Indians to Become Citizens Instead of Wards of Nation

Indian Act to be Placed Before Parliament Giving Natives Right to Vote as Reward for Service Rendered During War.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
OTTAWA, March 8.—Compulsory education and compulsory enfranchisement of the Indians are the principal features of a bill which is to be placed before Parliament by Hon. Arthur Meighen, Minister of the Interior. The object of the act is to remove the distinction which now exists between Canadian Indians and Canadian Indians and to change the latter from their present status as wards of the nation to citizens. Formerly an Indian could not be enfranchised until he had served two probation periods of three years each, and then only with the consent of his fellow tribesmen. From the date of enactment to 1918 only 160 were enfranchised. The act is to be passed as a reward to the Indians for loyal and excellent service rendered in the war whereby they have shown that they deserve citizenship, 3,000 having enlisted in the Canadian army.

WIVES WOULD FIRE ENTIRE POLICE FORCE

Bring in Motion for Dismissal at Next Commission Meeting.
 The police commission this morning, Commissioner Myhill presiding, stated that he was dissatisfied in the manner in which the case had been handled and believed that there was too much competition between the men, at the expense of the collective work. Myhill-Jones gave notice of motion which he is to bring at the next meeting for the purpose of obtaining a higher degree of efficiency. The motion is: "That the entire police force be given two months' notice from April 1, 1920, and the chief clerk be instructed to see through the proper disposal of the retiring positions of the retiring men from June 1, 1920." The men discharged will be allowed a square deal with their applications.

STOOL PIGEON CASE FULLY EXPLAINED

Letters of protest from the Great War Veterans' Association and the One Big Union regarding the use of stool pigeons in police court cases were read at the meeting of the Police Commission this morning. The latter letter was ordered filed and a reply is to be sent to the former explaining the circumstances. The man referred to in their letter had volunteered his services and had complete control of his faculties and had been acting in the same capacity as a private detective.

STEWART

The Portland Canal News, in its last issue, has published a letter from E. C. Mayers, solicitor for the Taylor Engineering Co., asking that certain statements in regard to the Dolly Varden affair be retracted. With the use of toboggans the supplies for the Big Missouri mine are being taken in over the snow from the end of the Premier road. The intention of William Noble, who is directing operations at the present time, is to take in enough supplies over the snow to last all next-summer and avoid the inconvenience of a pack train. Plans are already being advanced for the celebration of July 1 in Stewart. A ball game between Stewart and Hyder is mooted. The teams are to draw from the residents of the towns and no outsiders are to be imported.

Howard Campbell, formerly of the Prince Rupert Club, will open the Stewart Miners' Social Club this week. It will be found a comfortable retreat for the citizens in general. Mr. Campbell was recently in charge of the Omineca Hotel at Hazelton.

Martin and Harry Smith are in town remodelling the Big Store which is one of the early landmarks from pioneer boom days.

The Leap Year dance last Friday night was a huge success. A large attendance was present to enjoy the dancing to splendid music supplied by an augmented orchestra. The ladies did the proposing and the gentlemen supplied the refreshments and acted as perfect ladies.

The Citizens' Association has again raised the topic of the incorporation of the town. The matter is being taken up with the authorities as it will be quite difficult to launch street and sidewalk repairs and other public works without some special action.

SCHEDULE OF BOAT SERVICES

Must Be Dock at Stewart Before Big Steamers Call.

A direct connection with Wednesday's boat from the south will be given Stewart and Masset on alternate weeks. Next Wednesday afternoon the Prince John will leave for Masset and on her return make the trip to Stewart. On the week following, the Prince Albert will connect direct with the south steamer for Stewart and make the trip to Masset on her return. The Prince John will maintain her regular fortnightly service to Vancouver and Southern Queen Charlotte Island points and the Albert will be run as an emergency arises in the time intervening between the runs to Stewart and Masset.

