Militant Speech by Sir Thomas White in Commons

Advises Government to Carry on and Strongly Advocates Union on Question of Higher Tariff; Does not Believe in Farmer Party.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
OTTAWA, March 9.—Sir Thomas White, ex-minister of finance, intervened in the House debate on the address today with a speech which has set political gossips agog. From the first to the last the speech was militant. "Carry on," Sir Thomas exclaimed, as he strenuously opposed the idea of a general election. "That is what the hope of Canada expects this government to do."

He said this to the Government and to members on this side of the House. Sir Thomas went on, to the cheers of the members. "If Sir Robert Borden will form a national Liberal Conservative party consisting of the old Conservative party and members of the Liberal party who joined him in that great fight, and who think alike on national questions, including fiscal questions, I will sweep the country." The fiscal issue Sir Thomas put frankly for a protective tariff. In his view, people would tolerate a fiscal policy which raised the tariff "only as a means of raising revenue, and not as an instrument of development of national resources." Workmen would not accept a free trade policy, robbery of his own employment. Farmer, once he knew the truth on both sides, would not support the policy closing the markets for the "more preferred" markets of the United States, which might at any time be closed by Congress. Sir Thomas was strongly critical of the formation of a third party. Third parties are creatures of the moment, stable under the British constitutional system. There could be no worse for Canada than to have its own groups, having their own group interests. The corridors last night and the speech was discussed, especially in its bearing on the political situation. "Does the return of the ex-minister to active politics?" such a query commonly heard, but Sir Thomas gave no indication in his speech.

EXTRA EXPENDITURE MADE TAXES GO UP

Many New Expenditures and Reduction in Assessment Causes 11 Mill Increase in Taxation.

The Rate By-law for the year 1920 was adopted at the council meeting last night. The rate this year will be 25.1688 mills, an increase of over 11 mills from last year. There are a number of reasons for this increase. The reduction in assessment this year was the cause of an increase of 4.75 mills, increased special rates for money by-laws, 2.25 mills, school by-laws, 1.45 mills, exchange on interest and redemption payments, 1.59 mills. The 1919 rate fell short of the expenditure and instead of being 13.75 as it was, it should have been 15.75 mills.

CARS HAVE ARRIVED FOR FISH SHIPMENT

Three Cars are Ready for Tomorrow's Train—More Will Go Saturday.

Six express refrigerator cars arrived from the east yesterday and three were loaded this morning with fresh halibut for shipment to the eastern market by tomorrow morning's train. The boats selling today were:—Fisher, 13,000 lbs.; Westford, 11,000 lbs., sold to Booth Fisheries at 13.3c and 10c. Reliance, 15,000 lbs.; Caygeon, 9,000 lbs., sold to Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. at 13.4c and 10c. Lansing, 15,000 lbs.; Margalice, 6,000 lbs.; Roald, 1,000 lbs., and Ellinda, 1,000 lbs., sold to Pacific Fisheries at 13.4c and 10c.

TWO DOLLAR REWARD FOR SAVING MILLION

Clerk Found Order Entitling the Bearer to \$1,200,000 in Bonds.

NEW YORK, March 9.—A seventeen-year-old clerk found an order on the Bank of Montreal which entitled the bearer to \$1,200,000 in railway bonds. He took the order to the firm whose signature was on the order and was given two dollars reward, with the further commendation that his honesty "would probably enable him to make his way on in the world."

ENGLISH CUP FINAL

LONDON, March 9.—The draw for the English cup semi-final is Huddersfield vs. Bristol City at Chelsea and Chelsea vs. Aston Villa at Bramall Lane, Sheffield. The games are to be played on March 27.

GIANT FLYING BOATS

NEW YORK, March 9.—The United States navy will send two giant flying boats across the Pacific to Manila and from there to China.

WORKING ON PLANS FOR ROAD AROUND ISLAND EITHER WAY

Plans are now being prepared at the local provincial office of Public Works for the proposed road around the island. These plans are based on surveys that have been recently made and provide for a route either west or east out of town. The road may be started either by way of Section 2 or Shawatlans passage as the office at Victoria may decide from the plans which will be submitted to them.

ANTI-SEMITIC

Trouble in Budapest Over Admission of Jews to University.

BUDAPEST, March 9.—Anti-Semitic disturbances by students have caused the closing of the university here. Representatives of the Terrorist group prevented the Jewish students from registering.

