## Counter Revolutions Are in Progress Throughout Germany

Independent Government in Silesia; Communist Rising in Rhine Valley; New State Formed Around Bavaria; Berlin Looks Better.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

LONDON, March 16.—Telephonic messages from the Berlin correspondent of the Exchange Telegraph Co. from different parts of Germany report the situation to be rather complicated. In Silesia comes word that an independent government has been formed under direction of the Socialist leader Herr Phillips. In the Rhine valley and Westphalia industrial regions the communists have proclaimed a counter revolution and a general strike. A number of labor councils have been formed at Aachen and Dortmund.

Heavy fighting continues at Frankfurt. Bavaria, Wurttemberg and Baden have joined as one state and Saxony, it is reported, also enter this bloc.

BERLIN, March 16.—The counter revolution in Germany ended last night to have reached the end of the road. There is strong probability that shortly one government will be in power and that President Ebert will come back to Berlin with his ministers.

## JEWELLERY HAS BEEN RECOVERED

Rings, Sapphires and Emeralds Purchased With Bogus Check are Returned.

Messrs. Mitchell & Duncan, Vancouver jewellers, have been notified of the recovery of \$3,000 worth of jewellery sold by them weeks ago to H. H. Muggley, a man in Montreal awaiting extradition to the United States on charges of passing bad checks.

Muggley and his wife and child were staying at the Empress Hotel at the time he made his purchase of Mitchell & Duncan. He had quite a number of articles, including some diamonds, sapphire and emerald goods. Muggley was described as the picture of prosperity and he wrote out a \$3,000 check on New York bank nobody suspected anything, especially since the company had received a report telling that Muggley had an account in Vancouver and New York. In addition to that, Muggley told of a company he was organizing in Vancouver and the name of some of the principals.

When Mitchell & Duncan learned some days later that Muggley had been arrested in Montreal and that firms in Minneapolis and Atlanta had filed suit for cheque charges against him, they commenced to suspect all was not as it should be. They wired the Montreal police about the \$3,000 deal and had a charge preferred against Muggley. Yesterday they were told that Muggley had turned over the goods he purchased here and these will be returned. Whether Muggley intentionally used a worthless cheque or unintentionally overdrew his account is a matter of doubt, and Mitchell & Duncan are inclined to the latter belief. At any rate their main worry is over, as the diamonds and sapphires and emeralds are now on their way back to Victoria.

## FISH ARRIVALS

Catches Sold Here This Morning Except Omaney.

The following fishing boats in the morning sold to the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. for 6c: H. & R., 8,000 pounds; 5,000 pounds; Volunteer, 4,500 pounds; Atli, 7,000 pounds; 4,500 pounds; and Agnes, 6,000 pounds. The Omaney had 66,000 pounds has not yet sold. The car situation shows signs of relief.

## SIR LOUIS DAVIES HAS BEEN SWORN IN AS ADMINISTRATOR

OTTAWA, March 16.—Sir Louis Davies, chief justice of the Supreme Court, was yesterday sworn in as administrator of the Dominion to act during the absence of the Governor General who has gone to England.

## PUBLICITY FROM THE LUMBER MILL

Full Page Article in the Western Lumberman Describes Seal Cove Industry.

Prince Rupert is getting a good deal of publicity from the Prince Rupert Lumber Company in this city. The Western Lumberman of Vancouver has a page article, illustrated, telling of the big mill at Seal Cove, describing its plant, and featuring the fact that the Emerson interests are again to operate it.

The same article deals with the improvements which are being made at the mill and is in all a good advertisement for this city. The picture of the mill shows also part of the cold storage plant and the cannery up the inlet.

## LOCAL BIRDS TAME

Visitors Remark on Appearance of Ravens, Crows and Gulls in Streets.

Visitors to the city are much interested in the birds in and around Prince Rupert. They remark that never before have they seen ravens, crows and gulls so tame that they would alight in the main street of a city and feed on the garbage and other refuse picked up in back yards.

The big black raven with its familiar croak is seen everywhere in the winter, and the crows and gulls are so tame at times that it is almost possible to catch them.

George Casey and D. S. Cameron returned by the Venture yesterday afternoon from Victoria where the convention of the B. C. Federation of Labor was attended. Mr. Cameron was chairman of the committee on reports and was kept very busy during the sessions. The B. C. Federation is practically dissolved now its purpose being covered by the scope of the One Big Union. The B. C. Federation is now under the O. B. U. control.

The tax rate in the municipality of Esquimalt this year is set at 17 mills. Last year it was 18 mills. The difference is in spite of the increase of half a mill for educational purposes.

## GERMANS KNEW OF SAILING OF CONVOY

Code Message was Picked up and Deciphered, Admiral Sims Tells Senate.

WASHINGTON, March 16.—That the Germans knew about the sailing of the first American convoy, was stated by Admiral Sims yesterday to the Senate Committee. The code was intercepted and deciphered by the naval department.

