

Admiral Jellicoe Makes Report

Suggests Fleet For General Naval Needs, or For Defense

Minister of Naval Affairs Should be Separate from Other Seafaring Affairs; Should Spend from \$5,000,000 to \$25,000,000.

\$10,000,000 a Year For Defense on the Pacific

in Recommendation that could be used Offensively, But would Protect own Interests Defensively.

OTTAWA, March 11.—If Canada decides to co-operate in general naval needs of the Empire, it may be convenient to base on which to build up a fleet. The basis suggested by these conditions is a fleet unit which it is considered that experience has shown should comprise in the case of Canada a battle cruiser, two light cruisers, six destroyers, four submarines, and two fleet mine sweepers.

Naval forces suggested as adequate purely for the protection of Canadian ports comprise three light cruisers, one flotilla leader, twelve torpedo craft, and eight submarines with one battleship.

The above excerpts from the report of Viscount Jellicoe on his mission to Canada, which was tabled in the House of Commons by Hon. C. C. Ballantyne, minister of naval affairs, indicate an eminent authority thinks of Canadian naval requirements, and is to play her part in Empire affairs and also if she is to protect her own shores.

The report is not a lengthy one. After mentioning subjects which advice was requested by the Government of Canada, it deals with the question of a Canadian navy under a number of headings. It mentions that the naval assistance on the part of the British Empire during the war was rendered during the eighteen months of the war by the United States was a protection of trade by convoy and that without this help Britain would only have been able to use convoys to a limited extent to meet the submarine menace by abandoning her overseas expeditions.

Makes Four Suggestions.

His suggestions ranging from a \$25,000,000 fleet to one of \$5,000,000 was made by Admiral Jellicoe. Although he does not state specifically what would be the cost of the fleet recommended for Canada as given above, he includes a table in his report which shows the cost of the various vessels mentioned. He emphasizes the importance of air work, stating that any navy of the future must possess a proper complement of aircraft.

Under the heading of "Administration," the report states that it is impossible to omit mention of the immense advantage that would result from keeping the naval reserve outside the region of primary participation. It comments on the administration of the navy by a Canadian naval board more or less along the lines of the militia council at present in existence. There should be a separate department for the navy exclusively responsible for that service and the other seafaring affairs should be conducted by another department.

The Minister of Naval Affairs would be responsible to Parliament and the administration proper would place the final control of the navy under civil authority.

Royal Naval Reserve.

Admiral Jellicoe also recommends the continuation of the Royal Naval Reserve under the title of the Royal Canadian Naval Reserve. In the list of estimates the sum of \$10,000,000 for the defense of Canada's trade in the Pacific is given in addition, there is little naval force included in it which can be used offensively. In other words, whilst Canada would be protecting her own interests defensively it would fall to the lot of the British Empire with the assistance of the other dominions to take such action as would be necessary to bring the matter to a conclusion.

BITTER WORDY DUEL IN HOUSE

N. W. Rowell and Charles Murphy Belabor Each Other to Delight of Spectators.

CROWDS ATTEND TO LISTEN TO SPEECHES

"Commercialized Christianity," "Foul Slanders" and Other Interesting Expressions Used by Speakers.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

OTTAWA, March 11.—Yesterday's proceedings in the House of Commons were marked by a bitter duel between Charles Murphy, one time a member of the Laurier administration, and Hon. N. W. Rowell, president of the Privy Council. It began a few minutes after the House opened in the afternoon and did not close until 9:30 in the evening.

Crowds jammed the galleries and in the evening not a seat was vacant. The official and public galleries were packed. There was a constant outburst of cheers and laughter on the occasion when both the antagonists were called to order.

The trouble all harked back to how a speech was made by Murphy nearly two years ago in which Murphy attacked what he termed the "commercialized Christianity" of Rowell. Murphy again attacked Rowell for "foul slanders" on the way in which the French religious orders had conducted themselves in the war. He talked of Rowell's "tissue of amazing evasions" and compared Mr. Rowell's smile with "the shining silver plate on a coffin."

