Insurgent Strike Still Going Strong

Reported Break on One Railway, but Scope is Extended; Senate Refers Matter to Commerce Committee for Report

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
CHICAGO, April 10.—The "outlaw" strike of railroad employees continues to spread today although the situation is less serious in Chicago, the headquarters of the insurgent movement. The strike has extended to Milwaukee, Indianapolis, New York, Columbus, Ohio, and other centres. New York striking yardmen and switchmen were joined by 100 men.

CHICAGO, April 10.—(Later.) A break in the unauthorized strike of switchmen and engineers which started nine days ago has subsequently spread to a number of other centres. A number of railroad centres was freed today by A. A. Whitely, president of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, who conferred with the committee members from the Chicago and Western Railroad. The delegates said to have told Whitely that a vote would be taken in 24 hours with a view to ending the strike on that rail- Saturday night.

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RENT CASES IN NEW YORK

Over Four Thousand Cases Dealt with by Court During the Week

NEW YORK, April 10.—Rent cases heard in New York courts this week since the passage of the anti-profiteering measure, have passed the four thousand mark. Restriction of rents to 25 per cent more than those paid a year ago, caused such joy among 500 tenants in a Bronx court that Mr. Justice Robitzek broke his gavel maintaining order.

FIUME PROBLEM IS NOW SETTLED

Telegram from Trieste to Geneva Tells of Agreement Between Jugo-Slavs and Italians.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
GENEVA, April 10.—A telegram received from Trieste asserts that the Italo-Jugo-Slavic commission, which has been in conference regarding an Adriatic settlement, has reached an agreement in regard to the ports. Under it Italy obtains sovereignty over Fiume, the Jugo-Slavs, according to the agreement, would receive Susak, the Canal Della Fiumara, Porto Baross and the port of Volosca. The port of Abbazia, to the southeast of Volosca, would remain Italian with the Jugo Slavs receiving Scutari, on the Albanian coast, as compensation.

JUDGMENT GIVEN IN FAVOR WORKMEN AT ISLAND LUMBER CAMP

The workmen who have been suing the Port Elements Box and Lumber Co., the Massett Inlet Lumber Co., and the Edmonton Lumber Exchange for wages at the camp on Queen Charlotte Islands have obtained a judgment in their favor. In his finding Judge Young gives them lien rights on 195,000 feet of lumber in the yards at Port Clements which belongs jointly to the Port Clements and Massett companies. This judgment will cover their wages amply, it is believed.

The workmen concerned include Baga Singh, Arthur Ives, Richard Briggs, Baghan Singh, David Crocker, B. Goedkoop, J. Whyte, Rala Singh, A. A. McRae, Thakar Singh, and Harry Plaster. M. Gonzales, of the firm of Williams & Manson, was the successful lawyer for the plaintiffs. The Port Clements Box and Lumber Co was represented by W. O. Fulton, and W. E. Fisher appeared for the Edmonton Lumber Exchange.

RULE OF ROAD BEING CHANGED

Bill Tabled Yesterday in Legislature by Hon. Dr. King.

VICTORIA, April 10.—The rule of the road will be changed in Prince Rupert probably on July 15 of this year. Provision for the change is contained in a bill tabled in the Legislature yesterday by Hon. Dr. King, minister of public works.

Conciliatory Reply from France Regarding Matter Of the German Occupation

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
COBLENZ, April 10.—Belgium is backing France in the occupation of German cities. Notification was given through the Belgian military mission of the participation of Belgium in the French action in occupying Frankfurt and neighboring towns. Belgium is sending a detachment of troops with the French in order to mark its co-operation.

Government Again Refuses Cash Grant to Ex-Soldiers

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
OTTAWA, April 10.—In the House of Commons yesterday the acting prime minister, Sir George Foster, stated that the Government had not changed its views in regard to the granting of a cash bonus to returned soldiers. It did not consider it a wise measure of re-establishment to place a lump sum of money in the hands of each returned man.

