Large Deficit on Railways Operated by Government

Loss in Operation of National Lines was \$14,000,000 and Total Loss Including Fixed Charges was \$33,000,000.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
OTTAWA, March 30.—In a lengthy statement regarding the operation of the Canadian National Railways, Hon. J. D. Reid, minister of Railways, said that the operating deficit on all Government lines last year was \$14,000,000. The total deficit during the year, including fixed charges, was \$33,000,000. No railway estimates were passed by the committee. The deficit on the railway operation is considered a very large one, and, if continued, will prove a great handicap to the country. The total deficit of thirty-three millions has to be paid, either from the taxes or from an additional loan, the interest on which will have to be paid by the people. In view of the statement of the minister, much interest will be taken here in the operation of the big Grand Trunk system which is now under government control and on which a minimum dividend must be paid to the stockholders.

Would Expel Turks from the Capital

President Wilson are urged That Armenia Should Be Big State.

PARIS, March 31.—It was said today that the foreign office today that the French point of view regard Turkey and Armenia is in agreement with that of President Wilson as to the desirability of the largest possible Armenian state and the expulsion of the Turks from Constantinople.

Action in Ireland

George Foster Replies Emphatically to Question in Parliament.

OTTAWA, March 31.—I. E. O'Hara, now in the House of Commons yesterday asked if it was the intention of the Government, in view of the deplorable condition in Ireland, to make representations to the Supreme Council of the League of Nations similar to those made by it on behalf of the Armenians.

Mr. George Foster replied with emphasis "No."

Johnson, manager of the Cold Storage Co., was present, setting forth the company's position in the matter.

Canadian Olympics Leave Canada for Antwerp Saturday

TORONTO, March 31.—The Falcons, the Allan Cup winners, but officially known as the Canadian Olympic Hockey Team, will leave Montreal Thursday morning for St. John, N. B., and will embark Saturday morning on the liner Melita for Liverpool.

Men Suing for Wages

Port Clements Box and Lumber Co. Employ Men at Islands Without Paying Them.

In the County Court yesterday afternoon before Judge Young the case of Harry Plaster et al versus Port Clements Box and Lumber Co., Massett Inlet Lumber Co., and the Edmonton Lumber Exchange was commenced and adjournment was made until this afternoon. The case is the action of the lienholders for wages in the mill of the Port Clements Co. The Massett company are mortgagees and the Edmonton Lumber Co. is implicated, having purchased a considerable amount of lumber from the Port Clements Co., which the plaintiffs are endeavoring to seize.

M. Gonzales, of the firm of Williams & Manson, is acting for the plaintiffs. W. O. Fulton appears for the Massett Lumber Co. and W. E. Fisher for the Edmonton Lumber Exchange. The Port Clements company is not represented by a barrister.

Harry Platts Fined Fifty

Charge of Keeping for Sale Was Reduced to Having in Possession.

Harry Platts appeared in the police court this morning to answer a charge of keeping liquor for sale, but this charge was dismissed and he was fined \$50.50 for having liquor unlawfully in his possession.

The arrest was made on Monday night by Sergeant Adams and Constable McGlinchy as the accused was about to enter the Hub Cabaret and the liquor was found on him. It consisted of eight medicine bottles of alleged Scotch whiskey which Sergeant Adams stated was not of good quality. The defence of the accused on this charge was that he was on his way to a stag party and was calling at the cabaret to see if the fire was going. The liquor was for the party and it was not the intention to sell it at the cabaret.

Big Event to Take Place at the Westholme Theatre This Evening.

There is already a big demand for tickets to witness the fistie battle between Chett Neff and Harry Anderson in the Westholme Theatre this evening. Neff has been here since last week and has trained steadily. He is in good shape. Anderson arrived today and is also fit and ready for the fray.

The match tonight promises to be a wholly different contest, and the fans are already discussing the relative possibilities of the fighters.

Will Then Take Run to Stewart and Masset With Passengers and Freight.

Algerine Should Reach John Soon

The salvage steamer Algerine left Vancouver last night for Hydah Point where the steamer Prince John is on the beach, partly submerged, after colliding with the Prince Albert early yesterday morning.