LONDON, March 9.—The Horn-castle by-election resulted in a victory for Capt. S. V. Hotchkiss, Coalition Unionist, with 8,140; S. P. Patterson, Liberal, 6,727, and W. Holmes, Labor, 3,443.

SEATTLE WINS

Best Vancouver Can Now do is to Tie for Leadership.

VANCOUVER, March 9.—Seattle held Vancouver to scoreless hockey, winning by 2 to 0. The best the local team can now do is to work into a tie for the league leadership, unless Victoria wins from Seattle in the next fixture, in which event all three clubs will be tied.

Would Dissolve the B.C. Federation of Labor Now Function Is Performed

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
VICTORIA, March 9.—The British Columbia Federation of Labor came into existence to bring together the workers of this province and that it should dissolve now that "this function has been performed in the formation of the One Big Union." This was the feature of the address of President Kavanaugh, read to the British Columbia Federation of Labor in session here. Kavanaugh is in England. The One Big Union, he declared, was more fitted to function in everyday struggles for wages and conditions. A. S. Wells, secretary, could not give accurate information as to the number of organizations affiliated with the Federation. He also contended that the usefulness of the Federation of Labor was ended and should be disbanded. The report of the executive committee states that it had been impossible to proceed with the six-hour project because of the necessity of national action. He complained that organizers of the Federation in pursuit of their work had been driven from towns in the interior.

Constantinople Is In British Hands

Will Probably be Occupied Permanently To Protect Allied Commerce; Serious Disturbances in Different Sections.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
LONDON, March 9.—A new government headed by San Pasha has been formed in Constantinople. The new cabinet includes most of the members of the preceding government. Latest reports in an official message received here indicates that Constantinople is under martial law and controlled by British soldiers. Turkey is reported to be stirring up the Arabians, Mesopotamians, and Thracians. The position of the French forces in Cilicia, Turkish Asia Minor, are described as serious. The French are menaced by large bodies of Turkish Nationalist troops of the forces of Mustappa Kemal, leader of the Turkish rebels. The occupation of Constantinople may be permanent, the British taking the position that safety of the Allied commerce demands full protection for the "gateway of the East." Some outbreaks have occurred in Constantinople, an official message said, but it is believed Allied forces there are sufficient to prevent disturbances assuming serious proportions.

PREDICTS BIG INFUX TO THE NECHAKO AND BULKLEY VALLEYS NOW

"Last year's settlement in the Bulkley Valley," said Hon. E. D. Barrow in the legislature last week, "is only the vanguard of what you will see there this season. This year will see great development in the valleys in that country." Mr. Barrow says that the land is easy to clear, the weather ideal and that the country is the ideal place for the young settler these days. A son of Premier Oliver has given up his study and practice of the law to become a farmer in the Bulkley Valley.

COLONEL PECK MAY COMMAND OLD BATTALION

Ottawa is Asked to Give Him Appointment With Headquarters in Victoria.

The 16th Battalion located at Victoria has written to Ottawa asking that Lieut.-Col. C. W. Peck, V.C., M.P., be appointed officer commanding. The action was taken at a meeting last week in the Pemberton Building. The following is the report of the meeting as given in the Victoria Times:

"A campaign to rouse interest in the famous unit will be commenced immediately by the 16th Battalion whose headquarters, as a result of a recent decision, are to be in Victoria.

"The necessity of letting the public know of the real honor which has been bestowed upon Victoria by the placing of the 16th headquarters here was reached at a meeting of veterans last night in the Pemberton Building. It was decided that a committee of three would wait upon His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor, the Premier, the Mayor and City Council, the Rotary and Kiwanis Clubs and other public bodies with a view to stimulating enthusiasm in the celebrated unit.

"Captain Dewar occupied the chair last night and was supported by Captain "Syd" Johnston, the adjutant regiment, and Sergeant Darke. The two latter with Lieut.-Col. Lorne Ross, whose activity in the interests of the unit's continued existence in Victoria was fully acknowledged, are to form the committee to interview the organizations named. At the suggestion of those present at the meeting, all others of the 16th Battalion Association are to form a "boosting" club for the organization.

"The meeting decided to write to Ottawa and voice approval of Colonel Peck, V.C., M.P., as O.C." Finances also were discussed at the meeting, which heard with considerable gratification of the considerable sums of money on hand."

