Settlement of Big Lawsuit.

Prince Rupert people will be very pleased to know that the big lawsuit has been settled, and that now there is a prospect of work going ahead more rapidly at the shipyards and that further contracts may be secured for other ships than those now under construction. Under the general management of E. P Rust and with J. H. Pullsbury as superintendent the work has been making fairly good progress of late. Now there should be an impetus given to the work of construction and Prince Rupert should be a busy place for some time to come.

Townsite Trouble

At Hazelton.

The progress of the town of New Hazelton is much impeded by the fact that nearly all the land in the neighborhood is subdivided into townsites and that some of the lots in this have been sold to men who are paying the taxes on them. The result is that something like ten thousand acres of good cultivable land is tied up in such a way that it cannot be cultivated. The condition is disastrous to the community.

Good Steamship Service to Stewart.

The news that Stewart is to get a first class weekly steamship service commencing very soon will be good news to residents Simpson but the time for Prince of that place and to those who will be doing business with the Rupert varies only a few minutes mining town. DISCUSS PAVING

Committee of Board of Trade Met Works Committee of Council Last Night.

Last night a committee of the Board of Trade consisting of President Parker, J. H. Pillsbury, M. P. McCaffery and H. F. Pullen, met the Works Committee of the City Council in the engineer's office and discussed with them the possibility of laying permanent paving on the busier streets of the city. The Works Committee consisted of Aldermen Currie, Kerr, Casey and Roches-

The whole situation was canvassed and it finally came out that the only difficulty in the way was one of finance. At present the city has power to work under a local improvement scheme by which the property owners pay for the improvements on a frontage basis. As the whole city would benefit from the improvements it was felt that this would not be ust, especially as the taxes n Section 1 are already at the breaking point.

Mayor Vetoed Plan.

Alderman Casey explained that the Board of Works, of which he was chairman, last year ordered a letter sent to the municipal inspector at Victoria suggesting a plan for making a single local improvement district of the whole city and asking for his approval. This letter was never sent. The committee wondered why a reply had not been received, but it was not until recently that it came ou. ... at the mayor had vetoed th letter. It was on business connected with this financing that the mayor was now in Victoria. but they did not expect to get any action this year as it was too late to get a special bill through the Legislature.

Engineer Clements said he was opposed to putting down permanent streets until after the new sewer system was installed. In answer to a question he admitted that it must be several years before that was done. He thought a good macadam sur-facing would answer the purpose. FIRST EVENT IN Differing Methods.

At the conclusion of the conference the chairman of the com mittee thanked the Board of Trade for the interest they were taking in this matter, and the president of the Board expressed appreciation of the courtesy they had received from the committee and said he thought the conference had not been altogether without benefit. Department of Finance

ALL persons residing in Canada, em-ployed in Canada, or carrying on business in Canada, are liable to a tax on income, as follows:-

1. Every unmarried person, or widow, or widower, without dependants as defined by the Act, who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$1,000 or more.

2. All other individuals who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$2,000 or more.

3. Every corporation and joint stock company whose profits exceeded \$2,000 during the fiscal year ended in 1919.

Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 30th of April, 1920.

ALL INDIVIDUALS other than farmers and ranchers must use Form T 1.

FARMERS AND RANCHERS must use Form T 1A.

CORPORATIONS and joint stock companies must use Form

Penalty

Every person required to make a return, who fails to do so within the time limit, shall be subject to a penalty of Twenty-five per centum of the amount of the tax payable.

Any person, whether taxable, or otherwise. who fails to make a return or provide information duly required according to the provision of the Act, shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty of \$100 for each day during which the default continues. Also any person making a false statement in any return or in any information required by the Minister, shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding \$10,000, or to six months' imprisonment or to both fine and imprisonment;