BUSY DAY IN POLICE COURT

Twenty-one Cases, Including Perjury, Concealed Weapons, Drug Act, and By-law Offences.

This morning was a busy one in the police court when Magistrate McMorde was confronted with no less than 21 cases ranging from perjury to by-law offences. The revenue of the department was considerably increased by fines imposed and many cases were remanded.

Wm. Keir, who was a witness in a recent bawdy house case, was charged with perjuring himself in the evidence he gave in that trial. He claimed that he had had no conversation with Louise Adams, the accused, after he had left her house on the night in question. The evidence of the police contradicts this. His arrest was effected last night at the Cold Storage by Sergeant Adams. Bail was suggested for \$1,000, but was not fixed and the accused is still in jail. The case is adjourned until March 18.

Concealed Weapons.

J. H. Kampser, a familiar figure about town who is nicknamed "Charlie Chaplin," came up charged with carrying concealed weapons. He claimed that he used it to support his back. His case was remanded until March 18 and he remains in jail. John Toner, an old offender, was fined \$25 for being drunk and disorderly and using obscene language. A charge of wilful damage against him was withdrawn. A charge of allowing drunkenness preferred against Louise Adams was dismissed. She (Continued on Page Six.)

Aerial Transportation Scheme is Planned For Stewart Mining Section

Roy C. Price, of Anyox, who was formerly in charge of a Granby flux quarry at Swamp Point, is now engaged in working out an aerial project by which freighting may be done between the beach at Stewart and various mines up the Salmon River. It is the plan to operate hydroplanes for this purpose and the claim is made that freighting costs may be cut in half.

The plan, which is backed by influential mining men, is reported to be well advanced. Three machines have been ordered from the Boeing Aeroplane Co. of Seattle and Mr. Price will bring the first machine up himself. The many lakes which abound in the district will be used as landing places. Mr. Price arrived from Vancouver yesterday and is registered at the Hotel Prince Rupert.

Bad Mixup In Turkey.

There is a bad mixup in Turkey. An effort is being made by Mohammedans everywhere to influence the Allies against breaking up the Turkish Empire, and it must be admitted that the Mohammedans are still powerful and their influence is far-reaching.

It is probable that the trouble in Egypt and other parts of the country is caused by the influence of those who are trying to save Turkey. It is also possible that the troubles are worse than reported.

Some Facts About Turkish Empire.

In view of the present interest taken in Turkey and the small amount of information available in connection with that country, it may be said that the present Sultan Mohammed VI is 59 years of age.

According to the law of succession the crown is inherited by the male descendants of the sultan according to seniority, all children born in the harem, whether from free women or slaves being of equal heritage.

It has not been the custom of the Sultans of Turkey for centuries to contract regular marriages. The inmates of the harem are taken by purchase or free will mostly from districts beyond the limits of the empire, and from these the Sultan designates a few to be called Kaidin or full wives.

Form of Government In That Country.

The present constitution of Turkey was adopted in 1876 by which freedom of person and property was supposed to be secured, judges were appointed for life, torture was abolished and, while Islam was declared to be the religion of the state, freedom of worship was granted to all, and all persons were eligible to public office irrespective of religious belief.

Two houses of parliament were established consisting of a senate and chamber of deputies, the former appointive and the latter elective.

The constitution was overridden by Abdul-Hamid (The Damned) who built up an autocracy, but corruption and misgovernment made the people discontented and as a result Abdul was deposed and the constitution restored in 1908.

The total area of the Turkish Empire before the war was approximately 600,000 square miles and the population about 20,000,000. The smallness of the population is accounted for by the fact that a large part of the country is desert.