ASSISTANT INSPECTOR IS AFTER INCOME TAX

Will be Appointed at Prince Rupert to Round up Defaulters.

An assistant inspector of taxes for the Dominion Government is to be located in Prince Rupert where he will have particular charge of the collection of income tax. Inspector Glendenning of Vancouver says that a good many people have not yet made their returns and these will be compelled to pay an extra 25 per cent. Many stenographers, he says, are earning more than \$1,000 a year but have not paid income tax.

LITTLE JACK BEATTY DIED THIS MORNING

Older Son of Well-Known Citizens Fails to Recover From Operation.

The death occurred this morning at 9 o'clock in the general hospital of John Rutherford Beatty, the four-year-old and older son of Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Beatty, 657 Fifth Avenue East. The little boy had recently undergone a severe operation and succumbed to heart trouble. He was born in this city and lived here all his life. He will be sadly missed by his many playmates in the east end of town and deep sympathy will go out to the sorrowing parents in their sore bereavement. The funeral will take place from the Methodist Church at 2:30 Thursday afternoon, Rev. T. H. Nuttall officiating. Arrangements are in the hands of the B. C. Undertakers.

HOTEL PROPOSAL

Bring Football Team to Canada.

It is to be hoped that some arrangement will be made by Con. Jones to bring an Old Country football team to this country. He is now in Scotland offering inducements to the Scottish teams and if he fails there he will try to get an English aggregation.

Everyone would like to have one of the first class old country teams come here. They may not visit Prince Rupert, although, even that is not impossible. The visitors would doubtless be able to show the Canadians a good many things, and it is possible that they may learn something from Canada. At any rate we should get to know each other better and old country sportsmen would take a great interest on this side the pond.

Vote for Indians Radical Measure.

The despatch received yesterday in regard to enfranchisement of Indians was read with great interest. The Indian population in this constituency is large and many of the men are of a high type. The details of the measure will be awaited with a great deal of interest. There are still some old natives who are scarcely in touch with modern conditions sufficient to make them intelligent voters. On the other hand many of the younger generation are better educated and more intelligent than many white men.

What will be of interest will be to what extent the Indians are to be made free citizens of the Dominion. If they are to be given their own lands with power to dispose of them and to act in every way as full fledged citizens, the tendency will be for the reservations to be broken up and more intermingling of the races to take place.

Tax Rate Increase Seems Very Large.

An increase in the tax rate to the extent of over eleven mills this year is rather a startler. It is partly due to the reduction in the assessment, something that a large section of the ratepayers were clamoring for. It will be for ratepayers to decide now to what extent this tax rate shall change in future. There are a lot of things needed, but the money must be found if we are to enjoy luxuries. The assessment is something that will make the people think seriously, and watch well every move made.

Will Alvensleben Come to Canada?

Will von Alvensleben be allowed to come to Canada? We do not think so, nor do we think it wise he should. He might get into trouble. People here have not forgotten the statement alleged to have been made by him that the Kaiser had appointed him governor of British Columbia.

If Alvensleben is a British subject and allowed to cross the line it is to be hoped that he will be arraigned for treason. We want no men here who are ready to turn on the country when opportunity offers. We want men who if need be will fight for Canada and stick by her in peace and in war.

