War Veterans Will Demand Definite Bonus For Soldiers

Minimum of 1000 and Maximum of \$2,500 Payable to Every Man in Canadian Forces; Discussed For Two Days.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
MONTREAL, March 26. After two days of discussion, which
times became somewhat sensational, the Great War Veterans'
Association of Canada, at their fourth annual convention here
held last night to adopt a definite bonus plan, which fixes a
minimum of \$1,000 and a maximum of \$2,500, subject to no
deduction and payable to 100 per cent of the Canadian forces.
The cash re-establishment bonus is based on an additional
\$60 a day for the total term of their enlistment, to men who
were in service on a belligerent front.

ARMENIA SUPPLY ARMS TO ARMENIA

WASHINGTON, March 26.—A
resolution that the United
States Government supply to the
republic of Armenia sufficient
arms and ammunition to
equip a stable army" was made
by a Senate sub-committee,
which has conducted an exhaust-
ive investigation of conditions in
the Near East.

PROPOSED TO BE POLICE SPY

Man Was Killed When Crossing
Street in Broad Daylight
in Dublin.

DUBLIN, March 26.—In the ab-
sence of information to indicate
the motive, the popular be-
lief prevails here that the un-
identified man who was shot and
killed in a downtown street in
broad daylight last Saturday, was
a police spy.
The man who was killed was
about 25 years of age and well
dressed. He was crossing the
street when three men approach-
ed him, one of them drawing a
revolver close to the victim's face
and firing three times.
None of the three men have
yet been arrested.

WHISKEY WHILE OWNER AT CHURCH

When Luke McGuire, a citizen
of Baltimore, was at church the
other Sunday night three men
with a small automobile truck
made three trips to his home and
hauled away his five barrels of
whiskey. McGuire places the con-
servative value of \$1,250 on his
best stock. A neighbor sat in the
room of his home and watched
the entire proceeding but as all
of the lights in the McGuire home
were burning it was thought that
McGuire was home. When Mc-
Guire returned from church he
found the gate was open so he
started to investigate. The kitchen
door was unlocked but he
found nothing disturbed until he
went to the cellar and then—
boom.

That Already \$5,300 Has

Left Skidegate at 5 O'clock Yester-
day Morning and Got in
Last Evening.

TOWN HAS BEEN ABUZZ
WITH UNFOUNDED RUMOR

The P. Dorreen sailed safely
into port at 9 o'clock last evening
and is moored today at the Booth
Fisheries' wharf bearing little
marks of mishap and according
to her crew in better shape than
she has ever been before. After
having been repaired at Aliford
Bay the little fishing vessel left
there at 5 o'clock yesterday morn-
ing and had one of the best trips
across that has been experienced
by her sea-faring crew.

As early as yesterday morning
wild rumors have been floating
about town as to disaster that had
befel the craft. Towards evening
the report grew and with each
repetition it became enlarged and
exaggerated until last evening it
was the topic of conversation and
surmise in all parts of town. The
News office has been kept busy
ever since yesterday morning at-
tempting to answer queries and
obtain definite information. Un-
til the arrival of the boat last
night nothing but conjecture was
obtainable, so the reports were
unheeded and the News refused
to publish any of them.

Wild Stories.

The first story was that the
boat was overdue from Skidegate
and was supposed to have sunk
in Hecate Straits. By noon the
report was around that she had
been seen to sink by another boat
but this could not be traced up-
Last night it had grown until it
was quite freely stated that the
flotsam had been picked up and
one survivor, Peter Muse. The
distress of the relatives can be
imagined as three of the four
members of the crew have fami-
lies and the parents of the Doiron
boys reside here. The crew con-
sists of Henry Doiron, Stanley
Doiron and Peter Muse, all of
whom are married with families
and a younger brother, Frank
Doiron.

Hit a Rock.

"We hit a rock in Skidegate
Narrows when our engine stop-
ped," said Stanley Doiron to the
News this morning, "and after
staying there for a day, during
which time our boat was partly
under water we were picked up
by the Nidaros and towed into
Aliford Bay where repairs were
made. We left there yesterday
morning and after a fine trip
across the straits arrived home
last evening. We were forced to
throw out all our ice, bait and
supplies while on the rocks and
had just enough provisions to
make the passage home. The
weather was so favorable that we
were able to make the fifty miles
of open water yesterday in six
and a half hours.

Heard of Rumor.

