Head of British Admiralty on Navy

Walter Long Speaks to Canadian Club in London Advising Correction of Armaments not Increase.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
LONDON, March 24.—The Duke of Devonshire arrived in London just in time to preside over the Canadian Club's dinner at Auckland Geddes, the new British Ambassador to Washington. In the course of a speech at the dinner, Right Honorable Walter Long, the head of the Admiralty, remarked that the British Parliament had not only refused to build new vessels but actually scrapped glorious ships. "The time has arrived," said Mr. Long, "when we should enter into new competition, not regard the size of armaments but in the correction of armaments. I am a believer in the League of Nations, but we have great possessions and above all are the real security of the freedom of the world, cannot now abandon all our armament."

CRIMES GUARDED GOING TO COURT

Display on Way to Assizes—Murder of Mayor of Cork Condemned.

LONDON, March 24.—Armored police with drawn swords escorted the judges of the assizes court at Galway to the house on Monday. One of the judges in addressing the jury said there had been murders, two robberies with many other crimes such as looting in the houses since the assizes.

SIE RILEY IS ACQUITTED

Against Sentence Granted in Vancouver on a Technicality.

VANCOUVER, March 24.—Bessie Riley of Prince Rupert, who was convicted recently by Magistrate McMorde on a liquor charge pleaded yesterday on a writ of habeas corpus. The judge found that the warrant of commitment was faulty, and charges of "offering for sale" and "exposing for sale" were not in the warrant. The decision of the judge was made on a technicality.

NATIVES OF B. C. ARE MENTIONED IN REPORT

Late Dan Pearson of Metlakatla, Who Won Military Medal and Later Died, Included in Number.

The report of the Department of Indian Affairs just published tells of the work of B. C. Indians during the war. It says:—"British Columbia Indians are somewhat less warlike in character than those of the plains and in the eastern provinces, and are by nature adverse to leaving their homes upon any unfamiliar venture. They nevertheless sent several hundred good soldiers to the front, and a number of them have very distinguished records. "Although the Military Service Act did not apply to the Indians, a record of those enlistments was compiled upon the introduction of the measure. It was found that among the Indians of the Head of the Lake band in the Okanagan district every man who came within the description of the first call had already enlisted. This is a record of which any community might well be proud. One of these Indians Private Geo. McLean, received the Distinguished Conduct Medal in recognition of the performance of a feat which was of an extraordinary character even for the great war. Private McLean single-handed destroyed nineteen of the enemy with bombs and captured fourteen. He was himself severely wounded upon this occasion. "A number of the British Columbia Indians served with the Mesopotamian forces. One of these, David Bernardan, of the Owekayno band, in the Bella Coola agency, commanded a motor transport vessel on the Euphrates river. An Alert Bay Indian, Edward Victor Cook, received the Distinguished Conduct Medal. He was wounded twice, and was finally killed towards the end of the war. Dan Pearson, an Indian of the Metlakatla band, which is located near Prince Rupert, was awarded the Military Medal. He afterwards died of pneumonia."

ALBERTA COAL CAMPS ARE SAID TO BE IDLE

Efforts to Have All Miners Join United Mine Workers Causes Trouble.

CALGARY, March 24.—Efforts of the Minister of Labor to enforce the order that only miners who sign the United Mine Workers of America check-off will be allowed to work has caused eruptions in Alberta coal-camps and today four large camps totalling several hundred men are reported to be idle.

CLAIMS HE IS THE GOVERNMENT OF B. C.

Man Who Plainly Shows State of Unsound Mental Condition Was in Police Court.

Bearing all the ear marks of a crazy man, Eli Pavich appeared in the police court this morning charged with vagrancy. His case was remanded until 10 a. m. tomorrow when the magistrate will give his decision. Chief Vickers told of knowing the accused for ten years. He had, at the time given trouble to the police and had subsequently been in the asylum. He was one of the participants in the battle of Kelly's Cut. Constable McGlinchy told of arresting him. The accused had no visible means of support and had told the constable that he was not working and did not intend to. On his person was found a check for \$400 payable to himself, but with no signature. He had endeavored to pass this at the Central Hotel and at the bank. The accused took the witness box in his own defence. In vociferous tones which brought spectators from other parts of the city hall, he told that he was the government of British Columbia. He had wandered over all parts of the country, but Prince Rupert was the only place where he had been bothered. He spoke in a wild manner and his remarks were irrelevant. He is to be examined by the doctor today.

