Major Andrews Goes Over to Opposition

Michael Clark Dubs the Farmers the "National Progressive Party" and Defends them Against Class Politics.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
OTTAWA, March 6.—The cross benches in the House acquired a new name and a new convert yesterday. The "National Progressive Party," so Dr. Clark of Red Deer referred to the movement led by Mr. Crerar and speaking a little later Major Andrews announced his intention of voting for the amendment, then of passing over to the cross benches. Major Andrews told the House how, when last he cast a vote for the Government, he placed his resignation in the hands of the constituents. They declined to accept it. They gave him a hand. Now, therefore, although he "did not like this sort of thing," he would join the cross benches. He would feel freer.

STEAMSHIP CO. HEAD OFFICE

Committee Appointed by Board of Trade to Ask for Change.

SHOULD BE LOCATED AT PRINCE RUPERT

That the head offices of the G. T. P. Coast Steamships should be in this city is the unanimous opinion of the Board of Trade and a committee consisting of M. P. McCaffery, G. W. Nickerson and F. G. Dawson was appointed to draw up a strong resolution asking for the change. It was decided to get right after this and follow it up, and if necessary use strenuous measures to secure it.

The matter was introduced by G. W. Nickerson who urged that it was in line with the address given by Capt. Nicholson at the Board of Trade luncheon a few days ago. He suggested that it may be necessary to take strenuous measures to secure the change, but they should get right after it now.

Mr. McCaffery agreed with Mr. Nickerson that when the head of the line came here and talked about trans-Pacific business it was time to make this the headquarters for the coast service. There was no real argument against it. "We know that the request is a right one and we should get it," concluded the speaker.

A resolution asking for the appointment of a committee was then put and carried with enthusiasm.

HOCKEY CHAMPS ARE GOING EAST

Patrick's Men Will Play Series of Five Games for the Stanley Cup.

MONTREAL, March 6.—President Frank Calder of the National Hockey League announces that Frank Patrick has promised that the Pacific Coast champions will come east for the Stanley Cup series and that the champions will be in Ottawa to play the first game on Monday, March 22.

The series will be the best three out of five games, alternative eastern and western rules to be used.

FINE STATION AT HOUSTON WILL BE COMPLETED SOON

Work on the new station at Houston is going on rapidly and has reached the plastering point. Apart from the station at Smithers the depot at Houston will be the finest on the mountain division, having a concrete foundation, hot water heating and other modern conveniences. The citizens of Houston are quite glad their old frame station burned down.

NO VISITORS FOR COMMONS

Practice of Allowing Distinguished Persons Privileges Will Be Discontinued.

OTTAWA, March 6.—The chamber of the House of Commons is to be the pure and undefiled sanctuary of duly elected representatives. No stranger, however distinguished, is to be allowed upon its floors.

In the past it has been the custom to permit an honored guest to take a seat alongside Mr. Speaker and frequently distinguished visitors have addressed the House while in session and while the mace was within the chamber. It does not matter how distinguished they are in future they will not be permitted this favor.

MAGISTRATE M'MORDIE REPRIMANDS ITALIAN

Was Found Guilty of Stealing, But Let Off on Suspended Sentence.

A. Dominatto, charged with the theft of a door and bricks from J. Postulu, came up for the magistrate's decision in the police court this morning and was found guilty but released on suspended sentence. He was required to put up bonds to the extent of \$500, and must report weekly to the police for a year.

In passing sentence the magistrate said he had taken into consideration the fact that the accused was a married man and had children. However, there was too much of this kind of thieving going on around this town and somebody would, sooner or later, have to be made an example of. If ever the accused appeared back in the police court he would be dealt with severely.

FRANCE HOLDS BACK FROM AID TO GERMANY BY ALLIES

Three Important Reservations from Proposed Declaration by Supreme Council; Demands Her Pound of Flesh.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
PARIS, March 6.—France has neither signed nor approved the declaration regarding the economic situation of Europe which the Allied Supreme Council has proposed to make, it was declared here today. The original text of the declaration begins by setting forth that the small nations bordering on Russia must be obliged to make peace with the Russian Soviet Government in order that an economic revival may begin.

