Newman Erb Pays J. L. Mullen \$75,000 for Share in Company

P. Rust, General Manager here, gets Word of Final Settlement by which All Others are Eliminated from Contracts

Negotiating for Twenty Tankers for \$36,000,000

Review of Incidents Connected with Case by Man on Spot; All Charges are Withdrawn

This morning E. P. Rust, general manager of the Prince Rupert Drydock & Engineering Co., Ltd., here, received the following telegram from Newman Erb, president of the company, Vancouver—

"Have concluded arrangements for the purchase of the interests of the Mullen Construction Co., F. F. Schellenberg, and other associates."

(Special to the Daily News via Government Telegraphs.)

VANCOUVER, April 9.—(1 p. m.) Under the terms of settlement of the drydock case in an agreement signed and approved by the court, Newman Erb pays Mullen \$75,000 for his 49 per cent interest in the company and acquires complete control. On his departure for New York, Erb stated that he had vast plans for the utilization of the lease of the government drydock shipyard, which is the chief asset of the company. Before leaving New York he had opened negotiations for a contract to build twenty tank vessels at figures approximating \$36,000,000.

VANCOUVER, April 8.—In reviewing the settlement of the Mullen case under which Newman Erb was suing for recovery of control of the shipyard and drydock at Prince Rupert, John L. Mullen and others, one who was intimately connected with the case here, and who has been in constant attendance at court, says that before the court opened Erb submitted proposals of settlement by which he would either buy or sell. Counter proposals were made between the two parties for a week and a half. In a final endeavor to effect a settlement Mr. Erb offered to pay much more than he offered to take. Under the final settlement the Mullen interests sell out to Erb and the action stands adjourned until Mr. Erb performs all obligations under the settlement. Should Mr. Erb fail to do his engagements, the action is to stand dismissed and the Mullen interests will be left in sole possession. All charges of conspiracy against the defendants have been withdrawn.

W FISHERY LEGISLATION

Provisions of Fish Inspection and Rules for Importing Fish Products.

EFFECTIVE HERE NOVEMBER FIRST

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

OTTAWA, April 9.—The House of Commons today took up a resolution to amend Dominion fish inspection legislation this morning. It proposes that the Act shall apply to all fish, including salmon, mackerel, herring, alewife, mackerel, and all other fish which are caught and marketed. The alewife is a small fish similar to the sprat but belongs to the sprat family. It is not found on this coast and its commercial value is not great. An important provision in the proposed amendment is "that all fish imported into Canada from foreign countries shall be packed in containers of similar character and of equal quality to that required under the proposed legislation, and shall be clearly marked with the kind and grade of fish they contain, and with the name of the country of origin. The proposed legislation would be brought into force with respect to fish caught on the Pacific coast on November 1, 1920, and on the Atlantic coast on April 1, 1921.

Commencing about 10 o'clock, the first few dances were played by Miss Mabel Adams. The regular orchestra for the evening was Gray's and they were, as usual, fully pleasing. The floor was in the best of condition and the night was excellent so there was nothing to mar the complete enjoyment of the affair.

HIGH PRICES BEING PAID FOR HALIBUT

Small Boats are Reaping Benefit From the Present Market Condition.

From the fishermen's point of view at least, the fish situation at this port is again very satisfactory. With the arrival of a number of refrigerator cars lately, that part of the trouble is over. The demand for fresh halibut is again strong and the supply scarce with the result that prices are high and promise to stay that way until some big arrivals are here, and there are none immediately in sight. In the meantime the small boats are doing well.

The Thelma arriving yesterday sold her 11,000 pound catch to the Pacific Sea Products at 17.2c and 13c. Today the following boats sold to the Atlin Fisheries at 18.6c and 15.5c which is the highest price paid in months: Reliance 4,000 lbs.; Cora, 6,000; Rosepit, 8,000, and Bayview, 5,000 lbs.

