ONLY HUNDRED PRESCRIPTIONS IN ONE MONTH

That is Restriction on Doctors Under the New Prohibition Bill.

The following are the principal provisions of the new Prohibition Bill introduced into the legislature by J. W. deB. Farris, attorney-general:

Physicians restricted to eight ounces in issuing prescriptions, except for out-of-town patients or in cases of particular necessity when statutory declaration must be made.

Physicians must issue not more than one prescription to any one person in any one day and will not be allowed more than 100 prescription blanks per month.

All prescriptions must be filled within forty-eight hours of date of issue.

Flavoring extracts containing alcohol must be sold in bottles containing not more than four ounces.

Details of alcoholic contents must be placed upon all bottles of "near beer."

Authority given municipalities and cities to regulate places where soft drinks and "near beer" are sold.

Dentists may obtain one reputed quart of liquor daily for use in their practice, instead of one imperial pint as formerly.

Booth Fisheries Buy up a Carload to Ship at Once.

MONEY IN ITALY IS WORTH LITTLE

Coal \$40 a Ton and No Sugar to Be Bought.

"Plenty of money but it's worth nothing when you've got it," says A. Gamba who has just returned to his home at Courtenay after a five months' visit to see his parents near Turin, Italy.

He had not had any sugar at all in Italy for two months before he left. It was 9 lire for two pounds when you could get it—and that was very seldom. In normal times a lire was worth 20 cents; today in Italy the Canadian dollar was worth 18.90 lire and the people were glad to get the Canadian money at that price. Coal was almost as precious as diamonds, 750 lire for a ton or translating the lire at its present value in Canadian money pretty nearly forty dollars a ton. Bread was very dear and very hard to get.

Dolly Varden Road Clear by May First

Taylor, Head of Mining Co., Looks for Larger Production than Ever This Season at Alice Arm.

J. T. Taylor, head of the Taylor Mining Co., and his party left the Prince Rupert to Vancouver last night after a successful trip of inspection to the Alice Arm district and Dolly Varden and Wolf Mines. Mr. Taylor, interviewed by a representative on the steamer, stated that the work of clearing up would commence very soon. He does not expect to see such tremendous developments generally as some sources lead the public to believe, but the coming season will see steady work which will prove the country and put properties on an operating basis. The Taylor Company

will take advantage of the influx of money to the district to put their own properties and an relieving the labor situa-

Officials on Trip. Accompanying Mr. Taylor on his trip was E. H. Nutter, of the Mineral Separation Co., New York; Mr. Mayers, his chief assistant; Col. Karij Davis, of South Africa who made the trip looking into possibilities of the district, and C. M. Rolston, a director of the Taylor Mining Co. and manager of the Imperial Oil Co. of Vancouver.

The Wolf Mine. The Taylor Mining Co. are looking into the possibility of extending the railroad to the Wolf Mine. Already the camp building has started. We are going to put in two engine compressors. One is already there and the other is being put in. About June 1 we will have 25 men engaged in development at the Wolf.

1,000 Tons Ready. There is now 1,000 tons of ore at the upper terminal for shipment as soon as the railway is ready. We expect to ship 200 tons daily as soon as the season opens. Keeping this up the entire camp will be ready to start. Fifty men are now employed on Taylor work at Alice Arm. By June 1 we will have working besides those already engaged at the extension of the railroad to the Wolf Mine. Hammell, principal owner, says that it will prove one of the richest gold mines in the world.

GASOLINE PRICES ARE NOW GOING UP

"Gasoline Cocktail" is a Mixture of Gasoline and Kerosene Which Takes Place of Distillate.

VANCOUVER, March 19.—So far as the Imperial Oil Company's officials are aware there is no increase in the price of gasoline, though an increase was put into effect at Seattle on Wednesday. The price here still remains 40c at pumping stations or 38c in bulk. The gasoline cocktail that the local plant is concocting from gasoline and kerosene for consumption by distillate engines, sells at 28c.

Local Prices.