In the summer one of the large steamers will be placed on the Stewart run, giving a twice a week service to both Stewart and Anyox by running the Prince George or the Prince Rupert and one of the smaller boats as a subsidiary. The trips of the big boats to Stewart cannot be made until the new wharf is completed there.

Interviewed by the Daily News Saturday morning, Capt. Nicholson, manager of the coast steamship service, had nothing definite to say in regard to the summer service. The Prince George will remain in the local shipyards for three weeks and will then go to Yagrows Yards, Victoria, this company having made the lowest bid on some repair work. Captain Nicholson left for Vancouver on the Princess Beatrice last night.

JONES AFTER SCOTTISH TEAM

Fails to Get Newcastle United and Now in Scotland for Football Eleven.

MONTREAL, March 8.—The Dominion Football Association has received a cable from Con Jones that the Newcastle United had declined the invitation to tour Canada this summer. Jones stated that he would be in Glasgow, Scotland, at the week end and would endeavor to have the Glasgow Rangers or Celtic make the trip. Failing to secure a Scottish League club, Jones will go back to England and approach the following clubs in the order given: Everton, Chelsea, and Aston Villa. These are all first division clubs and would be big drawing cards on a tour across Canada.

A cable is expected from Jones this week announcing the team that will come to Canada.

CANNOT INFLUENCE POLICE MAGISTRATE

In Letter Replying to Police Commission Regarding Drug Cases, Magistrate Points out His Duty.

The following letter from the police magistrate in reply to the request that offenders under the Drug Act be imprisoned instead of fined was read and filed at the Police Commission meeting this morning:

"I beg to acknowledge your letter of February 10 and note its contents.

"I will call your attention to the oath of office that every judge and police magistrate has to take, under which we are bound to do right in all cases that are brought before us according to our best lights. "This practice is observed by all judicial bodies from the Privy Council down and it is the pride of all British institutions that our judges are removed from all influences which might affect their deliberations.

"I, therefore, respectfully submit that I have no alternative while acting as police magistrate but to do my duty without fear or favor as each case may impress me from the evidence adduced, and I cannot permit myself to be influenced as to punishment to be imposed except by laws covering the matters, the evidence adduced and the arguments advanced in the open court.

TWO SMUGGLERS GOT AWAY FROM CUSTOMS OFFICERS BUT LIQUOR WAS CAPTURED

VANCOUVER, March 8.—A bloodless battle between revenue officers and liquor smugglers occurred at Sumas on the international boundary. Guns were drawn but no shot fired. The officers captured an auto and \$2,000 worth of booze.

Since the inter-provincial trade in liquor has resumed a large proportion of the imports into Vancouver have been smuggled into the States. Officers got wind of a big load coming through. They barricaded the road and when the car approached the blue-coats rushed forward with drawn guns only to be met by two determined men, also armed, in an auto.

In the excitement a second car approached and turned in the roadway. The smugglers leaped from the first car into the second and all escaped.

Large seizures have been made during the last few days on the Great Northern train from Vancouver to Seattle.

Constantinople Is Occupied by Allies

Note sent to Turkish Government Threatening Drastic Action Should Necessity Arise; No more Massacres.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

LONDON, March 8.—The Allies despatched a note to the Turkish Government, the terms of which were not disclosed, but it is understood they were drastic and will be followed by drastic action should necessity arise.

The idea of a conference is to impress upon the world that the world will not tolerate massacres, such as the Armenians in Cilicia last month.

The Allies plan to make some sort of a military demonstration at Constantinople. Just what form this will take has not been decided upon, but a strong action is necessary to save hundreds of lives.

The Allies have enough troops in Turkey to occupy Constantinople if it is necessary to resort to force.

PARIS, March 8.—The Turkish Government has asked the French authorities that Marash should be evacuated of French troops. Calm seems to have been re-established in Cilicia. Constantinople is occupied by Allied troops.

LOCAL NEWS ITEMS

Estimates for the police department of the city this month have been passed by the commission, providing for a figure in the vicinity of \$20,000. The chief of police states that there is going to be a lot of action by the police this year. Last year the estimates were exceeded by \$4,000 owing to the high cost of legal assistance and fares.