The Chicago Switchmen's Strike Spreads to Other Cities; Efforts to Break

(Special to the News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

CHICAGO, April 9.—Threatened by revolution as a result of the growing strike of insurgents among the railway switchmen, organized labor today considered appealing to the Government to take drastic measures to quash the strike.

Industries in many sections of the country were closed down today because of the inability to obtain supplies as a result of the unauthorized strike.

The strike has spread to leading railway centres of the nation from New York to San Francisco.

CHICAGO, April 9.—(later)—The unauthorized strike of switchmen and railroad engineers, which started in the Chicago district and spread to several cities, will be broken within the next 48 hours, A. F. Whitney, vice-president of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, and A. E. Heberling, international president of the Switchmen's union of North America, predicted this morning.

The traffic handled is still less than fifty per cent of normal. One thousand brotherhood men from other cities have answered the call to come as strike breakers.

PRINCE JOHN NOW AFLOAT

Raised Yesterday Morning and Will Leave for Rupert on Saturday.

Superintendent Beaumont has received word by wireless from Dead Tree Point, that the Prince John was raised at 11 a. m. yesterday and at 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon was anchored in Alford Bay.

It is expected to leave for Prince Rupert on Saturday, arriving here on Sunday or possibly earlier.

The salvage steamer Algerine is well fitted for the work of raising and repairing the vessel. Not only could she put in wooden or cement patches, but she had on board a well fitted machine shop and qualified mechanics so that a steel patch could be put in place if found desirable. The plan usually adopted is to put a temporary patch on the hole and then pump the vessel out, if necessary using auxiliary floats to make her more buoyant.

TEN KILLED IN JERUSALEM

Three British Officers Among the Wounded, Says Despatch to Times

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

LONDON, April 9.—It is reported that ten civilians were killed and 180 wounded and that three British officers were wounded in the disturbances in Jerusalem on Easter Sunday. There was a conflict between Jews, Moslems and Arabs. This news comes by way of Cairo in a special despatch to the Times dated April 7.

SEVEN HUNDRED TONS HERRING BAIT IS AT COLD STORAGE NOW

The herring bait pack at the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co. is coming along very satisfactorily according to the statement of T. H. Johnson, manager. Already between six and seven hundred tons have been brought in and iced down. It is expected that the objective of 1,000 tons will be reached before the run is over.

The last catch came in from Jap Inlet, Porcher Island, where two boats owned and operated by Jack Bradbury and Don Yelf are engaged in herring fishing.

The Granby Company's tug Tarter, with the barge Griff in tow, arrived from Anyox this morning and will take a barge load of fuel oil for Granby at the Imperial Oil dock as soon as the Dilworth has finished discharging.

New Liquor Law for Ontario Province

Measure Introduced into Legislature at Toronto Gets as Near to Bone Dry as is Possible

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

TORONTO, April 9.—In the Ontario Legislature a bill was introduced yesterday supplementing the Dominion legislation prohibiting the importation of liquor into Ontario. The measure is calculated to render the province as nearly as possible bone dry as rests within the power of the law.

Every person who, either by himself or his servant or his agent transports or carries liquor into Ontario for sale or consumption within the province or who delivers liquor to any person in Ontario for sale or consumption within the province, shall be guilty of an offence and subject to penalties provided.

The act does not forbid the sale, transportation or delivery of liquor for export from Ontario, transportation of liquor through Ontario from any place out of the province to any other place outside the province.

TWO TEACHERS ARE LEAVING

Miss Tingley and Mrs. Golden Will Resign April 30; Miss Rivet Appointed.

BUSINESS OF ROUTINE NATURE AT MEETING

At the regular monthly meeting of the school board last night the plans of the architect for the grading of the Hays Cove school site were adopted and the city may now go ahead with the alterations to the pipe line.

The resignations of Miss Tingley, vice-principal of the Borden Street School, and Mrs. Golden, of Seal Cove, were received and accepted. Miss Tingley is going to the Islands to be with her mother who is in poor health, and Mrs. Golden is accompanying her husband to Vancouver. Both resignations are effective April 30. Miss Rivet of the city has been appointed to the regular teaching staff and new teachers are being advertised for.

