## Irish Prisoners Released; New Policy is Inaugurated

### London Daily Mail Says Sir Neville MacCreedy to Supersede Existing Heads of Government in Ireland; Triumph for Strike

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

DUBLIN, April 15.—Sixty-eight hunger strikers were released apparently unconditionally, and as a result the strike is considered off.

It is officially announced that it is not intended to release all hunger strikers in Mount Joy prison unconditionally but that an order has been issued that those released from prison will be out on parole for a period to be specified in the case of each individual by the prison doctor.

The Lord Mayor, who went to see Lord French when the hitch occurred at Dublin Castle through the stipulation that prisoners must return to their captivity on recovery, stated on his return that the prisoners would be released unconditionally.

The prisoners had agreed to accept the stipulation on the ground that it was a relaxation of the "cat and mouse" system.

The release of the prisoners is regarded as a complete triumph for the hunger strike and its ally, the general strike. It was known yesterday that the Lord Mayor had summoned the Lord French and that it was then only a question of terms.

LONDON, April 15.—The release of the Irish prisoners was a direct order of General Sir Neville MacCreedy and marks the beginning of an entire change in Irish policy, according to the Daily Mail. General MacCreedy is instructed to inaugurate a policy of conciliation and will be given a free hand. In other words he was to supersede the existing heads of the Government in Ireland.

## Mayor McClymont States Plans for Extending of City Sewers and Streets

Mayor McClymont has returned from his trip to Victoria with a plan for the financing of city improvements, especially in regard to roads and sewers, based on the information which he obtained at first hand from interviews with the various authorities of the government and other municipalities in the province. These will be presented to the City Council in a report that the mayor will compile for an early meeting.

"I found out when I was below," stated the mayor to a News representative yesterday afternoon, "that Prince Rupert is the only city that carries out its street improvement plan. I had interviews with various representatives from various municipalities including the mayor of Nanaimo, two representatives from the Vancouver council, the entire Victoria council, all of whom had a conference with Premier Oliver and his cabinet members."

"We requested the government officials that the municipalities receive a part, if not all, of the taxes raised within the municipal limits covering automobile and amusement taxes. Although we received no definite answer, I believe that the Government has in mind doubling the present amusement tax and giving half of the tax raised to the municipalities. The municipal representatives present did not look with favor on the increasing of a tax which is already sufficiently high. It was not after that, as it further increases the cost of living."

Regarding the improvement of building of streets and local improvement in Victoria, I find that a commission appointed to report on this had placed one-third of the cost of permanent work on the city as a whole and the remainder on the property directly improved. All rough grading such as the opening up of streets, is charged to the city as a whole. This scheme also applies in Vancouver, South Vancouver and Point Grey.

"I spent some time with Commissioner Gillespie of South Vancouver, who has considerable knowledge of municipal operations in eastern Canada and he stated that he knew of no other city besides Prince Rupert in Canada where property abutting paid the entire cost of its street work. I also had an interview with Municipal Inspector Baird who gave me to understand that the cost of street work under the local improvement plan did not come under the 20 per cent limit that is placed on the borrowing powers of a city. This point has not, heretofore, been thoroughly understood here."

**Mayor's Proposal.**  
The mayor's proposal is that the outstanding payment of street work, including the \$700,000 in Section 1, be divided and 50 per cent of that cost be placed on the whole city with the remainder under the local improvement plan and that all future street grading be worked out on the same basis. Before this would become effective it must be approved by the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council, who can either pass it direct or refer it to a vote of the ratepayers but the mayor prefers that the ratepayers make the decision.

**Sewer Financing.**  
"I investigated the methods of

**Street Work.**  
financing sewer installation in various municipalities," stated the mayor on the sewer subject, "and found that they were all laid down on the general debenture plan covered by the whole city. Laterals were paid for by the local improvement tax of property abutting."

"My proposal for Prince Rupert is that the same basis be used and that all houses or flats on the streets supplied with sewers, whether connected or not, be required to pay an annual rental of from \$5 to \$7. In this way a larger percentage of the interest and redemption fund would be paid by those having the direct benefit of the system."

**Trunk Road.**  
"I propose to ask the Board of Works to submit to the council plans for the commencement of a general sewerage system and also the rough grading of a trunk road to the Cold Storage, as well as connections for side streets in sections 7 and 8. They would prepare estimates, and by-laws would be submitted to a vote of the people. The work would have to be done on the sinking fund plan as after the present sale of serial bonds the city will have all the serials it can finance with ease."