The Algerine was formerly a sloop of war engaged in patrol work at Esquimalt for the British Admiralty and was purchased some time ago by the B. C. Salvage Co. She is not very fast and it will probably be tomorrow night before she arrives at the Queen Charlottes.

The Prince Albert will come here just as soon as she has discharged the oil drilling machinery which she was taking to Skidegate. She will bring along the passengers from the Prince John and will then be ready to take the run to Stewart and Masset.

Shipping men are wondering how it was that two steamers should leave two points 600 miles apart, go to an out of the way place like Skidegate where hardly any boats call, and collide there. Possibly the mystery will be cleared up when the Albert arrives tomorrow.

Bombs Explode in Thurles Rectory

Also in Residence of Poor Law Guardian at Same Place.

LONDON, March 31.—Bombs were exploded during Monday in the Protestant rectory in Thurles, Ireland, and in the residence of the Poor Law Guardian there. The intention was to secure arms. Both houses were badly damaged but no one suffered personal injury.

Military Commander Leaving for Ireland

Confers With Lloyd George Before crossing to New Duties.

LONDON, March 31.—General Sir Neville McReady, the new military commander in Ireland, had a long conference with Premier Lloyd George today preparatory to going to Ireland for his new duties.

Henry Jacobsen and Andrew Anderson were each fined \$10 in the police court this morning for being drunk and disorderly. Anderson was badly bruised about the face, indicating that a fracas had taken place. The police are investigating and it is probable that further charges will be laid.

Big Hockey Teams Tied in East Versus West Contest For Championship of World

ARENA GARDENS, TORONTO, March 31.—A fifth game will be necessary to decide the world's hockey championship and possession of the Stanley Cup. In the fourth match here last evening the Seattle Metropolitans defeated Ottawa by 5 goals to 2 and thus tied the series with two wins each. The big final deciding contest will take place here on Thursday night. The Ottawas won on their own rinks the first two games and then the westerners came into their own, and they are feeling very confident that they have a good chance of carrying the silverware home to Puget Sound.

Cold Storage Men Are in Edmonton After Contracts

EDMONTON, March 31.—Representatives of the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co., Ltd., of Prince Rupert, B. C., in the persons of T. H. Johnson, manager, and G. M. Brown, of the sales department, were in the city yesterday looking after several big contracts.

May Aid Poland

That Country Will Call Upon the Allies for Help if Pressed by Bolsheviks.

WASHINGTON, March 31.—The Polish delegation here today announced that Poland will call upon the League of Nations for Allied reinforcements if the Bolshevik armies threaten to break the Polish eastern line of defence. Unless the Bolshevik forces are materially strengthened, it was said, the present Polish army can hold its own.

Skin Grafting on Miss Phyllis Sloan

Little Phyllis Sloan, daughter of W. J. Sloan of this city, yesterday underwent another grafting operation at the hospital when a piece of skin was taken from the arm of Mr. Lockwood by Dr. Kergin and transferred to the arm of the little girl. The child was badly burned last October and has been in the hospital ever since. If the present operation is quite successful she is expected to be out in the near future. This is the second operation of the kind Miss Phyllis has had to undergo.

Rich Ore for the Smelter

Tillamook Takes South 250 Tons and Will Bring North Cannery Supplies for Alaska.

The gasoline power schooner Tillamook left Prince Rupert on Monday with a cargo of 250 tons of ore from the Premier mine for the Tacoma smelter. This is rich ore but is said not to assay quite as high as previous shipments. It is reported to be worth about \$300 a ton. The Tillamook will load cannery supplies at Puget Sound for Alaskan points.

Major C. B. North, manager of the Dolly Varden mine at Alice Arm, is in town today en route north. Preparations are now being made for the clearing of the railroad at the silver camp.

Contracts for All Ships by Public Tender

No More Vessels Will be Built as Heretofore, Says Ballantyne.

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
OTTAWA, March 31.—The Government vote of \$20,000,000 for the completion of the ship-building program was carried at 12:10 this morning. Hon. C. C. Ballantyne said that the Government would let no more contracts for the building of new ships over \$5,000 without calling for public tenders.

