Police Force is Underpaid.

The relative pay for men working in Prince Rupert and Vancouver is often discussed as well as the cost of living in each place. Inquiry in regard to the pay of the members of the local police force shows that the constables here get less money than they do in Vancouver. In Vancouver first class constables, ranking the same as Constables Adams and Bailey, get \$158 a month and they have to do nothing but patrol work, a detective department looking after the purely detective work. First class constables here get \$150 a month and they work an hour longer each day than in Vancouver and also they are expected to do detective work, and in fact are quite proficient at certain classes of detective duty. Other constables get only \$140 a month.

In view of the criticisms which have been levelled at the "force" from time to time and in view of the extremely difficult nature of the work they have to perform, especially in a small city, it seems as if they should at least get as much money as in the cities to the south.

Life of Policeman Not a Cynasure.

The police constable has anything but a pleasant life. He is always expected to endanger his life in the interests of the community in handling dangerous criminals when occasion requires, and he is continually getting called down by a commission, each member of whom has his views on the manner in which the law and order department of the city should be conducted. He is also subject to the order of a chief and is bound by an oath of office. Should he be required, he is subject to call at any time.

Charges of graft and rakeoff are often spread recklessly in regard to members of police forces generally, and it is hardly to be wondered at that constables should be suspected of getting money illicitly when the pay they receive is scarcely enough to allow them to live decently without aid from outside. The only way to get away from these suspicions is to pay the men well and expect them to give good service in return. Just now at anyrate the police seem to be earning their money.

Chief's Salary Is Very Meagre.

The salary of the Chief of Police here is \$185 a month, and for this he is responsible for the law and order of the city, is subject to disagreeable cross questioning and remarks every time the police commission meets and is expected to advise the commission and to do an immense amount of preventive work of which the public never dreams.

The Daily News realizes that the expenses of the city are heavy and the taxes high, but that is no reason for underpaying workers in any department. If they are doing good work they should be paid well.

Magistrate's Salary

Also Needs Revision. Perhaps Magistrate McMordie will pardon reference to his position in the life of the city.