"This plan would be more advantageous especially since the province proposes to take over municipal sinking funds and allow 5 per cent interest compounded annually. This new legislation will also ensure a greater degree of safety and control over sinking funds, which some municipalities show a tendency to squander."

D. J. Evans and other carpenters at the Inverness cannery lost tools valued at \$2,000 in the fire on Sunday morning. Mr. Evans personal loss was \$400.

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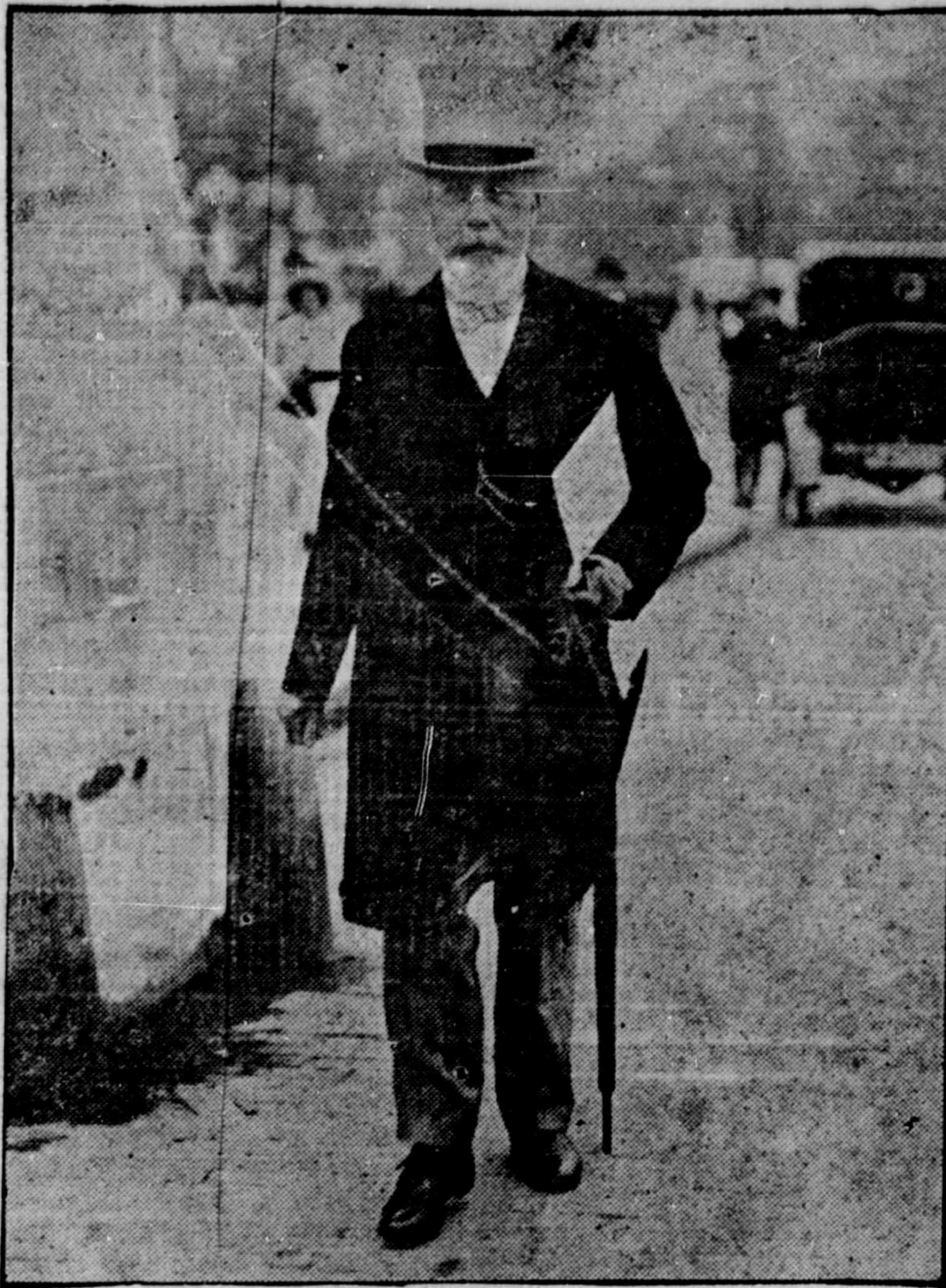

## Parts of Ireland Accept Sinn Fein

### Both Sides Accept Rulings of Revolutionary Courts, says T. P. O'Connor in Speech in House of Commons

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

LONDON, April 15.—The most striking passages in the Irish debate in the House of Commons was when T. P. O'Connor asserted that in a large portion of Ireland authorized government had ceased to govern. He instanced cases where Sinn Fein revolutionary courts superseded ordinary methods of litigation, court decisions handed down being accepted by both sides.