Gasoline (s) selling locally at 60c per gallon by the case and 41 1/2c in bulk. The "gasoline cocktail" is not yet sold here although it is reported many of the gasoline fishing boats use the mixture, making it up themselves. Authorities say that it is almost identical with the distillate.

SILVER CREEK UNDER RACEY

Stewart Company are Starting Active Developments at Once—Supplies Are in.

The Silver Creek Mines, Ltd., of Stewart, announced the appointment of P. W. Racey, M. E., as engineer in charge of the development operations at the Silver Creek properties in the Salmon River section.

It is the intention of the company to vigorously press development with an initial crew of ten men, gradually increasing until a full force is employed.

Orders for the requisite equipment and supplies have already been placed to insure the commencement of the work despite weather conditions make it feasible.

BOWSER'S LETTER TO LATE SIR RICHARD

Attorney-General Scores Leader of Opposition for Unjust Insinuations.

The attorney-general was concluding his speech in the Legislature in a heated manner and was roundly denouncing the opposition leader for what, he alleged, were the unjustified insinuations of the possibilities of irregularities under the new bill. He referred to the overcast "soldier's" vote, intimating there had been a plan to steal it, and, he declared, when the opposition leader spoke of the possibilities of irregularities under the new system of absentee voting through the sealed envelopes containing such ballots being tampered with, he must have in mind previous irregularities by the late government.

"I have here before me a copy of a cable sent by my friend to the late Sir Richard McBride, agent-general at London," Hon. Mr. Farris said, and he continued to quote:

"The soldiers' vote may give us 12 to 15 seats. I want 180." There was hearty government applause.

"I will read on," he continued. "Slump is general everywhere, prohibition carried by over 7,000."

"Talk needed 7,000 and my friend opposite says he wanted 180. It is any wonder he could speak as he did election crookedness? Is it any wonder he spoke of the possibility of a close election and of its being possible to tamper with these sealed envelopes coming down from the upper country. The tragedy of my friend's position is that there is nothing he can talk about but we can show how he has been guilty of those very things he expects this government to do," said Mr. Farris, concluding his speech.

Prince Rupert is an ideal place for an apartment house. For those who have no children or for those whose children are very young the apartment seems to be far preferable to the detached house or cottage.

The whole question resolves itself into one of finance. Money is needed to put up a building of that kind, and the rate of interest on the investment is an important consideration.

Building Proceeds, But not Fast Enough.

There is considerable building going on in the city. New houses are going up, not only in Section 2 but in other parts of the city and plans are under way for a good many others.

One of the difficulties in the way of a building campaign is that building societies do not make loans in this city. A local concern was formed a year ago to help get over this difficulty.

Suggestion From An Outsider.

A visitor to the city who has walked around a good deal and seen perhaps more than local residents, says he sees a number of buildings not in use, mostly stores.

Coming Boom at Mining Towns.

Everything points to a big boom in mining this year. Stewart is naturally the big centre, for not only is the rush on to the Salmon River but the Bear River section is also once more attracting many mining men.

Some Prince Rupert people have been looking into the possibilities of opening branches at Stewart. This may or may not be a good thing but usually it is good policy to confine business operations to one city.

At Alice Arm there are prospects of a good year. A newspaper is to be started there soon and it seems as if there would be a good camp at that place.