## Money Spent By France Was in Common Cause of All Civilized Countries

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

PARIS, March 16.—Premier Millerand today put aside the German crisis long enough to discuss relations between France and the United States and conditions of international credit. He said to a representative of the Associated Press:

"France and the United States must continue the close friendship which has always been maintained. No fleeting misunderstanding must be allowed to trouble their relations. The sooner misconceptions are dispersed the better.

"This seems an opportune time to recall to our friends, the United States, that France is not asking for charity. The greater part of the money France borrowed from abroad was spent in the common interests of all civilized countries, a fact which might form the basis of a claim for special consideration, but such is not our intention."

## Charges That Board of Works Is Not Consulted Regarding Improvements

Giving for his reasons that the engineering department of the city hall staff failed to bring important street work before the Board of Works but simply went ahead without the authority of that body in putting in improvements, Ald. Casey last night intimated to the City Council that he was going to resign as chairman of the Board of Works to avoid responsibility for some "fool stunts" that have been done.

The matter came up when Ald. Casey protested against the four-foot crossings that are being put in the business section of the city and urged that the work be immediately stopped. He stated that the Board of Works had never been consulted on the matter. It came out that the width of none of the street crossings put down had been approved by the Board of Works although the design had been. Another case of which the board had never been consulted was on the re-decking of Fourth Avenue which Alderman Casey considered was work that should not have been done.

"This seems a strange proceeding," stated Alderman Perry. "It is time to call a halt and find where the responsibility lies. However, I think it would show weakness to resign. May I ask Ald. Casey if his committee has conferences with the city engineer?"

"Yes," replied Alderman Casey, "but usually on matters of minor importance. The heavy work does not come before us."

"The Board of Works is an unpopular body," said Ald. Kerr, "and nobody wants to belong to it."

## ALVENSLEBEN NOW LIVES IN SEATTLE

Wishes to Return to British Columbia to Recover Some of Money Invested.

VANCOUVER, March 16.—Conflicting reports come here from Seattle in regard to Alvo von Alvensleben. He is now living in Seattle with his wife and is said to be anxious to come to British Columbia before leaving for South America, where he intends to live.

Alvensleben, who is said to represent the ex-Kaiser and a large number of German notables, some of whom took part in the war against the Allies, was largely interested in the Jingle Pot coal mine on Vancouver Island, which was wound up and re-organized under an arrangement with the Government. Alvensleben will try to regain his interests in this and other concerns, with the hope of getting away with a modicum of the six to seven million dollars of his own and clients' money he invested in British Columbia during the days of the land boom preceding the war.

## Companies Formed To Operate Planes

The R.C.P. Co., Ltd., and Northern Aero Co., Ltd., have Ordered Three Hydro Planes at Cost of \$20,000 Each.

VICTORIA, March 16.—Certificates of incorporation have been issued to two Prince Rupert companies, the R. C. P. Co., Ltd., and the Northern B. C. Aero Co., Ltd., both of which are organized for the purpose of operating hydroplanes out of Prince Rupert, Stewart, Alice Arm, Anyox and Ketchikan. They have been organized by, and it is understood, will be under the management of Roy C. Price of Prince Rupert and formerly of Anyox, with a number of prominent mining men of Anyox and Stewart backing him.

The companies, which are closely associated, have already ordered three hydroplanes in Seattle, to be delivered at a cost of \$20,000 each and the first should arrive at Prince Rupert under its own power in about a month from now. It is understood that Mr. Price will go to Seattle to take over the first machine and will fly in it from there to Prince Rupert.

The new company is designed especially to fly between coast points and mines that are difficult of access, carrying both passengers and freight. They will supply the big mines on the Salmon river from Stewart, and will bring these mines in direct touch with Stewart without passing through American territory. It is claimed that by means of planes the cost of delivering freight to the mines will be cut in half and at the same time will provide a good profit to the new companies. There are small lakes adjacent to most of the mines on the Salmon River and also near prospects in the interior, and these will be utilized as landing places by the hydroplanes.

## The Aviators.

Eddie Hubbard will fly the first plane, it is expected, and it will be turned over to Lieut. Ernest Hall, one of the B. C. boys who was overseas and who has done considerable flying since he returned.

Lieut. Hall is a native son who was born at Cumberland, Vancouver Island. When the war broke out he was working in the Merchants' Bank here, but when it became known that there was need for airmen Ernie was one of the first to join. He saw a good deal of service overseas after training in Texas along with a number of other Canadian and American aviators. On his return from overseas he rejoined his bank at Vancouver, but he got married, contrary to the rules of the concern, and had to relinquish his post. Now he is to fly in northern British Columbia with Prince Rupert as headquarters.

The second and third planes will probably not be ready for shipment until June.

