Bombardment of Kiel Causes Death of 400; Many Wounded

Quarters of Town Destroyed by Guns of Cruiser; Communists Seize Arsenal; Then Driven Out.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
LONDON, March 16.—Four hundred persons are reported to have been killed and many persons wounded in a bombardment of Kiel by the German cruiser *Eckernforde*, says a Central News despatch from Copenhagen, quoting the *Ekstrabladets* Kiel correspondent.
The despatch adds that some quarters of the town were destroyed by the bombardment. The cruiser is said to have directed its fire especially against the quarters of the workmen who are opposed to the Kapp Government.
In addition to the report of the bombardment of Kiel, detailed reports have been received of severe fighting there.
The Daily Mail's correspondent under date of Monday, says the communists seized the arsenal, six officers and a number of soldiers being killed. Later a marine brigade supporting the Government retook the arsenal, where about 200 people are reported to have been killed.

TRIBUTE TO JEWISH NATION

Secretary Daniels Endorses Movement to Establish Home in Palestine.
(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
BALTIMORE, March 17.—Enthusiasm of the movement to establish in Palestine a national home for the Jewish people was today by Secretary Daniels in an address to the Zionist organization of America for the Palestine restoration. It was supported by a high tribute to the Jews living in America.

ALICE ARM HOTEL SOLD

Purchaser Will Double Capacity Meet With Present Demands of Travelers at Camp.
In an agreement for the sale of the Alice Arm Hotel, now owned by Ole Evindsen, has been reached. The purchaser is Charles F. Walmsley, of Vancouver, who is well known hotel man, having operated houses in Nelson, Hope, Westminister and other cities in the south. Although all travelers will regret to learn of Mr. Evindsen leaving the business, the house will be carried on in his hands.
Mr. Walmsley will take charge April 1. The interior will be rearranged and renovated and capacity doubled. Mr. Walmsley is now on the ground supervising the changes. The hotel has been a serious for many visitors actually have to sleep in the street, all the accommodation being taken up.

INCOME TAX MUST BE PAID

Notice Being Given to Those Who are in Default.
(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
VANCOUVER, March 17.—Final notices are being sent to those who have not yet filed in income returns and everyone not making the return before April 1 will be proceeded against according to law. It is not necessary that such notice be given to anyone not notified and yet failing to make the return is liable to the penalty. Postmasters and others are provided with forms that can be secured on application. Married persons with an income of \$2,000 a year or over are liable to tax and unmarried persons with income of \$1,000 a year must also pay.

A MEMORIAL IS UNVEILED

Archbishop Du Vernet Preaches in Presbyterian and Anglican Churches at Terrace.

Archbishop Du Vernet returned last night from a visit to Terrace where he unveiled a memorial shield, on which were the names of Lieut. Morrison and Pte. Chichester, two members of the Anglican Sunday School at Terrace, who made the supreme sacrifice. The Archbishop preached in the Anglican Church in the morning and in the Presbyterian Church in the evening. The services are so arranged that they do not conflict with each other at that place, being held at the Anglican and Presbyterian churches alternately.
The Archbishop reports that work has commenced on the enlarging of St. Matthew's Church at Terrace by throwing into the main building the schoolroom at the back. This is made necessary by the growth in population and the increasing interest in the church.
The train from Terrace arrived here shortly after midnight last night, the delay being caused by an engine off the track near Shane and other impediments as a result of the breaking up of the ice and snow.

GERMAN REACTIONARIES WOULD PREPARE FOR WAR

Object to Demobilization of the Army as Provided by Treaty of Versailles and Would Retain War Courts.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
GENEVA, March 17.—One of the conditions proposed to the Ebert cabinet by General von Luettwitz was that demobilization of the army of the Empire, as provided by the Versailles Treaty, must not be executed, and war courts martial must not be disturbed, according to Premier Bauer of the old government, says a Stuttgart despatch to the *Neue Zurich Zeitung*.
Premier Bauer also quoted General Luettwitz as saying that the Empire instead should prepare for a new war. The Premier added, "after such a condition, what aims Kapp and his accomplices are pursuing can be judged."

NEW BUILDING FOR T. EATON

Addition to Winnipeg Premises Completes Square Nine Storeys High.

