Immense Corporation for Shipbuilding in Canada

Concern Capitalized at Quarter of a Billion Dollars to Take Over Existing Concerns to Enable Canada to Compete

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
OTTAWA, April 16.—Colonel Grant Morden, well known in Canada in connection with the Canadian Steamship Merger, is in Ottawa to complete the organization of the biggest industrial company in the British Empire. It will embrace the whole of Nova Scotia steel and iron companies, the Canadian Steamship Co., several shipyards in various parts of the Dominion and other large concerns.
The new concern will be known as the British Empire Steel Co. and the capitalization will be \$250,000,000.
The object of the merger is to compete with the United States Steel Corporation and deprive that company of its immense trade in British marine.

PROPOSITION LEADER TO VISIT WEST

Will Leave for British Columbia About Second Week in June; Ministers Coming.

OTTAWA, April 16.—It is understood that Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, leader of the Liberal party, is to tour the entire west at the end of the present session, beginning his trip about the second week in June and going as far as Victoria, B. C., and working eastward.
There is also talk of a movement to induce cabinet ministers to tour the country and it is likely that several prominent members of the Government may come west during the summer.

"EMERALD ISLE" SUNK AT LOCAL DRY DOCK

Paddy Burke, Owner, Had Mental Aberration, and Left Sea Cock Open.

After having spent a night tied up by the bowline to the dry dock with its stern pointed perpendicularly towards the bottom of the harbor, Paddy Burke's pea green private yacht "Emerald Isle" was successfully raised yesterday morning.

Paddy, who is the genial patrolman at the drydock, recently bought this boat and after making sundry repairs getting it ready for the enjoyment of the long summer evenings when the yards may be left without fear of bandits or ruffians, left it on Wednesday afternoon. Unfortunately, in leaving it Paddy forgot that the ship would sink if he left the sea-cock open, and next morning his boat was on the start of a stern dive to the bottom.

Brilliant salvage work on the part of the owners and friends soon brought the vessel to rights, the only damage being a coat of mud and the threatening list to the pontoons during her submersion. 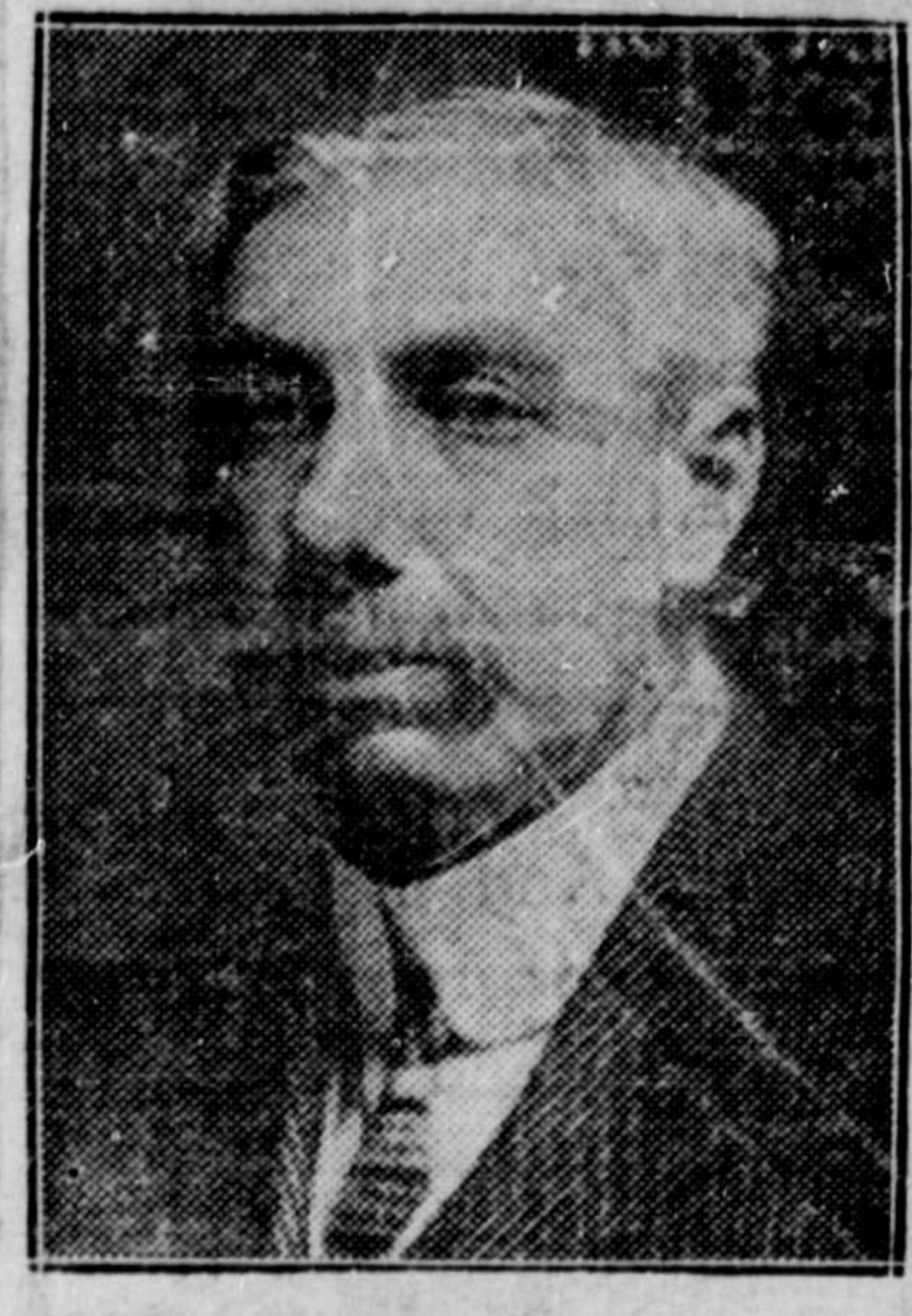

