## Sonora State Breaks Away From Mexico; Forms Republic

### Officials Seize American Railway and Reinstate Strikers; Customs Houses and Other Federal Property Taken Over

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
MAGDALES, April 12.—The state of Sonora withdrew from the Republic of Mexico on Saturday. The state congress in a secret session which lasted all Friday night, held at Hermosillo, voted to resist with armed force any attempt of the Carranza Government of Mexico to send troops into the state.  
The action of the state of Sonora resulted from President Carranza's order to send federal troops into the state.  
Sonora officials seized the Southern Pacific of Mexico on Saturday. This is an American railroad whose employees had been on strike. All the strikers were put back at work with the guarantee of the fulfilment of their demands.  
The customs houses and all property of the federal government of Mexico were formally seized in the name of "The Republic of Sonora" simultaneously with the receipt of a report of clash between Carranza soldiers and Sonora state troops at Ymas.

## Inverness Cannery Goes Up in Flames

### Thirty-three Boats and Immense Quantity of Gear as well as Some of Last Year's Pack Destroyed, Whole Worth \$150,000

Yesterday morning at an early hour the Inverness Cannery on the Big Slough of the Skeena River, about eleven miles distant from Prince Rupert was totally destroyed by fire as well as all the boats and gear and some of last year's salmon pack. The loss is estimated at about \$150,000. While the cannery and store are gone, all the dwellings were saved, the buildings on the east being the factor of safety for them. The fire did not last long. It started about 1 a. m. and before the people there realized it, the whole place was ablaze and some waterpipes had been melted thus making the water power ineffective. The blaze was plain from this city by those who happened to be going home in the morning.

Everything Gone.  
The nets were in the building at the time and it is possible the net lofts may have been a point for the fire, as some of the gear was in the building and would set the place on fire immediately. There were 63 boats and all the gear and canning machinery, besides several thousand pounds of chums and pinks left from last year's pack.

The price of halibut at the waterfront is still going up and yesterday 19.2c was brought at the fish sale. This is getting close to the record price of last November when the highest price of 19.9c was reached. Cars are not plentiful but are sufficient to meet immediate demands.

## WAGE DISPUTE NOW SETTLED

### Cold Storage and Fishpackers Come to Settlement—87 1/2c Per Hour With Thirty Days' Notice.

The dispute between the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co. and the Fishpackers Union as to an increase of wages for men engaged in packing fish has now been finally settled amicably.

At the meeting of the Fishpackers Union last night it was decided to accept the finding of the Conciliation Board as to an increase of wages with the exception of the clause making the new scale for one year's time.

This morning T. H. Johnson, manager of the Cold Storage, stated that a final agreement had been arranged and the question is closed. The new scale is effective with the provision of a 30 days' notice for change.

The fishpackers, under the new scale, will receive 87 1/2c per hour, an increase from 60c, this raise to be retroactive from February 24 with overtime in proportion. An additional bonus of \$1 a week is also given to inside freezermen.

## English Election Results Prove Most Interesting

### Labor gets an Enormous Gain in Dartford, but Loses Out in Stockport, where Sir Leo Money is Defeated

LONDON, April 12.—In the Dartford constituency where the election was held on March 27, J. Mills, the labor candidate, received 13,610 votes. R. Mellor, coalition Unionist, and Tom Wing, independent Liberal, leading candidates who opposed Mills, polled between four and five thousand votes each. The vacancy was caused by the death of J. Rowlands, Liberal, who in 1918 had a majority of 9,420 over his labor opponent.

## PROPOSAL FOR ARMENIA IS BEFORE LEAGUE

### Hon Herbert Fisher on Behalf of Great Britain Brings Matter Formally Before Gathering.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
PARIS, April 12.—The fourth public sitting of the League of Nations took place in Luzemburg Palace with Leon Bourgeois, president of the French Association of the Society of Nations, presiding.

Herbert A. L. Fisher, British Minister of Education, representing Great Britain, read a report on the Armenian situation, advocating the construction of a state of Armenia on a free and independent basis. The best means for reaching such a solution, the report said, was the acceptance of a mandate for Armenia by some state under the League of Nations.

## RAILWAYMEN ARE STILL OUT

### Men on Pennsylvania Vote to Return to Work, But no General Movement to Return.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
CHICAGO, April 12.—The first important break in the unauthorized strike of railroad employees, which started in the Chicago terminal district nearly two weeks ago, occurred last night at Columbus, when 600 switchmen on the Pennsylvania Railroad voted to return to work.

Although there was no general movement back to work among the 40,000 men reported on strike throughout the country, defalcations from the ranks of the insurgents were reported yesterday and today in Chicago, Kansas City, California and several other places, and leaders were confident that the peak of the strike movement was reached. Others claimed that the strike was gaining momentum daily.