Winnipeg, March 17.—A modern building, nine stories high, exclusive of basement, will be erected this summer by the T. Eaton Company, on the corner of Donald and Graham, H. McGee, vice-president, announced today. Work upon the new building started this afternoon. Two brick and two frame houses, all vacant, on Donald Street, are being torn down.
The erection of the new structure will change the group of Eaton buildings from an irregular shape to a square, and will represent another step in the total Eaton plan which contemplates an immense institution extending right back to St. Mary's Avenue.

What Announcement Says

The following is the announcement of the new structure by H. McGee, vice-president of the T. Eaton Company, in connection with the final step of signing the contracts:
"The T. Eaton Company announce their preparations for large building operations this spring. These concern the erection of the second unit of the building programme as outlined to the city council.
"This building will be located on the corner of Donald Street and Graham Avenue, and will extend 348 feet on Donald Street and 120 feet in depth to the lane. The building will be nine stories and basement, and will provide about four hundred thousand feet of floor space."

The Vital Message By Conan Doyle.

Conan Doyle has written a second book on Spiritualism which he has named "The Vital Message." It is an argument in favor of a spirit world, more or less closely in touch with human affairs and with which communication may be had by means of those who have the power, a power not possessed by many. Doyle is firmly convinced as a result of many years of investigation, that there is a spirit world and that the spirits do communicate with men and women through mediums. He believes in spirit photography, table rapping, the ouija board, spirit voices, materialization and other phenomena and in every case ascribes the results obtained to spiritualism.

Instances Given of Wonderful Powers.

Doyle gives instances of wonderful powers enjoyed by some people. He tells, for instance, of D. D. Home, a Scottish American, the story of whose life written by his wife says that he was able to produce his phenomena in full daylight as well as in the dark. He never received payment for his services and refused a fee of \$10,000 on one occasion. He had the power of self-levitation, the handling of fire, movement without touch of heavy objects, visible materialization of spirits, miracles of healing, and conveying messages from the dead. These and other powers have been possessed by other mediums and Mr. Doyle claims there can be no possible dispute as to their authenticity or any possibility of deception.

New Light From Spiritual Messages.

The writer of "The Vital Message" sees great hope from a general acceptance and belief in the spirit phenomena. He says: "With the actual certainty of a definite life after death and a sure sense of responsibility for our own spiritual development, a responsibility which cannot be put upon any other shoulders, however exalted, but must be borne by each individual for himself, there will come the greatest reinforcement of morality which the human race has ever known. We are on the verge of it now, but our descendants will look upon the past century as the culmination of the dark ages when man lost his trust in God, and was so engrossed in his temporary earth life that he lost all sense of spiritual reality."

What is the Power Ascribed to Spirits?

Everyone must be agreed that wonderful results are obtained both through people who profess to be mediums and also by others who have never practiced the art. We have all heard of wonderful messages and impressions, of dreams that have come true, of spirit manifestations and phenomena of other kinds so well attested that only the most incredulous would dare to disbelieve them. We also know that many very prominent men and women believe in spiritualism and are fully assured that it is not a phantasy but a reality.

The phenomena of spiritualism cannot well be doubted, but of the cause of the phenomena there is some doubt. That wonderful things are seen and heard, all who have investigated are agreed, but many investigators are not agreed that they are produced by spirits. We undoubtedly are in touch with some very wonderful power, so comprehensive yet elusive that it is difficult to understand. Men and women with special powers are continually making use of this power, just as we make use of wireless telegraphy. May not many of the results obtained come from mental telepathy, from the power of mind reading, of hypnosis, or the delving into the subconscious mind. Perhaps they come from a combination of these or from a new power not yet named.

FORWARD MOVEMENT TWO MILLION AHEAD

Presbyterians Raise \$4,520,000
and Methodists \$4,506,000.

TORONTO, March 17.—Nearly two million beyond the objective has now been achieved by the five co-operating churches in the financial drive of the national campaign. The latest returns place the Presbyterians at the top of the list with a total of \$4,520,000; while the Methodists follow closely with a total of \$4,506,000. Reports from the Maritime Synod of the Presbyterian Church showed a total of \$600,000 raised, being \$125,000 over their allocation. Toronto reports another increase, bringing their total up to \$770,608; Newfoundland reports a total of \$24,000.

