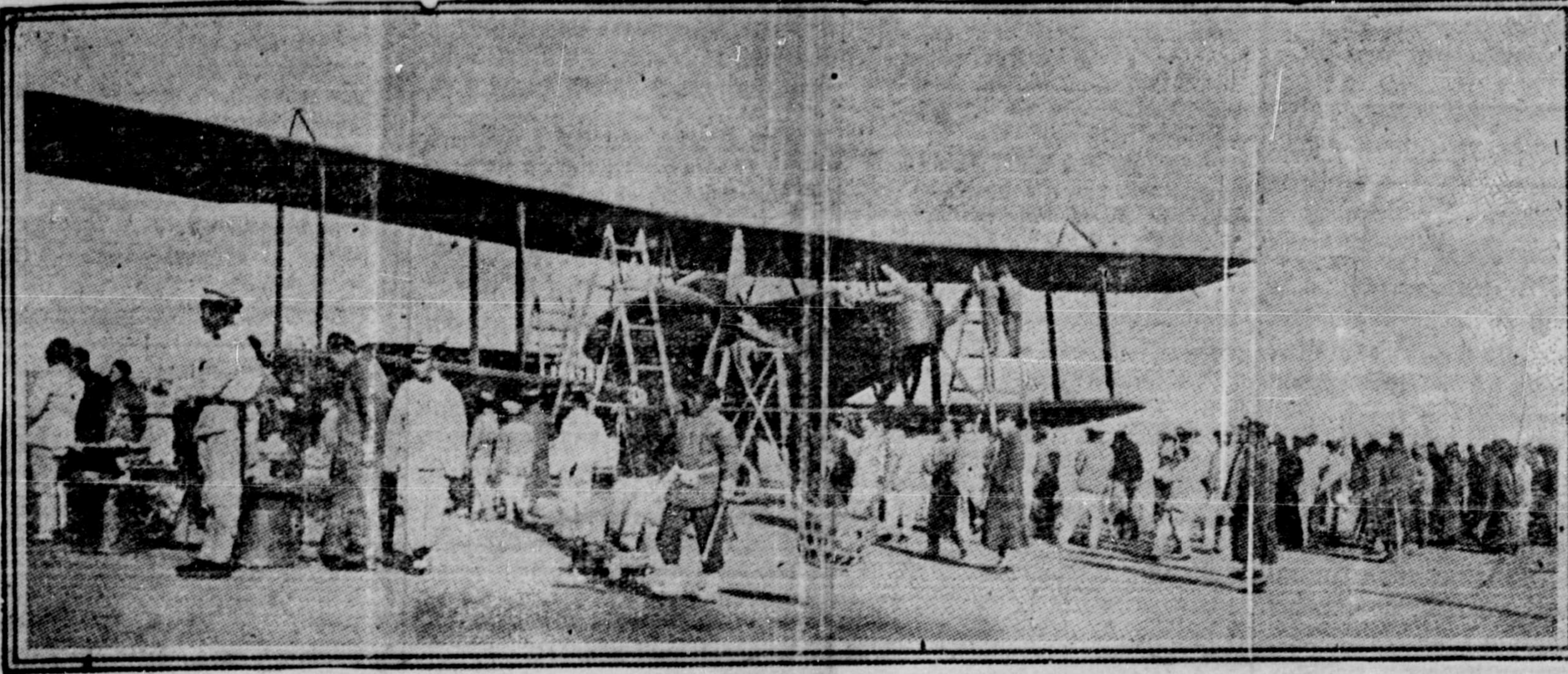

## WITNESS SAID TO BE STUPID

Patmore Argues that Keir is not Bright and did not Intend to Mislead

William Keir, charged with perjury in connection with a recent disorderly house case in the police court, was up for preliminary hearing this morning. It is alleged that his evidence in the first case was not according to fact and he freely admitted that he had made a statement in the trial that was not true. The defence put in by L. W. Patmore, defending, was that the accused was stupid and that he did not understand the questions asked by Prosecutor Williams.

