Two Dead and Four Wounded In Riots

Cash Between Disorderly Soldiers and Civilians in Streets of Dublin Caused Disturbance with Fatalities.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
DUBLIN, March 23.—There was a riot here tonight in which men were shot dead and four seriously wounded. The riot precipitated by the disorderly conduct of soldiers, about 300 whom paraded the street at 9 o'clock last night singing, jostling, hammering on doors and smashing windows.
LONDON, March 23.—Reports from Dublin dealing with the riot differ. One says the soldiers were leaving a theatre singing "God Save the King" when they were attacked by a mob. A soldier fired his revolver in self defense whereupon another became general and a man and a woman were killed. Another version is that the fatalities were due to volleys fired from the barracks to protect unarmed soldiers.

Admiral Benson was Man Who Warned Sims Against British During The War

WASHINGTON, March 23.—Rear Admiral Sims told the Senate investigating committee yesterday that Read Admiral Benson, chief of naval operations during the war and now chairman of the United States Shipping Board, was the officer who told him "not to let the British pull the wool over your eyes, we would as soon fight them as the Germans."
Explaining his interpretation of what Admiral Benson said, the witness said he had not given the statement a second's consideration then, because he had assumed it resulted from what he described as an intensely anti-British feeling, entertained by Admiral Benson.
Sims added that Admiral Benson was an "upright and honest man."

CITY COUNCIL LIKES MAGAZINE "RESOURCES"

Mayor and Aldermen Feel That It is Doing Invaluable Publicity Work for the City.

On the recommendation of the finance committee the City Council last night decided to take a half page advertisement in the monthly "Resources" at a rate of \$20 per month. Alderman Casey was in favor of making it a full page advertisement at \$30 and the power to do this was left with the finance committee.
The consensus of opinion of the council seemed to be that "Resources" was doing an admirable work of publicity for the city. It was a publication that was a decided credit to the city and should be supported. Many of the aldermen made appreciative and complimentary remarks on the high class publicity that Weston Coyney was giving Prince Rupert and the district in his excellent publication.

DORREEN HITS ROCK IN SKIDEGATE STRAIT

Was Towed to Skidegate by the Nidaros Where Temporary Repairs are Being Made

Word has just reached town of the wreck of the gasoline fishing boat, P. Dorreen, in Skidegate Narrows. The boat just left Prince Rupert a few days ago and was making her way through the narrows when the engine stopped and the vessel drifted on the rocks. She was towed by the Nidaros into Skidegate where examination was made and it was found to have smashed several planks. It is expected that temporary repairs can be made at Skidegate so that she come across the straits under her own power where complete repairs will be made. There were four men aboard under Captain Henry Doiron.

NOTIFY POWERS OF ACTION OF SENATE

That Will Probably be First Step to be Taken By President Wilson.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
WASHINGTON, March 23.—In the absence of any authoritative prediction of what President Wilson would do with the unratified treaty, the impression gained in diplomatic circles today was that the first step probably would be a notification to the other powers that the Senate had refused ratification.

The two borrowing-by-laws for \$50,000 and \$10,000, the light and pole line extension \$45,000 bylaw and the telephone extension \$60,000 bylaw were passed by the City Council again last night. They had been passed previously but were returned by the bank solicitors for minor changes. A standard by-law form is to be compiled for the use of the municipalities which will avoid this returning of bylaws for correction.

GERMAN SITUATION STILL IS EXTREMELY SERIOUS

Company of Volunteers Overpowered by Spartacans; Officers Killed and Bodies Mutilated, According to Report From Berlin.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
BERLIN, March 23.—Conditions in Germany were described by the minister of defense this morning as extremely serious. "You can't paint the situation throughout Germany too black," an official at the ministry declared to the correspondent after a survey of the reports that had come in during the night. The situation in Berlin itself was characterized as bad. In one case a company of volunteers had been overpowered by Spartacan forces, its officers killed and their bodies mutilated.
The southern and eastern parts of Germany are reported quiet. To the north of the Spree River in the Berlin district the outposts of the regular soldiers have been withdrawn, leaving detachments to guard the stockyards and railway station.

HUSBAND AND WIFE QUARREL

Man Charged With Ill-using Woman—Adjourned to Allow Opportunity of Settlement.