The Princess Mary arrived at 4:15 from the south with a good list of passengers, some for this port and many going north. After loading some machinery which came here over the railroad for Ketchikan the steamer pulled out again at 2:30. The Princess Ena is at McCaffery & Albert's wharf unloading a cargo of Vancouver Island coal.

It was learned at the Police Commission meeting this morning that it cost the city about \$800 to obtain convictions in the recent liquor cases and send the convicts south. A vote of thanks was tendered to the Salvation Army for their care of women prisoners. The lawyers' fees were \$400. "Easy money," remarked Commissioner Hill. "I am going to have my boy take up law."

The Police Commission was informed by Chief Vickers at their meeting this morning that there is very little gambling in the city and the clubs are being conducted in an orderly manner. Lately some "tin-horns" have been forced out of town and it is reported that it is hard to get a game. Weights of coal and bread were also reported right during the month from examinations made by the police.

ALVENSLEBEN IS AGAIN FREE

Said to be on His Way to Vancouver, But May Not be Allowed.

REPORTS TO UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

VANCOUVER, March 8.—Alvo von Alvensleben, who would probably have been made governor of the German province of British Columbia if the Kaiser had won the war, has been freed from Fort Douglas prison on Saturday afternoon and left Salt Lake City for Vancouver. He will reach Seattle Tuesday and whether he will be allowed to cross the international boundary into Canada will then develop. In any event he will have to report regularly to the United States department of justice.

It has neither insurance nor other benefit except that members and their families are aided in time of need. It is interested in building up and advancing the interests of the city, district, province and Dominion.

So it is with the Railway Commission and other governmental institutions. It is easy to make laws, but the executive department is the difficulty.

Cost of Exchange To Canadians.

The Canadian dollar is worth 100 cents in Canada. It is worth only 84 cents in the United States. With Canadian money at a discount of from 10 to 15 per cent., exchange with the United States is costing Canadian consumers between \$75,000,000 and \$100,000,000 a year.

"We are buying \$740,000,000 of goods a year from the United States," said Hon. Arthur Meighen, minister of the interior, addressing Winnipeg business men recently. "Of that \$740,000,000, \$71,000,000 is cotton, which we have to buy from there; \$154,000,000 is iron and steel, and we surely have enough iron and steel in this country to supply all the needs of Canada; \$46,000,000 is for wool, and I know of no reason why we cannot grow enough to supply our own demands; \$51,000,000 is for coal, and we have as much coal as the heart of man can desire in this western country, and there should be some way found whereby the largest production of coal used in this country comes from the mines of our own country; \$20,000,000 is for imports of meats, and surely this is a meat-producing country; \$18,000,000 is for hides; \$15,000,000 is for chemicals, and \$19,000,000 for breadstuffs. There is not the slightest reason in the world why the chemicals we need should not be obtained in our country; this is the greatest country in the world for the production of chemicals.

"In all these lines, making up more than half of our imports from the United States, it only requires courageous effort on the part of our country to reduce the purchases in the United States to only a percentage of what they are today, and to increase our sales."

MODERATIONIST MEETING HELD

Resolution Passed Asking New Law for Protection of Personal Liberty.

VANCOUVER, March 6.—Demonstrating the intention of supporting the efforts of the Moderation League, a mass meeting last night unanimously passed a resolution calling on the Government to enact a law better to protect the liberty of the subject and maintain their rights as free men and women. This was done after Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper had declared that no government or other body of men had any right to take away the personal liberty of the British subject or to dictate what he shall eat or drink. Sir Charles declared the men here behind the Prohibition Act had not the courage of their convictions, as they had in the United States. There neither rich nor poor could keep liquor in the house, but here the Government held in the hollow of its hand only the poor man who had no money and no cellar.

