Sane Way of Settling Dispute.

When there was a wage dispute between the fishpackers and their employers the matter was arbitrated and a settlement arrived at which was accepted by both sides. It was a compromise settlement.

There is a general tendency to adopt a more sane method of settling industrial disputes. While it will be some time before we get over the disturbing effects of the war and the industrial upheaval caused by the food shortage following four years of little production, there is an evident tendency toward a better state of affairs. People are realizing that while prices are very high at present, they cannot remain so indefinitely. A period of falling prices will follow which will try the mettle of business people.

Prosperity on Rising Market.

While no merchants like a continually rising market, they like less a falling market. Many merchants made money owing to a rise in value of their stocks. The same men will lose money when they have to sell for less than they paid for goods. Fluctuations of that kind are bad for business. There have been very few business failures during the past year or two. There will be many more directly the prices begin to toboggan. There is no need to fear such a time if preparation has been made. Any profits made on the rising market should be set aside to make up for the losses on the falling market. The man who does not face this is likely to go down and out. It may be a year or more before the turn comes, but also the turn may come at any time. United States factories are said to be stocking up, their market being restricted by the exchange. The longer the balance of exchange remains as it is now, the more danger there is of a sudden falling in prices of those goods manufactured by the United States. Let there be a big crop throughout the world this year and anything may happen.

So far as Prince Rupert is concerned, it does not seem as if she would suffer much. She will stand to gain from a drop in prices as long as she can sell her fish. At the same time it must be remembered that any tension in the money market, such as has already commenced to a slight extent, will have an effect on credits and credits are necessary in most lines of business.

Power Question is Important One.

A letter received a few days ago from Daniel Morrissey which was not published in the Daily News suggests that instead of going elsewhere for power, the city should raise the dam at Woodward Lake and put in another unit at Shawatlans power house. That is a matter for engineers. Mr. Morrissey may be right. If he has expert figures on it and on the other proposals he is in a position to judge.

The proposals at present before the city are:—

1. The installing of a power plant at Wark Channel at a cost of \$670,000.
2. The installing of a steam plant in the city at a cost of \$320,000.
3. The doubling of the present plant at Shawatlans and the raising of the dam at the lake.
4. The harnessing of Khtada River at a cost of at least \$1,500,000.
5. The harnessing of Falls River at a cost of, say, \$2,500,000.
6. Purchasing power from a private concern that would develop either of the larger water powers.

The last mentioned proposal would be the most suitable if a concern could be found that would go into the business, for the city needs all its resources to build streets and sewers.

The larger proposals are better than the smaller ones, but the city must be sure she is able to go through with any scheme before starting. To be held up financially when in the midst of a big project would be fatal.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

COMPANIES MAY CONTRIBUTE TO CAMPAIGN FUND

Franchise Act Amended to Permit
of This—Stiff Fight Over
Principle.

OTTAWA, April 14.—Clause 10 of the Franchise Bill, prescribing contributions directly or indirectly to candidates or campaign funds by an incorporated or unincorporated company or association unless incorporated for political purposes alone, was defeated in the House of Commons without a division. An amendment introduced by A. R. McMaster, Liberal member for Boone, which would prohibit contributions by any but private individuals and then effect the publication of all such contributions, was also defeated without a vote. McMaster's resolution brought out the first really spirited fight of the session, farmer members from the western provinces figuring largely in the list of speakers.

INVERNESS CANNERY IS TO BE REBUILT

No Official Announcement But It Is
General Understanding that
Work will Proceed.

While no official announcement has been made, it is understood that the Inverness cannery is to be rebuilt at once and canning will proceed as usual this season. R. G. Johnson is going south on Friday morning to complete the arrangements.

J. H. Todd & Sons have two canneries on the Fraser River, which have been closed and much of the equipment, with the possible exception of nets, can be secured there. There are said to be boats aplenty and there is still plenty of time to do the building.