This is followed with a statement that Germany must be provided with the means of resuming industrial activity and that since the prosperity of Europe depends upon the prosperity of all countries, it is proposed that a loan be made to Germany guaranteed by German assets in priority to reparation payments, the loan payments to be controlled by neutral commissions.

Instructions are being sent to Ambassador Cameron in London that he sign the declaration with the following reservations:

1. France will not join in any pressure upon small countries along the Russian border to oblige them to make peace with the Soviet.
2. France will not consent to giving any priority over reparation on the assets of Germany for that purpose.
3. France will not consent to the control of German payments on loans Germany may make by any other organization than the Reparation Commission.

DISABILITIES OF GAS BOATS

Department of Marine to be Asked for Change of Regulations.

At a meeting of the Board of Trade held in the rooms last night the complaint of Captain Freeman in regard to the department of Marine requirements for gas boats engaged in towing or carrying passengers was endorsed and the harbor committee are asked to formulate a resolution covering the matter and forward it to the authorities.

Capt. Freeman outlined at some length the disabilities under which gas boats operate as compared with conditions on the American side. The gas boats here come under the same law as steamboats. He had for a long time past tried to show that the regulations were unreasonable. There was no reason why certain equipment should be carried in order that a gas boat might tow a raft of logs across the harbor. He suggested they ask a law similar to the American law.

Several members, including M. P. McCaffery and G. W. Nickerson, spoke in favor of a change.

MANAGER APPOINTED

E. P. Rust From New York City, Appointee of Newman Erb as Dry Dock Superintendent.

A new manager for the local dry dock has arrived in the city in the person of E. P. Rust. Mr. Rust has come direct from New York City, being appointed by Newman Erb, who now has control of the local shipbuilding plant. Mr. Rust is a young American business man, and is accompanied by Mrs. Rust and two young children. J. H. Pillsbury, marine superintendent, has been acting general manager since the court injunction was issued in January giving Newman Erb control of this shipyard until the decision of the Supreme Court trial, which commences on March 22, is given.

TOUR COUNTRY IF ELECTION IS NOT GRANTED

Mackenzie King Says He will Expect People to Back His Demand.

VOTE TO BE TAKEN PROBABLY TUESDAY

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
OTTAWA, March 6.—That if the amendment calling for a general election is defeated by the Government when the vote is taken, probably on Tuesday night, Liberals would go across the country from the Atlantic to the Pacific and expect the people to rise up with them and demand that the Government resign, was the statement of W. L. Mackenzie King, leader of the opposition, addressing the annual convention of the Eastern Ontario Liberals last night.

CARSON AGAIN HEADS ULSTER

Re-elected President of Unionist Council—Considering Home Rule Proposals.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Belfast, March 6.—At a meeting of the Ulster Unionist Council, Sir Edward Carson was re-elected president. He submitted and analyzed proposals for the future government of Ireland as laid down in the Home Rule Bill.

Sir Edward said it was not proposed to make a decision for or against the Government's proposals at the present session. He declared that the period was one for greatest anxiety, and that whatever decision was reached, should be taken only after most mature deliberation.

It was announced by Sir Edward that another meeting of the Council would be held on Wednesday next at which it was proposed to proceed to a definite decision.

Very Grave Disregard of Professional Ethics by Former Paper Controller

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

OTTAWA, March 6.—A dramatic incident occurred at one of the hearings before the Board of Commerce sitting as paper controllers, when R. A. Pringle, K. C., who was paper controller from the time of the creation of that office until six weeks ago, appeared before the Board as counsel for one of the newsprint manufacturers.

Both Commissioner Connor and Commissioner Murdock questioned the ethics of Mr. Pringle's appearance in that capacity under the circumstances, and after a lengthy argument, Mr. Pringle withdrew.

The two commissioners were visibly embarrassed when Mr. Pringle, on the hearing being opened, proceeded to present the case for one of the newsprint manufacturers and referred to certain arrangements he said he had concluded in his previous capacity as paper controller.

