New Franchise Bill Provides Votes For All British Men and Women over 21 Years Old

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

OTTAWA, March 12.—Hon. Hugh Guthrie introduced the Franchise Bill into the House of Commons. The purpose of the bill is to provide a uniform franchise throughout the Dominion.

It fixes a uniform franchise throughout the Dominion. It provides a uniform method for preparation of the voters' lists. It provides a simple, satisfactory method for the conduct of elections.

Representing the bill Mr. Guthrie said that under its terms franchise had been established upon very broad principles. The requirements would be those of British citizenship, residence in Canada for one year, in the particular constituency for six months, and the attaining of the age of 21 years. It would apply alike in the case of male and female voters.

With regard to the preparation of the voters' lists the principle was the use of existing provincial lists. In any province where the lists were authorized by law for use in the provincial elections, they could be utilized in the case of the Dominion elections, provided the lists were not more than 12 months old or more than 12 months had elapsed between the compilation of such lists and the issue of writs for the Dominion.

Direct Action Favored by Labor Unions

Four to One Against Strike
to Enforce Nationalization
of Mines.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

OTTAWA, March 12.—The vote on the question of "direct action" to enforce the nationalization of mines taken yesterday was a complete defeat for the laborites. The vote representing the workers of each union was 3,732,000 for prohibition and 1,015,000 for action.

Labor Congress also rejected the miners' proposal to call a strike of the more important industries to enforce nationalization. H. Thomas, railwaymen's president, presided over the session.

Man's Clothing Store Was Robbed During the Night

A man's clothing store was robbed last night of socks and shoes to the value of \$50. A thief threw a boulder through one of the display windows and helped himself. The owners were informed of the robbery at 7.30. The store was shattered and the thief was seen running away. The police are investigating but no arrests have been made.

Borden School Under Repairs

Either Burrill Hall or Lutheran
Church Will be Used for
Overflow.

At the regular monthly meeting of the School Board last night it was decided to call for tenders for the putting of new siding on the south and east sides of the Borden Street School. Tenders are also to be invited for the painting of the building.

A circular letter from the Provincial Board of Health requiring that all school children, who cannot produce certificates, be vaccinated was referred to the city medical health officer and the medical health inspector for the schools.

The invitation of the City Council to attend a joint meeting in the council chamber was accepted by the board.

A report was made on the question of obtaining a new school room for the increased population. Negotiations are under way with W. E. Burrill for the Ninth Avenue hall and also with the trustees of the Lutheran Church on Ninth Avenue and Young St. Mr. Macdonald, superintendent of schools, was instructed to look into the matter of obtaining a new teacher.

The use of the grant made by the city council for the athletic instruction of children at the Exhibition Hall is being taken up with the Athletic Association.

Juryman Ill At Winnipeg

Trial of Strike Leaders Adjourned
Until James Jack Recovers

WINNIPEG, March 12.—Further adjournment of the trial of seven alleged strike leaders was necessitated by the continued illness of James Jack, a juryman. Mr. Justice Metcalf, in adjourning the trial until Saturday, stated that Mr. Jack was making satisfactory progress and might be able to sit again by that time.

Mr. Jack is in the general hospital, the nurses in attendance being sworn in as bailiffs.

Peace Negotiations Roumania and Russia

BUDAPEST, March 12.—Peace negotiations between Roumania and Soviet Russia will open soon. The Roumanians will demand the withdrawal of Soviet troops and the establishment of commercial relations.

Was Killed Instantly

Bert Green Struck by Crank
Shaft He Was Carrying

Bert Green, a Machinist working at the Imperial Machine Shop, was killed instantly this afternoon as a result of an accident. He was carrying a crank shaft across some planks near the shop when the plank broke and the man fell, the crank striking him on the head and killing him instantly.

A doctor was called but when he arrived the man was dead.

Figures Given On Manitoba's Public Works

Eight Million Dollars to Complete
New Parliament Buildings; A
Million Against Thomas
Kelly.