POUND AND DOLLAR STABLE

British Sterling Exchange Has Advanced While Other Currency Drops, Except Canadian Dollar.

NEW YORK, March 24.—Demand sterling and the Canadian dollar were exceptions to a general unsettlement of the foreign exchange at the opening of the stock market here today. Sterling opened at \$3.78 1/2, an advance of half a cent from Monday. Italian exchange made a low record, lire checks being quoted at 20.32 to the dollar, a decline of 68 centimes. Francs were off 40 centimes, opening at 14.62 to the dollar, marks were quoted at 1 1/4 cents each, while the Canadian dollar held its gain of Monday at 89.65 cents.

GEORGES CARPENTIER ARRIVES AT NEW YORK

Is Accompanied by Bride and Received Hearty Welcome.

New York, March 24.—Georges Carpentier, heavyweight boxing champion of Europe, who served France in the world war as an aviator, arrived here today on the steamship Savoie and was cordially welcomed by a throng of sporting enthusiasts and a delegation from the French colony here. He was accompanied by his seventeen-year-old bride and his manager, Francois Deschamps.

BIG HOCKEY GAME

Second Event of Series at Ottawa Tonight.

OTTAWA, March 24.—The Metropolitan of Seattle, champions of the west are confident that they will be able to make a better showing when they meet their opponents here tonight for the second time. The first game was close with Ottawa leading by one goal. Tonight the visitors have more confidence as they know the rink and have got over their long journey. The game promises to be a very fast one and there is much excitement among the local fans.

CHEF NEFF ARRIVES

Likely Looking Little Boxer Steps Off the Prince Rupert With Ben Self.

Ben Self arrived from the south on the Prince Rupert this afternoon with Chef Neff, the lightweight boxer, who will meet Harry Anderson in a 15-round contest next Wednesday. Neff is being greeted by many old friends in the city who are glad to see him looking in such excellent form. "I am going to try my best to beat Anderson," remarked Chef to a News representative on stepping off the boat. Anderson is considered as a likely opponent. He will not arrive here until next Monday or Wednesday.

Army Estimates Discussed In British Parliament; Vote for Large Sum Passed

LONDON, March 24.—The army estimates providing for 525,000 troops, which number will be gradually reduced to 280,000, and other expenditures, amounting in all to £125,000,000, occupied the House of Commons. Army questions generally were discussed and much criticism was indulged in of the policy of the Government at home and abroad, but the vote was finally agreed to.

At question time the Prime Minister expressed his regret that a question had been put down in connection with the possibility of another Easter rising in Ireland, to which obviously no answer could be given.

The Prime Minister stated that no date had been fixed for the assembly of the League of Nations.

MATTER OF FISHERIES IS SETTLED

C. C. Ballantyne Writes Board of Trade Confirming Former Communication.

INSPECTOR MAY HAVE TO LIVE IN DISTRICT

A letter has been received by the Prince Rupert Board of Trade confirming former communications from the department of marine and from Colonel Peck in regard to changes in the fisheries regulations. It also mentions that the matter of a resident inspector is being inquired into. The letter is as follows:—"In acknowledging your letter of the 24th ultimo, in which you refer to requests that have been made by certain interests in southern British Columbia that the recently modified fisheries policy be not brought into effect, I may say that such policy was decided upon only after the most careful consideration, and no changes therein will be made for the present year, nor thereafter, unless experience under the new conditions show modifications to be in the public interest. "I note your request that District No. 2 be separated from the other districts. I assume you mean that the inspector for this district should not be under the jurisdiction of the chief inspector for the province and should report directly to Ottawa. "Experience has shown that such an arrangement is not the best one, but on the contrary the existing method of administration enables co-ordination of the service that could not otherwise obtain. Indeed this method has been found so much better than that of the different district inspectors reporting directly to headquarters that it has been extended to all parts of Canada. "There is, however, force in the argument that the inspector of fisheries for this district should have his headquarters permanently in Prince Rupert. I am looking into this matter. "Yours truly, "C. He told of the activities of the Northern Interior Co-operative Association which is endeavoring to get a market here and also spoke of the possibilities of a co-operative store here. The council endorsed his association and promised it every support in getting established.

