

## An Iron and Steel Works for District

Board of Trade Passes Resolution regarding Copper River Development on Recommendation of Mining Committee

The question of an iron and steel works for this district was taken up before the Board of Trade at its meeting last evening. A resolution contained in a report of the mining committee moved by J. B. Roerig was unanimously passed. The resolution was:

"Whereas, there has been for some time past, and is now considerable agitation on foot in the southern part of the province for the development of the iron resources and establishment of steel works. This agitation seems to be kept up by the Boards of Trade of the southern part of the province and is encouraged by the provincial department of mines, and

"Whereas, the need and feasibility of establishing the steel industry on this coast seems to be proved by competent authorities, and all efforts put forth in this connection are commendable, yet there are anything tangible takes place, a survey to take into consideration the claims of all sections of the province should certainly be made, and,

"Whereas, the efforts of the southern cities so far appear to be directed to a deposit of limonite situated on the P. G. E. Railway upon which the Provincial department mines department prepared a special report, and secured a special examination by the Dominion department of mines and in their eagerness to advance their own interests and interests of the P. G. E. railway, the southern cities have entirely ignored the resources and possibilities of other parts of the province, one at least of which surely can offer much more in the way of iron deposits and essentials towards the establishment of the steel industry than the location and deposit which seems to be their hobby.

**Copper River Iron.**

"Whereas, in the Copper River district contiguous to Prince Rupert, near Copper City, 90 miles from here, are found the largest quantities of limonite iron ore yet mined in the province, and in the same vicinity an unusually extensive field of excellent coking coal also exists. Water powers and all the necessary fluxes abound.

The iron as well as the coal has been favorably reported upon by several able engineers, including Mr. J. D. McKenzie of the Geological Survey of Canada, who in his report of 1915 has estimated the available tonnage of iron ore, proven by systematic drilling, at 562,500 tons.

## Winnipeg Trades and Labor Council Withdraws from O.B.U. Defense Committee

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

WINNIPEG, April 7.—Expressing its conviction that the support of the convicted strike leaders is a matter for labor as a whole, Winnipeg Trades and Labor Council last night unanimously decided to sever connection with the defence committee, which is largely an O. B. U. organization, and invite the executive of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada to come to Winnipeg to consider and decide upon a policy to be pursued. The council will, therefore, not be officially represented at the convention which the defence committee has called for Sunday morning.

Credit was given by some of the speakers for the work which the defence committee has done, it being stated that a fund of about \$57,000 had been raised, but it was emphatically stated that the internationals were the only organizations that could hope to get anything like satisfaction and that it was up to other labor organizations to line up with them and make labor present a united front when the issues at stake were so very important.

## SEAL COVE BIG LUMBER MILL REOPENS TODAY

Loge Arrived Last Night and Cutting Commences under Management of Owners.

The big mill at Seal Cove reopened today under the management of the owners, the Prince Rupert Lumber Co., after being operated for a year by the Prince Rupert Spruce Mills. The latter concern finished up a week ago. The organization throughout is being retained with E. F. Doby, the designer and builder of the mill, as manager.

Last night a raft of big logs arrived here from Georgetown, they having been purchased from the Georgetown Spruce and Cedar Co., Ltd. The logs are large ones that the Georgetown mill was unable to handle.

## Supply of Logs.

The camp operated by the Prince Rupert Lumber Co. at Shannon Bay on Masset Inlet is putting logs into the water, and the first Davis raft is due to arrive here on or about April 15. The entire log supply for the year amounting to from twenty to twenty-five million feet should be in storage at Silver Creek by the end of September.

## New Machinery.

The new gang saw for the mill has arrived and the work of installation will commence at once. The planing mill is on the way and the work of erecting dry kiln and planing mill structures is proceeding.

## EXCELLENT CONDITION OF CITY'S FINANCES

All Public Utilities Show Profit Including Water Department; Debt is Reduced and Sinking Fund Intact

The report of W. E. Hodges, the city auditor for the year 1919, was received at last night's council meeting and on motion of Alderman Dybhavn, seconded by Alderman Wilson Murray, was tabled for a week to give the council time to consider it. The statement shows a satisfactory state of financial affairs in city matters and the report of the operation of the public utilities is considered especially gratifying.