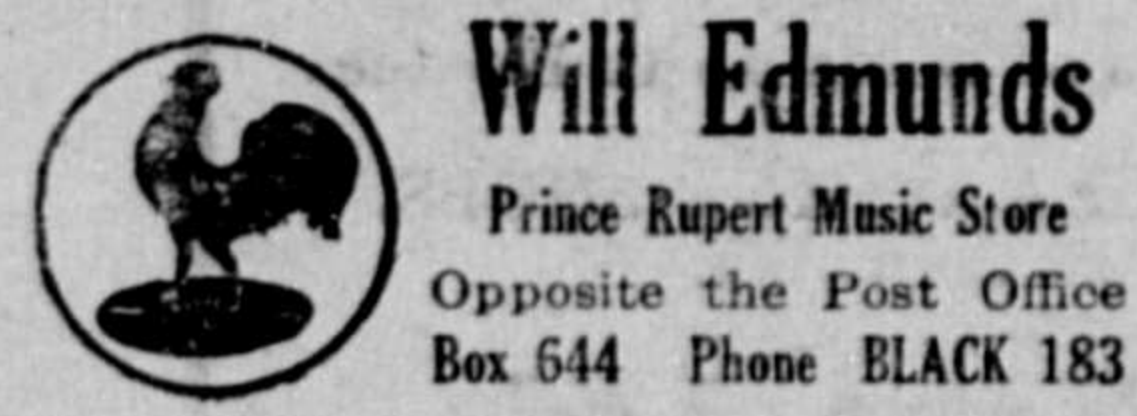

Dominion of Canada



Department of Finance

ALL persons residing in Canada, employed in Canada, or carrying on business in Canada, are liable to a tax on income, as follows:—

1. Every unmarried person, or widow, or widower, during dependants as defined by the Act, who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$1,000 or more.

2. All other individuals who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$2,000 or more.

3. Every corporation and joint stock company whose profits exceeded \$2,000 during the fiscal year ended in 1919.

Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 30th of April, 1920.

ALL INDIVIDUALS other than farmers and ranchers must use Form T 1.

FARMERS AND RANCHERS must use Form T 1A.

CORPORATIONS and joint stock companies must use Form T 2.

Penalty

Every person required to make a return, who fails to do so within the time limit, shall be subject to a penalty of Twenty-five per centum of the amount of the tax payable.

Any person, whether taxable, or otherwise, who fails to make a return or provide information duly required according to the provision of the Act, shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty of \$100 for each day during which the default continues. Also any person making a false statement in any return or in any information required by the Minister, shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding \$10,000, or to six months' imprisonment or to both fine and imprisonment.

LIVING COST IS DISCUSSED

**House of Commons Talks But
Sheds no Light on the
Problem.**

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
OTTAWA, April 14.—The
House of Commons witnessed a
curious debate yesterday, the
subject matter being a resolution
by Dr. Deslauriers of St. Mary's,
Montreal, who in effect asked that
because it had failed to improve
the cost of living, the Board of
Commerce should be abolished.
When he took the floor, however,
there was criticism and defense
of the farmer but scarcely any
mention of the Board of Com-
merce.

Dr. Deslauriers proposed that
in place of the Board of Com-
merce there should be a board
consisting of the premier, a rep-
resentative of labor and two mem-
bers of charity organizations.

Alphonse Verville of St. Denis,
Montreal, would have price regu-
lating legislation introduced and
profiteers punished. Later he
also suggested hanging profiteers.
("Hear, hear.")

Further contributors criticised
the demands of labor. J. F. Fa-
ford thought the eight-hour day
was a factor in increasing the
cost of living. Joseph D'Anjou
of Ramouski said that workmen
wanted to work as little as pos-
sible.

Eventually the resolution was
declared lost and the House in
committee took up the Franchise
Bill.

RAILWAYMEN'S PENSION CLAIM

**Matter Will Come Before Arbi-
trators in Grand Trunk Deal.**

(Special via U. T. P. Telegraphs.)
OTTAWA, April 14.—A lengthy
discussion took place in the
House of Commons on a motion
by Colonel J. A. Currie that the
Grand Trunk arbitrators should
take into consideration as a debt
of the company the amount re-
quired to restore the pension
status of the men penalized for
taking part in any strikes.

The minister of justice replied
that the men's claims respecting
pensions would be submitted to
the Board of Arbitration and
every facility given to press it as
a liability of the company.

On this assurance the Colonel
withdrew his motion.