R. A. Stoney, organizer for the Typographical Union, also addressed the meeting on labor conditions in the province.

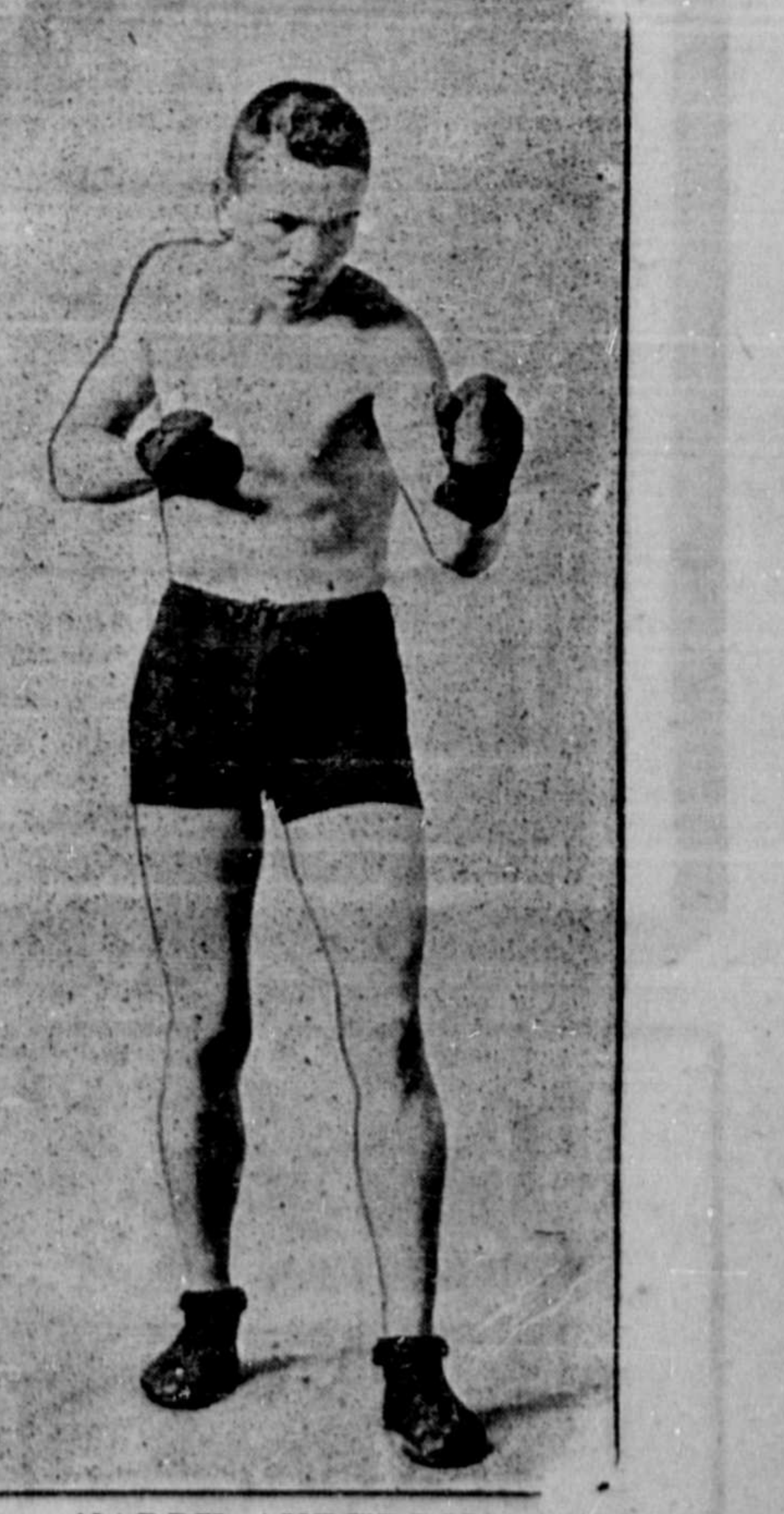

In the Letter Box

The Old vs. the New Revelation.