Mountjoy Prison Again Filled with Leaders of Sinn Fein Activities

DUBLIN, April 16.—Extensive midnight raids were carried out last night and a hundred persons are reported arrested. The raids constituted the biggest roundup operations ever known in the city with about 110 arrests made. Mountjoy prison regained more prisoners than it lost yesterday through the removal of hunger strikers.
Three persons were reported killed and nine others wounded in a shooting affair at Milltown, County Clare. It is alleged that the police and military were involved. Those killed were civilians.

Railway Managers Give Ultimatum to Striking Employees

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
NEW YORK, April 16.—The Railroad General Managers' Association of New York delivered an ultimatum to the "Big Four" railroad brotherhoods, giving them until noon on Saturday for their men to return to work. After that time, it was stated, the railroads will themselves open their books for a period of 24 hours ending at noon on Sunday, for application to register. During that period any who are acceptable will be taken back into service, retaining their former rights.

The railroads retain the right to refuse to reinstate or re-employ certain employees, who have shown during the period of the trouble by violence, seditious utterances, intimidation or other well defined means as unfit for the railway service.

GRAND TRUNK DEBATE TODAY

W. L. Mackenzie King to Speak On the Bill for Final Ratification.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
OTTAWA, April 16.—Opposition criticism of the Government's bargain with the Grand Trunk Railway Co. was deferred until today on the suggestion of W. L. Mackenzie King in the House of Commons.

On the second reading of the bill to confirm the agreement between the Government and the company, Hon. J. D. Reid, minister of railways, produced a mass of correspondence. This correspondence had been requested by the leader of the opposition on the previous evening, but when he found that it took about two hours for the minister to read it, he asked for more time to look it over.

The request was acceded to by the Government.

Hearst Papers Continue Campaign.
 The Hearst journals in the United States are continuing their campaign of vilifying everything British. There are not many open attacks, but seldom an edition of the big papers misses faking a dirty slap of some kind at John Bull. These papers are sent into Canada and distributed widely at some points. In one to hand today, a cartoon in the New York American, shows John Bull as an ingrate after having been rescued from the Teuton armies by Uncle Sam. This stuff may pander to the tastes of a certain element in the United States, but it should not be allowed to circulate in Canada.

Best Elements Discouraged.
 The Hearst papers are made to pander to the lower element of the American people. They periodically work up a campaign against the British, largely for political purposes. Then we give them a welcome here. The better class of American does not like that. He is not influenced by it, but there are many who are only now learning to read, men and women who take most of their education from the streets, the movies and the Sunday papers. These absorb with avidity stuff such as the Hearst papers put out.

