1899 and spent 13 years in the service in the Yukon.

MOTOR CARS WILL HAVE DIM LIGHTS

Bill to Make Illegal the Bright Headlights Which Annoy Passengers.

The Government bill introduced into the Provincial Legislature providing for dim or partly dim lights on motor cars reads as follows:

"No lighting device over four-candle power equipped with a reflector shall be used unless the same shall be so designed, deflected, or arranged that no portion of the beam of reflected light when measured seventy-five feet or more ahead of the lamps shall rise above forty-two inches from the level surface on which the vehicle stands, under all conditions of road: Provided, however, that this subsection shall not apply to what is known to the trade as 'spot-lights' when used as such but such 'spot-lights,' if so used, shall not be directed at an approaching vehicle."

TRANS-ATLANTIC FLIGHT

LONDON, March 5.—The Dutch Government has offered a large prize for an air flight from Holland to the Dutch West Indies, a distance of 9,200 miles.

Crerar Criticizes But Asks Election

Union Government has Served its Purpose, he Thinks, and House Cleaning Now Due; Redistribution First Perhaps.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

OTTAWA, March 5.—Criticising both the leader of the Government and the leader of the opposition for lack of constructive thought in their speeches, Hon. T. A. Crerar, leader of the cross benches in the House of Commons, declared he would support the King amendment calling for a general election, because he felt that the Union Government had served its purpose and a house cleaning was now due. A new administration was needed to cope with the troubles of Canada.

T. W. Caldwell, Carlton, N. B., and O. R. Gould, of Assiniboia, then made speeches defending the agrarian platform against charges of class legislation, and declaring that the tariff penalized farmers.

Hon. Arthur Meighen defended the Government and attacked Mackenzie King's demand for an election and said that Crerar was the leader of a class party.

Want Redistribution.

W. A. Buchanan of Lethbridge, declared he would support the Government on the assurance that there would be a census and registration to give the west fair treatment in representation. He condemned those who would oppose the tariff indiscriminately.

W. H. Whidden of Brandon declared the franchise should give the vote only to those of Canadian citizenship.

W. F. McLean of South York said the Prime Minister should be in the House more often. He wanted redistribution before an election.

NO REFRIGERATOR CARS THIS MORNING

There Was, However, 89,000 lbs. of Halibut Landed at 9c and 6c Today.

The car situation is again bad at the waterfront, there being no cars available for the fish at this morning's fish sale. The Cold Storage and the Royal Fisheries were the only bidders at the sale and the price paid was 9c and 6c. The Johanna, not satisfied with the price offered, cleared for Seattle with 18,000 pounds. The Royal Fisheries bought the catch of the Clara N., a Canadian boat, 2,500 pounds.

The Canadian Fish and Cold Storage bought up the catches of the following boats which will be put in cold storage:—Clara, 3,000 lbs.; Hervester, 4,500; Norlund, 30,000; Myrtle, 8,000; Daisy, 2,500; Vienna, 8,000; Marguerite, 5,000; Mayflower, 3,000 lbs.

Post Office Surplus
Not Legitimate.

A despatch from Ottawa tells that the post office department shows a surplus for the year of something like two and a quarter million dollars. The figures look well, but they do not represent a legitimate profit. The money is wrung from a lot of sweated employees that are woefully underpaid.

Possibly the worst cases of sweating are found in the big cities where the letter carriers work for a miserable pittance. Even in this city the postal clerks and other employees have, in many cases not been paid enough to live on. Not only that but here and elsewhere there is no real desire to serve the public, as often the number of sorters has been altogether too few. The result is that the public have to wait. The staff do the best they possibly can under the circumstances, but they have been unable to cope with the work. Still they go on without complaining and take the abuse of the disgruntled public without a murmur.

The Postmaster General likes to make a good showing, naturally, but it does not look well to show a profit of over two million dollars from a starved service. Every man and woman should give a good day's service for a day's pay, but he should not be asked to work in the public service for far less than is being paid by private employers.