Henry John Clarke appeared in the police court this morning charged with assault on his wife by spanking her. The accused elected for summary trial and pleaded not guilty.
Mrs. Jane Clarke, the wife, appeared in the witness box and told of being married four years, having one child 17 months old. She had been in Prince Rupert ever since last July and had been living with her husband. He was in the habit of going into violent tempers, grabbing her by the throat and threatening her life. In September he had made her black and blue by punching her arms. He had only worked three months since July and she had been dependent on the charity of the Great War Veterans' Association and Ladies' Auxiliary. She had heard that he was addicted to the use of drugs although she had not seen him use it. On Wednesday he had grabbed her by the throat and hurt her.

Continually Nagging.

The husband, taking the box, said he had been in the hospital for three months. On the morning when she claimed he made her black and blue, she had nagged him to work and had finally hit him with a broom. At this time he was under the doctor's care as a result of an operation on an old wound. That was the only time he had ever lifted his hand to her. She was continually nagging at him and he had warned her that he might lose his temper and do violence.
W. E. Williams argued that there was no doubt but that the man had assaulted her. His demeanor in the box would show that he was of an unreasonable disposition. There was considerable justification for the woman to want him to go to work. It was hardly believable that a man would choke a woman in her condition. Why should she get up to cook his breakfast? Whatever decision the magistrate made the woman would have to have protection from the man.

Remanded Two Days.

The magistrate said that he believed Mrs. Clarke's story. It was, however, a serious matter to break the relations between man and wife. The present state could not continue in this country. The case was remanded for two days in the hope that an understanding may be reached between the man and his wife.

Finance Committee Recommends His Appointment and Report Adopted by Council.

Mr. Hooper, it is expected, will be here to take up his new duties within ten days or as soon as he can get away from Vancouver.
Alderman Casey asked if the position had been advertised. The mayor replied that as local lawyers did not seem to want the post advertising had been deemed unnecessary by a majority of the aldermen.

VALUABLE FURS SOLD AT EDMONTON FOR HUNDRED THOUSAND

EDMONTON, March 19.—One of the biggest transactions in the hide and fur business for several years occurred Wednesday when the A. Carruthers Co., Ltd., through their branch manager, T. H. Halford, purchased from Lamson & Hubbard \$106,543.75 worth of furs. This is the largest lot of furs sold in Edmonton by public competition for the last fifteen years. The second highest bid was \$98,000 by F. Ramelson. The purchase represents the bulk of Lamson & Hubbard's Christmas furs from the Mackenzie district. The lot is comprised of 28 white foxes, 1,356 mink, 97 red foxes, 164 beaver, 82 skunk, 49 bear, 1,859 weasels, 9 silver foxes, 14 wolverines, 8 fishers, 26 otters, 20 lynx, 970 marten, 37 cross foxes, and 6 wolf furs. One of the most outstanding features of this shipment of furs is that they are nearly all of the most fashionable furs, and that there is practically no culls in the lot. They were shipped to the Winnipeg branch of the A. Carruthers Co., Ltd., and will be sold from there.

Closing of Navy Yard Interesting Proceeding.

The closing of the Esquimalt navy yard by the Dominion Government may mean the saving of expense or it may mean the opening of another navy yard in a strategic position. Esquimalt has been a navy yard since the beginning of white settlement in British Columbia and an immense amount of money has been spent on it.

Curious Action Regarding Defences.

The navy yard was turned over years ago to the Dominion at the time when the Laurier Government was in power. It was kept running and an attempt was made to form there a base for a Canadian navy.

Soon after that the Laurier Government was defeated and the navy was dropped, the Esquimalt yard closed and the Rainbow put out of commission, the policy of the Borden Government being to make a donation to the Imperial Government instead of having a local institution.

At the time of the close down the Esquimalt forts were also closed and the two big guns which were just ready for mounting at Signal Hill were lying in the yard at the base of the hill. There they lay for years although the excavation and cement work ready for mounting, which had taken years to complete, was now all ready.

Curious Action Of Authorities.

Another curious action of the authorities in connection with naval matters was that during the time when the yard at Esquimalt was closed a guard was always set at the gate and no citizens of the place were allowed to carry a camera inside or to go near the forts.

New Navy Yard Very Expensive.

The establishment of a new navy yard would be a very expensive affair, especially at a time when the finances of the country are in a bad way. If it is necessary, we must have it, but the people who are already being heavily taxed and whose taxes will have to be still further increased to pay for the wilful waste and profligating in connection with purchase of war supplies, will be very careful about sanctioning any further large expenditures.