Sport Briefs

Joe Malone, with nine goals, is leader, while Cully Wilson, of St. Pats., moves into second place, by virtue of his points, eight of which he gained in one game. Sprague Cleghorn, of Ottawa, Jack Darragh, of Ottawa, and Arbor, of the Canadiens are tied with Lalonde for third place honors.

With Vancouver practically assured of first place in the Pacific Coast Hockey race, interest will now centre on the play-off for the championship of Canada between the winners in the National League series and the coast. Ottawa is the eastern champion city this year and the coasters will go east. Although the games are not played at home, interest nevertheless will be just as keen on the coast. After the hard games played through the winter and the keen rivalry between Victoria, Seattle and the champs for the Pacific coast honors all the coast will now be backed up behind Vancouver in the hope and desire to bring the world's championship to the Pacific coast. It is to be hoped that the players are not so unfortunate at this year's play-off as they were last year when the games had to be cancelled.

President Hermann, of the Cincinnati Reds, has made the announcement that there will be no change in the regular roster of the Reds this year. This statement was made by Hermann in response to a report that had been going the rounds that Manager McGraw, of the New York Giants, had offered to trade "Pepp" Young for Eddie Rousch and Larry Kopf. LOCAL TALENT HOLDS ITS OWN

Last Night's Concert Shows Prince Rupert Does Not Have to Import Entertainment.

SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA IMPROVING RAPIDLY

That plenty of real excellent musical talent, both vocal and instrumental, exists in this city was fully proved by the performance put on last night by the Prince Rupert Symphony Orchestra Society. The Westholme Theatre was practically filled to the doors with an enthusiastic audience to whom every number offered was fully appreciated and loudly applauded. It was indeed a treat for the most of the listeners to get away from the ordinary grind of moving picture and dance music and hear something in the way of art. The sixth concert given by this organization which has brought an invaluable and heretofore unknown form of entertainment to Prince Rupert music lovers was as big a success and as fully enjoyed as any offering yet made by them, composed as it was of entirely local talent.

Speaking for the orchestra itself, it is now whipped into a class which would do credit to the most of professional bodies. To Professor Harvey who has devoted many hours of his valuable time without reward or hope of any, great credit is due. He has made an orchestra out of what, a year ago, was only a handful of amateurs. The members play with a precision that would hardly have been thought possible to gain.

The orchestra numbers were Sousa's "High School Cadets March," Czibulka's waltz intermezzo, "Love's Dream After the Ball," Air from Louis XIII., Amari's Pizzicato by Ghys, Donizetti's "Sextette from Lucia di Lammermoor," and Handel's "Largo."

Soloists.

Mrs. Jarvis McLeod, as soloist of the evening, fully lived up to her reputation as a vocalist. Her clear and sweet soprano was pleasing to the audience and her solos were executed with a sympathy and feeling that would be hard to excel. She sang Piccolomini's "Queen of Angels" and answered the continued applause with "Mother Machree," which was equally delightful. As her second number on the program she sang Ethelbert Nevin's immortal "Rosary."

Professor Harvey came to the aid of the concert well last night when it was ascertained, at the last moment, that J. Stuart Pudney could not be present to recite. He delighted all with "I Love You" and "Flowers" in his rich tenor. The piano solo by Miss Lillian M. Stephens, Rachmaninoff's beautiful "Prelude in C Sharp Minor" was excellently rendered and Miss Stephen proved herself to be an excellent soloist as well as accompanist. Mrs. Director's recitation "Caudle Has Been Made a Mason" was a pleasing diversion placed just in the middle of the program. It was made very pleasing in its humor

by Mrs. Director's clear-cut, sharp manner and she answered the encore with "My Sister's Best Feller." John Fotos played Godard's "Berceuse" with a good deal of feeling and his technic, for a boy, is indeed excellent. Schubert's Serenade played as a cornet solo by J. Peyton, accompanied by the orchestra, was one of the most beautiful selections of the program.