Canadians have nothing to say about what shall be published in the United States. What they do is their own business, not ours. The people of Canada have, however, the right to say that this poisoned stuff shall not be brought across the line into Canada. We are strongly of opinion that no Hearst journal, magazine or newspaper should be allowed to cross the boundary until there is a decided change in tone.

Free Newspapers And Free Speech.
 To talk about the freedom of the press is very nice. We all know, however, that freedom is only a relative expression. We are all struggling to be free, but freedom is largely a matter of education and training. These is a marked difference between license and freedom. For instance, here is a millionaire newspaper owner who has political ambitions and also a strong journalistic sense. He knows that there is a strong German sentiment in certain parts of the United States and he panders to these in order to increase the circulation of his papers and his political prestige at one and the same time. That is freedom of the press. To allow the Hearst ambition to cross the boundary line would simply be adding to the vanity of this already top-heavy man who fans the lowest human passions to enhance his own prestige.


This type of journalism is in line with the free speech which allows men with a gift for vilification to mount a tub and sway a mob in such a way as to incite them to commit crimes. It is a tendency which should be checked. We believe in freedom of speech and freedom of press as long as it does not break out into license which is dangerous to the country as a whole, and liable to cause much unnecessary suffering, if given a free rein.

Major Allan Brooks, naturalist and artist, left the city yesterday for the Islands on the steamer Prince Albert. He intends to spend the summer on Graham Island with headquarters at Masset. For many years Major Brooks, or, as he is more familiarly known among naturalists, Allan Brooks, has been engaged in studying the ways of the wild things, especially of the birds. He is an artist who delights to reproduce with pencil or brush the beauties that he sees. Many of the best books on bird life contain illustrations from the brush of this quiet worker, one of the most notable being "Birds of Washington," a large two-volume publication brought out by W. Leon Dawson of the University of Washington. The more expensive editions have full page color illustrations reproduced from the wonderful drawings of this artist, and a few de luxe copies have some of the original drawings inserted.

NEW FACTORY . IS ADEQUATE

Shockley Wood Working Establishment at Cow Bay in Position to Handle Increased Business.
 The new woodworking shop at Cow Bay, into which E. H. Shockley has moved his increasing business, is a decided acquisition to the waterfront. The quarters are commodious and provide ample space for the machinery and stock.
 Since moving Mr. Shockley has installed a complete equipment of woodworking machinery for the manufacture of local spruce. At the present time the staff is busy preparing dressed stock for the coming season. Boatbuilding is being especially catered to by the carrying of a stock of hardwood and boat lumber.

POSSIBILITIES OF THE TEL-EL VALLEY

Messrs. Lineham and Lewthwaite Suggest Development of Fine Country.
 That the Tel-el Valley has immense agricultural possibilities is the opinion of Arthur Lineham and W. A. Lewthwaite, both of whom are interested in the oil boring on Queen Charlotte Islands. The Tel-el Valley is not far from Skidegate on Graham Island. It is low lying and the Tel-el river is sluggish and often overflows. The meadows, however, are very rich and, if ditched and the impediments in the river removed, would be very valuable.
 Mr. Lewthwaite has had to do with sugar beet growing in the past and he thinks this valley would be ideal for the purpose. It would provide work during winter and the cattle would use the pulp after the sugar had been extracted. Both visitors suggest that the government would find this an ideal place at which to encourage settlement. There are something like ten thousand acres of open land there and the possibilities of development are very great.
 Messrs. Lineham and Lewthwaite are both very confident of success in their boring operations. If they do not strike oil they feel sure that they will find coal, so that in any case the work will not have been fruitless.