The most remarkable example of Sinn Fein authority is the case of land settlements now effected in the west. Government officials were ordered away and the populace has taken possession of huge grain ranches, the existence of which had long been complained of and divided up the land among landless people adjoining the congested districts.

## PROHIBITION IS FROM DEVIL

### So Says Member for Peterboro in Dominion House of Commons.

### OBJECTS TO SPENDING MONEY ON CAMPAIGNS

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

OTTAWA, April 15.—Considerable discussion took place in the House of Commons yesterday on the motion by G. H. Burnham, East Peterboro, that in view of the reported statement by Rev. Ben Spence that another prohibition referendum in Ontario would cost prohibitionists \$5,000,000, that all campaign funds be prohibited and made a criminal offence and that an amendment to the criminal code be made to that effect.

Mr. Burnham was particularly critical of the Dominion Alliance, Y. M. C. A., and Farmers' party. In finally withdrawing his motion, Mr. Burnham concluded with the remark that, so far as prohibition was concerned, he believed it was anti-Christian and came from the Devil to whom it would finally return.

## LLOYD GEORGE SUPPORTED BY TWO MEMBERS

### New Minister of Labor Re-elected and Successor to Geddes Returned.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

LONDON, April 15.—Right Hon. T. J. Macnamara was yesterday declared elected for the Northwest Camberwell seat in the House of Commons. He was re-elected on assuming the office of minister of labor. The result of the voting gave T. J. Macnamara, Coalition Liberal, 6,618; Suhan Lawrence, Labor, 4,733; J. G. Carroll, Independent Liberal, 3,386.

In the Basingstoke constituency Sir Arthur Holbrook, Coalition Unionist, was elected to the Commons to succeed Sir Auckland Geddes, now ambassador to the United States. Liberal and Labor candidates were second and third respectively with a difference of only 41 votes between them.

Provincial Estimates Make Good Reading.

The provincial estimates mentioned in the despatch of yesterday make good reading for Prince Rupert people. The fact that work is to commence on the Provincial Government buildings and that the sum of \$100,000 is to be spent on that work this year is in itself a great thing for the city. It is understood that this is simply the first of a series of votes for the buildings which should cost something like half a million dollars.

The Provincial Government wharf has not been able to carry a heavy load since it was built. The result is that to a large extent it has to be rebuilt. The vote of \$80,000 for that purpose seems a very large one, but it is proposed to make very marked improvements there and it will cost a lot of money.

The other votes both in the city and district will be much appreciated. It will mean the employment of a lot of labor and the freeing of a lot of money in the place and should help to make good times.

Member for Riding Does Good Work.

At the risk of being thought to be talking politics, the Daily News cannot help expressing appreciation of the work done by the local member, the Minister of Lands. There has been criticism of the failure of the Government to spend money in this district, but this is the first year that the provincial finances have justified the Government in making expenditures. Now that the balance is at last on the right side of the ledger and the credit of the province is once more established, public works can proceed. It is difficult for a government to have to go contrary to public opinion in withholding money on work which is badly needed. Mr. Pattullo has been in a difficult position and people here will appreciate that fact.

Regret at Death Of E. P. Gingras.

The sudden death of E. P. Gingras, public works engineer, under such tragic circumstances, removed one who was highly respected and a general favorite throughout the city. He was a man who was keen at his work, a man of ability, and although in the public service treated the people whom he met in his official capacity just as those who met him in social life. These qualities are so uncommon that they excite remark. Prince Rupert will miss the late Mr. Gingras.

Corporation Control May Continue.

The Dominion House of Commons eliminated from the Franchise Bill any restrictions against corporations contributing to campaign funds. The despatch did not say how the house lined up, but it is to be assumed that the opposition to retaining the provision was very strong or it would have been allowed to stand.

The House also turned down a proposal that all contributions should be made public. As a matter of fact it would seem as if Parliament is still controlled by certain monied interests which secure legislation favorable to themselves by making secret contributions to campaign funds.

Dolly Varden Not Disallowed.

The Dominion Government refused to disallow the Dolly Varden Act and as a result the present management will remain in control unless dislodged by civil action in the courts of law. The fear had been expressed that the mine was likely to be tied up by litigation, but it would seem now as if there is no danger of that this year. Alice Arm should have a prosperous season.

