Hamar Greenwood is Now Chief Secretary For Ireland

Canadian Succeeds to Position vacated by Sir Ian MacPherson; No Sign of Easter Trouble in Emerald Isle.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
LONDON, April 3.—Sir Hamar Greenwood, under secretary of state for the colonies, has been appointed chief secretary of state for Ireland according to an official announcement this afternoon. Sir Hamar succeeds Sir Ian MacPherson, who resigned yesterday. In Dublin, April 3.—The situation in Dublin today was normal. There was not the slightest sign of any Easter rising, rumors circulating the possibility of which recently became so general as to provoke questions on the subject in Parliament. The resignation of Sir James Ian MacPherson as chief secretary of state for Ireland did not cause a ripple of excitement here. Irishmen regard the resignation of Sir James as the viceroy, as solely responsible for the direction of affairs and seem not to be interested in MacPherson's successor. Hamar Greenwood is a Canadian and has made a number of visits to Canada since entering politics here. He was for some time private secretary to Winston Churchill before getting an appointment.

CHIEF SECRETARY FOR IRELAND HAS RESIGNED POSITION

NEW YORK, April 3.—Sir Ian MacPherson, chief secretary for Ireland in the Lloyd George cabinet, has resigned his office and the resignation has been accepted, it was officially announced yesterday.

ARMENIAN QUESTION

Proposal to Unite All Territories Except Cilicia.

PARIS, April 3.—A mandate for Armenia has been offered the League of Nations by the Supreme Allied Council. All Armenian territories would be included with the exception of Cilicia, which would be left under French protection. An outlet to the Black Sea would be provided by the arrangement under consideration.

JAPANESE KILLED

Seven Hundred Fall Before the Bolsheviki in Siberia.

HONOLULU, April 3.—Seven hundred Japanese troops and civilians were killed in a two-day battle with Russian Bolsheviki forces at Nikolaevsk, Siberia, according to a cable despatch received by the Japanese newspaper Nippu Jiji here.

38 MEN CHARGED WITH CONSPIRACY

Chicago Communists to be Tried on Indictment of Trying to Overthrow Government.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
CHICAGO, April 3.—William Ross Lloyd, millionaire sergeant at arms of the Communist Labor Party, and 37 other defendants must stand trial on an indictment charging them with conspiracy to overthrow the Government by force. Judge Oscar Hedel, in the criminal court today, dismissed a motion to quash the indictments, which were returned by the grand jury under the new state law against criminal syndicalism.

PRINCE GEORGE GOES SOUTH TONIGHT AFTER BEING OVERHAULED

The steamer Prince George has completed her annual overhaul here and is scheduled to leave for the south tonight. The steamer is to go into dock for a short time at Esquimalt, after which she will go on the regular run. The Prince George will take passengers south.

MINERAL GROUP IS SOLD FOR \$100,000

Local Owners Receive First Payment on Alice Arm Property.

The Royal Group of mineral claims, the bonding of which was recorded in the News some time ago, has been sold by the owners, Jack Miller, C. E. Betts and D. J. Hancock, for \$100,000. The first payment has just been made. This property adjoins the Dolly Varden and the David Copperfield.

Ottawa Hockey Players Champions of the World Beat Seattle by 6 to 1

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
ARENA, TORONTO, April 2.—The world's hockey championship and the Stanley Cup go back to Ottawa. In a magnificent game played at the arena here last night before 5,000 people, Ottawa defeated the Seattle team by a score of 6 to 1 and thus clinched the honors.

In the third period with the score even, 1 to 1, the crowd in an uproar, Darragh of Ottawa scored the goal that broke the tie and which cracked the hearts of the Seattle players. Seattle went to pieces after that and the Ottawas played them off their feet.

NEW YORK MARINE WORKERS ON STRIKE EFFECTIVE AT ONCE

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
NEW YORK, April 2.—A general strike order effective immediately on all railroad boats except ferries was issued by the Marine Workers Affiliation this afternoon. Workers on the ferry boats of the railroad companies were ordered to quit work at 8 o'clock tonight.

The union announced that 5,000 men would obey the order and the strike would tie up 40 per cent of the total harbor traffic. It is possible that a sympathetic strike of the men in the shops of the railway may be called.

BODY FOUND IN VANCOUVER BADLY GASHED

Los Angeles Aviator Thought to Be Victim of an Auto Accident.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
VANCOUVER, April 2.—With both legs broken and a severe gash on the head, the body of Elgin Wallstrom, believed to be an aviator from Los Angeles, was found lying at the junction of the two chief thoroughfares here early this morning. It is alleged that he was the victim of an automobile accident. J. R. Robinson, taxi driver, has been arrested in connection with the fatality.