The Methodists have yet to hear from some sections of the Prairie Provinces, which have not yet been able to make the canvass. Newfoundland will not start its campaign until April. Some sections of Ontario have been held up by the "flu." The officials are confident of achieving the five million mark by the time the campaign is complete.

Among the congregational reports received are the following: Bloor Street Church, Toronto, has reached \$96,600—the highest result among Presbyterian churches in Ontario. Parkdale Church has reached \$24,000, or \$9,000 beyond its allocation. Knox Church is now conducting its canvass and St. Andrew's King Street are yet to hear from.

MANY NEW ROADS IN MANITOBA FOR 1920

Tenders Will Be Called for Grading 800 Miles.

WINNIPEG, March 17.—Tenders for grading about 800 miles of road will be called for in Manitoba within the next two months, according to information supplied by an official of the provincial good roads department today. This work will be let in contracts running all the way from two to seventy-five miles.

This work will be done under the provisions of the Good Roads Act. During the last six years about 1,200 miles of road have been graded and about 400 miles gravelled under the act. Before the close of the coming season the total of roads graded under the act will have reached 2,000 miles, officials declare.

In addition to the roadwork, it is expected that over 100 concrete bridges will be constructed this season. This work will include a steel bridge 650 feet long over the Red River at Morris, to cost more than \$100,000; a concrete arch 100 feet clear span over the La Salle river; several bridges of concrete over the Assiniboine river, and a number of bridges of from 30 to 50 feet clear span. Up to date, 384 bridges have been built under the Good Roads Act, of which 274 were of concrete.

Big Advances in Sight.

It is expected that over 4,000 miles of grading will be done in Manitoba within the next four years, and a large percentage of this mileage is to be gravelled.

Under the Good Roads Act all work is to be let by contract.