### False Evidence.

Stipendiary Magistrate McMullin conducted the trial and Magistrate McMordie was called to the box as a witness. He told as to the demeanor and evidence of the accused at the first trial. Chief of Police Vickers gave evidence, telling of a phone call he had had from the accused at the residence of Louise Adams in the evening as contradicting his evidence at the first trial when he said he had not been there after the Sunday morning in question. Louise Adams testified as to the accused being at her house on the Sunday evening.

The accused took the box and he admitted that he had been at Louise Adams' house on the Sunday evening. He had been mixed up at the first trial and misunderstood Mr. Williams' question. He stated that he had not discussed the evidence with anybody since the trial, later amending this and saying that he had talked it over with Mr. Patmore. He said that he was not very bright sometimes, and that he had had a poor education in Scotland. He had been second engineer on the Point Ellice and that he was latterly blacksmith's helper at the Cold Storage.

### Stupid or Not?

Mr. Patmore advanced the argument that the man was simply a first class stupid witness. He had not intended to deceive. No one could suggest that his stupidity was designed. The charge of perjury must show intent to mislead and it would be foolishness to commit the man on such evidence.

Mr. Williams contended that the man was not as big a fool as he would have the court believe. Of course this was his only defence. To be second engineer on a boat like the Point Ellice he cannot be altogether a fool. If he was a fool he should be in the asylum. There should be a check on this misleading evidence.

Adjournment was made until 10 o'clock tomorrow morning when Magistrate McMullin will give his decision.

## SHAMROCK CLUB CONCERT GREAT

Vocal, Terpsichorean and Dramatic Talent Displayed Was Surprising and Skilled.

The first annual grand dramatic and musical entertainment under the auspices of the Shamrock Dramatic Club given last night in the Westholme Theatre drew a crowd that filled the house to the doors and provided an excellent evening's pleasure for every one present. One pleasing feature of the concert was that the most of the performers were new to the audience and many of them proved pleasant surprises in the talent displayed. The success achieved was proof of a lot of painstaking training and practice and those instrumental in staging the affair are to be congratulated on the result attained. From the beginning chorus to the final drop of the curtain everything went without a hitch.

The program was in honor of St. Patrick and the patron saint of the Emerald Isle was honored indeed.

The opening number was a selection of Irish airs by the Westholme Theatre Orchestra and it was executed to perfection by them. Characteristic of Irish melody the tunes ran from those of the sentimental and rhythmic ballads to the vivacious airs of the country dances and each was given its proper interpretation by the orchestra. The entire act music was also enjoyable features of the affair. Among the airs appropriately played were "Wearing of the Green," "Echoes from the Green Isle," "Come Back to Erin," "Erin's Isle," "Humors of Donnybrook," and others.

Other soloists in this part were Harry Astoria, Gillis Couture, H. Fletcher and Misses Blanche Curtin and Patricia Meagher. The two former sang verses of the opening song "God Save All Here." Harry Fletcher, pleasing as ever, sang "An Irish Love Song," and "Mother Machree." The latter brought much applause and he was forced back in an encore. The Shamrock Glee Club Quartette, consisting of Harry Fletcher, Harry Astoria, G. Couture and J. S. Roberts, sang "Dear Little Shamrock" with a beautiful blending of the voices.

### Lady Soloists.

Emmett Adams' solo, "The Bells of St. Mary's" sang by Miss

Patricia Meagher in her delicate clear soprano, was one of the most delightful parts of the program. She was applauded loudly and was presented with a bouquet. The assistance of the members in the melodious chorus put much spirit into the song and its melody left its impression on the audience. Miss Blanche Curtin singing "The Kerry Dances" displayed a good deal of skill and was well received, also being presented with bouquets. W. J. Pitman played the accompaniments in his well known and popular style.

### Second Section.

The second section of the program was opened by J. S. Roberts with two solos, "Macushla," and "Father O'Flynn," with Mr. Pitman accompanying on the stage. Will Edmunds gave a cello solo, "My Wild Irish Rose," and in response to vociferous applause played "Believe Me if All Those Endearing Young Charms."