Editor of News,—
Your editorial on spiritualism, and your invitation for correspondence in reference to it stirred up sufficient interest to cause me to look up information on the subject. From your reference to Conan Doyle and his books and from other press notices I was led to believe that he would be one of the most reliable and informing authorities on spiritualism that I could procure. Through your kindness I have had the privilege of reading his book "The New Revelation." This I have read and reread, and along some lines have carefully analyzed.

As the whole subject hinges on the messages that come from the departed spirits, I gave close attention to all the author said about the spirits from whom the messages came, the mediums through whom they came, and the way the validity of these messages was tested.

Mistakes of Spirits.

After speaking on pages 90 and 91 of the mistakes the spirits make in their attempts to foretell events, he makes the following statement regarding a certain class of spirits, which to me is very significant, and speaks volumes. The author says: "But apart from these limitations we have unhappily, to deal with absolute cold-blooded lying on the part of wicked or mischievous intelligences. Everyone who has investigated the matter has, I suppose, met with examples of wilful deception, which occasionally are mixed up with good and true communications. It was of such messages, no doubt, that the Apostle wrote when he said: "Beloved believe not every spirit but try the spirits whether they be of God. These words can only mean that the early Christians not only practiced spiritualism as we understand it, but also that they were faced with the same difficulties." Everything in the above quotation finds its analogy in the teachings of the bible, with one exception. That is the assertion that "these words can only mean that the early Christians not only practiced spiritualism as we understand it, but also that they were faced with the same difficulties. The early Christians were faced with the difficulty of dealing with wicked lying spirits, whom the Apostle John calls the spirit of anti-Christ in the context of the passage quoted above by Conan Doyle. A comparison of this quotation and context with modern spiritualism as taught in "The New Revelation," has convinced the writer that it is identical with the anti-Christ spirit with which the Apostles had to contend. I see by comparing the teaching of the Apostles with modern spiritualism that the method of testing the messages of the lying, wicked spirits was entirely different. I have also found that the practice of spiritualism by the early Christians and modern spiritualists are as far apart as the east is from the west. (See 1st John 3:22 4-6.)

Anti-Christ.

A comparison of the following statements will show that modern spiritualism as set forth by Conan Doyle is identical with the anti-Christ spirit as set forth in the Bible. On page 55 of "The New Revelation" the author says: "One can see no justice in a vicarious sacrifice, nor in the God who could be placated by such means. Above all, many cannot understand such expressions as the 'redemption from sin,' cleansed by the blood of the Lamb," and so forth. Compare these statements with the following scriptures: "For I delivered unto you first of all that which I also received, how that Christ died for our sins according to the scriptures." (1st Cor. 15: 3.) "Ye know that ye were not redeemed with corruptible things . . . But

with the precious blood of Christ as of a lamb without blemish and without spot." 1st Peter 1-18-19. "The blood of Jesus Christ, His son, cleanseth us from all sin." 1st John 1-7.

Christ Spirit.

On page 57 our author in speaking of the spirits in the beyond says: "Opinion is not absolutely uniform yonder, any more than it is here, but reading a number of messages upon this subject, they amount to this: There are many higher spirits with our departed; they vary in degree; call them "angels" and you are in touch with old religious thought. High above all these is the greatest spirit of whom they have cognizance—not God, since God is so infinite that he is not within their ken—but one who is nearer God and to that extent represents God. This is the Christ spirit." Here we have direct denial of the deity of Christ. I am just wondering if these may not be the spirits of some of the wicked Jews we read of in John 10:30-39, who were going to stone Christ, and when he asked them for which of his good works they were stoning Him they said: "For a good work we stone thee not but for blasphemy and because that thou, being a man, makest thyself God." Christ did not deny the charge that he was making himself God, but contended for the truthfulness of the claim. Again I ask, may not the spirits who denied the deity of Christ to the mediums of the spiritualists have been the spirits of these wicked Jews who were going to stone him for making himself God, when he was on earth? Or perhaps it was the spirit of their father the Devil, whose works they did. John 8-44.

