## Our Winnipeg Prisoners Are Found Guilty of Charges

### Armstrong, Pritchard, Ivens and Queen on Various Counts, Bray on Minor Charge and Alderman Heaps not Guilty.

## Jury Disagreed at First But Returned and Decided

### Prisoners Found to be Common Nuisance and Will not go to Jail; Exception to Judge's Charges.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

WINNIPEG, March 27.—(1:45 Prince Rupert time.)—The verdict in the strike leaders' trial is as follows: Heaps, found not guilty on all charges.

Bray, found guilty on the charge of being a "common nuisance" which charge is not punishable by a prison sentence. Armstrong, Pritchard, Ivens and Queen were all guilty on various charges.

WINNIPEG, March 27.—At 2:30 this afternoon (Winnipeg time) there was no verdict returned by the jury in the trial of the strike leaders at Winnipeg with Mr. Justice Metcalf presiding. The jury had been out since last night and had failed to agree. They so reported to the judge who addressed them for some time and they again retired.

At half an hour after midnight last night when the presiding judge concluded his charge to the jury, his address having commenced at 4:30. His lordship's charge followed the rebuttal of A. J. Andrews, K. C., senior counsel for the crown. Objections to the judge's charge were taken by W. H. True-K. C., who applied for a reserve case and the application was granted by His Lordship. The court was adjourned until morning at eleven.

The charge, which is one of seditious conspiracy, is against the leaders in the big strike which spread throughout the West last summer, with headquarters in Winnipeg. The prosecution endeavored to show that the aim of the leaders was to upset the present constitutional government and replace it with a soviet. It was stated that an actual attempt had been made to form a soviet in Winnipeg. The charges were denied.

The men whose fate is being decided are W. A. Pritchard, of Vancouver; Alderman John Queen and A. A. Heaps, of Winnipeg; Wm. Ivens, R. H. Bray, William Armstrong, and R. J. Johns.

## COMMITTEE SITS ON NEW ELECTIONS ACT

### Number of Clauses Considered; Curious Provision Regarding Arms.

Eighty-nine sections of the Provincial Elections Act were considered at Victoria by the Legislature in committee and, with the exception of a little more than a dozen of the more contentious clauses, were disposed of.

Under the provisions of the old act one separate polling booth does justice for three hundred voters and no change had been made before its inclusion in the present measure. The leader of the opposition suggested that the word two hundred be substituted for the larger number because of the additional work that would devolve upon clerks in the operation of that clause in the new bill which requires the comparison of signatures. The section was stood over and very probably will be amended in conformity with Mr. Bowser's suggestion.

### Expert Advice.

Typical of the minute examination to which each section of the measure is being subjected was the discussion on the clause requiring the stamping of ballot papers with the official but secret mark. Suggesting the additional safeguard of each envelope being initiated by the voter himself, Mr. Bowser raised the point for discussion. The Premier observed that the idea of the official stamp had been considered from the point of view that by the use of ink of a particular kind any attempt at "steaming" an envelope would cause the ink to "run" and reveal the evidence of tampering at once.

### The "Mickey."

One of the purely legal sections of the new bill demands the surrender to the returning officer or his deputy on request any offensive weapon, such as firearms, swords, staves, or bludgeons, with which any such person may be armed. The leader of the opposition mused as to whether the "mickey" might be included in this provision. Mr. Oliver replied that it might well include the "brute majority."

On arrival at the clause providing for penalties for personation the member for Esquimalt did not like the idea of no stipulated minimum fine. The omission, apparently, was an accidental one as other clauses provide for both maximum and minimum. The clause was stood over.

The new measure similarly provides that the expenses of transporting voters to and from polling places within the electoral district shall be paid, but such payment is not allowed in respect of transportation from one electoral district to another.

### Legalizing It.

Mr. Bowser was somewhat surprised to see the provision and inquired whether the old act contained it. The Premier replied that it was a new section designed to legalize a practice indulged in by all parties hitherto without any statutory authority.

## ROOF OF HOUSE WAS BURNED YESTERDAY

### Department Had a Call to House on Second Ave. West; Damage was Slight.

The fire department had a call yesterday afternoon at 5:30 to the house occupied by Louis Robitseau on Second Ave. west, beyond the junction when the roof caught on fire. The blaze was quickly extinguished with small damage to the premises. The fire was caused by a defective stove pipe.

## JUDGE YOUNG SPOKE ABOUT SOCIAL EVIL

### Told About Peace Work of Red Cross and Gave Startling Facts and Figures.

"There is an enemy in our midst today," said Judge Young to the St. Andrew's Society last night, "that threatens more damaging effects to our nation than ever we faced in the Great War. This enemy is disease—disease that could be prevented, can be prevented but is not prevented. Medical examinations in connection with military enlistment brought forth the information that 30 per cent of the flower of our manhood suffered from defects that could have been eradicated if checked in their early stages. Under military rule diseases were prevented and corrected and it seems apparent that something similar must be done in civilian life."