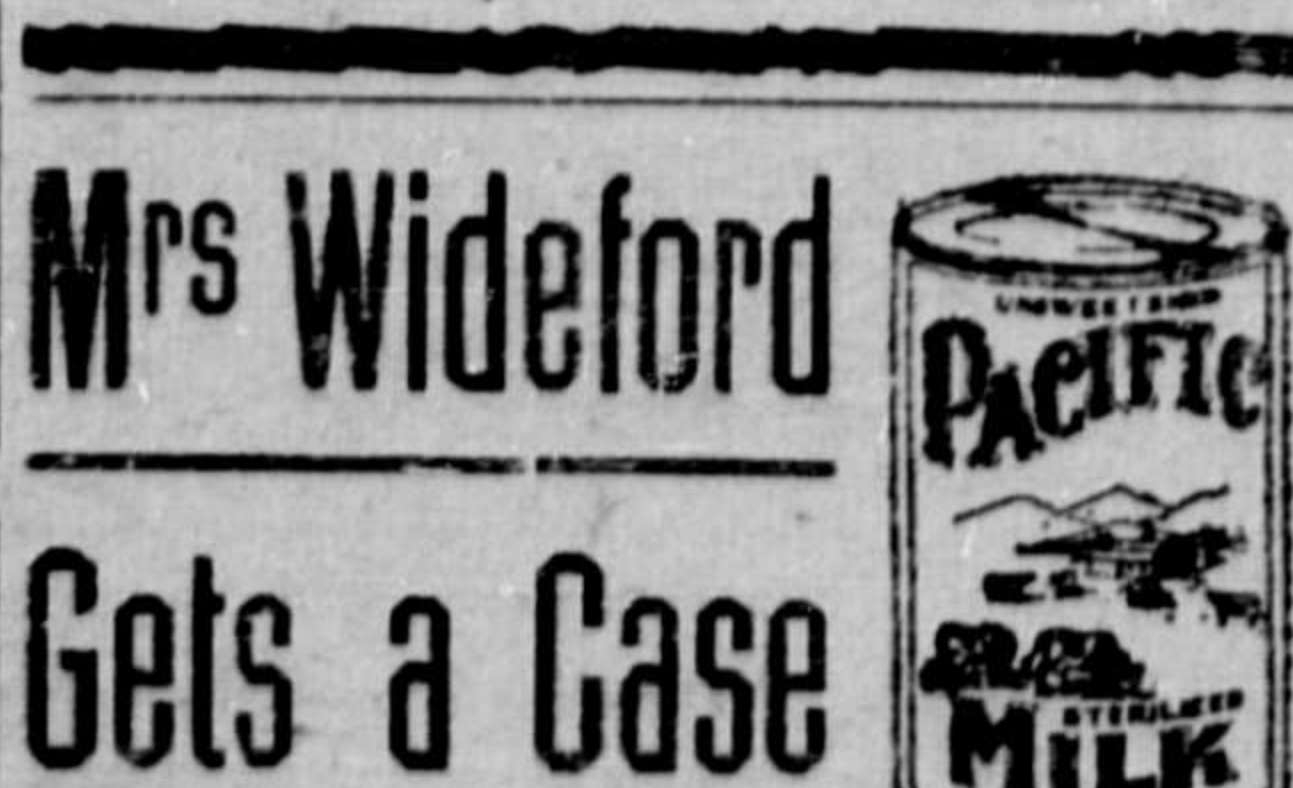

SICK LEAVE IS ALLOWED

Officials of City on Salary Will
Get Ten Days With Pay
Per Annum.

After much discussion at last night's council meeting a report from the Public Utilities Committee recommending that all civic employees paid by monthly salary be allowed ten days' sick leave without deduction of pay per year was adopted. To this recommendation was added an amendment reserving the right of the city to call for a doctor's certificate if deemed necessary. Those voting against the report and amendment were Aldermen Rochester and McLennan.

Alderman Perry, chairman of the utilities committee, told how the necessity for some such legislation had arisen over cases in the telephone department. Alderman Perry in his motion for adoption was seconded by Alderman Kerr.

Alderman Rochester considered the adoption of the report would be a retrograde step. It was time to meet trouble when trouble arose. There was no reason why such free legislation should be made with city money when the same methods would not be employed in private business. The advertising of this sickness business would not be good for the city. If employees got sick there would, usually, be extenuating circumstances. Sickness insurance could always be obtained to cover absence from work. If this was done for one it should be done for all.

All the aldermen spoke for or against the report and it was finally adopted by a 6-2 division.

FREIGHT TRAFFIC WITH GERMANY IS BEING RESUMED

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

BERLIN, March 8.—Belgian, French, Swiss and German administrations which have been negotiating at Basle, have reached an agreement under which freight traffic between Germany and France and Germany and Belgium can be resumed.

LOCAL NEWS ITEMS

The 1920 Indemnity By-law was put through its last reading and finally adopted at last night's council meeting.

The city estimates for the year 1920 were presented at last night's council meeting. They total \$287,375.18 and include \$68,816.18 raised by special by-laws. The adoption was laid over till a special meeting next Friday which members of the School Board are invited to attend.

J. D. Galloway, who left the provincial mining service in order to take a more lucrative position in Mexico, has found his health suffer in that country and is returning to British Columbia. He will again enter the provincial service under the Minister of Mines.

As a result of the request of the Prince Rupert Amateur Athletic Association for a grant of \$500 to further the athletic training of the boys and girls of the city, the city council last night allowed the school board \$350 to this end with the provision that an instructor be employed to conduct classes at the Agricultural Hall.