WINNIPEG, March 12.—It will cost \$8,075,418.58 to complete the parliament buildings in Winnipeg according to figures given to the legislature of Manitoba by Hon. G. A. Grerson, minister of public works. The estimated work remaining to be carried out will entail an expenditure of \$1,575,418, in addition to the \$6,500,447 already expended, which sum included \$1,994,199 which is credited to the previous administration. The return sets out the Board of Appraisal award of \$1,207,361 against Thomas Kelly & Sons, the original contractors.

LONDON, March 12.—Commander Erskine Childers, commander in the naval reserve, is the latest suspect arrested in Dublin and held in custody. He is the son of a former Chancellor.

DETROIT, March 12.—A hunger strike declared on Tuesday by some 200 aliens incarcerated here has been called off. They succumbed to the aroma of soup.

Succeeds Osler

LONDON, March 12.—Sir Geo. I. Makins will succeed Sir William Osler as chairman of the Fellowship of Medicine.

Chinese Break Away from Military Guards at Camp At William Head, Victoria

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

VICTORIA, March 12.—At the point of the bayonet several hundred Chinese coolies, who made a determined attempt to escape from William Head cantonment, were finally rounded up by military guards and herded back within the encampment fences. Over 8,000 Chinese coolies were at William Head when the riot occurred and it is estimated that about 2,000 succeeded in breaking away from the enclosure.

Guards were insufficient to stem the onrush of the forces of mutiny from getting out into the surrounding country and they had escaped before reinforcements could be rushed to the scene and the crowd of rioters forced back into the camp.

The cause of the riot is not known. A late advice states that the riot has been quelled and that order prevailed at the camp.

Canada's Status in League of Nations

Parliament asked to Pass Resolution that
Would Ratify Stand Taken by
Government; Treaty with
Bulgaria.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

OTTAWA, March 12.—Canada's status in the League of Nations again loomed up in the House of Commons when Hon. W. L. Rowell, president of the Privy Council, brought in a resolution to approve the Peace Treaty with Bulgaria.

After the statement that members complained that they had not received printed copies of the treaty sent out from Mr. Rowell's office, it had been decided that he should make a statement. The adoption of the treaty, he said, embodies the principles of democratic control in that it could only be ratified after the consent of Parliament.

In considering the League of Nations Covenant the status of Canada had been questioned. "In submitting this to the House it is the hope that it will be approved unanimously," said the minister. "The Government asks the House to ratify the principle of Canada's status as a member of the League. If the House adopts the resolution, it means that the House places itself behind the Government in maintaining Canada's status as already established. It also means the re-affirmation of the labor clauses in the treaty, which were on similar lines to those contained in the treaty with Germany and Austria, already approved by the House."

Saskatchewan Veterans Decide Against Entering Into the Political Field

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

PRINCE ALBERT, Sask., March 12.—A unanimous decision not to enter into politics either as a party or in support of any particular party is indicated by the Great War Veterans convention, when a resolution was submitted advocating entry of the association into politics in support of a broad platform, which would help to create equality for all in the development and distribution of the natural resources of the country.

Delegate Jones of Kinross voiced the opinion that if the association entered politics as a body it would inevitably be wrecked and land on the rocks on which, at some time or other, all political parties were wrecked.

Delegate Payne of Indian Head said the association could not support the platform without entering politics. To consider such a policy was playing with fire and the results were likely to be disastrous.

On the motion to adopt being put, only the Moosejaw delegates supported it. Without discussion the convention then adopted a motion asking the Dominion Command to again bring before the Government the re-establishment plan submitted last year.

Junior League Games Played

Bluebird Girls and Colt Boys
Were Winners at the Rink
Last Night.

Two Junior League basketball games were played in the rink last night and there was a very good attendance to witness them. The Entrance Class Bluebirds were winners over the High School Fireflies by a 3-0 score. Although the Flies were unable to score they made a much better showing than on their last appearance and are beginning to give promise.

The boys game between the Colts and the Beavers was a fast one and resulted in a win for the Colts by a 21-13 score. The first half ended 12-5 in favor of the Colts and in the second half the Beavers showed appearances of rallying but failed to do so.