Election Talk But
Nothing Certain.

There is talk of Dominion and Provincial elections. Many think the Dominion Government cannot hold together much longer, but a government supporter told the opposition on Wednesday that they need not expect an election until after the census had been taken next year.

In the provincial field there is no certainty. There is no demand throughout the country for an immediate election and it is not at all unlikely that it will be held after the session next year. There was a rumor to the effect that an election would be held this fall but it is wholly without any foundation except that it is known that an election must be held before very long and the autumn is a customary time for such events.

Visit of Prince
Costly Event.

The visit of the Prince of Wales to this country was a costly affair. At a time when the country is in a bad financial condition it is a large amount of money to spend. The visit was certainly appreciated and the young prince made himself very agreeable and played the part assigned him very well. We doubt, however, if it is a good precedent to pay large sums for entertaining princes in a democratic country.

Lawyers Likely to
Get Most of Cash.

Judging by outward appearances the lawyers are likely to get most of the pickings from the ship contracts. No opportunity seems to be lost in bringing some phase of the case before the courts. What is most puzzling to the man on the street is what Newman Erb expects to get out of the contracts if he keeps the case under litigation indefinitely. It is to be hoped that the trial will come off on the 22nd and that a speedy settlement will be made. In the meantime work is proceeding steadily although not as rapidly as was expected.

It is possible that he may bring this matter up tonight or bring it to the attention of the committee when formed. Capt. Freeman says he is willing to put up \$100 himself for this purpose.

George Leek is also considering holding a sale and he says he has already been promised a good deal of support.

ROUMANIAN PREMIER AND GREAT BRITAIN

On Recent Visit He Asks for Closer Relations to Offset German Influence.

In view of the pronouncement of Premier Alexander Vaida Voeved, of Roumania in regard to the effort to restore the Hapsburg dynasts in that country, it is interesting to note that he recently visited England and while there is reported by the London Times to have said:—

"The reason why Roumanians desire that the relations between Great Britain and Roumania should be closer, is quite simple. Because of her geographical situation Roumania was obliged to submit to German influence and even to an alliance with Germany. The result of this alliance and this influence was war against the Central Powers on the side of the Allies. Today we are able to appreciate the power, the sincerity, the good will of our Allies. The warm reception which has been given to me in London is for me the best of proofs, and I shall entertain for it deep gratitude. I am sure henceforth that you will not draw away from us after the conclusion of peace the friendly hand that you stretched towards us during the war.

"We shall defend ourselves against those who attack us, but in the defence against Bolshevism I consider we have a European role, that we should help in consolidating Russia herself and that we should defend—with the Poles—the rest of Europe. It is from this point that I again ask for the support of our Allies, and I am sure that the wisdom of the Allies' statesmen will not refuse me this."

FRED STORK GIVES ADDRESS TO TEACHERS

The bi-monthly meeting of the Prince Rupert Teachers' Association took place Wednesday afternoon in Borden Street School. Fred Stork delivered an inspiring address on the subject of education from the business man's point of view. He stated that, in view of the fact that ninety per cent. of the pupils attending school would take their places in the business world, they should be given some idea of the rudiments of business.

A hearty vote of thanks was tendered to Mr. Stork for his splendid address, and the hope was expressed that other citizens would be induced to speak to the association from time to time.

EASTER DANCES

Two Already Being Planned for Easter Week and Week Following.