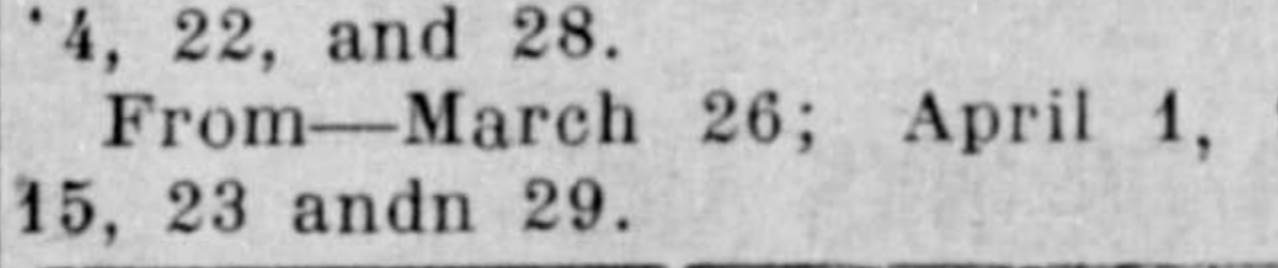

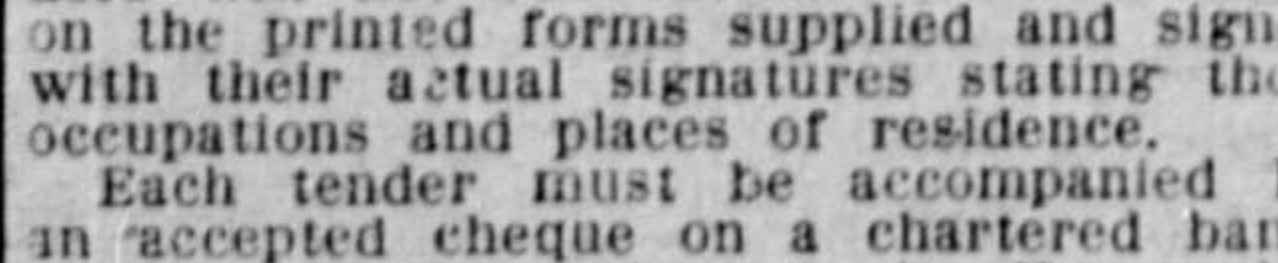

RICHEST INDIAN GIVES LAVISHLY TO CHARITIES

Among the future red letter days of Henryetta, Okla., there will be probably one known as "Jackson Barnett Day," and right well should this generous full blooded Creek Indian be memorialized for his gifts to churches and for the benefit of Henryetta generally, for Jackson Barnett, uneducated and untutored ward of the government, has again loosed his purse strings to the extent of giving \$25,000 to each of the seven local churches, irrespective of creed or tenant, and \$1,000,000 for an endowed Indian hospital to be located at Henryetta, besides incidentally contributing \$400,000 additional to outside missionary funds, aggregating nearly \$1,500,000, given at one time to the cause of religion of the white brother and the care of the sick of his own race.

Barnett, though a judged incompetent in the eyes of the law, is probably the wealthiest Indian in the world, having near \$4,000,000 to his credit in Washington, to which he is adding a royalty income from his vast oil well leases at the rate of \$150,000 annually, an infinitesimal part of which is used to care for his necessities and simple wants. He does not know, nor could many of his white brothers realize, the immensity of these millions. But he does comprehend that he owns a great amount of money which is growing every day, and, realizing that he can never use such vast wealth for personal needs, he has asked and received permission from the Indian Department to give millions to the cause of Christianity and charity.

In looking about for worthy institutions that he might assist in his home town of Henryetta, Barnett saw the need of better church buildings, and he forthwith proposed, with the consent of Washington, to aid in financing new edifices. At that time, the summer of 1919, the First Baptist needed funds for its new structure, and a gift of \$25,000 from Barnett materially assisted in completing the house of worship, which cost in all \$65,000. Other churches, among them the First Methodist, Presbyterian, Episcopal, Christian, Catholic and Nazarene, received similar donations from Barnett. The matter of permitting these gifts was brought then to the attention of the Indian Department.