## THREATENED BREAK UP OF GERMANY IS REPORTED AT BERLIN

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
BERLIN, April 12.—Major General Baron von Luttwitz, who played a leading part in the recent Berlin revolution, is reported to be preparing for a fresh revolution in Germany.

Reports of a new reactionary plot and movement to declare a separation of the south German states, led by Bavaria, continues current here. The Government has taken measures to prevent disorders.

## MEMORIAL TABLET TO ALL MEMBERS OF PRINCE RUPERT CLUB WHO FELL OVERSEAS

### Formal Unveiling Took Place Yesterday Afternoon with Addresses by Judge Young and Lieut.-Col. McMordie

On Sunday afternoon there was a notable gathering of the members of the Prince Rupert Club in the big sitting room upstairs, to unveil a bronze tablet in honor of ten members who had fallen overseas during the great war. President James McRae was in charge of the arrangements and the unveiling ceremony was conducted by Judge Young, while Lieut.-Col. McMordie gave a short address. A verse of "O Canada" was sung and the hymn "Blest be the Tie that Binds," Professor Harvey leading with the violin.

In his address, Judge Young said he sincerely deplored the necessity of this gathering. The boys whom they honored that day had paid the supreme sacrifice and had not returned and they were there to express their sorrow and to perpetuate, as fully as possible, the sacrifice they had made in the cause of liberty and justice. They knew the boys, knew them well, and were aware of the sense of courage, of justice and honor that had inspired them. Knowing their high ideals all expected them to volunteer for service, it would have been a disappointment had they done otherwise. All realized the dangers and knew that all who went overseas were in the midst of death, destruction and carnage. Still it was a great shock to hear of their deaths for they were expected home.

**Great Event.**  
The speaker said he was unable to express the feelings of those present in adequate language. No man could do justice to such an occasion as this. He knew if the lads were in the great spirit land and possibly present on that occasion, at the first suggestion of fulsome flattery they would disappear. Death was one of the greatest events in life and one of the noblest when it came in the defence of liberty. If the cause were just, no matter what had been the faults of those who fell, if any, he knew that they appeared before their maker with a clean slate.

In conclusion the judge said that the sympathy of the members of the club were not with those who had gone but with those left behind and with the Empire. He said this advisedly. Men such as they were needed in these days of civil strife. The memories of those who had gone would ever be green. It was to honor them that they unveiled the tablet that day.

**Colonel McMordie.**  
Lieut.-Col. McMordie mentioned that faith had been kept with the dead. The war had been carried on until victory had been secured. He recalled the time five years ago when the world trembled at the ambition of the Hun and when these friends who were gone had stepped forward and volunteered and exclaimed "Here I am, send me."

The sacrifice of these men was not in vain. The war had been carried through to a triumphant conclusion. It was a proud part this country had played. The war had proved that chivalry was not dead, that Christianity still lives. These friends whom they honored had given up their lives that all might continue to enjoy freedom. They could express appreciation best by keeping green their memories of those who had fallen. It should make them more kindly with each other.

**Greatest Thing.**  
Concluding, the colonel said we would not have them return.

**IRISH WORRIED AT TREATMENT OF PRISONERS**

DUBLIN, April 12.—Officials of the Irish Trades Union Congress and Labor Party today issued a call to the workers of Ireland for a general strike throughout the country tomorrow as a protest against the treatment of political prisoners.

#### Sunday Concerts

Should be Encouraged.

The enterprise and public spirit of the organizers of the Sunday concerts is most commendable and it will be a thousand pities if the people who attend do not make it possible to continue the series until the fine weather sets in. A great deal of work is involved and it is for the people of the city to show their appreciation by giving with sufficient liberality to insure continuation. The concert of last night was worth, commercially, anything from one to two dollars, but very few of those who attended paid anything like that sum. It is only the fact that it is a Sunday night event that makes it possible to continue.

#### Rule of Road

IS to Be Changed.

The rule of the road is to be changed, and drivers will have to pass on the right instead of on the left as heretofore, if the bill recently introduced passes the Legislature. Unfortunately the cost of changing all the cars on the B. C. Electric Railway at Victoria and Vancouver will be so great that it was impossible to make the change there without giving suitable notice.

During the last few years hundreds of cars have come from the States into Canada and Canadian cars have gone south into Washington state and farther down the coast. The result has been that there has been much confusion among drivers. When British Columbia falls in line with the rest of the continent in the matter of the rule of the road, this confusion will be eliminated and the danger of collision lessened. We had to fall in line some day. Why not now?

#### Impressive Ceremony

At Prince Rupert Club.