Special mention is due Willie Mitchell of the Colts and Ted Halvarson of the Beavers for excellent playing. The referee of both games last night was Charlie Blythe.

TOLEDO, March 12.—Jimmie Wilde, flyweight champion of the world, and Frank C. Mason, of Fort Wayne, Indiana, will meet in a twelve-round, no-decision bout tonight.

Rate Increase On Old Country

Freights Between United States
and United Kingdom Have
Taken Big Jump.

NEW YORK, March 12.—The freight rates on foodstuffs shipped to England on British vessels have increased 30c per hundred pounds. This will work a hardship on the British Government as the Ministry of Food has 300,000,000 pounds of pork products in United States warehouses. The increase will mean that the English public must pay \$900,000 more if shipped under the new rates.

Jellicoe's Report An Interesting One.

Admiral Jellicoe has reported to the Canadian Government in regard to the needs of the country from a naval point of view and the report has been laid before Parliament. It will now be for the people of the country to decide whether or not they want a navy and if they want it, how much money they will spend on it. It is to be assumed that the matter will be left in abeyance for the present and will be discussed during the next election campaign in order that the people may be completely informed in connection with it.

When the time is ripe for a navy it certainly must be a Canadian navy. We must build our own war ships as we have built our merchant ships. We can do it just as well as they do it elsewhere. From an efficiency point of view it may be better to contribute to an Imperial navy, but the Canadian people can never become interested in that great silent monster as they would in their own little back yard fleet.

To have war ships does not mean much to a country unless she is in a position to man them. A navy is not made, it grows. There has to be a building force behind it, but the navy consists even more in its personnel than in its ships. It is an institution and it must be in close touch with the other activities of the country. It should be an outgrowth of those activities rather than something grafted on. With the development of a merchant marine, the thought must naturally occur, how are we going to defend it?

Commence in Small Way at First.

The Laurier Government made a start with a navy years ago and everything looked very good on paper, but they were very slow in getting to work, so slow that the people got tired of waiting. Then when the Conservatives came in power they upset all the plans and started on a new tack and did much less than their predecessors. Those were in days when the country could afford to spend money. Now the burden of war debt is so great that it is doubtful if the country will be prepared for any extra expenditures for some years to come.

What might be done, it would seem, would be to build a few of the smaller vessels first, submarines for instance, for the defense of the Canadian ports. The work could be extended from time to time and men could be trained so that when the larger ships were built they would be really a part of a naval system and not so many white elephants.

Must Pay Debts Before Having Luxuries.

The first thing for Canadians to do is to pay their debts. To spend large sums of money on warships or anything else not actually needed would be foolish just now. Get the finances of the country into better shape and then talk about new enterprises. As long as our dollar is not worth its face value in the markets of the world, and as long as we have to borrow in order to pay the running expenses of the country, we are in a bad way. If we spend money now it must be first on schemes for developing the natural resources of the country so that we may take our rightful place in the world commercially. Then when we have taken that place will be time enough to plan to defend it.

ALD. PERRY ON SCHOOLS

Defends His Attitude in Regard to Criticism of Building Estimates.

DID NOT USE INCORRECT GRAMMAR AT COUNCIL.

Aldermen Should Have Been Given More Detail of Proposed Expenditures.

To the Editor:—A friend of mine told me yesterday that THE MAN IN THE MOON is made of green cheese. Believing this to be true, I make bold to analyze the strange mixture bound up in your editorial of yesterday, in which you observed that “the assessment is something that will make the people think seriously, and watch well every move made.” Added to this your “Man in the Moon” reflections of today, in which you try to make clear that a certain alderman is trying to run the town simply because he has been trying to throw light on seemingly ill-considered expenditures, display a strange and cheesy mixture indeed.

I am desirous to repudiate the atrocious grammar attributed to me in the Empire of Tuesday, as having been expressed at Monday’s council meeting; also to offset the suggestion made that I was in any way anxious to see a restraining order served upon the local School Board to prevent that body from building on a site it had selected.

I am not questioning the right of the School Board to select a school site, nor am I challenging the prerogatives and powers of the said board. I am, however, determined that, so far as I am concerned at least, the School Board shall keep within the bounds of law and reason, and expend the public funds as a responsible public body with the knowledge and acquiescence of the rate payers.