In the past the contracts have been distributed to the yards that were in a position to build, partly with a view to securing a mercantile fleet, and partly to relieve the condition consequent on the demobilization of a large number of returned soldiers with the consequent flooding of the labor market.

Asquith is Opposed to Two Houses

Characterizes the Two Parliament Scheme of Home Rule for Ireland as Absolutely Unacceptable.

LONDON, March 31.—Herbert Asquith, former premier and advocate of one parliament for Ireland, took issue in the House of Commons today on the Home Rule question with Premier Lloyd George, whose plan for two parliaments for Ireland Mr. Asquith characterized as "absolutely unacceptable."

Particular interest is centred in the contest between the Premier and the former Premier, both of whom aspire to the leadership of the Liberal party, but as yet they have not come to grips.

Judge Metcalf on Right to Strike.

In the trial of the strikers convicted of sedition at Winnipeg in which case sentence is to be delivered next week Judge Metcalf made some interesting statements when charging the jury. We quote:

In the matter of strikes, and the contention that there was a time when the workers could persist in claiming that they had the right to carry on a Dominion-wide strike, his lordship said that any man who claimed that the strike of last summer was a lawful strike assumed great responsibility. Counsel in question had admitted the distribution of a class of literature, a sample of which was now in the court as exhibits, and counsel stood in this case to justify Ivens' action in defying the law of censorship. The jury knew what had taken place. As a King's counsel, he thought Mr. Trueman had taken upon himself a grievous responsibility. "I am here for the purpose of instructing you on the law. We all have our functions. You as the jury have to consider the facts. But you have to apply the law to the facts, and I have already told you that my function is to keep order in this court and to tell you what the law is. You should take my statement of the law as correct. If wrong, and the accused are thereby injured, justice could be done, but the action of counsel has been such that I feel that I must instruct you fully upon the law. My charge, therefore, will be of great length."

Question of Law, Not of Justice.

His lordship said the question was not whether labor was entitled to try to better its position, or what was to become of capitalism, or the present social system? "The question is: Are some men guilty, under our law, of doing or going among others to do, or cause others to do, the unlawful acts charged? That is our question. It is very simple. This is a court of justice which is bound by the law as it stands, and not by the law as the accused say it ought to be. Therefore, we have nothing to do with the supposed law of natural justice unless it be a part of the law of the land. It is the function of parliament to make the law. This parliament has done. It is the function of parliament to amend the law so as to do justice and satisfy the popular desire. Until parliament has changed its laws, we must in the performance of our duty follow the laws, otherwise we would have mob rule and chaos. We have, therefore, to administer justice according to the law of the land and not otherwise."

"If you were to pay attention to the law as laid down by counsel for the crown and counsel for the defence and also pay attention to the law as laid down by the presiding judge, then the devil knows not what the law would be that you have in your minds. I again say that I must instruct you in law, and that you must pay attention to that instruction only."

Calgary Convention Condemned by Judge.

After having called attention to the reports that had been printed of the Calgary convention, and revised by some of the accused, his lordship said that the jury if they read the resolutions would be justified in coming to the conclusion that the convention was endeavoring to bring about a drastic change in the form of the government of Canada. "There is," said he, "an indicated preference for the soviet form of government; also for a proletarian dictatorship; also for strikes; also for the organization of the workers for the purpose of such demands as they thought necessary; also, it was stated the general organization should be proceeded with great vigor; also that there should be a general strike somewhere about the first of June." The evidence of intention could be gathered, he said, from the resolutions passed calling for the repeal of orders-in-council; enforcing the release of certain prisoners in jail; for the withdrawal of the troops from Russia. "A strike for any such purpose as this," commented his lordship, "is wholly illegal and is not covered by the privilege granted by the law to labor strikes." "It is hard to understand," he continued, "any one with the intelligence of the accused would not know a general strike for such a purpose was not lawful. As a matter of fact the convention was warned by two of its members that they were likely to get into jail, and the remarks of Kavanagh may justify you (the jury) in coming to the conclusion that they all considered that the workers themselves would be sufficient protection to keep the workers out of jail whether they were law breakers or not."