There was an impressive ceremony at the Prince Rupert Club yesterday when a bronze tablet was unveiled in honor of the members who lost their lives overseas. There was a feeling of solemnity in connection with the occasion which befitted the event. Hymns were sung at the club for the first time in the history of the institution and members showed that they appreciated the sacrifices that their fellow members had made and revered their memory.

#### Apartment Houses

May Solve Difficulty.

The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson. The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

## RAY COLLISHAW TELLS OF LIFE AMONG BOLSHIS.

### Officers' Wives and Families Murdered Made Cowards of the Men

Col. Raymond Collishaw, Canadian ace, concerning whose safety anxiety has been felt, has been busy in a two thousand mile retreat before the Bolshevik hordes in South Russia, an experience which he graphically describes in a letter to Captain J. W. G. Clark of Toronto. The letter is dated January 25 from the British military mission, 47th Squadron, R.A.F.

#### After Fever Attack

Col. Collishaw said: "I wrote and told you something of my evil days in hospital with typhus fever contracted on the Tzaritsan front. I soon rejoined my squadron and very soon the Bolshevik hordes began to advance against the volunteer army, but the main line of attack was on the left flank of the army, so we moved from Tzaritsa to Kursk to protect the Kharkov area.

The enemy came on in flocks, and as we went up quite close to the line with our trains they advanced quite close and we had great difficulty in finding a locomotive to pull our show further to the rear during the evacuation. During this time we erected twenty D.H.G.A.'s in forty degrees below zero. Some game, as you can imagine. But our men were "full out," and we accomplished the task. In addition we maintained a constant reconnaissance for the army headquarters. At this time priceless targets for the Camels and Snipes presented themselves and our scout pilots enjoyed a most interesting session every day, with flocks of Red cavalry parading openly upon prairie plains. This, in addition to the terrific bombing from the D.H.G.A. and D.H.G. flights, upset the enemy advance mostly and allowed our army to retire in a somewhat orderly fashion.

#### Officers' Families Murdered

The Bolsheviks now began to torture and murder the family of every officer they found, which could only result in many officers deliberately deserting their regiments to return and bring their families to the rear by trains. These officers were desperate, and in their anxiety to safeguard their families they became uncontrollable, and everyone was in a panic to get to the rear, thereby blocking all railway transportation. The enemy began to move ahead then very rapidly, averaging about ten miles each day.

"My flight went through ten evacuations, and on one occasion the whole country in our rear turned Bolshevik for a distance of some forty miles, and we had to fight our way to the rear and out of the affair.

"In this country one never knows who is a Bolshe and who is not. When such a thing occurs I simply take command of the situation and ignore all Russian generals and orders and extricate our show into a more favorable position.

"In the rear of the main attack, you will see if you look on the map of South Russia, that between Kharkov and Rostov a great many railways connect, and all ran to Taganrog, near Rostov on a double line. The whole rolling stock from everywhere soon made a traffic jam, assisted by Bolsheviks within the Volunteer army. At the last main junction before Taganrog the enemy were quite close, so 10,000 wagons were burned within the station by our own troops to ensure that they would not fall into enemy hands. Unfortunately our trains got on the wrong side of the junction and so we were cut off from our base."

#### To the Crimea

Col. Collishaw said after the Bolshevik advance he decided to try and make for the Crimea country.

He continues: "I had about 200 Russian officers join us. They were only too glad to act as guards, just as ordinary British soldiers en route, and so we proceeded. The local enemy moved a wrong switch deliberately, and we went mostly off the track. As we had almost one thousand miles to go with hardly any coal left, and the enemy were about to cut the line any time, you can imagine we worked some! We got going again minus several

wagons and with all stores salvaged and proceeded on our way.

#### Telescoping Cars

"Next, a large American light engine came along about fifty miles an hour, with no driver or fireman on board and ran into us from the rear while we were stationary. You can imagine it was some shock, telescoping many of our trucks and coaches, and one officers' first class coach was lost by fire with all the officers' personal gear.

"After feverish work we finally managed to get away with nearly all our equipment. One of my flights was cut off altogether a little later, and I was forced to fight and walk some 200 miles to safety. Just as our third train crossed the last bridge into the Crimea the enemy arrived and destroyed the bridge. However, we arrived safely and here we are.

#### Struggle to Retain Crimea.

"The attack upon the Crimea has begun, and we are now flying to make reconnaissance for the for the staff, which is making some effort to prevent the enemy from occupying the Crimea. But the fighting spirit of the volunteer army seems to be broken, and I do not think they will hold out, as the enemy are now over-strong, indeed, having received much assistance from German sources.

"When you know that we moved over 2,000 miles of railway in this great retreat you will begin to have some conception of our experiences. I shot down two Bolshevik German Fokkers within our lines.