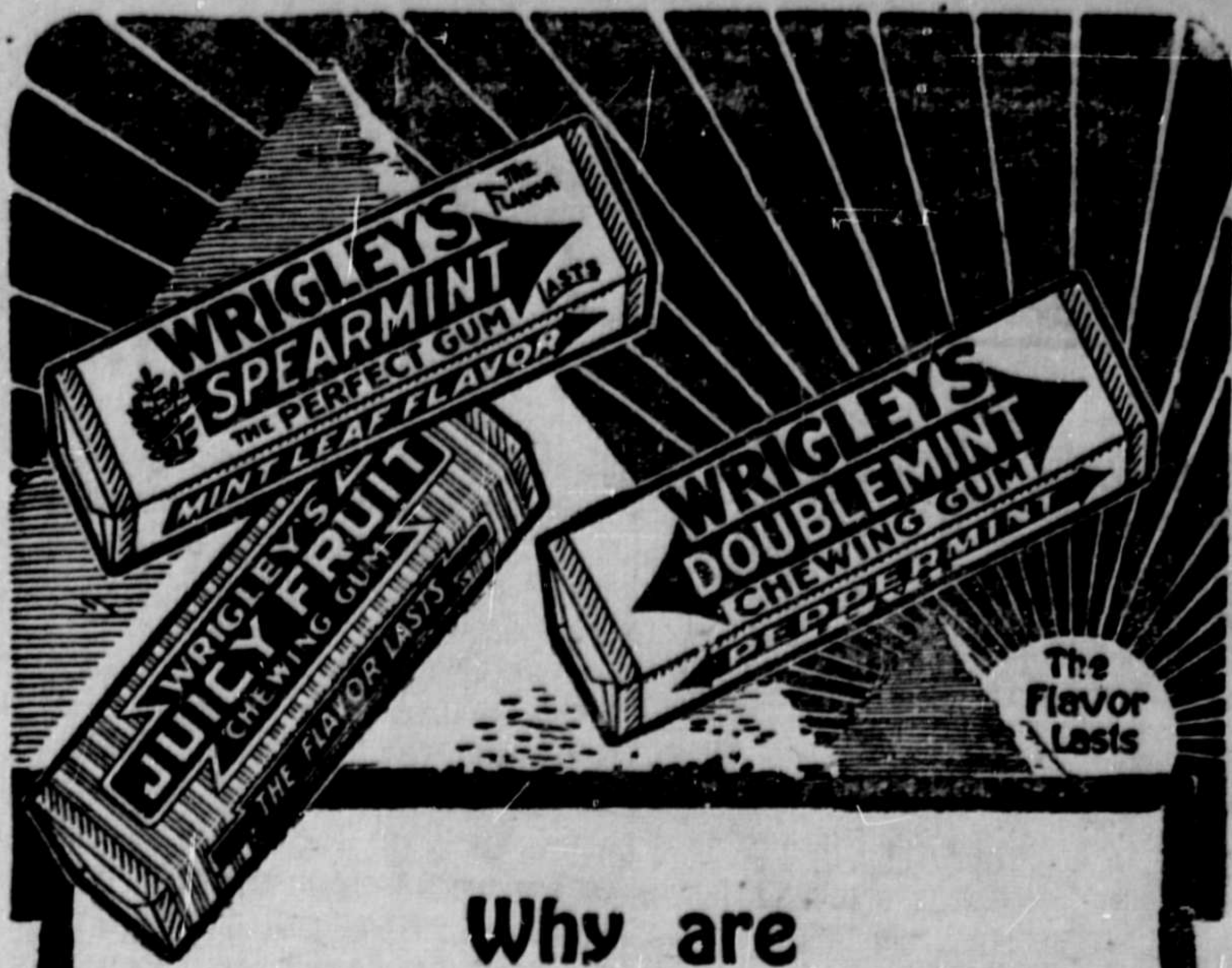
FRANCE AND VATICAN

Re-establishment of Relations
With Holy See Proposed in
Bill Before Chamber.

PARIS, March 17.—National interests of France justified her in working in closer accord with the Vatican, says the preamble of the bill providing for the re-establishment of relations with the Holy See, presented today in the Chamber of Deputies.

A number of instances where France needs a diplomatic representative at the Vatican are cited by the preamble. It says the new situation in Syria, Palestine, Constantinople and the Orient generally, where France has century-old traditional sympathies, there are French missionaries who "ought not to be sacrificed to foreign competitors," the application of the concordat to Alsace-Lorraine, the administration of missions in the former German colonies of Togoland and Kamerun and the exercise of the Catholic religion in Morocco are pointed out as problems in which co-operation between France and the Vatican is necessary.

FIFTEEN-ROUND GLOVE CONTEST HERE SHORTLY

Chet Neff and Jimmie Clarke, Both Champs, Will Meet for Championship of the Northwest.

Roi Barnes, local boxing promoter, announced yesterday afternoon that negotiations have been completed for the appearance here of Chet Neff, of Seattle, lightweight champion of the southwestern States, and Sgt. Jimmie Clarke of Vancouver, champion of the Canadian Expeditionary Forces. It will be a fifteen-round boxing contest to a decision for the championship of the Northwest. Ben Self has been negotiating with Clarke for some time and Roi Barnes has just completed the arrangements with Neff and the contest will take place in the Westholme Theatre on March 31.

Neff's Record.
Chet Neff is not a stranger here, having fought three times before in the city with Jack Willard, the first time, and subsequently twice with Roughhouse Burns, first fighting to a draw and the last time getting the decision. He is a clever little boxer not of the sudden death kind, but tends more to cool-headed and effective work. He has a long string of victories to his credit in 1919 most of which were won in Arizona and California where he has been boxing lately. In his year's record he has four knock-outs, fourteen wins, six draws and three defeats.

Clarke's Record.
Jimmie Clarke is also a hard customer, having fought his way to the championship of the Expeditionary Forces. He is fighting in Calgary on Friday with Cloney Tate for the Canadian lightweight championship. More particulars of his record will be here later.

The fighters should arrive here in about a week's time to finish training. Neff is leaving Seattle on Sunday night and will be here next Wednesday. Clarke will come by rail from Calgary as soon as he is through with Friday's fight. They will both bring their sparring partners and will go into hard training.

FERTILIZER AND OIL FROM MUDSHARKS

Company of Returned Men to Operate Backed by Federal Government.

Returned soldiers constitute the personnel of the Veteran Products Company, an industrial concern which is starting operations at Parker Island, just above Montague Harbor.