## MUCH WORK ON PRINCE JOHN

### Plates Renewed—Upper Deck Relaid, and Complete Renovating of Passenger Quarters.

The specifications for the repairs to the Prince John will be in readiness by Saturday night or Monday morning and tenders for the work will be opened at 10 o'clock Wednesday morning in the office of R. Beaumont, superintendent of the coast services. The work is to be carried on for the company and the place of repairs will depend on the successful tenderer. There are a number of firms represented here who intend to tender on the work and a preliminary examination has been made.

"We find that a considerable portion of the bottom is set up," said Captain Nicholson, manager of the fleet, to the News this morning. "This will require a number of the plates to be taken out and returned after being smoothed out. There are a number that will require renewal altogether. This is outside of the general damage done to the hull as a result of the collision.

"The cabin work is all destroyed and will have to be renewed generally. Complete upholstery and recarpeting of the passenger section will be necessary and all the furniture will have to be replaced. A new upper deck will also have to be relaid. The whole work will take six weeks to complete at the very least, in my opinion."

Captain Nicholson and Captain Logan will remain here until the contract has been awarded.

## GERMAN JUNKER MEETING HELD

### Proposal to Divide Germany into Two Parts and Secure Aid From France.

(Special via C. T. P. Telegrams.)  
GENEVA, April 14.—The Munich Post, a Socialist organ, created a sensation in Bavaria by publishing a report of a recent secret meeting of the Bavarian Junker party, attended by most of the military officers.

The principal questions discussed related to the division of Germany into two parts and proposed overtures to be made to France to join in the attack on Russia.

Department of Finance

ALL persons residing in Canada, employed in Canada, or carrying on business in Canada, are liable to a tax on income, as follows:—

1. Every unmarried person, or widow, or widower, without dependants as defined by the Act, who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$1,000 or more.
2. All other individuals who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$2,000 or more.
3. Every corporation and joint stock company whose profits exceeded \$2,000 during the fiscal year ended in 1919.

Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 30th of April, 1920.

ALL INDIVIDUALS other than farmers and ranchers must use Form T 1.

FARMERS AND RANCHERS must use Form T 1A.

CORPORATIONS and joint stock companies must use Form T 2.

### Penalty

Every person required to make a return, who fails to do so within the time limit, shall be subject to a penalty of Twenty-five per centum of the amount of the tax payable.

Any person, whether taxable, or otherwise, who fails to make a return or provide information duly required according to the provision of the Act, shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty of \$100 for each day during which the default continues. Also any person making a false statement in any return or in any information required by the Minister, shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding \$10,000, or to six months' imprisonment or to both fine and imprisonment.

## General Instructions.

Obtain Forms from the Inspectors or Assistant Inspectors of Taxation or from Postmasters.

Read carefully all instructions on Form before filling it in.

Prepay postage on letters and documents forwarded by mail to Inspectors of Taxation.

Make your returns promptly and avoid penalties.

**CANADA SENDS AID TO STRIKE**

Defections Occur From Ranks and Improved Conditions Reported in Western Centres.

CHICAGO, April 14.—Reports from railway centres in the central and far western states, indicated a general improvement in the strike conditions. Although the leaders of the insurgent switchmen and yardmen strenuously denied that serious defections had occurred in their ranks, the railway heads and officials of the brotherhood, who are fighting the unauthorized walkout, declared the strike in western territory was gradually dying out.  
 WASHINGTON, April 14.—Evidence in the hands of the Department of Justice that help is being sent from Canada for strikers participating in the unauthorized railroad strike, according to Assistant Attorney-General Garvin. He did not know the extent of this aid. Labor leaders of the I. W. W. type, he said, had been traced from Canadian boundary cities to various trouble centres.

The principal efforts seemed to be to break the ranks of loyal shop workers. Officials admitted last night that they saw signs of an attempt to expand the railroad strike into "One phase of a world revolution."