Mr. Murdock said the Board of Commerce as paper controller had not received the co-operation it had reason to expect from Mr. Pringle as the former, incumbent of that office, and added that he thought it strange that Mr. Pringle should now appear as counsel for a newsprint manufacturer to contest the order made by the Board as paper controller.

ARE BORROWING FOR THE P. G. E. RAILWAY

Sum of \$8,800,000 Asked of the Legislature for Continuation of Construction.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

VICTORIA, March 6.—Authority to borrow the net sum of \$8,800,000 on the P. G. E. account is contained in two bills being brought down in the Legislature by Hon. John Hart, minister of finance.

The Pacific Great Eastern Note Payment Act calls for the borrowing of \$4,800,000 and the Pacific Great Eastern Construction Loan Act \$4,000,000.

TENDERS CALLED AND PILES ARE ORDERED FOR DOCK

J. A. Heaman, chief engineer of the G. T. P., was in town from Winnipeg during the week and left for the east on this morning's train. Mr. Heaman stated to a representative of the News that operations on the new ocean docks are about to commence and filling for the piling will start as soon as the Dominion Government commence operations on dredging at Metlakatla Bar. From the bar will be brought the sand for filling purposes. It will be a fortnight, at least, before the government work commences, as tenders will not close till March 18.

Mr. Heaman says that the materials for the new dock will be obtained in Prince Rupert as far as possible and the contract for supplying of creosoted piles and lumber has already been awarded to Albert & McCaffery as representatives of the North Vancouver Creosoting Co. at Vancouver. Tenders are now being called for the construction of the wharf proper.

Orchestra Concert Sunday Evening.

Once more the local Symphony Orchestra is to give a Sunday night concert in the Westholme Theatre and doubtless many people will want to hear them. As the winter season is coming to a close soon there will not be many more opportunities to hear this fine aggregation of instrumentalists.

As with former concerts this one will be free by ticket. The idea of giving away tickets being that people who wish to attend church may do so feeling sure that they will get seats at the concert, if they have taken the trouble to secure their tickets beforehand. It was felt that the wide open plan was unfair to churchgoers.

We do not ask people to attend this concert to encourage the orchestra, however desirable that may be. We suggest that people will go because they want to hear the music, both instrumental and vocal, that is offering on this occasion. If they do this and enjoy themselves thoroughly, the members of the orchestra will be satisfied.

Prophecy Regarding Dominion Elections.

If it were safe to prophesy, which it never is, we would suggest that there will be no Dominion election for some time to come. The members of the House, who fear that they may never enter the precincts of the House again, think it would be well to remain there as long as possible. They say that next year there will be a Dominion census and after that there should be a redistribution of seats, to be followed by a general election.

It is customary to hold the census every tenth year about midsummer. That would mean that the returns would all be made by the early autumn. By calling an autumn session toward the close of 1921, a redistribution bill could be passed just before an election and at the same time the members would be given an opportunity to draw another extra sessional indemnity, the last many of them will ever draw.

There is no certainty that this will be the course adopted, but if the Government can weather the present session, and there seems no reason to think otherwise, the plan outlined would be following the line of least resistance, and would provide the proper kind of final potlatch for the members of the House.

Too Many Women In England Now.

There are too many women in Great Britain since the war. Even before that there was a large preponderance of females in that country.

"Dr. Murray-Leslie, in a lecture at the Institute of Hygiene, very seriously studied the consequences of the 'sex preponderance' of women in Great Britain," says the London Times. "Sex preponderance means that there are 1,000,000 more women than men. It would be a more alarming fact if so considerable a proportion of women were not civilized by the higher education. But this, as Dr. Murray-Leslie observed, has its awkward side. The fittest women are forced into the labor market, while the less fit marry and bear children. Among the less fit is the 'frivolous, scantily clad, jazzing flapper, irresponsible and undisciplined, to whom a dance, a new hat, or a man with a car is of more importance than the fate of nations.' Science itself cannot resist a gibe at the flapper. She is certainly a vulgar ornament of the new age. But it is a pity to give the impression that London is dominated by her. A visitor would be more likely to wonder at the masses of young girls earning a living by hard work than at the comparative few who are hardy parasites."