The matter of a schedule of salaries was discussed and the Board went on record as being in favor of keeping 15 per cent ahead of the scale existent in Vancouver.

A letter was read from David H. Hays inquiring why the Hays Block school room was being used for night classes contrary to the agreement with the owner. It was decided that this must be discontinued. The room was not being used for this purpose with the permission of the board.

A letter from the secretary of the Municipal Chapter, I.O.D.E., to Superintendent Macdonald inquiring why the flag was not raised over the King Edward School was received and filed. The reason given is that the weather conditions make it impossible.

ANGLO-FRENCH RELATIONS ARE NOT IMPROVING

Great Britain Does Not Approve of Occupation of Rhine Cities

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

LONDON, April 9.—The Times says a crisis has arisen in the Anglo-French relations and that, contrary to assurances that difference of opinion between the Allies regarding violation of the neutral zone by German troops were about to be settled under a friendly understanding, it appears that the British Government yesterday took steps to minimize their disagreement with the policy of France.

France is without the approval of Great Britain or the United States when she occupied the German Rhine cities, according to authoritative information today.

Housing is Still Important Problem.

Housing continues to be an important problem, for which there appears to be no solution. The demand for houses is increasing. People are being turned out of the places they are renting and they have nowhere to go. Houses which are becoming empty are spoken for a long time ahead. New dwellings are being erected, but the numbers are not anything like enough. Someone will have to build, that seems certain, but the difficulty is that so many people need all their capital in their rapidly extending businesses.

The cost of building is high, but lots are still at a moderate price and the present rents should be sufficiently high to warrant the erection of houses. The man who can invent a cheap house will be the greatest benefactor of the age.

It is not only in Prince Rupert that there is a scarcity of houses and that the rents are high. All along the coast the condition is the same, and if reports are to be believed there is just as great a shortage in the east of this continent and in Europe. Each community will have to do its share toward relieving the pressure.

In some parts of the country the municipalities are undertaking the erection of houses, which are to be sold to those needing them. In British Columbia the municipalities have no such powers, neither have they the resources with which to undertake the work. The building of sewers and roads will engage their attention for many a year.

In Prince Rupert there are still a number of old stores and other buildings that might be renovated and made fit for living premises. As an example, there is the Dominion Hotel and the Lynchs' store, both of which would make living quarters for families or single men. There are many other buildings not at present utilized. The owners are losing possible income and the community is losing the accommodation.

Innocent Paragraph Touches Someone.

An innocent editorial paragraph urging the more frequent use of the bathtub seems to have raised the ire of someone who construes the paragraph as an attack on the man who works at manual labor. Nothing could be farther from the facts. The man who works is the man who sweats and usually he is keen on bathing. He is the man who is healthy. Not infrequently it is the man with the sleek exterior who needs to make his ablutions more regularly.

Pilotage Question One for Consideration.

The big tanker Dilworth here with oil for the Imperial Oil Co. came up from San Francisco by the outside passage and wired to Vancouver for a pilot to bring her in by way of Dixon's Entrance. When she arrived off the strait on Wednesday the pilot had not arrived and in answer to a wireless message Capt. McCoskrie went out in the Narbethong to meet her and brought her in. Before she docked, the pilot from Vancouver had arrived.

This seems an impossible condition for a pilot to have to come all the way from Vancouver every time a steamer wishes to enter this port from the outside. There are men here who are able to do the work, and if there aren't, one should be appointed. This port is going to be a busy place and steps should at once be taken to see that in the matter of pilotage we are properly looked after. Delay means a great loss to shippers and there should be no handicap of any kind on people wishing to come to Prince Rupert, one of the most accessible harbors in the world.