"When we were 25 miles out
of Rupert a passing boat informed
us that we were reported lost, so
we then made all speed to get in
and immediately called up our
families. All my wife was able
to say when I spoke to her was
'My God!' We have a pretty good
idea who started the rumor and,
believe me, he's not going to get
off unmarked."

The crew had nothing but good
to say of the hospitality of the
people on the islands during their
distress. They were supplied with
food, shelter and supplies when
their own was gone, and they feel
extremely grateful.

FIUME TO BE A REPUBLIC

D'Annunzio and Fiume Council so
Decide—Proclamation
Next Month.

April 21.

PANAMA, March 26.—It is

Prince Rupert Compared With Eastern Country.

Comparing conditions here with that which has obtained in the east of late, we have been wonderfully well off. Not only was there a month of clear sunshine with cool but not cold nights, but even since the break in the fine spell the weather has not been bad. In the east, however, both in Canada and in the States, there have been such storms that traffic has been tied up and people have not only been unable to get from one place to another, but in many cases they have been short of the necessaries of life. For one thing they have been unable to get a proper supply of fresh fish from Prince Rupert.

Here the fishermen and fish buyers have suffered some inconvenience through not being able to get cars with which to handle the product. This is a serious matter, but nothing like so serious as not to be able to get food of any kind or fuel during intensely cold weather.

Added to the tieup in the east, there is of course the general shortage of equipment, caused by the fact that the Government of the country was bending all energies to winning the war instead of building cars. We are not enthusiasts about the Union Government, but we do not think they should be blamed for not providing money to build fish cars, when every dollar was needed for sending men and supplies overseas. Now conditions have changed and we are expecting the Dominion to do its bit here as well as at other places. Our railway must be equipped, docks and stations built, and other improvements put in. We believe this will be done no matter who is in power at the capital for no Government can afford to kill the usefulness of a railway such as the one we have.

Is There Yet a Unionist Party?

At the time of the last election the Toronto Globe was a Unionist paper, breaking with many of its former supporters because it believed the right policy was to support the war to the limit. Now, along with other journals, it feels that the work is accomplished. In a recent editorial it says:—

"The pretense that the Government at Ottawa is a Unionist Administration in any proper use of the term must be abandoned. The former Liberals who still retain their portfolios in the Coalition, or who support it as members of Parliament, can no longer deceive themselves with the idea that the fiscal and other policies of the Conservative party will be modified as a means of bringing about a fusion between the Liberal-Unionists and the Conservative party.

"If under these circumstances the Coalition remains in power until the end of the Parliamentary term, or even for another year, the former Liberals who continue to support it must make up their minds to accept the Conservative policy and vote as Conservatives if they have any desire to remain in political life. On no other footing can they hope to secure nominations for the next House of Commons.

"All over the country Conservatives are ignoring their allies, the Liberal-Unionists, and are insisting upon a return to the party organization that existed before 1917, and that remained inactive only because of the necessity of continuing the pretense of Union Government after the reality had ceased. The most powerful Conservative machine in the Dominion—the Central Association of Toronto—has decided to abandon its Unionist camouflage. At a special meeting of the Association a resolution was adopted declaring 'that in the opinion of this Association the time has now arrived to return to party lines, and it is further suggested that the Liberal-Conservative party proceed to reorganize on a broad, patriotic, national basis without delay.'"

MINING POLICY OF GOVERNMENT

Sloan's Iron Ore Reserve is Explained—Purpose of Development.

VICTORIA, March 26.—To a very large extent opposition criticism of the bill to amend the Mineral Act—now awaiting the formal royal assent—has centred upon a belief that its operation would work a hardship upon the prospector. Although the Hon. William Sloan, the minister in charge of the bill, took a good deal of pains to explain the objects of the measure and to illustrate its intended working to the benefit of the prospector; and to the province at large, the temptation on the part of the opposition members to seize upon the more contentious points as a medium for the manufacture of campaign material was altogether too great.

In brief the measure seeks to give power to the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council to place a reserve on iron ore deposits. The latitude in question is to have a life of three years. It will be applied to a limited extent only and the authority so granted will be exercised in such a way as to inflict nothing in the nature of hardship or interference with the prospector or any class of people interested in the mining industry. As already inferred, however, it will be used for the advancement of the interests of those directly or indirectly concerned in the development of the mineral resources of this province, as well as for the benefit of the public at large.


The Reply to Criticism.