Eight of the younger girls of the Annunciation School appeared in Irish and Welsh dances. These were among the most enjoyable numbers on the program. They were very pretty and were executed with harmony and unison that told of careful and painstaking training. The little girls taking part were Misses Martin, Riel, Bowness, Burritt, Reilly, McLaren, Bostrum and Palmer. The costuming of the girls was a feature that was remarked on in favorable terms.

### The Farce.

The farce comedy "That Rascal Pat," proved most enjoyable. J. Fred Ritchie, Jr., taking the part of Chas. Livingstone, a proud but penniless young Englishman, showed a good deal of talent and stage presence. Pat McNogerty, a typical Irish valet, was played by F. W. ## HOUSE SHORTAGE IN VANCOUVER

Almost Impossible to Rent Either Residence or Flat in The City.

VANCOUVER, March 18.—It is almost impossible to rent either a house or a flat in Vancouver today. The demand is steady and not only rents but the price of houses has gone up.

Two years ago there was no sale for houses in South Vancouver or any of the suburbs a short distance from town. Today residences are changing hands every day and the prices are stiffening. Terms are not as easy as they were and the sums asked are much greater than they have been since the land boom before the war.

## MANY BOOKINGS FOR TOURISTS TO NORTH

Attempt Made to Corral All Accommodation to Alaska by American Ships.

SEATTLE, March 18.—There is every reason to believe that this will be a record year both for tourist and general passenger travel to Alaska and northern British Columbia. One booking agency offered to take the whole accommodation on one line of steamships, but this was refused as it was thought more important to cater to the local needs first. Germany Seems Becoming Settled.

Judging from latest press reports the German revolution is proving a fizzle and the old Government will continue to conduct the affairs of that country. It seems like a final squirm of the old military party, an effort to force the hands of the Government in order to bring the military idea once more to the front.

The difficulty there as in this and other countries is that a group of people get together, talk a good deal, and eventually fancy that they are the country. When they find that the people as a whole are not with them, they find themselves in a difficult position. It is so easy to become imbued with the ideas of the small circle of people in which we move. That is what keeps up the enthusiasm for a losing cause at election time. The committee room is the centre from which the enthusiasm radiates. Sometimes a club is the centre.

There is in Germany a military set that associates almost exclusively with military people. They talk among themselves and enthuse each other until it seems to them that the whole country is beset with militarism. They are mistaken and they have now discovered their mistake. They have struck earth.

German Government Is Democratic.

The present Government of Germany was endorsed by the people of Germany only a little more than a year ago, in January, 1919, to be exact. The election at that time was under the proportional representation plan and the party allegiance of those returned was Majority Socialists, 163; Catholic Party, 88; Democrats, 75; Conservatives, 42; Independent Socialists, 22; People's Party, 21; Bavarian Peasant's League, 4; minor parties 6, making a total representation in the Reichstag of 421. For this parliament all German people, men and women over 20 years of age, voted. It sits for three years and the president is elected for seven years.

Socialists Like Other People.

It will be noticed that the Government of Germany is practically a Socialist Government. In spite of that we find the affairs being conducted much as they are under any other group of legislators. They have abolished all class privileges or disadvantages of birth, class or creed and guarantee freedom of speech and press and the right of meeting. In fact they have provided the same rights and privileges that are found in the constitution of Canada.

As we have said before freedom is more a matter of education and training than of constitution, but a good constitution for a country is an aid in working out a condition of freedom. That the people of Germany are not yet free is shown by the fact that hundreds of innocent people have been killed in this rebellion and that an attempt has been made to reintroduce the military system. As long as such a condition is possible the country has not arrived at the democratic stage.

Lessons for Canada Are to be Learned.

Canada can well learn a lesson from Germany. There are in Canada forces that would introduce a system of militarism here. There are also times when sections of the people become excited and impatient at what they consider their wrongs and at such times they do things which are not conducive to the best democratic government. There has to be both patience and forbearance exercised in a democracy.