The time used is Pacific Standard, for the 120th Meridian west. It is counted from 0 to 24 hours, from midnight to midnight.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

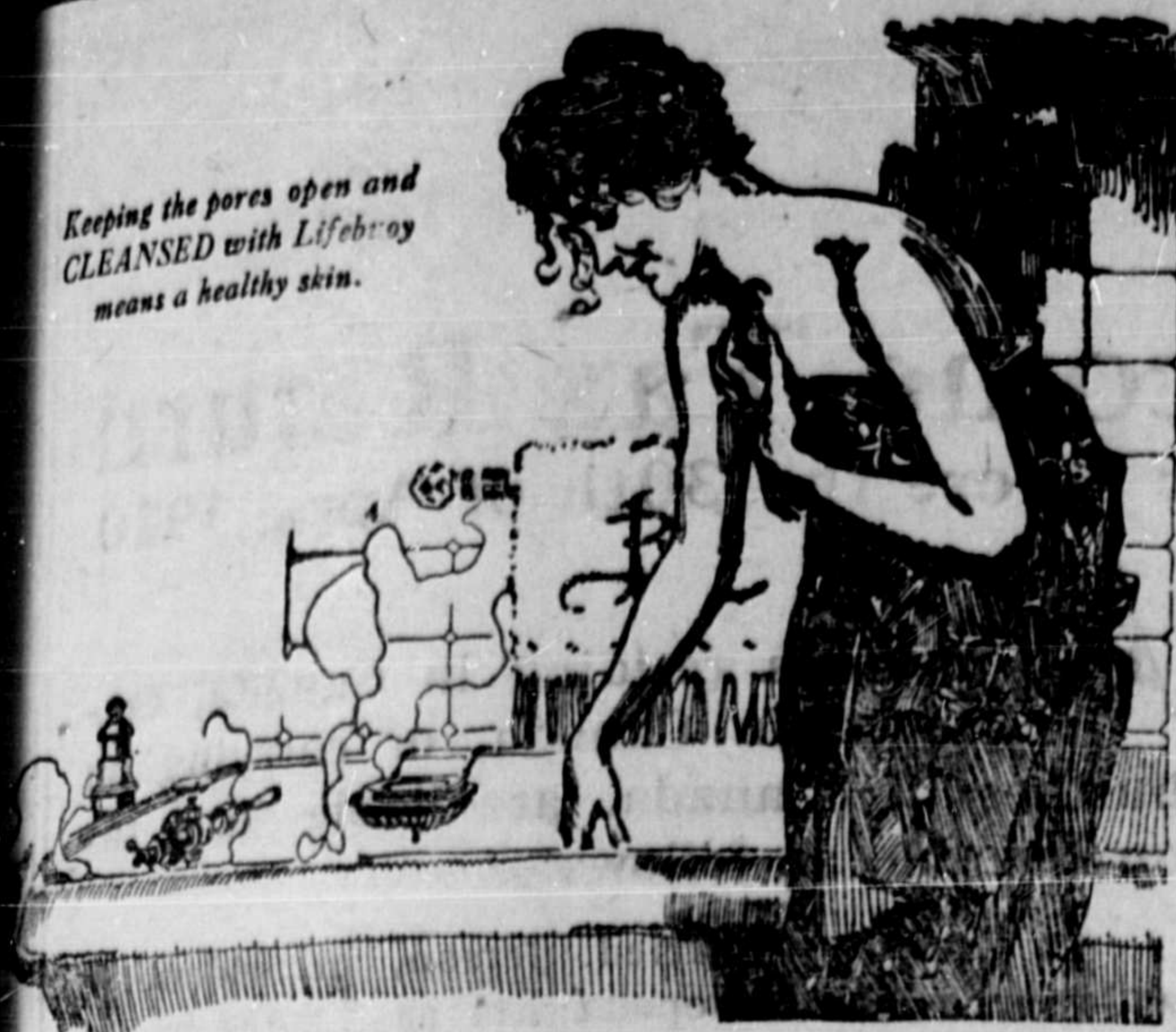

CODLIVER OIL ON THIS COAST

Proposal to Establish New Industry in This Neighborhood.