Lying Spirits.

The admission that modern spiritualists had "to deal with cold-blooded lying on the part of wicked or mischievous intelligences" came to me as a shock, for it accurately corresponded with a case, the record of which is 2817 years old. The author of "The New Revelation" admits that modern spirit messages have failed when tried by the test that proved the validity of this message. A comparison of page 90 of "The New Revelation" with 1st Kings, chapter 22, will verify this statement. This passage in the first book of the records of the kings of Israel and Judah, tells of a visit Jehoshaphat, king of Judah, made to Ahab king of Israel. Ahab proposed that they should seek to regain Ramoth

A BOY OF ELEVEN SHOT HIS SISTER

Elsie Dunn Died Instantly from .22 Calibre Rifle Bullet Wound.

TORONTO, March 23.—Elsie Dunn, aged eleven, 149 Gamble Avenue, was shot and instantly killed shortly after supper last night in her home by a lad named John Jones, also eleven years of age, who resides at 147a Gamble Avenue, and was taken into custody, after Dr. Robert H. Fleming, coroner of the district, had conducted a preliminary inquiry.

The lad shot his friend with a .22 calibre rifle, which, it is stated was in bad repair. The bullet entered her chest, and death was instantaneous.

The children were playing outside the home with the gun, and the boy, it is understood, aimed at a tree when the shot miscarried and struck the girl in the breast.

PRINCE GEORGE

With the object of interesting the public in pure poultry breeding and egg producing and also in putting on an annual poultry show, the Prince George District Poultry and Pet Stock Association has been formed.

A man by the name of Richardson, of McBride, has been arrested on a manslaughter charge as the result of the burning to death of S. Ross of Prince George in a fire caused by the throwing of a kerosene lamp at the deceased.

Constable Henley of Vanderhoof accompanied by Hugh Cochrane, sworn in as deputy, left for the coast this week in charge of the man Connier, charged with assaulting his wife and daughter at Burns Lake, while in an unsound mental state. An Indian who recently went insane at Vanderhoof was also taken down.

Fred Fraser, of Fraser Lake, has been sent to the Dominion convention of the Great War Veterans' Association as a delegate from this district. Mr. Fraser is about sixty years of age, but despite this was overseas with the American army.

Chief Constable McNeill, from Fernie, is here to take the place of Chief Constable Bourne, who has been adjudged hopelessly insane and is at the New Westminster asylum.

HAZELTON

On Sunday, March 14, a daughter was born at the Hazelton Hospital to Mr. and Mrs. V. F. Dunn, of New Hazelton.

Miss Goddard was in charge of the program and Mrs. Newick and Mrs. Sharpe were on the refreshment committee.

that he is going to use aeroplanes to transport his ore from the mine to Telkwa.

Mr. Thompson, brother of J. H. Thompson, the Prince Rupert hardware man, arrived in town last week and left for the Kildare mine on Manson Creek to make an inspection with a view to doing placer mining on a large scale.

VANDERHOOF

The Vanderhoof Herald has changed its name and now blossoms forth under the illuminating caption of "Nehako Chronicle." Under the same management of W. J. Rimes the claim is made for the new publication that it is absolutely free from all ties to sectional, townsite capitalistic or party interests.

A Vanderhoof Creamery Association is to be formed here with a capitalization of \$6,500 under the Co-operative Association Act. A committee consisting of J. B. Armshaw, F. C. Borhaven, Samuel Goecker, George Snell, Archie Stewart and George H. Outram have the work of organization in hand.

The contract for the completion of the Editorial Home here has been suspended on account of a lack of co-operation and a spirit of antagonism shown by the citizens of Vanderhoof. The Board of Trade of Vanderhoof deny any such condition.

The local public schools were re-opened last Monday after having been closed on account of the influenza epidemic.