As far as the prospector is concerned it is common knowledge that the absence of any sort of restriction in the past has been of no particular benefit to him, nor can it be argued today that he would benefit materially by reason of his discovery and location of purely iron deposits. It goes without saying that without an iron and steel industry in western Canada there is not sufficient market—if any—to make the product of such holdings saleable. That the force of this argument is appropriately appreciated by the prospectors themselves is evidenced by a statement recently given to the minister of mines by the president of the Prospectors' Protective Association, whose dictum reads in part as follows: "The iron deposits of British Columbia have in the past been of no value to the prospector. This class of ore is absolutely useless. By reserving districts which are idle and not covered by mineral claims there should be no reason or ground for opposition; for, if we have a steel plant in the province, it would furnish a market for ore which is now being held by the prospectors of the province and which would remain idle until such time as this market is created. Considering the benefits which British Columbia should derive from an industry of this kind I feel it my duty to give you (the minister of mines) my approval."

What It Means.

It has been charged that present holders and operators would be adversely affected by the operation of the new provisions in the Act. There is no foundation in the supposition. The authority asked for does not apply to iron ore locations already held under the Mineral or any other Act. To put it briefly, the object sought is to prevent the extension of the process of alienation which has been so common in British Columbia for many years. The Government does not intend to adopt an indifferent attitude and allow the development of the iron ore resources of the province to be impeded by perpetuating the policy.

And it may be as well to point out that many such deposits are privately held with little or no work done on them, while there is only one conclusion possible to arrive at as to the object in their original acquisition. Unquestionably they were obtained and are being held purely for speculative purposes. It is obvious, therefore, that it is in the public interest to remove this very dangerous obstacle to development by creating machinery with which to induce capital for the development of an iron and steel industry. Once this has been done British Columbia should be able to look forward to the launching of such enterprises as may assure to her the position

A Pointed Illustration.

It may be of interest to recall the fact that on Texada Island iron ore deposits of high grade abound in plenty yet little expenditure on development has been made. For more than forty years they have been out of the possession of the Crown. On the other hand it must be remembered that it is not intended to touch the unquestioned rights of those who have complied with all the laws heretofore; it is proposed, however, that for a time new iron properties—as may be deemed of sufficient importance—shall be reserved by the Crown.

Modus Operandi.

On the report of the discovery by a prospector of iron the resident engineer in which the find is made will be asked to inspect and report it. If it is considered on investigation that the ore is so situated, is in such quantity and of such quality as to warrant the belief that it might assist in the object in view, namely, the launching of an iron and steel industry, the power taken by the Government to apply the reserve very probably would be exercised. The whole idea of the measure, therefore, is designed towards industrial expansion, not contraction in the least particular.

DISCUSSES PENSIONS

C. W. Peck Makes Short Speech in House in Regard to Subject.

C. W. Peck, member for this district in the House of Commons, made a short speech in the House of Commons recently on a motion to amend the Pensions Act to make the allowance to soldiers' widows stable. As reported in Hansard, he said:—

"I rise to support the motion, as I have risen repeatedly in this House to express my sympathy with the mothers and widows of men who served their country in the late struggle. I shall not delay the House at this time with any lengthy discussion of the question, because I think that enough has been said. I am convinced that the Government have not closed the door upon any questions appertaining to the returned soldiers, and I think my hon. friend the Minister of Immigration (Mr. Calder) has expressed that determination. I have no doubt the time will come when the Government will appreciate the advisability of affording to this House an opportunity to discuss the subject from all possible standpoints. If, however, they do not grant that opportunity, then we shall bring the matter up in some other manner. I am sure they will give us a chance to go thoroughly into the question, for as I said before, and said advisedly, I rely on this Government to do everything humanly possible on behalf of the soldiers and the widowed mothers.

I do not see within sight any other prospective Government that will be willing to do any more than this Government has done or can do. The very first question in regard to the soldiers should be that of pensions. I made this statement in my constituency; that the widows and orphans of the men, our comrades, who were left over on the battlefields of France and Flanders, should be given first consideration. I will not recite the case which I have in mind, but I may assure the House that there are many which should receive every consideration. I think the whole subject could be more advantageously discussed at a later date; and, as I have said before, I am convinced that the Government will grant an opportunity to discuss the question of pensions. We shall, therefore await with anxiety their decision on the question, and if they can not grant ample opportunity to go into the matter then I shall take steps to bring it before the House."