The general revenue shows a deficit of \$19,382.26 but offsetting this are the profits from the Utilities Department totalling \$26,860.71 which leaves a net surplus of \$7,478.45. Owing to the heavy exchange rates prevailing this net surplus was more than used up in paying exchange on the \$80,000 remitted on the city account to New York in April. The profit from the light department for 1919 was \$17,442.50 as against \$7,524.28 for 1918. The total business done in this department was \$66,776.00, as against \$49,776.00 in 1918 which is an increase of 34.87 per cent.

The profit from the telephone department in 1919 was \$7,772.45 compared with \$883.85 in 1918. The total business done for the year was \$35,212, an increase of 34.43 per cent over the \$26,194 of 1918.

The water department showed profit of \$1,645.76 in 1919 as against a loss of \$5,536.94 in 1918 due to unusual maintenance expenses that year. The business done in 1919 totalled \$16,926.85 as against \$14,132.70 in the year previous.

**Soldiers' Loans.**

Out of the \$100,000 allotted for soldiers' building loans up to the end of 1919 a total of \$57,500 has been granted. An advance of \$75,000 cash was advanced by the government but this has been covered by city debentures which were issued and are now with the government.

The total debt of the city was reduced during 1919 by \$32,269, leaving a debt of \$1,609,222.90 at the end of 1919. The city officials again take pride in announcing that this city is one of the very few in the province with its sinking fund intact.

## CONCILIATION BOARD GIVES ITS FINDING

Concluded Its Sessions Yesterday and Contending Parties Now Consider Report.

The Conciliation Board between the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co. and the Fishpackers Union which has been inquiring into the demands of the packers for an increase of wages proportionate with the cost of living and clothing necessary to that line of work concluded its sessions yesterday and has made a unanimous report for a settlement between the contending parties.

The men had asked for a raise of 75c and the committee has recommended that an increase of 60c be granted them, this increase to be retroactive from February 4 with overtime in proportion. An additional bonus of \$4 a week is also recommended for inside freezers. It is now up to the contending parties to consider the report and accept or reject it.

The Conciliation Board consisted of Judge F. McB. Young (chairman), S. P. McMordie and George Rudderham. The chairman of the Fishpackers' representatives was N. Booth and T. H. Johnson and J. W. Nicholls appeared for the Cold Storage Company. An official report is being forwarded to the minister of labor at Ottawa.

## FRENCH TROOPS STILL ADVANCE

German Troops Also Move Forward and Reds are Disarmed.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

METZ, April 7.—French troops on the right bank of the Rhine are continuing their advance and occupied Homburg, nine miles north of Frankfurt this morning.

BERLIN, April 7.—Advance troops of the Reichswehr and Socialist troops entered the suburbs of Essen town last evening. Long columns of the Red army passed through Elberfeld on Tuesday. Most of them surrendered their arms at Elberfeld. Others marched into occupied territory where they were disarmed by the British.

## TAKE MARKET ON MAY FIRST

City Council Authorized Transfer of Lease to Co-operative Association Last Night.

Authorization for the transferring of the lease of the city market from the present holder to the Northern Interior Co-operative Association was made at last night's council meeting on motion of Alderman Currie, seconded by Alderman Perry. A. J. Prudhomme, who with D. Glennie, the present holder, appeared before the council last night, also requested that the clause in the Market By-law calling for bonds of \$2,000 be deleted or disregarded. This was referred to the Market Committee for report.

Mr. Prudhomme, who is the manager of the association, announced that the association would be taking over the market about May 1. He returned to Telkwa by this morning's train and will be back in town next Tuesday night. In the meantime the appointment of a manager will be made.

## JAPANESE WILL WITHDRAW WHEN CONDITIONS SAFE

TOKIO, April 7.—Japanese troops will be withdrawn from Siberia after evacuation by Czechs when Japanese in Siberia are safe and when conditions in Siberia no longer constitute a menace to Manchuria and Korea, it is officially announced.

with a probable tonnage of twice as much.

### Coal and Iron.

Since then Mr. L. W. Storm, another first class man, after making a very thorough examination has estimated 870,000 tons of 53% ore on hand, with a probable tonnage of 3,500,000. His assays were taken from represen-

tative samples, all remarkably low in phosphorous and sulphur for an ore of this class.