"I wish some of the Russians had some pep. They desire only to leave all to the English to do. All this does not tend to make one full of pep for the Russian volunteer army, but we came out for one year and we are going to be 'full out' to clean up on somebody so long as we are out on active service. I will let you know how we get along with the new turn of events. I am coming to Canada in April I hope."

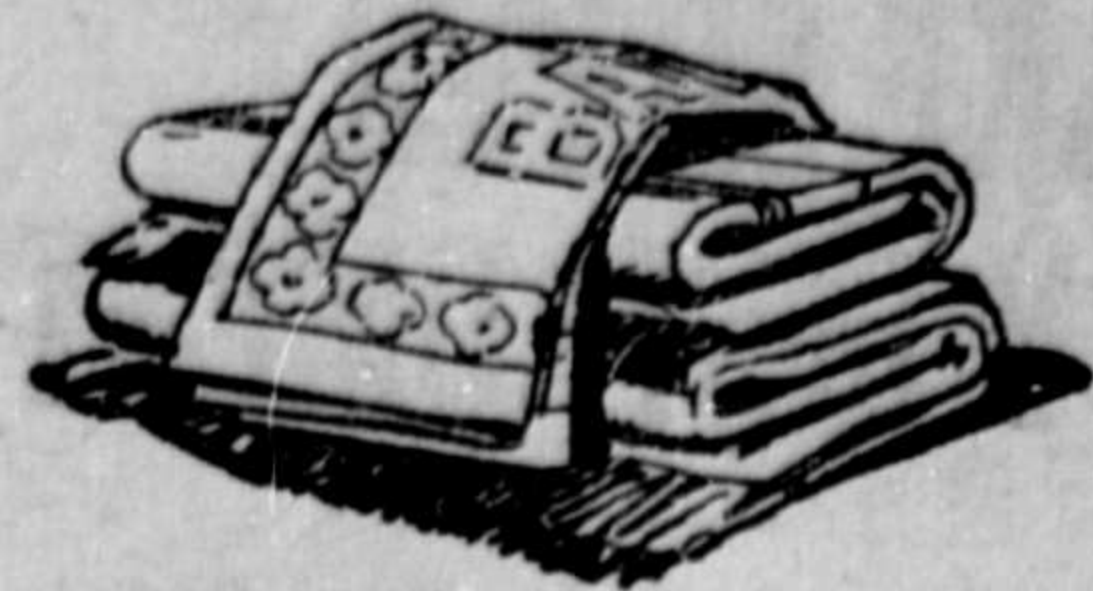

### STAKE SILVER BY INSTRUMENT

Ontario Man Says He Can Locate Mineral Deposits Without Digging.

ELK LAKE, Ont., April 12.—A deal of extremely peculiar interest has just been closed for a group of mining claims in the Gowganda district. The four claims involved are situated over one mile south from the Milner Lake O'Brien Mine, the owners being Andrew Cullen, Peter Ferland, of Haileybury, and F. Thomson of Gowganda.

#### Staked Last Fall.

The property was staked last fall on the strength of claims made by Mr. Cullen that by use of an instrument constructed on the principle that two things of a like nature attract each and that by use of this instrument he received a "strong pull" which showed the presence of silver on the properties in question. In fact, Mr. Cullen declares that he is confident that the extension of the rich Milner Lake O'Brien passes on to the property; mining men are entirely skeptical. They point to the fact that such dreams have rankled the minds of men since time immortal, not the least of these has been the crocheted stick or wand with which the dreamers claimed they could with ease locate the presence of water courses beneath the earth's surface, divining rods, affinity instruments or the willow twig have in the past failed to bring to light anything but a lesson to shy clear of them when anything but mere curiosity was involved. They have since the beginning been in the hands of clever operators, in fact, it is to this that may be attributed the pleasure of deception which they were able to temporarily establish.

#### Will Explore Property.

In Toronto a few days ago, Mr. Cullen was able to lead some people to believe that his instrument might be the exception, accordingly R. Henderson and his associate have entered into an option agreement to explore the Cullen, Ferland, Thompson property, the ultimate price amounting to \$300,000, payable only provided ore is discovered. It is stated that work will commence just as soon as the snow goes and that a shaft will be put down at the point decided by Mr. Cullen. As to this, however, it is disappointing to learn that while able to locate the presence of the ore Mr. Cullen cannot state how deep it is. It is just at this point that science appears to refute the claim. For instance, by standing, say, 500 feet to one side of the point directly above the alleged ore deposit and mapping the direction of the "pull," thence going to an equal distance on the opposite side of the deposit and lining up the direction of the pull it should be possible to establish the exact location of the deposit. This would eliminate any chance for the use of the excuse that should the shaft fail to find ore, that such was due to not going deep enough.