Already preparations are being made for Easter festivities. On Easter Monday the annual Daffodil Ball is usually held under the auspices of the Municipal Chapter of the L. O. D. E. and it is expected that it will be held again this year. 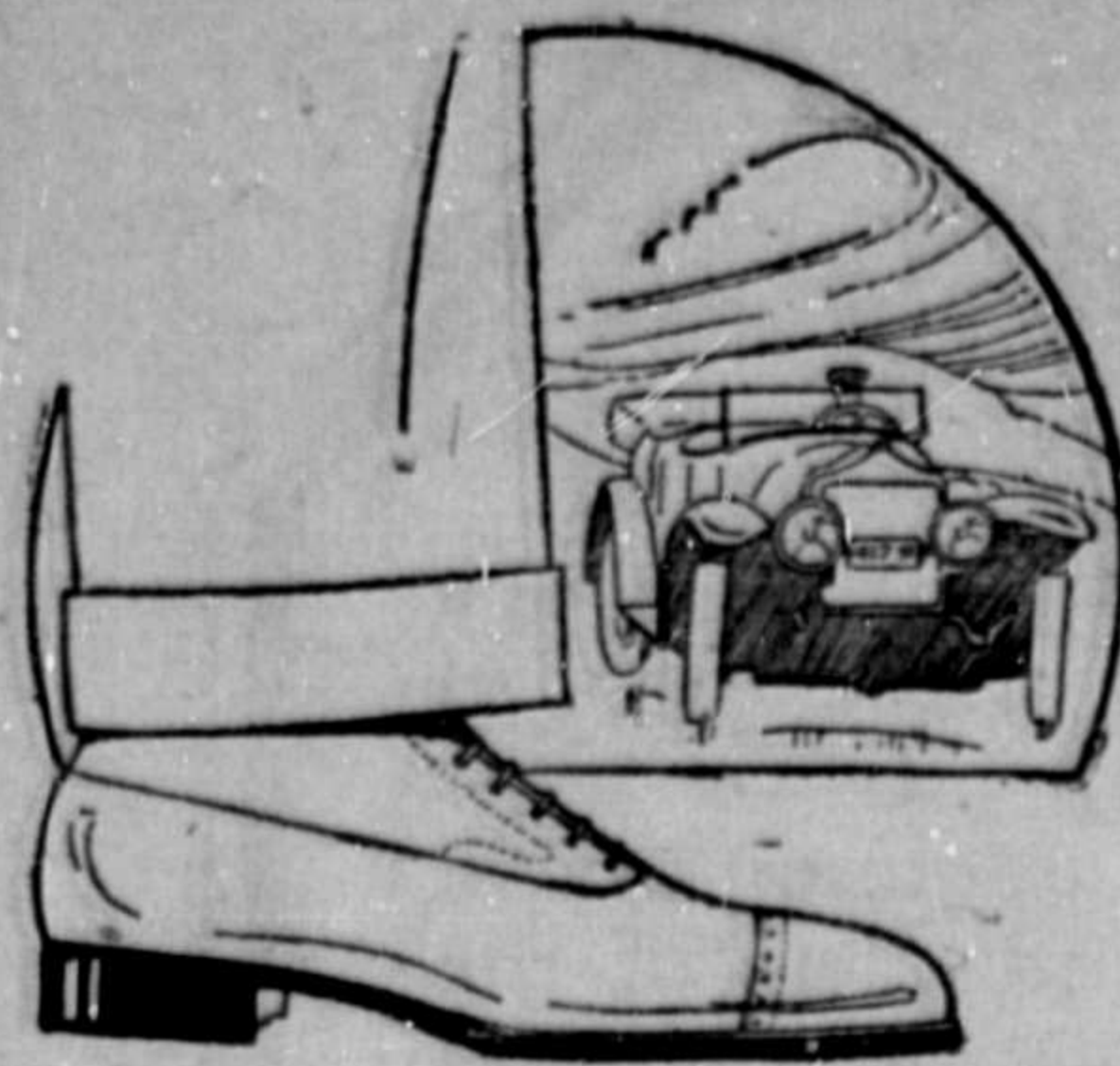