## BUILDING COSTS

Soldiers Find it Difficult to Get Houses Erected Under Loan Act.

It is not only in Prince Rupert that the cost of building is high. Those who are wishing to take advantage of the Dominion Housing loans are finding in other places than this that they cannot get much for their money. At Esquimalt a few days ago the municipal council called for tenders for a simple bungalow for E. M. Root, a returned man, which they expected to get for \$3,000. On opening the tenders it was found that the lowest was for \$4,355, while the only other tender for the same house was for \$4,700.

As the maximum they can lend under the Act is \$3,800, it was found impossible to have the house built.

## No Return of German Monarchy.

The new Government of Germany has satisfied the Allies that there is to be no attempt to bring back the monarchy in Germany and that it will live up to the treaty terms. That would be reassuring if promises meant anything to German officials. Unfortunately we have already had a taste of what it means to place confidence in the reactionary powers of that country.

Possibly there is no need for fear. At any rate it is pretty sure that the Allied Governments are keeping in close touch with the situation.

## Trial Date is Postponed.

The trial date for the Erb-Mullen case, concerning the ownership and control of the local shipyard has now been set at April 7. It is presumed that if it can be shown to the satisfaction of the judge that a further delay is necessary, even a later date may yet be set. Happily for Prince Rupert the work is still going on and, so far as the city is concerned, there might be no lawsuit pending.

There will be a feeling of increased confidence in the place once this tangle is settled. There have been hints at further contracts, and if they are secured it means continued prosperity to the city. At any rate we have the present benefit and the future will doubtless take care of itself.

## Fishermen Worried Over Exchange.

Some of the fishermen who make this their home port, but who have their homes in Seattle are finding that they have to pay a large amount for the privilege of living on Puget Sound. They pay anything from twelve to twenty cents on the dollar exchange, according to the variations, and the idea is not a pleasant one.

The way to get over the exchange problem is to build a house in Prince Rupert and live in it. The fishing industry is doubtless a permanency here and the more fishermen live here the more pleasant it will be for them and for everybody.