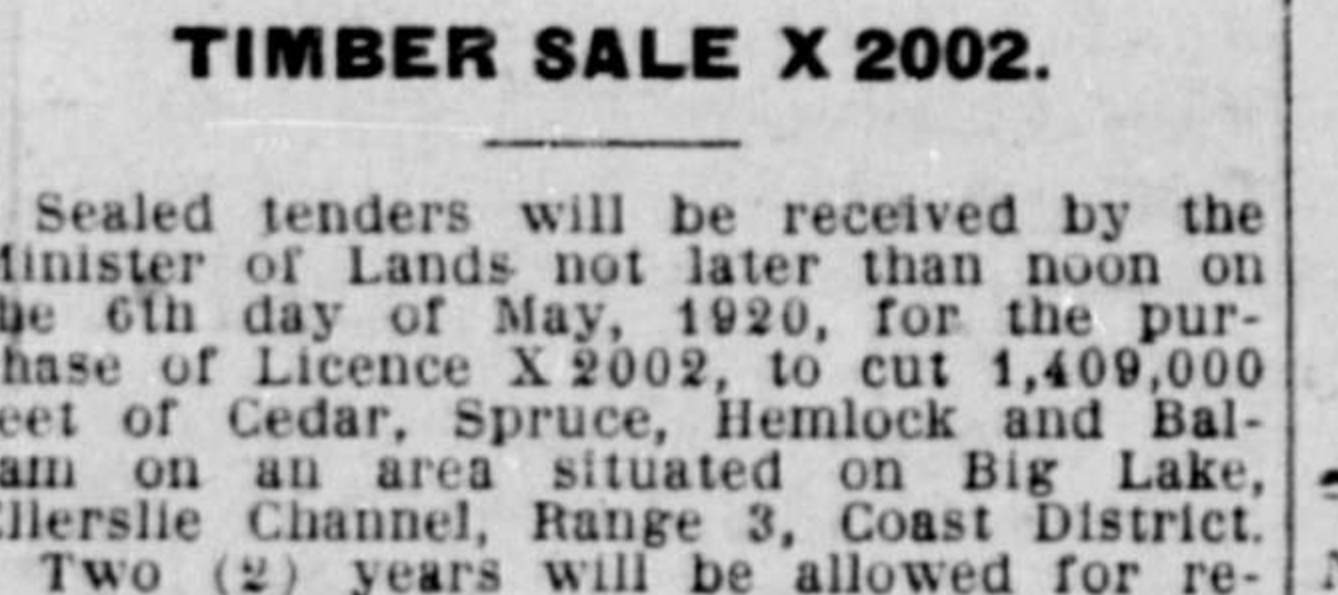
BAPTIST CHURCH HAD CORNER CLUB BANQUET