DIFFERENCE IN CAUCUS OVER FRANCHISE ACT

Liberal Unionists Want it Drawn on National Lines.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
OTTAWA, April 10.—Sir Geo. E. Foster pleaded in the Unionist caucus yesterday that a Franchise Act drawn on broad national rather than political lines would best become Canada now that war is over. He did not carry with him all Conservative Unionists. Liberal and western Unionists have always favored more or less openly this policy, but there is a small group of Ontario members who declare that the Government is simply drawing a razor across its throat by allowing aliens of western Canada to have the vote. Certain Conservative Unionists say that they will move an amendment to the Franchise Act as the bill is reported, in order that they may have the opportunity of lining up the members personally on the question.

EVACUATION OF RUHR HAS BEGUN

German Government Troops Restore Order in Essen, Says Report.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
HEADQUARTERS OF THE ARMY, Mayence, April 10.—Last night the German Reichswehr held the front of Duisburg, Mulheim, Essen, Dortsund, and Iserlohn. It is reported also that they have occupied Hagen. Dusseldorf had not been entered by the Reichswehr but the troops were a few miles north of the city.

PARIS, April 10.—According to information received by the Havas Agency from Cologne, the Reichswehr were reported to have begun the evacuation of the Ruhr district. According to reports from Essen, order has been restored there.

PURCHASES 1,000 ACRES

President of the Grain Growers to Farm Near Telkwa.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
VANCOUVER, April 10.—John Kennedy, vice-president of the United Grain Growers, has purchased 1,000 acres of land in the Bulkley Valley near Telkwa and will have 100 acres in crop this year.

The Prince Rupert Board of Trade has extended an invitation to the Canadian Fisheries Association to have their delegates visit Prince Rupert while they are on the coast at the convention to be held in Vancouver in June.

BELGIUM BACKS FRANCE IN OCCUPATION OF GERMAN CITIES

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

LONDON, April 10.—The reply of France to the British note on the action taken by France in occupying part of Germany has been received. It is maintained that France gave Great Britain ample warning on April 6 that France considered it necessary to take military steps if Germany failed to withdraw her troops. The note concludes with the expression of the wish of France to act in accordance with the wishes of the Allies.

The British Foreign Office has not stated what form the warning to France took. Officials here, however, view the reply as conciliatory and it has relieved the tension of yesterday.

PARIS, April 10.—Dr. Goepphet, head of the German peace delegation, has addressed to Premier Millerand, as president of the Peace Conference, a note asking an extension of three months after April 10 for the reduction of German military effectives.

COMPEIGNE, France, April 10.—Shipments of German cattle into France in accordance with the terms of the Versailles treaty have begun.

BURIED SHELLS CAUSE TROUBLE

Explode in Fields and Kill and Injure Those Who Are Near.

CAMBRAI, France, April 10.—Two explosions, in which twelve persons were killed and two injured, occurred in the district of Villers Guislain. The explosions were caused by agricultural tractors coming in contact with unexploded shells in fields which were being plowed.

WEEKLY BOATS TO STEWART

Prince George to Initiate Service With Mining Town, Leaving Vancouver April 21.

The summer service with the big steamers Prince George and Prince Rupert will commence this year earlier than usual. The Prince George which has been out of commission undergoing overhaul, will re-enter the service, sailing from Victoria April 21 for Seattle, then to Vancouver, leaving there at 8 p. m. Thursday and arriving here the following Saturday morning. She leaves here at 10 p. m. Saturday night for Stewart and arrives back on Sunday evening at 8, setting out at midnight as usual for Vancouver.

This will give Stewart a regular weekly service. The Prince Rupert will continue as at present giving a weekly service to Anyox.

The Prince Albert will give a fortnightly service to the Islands until such time as the Prince John is repaired, and will spend the intervening time in carrying tinplate and supplies to the Alaska canneries and bringing heavy freight from Vancouver.