### Asks Co-operation.

"The Red Cross of Canada is alive to the situation and it is with the authority of the society that I address you tonight. In conjunction with the Federal and Provincial governments and various volunteer organizations such as the Women's Institutes of Canada, Victorian Order of Nurses, St. John Ambulance Society and the Daughters of the Empire we are about to start a campaign in the interests of public health. The one thing that we must have is co-operation, and unless we obtain that co-operation our efforts will be futile. The people must be educated to the danger facing them and the benefits that may be derived from the work of these institutions. We hear talk of our mighty natural resources but it seems that our greatest asset—human health—is the least considered and the least conserved."

The work of the Red Cross is the caring for rural health and already organization work has been done. Arrangements have been entered into with the Victorian Order of Nurses and the Provincial Government for the supplying of district nurses. These nurses are to be given supplementary training at the University of B. C. besides the training they have already received to become graduate nurses. When a district calls for a nurse this nurse will be provided and it is the hope that the people thus supplied will learn much about the care and prevention of the present physical defects. Any district—Prince Rupert included—may get such a nurse. During the war the Red Cross provided an inexhaustible depot of money and supplies for military purposes and we will do the same in peace times. A main supply depot will be opened at Vancouver with branches at Prince George and Prince Rupert.

### Veneral Diseases.

"I have taken a good deal of time and trouble to assemble the information I will now give you on venereal diseases. These diseases are at the present time sapping the life blood of our country and their disastrous prevalence is terribly surprising. It is a well known fact that syphilis is destroying the health of the nation. Authorities state that from eight to ten per cent of the population of both Canada and the United States is affected with this loathsome disease. Do you know that there are 130 cases at the Essondale hospital in this province? Treatment for this disease costs the government of B. C. \$32,000 per year or \$482,750 to cure those cases already under the care of the government. Why, if we had the money that it costs B. C. to treat syphilis cases, we would be able to build a road around the world, to say nothing

## Another Murder in Ireland Yesterday

### Magistrate Bell Taken from Tram and Killed at Roadside Opposite Masonic Club by Four Armed Men.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

LONDON, March 27.—Alan Bell, resident magistrate, who presided over the inquiry into the dealings of the Sinn Fein with Irish banks, was shot dead this morning outside the Masonic Club in Dublin, according to a despatch from that city to the Central News.

Magistrate Bell was on his way from his residence in Monkstown to Dublin Castle when the tramcar in which he was riding was held up at Ball's Bridge by four masked men, who pulled the magistrate from the car and killed him at the roadside.

### Asks Police Protection.

The Lord Mayor of Dublin has applied to the authorities to furnish police protection to the Mansion House, according to a despatch to the Central News from Dublin. Mayor O'Neill's request, it is reported, was due to the fact that the mayors of Limerick and some other towns had received threatening letters such as the one said to have been sent to the Lord Mayor of Cork, Thomas MacCurran, before he was shot.

## POST OFFICE CLOSURES SUNDAY

### No One Will be Allowed in Lobby Until Early Monday Morning.

Acting under instructions from Ottawa, Postmaster McIntosh will close the postoffice all day tomorrow and from this time on every Sunday. The post box outside will be available for mailing letters and the incoming mail will be received and sorted and will be in readiness for the opening on Monday.

This order makes the local office conform with the other post offices throughout the Dominion.

## KING'S EMPLOYEES ASK MORE MONEY AND SHORT HOURS

LONDON, March 27.—The employees on the King's estates in Scotland including Balmoral Castle, are demanding an eight-hour day and a raise in wages to three pounds weekly. James D. Ramsay, King's Commissioner on the Balmoral estates, has given the men the option of working ten hours a day or quitting their jobs. As far as is known he has said nothing to them concerning wages.

## CAN HAVE MARKET IF WILLING TO PAY RENT THAT REQUIRED

The report of the market committee that the City Market be granted to the Northern Interior Co-operative Association on the condition that it be operated under the rules of the market by-law calling for a \$300 yearly rental was adopted by the City Council at a special meeting last night with seven members in attendance. This will necessitate personal negotiations between the present holder, Mr. Glennie, and the Association as his lease does not expire until September.

"I am returning to Telkwa to report to the Association," said the general manager of the Association, Mr. Prudhomme, at the train this morning. "We have several plans for disposing of our produce and we do not necessarily have to come to Prince Rupert. The council seems to think we have to. Both the council and the papers seem to be antagonistic to us in their support of the local merchants so, naturally, I cannot give much information. I will probably be back in Rupert in a week's time when the association will have decided on its action."