## Advertising Brings Results.

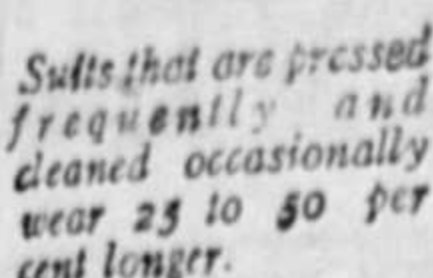

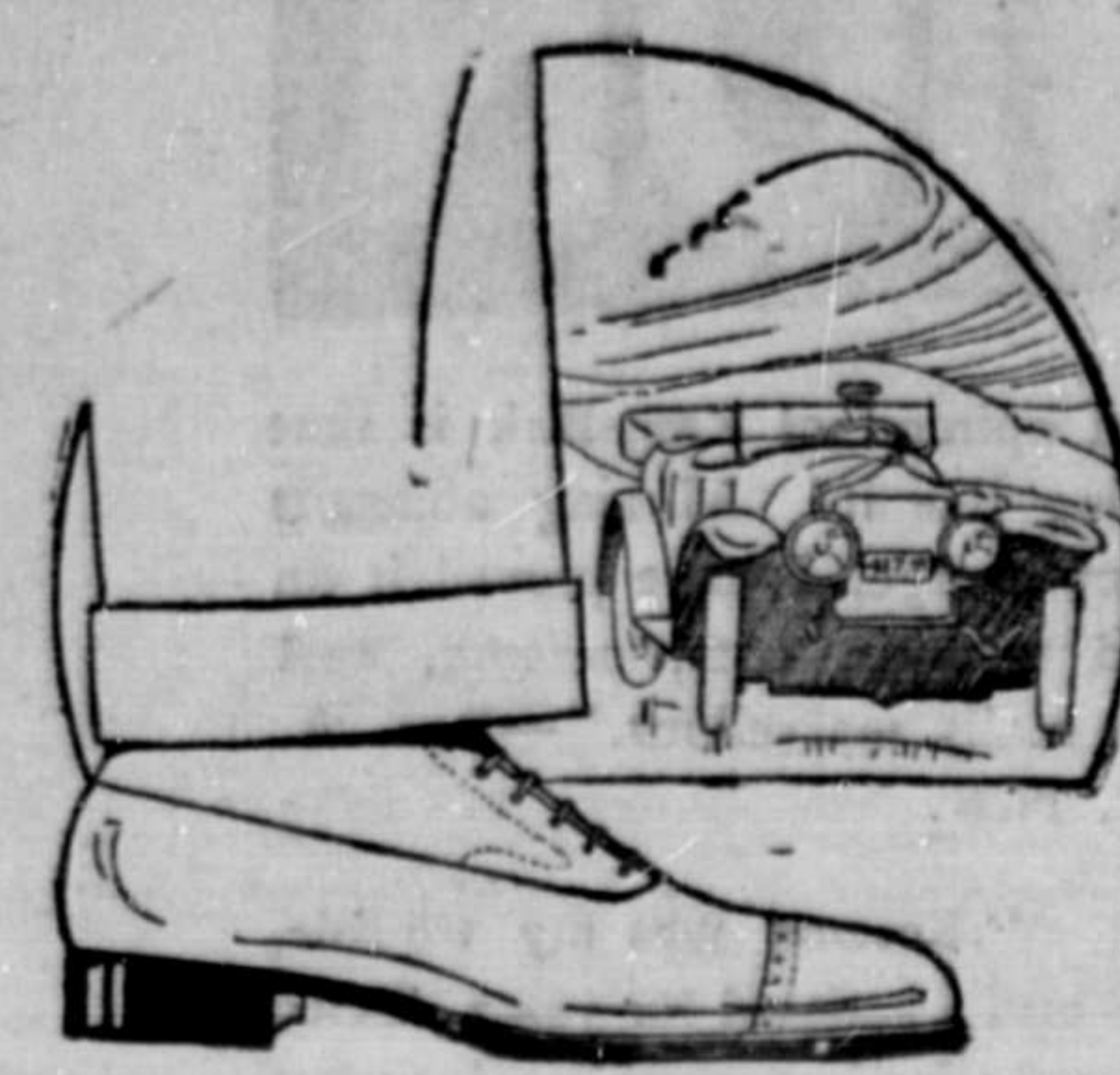

## PUTTING LOGS INTO WATER

Big Logs Purchased from Georgetown for Local Mill—Other Activities.

The Prince Rupert Lumber Co. commenced putting logs into the water yesterday at their camp at Shannon Bay, Masset Inlet. They have four logging outfits at work there with about fifty men in the woods altogether. Most of the logs are already felled.

The same company has purchased 800,000 feet of logs from the Georgetown Lumber Co. These were logs that were too large for the Georgetown mill to handle. They will be here in a few days.

On Graham Island there are two mills cutting, the Graham Island Spruce & Cedar Co.'s mill, generally known as Lynch's mill, and Lewis' mill.

The Buckley mill is being overhauled and three camps are putting logs into the water this week. It is understood that this mill will start operations very soon. It is operated by the newly organized Masset Timber Co. Mr. Buckley is expected from the south soon.

## TECO ARRIVES FROM SOUTH ON FIRST TRIP

Taylor Co. Motorboat Has Spent Winter Freighting Out of Vancouver. Had Fire.

The diesel motor boat Teco, Captain McMullin, belonging to the Taylor Engineering Co., arrived in port yesterday afternoon en route from Vancouver to Alice Arm with 250 barrels of Star fuel oil, powder and general freight. This is the first trip of the Teco north this summer and she has been doing general freighting out of Vancouver during the winter. From now on she will run regularly to Alice Arm taking out the high grade silver ore.

The Teco had a bad fire while at James Island Powder Works near Victoria this winter when her galley, mess house and cook's quarters were burned out. Fortunately the fire was checked, for the boat was carrying a cargo of gasoline at the time. Her mess quarters have been enlarged and

## OBJECTS TO TRANSFER OF QUARTER INTEREST IN MONTANA GROUP

A writ has been issued in the Supreme Court by John Irving, of Victoria, through his lawyer, F. G. Crisp, against Patrick Day and M. R. Jamieson asking for a declaration that the transfer of a quarter interest in the Montana Group of claims in the upper Salmon River valley was simply a transfer in trust.

The claim is made that the transfer was made by Jamieson to Daly last October, but it was in trust and Daly and Jamieson still possess his interest. Mr. Irving has asked a receiver to be appointed for the quarter interest to satisfy a judgment which he has against Jamieson.

## PRINCE GEORGE

Judge Robertson gave judgment in the county court on Friday last in favor of W. P. Ogilvie, the plaintiff in the case of Ogilvie vs. Wimbles over the ownership of the Ruggles Building in South Fort George.

Dan McFee, a well known ship-builder, arrived here last week to rebuild the "B.X.," which was wrecked on the Fraser River forty miles south of here. The vessel will be brought up the river to Prince George under her own steam where repairs will be made.

A further addition to the legal profession arrived here last week in the person of E. V. Finland, of Victoria, who contemplates opening a practice here. Mr. Finland served in the war in the flying corps.

George C. Dymont, who has been connected with various newspapers here, left last Thursday for a six months' visit to England.

James B. Connier, of Francois Lake, was found guilty of assault on his wife and daughter by Judge Robertson last week. A stated case was asked for and Connier will go before the Supreme Court in two months.

A drive for funds is to be carried out in aid of the extension of operations of the local hospital. It is proposed to enlarge the building and equipment.