Against Injunction.

I am not opposed to the building of a school on the site selected, for I am aware that the School Board has absolute authority in such a matter. The question of a restraining order was first broached by the mayor. My position was that since the mayor had, on the vote of the Council, obtained a legal opinion, for which the city had paid, I considered it proper to inquire as to the outcome, nevertheless I was not in favor of such a course. Such an inquiry should not be misconstrued to make it appear that I want a restraining order served on the Board.

The School Law is so clear that a child can understand it. Here the powers and duties of the Board are briefly and clearly outlined. It stipulates that, following an election of a council, the School Board shall prepare their estimates for the year. These are classified as “Ordinary” and “Extraordinary.” Ordinary estimates are those having to do with school expenditure in a current way, while extraordinary expenditures are those which embrace say a new building, etc.

When in January, 1919, the board submitted the estimates for 1919, part of the amount asked for was for extraordinary expenses, requisitioned as such. The fact that the board could then make distinction between ordinary and extraordinary expenditures is prima facie evidence that the board was familiar with school law.

Estimate Requirements.

The School Law further provides that in submitting estimates for the consideration of the city council, these shall be classified as follows:—

A. Site.
B. Buildings.
C. Furnishings and equipment.
D. Alterations and improvements.
E. Extraordinary requirements; also that the Council shall consider and determine under each class separately, and shall either approve or disapprove, notifying the Board of its decision within a week.

The question of a site was voted on and settled. A building was asked for, to cost \$150,000, and this was provided for by by-law and passed upon by the public.

No estimates were prepared and presented with regard to furnishings and equipment, nor for extraordinary requirements. During the passage of the by-law through its various stages in the Council, I repeatedly asked for

information concerning the intentions of the School Board in respect of furnishings and equipment, and extraordinary requirements, by which I means the following, viz:—

Furnishings and equipment, \$14,000.
Architect (estimated), \$7,000.
Deduction on sale of bonds, estimated 10 per cent, \$15,000.
Exchange, if bonds sold in the United States as before, estimated 10 per cent, \$15,000.
Leveling grounds, \$2,000.
Sewer to Hays Creek or Cow Bay, School proportion, say, \$10,000.
Extras on building, estimated, \$20,000.

Added to this the removal pipe line since asked, \$7,000.

Total \$ 90,000
Added cost of school 150,000
Total flotation cost \$240,000

I was disdainfully referred to school law, and informed that the Council had no authority over the School Board or the matter of school expenditure. I found it difficult to connect these assertions with the School Law itself, and no one seemed to be sufficiently posted on the School Law to be able to follow intelligently the passage of the by-law. In fact, while, verbally, ex-Alderman Kirkpatrick led the Council to believe (she representing the School Board) that the \$150,000 was intended to cover the cost of the building, furnished and equipped, in practice the by-law was prepared providing that a building only be erected at the cost mentioned.

Entire Cost.

I believe that when the public (continued on Page Four.)