The fire chief's report presented at last night's council meeting for the month of January showed a damage from fire of \$150 in the city during that month. The upkeep of the department had been \$987.07. A recommendation for the purpose of 1,000 feet of new hose was embodied in the report. This has been provided for in the yearly estimates.

A general increase to employees of the treasury department was allowed by the City Council last night on the recommendation of the finance committee. Ten dollar increases per month are given Harry W. Birch, A. Brooksbank, E. S. Allistone, William Reith, and F. Vickers. Misses Viereck, Allan and St. Cyr are to get \$5 increases. These increases are effective from February 1.

OVERHEAD CROSSING PLANNED FOR COW BAY

Provincial Government is Applying to Railway Commission for Permission to Erect Such.

Notice of application by the Minister of Public Works, Provincial Government, to the Railway Commission regarding the erection of an overhead railroad crossing at Cow Bay was read at last night's council meeting. It was explained by Alderman Dybavon that the Provincial Government had changes in view to making a more accessible road to the Provincial Government wharf by way of Cow Bay.

The mayor drew attention to the fact that the proposed new roadway might block the entrance to Cow Bay for civic purposes. After some looking over plans and discussion the matter was left over for a week.

PROPORTIONAL SYSTEM OF REPRESENTATION IS PROPOSED FOR GERMANY

LONDON, March 8.—The program of the German National Assembly this week includes a new Imperial Elections Bill under which the system of proportionate representation will be introduced, says the London Times' Berlin correspondent.

An interesting new feature is the proposed suffrage for Germans abroad or in foreign lands.

LIMERICK, March 8.—A hundred armed men attacked the police barracks at Doon. None of the police were injured and they finally succeeded in driving off the attackers.