DRAGGING OPERATIONS BRING FORTH NO CLUE

Nothing Yet to Indicate What Happened to Missing Man.

A thorough search by means of dragging was made this morning by Warden Bailey and Robert Hanna in the hope of finding the body of Baldemero Salinas, who it is suspected may have suicided by drowning, his bank pass book having been found on the shore near the garbage scow. Morris Condon and another party made searches in likely spots with a gasoline boat but neither found any further clue. It is possible that Salinas may not have drowned himself and the police and his friends are making a thorough search for him.

FISH ARRIVALS

Number of Boats Discharge at This Port—Two Cars Go East.

Two car loads of fish were shipped east by this morning's passenger train and, according to this morning's report from the Canadian Express Company, there are now no empty refrigerator cars between here and Prince George. The following boats sold at yesterday's fish sale: Alton, 50,000 lbs.; H. and R., 3,000 lbs.; Maud, 4,000 lbs., to Pacific Sea Products Co. at 14c and 10.7c; Joe Baker, 3,000 lbs., to Cold Storage at 14c and 10.6c; Bingo, 2,000 lbs., to Royal Fisheries at 14c and 10.7c; Rubein, 2,000 lbs., to Cold Storage at 14c and 10.6c.

SCHOOL ATTENDANCE

Prince Rupert reached her highest school record during the month of March when the actual attendance in the public schools was 645. In February it was 608. The average for the month just closed was 90 per cent. There was some sickness at the beginning of the month or, the average would have been higher. In February the average was 86, while in January it was 92 per cent.

AL YARD AT ESQUIMALT BEING CLOSED

Received to Take no New Work After April 15; Restless to Survey.

TORONTO, April 3.—The Esquimalt naval yard has received notice not to take any further work after April 15, when the yard will be closed. The yard will be closed, the buildings emptied and the preparations made for pulling down of the yard. At the end of April practically all the equipment will be idle. The small steamer Restless is turned over to be used as a tug boat in addition to the tug boat. This boat was recently after being in use as an extension ship at the entrance to Esquimalt harbor during the war.

RESCUE HERE WITH OFFICIALS

With Capt. Logan and Lt. Nicholson and Left for Scene of Wreck.

The salvage steamer Algerine left here yesterday morning for the scene of the wreck of the steamer John at Hydah Point, by Island. The steamer is in charge of Captain Hewison and on board was Captain Nicholson, manager of the G. T. P. ship services, and Captain Nicholson, representatives of the ship owners and of the London and Lancashire Marine Insurance Association. In connection with the account of the collision given on Thursday the writer confused the names of the skippers of the two boats. Captain Roberson was on the steamer John and it was his ship that landed the John at the beach instead of allowing it to sink in deep water. He had the engines going and pushed the John broadside for an hour and a half and all the time he was taking water and dragging the Albert down. Marine generally praise the work of the captain.

YUKON OBJECTS GOLD ROYALTY

Says Mining Only Industry Unable to Increase Price of Product.

DAWSON, Y. T., April 3.—The Yukon Development League will ask the Federal Government to abolish the present royalty on gold. It is claimed that gold has lost half its purchasing power and mining is the only industry which cannot increase the price of its product. The present regulation, it is stated, is already threatening the continuance of mining throughout the territory.

TEMPORARY REPAIRS TO PRINCE ALBERT

Will Leave for Masset Sunday Night and Continue South.

Temporary repairs are being made to the steamer Prince Albert today and the boat will leave for Masset tomorrow night about 10 o'clock, calling also at Port Clements and Buckley. She will continue her voyage to lower Queen Charlotte Island points and proceed to Vancouver before returning to Prince Rupert. The Albert arrived at 10 o'clock last night from Stewart and went to the dry dock for the temporary work. She will give a fortnightly service to Masset and Stewart until other arrangements are made.

MORE GOLD GOES TO THE UNITED STATES

Second Shipment of Ten Million Dollars Arrived Thursday and More to Follow.

NEW YORK, April 3.—A shipment of \$10,000,000 in gold from Great Britain arrived here Thursday on the Cunard liner, Saxonia, making a total received during the week of about \$20,000,000. Two more shipments, bringing the total up to \$40,000,000 are expected here soon.

Reckless Extravagance of British Peace Delegation

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
LONDON, April 3.—Charges that the Government had indulged in reckless extravagance at the Peace Conference in Paris have been made in connection with a bill for £503,388 for the expenses of the British delegation. When the bill was presented in the House of Commons, Sir Alfred Mond, the first commissioner of works, was sharply questioned as to whether his bill for hotels in Paris covered the cost of champagne, food and dances. He replied that his department was not responsible for the payment of bills for food and clothing, nor for typists, dances or bands.