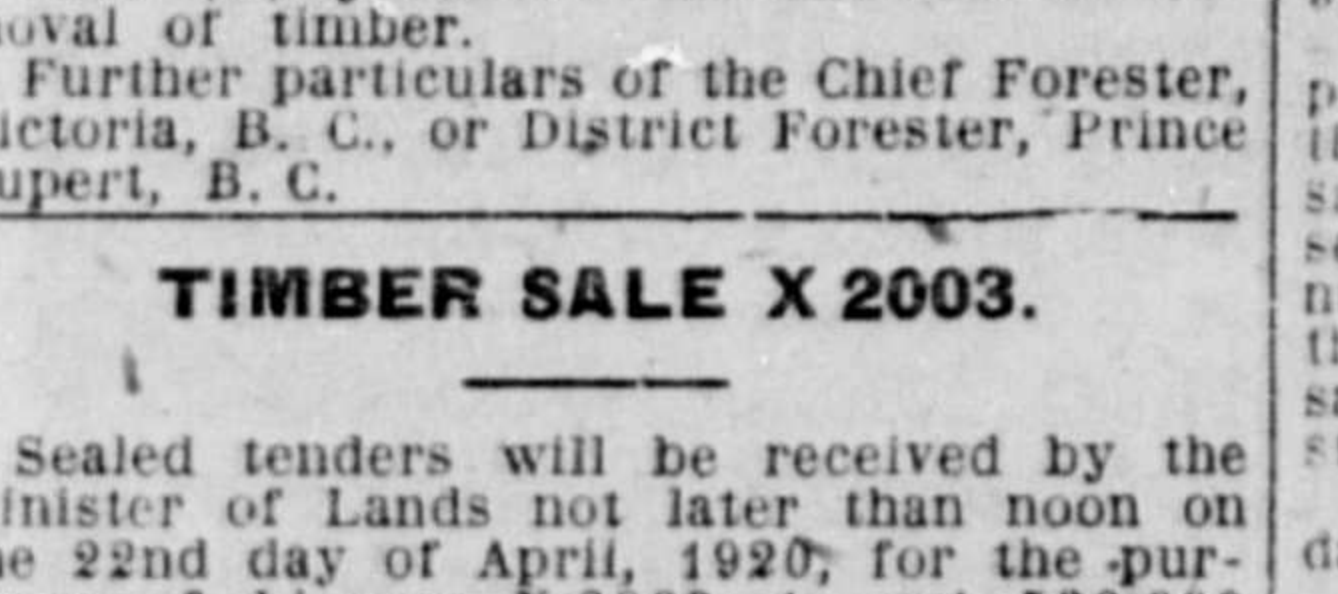

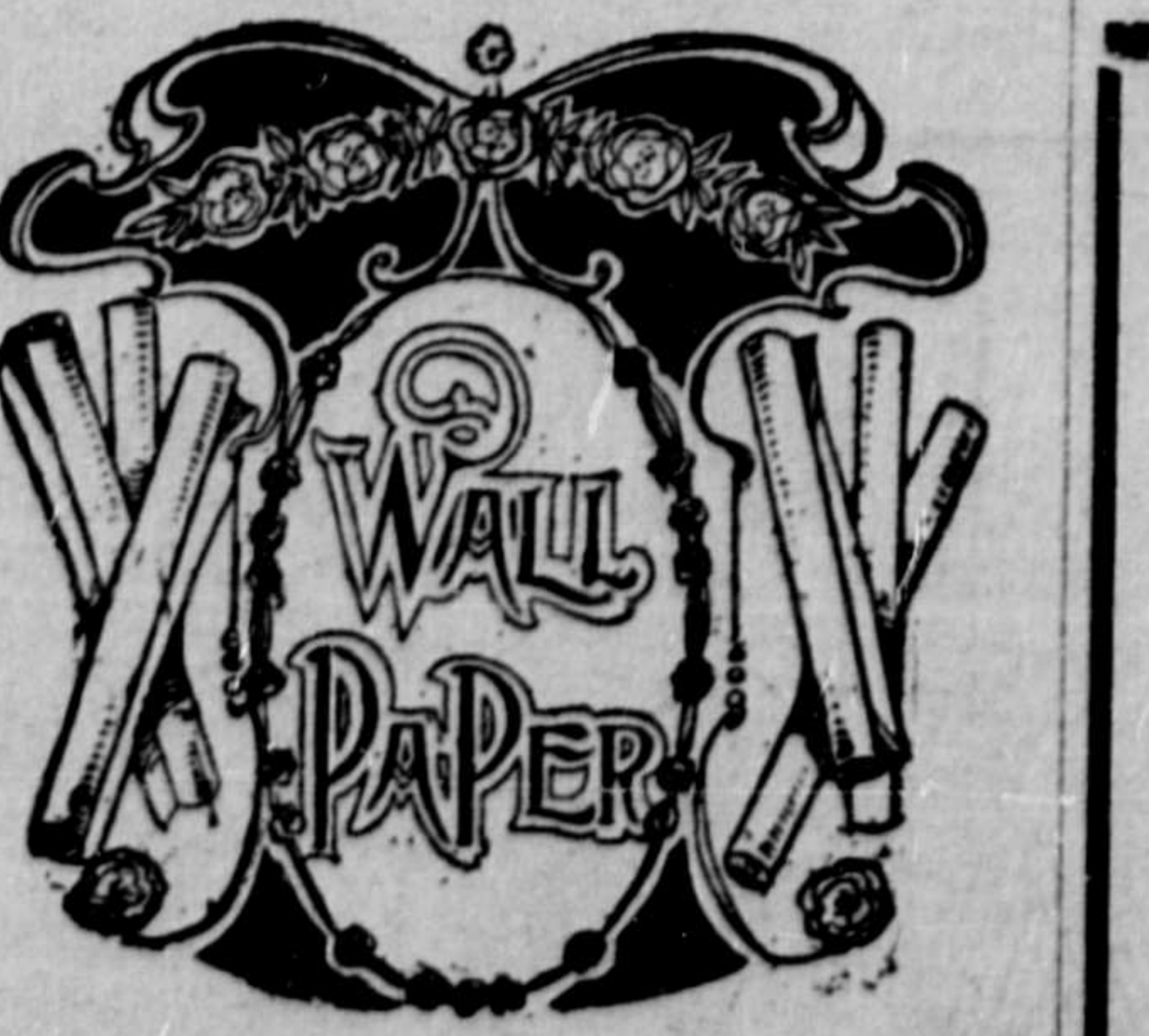
