Tests Made at Vancouver Regarding Quality of Material.

The recommendation of the Board of Works to bring one scow load of rock from the Smith Island quarry to try out on the city streets was last night adopted by the City Council. The results of the tests have been sent from Vancouver and it was found that the quality of the rock from Smith Island and Tyee were almost identical. Ald. Kerr maintained that the Smith Island quarry would be the most suitable as it was half the distance of Tyee and water transportation could be used instead of rail. Moreover, the city could obtain an indefeasible title to the Smith Island quarry for \$2,700 while it would cost \$7,000 to obtain a lease of the Tyee quarry. The scow load of rock will be placed on the streets and it will be ascertained how it wears before any further action is taken as to obtaining a quarry for the city.

Prince Rupert in The Public Eye.

Prince Rupert is more and more coming before the public as a centre of activity, brought about largely by its natural position and its many physical advantages. Mining and shipping journals tell of the prospects here and others are following suit. As an example take Toronto Saturday Night. In a recent number that excellent weekly says:-

"Hon. Wm. Sloan, Minister of Mines for British Columbia, in a recent review of new developments in Northern and Central British Columbia, stated that in the next few years Prince Rupert is bound to become the centre of one of the richest mining fields in the world. Latest developments in the vicinity of Alice Arm, Stewart, Hazelton, and numerous other points indicate very rich properties. A well known mining engineer, Mr. Alfred C. Garde, of Vancouver and Prince Rupert, is responsible for the statemen that "The wealth to be obtained fro mthe mineral riches of British Columbia would be more than enough to pay the whole of Canada's national debt and leave plenty more to carry on with." In speaking of the importance of establishing an iron smelter and iron secretary of the Prince Rupert Board of works, where ore, coal, water and transportation facilities are to be found, he says: "I have spent ten years in the north and 14th, 1920, for the erection of a twelve the new fields along the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, which is popularly known as the Copper River District, and it is very rich bulk or separate for the following trades: in all the necessary ores for the establishment of a smelter and iron works. You are going to see a boom in mining, particularly in the Stewart and Alice Arm districts, that will eclipse anything previously seen in this country. The coming activities in mining is going to have as big an effect on the future of Prince Rupert as the rush to Dawson had on Vancouver and Seattle."

Exclude Horses From the Streets.

Some years ago the editor of this paper in an editorial article in another paper expressed the opinion that the time would come in the not far distant future when horses would not be allowed to be driven on the streets, and suggested that from a

sanitary point of view this was something very much to be desired. A news despatch to the Vancouver papers a few days ago tells that Denver, Colorado, is preparing to put a regulation o this kind into force. That city has given the horse until January 1, 1925, to get out, after which no horses, cattle, sheep or swine may be kept within the city limits or driven on the streets.

Will Be Shock

To Many People.

It will be a shock to many people to find their old favorites disappearing. They like a live horse better than the dead machine. If these same people will consider, however, how much cruelty has been practised on the horse in the name of civilization they will at once admit that it is good for the horses to be kept from the peddler's cart, and from the wagon of the man who habitually overloads his team.

The horse in the field is a splendid creature, and ridden by a kind master he is often a personality, a friend rather than a slave. The horse in the city, however, tends to become a debased creature, insanitary and sometimes dangerous. He has to go before the rapid advance of modern civilization.



PROBABLY WAS SUICIDE CASE

Alice Arm Miner Mysteriously Left Hospital and Not Seen Since; O. B. U. Protest.

OWNER OF ESPERANZA AND OTHERWISE WEALTHY

A delegation from the Central Labor Council consisting of J. H. Burrough (spokesman), S. V. Cox and Fred. Shaw appeared before the city council last night to protest the action of the authorities in the matter of the disappearance of Baldemero Salinas, a Spaniard of Alice Arm and owner of the Esperanza mine there.

From the story of the delegation it would appear that Salinas had been an inmate of the hospital and was mentally deranged. On March 2 he left the institution and has since disappeared. He was seen on Hays Creek bridge acting in a strange manner and talking about committing suicide-His friends are afraid that he has! taken this action. The point protested is that his leaving the hospital was not reported.

Not on Record.

Alderman McLennan, who is a member of the Hospital Board, told that his entry at the hospital had not indicated that he was mentally unbalanced. The doctor may have known this but as there was nothing on the hospital records to show it the hospital officials could not be held responsible. He had been in the habit of sleeping at the hospital and going out during the day, sometimes staying till evening. When he had finally left and not returned there was not much notice taken of it.

Suggested Neglect-

Ald. Casey stated that he understood that the doctor knew of his mental state. It had been reported by his friend Gomez. There was no question as to his mental disability, as people had noticed it in the hospital and prior to his going there. In Kact the man giving way. Ald. Casey thought it was gross neglect to not report the matter and it was wrong to give him unrestricted liberty. To let him disappear without reporting it was the protest of the delegation and he would join in it-

The alderman also stated that he had been seen to attempt to jump over Hays Creek bridge one evening at 9 o'clock. He had an estate of \$3,400 cash and also mining interests. The thing should be brought to a head.

Serious Matter.

Mayor McClymont remarked on the seriousness of the matter, Probably no one was responsible at the hospital. It was news to him that there were any cases of this nature there. He ordered the matter to be investigated by the members of the hospital committee, Aldermen Murray and Mc-Lennan. The official administrator is to be notified.