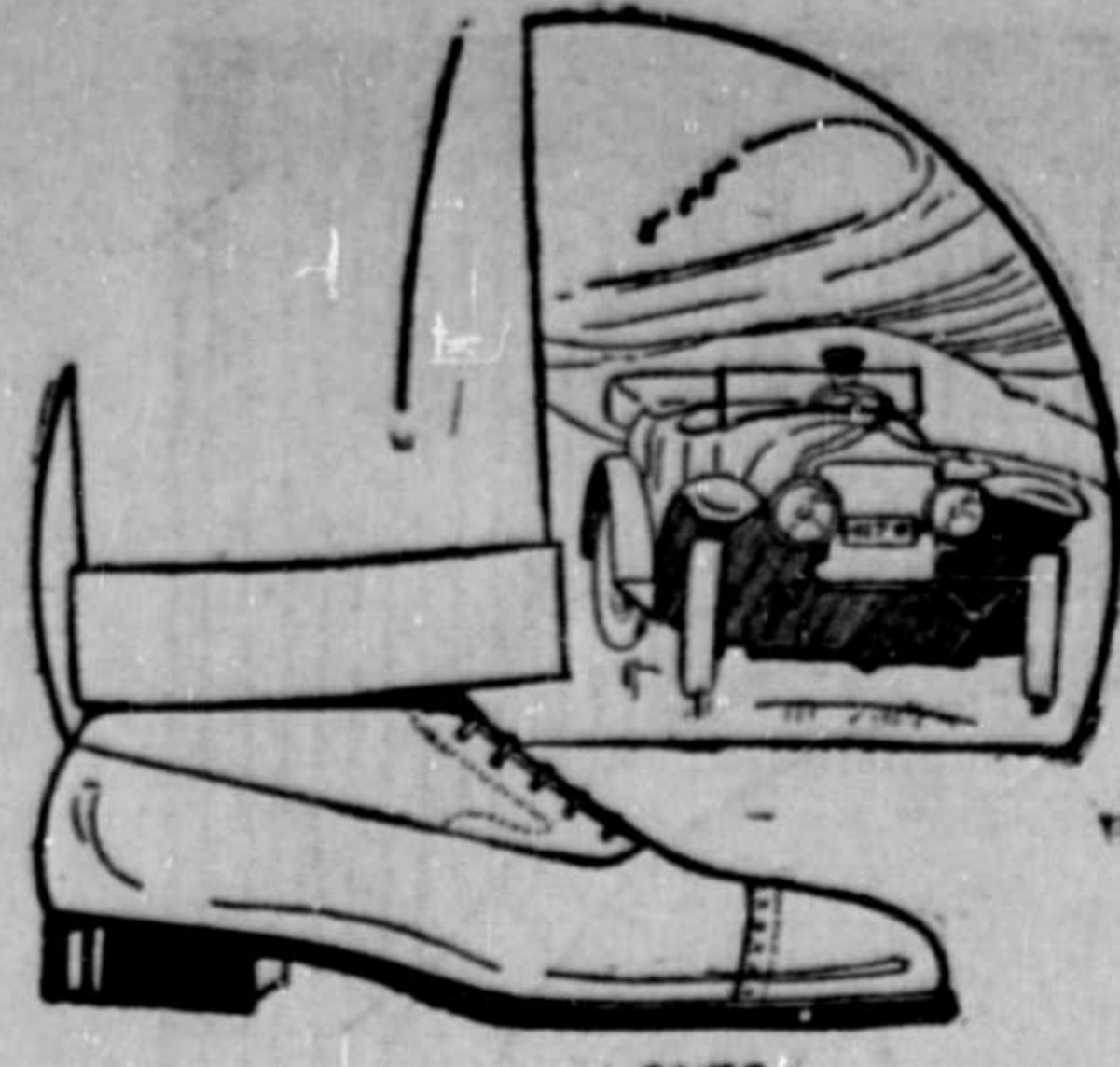

HATCHERY NOW

J. McHugh Expects That it will be Finished and in Operation This Season.

J. McHugh, of the Dominion Fisheries, who is in town at present, announces that work will be continued on the Lakelse Hatchery this summer and it is expected that by August 1 the hatchery will be completed and in operation. Mr. McHugh had expected to leave on the next steamer for Stewart on his way to Meziaden Lake, but has decided to go south tonight instead. While in town he dispatched the tenders for the new float between the government and G. T. P. wharves to Ottawa, where they will be considered and the contract let.