## ENGLISH MONEY HIGHER VALUES

### and Sterling Made Quick Jump Yesterday on New York Stock Exchange.

NEW YORK, March 27.—A stock rally in sterling exchange place yesterday before noon driving demand bills up to \$3.90, those and a half cents above the high mark of Thursday and a new high level in the present upward movement.

The low record was \$3.49 made February 4. Canadian dollars were quoted at a discount of eight and a quarter per cent. This morning there has been another slight rise in the value of the pound sterling, quotations being one-eighth higher than yesterday.

## TENDERS FOR TELKWA DEPOT

### Will be Modern and Permanent Structure Built With Tile and Concrete Foundation.

Tenders are being called for the erection of a new station at Telkwa. The bids are being asked in three styles, stucco, solid tile or interlocking tile. They will close on April 7. The new station will be a modern and up-to-date one somewhat similar to the one nearing completion at Houston. It will be of two storeys with a concrete foundation. On the main floor will be a waiting room, a baggage room, ticket office, agent's room and kitchen.

The calling for tenders for the new building would indicate that the expropriation action for the land which belongs to the Cassiar Coal Co., is to reach a settlement satisfactory to the railway company. It will be the third modern station on the line west of Prince George, the other two being at Smithers and Houston.

It is believed that operations may commence on a new station here this year. The chief delay now seems to be financial, as it is the intention of the company to put up a fine structure once it is started.

## GRASSHOPPER PLAGUE IN SASKATCHEWAN

### Swarms of the Insects Reported in Southeastern Part of Province.

REGINA, March 26.—Swarms of grasshoppers are reported on the high lands of Southeastern Saskatchewan and also in the vicinity of Disley. The department of agriculture is investigating and urging immediate action on the part of farmers and municipalities to cope with the hoppers.

### Fish Returns Very Impressive.

In order to impress upon members that Prince Rupert was not talking without the book, Col. Peck asked for official returns on the amount of fish caught in the different districts on this coast. The returns showed that Prince Rupert district produced fish, mostly salmon and halibut, to the value of \$6,783,434, while the district which includes both Vancouver and New Westminster produced only \$3,413,991. The other district, which includes the whole of the Vancouver Island coast, produced fish to the value of \$4,716,599. This last district included the salmon which are caught in the Todd traps at Sooke on their way to the Fraser River.

If there were any members of the House of Commons interested in this question it must have been an eye opener to note the value of production from this district and the fertility of Vancouver and New Westminster people trying to control the policy of the people here.

### Iron of North Should be Developed.

If it is true—and we believe it is—that there is an immense iron deposit at Copper River, sufficient to warrant the erection of a smelter in this district, some steps should be taken to keep this to the fore and try to secure a smelter in the district in the near future. Iron is the most useful of metals and the demand for it will be continuous, especially at a time when there is so much building to be done.

Vancouver and Victoria have been making strenuous efforts for a long time to secure an iron and steel works in their neighborhood. Possibly there is room for an iron works there as well as here. At any rate if anything can be done to secure development of this north country, it should not be neglected.

### Difficult to Realize Amount of Development.

It is difficult for the people of Prince Rupert to realize the amount of development that is going on in this neighborhood, especially in connection with mining. Every steamer from the south brings numbers of mining men who are going to different sections of the north coast and some to the interior.

One feature which is most encouraging is the intention of many owners of prospects to do development work, not with the purpose only of fulfilling the law in regard thereto, but with the idea of converting the prospects into mines that will produce ore in shipping quantities.

of one around the island. Together with gonorrhoea, a disease that is taken lightly but is often chronic, this disease is making awful inroads on the health of our people and is responsible for a large percentage of the insanity, blindness and other defects of our people.

**Duty of Parents.**

The United States has already taken the matter in hand and if you read some of the literature they spread on the subject you would think it raw. There's no mincing matters and they call a spade a spade. This literature is circulated in the Y. M. C. A., normal schools and other organizations. In some states a study of sex hygiene is a necessary part of normal school training. Where formerly this subject was frowned upon, it is now being studied earnestly. An inexcusable mistake for parents to make is to send their children out into the world without a word being said of sexology. Much of the spread of venereal diseases could be prevented by parents.

**Red Light District.**

"Regarding red light districts, I once thought that the establishing of such was a way of controlling venereal diseases. I now see the folly of that belief. Competent medical authorities will tell you that they are the very breeding grounds of venereal diseases. It is impossible for a woman to live that life without in a very short time becoming affected with syphilis. The districts should be cleaned out, but not unless a strict follow up campaign is kept up. If it is not followed up better have the districts, but it can be followed up and eventually almost eradicated. These arguments for segregated areas are piffle and only advertize and encourage vice."