LONGEST TOW IN ANNALS OF COAST

VICTORIA, April 10.—Completing the longest tow ever recorded in Pacific marine annals, the tug Hero, with the auxiliary schooner Laurel Whalen has arrived here. The Hero towed her from Tahiti, where she had been damaged in a storm, to Honolulu and thence to the British Columbia coast.

Settlement of Big Lawsuit.

Prince Rupert people will be very pleased to know that the big lawsuit has been settled, and that now there is a prospect of work going ahead more rapidly at the shipyards and that further contracts may be secured for other ships than those now under construction. Under the general management of E. P. Rust and with J. H. Pullsberry as superintendent the work has been making fairly good progress of late. Now there should be an impetus given to the work of construction and Prince Rupert should be a busy place for some time to come.

Townsite Trouble At Hazelton.

The progress of the town of New Hazelton is much impeded by the fact that nearly all the land in the neighborhood is subdivided into townsites and that some of the lots in this have been sold to men who are paying the taxes on them. The result is that something like ten thousand acres of good cultivable land is tied up in such a way that it cannot be cultivated. The condition is disastrous to the community.

Good Steamship Service to Stewart.

The news that Stewart is to get a first class weekly steamship service commencing very soon will be good news to residents of that place and to those who will be doing business with the mining town. The Grand Trunk Pacific Railway people recognize that there are going to be great doings at the camp this year and they are offering every facility for the development of the mines at that place. Dolphins are being driven so that the old wharf may be utilized until such time as W. T. Muse has completed the new structure for the Dominion Government.

Roads as a Factor In Civilization.

Just now Prince Rupert is wrestling with the problem of better roads. It is the same problem that is engaging the attention of every other community. It is very important for good roads are one of the most important civilizing agencies the country has. In the old days when people remained at home and no one knew anything beyond the little village or town in which they lived, ignorance and prejudice and oppression flourished. As people were able to get out and meet other people they became broader of outlook.

Prince Rupert is rather badly shut in. We have steamship and railway services but we need one thing more. We need to be able to get out of town by means of a road. We shall get it, but we must keep working for it. First of all we must make our own city roads fit to drive on, and then we may expect some help to build provincial roads.

PRINCE RUPERT TIDES

The time used is Pacific Standard, for the 120th Meridian west. It is counted from 0 to 24 hours, from midnight to midnight.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

DISCUSS PAVING OF CITY STREETS

Committee of Board of Trade Met Works Committee of Council Last Night.

Last night a committee of the Board of Trade consisting of President Parker, J. H. Pillsbury, M. P. McCaffery and H. F. Pullen, met the Works Committee of the City Council in the engineer's office and discussed with them the possibility of laying permanent paving on the busier streets of the city. The Works Committee consisted of Aldermen Currie, Kerr, Casey and Rochester.

The whole situation was canvassed and it finally came out that the only difficulty in the way was one of finance. At present the city has power to work under a local improvement scheme by which the property owners pay for the improvements on a frontage basis. As the whole city would benefit from the improvements it was felt that this would not be just, especially as the taxes in Section 4 are already at the breaking point.

Mayor Vetoes Plan.

Alderman Casey explained that the Board of Works, of which he was chairman, last year ordered a letter sent to the municipal inspector at Victoria suggesting a plan for making a single local improvement district of the whole city and asking for his approval. This letter was never sent. The committee wondered why a reply had not been received, but it was not until recently that it came out that the mayor had vetoed the letter. It was on business connected with this financing that the mayor was now in Victoria, but they did not expect to get any action this year as it was too late to get a special bill through the Legislature.

Engineer Clements said he was opposed to putting down permanent streets until after the new sewer system was installed. In answer to a question he admitted that it must be several years before that was done. He thought a good macadam surfacing would answer the purpose.

Differing Methods.

J. H. Pillsbury thought a roadway up the centre of the streets wide enough for two teams to pass would answer the purpose and the sewer and other pipes could then be laid on the sides or in the lanes. He and the engineer discussed different kinds of roads and road material but no progress was made as finance was the one thing in the way.