Regarding the hatchery at Lakelse, considerable work was done on this last year but on account of the strike in May and June it was impossible to get materials in time for its completion. The plant must be completed by August 1. As this could not be done last year; the work was called off until this season.

Lumber From Terrace.
At present lumber from Terrace is being hauled over the snow to Lakelse Lake and four teams are engaged on the work. Some time shortly after May 1 twenty-five men will be employed rushing the building to completion. Three buildings are being erected, the large hatchery building, a mess-house and a manager's bungalow. Supplies are taken in from Terrace to the foot

The hatchery is located up Granite creek to which a graded road leads from the lake shore. On completion, the hatchery will have a capacity of 10,000,000 salmon fry and a staff of about six men will be required to operate it. The old hatchery at Lakelse Lake has been entirely abandoned.

PRINCE GEORGE

The Prince George Hotel is now in full swing again under the management of Charles Johnson who has just come from the management of the Hotel Barron, Vancouver. The house has been thoroughly renovated and is a pleasant stopping place for visitors.

At the annual meeting of the Prince George Co-operative Association held last week the affairs of the Association were reported to be in flourishing condition. It was shown that the association's grocery store, selling at a discount of 5 per cent. of market prices to members, had paid all organizing and operating expenses. The following were elected officers for the year: President, C. W. Moore; Secretary-Treasurer, Wm. Somerton; Directors, John McInnis, Alex. Wimbles, W. T. Coil, Geo. Carruthers, R. Andrews, F. Kenyon and J. Shipway.

The Oddfellows card party and dance held in the Ritz-Keifer, hall last Wednesday night was one of the most enjoyable events of the season.

A quiet wedding was celebrated here last Thursday night when Miss Charlotte Dalzell became the bride of Marshall Sales. Mr. Sales is a returned soldier and was severely wounded overseas.

In the report of the Postmaster General issued for the fiscal year ending March 31, Prince Rupert post office ranks sixth in B. C. in gross postal revenue. Prince Rupert's revenue was \$26,154.17. The cities in the province exceeding this were Vancouver, \$732,363.38; Victoria, 235,906.17; New Westminster, \$53,368.55; Nelson, \$34,305.17, and Nanaimo, \$27,640.94.

AID SOLDIERS WITH TAXES

Government Working on Scheme For Dealing With Burden-some Arrears.

VICTORIA, March 11.—Returned soldiers and their dependents in British Columbia will learn with considerable interest that the provincial government has decided to extend the scope and operation of the Returned Soldiers' Aid Commission so as to comprehend the needs of those eligible beneficiaries whose tax arrears may be threatening to separate them from their property by the ordinary process of distress. While there has been no definite provision of a stipulated or set character of assistance the Commission has performed an excellent work in an unostentatious manner, and many returned men have been aided during the stage of waiting for gratuity or other allowances from the federal department.

This new and specific development, however, has been more or less occasioned by the discussion which took place in the Legislature recently in connection with a resolution sponsored by J. H. Hawthornthwaite, Socialist member for Newcastle, which sought to place upon the Government the onus for perpetuating the obligation of many returned soldiers who are in arrears with their municipal taxes. To be precise the terms of the resolution condemned the Government for working a hardship upon those veterans so circumstanced. Likewise its design was directed upon a specific line of action and called upon the Government to exempt from taxation all property of returned men assessed under and up to a value of two thousand dollars for the period of the war, and to rebate those taxes that had been paid within the same period.

Hard on Municipalities.