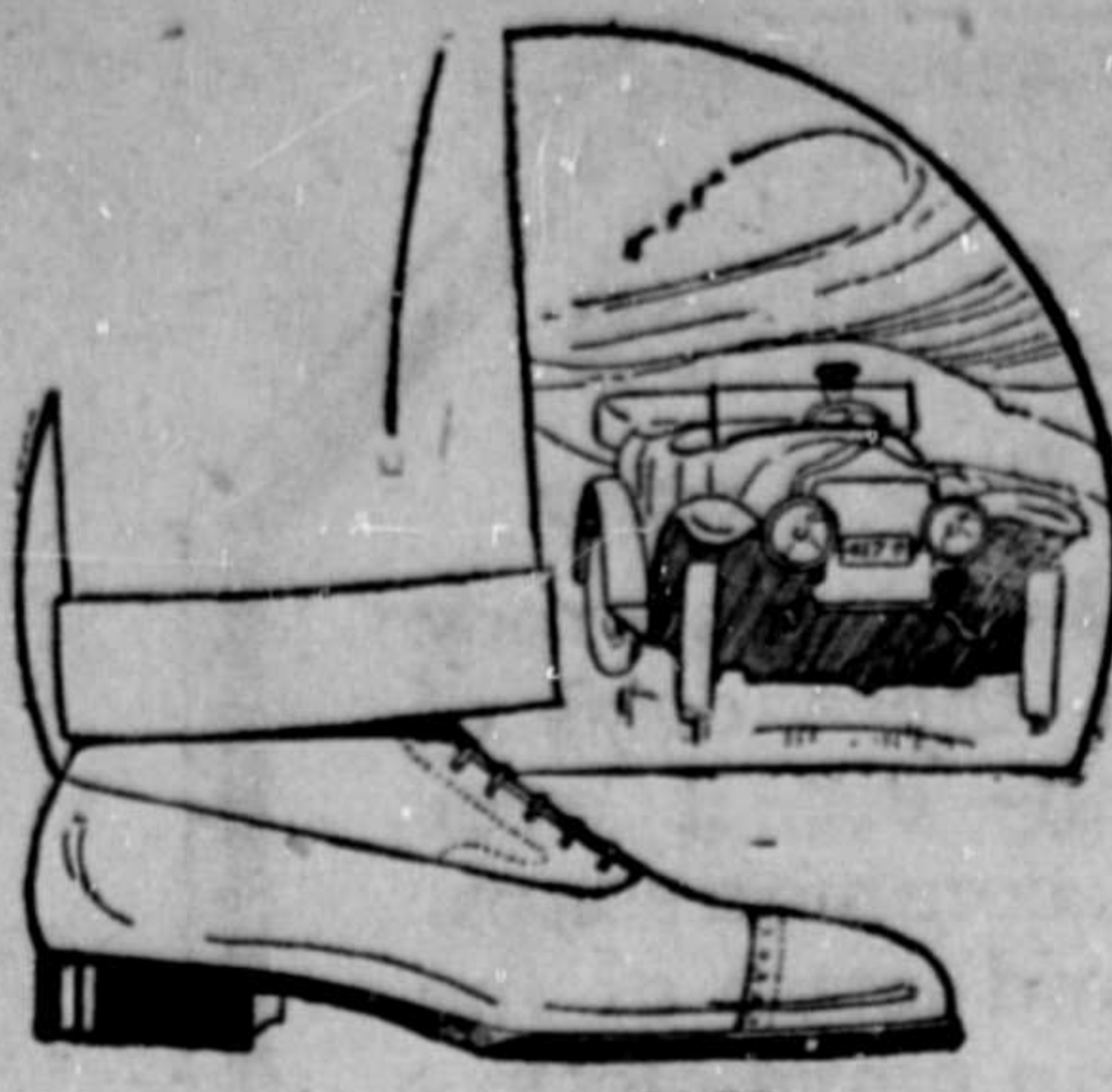

VANCOUVER, CHINA, OR JAIL, BUT NOT HOME," LEE WONG

The trial of Lee Wong, the Chinese boy who broke the plate glass window in his father's store, was concluded before Judge Young yesterday afternoon. The boy was found guilty but was let out on suspended sentence, provided he goes home to his father, helps him and goes to school.