The coal field on which several excellent reports are available, including such engineers as Thos. Falcon and Robert W. Hunt & Co. of Chicago, is equally extensive and covers 12,800 acres. Sufficient development has already been carried on to prove at least 12,000,000 tons of bituminous coking coal equal to any coal on the coast. The facilities for the erection of a blast furnace plant and auxiliaries in the immediate vicinity of Prince Rupert can hardly be surpassed on the Pacific coast, especially since unlimited quantities of high grade magnetite ore can be secured here from adjacent points to blend with the softer and porous limonites from the Copper River district. Magnetites exist in large quantities almost within the harbor of the city and,

"Whereas, in the development of an important industry, such as this, it would be a grave mistake to overlook the field which has the largest deposits of ore and coal and natural advantages in order to further the interests of one section of the province;

"Therefore be it resolved by the Prince Rupert Board of Trade, that a petition be sent to the Provincial Government praying that our claims for the Copper River iron and coal resources and the advantages of Prince Rupert as the best site for steel works be given through investigation and consideration before any government work is undertaken or assistance granted, feeling sure that our claims will be easily verified if inquired into. And be it further resolved that a copy of this resolution accompany the petition and that it be mailed to Hon. T. D. Pattullo, Hon. Alex. Manson, and the Hon. Wm. Sloan, as well as the premier of the province, and in order that our member at Ottawa may be kept informed, that a copy be sent to C. W. Peck, V.C., M.P., as well as also to the Dominion Department of Mines.

The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

## A MESSAGE OF LIBERALISM

Pamphlet Deals With Recent Convention and Shows What Party Stands for in Dominion.

J. E. Myers, the organizing secretary of the British Columbia Liberal Association with offices in the Birks Building, has received publication No. 1, of the National Liberal committee at Ottawa, of which Andrew Haydon is the National organizer and general secretary, and John Lewis, editor of Liberal publications.

The pamphlet which has just come forward entitled "A Message of Liberalism" embodies resolutions adopted at the National Liberal Convention held at Ottawa in August last year. It will be remembered that this convention was the first gathered of the kind since the historic convention of 1893, the prelude to the Liberal victory of 1896. It had been planned by Sir Wilfrid with the object of framing a platform that would express the real voice of the Liberals of Canada. His lamented death made it necessary for the convention also to choose a leader. This was the first time so far as the Dominion is concerned that a leader was chosen in that democratic manner.

### The Convention.

The convention was large and representative, comprising 1806 delegates. Even journals that were hostile or cold admitted that it was a magnificent gathering, well organized and harmonious. Harmony was due to enthusiasm, not to machine methods. Many delegates came to the convention with open minds as to the leadership, conscientiously trying to form their judgments by what they heard, and to make the choice that would be best for party and country. It was conceded that Mr. King was freely and fairly elected, and the other candidates, Hon. W. S. Fielding, D. D. McKenzie and Geo. P. Graham, accepted his election cheerfully and, in excellent speeches, gracefully moved that it be made unanimous.

### Resolutions.

The interest of the delegates in the policy of the party was evinced by a mass of resolutions, from which the following were selected by representative committees. They express as nearly as possible the ideas of the great body of delegates. They are submitted in the hope of indicating the aims of the Liberal party and of stimulating free discussion.

The resolutions as set forth comprise the following:—

"Loyalty to the King and Gratitude to the Canadian Army."

"The Death of Sir Wilfrid Laurier."

"Report of the Committee on Party Organization adopted as a Resolution."

"Financial Condition and Taxation."

"Condemning the Government for Non-Enforcement of Income Tax Law."

"The Tariff."

"Reciprocity."

"Encouragement to Agriculture."

"Labor and Industry."

"Conservation and Improvement of Physical Standards of Canadians."

"Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment."

"Railways and Development of Natural Resources."

"Control of Liquor Traffic."

"Canadian Autonomy."

"National Unity."

"Control of Natural Resources by Provinces."

"Respecting Election Frauds."

The latter portion of the publication deals with the Citizen's part in Government, outlines the opportunity for Liberals in Canada, matters relating to Democracy and Free Discussion, Traditions of Liberalism, Liberalism in Canada, and deals with Imperial Relations and National Unity.