At the Ellisby School box social \$120 was taken in towards school purposes. Archie Stewart was floor manager and auctioneer and much of the success of the affair was due to the committee work of Mrs. D. McCallister and Miss McLeod.

Your Income Tax Return Should be Filed at Once!!

All persons residing in Canada, employed in Canada, or carrying on business in Canada, are liable to a tax on income, as follows:

Every unmarried person, or widow, or widower, without dependents as defined by the Act, who during calendar year, 1919, received or earned \$1,000 or more.

All other individuals, who during calendar year received or earned \$2,000 or more.

Every corporation and joint stock company, whose profits exceeded \$2,000 during the fiscal year ended in 1919.

CLASS 1

Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 31st of March, 1920.

Trustees, executors, administrators, agents and assignees must use Form T 3.

Employers making a return of the names and amounts paid to all directors, officials, agents or other employees must use Form T 4.

Corporations and Joint Stock companies making a return of all dividends and bonuses paid to shareholders and members during 1919, must use Form T 5.

NOTE—Individuals comprising partnership must file returns in their individual capacity on Form T 1 or T 1 A.

PENALTY

Every person who is required to make this return, who fails to do so within the time limited, shall be subject to a penalty of \$10.00 for each day during which the default continues—and all such penalties shall be assessed and collected from the person liable to make the return in the same manner in which taxes are assessed and collected.

Time Limit

All persons in Class 1, as shown hereon, must file on or before the 31st of March, 1920.

All persons in Class 2, as shown hereon, must file on or before the 30th of April, 1920.