President S. D. Macdonald presided at the meeting which was largely attended. On behalf of the society he thanked Judge Young for his address.

## STEEL COULD BE MADE HERE

A. C. Garde Points to the Deposits of Iron and Coal in the Copper River District.

EYES OF MINING WORLD ARE ON THIS DISTRICT

"The mining industry in this north country is receiving more attention every hour from interests in the south," said A. G. Garde, M. E., who has just returned from a four months' sojourn in the southern part of B. C., to a News representative yesterday afternoon, "and the people of this place must wake up to their geographical advantage in relation to the industry. They must step out and bring business to the city if they expect to get it."

"There is undoubtedly a movement on foot and there is actually a company being formed in Great Britain to go into the steel business in British Columbia. These people will have men in the field this season to look into properties of merit, many of which lie right in this district. It behooves Prince Rupert to be on the look out that a smelter may be established here.

"There are large deposits of both iron and coal at Copper River. This could be brought to some point in the vicinity of Prince Rupert and together with magnetites assembled when steel could be produced. Many people favor this point for a smelter, for making steel as it could be very economically produced. To bring steel long distances from the United States when it could be so easily made right at our doors is utter non-sense."

### TWO KILLED

Magnus Johnson, Formerly of Kispiox, and Ole Gartt are Buried Alive.

Magnus Johnson, for many years a resident of Hazelton, having owned a ranch in Kispiox Valley, and well known throughout this district, and Ole Gartt, who leaves a wife and four chil-

dren in Kamloops, were buried alive on Thursday last in a cavern on the line of construction of the Kamloops-Kelowna branch of the Canadian National Railway, says the Interior News. Double shifts of workmen were put on to drive a tunnel to the spot, but not the slightest hope of finding the men alive is entertained.

The cave-in occurred in the longest cut on the line upon which crews have been working for the past eight or nine months, the accident occurring while a dumping train was being loaded. Timbers gave away and an immense quantity of rock came crashing down.

The Musical Society have been very busily engaged during the last few months getting ready for this occasion and the limited platform space available has restricted the number of the society's members taking part. The fine acoustic properties of the Methodist church building should enable the tone colors which this piece affords to be properly appreciated.

# Your Income Tax Return Should be Filed at Once!!

All persons residing in Canada, employed in Canada, or carrying on business in Canada, are liable to a tax on income, as follows:

Every unmarried person, or widow, or widower, without dependents as defined by the Act, who during calendar year, 1919, received or earned \$1,000 or more.

All other individuals, who during calendar year received or earned \$2,000 or more.

Every corporation and joint stock company, whose profits exceeded \$2,000 during the fiscal year ended in 1919.

### CLASS 1

Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 31st of March, 1920.

Trustees, executors, administrators, agents and assignees must use Form T 3.

Employers making a return of the names and amounts paid to all directors, officials, agents or other employees must use Form T 4.

Corporations and Joint Stock companies making a return of all dividends and bonuses paid to shareholders and members during 1919, must use Form T 5.

NOTE—Individuals comprising partnership must file returns in their individual capacity on Form T 1 or T 1 A.

### PENALTY

Every person who is required to make this return, who fails to do so within the time limited, shall be subject to a penalty of \$10.00 for each day during which the default continues—and all such penalties shall be assessed and collected from the person liable to make the return in the same manner in which taxes are assessed and collected.

### Time Limit

All persons in Class 1, as shown hereon, must file on or before the 31st of March, 1920.

All persons in Class 2, as shown hereon, must file on or before the 30th of April, 1920.

### General Instructions

Obtain Forms from the Inspectors or Assistant Inspectors of Taxation, or from Postmasters.

Read carefully all instructions on Form before filling it in.

Pre-pay postage on letters and documents forwarded by mail to Inspectors of Taxation.

Make your returns promptly, and avoid penalties

### CLASS 2

Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 30th of April, 1920:

All individuals other than farmers and ranchers must use Form T 1.

Farmers and ranchers must use Form T 1 A.

Corporations and Joint Stock companies must use Form T 2.

### PENALTY

Every person required to make a return, who fails to do so within the time limited, shall be subject to a penalty of twenty-five per centum of the amount of the tax payable.

Any person, whether taxable or otherwise, who fails to make a return or provide information duly required according to the provisions of the Act, shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty of \$100.00 for each day during which the default continues. Also that any person making a false statement in any return or in any information required by the Minister, shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding \$10,000, or to six months' imprisonment or to both fine and imprisonment.