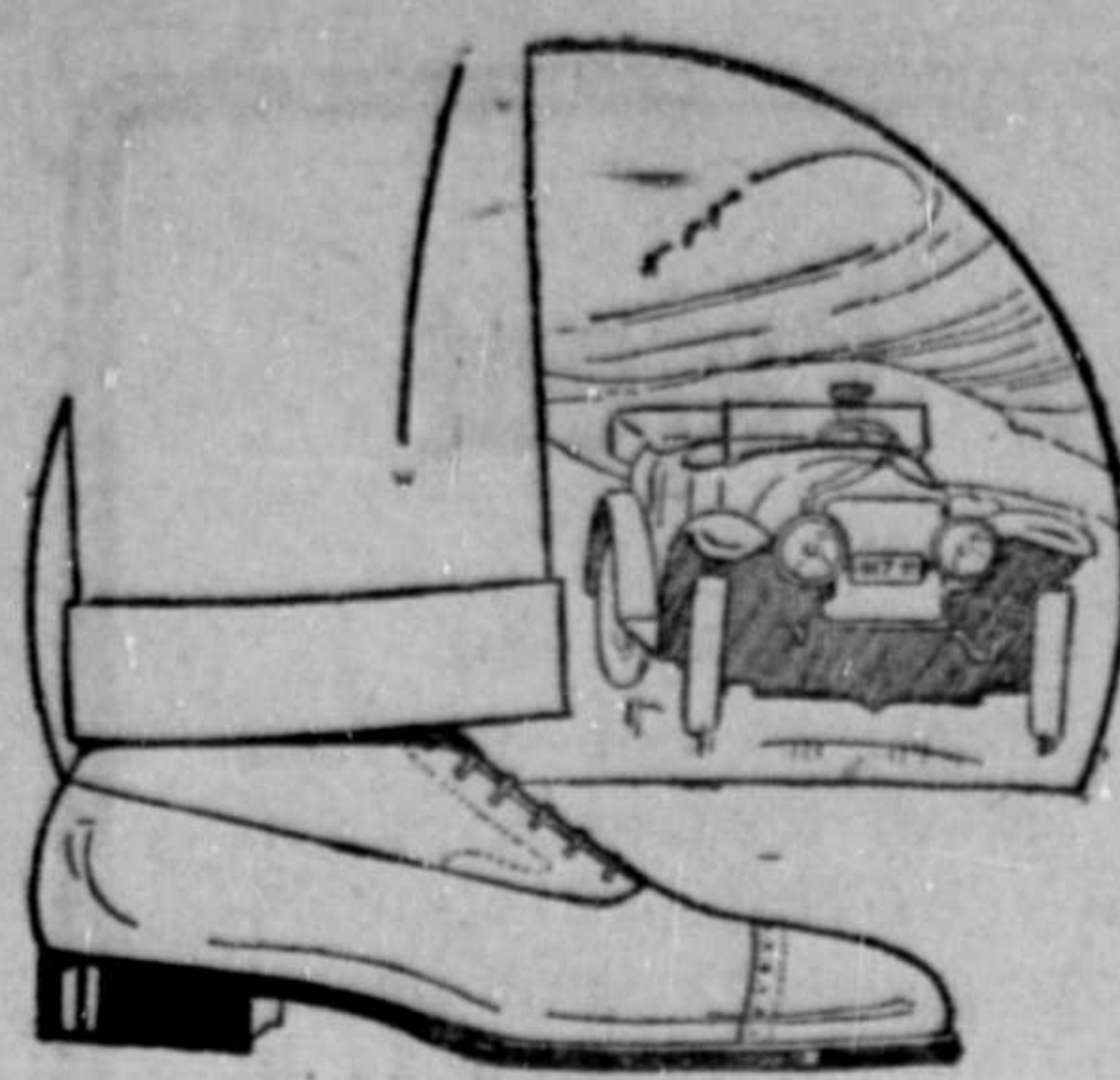

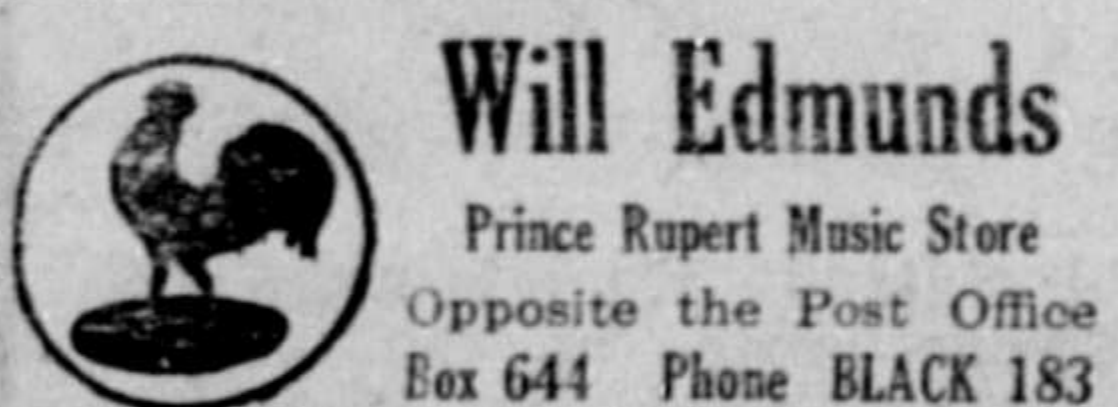

voted for this by-law, it was the prevailing understanding that the sum of \$150,000 would cover the entire cost of the school establishment fully equipped and ready for use.