An Easter Message to People From Archbishop Du Vernet

SORROW TURNED INTO JOY

The message of Easter brings home to us the truth that while the good may be for a brief season crushed and buried, it will inevitably rise again. We have learnt the lesson about the physical law of the conservation of energy. We know that physical energy may be changed from one form to another form, but it can never be lost. We need now to learn by heart the lesson about the moral law of the conservation of value. What is good in a spiritual sense may be changed from one form to another, but it can never be lost. It will rise again. If we have any sympathy with higher things, when in the conflict of life we see the good apparently defeated, sorrow will cut down in the prime of life, but if we wait in faith our sorrow will be turned into joy. Evil is destructive. It tears apart. It pulls down. Therefore in the end it must destroy itself. Good is productive. It increases good. It may be stamped down by the power of evil but it must rise again, for it has within it the germ of eternal life. This law of the conservation of value pervades the whole universe, but it finds its highest revelation in Christ. The forces of evil thought that they had crushed and buried this wonderful being who so embodied goodness, but He rose again a still more wonderful person in the power of His Universal Spirit. In preparing His followers for this great transformation Christ said: "A little while, and ye behold Me outwardly no more. Again, a little while, and ye shall see Me with spiritual vision." The Crucified Christ becomes the Risen Christ, Who by the power of His Spirit of Love will yet conquer the world, and establish upon earth the Commonwealth of Righteousness. CHOIR CONCERT WAS IMPRESSIVE

Sacred Recital Was Fully Appreciated by Large Audience of Music Lovers.

The story of the crucifixion as presented in Maunder's cantata "Olivet to Calvary" by the Prince Rupert Musical Society last evening in the Methodist Church was beautiful and well rendered. This organization, under the careful and experienced care of J. E. Davey, is steadily improving and is a credit to the musical circles in the city. The choir that faced the large audience last night numbered 15 sopranos, 10 contraltos, 6 tenors and 9 basses. Their harmony was excellent and the control was high perfect. Music lovers in the audience were well pleased and unanimously considered it a great improvement over the last performance.

The Cantata.
The theme of the cantata depicts the events taking place immediately before the crucifixion of the Savior, opening on the Mount of Olives and concluding with the crucifixion. It tells of the casting out of the money lenders from the temple, the scene in the Garden of Gethsemane and the judgment of Pontius Pilate. The soloists were J. E. Davey, A. Clapperton, Mrs. Jarvis McLeod, A. J. Lancaster and W. H. Melliar. The choruses sung by the choir en masse started softly and gathered force until near the end when the supreme pianissimo "Droop, Sacred Head" was rendered. A pleasing part of the cantata was the quartette "O Thou Whose Sweet Compassion," in which Mrs. Jarvis McLeod, Miss F. Edmands, George Wilson and A. Clapperton were the singers.

Sacred Recital.
The second part of the program was separate from the cantata and was a recital by local artists along the same sacred lines. Mrs. S. Bennett, a new vocalist to local audiences, proved a pleasing addition to the city's talent in her solo "The Good Shepherd." Will Edmonds, always delightful, played with his usual finish the cello solo "Meditation." Miss L. King, accompanied by a cello obligato by Will Edmonds, sang "O Rest in the Lord" in her usual sweet contralto. Meth Davies, formerly one of the leading members in the Welsh choir, sang "Calvary" in a very impressive manner. The accompanist of the evening was W. Vaughan Davies, whose playing on the pipe organ lent much to the general impression.

MAJOR PHILPOTT IS VISITING HERE

Dominion of Canada

Department of Finance

ALL persons residing in Canada, employed in Canada, or carrying on business in Canada, are liable to a tax on income, as follows:—

1. Every unmarried person, or widow, or widower, without dependants as defined by the Act, who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$1,000 or more.
2. All other individuals who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$2,000 or more.
3. Every corporation and joint stock company whose profits exceeded \$2,000 during the fiscal year ended in 1919.

Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 30th of April, 1920.

ALL INDIVIDUALS other than farmers and ranchers must use **Form T 1.**

FARMERS AND RANCHERS must use **Form T 1A.**

CORPORATIONS and joint stock companies must use **Form T 2.**

Penalty
Every person required to make a return, who fails to do so within the time limit, shall be subject to a penalty of Twenty-five per centum of the amount of the tax payable.

Any person, whether taxable, or otherwise, who fails to make a return or provide information duly required according to the provision of the Act, shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty of \$100 for each day during which the default continues. Also any person making a false statement in any return or in any information required by the Minister, shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding \$10,000, or to six months' imprisonment or to both fine and imprisonment.