### Canadianism.

Liberals are exhorted never to forget the common bonds of Canadianism and humanity and are reminded of their great national estate and their opportunity to build up a noble nation upon a firm foundation. In this publication no attempt has been made to enter into details of policy; the party platform is accessible to all and its several features will be discussed from time to time. This is an effort to get into touch with the great body of Liberalism throughout the country, to point to a few leading principles, and to indicate

### INCREASED RATES FOR ADVERTISING

### ALICE ARM

The old law store, which has been vacant for a couple of years, has been bought by George Bruggy and is to be filled with beds to relieve the scarcity of accommodation here. It will be possible to put up about 40 men here.

Four men are engaged in driving a tunnel on the Wild Cat mine owned by A. Davidson.

The Dolly Varden Railway is now clear for a distance of about two miles from the beach. Recent falls of snow have impeded the progress that it was expected would have been made on opening up the road.

J. Esplin and W. Sloan have opened up an independent assay office here. Mr. Sloan was formerly assayer for the Taylor Mining Co. at the Dolly Varden and Mr. Esplin has recently returned from overseas. They are building an office building on the Morrisin townsite.

Another lead of high-grade ore was struck on the 500 ft level in the Dilly Varden mine last Wednesday.

A new bunkhouse is being built near the jail here by the Taylor Mining Co. to accommodate the workmen whom they intend to bring in in the course of a few weeks.

The timbers for the new ore bunkers are now on the ground and work will commence at once. A spur is also to be built from the railway grade leading to the bunkers.

Joseph Galle and associates, representing Seattle interests, have made a second payment to Back Young on the Wild Rose group.

A. McGuire has completed the contract for driving a tunnel on the Musketeer mine for J. D. Meenach of Seattle. Mr. Meenach and a mining engineer are expected north soon to inspect the work. It is reported that a good lead of ore was encountered.

Diamond drilling on the Tiger that has been going on for some weeks has proven the property to have some ore of excellent values. The drill is to be taken to the Dolly Varden mine in the course of a week or so.

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### Sport Briefs

An organization in England called the Committee for National Physical Education, in which a company of responsible people are interested, has as its object the converting of young men looking on at games and sports by persuading them to use their own muscles. The estimate is formed that 90 per cent watch the 10 per cent who actually play. Employers of labor, physicians and others mean to alter this if they can. Good luck to their efforts. But they must remember the perennial truth that "opportunity is a fine thing." In all great centers of population the opportunity to play is lamentably small.

In the last games of the world's championship hockey play-off between Ottawa and Seattle at Toronto the coast players were not so much at a disadvantage from support at the side lines as their distance from the home city would lead one to believe. Indeed the Metropolitans got a good share of the "rooting" for they had many friends there. Three of the players on the Seattle team were old Toronto players who were well and popularly known. Holmes was a Toronto boy and both Foyston and Walker played with Toronto when they won the Stanley Cup in 1914.

Speaking of the aspirations of United States hockey for the championship at the Olympiad at Antwerp, the New York Times said last week: "So far as can be judged, the strongest opponents of the United States team will be the Winnipeg Falcons, winners of the Allen Cup. American hockey officials hold the opinion that the Falcons are about equal to the Winnipeggers, which team the United States Olympic seven defeated in two out of three games last week. The European entries are thought to be less formidable than the American continent teams."

Arthur Manson, formerly of this city and now president of the B. C. branch of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada at Victoria, has received a telegram notifying him that the Canadian boxing championships have been awarded by the Canadian Championship Committee to the Ottawa Amateur Athletic Federation to be held April 23 and 24. Entry blanks will follow, the telegram states. Arthur is also notified that the Olympic boxing trials will be held two months later.

King Albert, of the Belgians, who is taking a keen interest in the Olympic games to be given at Antwerp this summer, has called upon the authorities to repair all roads between the city and the stadium so that the people can attend the great athletic meet. The district is still showing the effect of the German bombardment, and considerable work will be necessary to put the highways in good condition. Skating teams from France, Finland, Sweden, Norway, Italy, Switzerland, England and Belgium are entered for the ice events to be contested on April 24 to 30.

### RECLAMATION AT SUMAS LAKE FLATS

Big Area to be Drained by Provincial Government for Returned Men.