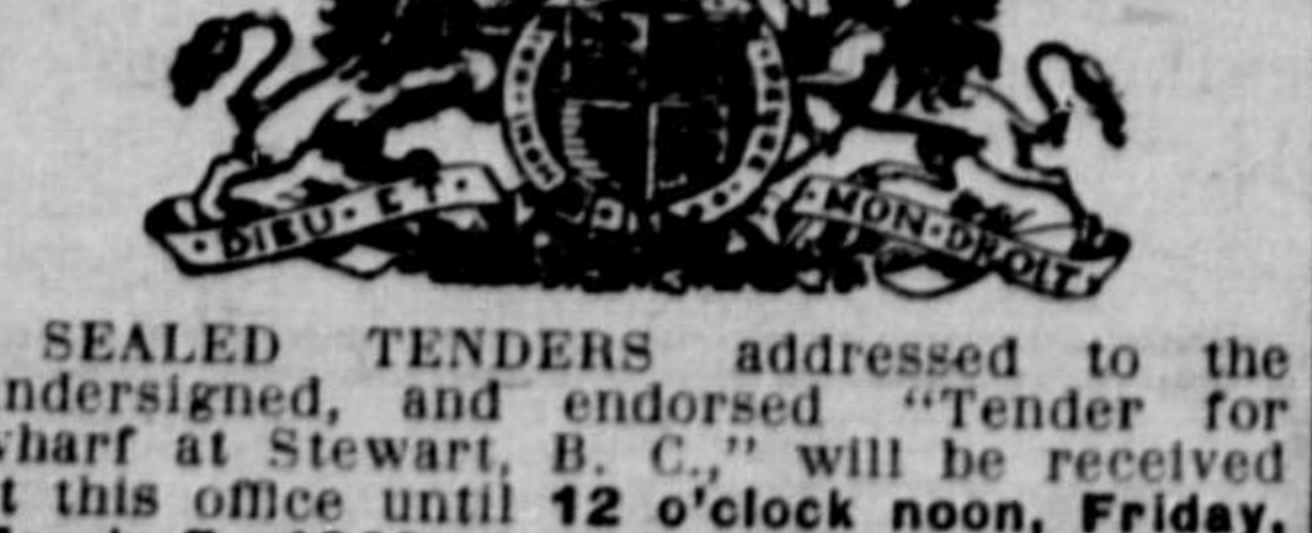

All persons residing in Canada, employed in Canada, or carrying on business in Canada, are liable to a tax on income, as follows:

Every unmarried person, or widow, or widower, without dependents as defined by the Act, who during calendar year, 1919, received or earned \$1,000 or more.	All other individuals, who during calendar year received or earned \$2,000 or more.	Every corporation and joint stock company, whose profits exceeded \$2,000 during the fiscal year ended in 1919.
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CLASS 1

Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 31st of March, 1920.

Trustees, executors, administrators, agents and assignees must use Form T 3.

Employers making a return of the names and amounts paid to all directors, officials, agents or other employees must use Form T 4.

Corporations and Joint Stock companies making a return of all dividends and bonuses paid to shareholders and members during 1919, must use Form T 5.

NOTE.—Individuals comprising partnership must file returns in their individual capacity on Form T 1 or T 1 A.

PENALTY

Every person who is required to make this return, who fails to do so within the time limited, shall be subject to a penalty of \$10.00 for each day during which the default continues—and all such penalties shall be assessed and collected from the person liable to make the return in the same manner in which taxes are assessed and collected.

CLASS 2

Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 30th of April, 1920:

All individuals other than farmers and ranchers must use Form T 1.

Farmers and ranchers must use Form T 1 A.

Corporations and Joint Stock companies must use Form T 2.

PENALTY

Every person required to make a return, who fails to do so within the time limited, shall be subject to a penalty of twenty-five per centum of the amount of the tax payable.

BAN IS RAISED ON AUCTION OF SOULS

Judge Patterson of Philadelphia Raises Ban on Famous Film Showing Armenians.

Declaring that the motion picture, "Ravished Armenia," better known under the title of "Auction of Souls," is a film of an educational character, Judge Patterson of Common Pleas Court of Philadelphia, has handed down a decision overruling the action of the Pennsylvania State Board of Censors, who condemned the picture and forbade its showing in the State of Pennsylvania.

After reviewing the picture himself, Judge Patterson said: "The court finds it a fact and a question of law that there is nothing in the scenes which make them sacrilegious, obscene, indecent or immoral, or of such nature as to tend to debase or corrupt morals. Viewing the picture as a whole, the court finds as a fact that it is educational in character. It is not only a vivid portrayal of the story entitled 'Ravished Armenia,' but it is also a picture of conditions as they existed in Armenia a few months ago."