The following letter in regard to the manufacture of cod liver oil was read at the Board of Trade meeting on Tuesday evening and referred to a committee for report:

Sir,—I endeavored last year to obtain the assistance of the Board of Research at Ottawa to investigate at first hand the possible sources on the Pacific coast of an adequate substitute for cod liver oil to supersede the shark oil from Norway, which is largely used in Europe to supply the deficiency. But I have encountered vigorous opposition from the wholesale dealers and shippers of cod liver oil, who have denounced to the Board of Research any attempt to deprive them of their present monopoly, on the ground that it would be offering to the consumer an inferior grade of oil; ignoring the fact, of which the trade must be fully cognizant, that inferior oils such as shark liver oil have been, owing to the deficiency in supply of the real cod liver oil, in use in Europe for at least fifty years.

Question of Profits.

The reason for this opposition is patently an apprehension that the discovery of an adequate oil, and the inauguration of such an industry on the Pacific coast would deprive them of much of their present profits. I quote from a letter of one of the Eastern cod liver oil dealers, sent to me by the chairman of the Council of Research at Ottawa:

"I am not aware that cod is caught in sufficient quantities on the Pacific coast to warrant the development of the cod liver oil industry. In any case we should frown upon any attempt which might be made to utilize the livers of other fish than cod for the manufacture of medicinal oil."

The supremacy of cod liver is largely due to priority and custom. And certain hard facts refute the claim of the eastern dealers, that the oil they offer for sale is all obtained from the real cod.

Demand Large.

More than fifty years ago the increasing consumption in Europe compelled the substitution of other fish oils. Twenty years ago the rapidly decreasing catch of cod was officially reported. The bulk of the fish sold by the fishermen and the fishmongers as cod is not cod.

The manufacture of "Morrhua" (the medicinal component) from the oil can be learnt in a week. And the profits made by the French chemical firm who originated its manufacture approximate from three hundred to four hundred per cent of the cost in the market of the best quality of cod liver oil.

Hoping that the suggestion for a new industry for the Pacific coast cities may interest you to serious purpose.

DISALLOWANCE OF DOLLY VARDEN ACT IS COMMENTED ON

"According to a special despatch from Ottawa it is the intention of the Dominion Government to disallow the Dolly Varden Railway Act as passed at last year's session of the British Columbia legislature," says the Victoria Times editorially. "The suggestion is made at the capital that the case will be referred back to the courts of this province for settlement."

"Up till the present time no official information of disallowance has been received in Victoria. Several days ago, however, the legal representative of the Taylor Engineering Co.—in whose behalf the legislation was enacted—was asked by the deputy minister of justice to show cause why the act should not be disallowed. As the matter stands at the moment, the Government of this province apparently is not considered of sufficient importance by the Federal authorities to be advised of a pending decision in respect of one of the statutory enactments."

"As we have pointed out before there is no earthly reason why this measure should be interfered with by the Dominion Government. There is not a single phase in the whole question that is outside the competence of the provincial legislature. Nor must it be supposed for one moment that this province will take any other course than to re-enact the legislation should the Ottawa authorities disallow it. Certainly an opportunity should be taken in that event to demonstrate to the Federal Government, British Columbia's resentment of such an unwarranted invasion of the rights bestowed upon it by the terms of the Union."

It was stated in the Times a few days ago that in the event of disallowance of the Dolly Varden settlement of last session, Premier Oliver will cause a new measure to be brought in to be passed before the present session ends, re-enacting last year's settlement in favor of the Taylor Company.

Mining News

The building of coal bunkers for the Granby company's mine at Cassidy's Siding on Vancouver Island is now under way and they will likely be completed in a few weeks' time. The new bunkers are located on a small bay about a mile and a half south of Ladysmith off Oyster Bay. It had originally been intended to locate the bunkers across the harbor from Ladysmith and run a short railroad from Cassidy's to them but a number of circumstances made the later adopted plan the more economical. As it is now, the line of the E. & N. railroad is used and the only new railroad construction is the building of a short spur from the main line to the bunkers.