Protection of Courts Against Attacks.

Speaking of attacks made on the courts in public speeches and writings of some of the accused, the judge said: "Perhaps the courts of this province are sunk so low as to deserve the hatred and contempt of the people or anybody else. That is a matter for you. It means I am here to do the bidding of the monster capital and that the judges and the courts are here to do that. Gentlemen, that is for you. In one way it is for you and in one way only. You may think these courts have reached such a stage as to be beneath the contempt of the public; that you desire these courts no longer to exist; but the question you have to consider is was there a seditious conspiracy to do away with the courts, not only here but throughout the Dominion of Canada."

"You may think I am taking this matter with a personal bias and prejudice. I want to tell you that personally I do not care. If the public of this country want these statements concerning their judiciary to be sent broadcast over the country for the purpose of educating the thugs, if the people who should take care do not take care about the attacks in literature and newspapers on the judiciary; if they do not take care what is said in parliament under the cowardly privilege that exists, the sooner the courts are swept away the better. That is all I have to say."

Sport Briefs

The Irish Football Association has suspended the Belfast Celtic team for one week on account of the conduct of the crowd at the Irish semi-final match last Wednesday when a riot ensued, revolvers being used. Celtic protested Glentoran for playing ineligible men and Glentoran was consequently dismissed from the competition. Glentoran has now offered Shelburne to play in Dublin for the Irish football blue riband and their offer has been accepted.

The measurements of Jimmie Wilde, the English midget, show what a neatly built boxing machine he is. There is no waste tissue on Wilde's little frame. He is built like a greyhound, plenty of muscle but little bulk. Wilde stands 5 feet, 2 1/2 inches in height and has a reach of 68 inches, which is 5 1/2 inches more than normal. His powerful forearms are as large as his biceps, measuring 10 3/4 inches. His chest measures 32 1/2 inches and his waist is only 22 inches. His legs are like bars of steel. They measure only 15 1/4 inches at the thigh and 10 1/4 inches at the calf. That is, one half inch less than his forearm, and shows how well developed above the waistline in comparison with his lower extremities. Wilde's neck is his weakest part. It measures only 12 1/4 inches, which is small for a boxer even of his diminutive size.

Con Jones is naturally disappointed that his efforts to obtain a first class soccer team to tour Canada have failed completely. Neither English or Scottish Association can entertain the idea of a ten week's trip. They say players would certainly get stale. The secretary of the English Football Association points out that a representative team is going to South Africa this year and Australia will be visited next year. Canada's turn therefore comes in 1922. Con has left London for a tour of European countries and will sail for Canada in April.

Before an exhibition game at San Antonio recently, Manager John McGraw of the New York Giants was the recipient of two tokens of esteem from his admirers in that city. One was a loving cup of silver and the other a baby wild cat, captured six months ago in Mexico. The Giants' leader made a brief speech of acceptance to cover both presents, and the wild cat was promptly dubbed "Pennant." McGraw received the loving cup with gratitude and the wildcat with much deference. He was chary about petting the creature, and inquired anxiously whether bandages and liniment were provided with it. He hopes to gain the animal's affection but will not press his attention upon it.

Canadian National Steamship Lines
 By CAPT. J. S. MARSHALL
 (In "Harbor and Shipping," Vancouver).

It is a well-known fact that railways having terminals on a coast must have feeders to supply them with freight; otherwise they cannot exist.
 As an example take the Indian State Railways which have Bombay at the one end and Calcutta at the other. These two harbors with their great docks are among the finest in the world. Ships from all parts of the world trade there, and the enormous volume of trade to and from these ports amounts to many millions of dollars yearly. Small branch lines feed the great railway running across country and all kinds of merchandise are carried over these lines to the two ports, and hundreds of ships are bringing freight to the same lines. Some of the largest and fastest steamers in the world are to be found in this trade. Take away the steamers and the railways would be practically useless.
 This principle applies also to the great transcontinental national railways of Canada. Ships must feed these lines and, as Vancouver and Prince Rupert are the terminals on the Pacific coast, large and fast steamers must be found to carry the freight from and to the Orient. Private shipping companies have not so far taken this trade up in a very active manner owing, possibly, to lack of appreciation of the large trade to be built up, consequently the Government of Canada must do so if the railways are to run successfully.