Dr. Cade, who gave the lad medical examination, was a witness yesterday. He testified that his right arm would probably be useless for life and he could never do any hard work. He could, however, do light duties about his father's store. The doctor said that it was quite possible that the pain of the inflamed and unhealthy elbow might at times make the boy peevish. The father who was in court said that he was willing to take the boy and look after him and pay for his schooling, but he did not want him to work in the store.

Must Report.

"I do not want to send you to jail," said the judge to the boy, "and am willing to let you out on suspended sentence. You are at liberty to go home with your father if you will do light duties about the house and go to school. I will see that Lee Nan, or nobody else but your father, will interfere with you. As for Lee Nan he had no business throwing you out and should be ashamed of himself. I wish he were here so I could lecture him about that. I want you to report to Chief Minty every week and tell him how things are going at home. If you have any complaints tell him about them. If you come here again you will go to jail. Are you willing to do as I say?"

WHARFAGE FOR SMALL BOATS

Matter Discussed and recommendation Made at Board of Trade Meeting.

At the meeting of the Board of Trade last night a report on a proposal of Captain Freeman to secure better accommodation for small craft here, was discussed and it was decided to ask the Provincial Government to take into consideration the provision of such facilities when they were rebuilding the present dock, a work which it is understood will be taken in hand this year. The recommendation of the Railways, Navigation, and Port Committees follows:—

"Whereas the Provincial Government contemplates reconstructing and adding to the facilities at the government wharf; that the matter be taken up with them with a view to having proper facilities installed for the accommodation of small boats entering the harbor from outlying points; such facilities to include a derrick and hoist for handling cargo to and from the dock level, and ample float accommodation for mooring such vessels, and also provision in the building for waiting rooms and toilets for the accommodation of travellers using such craft. We think that if the matter was thoroughly gone into at the time the plans are under consideration, that ample facilities can be supplied at this site for the requirements of the trade referred to in Mr. Freeman's letter."

PRINCE RUPERT HEADQUARTERS

Northern B. C. Farmers' Co-operative Association Consider This Place Promising Market.

The Smithers Farmers Institute has decided to form a Northern Interior Co-operative Association which will supersede the Farmers' Institute and for which a certificate of incorporation has been received. They will join with the Telkwa Farmers' Institute who have already entered. With the two institutes lined up for the amalgamation of interests, delegates have been appointed who will attend the meetings of other Farmers' Institutes in the district pressing their joining up in one big body.

It is the purpose of the newly formed association to obtain better control and management of the tremendous markets existing between Prince George and Prince Rupert which takes in the numerous lumber camps, canneries and other centres. The city of Prince Rupert is also considered a potential market for handling many times over what the valley would produce. For proper control of this market the co-operation of all the farmers in the entire district was necessary.

Outlined Plan.

A. J. Prudhomme in addressing a meeting of the Smithers Farmers' Institute outlined the plan of organization for the new association, stating that it was a share capital plan whereby the farmers would have an interest in the company. The shares were in denominations of \$100 and to make it easy for the buyers they could be bought in \$10 installments every three months. Warehouses would be erected at various centres and the market could thereby be controlled to protect the farmers against loss. The head office would likely be Prince Rupert, where the general manager would be stationed.

Mr. Prudhomme stated that a good inducement had been offered in Prince Rupert whereby the association could go into business in that city and be provided with free light, rent and water.

NEW STEWART WHARF OF ADEQUATE SIZE

Larger Boats May be Landed There Than at the Wharf Used at Present.

The new wharf at Stewart, for which tenders have been called by the Dominion Government Department of Public Works, will be a substantial structure and a decided acquisition to the town, both as a matter of architecture and convenience. It will be built about half a mile west of the present wharf and landings may be effected at it by any steamers at any point of the tide. This was impossible with the old wharf, as at some stages of the tide it could hardly accommodate a steamer the size of the Prince John and it was also built out along an unsightly mud flat.