While this suggestion on the part of the Newcastle member would naturally appeal to many returned men so placed as to come within its meaning, it was obvious at the outset that the spirit and intent of the suggestion were totally out of harmony with the ability of the Legislature to acquiesce. In the first place, and as pointed out by the Premier during the discussion which ensued, the resolution in its entirety bristled with inequalities. And in the second place the power of exemption or rebate in respect of municipal taxes does not rest with the Government at all. Its function in this particular regard is concerned solely with the administration of the law as it stands and the power to do what the resolution asks rests exclusively with the municipalities.

Until the Municipal Act is changed, therefore, the province—and by that is meant the Legislature—should not interfere save and except under the request of a majority of the municipalities.

Statistics issued from time to time have gone to show that nearly ninety per cent of tax arrears involve the municipalities or the organized sections of the province and in consequence the issue embodied in the resolution is rightly one for municipal and not governmental action at this time. Emphasis is unnecessary in pointing out the difficulties in which many of the municipalities in the province find themselves today, while the Premier took the stand on the floor of the House that were it even possible for the legislature to follow the course prescribed by the resolution the additional burden that would be placed upon the municipalities would provoke financial calamity in many cases.

Inequality of Plan.

These are general arguments against the wisdom of the resolution. There is a phase, however, which reports have it, has escaped the majority of returned soldiers and the general public. It is the inequality that such a proposal would create were it to become operative. Premier Oliver illustrated the case of the returned soldier who might chance to possess a dwelling assessed at \$2,000, and upon which all his taxes were paid. Under the Hawthornthwaite proposal this man, probably quite well off, would be entitled to a refund of all taxes paid by him during the whole period of the war. More—

over, in the case of the soldier or dependent in possession of a house assessed at, say \$2,500, upon which three or four years' taxes might be in arrears—with a possible mortgage encumbrance of three-fourths its value—would get no benefit whatsoever under the Hawthornthwaite plan of relief although this man or dependent might be very much more in need of the assistance than the man whose five years' of taxes would be remitted. Nor would any accommodation accrue to the soldier's widow who is a virtual taxpayer through the medium of her monthly rental paid for the house she does not own.

Will Find Relief.

These are the anomalies which Premier Oliver recruited in support of his objection to the principle of the resolution. And in making his request to the Newcastle member for its withdrawal because of its inequalities and impracticability, Mr. Oliver informed the House that some plan would be evolved before the end of the session whereby assistance would be given to those returned men who are suffering under the discomfort of tax arrears. Towards this end, therefore, it may now be taken for granted that the scope of the Returned Soldiers' Aid Commission will be extended and in future will comprehend all cases of necessity among returned soldiers and their dependents, whether the trouble be tax arrears or such ordinary and regrettably frequent cases of misfortune as come within the sympathetic and practical purview of this excellent provincial rehabilitation agency.