The enterprise, which will confine itself principally to the capture of mudshark and the reduction of the fish to oil and fertilizer, is capitalized at \$50,000, with plant valued at \$25,000, and judging by the names which appear in the directorate, the business promises to develop in the near future into one of the most important of the kind on the coast. The whole ground has been carefully reviewed, and all the difficulties likely to be encountered have been taken into consideration before the project was entered upon, so that every one connected with the undertaking is familiar with the character of the enterprise in all its details.

With the exception of the managing director the members of the company are all returned men. Captain Shadforth, the president, who is one of the well known coast pilots, served overseas with the mine sweepers; Mr. J. Mitchell vice-president, went from here with the Pioneer Battalion, subsequently joining the Forestry Battalion overseas; Mr. W. J. Scott, the building superintendent, left Victoria with the 67th Battalion, and Mr. A. H. Gunn, secretary-treasurer, left with the 2nd Division A. S. C., transferring afterwards to the Canadian Forestry Corps. Capt. N. T. MacDonald, the managing director, is well known up and down the B. C. coast as a seafaring man, having been skipper of sealers and other craft in this part of the world for the past twenty-five years, and before that being associated with similar enterprises in Nova Scotia.

Two Boats Purchased.

"We are starting at once with the oil refinery. The fertilizer will come after. We expect to be turning out oil within a month or six weeks. We are sending a crew of men up the first of next week to erect the docks, fertilizer plant, oil refining plant, etc., and everything should be under way within a very short time," reported Mr. Gunn, the secretary of the company, yesterday when approached on the matter.

The Dominion Government is backing the project, evidently glad to support an industry which is making capital in such a way from the mudshark, which preys on fish to an extent which is very destructive of this great asset of the coast waters.

When the plant is in full operation there will be about twenty men connected with the concern, all of them returned veterans of the Great War.

The social evening given by the Adair Carrs Chapter, I. O. O. E., in the Burgitt Hall last night was in every way a success. Nearly seventy-five persons were present and the collection amounted to \$25. Cards and dancing passed the evening away only too quickly.

TO BRING BACK
B.C. FEDERATION****Movement of Those Holding International Cards to Reorganize in This Province.**

Trades unionists who are loyal to the international organization and who have little or no sympathy with the radical One Big Union movement will probably act within a few days towards bringing the B. C. Federation of Labor back to life as an auxiliary of the Trades and Labor Congress, says the Victoria Colonist.

If they feel that the Federation is not the most efficient form of organization and not worth resurrection, they will probably turn to the other alternative and form a Provincial executive representative of the international unions in British Columbia. This executive would assume many of the duties and responsibilities formerly borne by the Federation prior to its control by the O. B. U. element and the return of its charter to the Trades and Labor Congress. In most of the provinces of Canada the executive form of organization has been adopted. The B. C. Federation was formed to secure a greater degree of self-autonomy. Now it has been "ditched" in favor of the O. B. U. by the extremist ring at present dominant.

The convention of the B. C. Federation of Labor here this week may have created a wrong impression in the minds of some people as to the tendencies or organized labor in the province. The delegates, or the great majority of them, belonged to the more extreme group of O. B. U. supporters. Conservative labor was hardly represented at all, because many of the locals refused to send delegates to the convention on the ground that the Federation, by returning its charter to the Trades and Labor Congress, was now functioning as an out-law organization.

Ignored Convention.
The gradual assumption of control and manipulation of the B. C. Federation by the radical forces which, at the Calgary convention last year, adopted resolutions commending sovietism and which, at the convention here reaffirmed this attitude, had the effect of creating widespread disaffection in labor circles. Many of the international locals, refusing to accept the O. B. U. standard and declining to have anything to do with the delegates who did support this theory, decided to ignore the convention. The result was that the action taken and the speeches delivered during the convention could not fairly be taken as an indication of B. C. labor's attitude on the issues of the day.

The O. B. U. claims 1,000 members in Victoria, and many of these men also hold international cards, playing safe for the time being by straddling the fence. On the other hand, it is estimated that there are 5,000 international trades unionists in the city, some of whom are temporarily absent owing to the cessation of ship-building operations and allied in-

dustries. The opposition to the O. B. U. in the ranks of Victoria's organized labor, according to those in a good position to judge, is overwhelming. Some regard the O. B. U. as premature and Utopian, although all right in theory; others claim it has no good points at all and should be flatly turned down as being simply an outgrowth of red radicalism. If it came to a showdown, it is estimated that union labor here would favor the international as against the One Big Union by a four-to-one vote.