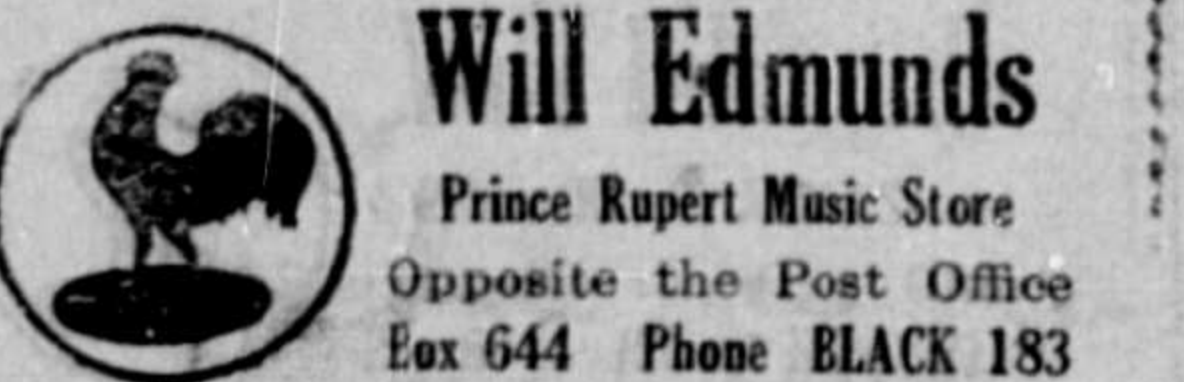

Sport Briefs

Football organization is going on apace. Already two clubs have met and appointed organizing committees and the others are working on their plans. The Great War Veterans have put a confident challenge to play any team in town and they will show next Saturday what kind of an aggregation they have to offer. They have a large field to choose from in selecting players, as the membership is large and a lot of the members took an active part in the football field before enlistment. If their members do not become attached to other clubs they should put up a formidable aggregation. The matter of affiliation is apt to cause trouble in arranging the different rosters.

Still we hear nothing of baseball organization. The managers are busy, however, and when they do start there is no doubt they will do something. The season is a little early as yet but the good players are pretty well sized up and it will not take long to get them together. The season will probably open with a smoker to obtain funds for working expenses and then they will be off. A week or so should bring forth some concrete plans in baseball circles for the 1920 season.

George Kennedy, prominent sporting promoter of Montreal, announced recently that his partner, Jack Curley, has signed a sixty-day contract with Georges Carpentier, the French heavyweight champion, to give exhibition bouts in Canada. Carpentier will appear in Montreal, Toronto, Ottawa and some of the western cities. A bout between Carpentier and Dempsey in France has been practically given up. It is the opinion of Descamps, the Frenchman's manager, that if the fight takes place it will be held in the United States. Descamps also states that the promoter who gets Dempsey to sign a contract will get the fight, as the French pugilist is not holding anything in the way and is only too anxious to have the fight.

A meeting of the American committee has been called for March 13 at New York and notices have been mailed to national associations supervising amateur sport, which will be represented at the international games at Antwerp. The manager of the Olympic is expected to be elected at the meeting and it is thought that this position will go to Matthew P. Halpin, of the New York Athletic Club, who successfully guided the American teams at Athens in 1906, at London in 1908, and at Stockholm in 1912.

The first detachment of greater New York's major league representatives is on its way south for spring training. Pitchers Al Mamaux, Clarence Mitchell and Harry Heitman, and Infielder Chuck Ward of the Brooklyn Dodgers, in company with a troupe of New York and Brooklyn newspapermen, sailed recently for Jacksonville, Florida. Managers Huggins, of the Yanks, and Wilbert Robinson, of the Dodgers, have planned to begin training this week. The main squad of the two teams will be leaving in a few days for the training fields.

PREDICTS THAT HAPSBURGS MAY BE RESTORED

Premier of Roumania Expresses
Himself in During Interview
to Pall Mall Gazette.

LONDON, March 5.—Alexander Vaida Voeved, premier of Roumania, in an interview printed in the Pall Mall Gazette regarding the appointment of Admiral Horthy as regent of Hungary is quoted as follows:

"The new Hungarian Regent will try in every possible way to effect the restoration of the Hapsburg dynasty with Charles as king. Under the direction of Admiral Horthy the direction of the Allied Supreme Council will be flouted at a ripe moment and the kingdom established.