One of the diamond drills which has been used up the Ecstall river by the Granby company during last summer's season is being brought out soon to be taken up to Stewart. The big copper company is no doubt wide awake to the possibilities in that district and although its name has not been prominently connected with mining there, they are none the less interested in it. Their operations are not given widespread publicity but it is well known that they have made investigations in the Alice Arm district for some years. From all appearances it would seem that they had abandoned that field now but real miners don't think so. Big companies are very strong on that virtue, "watchful waiting" and the Granby is no exception.

A great deal of interest is being taken at the Seattle mining convention in the coal samples brought down from the North Thompson coal measures. As the seam now being opened up has attained a thickness of 43 inches, all clean coal, there seems to be every prospect of the property proving a commercial success. The product is a heavy, bright, bituminous coal, burning clearly without clinker and very little ash. Eight earloads have been shipped to the Queen Bess mine at Blackpool for test in the steam plant where it has proved superior to any fuel previously in use.

Reports indicate that there is an increasing demand for copper, and in response to this more activity has been manifested in the copper shares on the New York Stock Exchange. For some two years copper stocks have been sluggish, this being a direct reflection from falling off in the earnings from the early period of the world war. The statement that last year saw more copper consumed than ever before in the history of the industry was rather startling, since production for the most of the year was at a low ebb. On the other hand consumption was by no means a positive guide to production, since the amount consumed represented a reduction of the copper surplus. According to present figures this surplus has been practically eliminated, and with the establishment of a revolving fund to aid European purchasers of the metal, the copper should move freely to the point of demand and production would be expected to increase.

Once again the inventions of war are being used effectively in the pursuits of peace. The miners at Pincher, in the Oklahoma mining district, have adopted steel helmets when working in exposed places where fragments of rock are likely to drop from considerable heights as in shaft sinking. For many years Cornish miners working in similar places have used Derby hats that were hardened by painting with boiled linseed oil.

EXPLOSION PONCA CITY

Thirty-two persons sleeping in the Newscourt rooming house are thought to have been killed by an explosion which wrecked nearly twenty blocks. Many persons on the main street were nearly suffocated by gas.

ALL persons residing in Canada, employed in Canada, or carrying on business in Canada, are liable to a tax on income, as follows:—

1. Every unmarried person, or widow, or widower, without dependants as defined by the Act, who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$1,000 or more.
2. All other individuals who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$2,000 or more.
3. Every corporation and joint stock company whose profits exceeded \$2,000 during the fiscal year ended in 1919.

Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 30th of April, 1920.

ALL INDIVIDUALS other than farmers and ranchers must use Form T 1.

FARMERS AND RANCHERS must use Form T 1A.

CORPORATIONS and joint stock companies must use Form T 2.

Penalty

Every person required to make a return, who fails to do so within the time limit, shall be subject to a penalty of Twenty-five per centum of the amount of the tax payable.

Any person, whether taxable, or otherwise, who fails to make a return or provide information duly required according to the provision of the Act, shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty of \$100 for each day during which the default continues. Also any person making a false statement in any return or in any information required by the Minister, shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding \$10,000, or to six months' imprisonment or to both fine and imprisonment.

Sport Briefs

Terrace has jumped right into the sport ring again after having been inactive for some years. Now that their boys are back from the front and many new ones are coming in, the spring weather has done the rest. Last week they not only formed a baseball association but also have started a band. The new baseball club has as its manager D. F. Robinson and Mr. McGrath secretary. With the number of new players to draw upon the club will have a creditable baseball lineup and they look forward to having some well contested games this summer with outside teams. All the old regalia and uniforms are being gathered up again. W. C. Sparkes and L. H. Kenny are president and secretary respectively of the band.