Want Charter Back.

So far as can be ascertained, the most likely development is the calling of a meeting of loyal international unionists with a view to perpetuating direct association with the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada and the American Federation of Labor. The return of the charter surrendered by the O. B. U. dominated Federation will be asked, and the situation will be much the same as ever before, with the exception that the O. B. U., instead of disguising under a false name, will be openly operating in the province, supported by a weekly newspaper with a circulation claimed to be 20,000.

At the Victoria convention the fate of the B. C. Federationist was determined. In future it will be guided by the policy laid down by the directors of the new company, composed of representatives of the various organizations affiliated with the O. B. U. It will be controlled by the O. B. U., and judging from speeches made at the convention, will cease to uphold the international organization, as in the past.

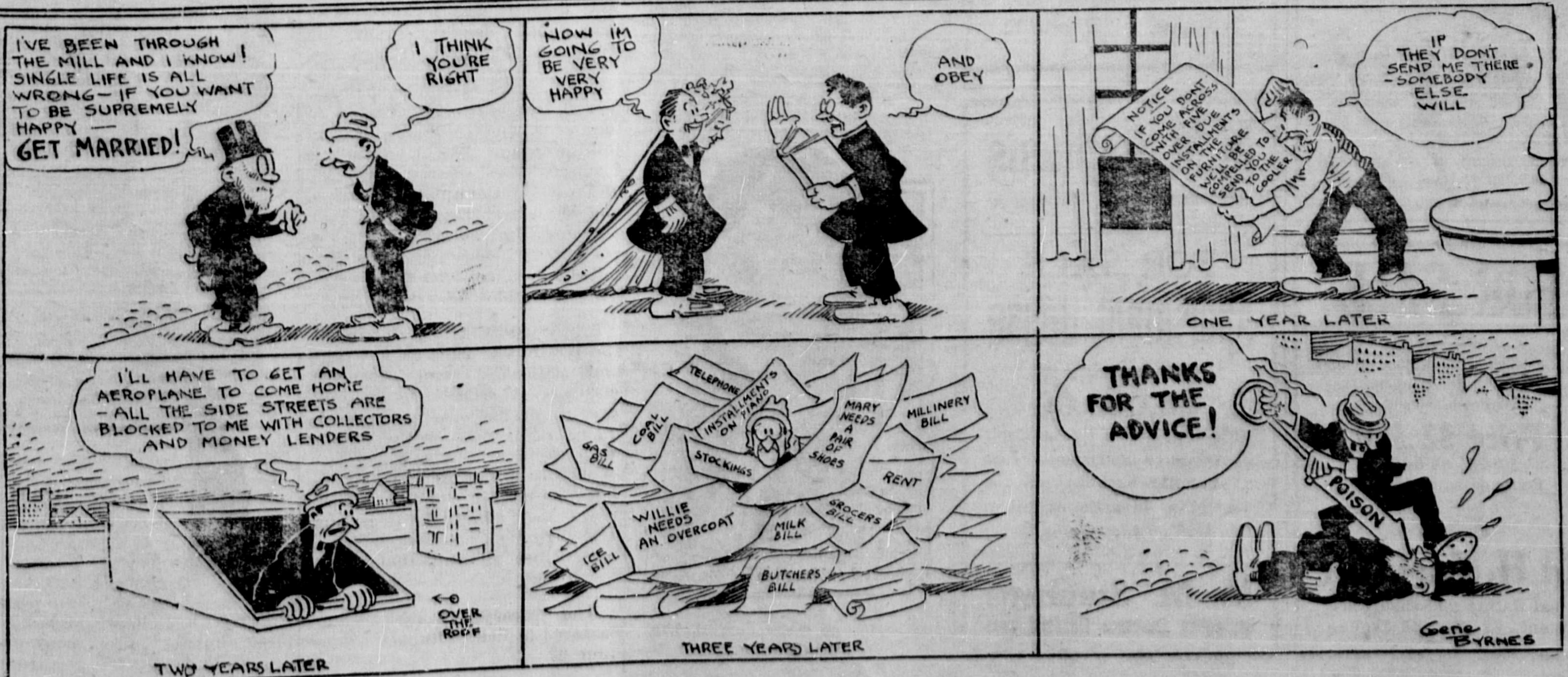

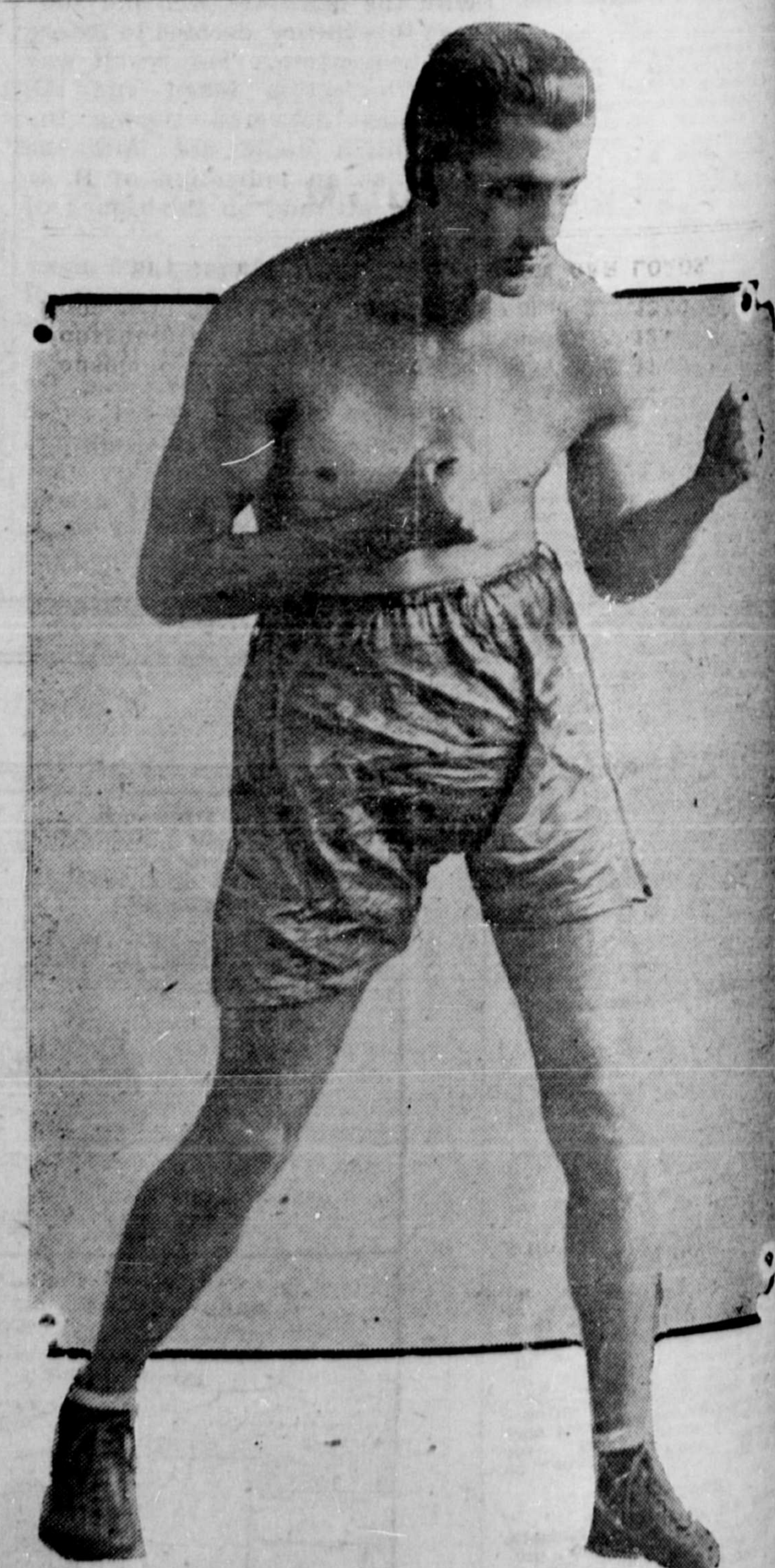