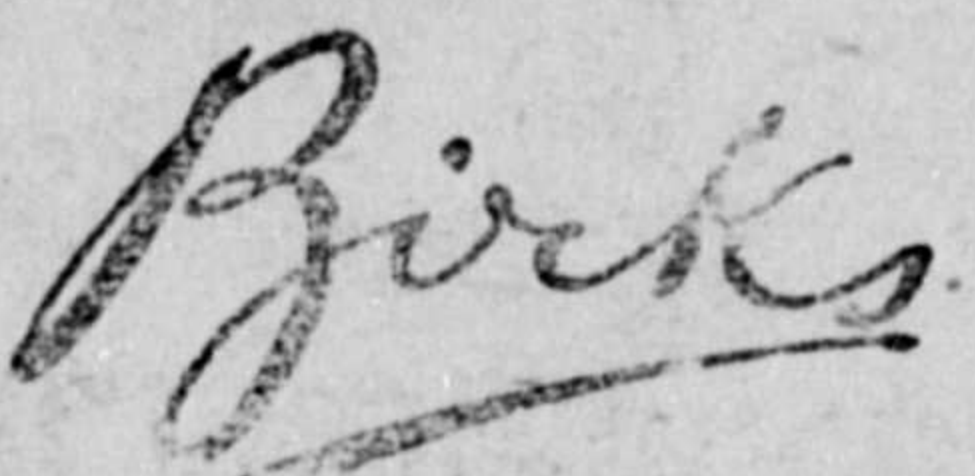

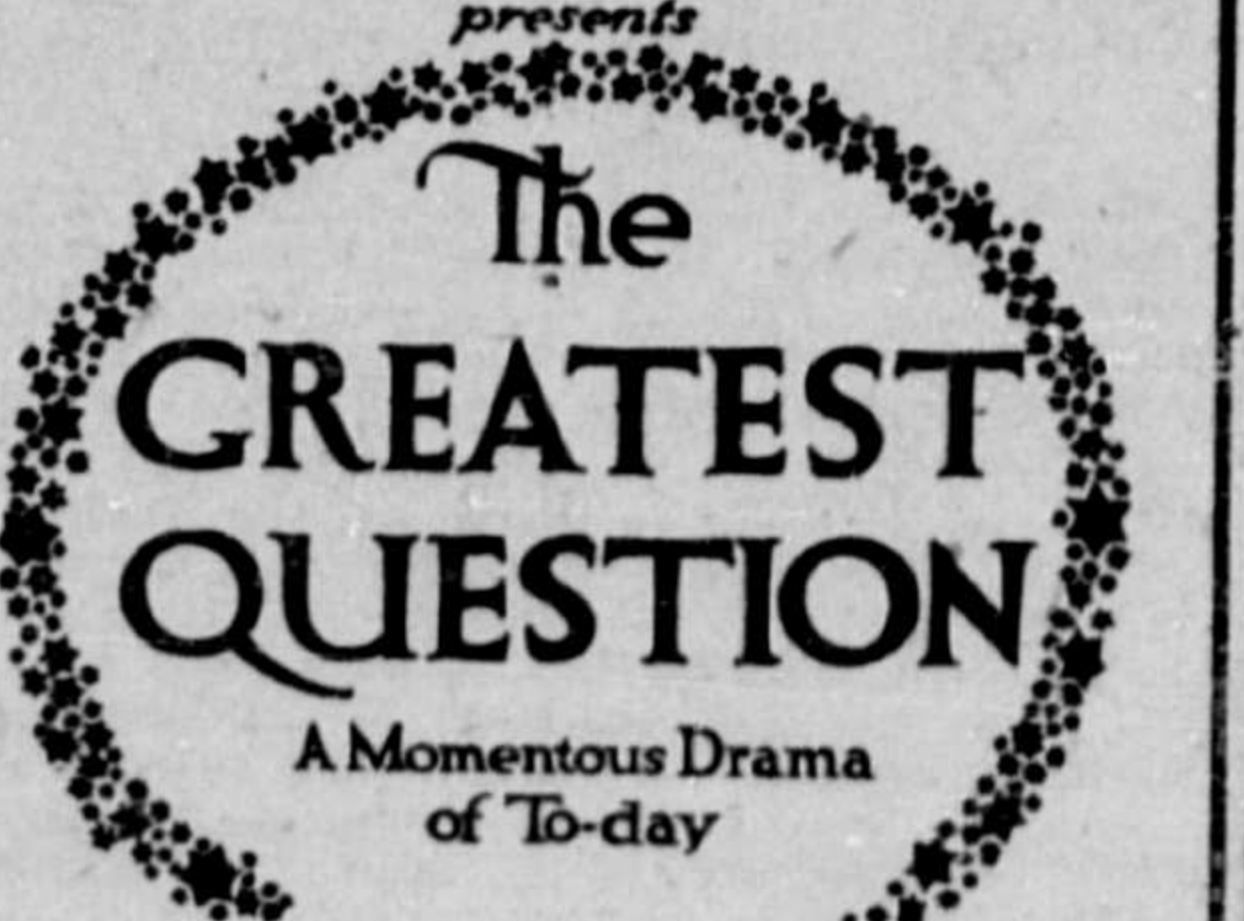