As soon as the building by-law was voted on and passed by the people, and as a result of the issue I took with the School Board to the effect that I considered the Board should submit their complete classified estimates, the School Board, six months after and as soon as excavation contract had been awarded, requisitioned an additional \$14,000 for furnishings and equipment, and even to this date no requisition has reached the Council for the extraordinary expenditures involved, except for the cost of removing the pipe-line and clearing the grounds.

The policy of the School Board seems to be to erect the school building and, when this is completed, make the public come through with the balance which should properly have been requisitioned from the Council under classified estimates, when the building was first asked for.

Some Questions.

Why did the School Board not make application for \$14,000 for furnishings and equipment when it presented its application for the school?

Why was provision not made at the same time, by by-law, to cover extraordinary requirements as required by School Law?

Why has the School Board persisted in its refusal to discuss the estimates with the Council? If the School Board intended

that the \$150,000 was to cover the cost of equipment as well as the building, why does the Board now requisition additional money by-laws?

Why was the public not invited to inspect the competitive plans, but only called upon to inspect the accepted plans after the return of the others?

To answer that such matters as exchange and deductions on the sale of bonds are provided for in the building by-law is not to my mind sufficient. It does not alter the facts that a bond issue greatly in excess of the actual cost of the building will be necessary, and the public will be called upon to foot the bill.

Only One Reason.

There is only one reason that I can see for the attitude of the Board to the whole question. It is that the School Board fears the public may not be willing to vote on money by-laws to cover such large expenditures if asked to do so, in which event the Board may be called upon to consider another program to meet school requirements throughout the city. My position, briefly, is that it is the purpose of the School Board to expend a quarter of a million dollars directly or indirectly in connection with the new school building, the board should ask the public to support its estimates in complete form and not introduce a series of minor money by-laws as though he public were easily forgetful of by-laws already voted on.

I have been asking in the council chamber that the School Board classify and complete their estimates, and also for a joint meeting to discuss the proposed extraordinary requirements. Surely my requests are not unreasonable.

May be Wrong.

As an alderman I think I am entitled to express my opinion on these matters. A frank discussion may prove that I am in the wrong, in which case I will be man enough to admit it. There should be enough public representatives in both bodies to show me if I am under a false impression, but no one has yet done so. I am open to conviction.

The utter silence of the School Board on this question is more painful than a straight up-and-down scrap. For mercy's sake start something. The school is badly needed, and the School Board and Council should have a clear and mutual understanding on so vital and urgent a matter.

NAVY SUBJECT OF DISCUSSION

Two Plans Have Already Been Abandoned in the Past by Canada.

OTTAWA, March 11.—The corridors of Parliament hummed with comment upon the report of Viscount Jellicoe of Scapa. The naval question has been a matter of acute political controversy ever since 1909, when Sir George Foster from the opposition seconded by Sir Wilfrid Laurier from the Government side, moved a resolution calling for the creation of a Canadian navy, built, manned and controlled by Canada. In 1910 Sir Wilfrid Laurier brought down his program, which comprised the construction of four "Bristol" cruisers, one "Boadicea" and six destroyers. The program was never completed.

On the return of Sir Robert Borden to power, a temporary policy was agreed upon on the advice of the British Admiralty, which contemplated the contribution by Canada of \$35,000,000 for the construction of two dreadnaughts, the best that money could buy or science could conceive. This "contribution" policy was fought to the last ditch by the opposition in the House of Commons and killed by the Senate.

During the war Sir Robert Borden and the representatives of the other dominions utterly opposed the suggestion of the Admiralty that an Imperial fleet be created on the basis of proportionate contributions.