Terrace seems to have taken the lead for the whole district in baseball lines in announcing its organization. There doesn't seem to be a word about sport of any kind at other points and not much of an idea can be gained as to what they will have to show. Even Prince Rupert seems to have gone dead in a sporting way. This is no doubt due to the past week's wintry looking weather. Outside of Ben Self stating that he is going to set the ball rolling soon, nothing is mentioned officially about baseball. No doubt it will start with a rush when it does start, however. The time is getting ripe for organization work and we ought to see some pretty soon.

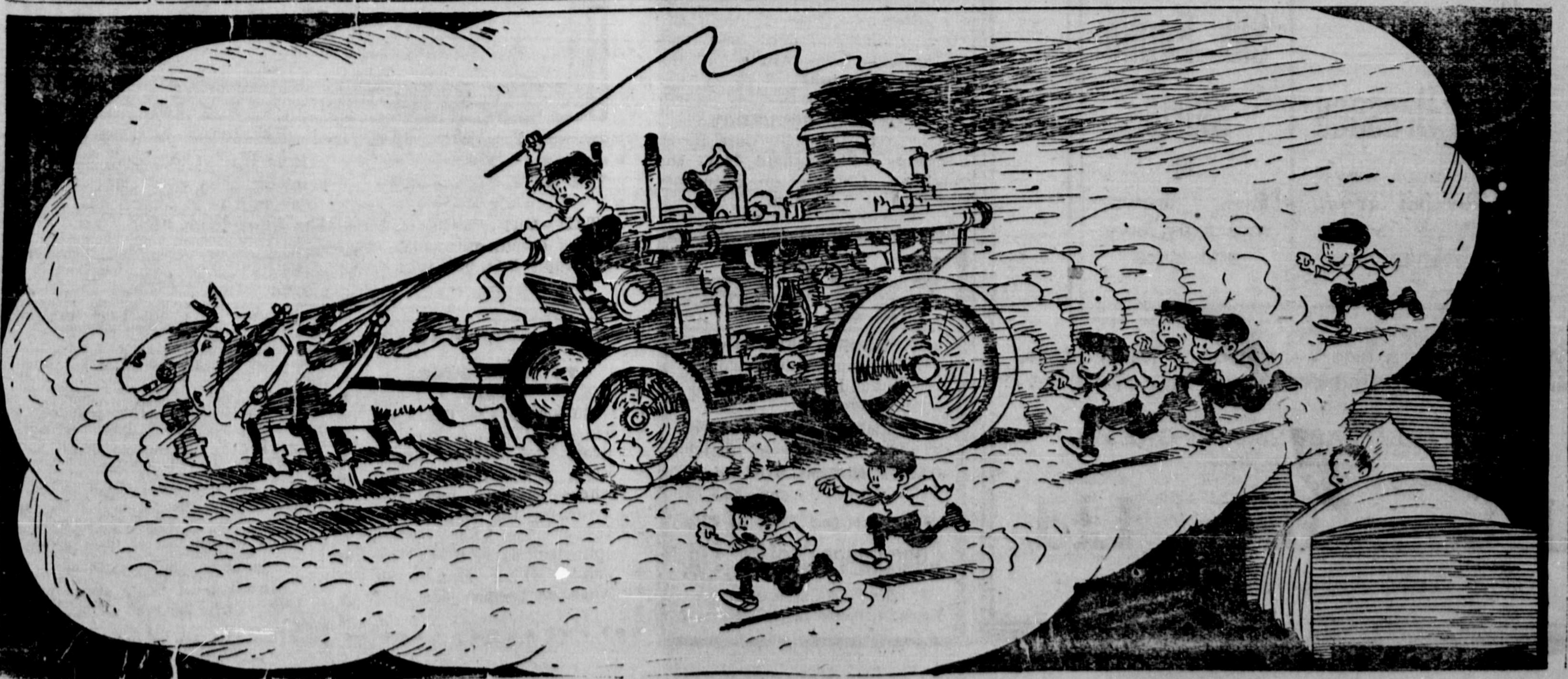