"GIRLS" IS GREAT COMEDY FEATURE

Comedy is rampant in the new
Paramount picture, "Girls," star-
ring charming and dainty little
Marguerite Clark, which will be
shown at the Westholme tonight.

One of the delightful situations
in the film is that confronting a
young man who has fallen hope-
lessly in love with a beautiful
girl, and is seeking admittance to
her home that he might woo her.
But his beloved is living under
the impression that she is a man-
hater, having been jilted in her
younger days and having sworn a
hatred of all men, has hung above
her door a sign reading, "No man
shall cross this threshold."

Such a glaring defiance might
have intimidated most young men,
but not Edgar Holt. He is a

young lawyer and a man who
perseveres. He simply goes
around to another room across
the courtyard, crawls across a
suspended shutter and enters her

Sport Briefs

According to Major Anthony J.
Biddle, who recently boxed two
rounds with Georges Carpentier,
the Frenchman is a marvellous
boxer, with a style that is a cross
between Packey McFarland and
Frank Erne. "Carpentier's foot-
work and ducking make it almost
impossible to land on him solid-
ly," said the Philadelphia sports-
man, who has sparred with many
of the leading professionals. Ma-
jor Biddle believes that the
Frenchman's speed on foot will
puzzle even Jack Dempsey, as fast
as the champion is both with his
feet and hands. That Carpentier's
style is most impressive is em-
phasized by the fact that not one
of the Frenchman's critics have
been able to pick a flaw in his
technique.

The Manitoba Football Associa-
tion, at its annual meeting last
Thursday night, expressed unani-
mous disapproval of the way in
which the Dominion Football As-
sociation is handling the football
situation in British Columbia.
The D. F. A. was censured for
"unconstitutionally" admitting
membership of the British Colu-
mbia Provincial Football Associa-
tion, a non-existent body, in-
stead of the British Columbia
Football Association. Withdrawal
from the Dominion body is threat-
ened by the Manitoba Association
if an effort is not made in the
next thirty days to remedy what
the resolution terms "the wrong
done the cause of soccer in Cana-
da generally and in British Colu-
mbia in particular."

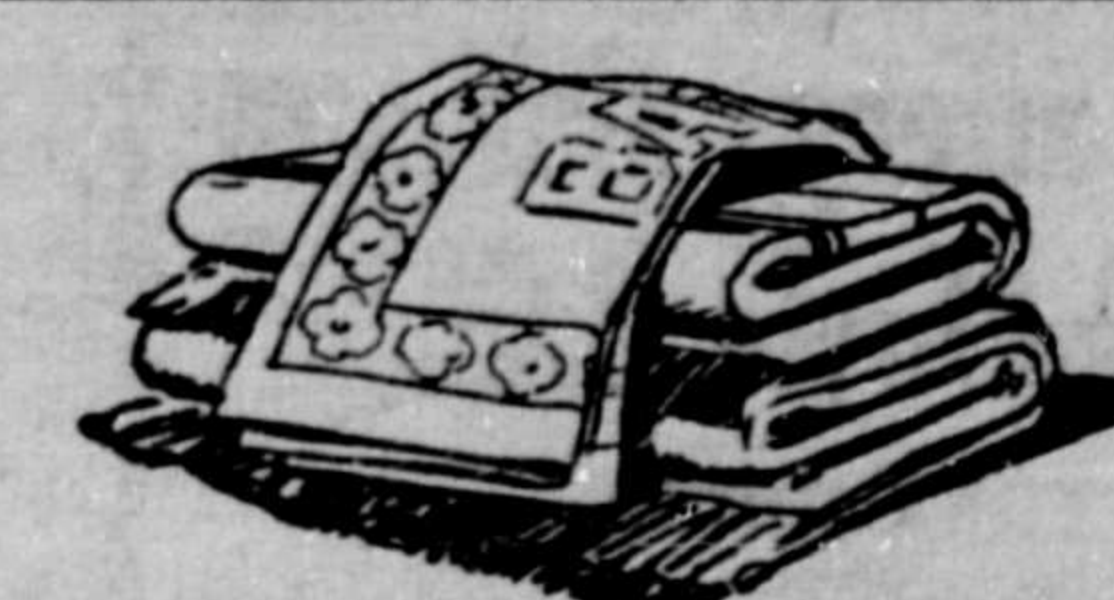