"The Hungarians believe the Allies are too weary to take serious action. For some time there has been a secret organization in Hungary of all men between the ages of 18 and 26. Arms have been obtained in Austria and efforts made to obtain munitions in Warsaw."

Vaida Voeved predicted that the former emperor's son will be proclaimed king if the plan to restore the emperor, himself fails.

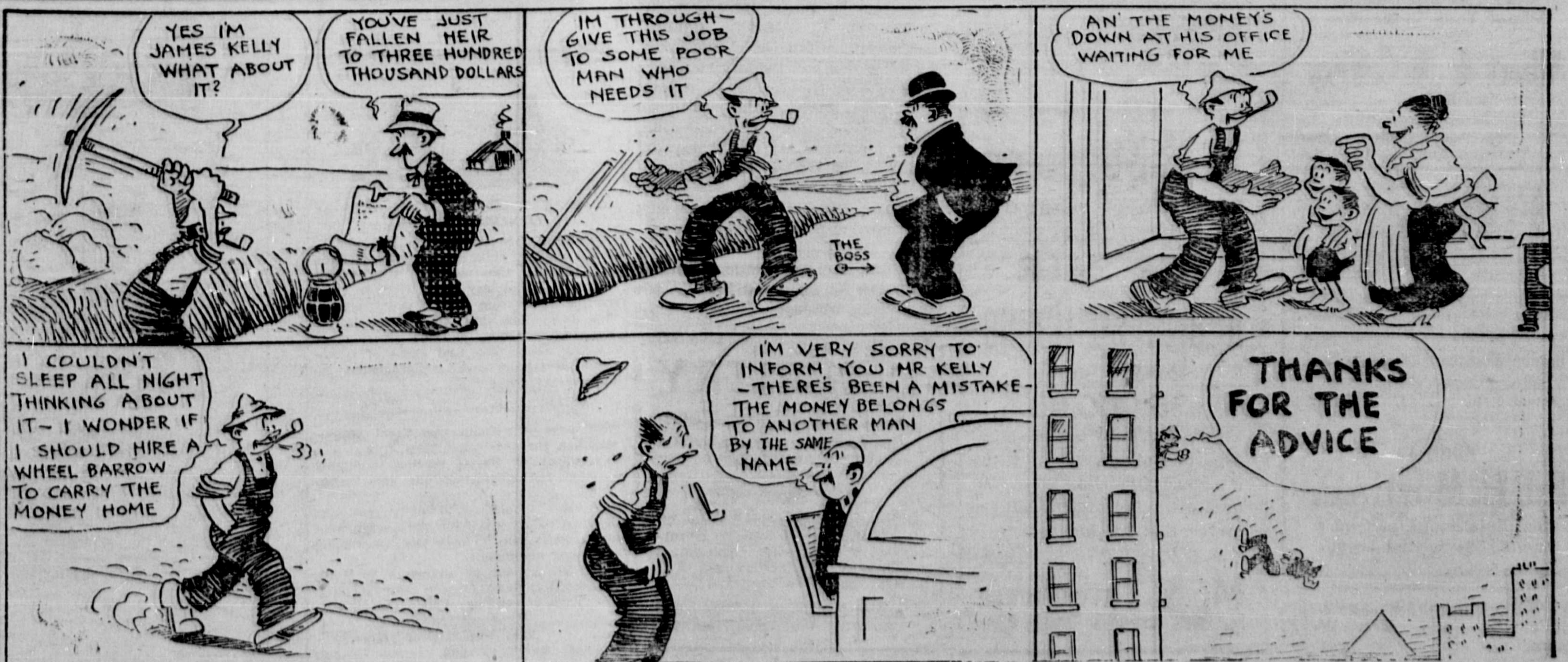