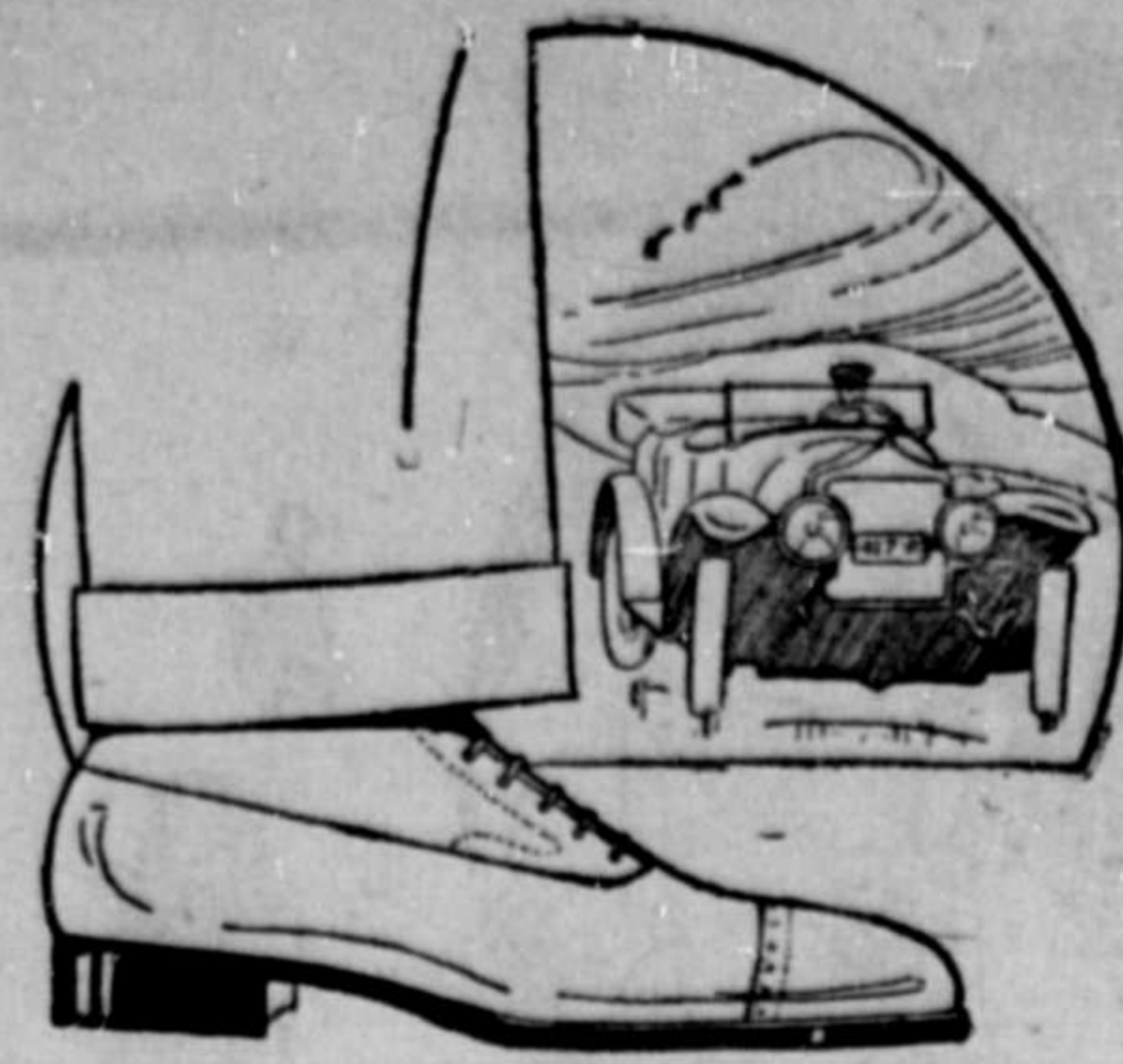

PRESIDENT NOT
IN AGREEMENT

Cannot Possibly Join with Other
Premiers Regarding
Jugo-Slavia.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

WASHINGTON, March 8.—President Wilson accepts with reservations the proposals of the British and French premiers that Italy and Jugo-Slavia undertake the settlement of the Adriatic question. He says if Italy and Jugo-Slavia prefer to abandon the formation of a buffer state containing an overwhelming majority of Jugo-Slavs and desire to limit the proposed free state of corpus separatum of Fiume, placing the sovereignty in the League of Nations without either Italian or Jugo-Slav control, the United States is willing to leave the determination of a common frontier to Italy and Jugo-Slavia.

The president says he cannot "possibly join" in the premiers' suggestion that the memorandum of settlement of December 9 be withdrawn, the details of which included that "Albanian questions should not be included in Jugo discussions" and reiterates that the United States cannot approve of the execution of the terms of the Treaty of London.

ROUND WORLD SERVICE WITH OWN VESSELS

Freight Rates Here Said to be Much Cheaper Than in Africa.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegrams.)
OTTAWA, March 8.—In the course of a speech before the Canadian Club Saturday D. B. Hanna, president of the Canadian National Railways, stated that at the present time the National Railways had 24 vessels on various routes. On the Pacific coast it was expected the service would be started to South Africa, returning by Hong Kong and Singapore.

Mr. Hanna referred to the cheap freight rates existing in Canada, which were about eight-tenths of a cent per ton per mile, and added that if the Canadian railways were given the rate that existed in South Africa, namely 2.64 cents, it would be possible, on an investment of one and a half billion dollars to pay not only 5 1/2 per cent dividends but they would pay 5 1/2 per cent on the whole national debt of Canada and on top of this they would have \$100,000,000 left with which to buy new equipment.

POLICE REPORT FOR FEBRUARY

Majority of Cases Arising From Liquor—Fines Not so Heavy as Usual.

The report of the chief of police was presented at the meeting of the commission yesterday. There were 40 cases, all told, with 32 convictions. Of the 32 convictions 23 fines were imposed which brought in \$701. Nine of the offenders had gone to prison, the most of these being under the B. C. Prohibition Act.

Classified, the convictions show 12 drunk, 11 under the prohibition act, 2 vagrants, 2 under the drug act, 2 motor vehicle act, 1 under the health bylaws, 2 assaults with 3 cases committed for trial.

JAPAN TO WITHDRAW TROOPS FROM SIBERIA

Will Retain Control of Vladivostok and Railways.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegrams.)
WASHINGTON, March 8.—Although planning to withdraw the bulk of her troops from Siberia, Japan will not relinquish control of Vladivostok and vicinity and the Chinese Eastern Railway and the strategic railroad junction in the Trans-Balkan region, according to official information received here.

TROUBLE IN ARMENIA OVER THE BOUNDARY

Constant Skirmishes with Tribes-men and Turkish Irregulars Going On.

(Special by G. T. P. Telegrams.)