Judge Patterson added a brief to his decision, which in part is as follows: "This picture is capable of implanting in the many millions of thinking and unthinking Americans the conviction which may reasonably determine the public conduct of the American people in the near future that the Armenian people deserve to be rescued, comforted and made free and secure for the future by the use of the full power of the democratic western people."

The "Auction of Souls" will be shown tonight at the Westholme Theatre.

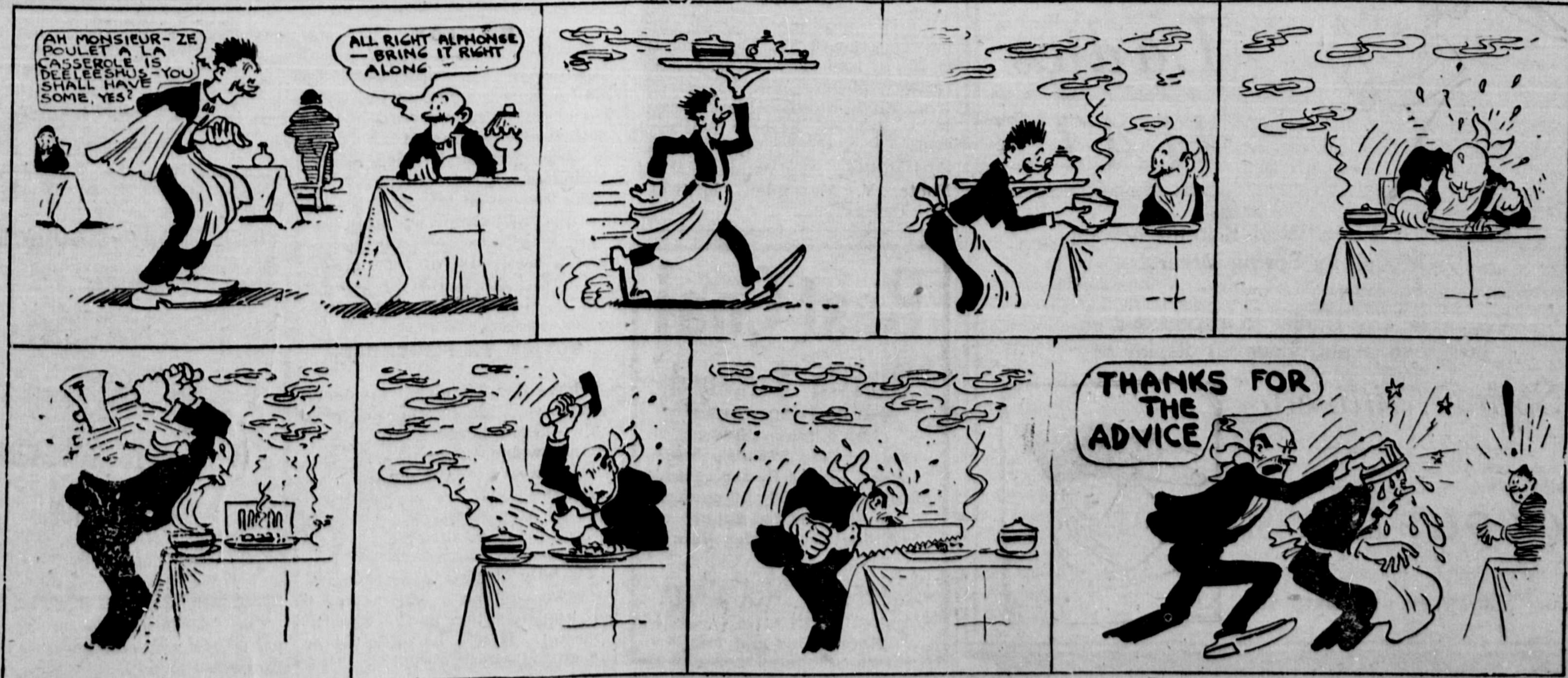

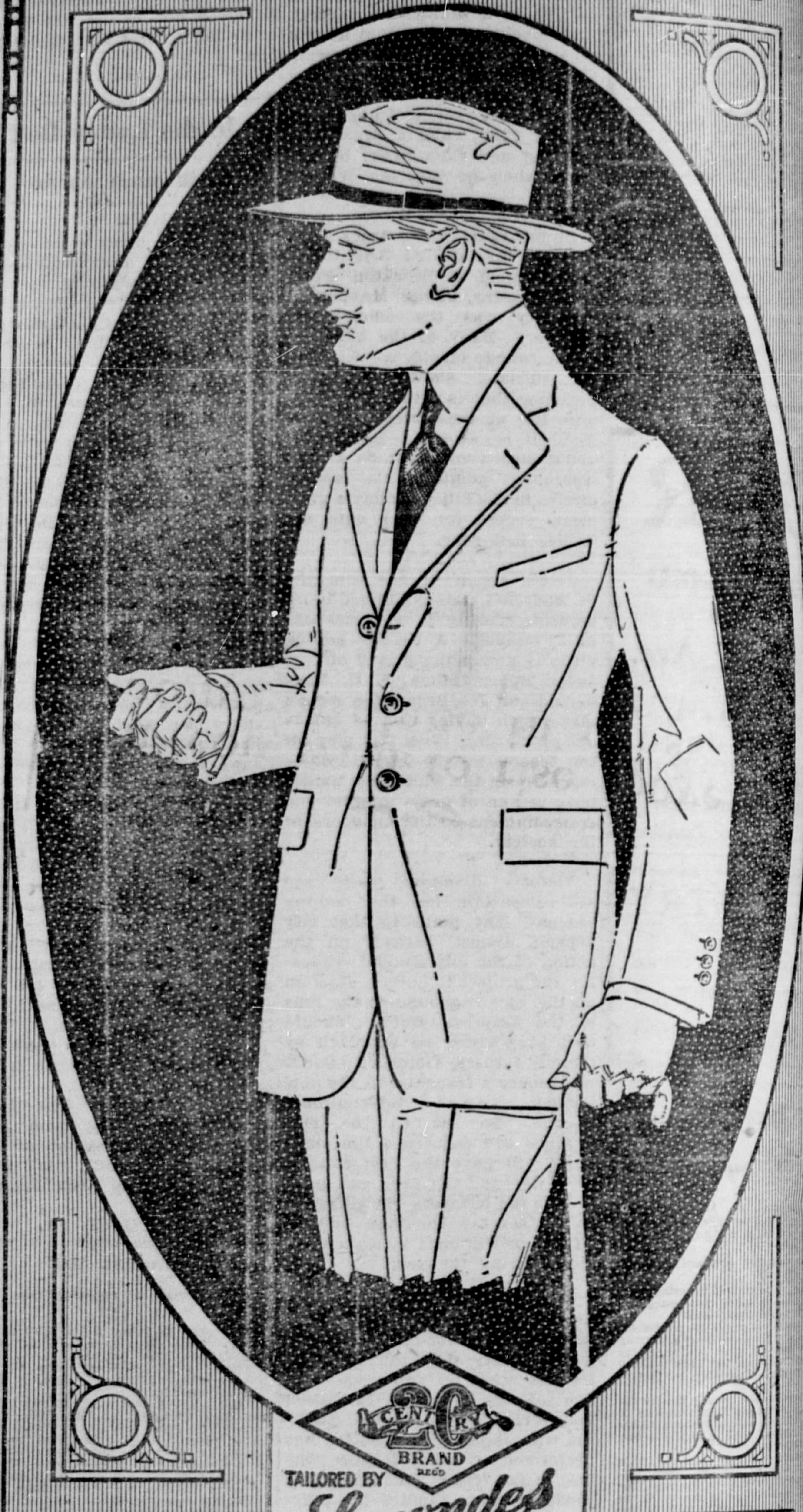