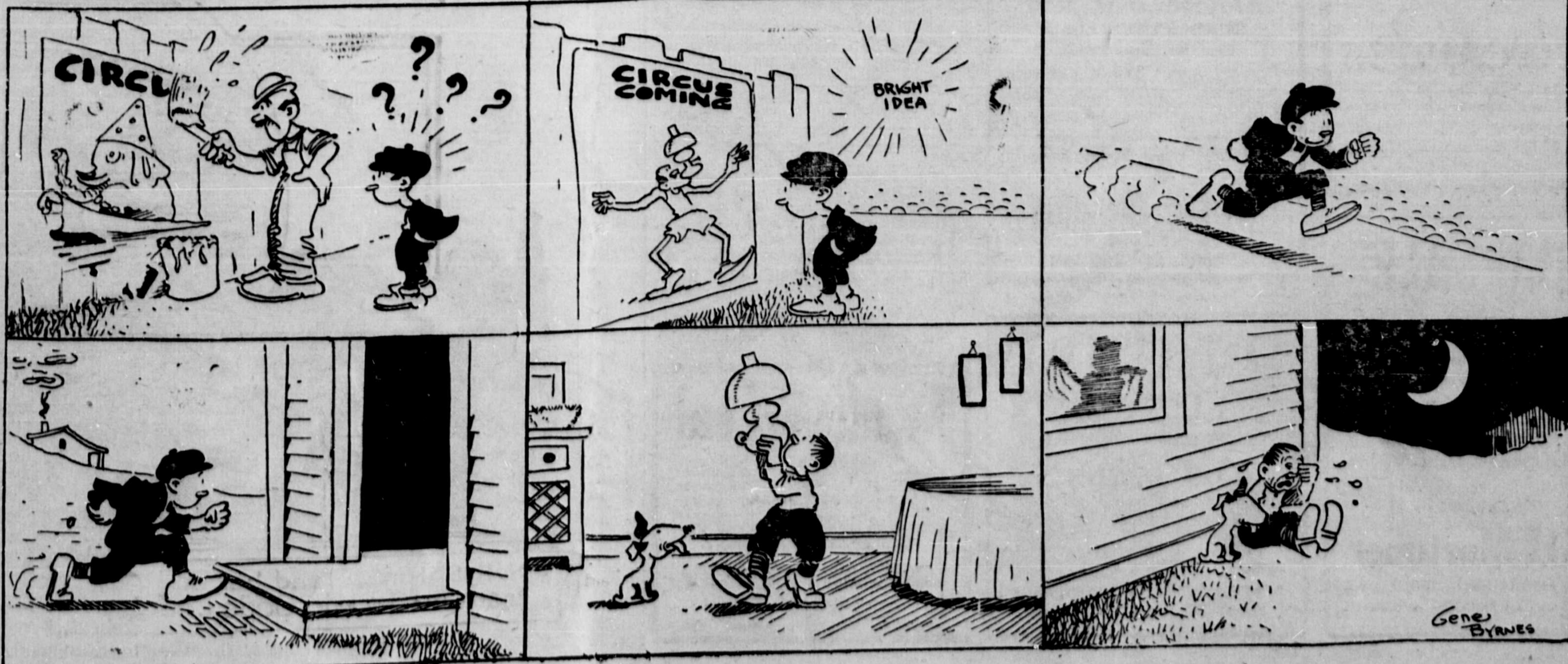

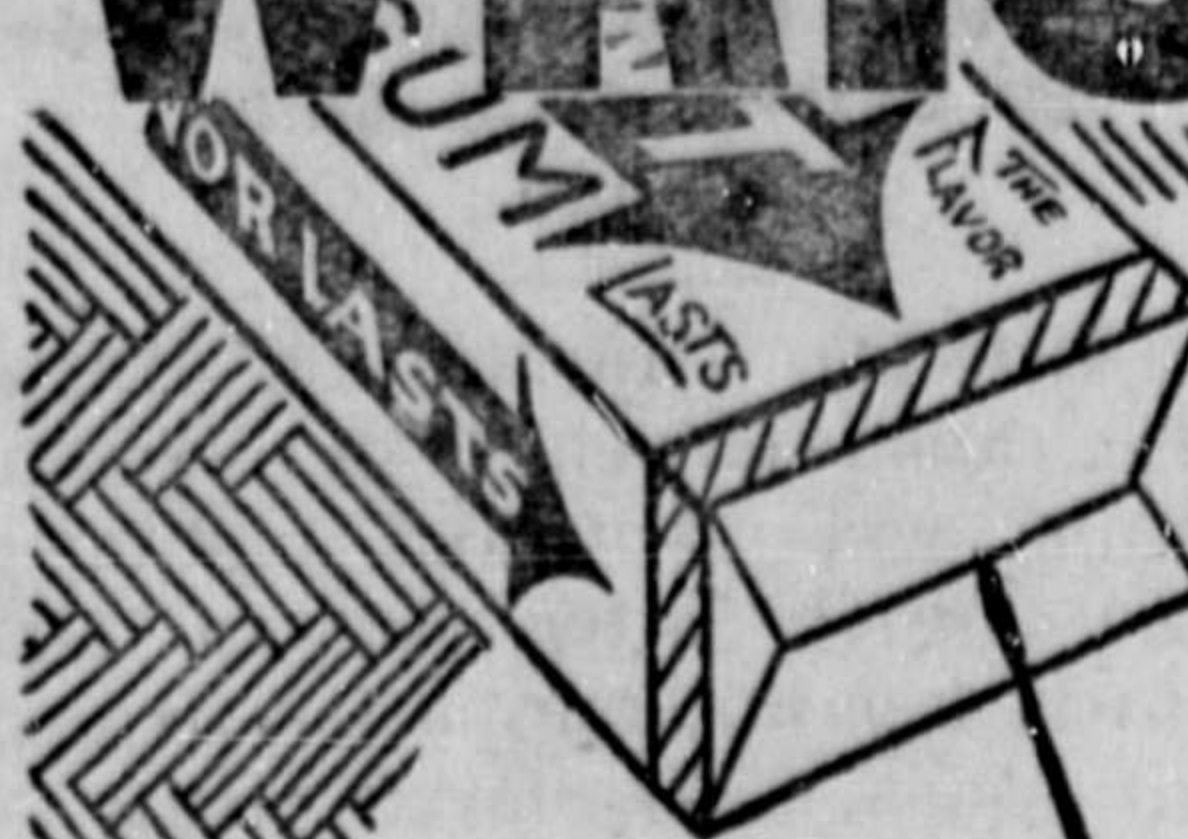