LONDON, March 8.—The British forces in Mesopotamian oil regions, particularly near Kerkuk and Mosul, have been engaged in constant skirmishes with tribesmen and Turkish irregulars, the opposition of these forces being similar to that encountered by the French at Aintab, Marash, and other points in Cilicia.

Recognition of the Armenian Republic and the definition of its borders are matters in dispute and have embittered the Turks in Cilicia. The Armenians claim that all of Adana and Cilicia must be incorporated in the new republic as they belonged to ancient Armenia.

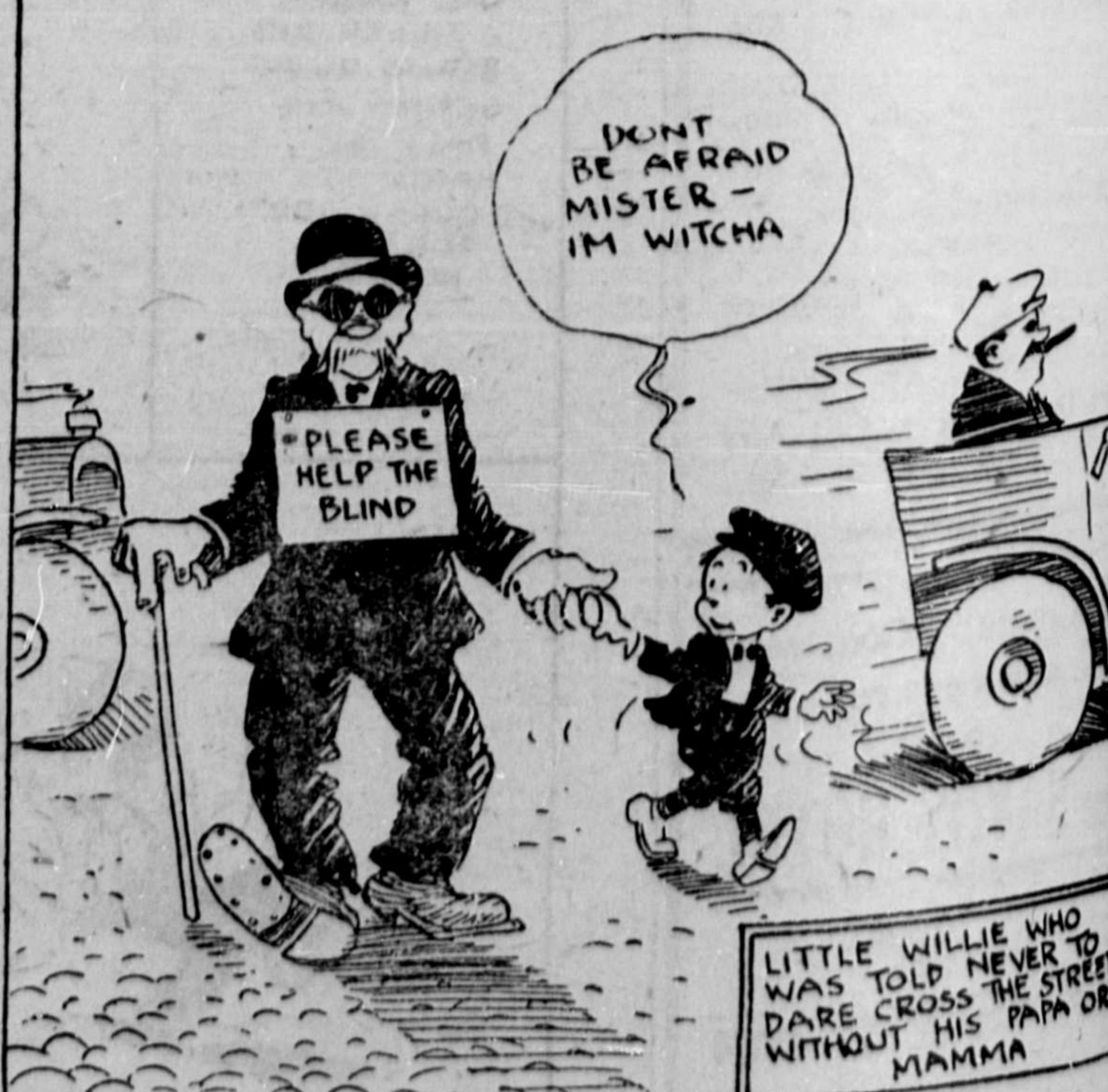