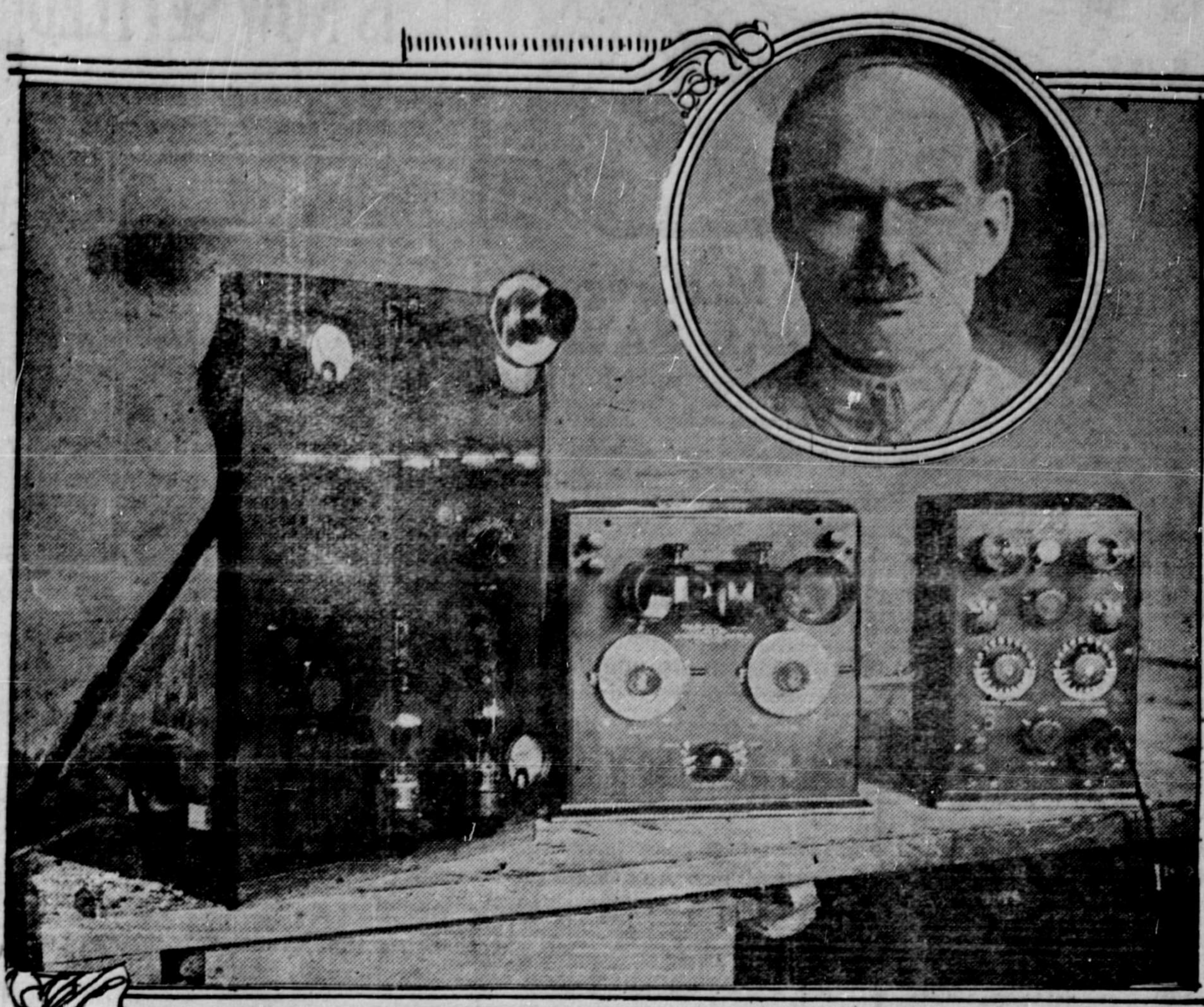

3. The strikers to be reinstated and the men that went up with Mr. Harris to get the jobs they engaged for, this without prejudice to their claim for damages.
4. Bundles to be hauled to and from the mine free of charge.

Mr. Burroughs says the manage-
ment voluntarily offered to meet
a committee of the men at any
time.

There are about 150 men in
Stewart waiting for the mines to
open up which will be in from
six to eight weeks.