NEW WESTMINSTER, April 6.—The British Columbia big reclamation scheme, which is expected to bring under cultivation some 33,000 acres of land in the Fraser valley, known as Sumas lake, will be started this month. The contract is being let by the Provincial Land Settlement Board to Marsh, Brown & Co., and when completed will cost in the neighborhood of \$1,800,000.

Returned soldiers are to be given the preference when the acreage is turned over.

**ALL persons residing in Canada, employed in Canada, or carrying on business in Canada, are liable to a tax on income, as follows:—**

1. Every unmarried person, or widow, or widower, without dependants as defined by the Act, who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$1,000 or more.
2. All other individuals who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$2,000 or more.
3. Every corporation and joint stock company whose profits exceeded \$2,000 during the fiscal year ended in 1919.

**Forms** to be used in filing returns on or before the 30th of April, 1920.

**ALL INDIVIDUALS other than farmers and ranchers must use Form T 1.**

**FARMERS AND RANCHERS must use Form T 1A.**

**CORPORATIONS and joint stock companies must use Form T 2.**

### Penalty

Every person required to make a return, who fails to do so within the time limit, shall be subject to a penalty of Twenty-five per centum of the amount of the tax payable.

Any person, whether taxable, or otherwise, who fails to make a return or provide information duly required according to the provision of the Act, shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty of \$100 for each day during which the default continues. Also any person making a false statement in any return or in any information required by the Minister, shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding \$10,000, or to six months' imprisonment or to both fine and imprisonment.

**GERMAN TROOPS ADVANCING IN RUHR DISTRICT**

Very Little Resistance From the Communists Except in Small Triangle.

DUESSELDORF, April 6.—The advance of the Reichswehr in the Ruhr region continues and Oborhaysen, Dortmund, and Luedenscheid were occupied today. Only a few hundred communists offered any resistance.

Communication with the occupied towns has been cut off.

Berlin, April 6.—Government forces lost 200 men, killed in fresh fighting in the triangle formed by Duisburg, Dortmund, and Essen, according to official information received here. Except for the trouble in this triangle, quiet is gradually being restored in the Ruhr district.

**DISCUSS STREET IMPROVEMENTS**

Board of Trade Committee to Interview City Authorities to Secure Information.

At the regular meeting of the Board of Trade held last night, M. P. McCaffery asked if any reply had been received from the city in regard to the recommendation made to them by the board containing a report by J. H. Pillsbury on street paving.

This precipitated a general discussion of the question of roads and sewers in which a number of the members took part. Mr. Pillsbury expressed an opinion that improvement of the streets and sewers should take precedence of any investment in hydro-electric plant, which might well be left to private enterprise, as all the city's resources would be needed to cope with the street and sewer work.

Mr. Maguire proposed that an expert engineer should be employed to lay out a sewer system, but it was pointed out that this had already been done several years ago and the report was available on file.

John Dybhavn said he believed it was the policy of the city board of works to crown the business streets with granite and bring them to grade.

Finally, on the motion of H. F. Pullen, it was decided that the president should appoint a committee of three to interview the civic authorities to secure information before the board went on record regarding any particular line of policy. This committee will report back to the board in the near future.

The report of the harbor and navigation committee of the Board of Trade in regard to recommending a new wharf at Sandspit, Q. C. I., was referred back for further consideration on the receipt of a further letter from Captain Gillett on the subject.

**HAYS CLAIMS DAMAGES RESULT BAD SEWER**

Lost Tenants and Had Extra Plumbing Expenses—Will Sue if Not Paid.

Through his solicitors, Patmore & Fulton, David H. Hays is making application to the city for damages to the extent of \$175 incurred at the Hays Block on account of the sewer trouble there last fall. Owing to a faulty sewer at that time several of Mr. Hays' tenants left the building and he lost otherwise. The claim was based on one month's rent of \$125 lost by J. F. Mullen vacating, \$30 by the loss of the Indian office and \$20 plumbing expense. The letter from the solicitors to the council last night threatened that if the \$175 was not paid legal proceedings would be instituted for all the amount lost.

Alderman Perry was in favor of paying the claim outright and thought that it was well based. Alderman Dybhavn, however, felt that the matter should go to the city engineer and city solicitor before payment was made. This was the action taken.