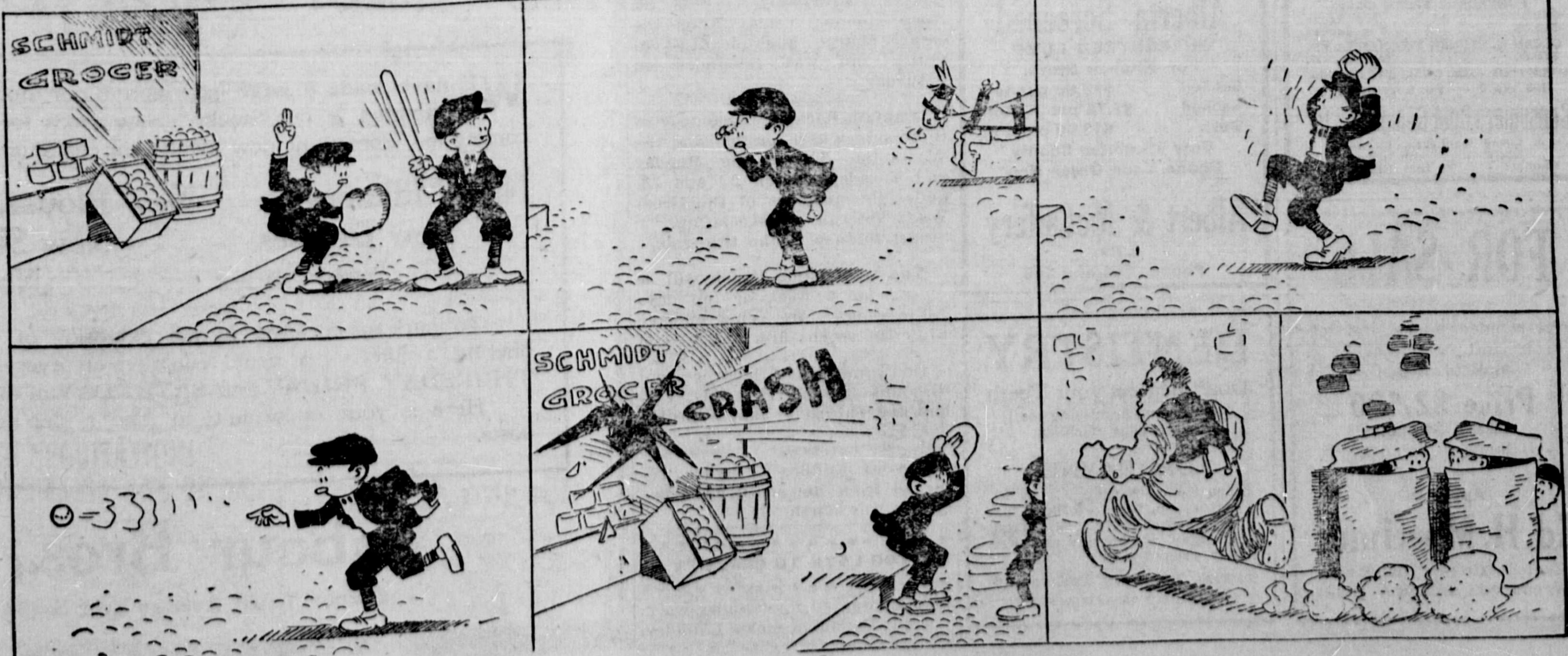

RESERVES AND PROSPECTORS

After April 1 Permission May be Granted to Those Desiring to Stake Claims.

PERMISSION NECESSARY FROM INDIAN AGENT

Effective on April 1, the Indian reserves in the entire province will be opened up to both Indian and white prospectors. This, however, applies only to the mining of precious metals, gold and silver. The base metals like copper, lead and zinc cannot be used. Application for permission must first be made to the Indian agent for the district before prospecting can commence. With this application must be exhibited a certified copy of a provincial miner's license or some other statement of authority to prospect.

Unless the applicant is some character who may be feared to cause trouble among the Indians, permission shall be granted. Upon the location and recording of a claim with the provincial authorities, application must again be made to the Superintendent General of Indian Reserves through the Indian agent for a lease. Such rental shall be paid as designed by the Indian agent upon such lease being granted.

In Effect April 1.

As far as the Dominion authorities are concerned this opening of the reserves to prospectors has been in effect since December but the provincial order-in-council does not come into effect until April 1. Thus it is no use for prospectors to stake before March 15 because such staking has to be recorded within fifteen days of the staking. As to the Kitsault reserve at Alice Arm which has caused enquiry the provincial authorities state that prospecting on it is almost useless and, in the long run, would prove more trouble to the prospectors than good they would get from it. The agent for the Kitsault reserve is W. E. Collison, of this city, and to him those desiring to prospect on the reserve will have to make application. In Prince Rupert district, under Mr. Perry, some applications have already been made for permission to prospect on Finlayson Island off Port Simpson both from Indians and whites.