Government Ownership.
 A great deal is said, pro and con, about government operation of steamships. It does not follow that government ownership

Proper Wharfage.
 Trade with the Orient is increasing rapidly and the great detriment to it not being double what it is at present is the want of suitable ships. Some time ago a Japanese company proposed to run a service of steamers from the Orient to Prince Rupert, but, owing to want of proper facilities for loading and discharging at that port the scheme fell through. What is required both at Prince Rupert and Vancouver is wharfage accommodation with proper cranes for loading and discharging, and also large railway yards to enable the freight to be moved as quickly as possible. If all these are made spacious enough, there should be no congestion of traffic like one may see when space is limited. Congestion always means delay and expense that should be avoided.

Fast Steamships.
 As the railway across Canada to Prince Rupert has not yet been fully developed, an express mail service could be put in operation to connect with fast steamers at Prince Rupert. Mail and passengers from, say, Southampton, England, could be landed in Shanghai in 21 days. On this route there should be at least three fast steamers specially suited for the Pacific trade, with a sea speed, in loaded condition, of not less than 18 knots in ordinary weather with a possible 20 knots, and having accommodation for 250 or 300 first-class passengers and to carry from 5,000 to 8,000 tons deadweight cargo. Vessels of this type would be about 600 feet long, 70 feet beam and 29 feet draught. They would displace about 25,000 tons. Ample deck space for promenade and shelter would be required and cold and hot air ventilating systems installed as both hot and cold weather is experienced in this trade. Sufficient ballasting arrangements should be provided so that the return voyage with light cargoes would give a metacentric height of at least three feet and would make the stability of the vessel sure when in this condition, and be more comfortable and enjoyable from a passenger's point of view.

Shortest Route.
 These vessels should be built with deep plates and widely spaced frames and on the pillar and girder principle. This is the strongest type of vessel that has yet been designed and can stand the enormous strains that are experienced when driving into a head sea. The propelling machinery should be two reciprocating engines and one centre turbine. Oil should be the fuel used as it is cleaner, more efficient and economical than coal. For fast handling of a cargo a sufficient number of silent steam winches should be used. Electric winches have not proved the success anticipated, owing to their

frequent break-down and smashing cargo when heaving up from the holds. These vessels would sail between Prince Rupert, Shanghai and Hongkong, as that is the shortest route to the Orient. The distance from Prince Rupert to Shanghai is 4,724 miles. From Vancouver it is 5,160 miles.

A monthly sailing of large steamers from Vancouver should be put in operation at once as the trade is there and only wants ships. These steamers should be 10,000 to 12,000 deadweight cargo capacity, with a sea speed of not less than 16 knots and have accommodation for at least 100 one-class passengers, no others. They should be built on the same principle as the faster vessels, and if coal is used, of large bunker capacity, although oil is recommended. They would be on the run to Shanghai, Hongkong, Singapore and Calcutta. Vessels of this type and speed would land freight and passengers in Shanghai in 14 days.

On to India.

Trade with India and the Straits Settlements could be made one of the best in a very short time, as all kinds of produce useful to Canada comes from these countries. Jute for making sacks and ropes, coir for matting and ropes, all kinds of nuts for oil, indigo for dyes, skins for leather, dyestuffs, drugs, oils and spices, rubber for various purposes, to say nothing of tea, sugar, rice, tobacco, cotton, wool and many other commodities too numerous to mention. As a market for the products of Canada the East offers a fertile and practically virgin field.