At the conclusion of the conference the chairman of the committee thanked the Board of Trade for the interest they were taking in this matter, and the president of the Board expressed appreciation of the courtesy they had received from the committee and said he thought the conference had not been altogether without benefit. The work the city propose to do would at any rate be valuable preparatory to a paving scheme.

NEW MINISTER SPOKE BEFORE CORNER CLUB

Addressed Gathering of Nearly Sixty on Friendship—Games and Refreshments.

About fifty-five members of the Corner Club assembled in the Baptist Church social hall last night to hear an address by Rev. James Dunlop, the new minister, on "Friendship." Mr. Dunlop, who is an interesting speaker, covered the subject in an able manner and emphasized the necessity for careful selection of one's friends.

Mrs. J. P. Wright sang a solo which was loudly applauded. Following this, games were played and after appetizing refreshments had been served the party broke up after one of the most successful evenings of the season.

T. H. Johnson and J. F. Maguire have been delegated by the Board of Trade as members of the War Memorial Committee. Besides these, Alderman Murray, Alderman Casey, Dr. McNeill, J. W. Nicholls, James Campbell, W. A. Mathieson and D. S. Cameron comprise the committee.

Dominion of Canada



Department of Finance

ALL persons residing in Canada, employed in Canada, or carrying on business in Canada, are liable to a tax on income, as follows:—

- 1. Every unmarried person, or widow, or widower, without dependants as defined by the Act, who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$1,000 or more.
- 2. All other individuals who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$2,000 or more.
- 3. Every corporation and joint stock company whose profits exceeded \$2,000 during the fiscal year ended in 1919.

Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 30th of April, 1920.

ALL INDIVIDUALS other than farmers and ranchers must use Form T 1.

FARMERS AND RANCHERS must use Form T 1A.

CORPORATIONS and joint stock companies must use Form T 2.

Penalty

Every person required to make a return, who fails to do so within the time limit, shall be subject to a penalty of Twenty-five per centum of the amount of the tax payable.

Any person, whether taxable, or otherwise, who fails to make a return or provide information duly required according to the provision of the Act, shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty of \$100 for each day during which the default continues. Also any person making a false statement in any return or in any information required by the Minister, shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding \$10,000, or to six months imprisonment or to both fine and imprisonment.

General Instructions.

Obtain Forms from the Inspectors or Assistant Inspectors of Taxation or from Postmasters.

Read carefully all instructions on Form before filling it in.

Prepay postage on letters and documents forwarded by mail to Inspectors of Taxation.

Make your returns promptly and avoid penalties.

NEW HAZELTON MINES ACTIVE

Much Development is Proceeding and Good Ore Found at Several Properties.

NEW HAZELTON, April 9.—There are persistent rumors here to the effect that the American Boy mine is to resume operations on a much larger scale than before.

At the Silver Standard Number 1 vein at a depth of 125 feet widened out in the north drift to a thickness of five feet in good milling ore with several streaks of shipping ore.

Work has started on the Erie mine on Four Mile Mountain across the river from New Hazelton. The contract has been let for a 150-ft. crosscut tunnel to connect with a shaft sunk several years ago.

One Nine Mile Mountain the American Smelting and Refining Co. have sunk a shaft 30 feet in good ore all the way.

The owners of the Delta property on Rocher deBoule Mountain have a gang of men working on a tunnel contract. They have encountered pockets of ore although still 250 feet from their objective.

FRANCHISE BILL IS UNDER DISCUSSION

Chief Electoral Officer to be Appointed for Life.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.) OTTAWA, April 9.—There was been discussion of the Franchise Bill in the House of Commons yesterday. Under the provisions of the bill a chief electoral officer is appointed. His appointment will mean the abolition of the office of the clerk of the crown in chancery, an office which dates back in Canadian history for a century or more.

Under the bill it is proposed that the parliamentary counsel of the House of Commons shall also be chief electoral officer. He shall be appointed for life and removable only as a superior court judge may be removed.