Let me earnestly advise all who give to life and death the past of life, the tomorrow of death, a passing thought. Let them draw from the immense library on the subject. They will very soon find an explanation and an interpretation which will give form and color to the chaos within. Life will have a purpose and with hardly a figure in the speech, they will find themselves humming, whistling as the hours pass and the shadows lengthen until the summons comes to "join that innumerable caravan."

Their passing out will be as one who, flipping the ashes from a fragrant cigar and idly watching the blue volume of smoke curl softly to the ceiling, falls quietly into slumber.

Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class \$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted surveying land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished but parties of not more than four arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each shall necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claim five years and make improvements of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 1/4 acre. Where pre-emptor in occupation less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be made by pre-emptor applicant makes improvements to extent \$200 per annum and records same or record same will operate as a future. Title cannot be obtained less than 5 years, and improvement of \$10.00 per acre, including clearing and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, but requires lease in connection with farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements and residence maintained on the granted land.

Unsurveyed areas not exceeding 100 acres, may be leased as homesteads and improvements conditions of rental and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company, timber land not exceeding 640 acres may be purchased; conditions of payment of stampage.

Natural gas improvements may be purchased by pre-emptor, but conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of well price, in excess of half of well price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANT ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and holding with His Majesty's Forces, during the time within which the heirs or devisees of deceased pre-emptors may apply for title under this Act is extended for one year from the date of such person's death, until the year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers or sailors or by their heirs or devisees. Pre-emptions recorded after June 1st, 1914, are exempt from stampage. Taxes are remitted for five years after the date of payment of stampage or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from installment to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASE OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failing to complete purchase, involve forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole due and taxes and interest, the purchase price may be distributed proportionately over the whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock and provides for grazing under Commission administration under leased basis on numbers raised; priority for stock-owners; stock-owners may purchase land for range partitioning. Free, or partially free, pasture for settlers, campers or travellers to ten head.

Harry Anderson, who will come here to box Chet Neff on the 31st, is not a stranger to this town. In fact about five years ago he defeated Jimmie Clarke, who was to have come here, in this city. Anderson has fought all the leading boxers on the coast and up till a few months ago was champion of the Northwest but lost to Cloney Tate. Two years ago he fought a four-round draw in Seattle with Freddie Welsh before Welsh lost the world's championship to Benny Leonard. Up to recently Anderson has been fighting on the prairies and on the coast. He was discharged from the United States navy a few months ago after having served during the war.

Local fans say that Anderson will be a better match for Chet Neff than Clarke would have been. He is a cleverer fighter than Clarke and will give Neff a good run. The contest will practically resolve itself into one for the Northwest championship. Neff will arrive with Ben Self from the south tomorrow morning on the Prince Rupert. It is not likely that Anderson will reach here before the day of the fight, although it is possible he may get up on the C. P. R. boat which will arrive next Monday.

Clubs in the Pacific International Baseball League are stepping right out after top notch players, and fans on the new circuit should glimpse some pretty fast ball this season. It was thought for a time that the league would be just so-so, with an average run of players, but judging from the players that are being signed, the teams will boast first class material and indications point to a keen fight for the pennant. It looks like a big year for the diamond game in the Northwest, especially in Vancouver and Seattle.

The young men of London have been charged with consenting to be spoiled. They get dance invitations four and five deep—they try not to disappoint—they dance the shoes off their feet and the money out of their pockets—and are, in short, capable of any desperate terpsichorean feat. To these and similar indictments young men are replying in the public prints that, if it were understood what martyrs they have become, they would be pitied rather than despised. One neither pities nor dispises. Young men have not suddenly become so unselfish as to devote themselves to entertainments they dislike. If they do not want to dance there is no conscription. Time was when the hostesses would have gladly passed a Dancing Compulsion Bill. And who knows whether that time will not return very soon?

came too. According to the police report the trouble started when the car in which Leonard was riding bumped into the rear of another car at the street intersection. The contact resulted in the mitt merchant receiving the wallop on the back of the chin by the back of the seat, Benny being on the downward grade while the offending area was coming up.

Every unmarried person, or widow, or widower, without dependents as defined by the Act, who during calendar year, 1919, received or earned \$1,000 or more.
All other individuals, who during calendar year received or earned \$2,000 or more.
Every corporation and joint stock company, whose profits exceeded \$2,000 during the fiscal year ended in 1919.