A system of judicious advertising throughout the ports and countries mentioned would bring trade and passengers to Canada that is not even thought of at present, because it is, practically speaking, unknown. The trade is there and merchants are asking for ships. Passengers are there who would come to Canada if only they knew the ships to sail in, and many people who spend holidays in Japan would come to Canada if suitable ships and accommodation is guaranteed. There is not a single ship today sailing from Canada going to India by the Pacific route, consequently trade and passengers that would come via Prince Rupert and Vancouver are diverted by the Suez route. Show merchants the ships and the trade will follow. This is a question which should receive careful study and consideration and not lightly set aside as being "impracticable at the present time."

In the writer's opinion, based upon personal knowledge and observation of the markets in question the "present" is the fertile time to plant the seeds of future growth of overseas trade with the great countries across the Pacific.

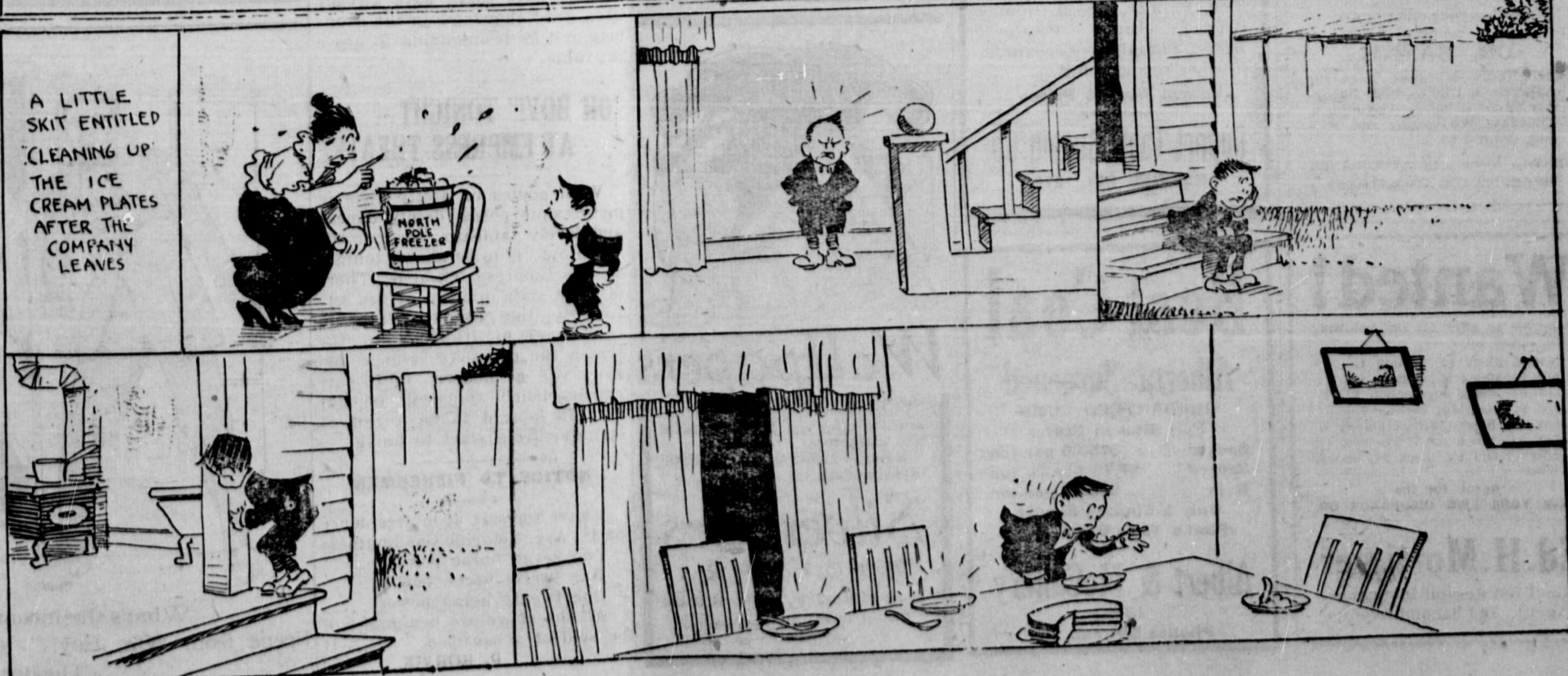