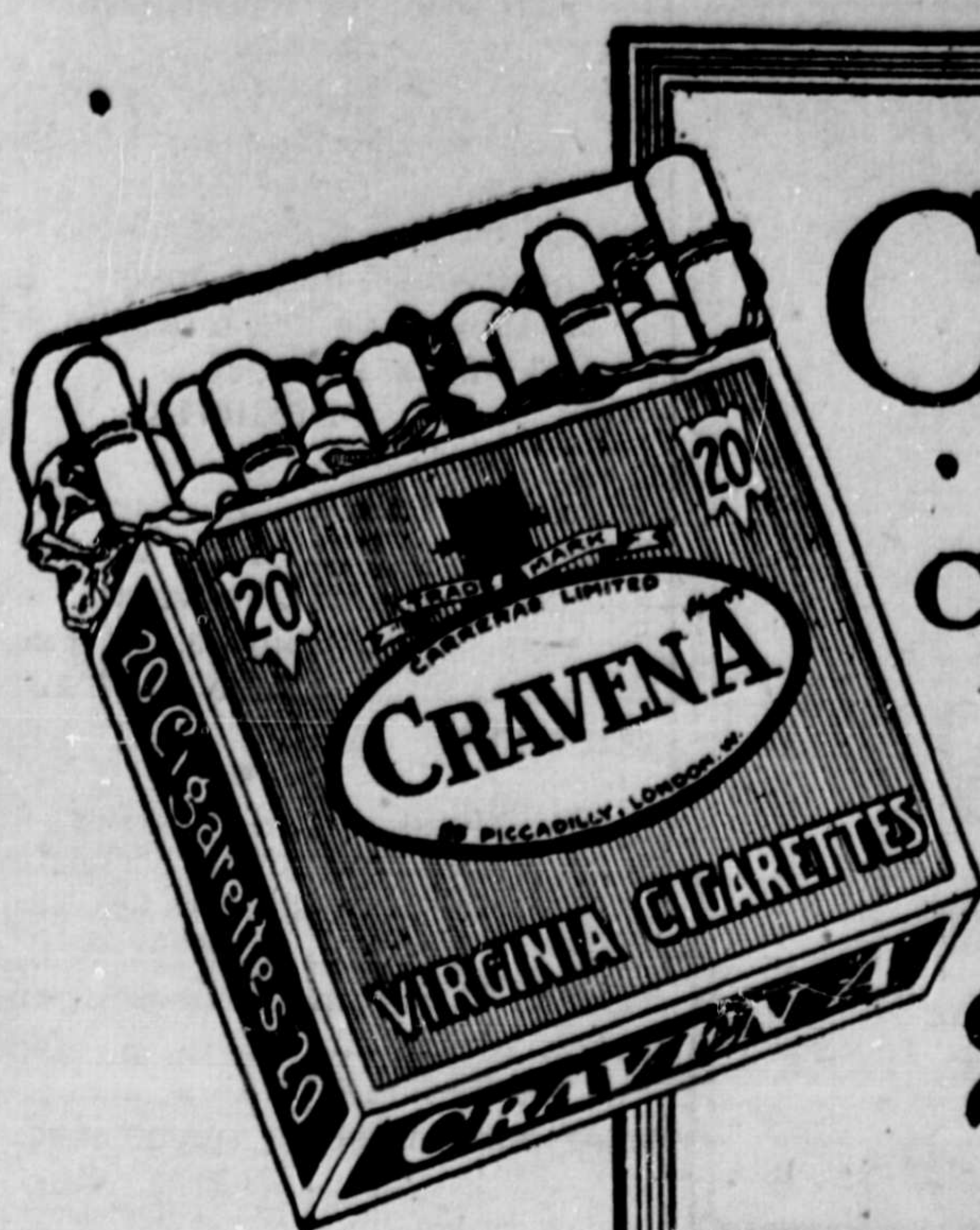

Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 3 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$500 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads. Title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 40 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Balance of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enactment to March 21, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfilment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim, whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.

Crazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged, priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.
