Strike Said to Be Definitely Broken

Twenty-five Leaders under Arrest, Many Returning to Work and Freight Moving; Discussion as to Red Activities

CHICAGO, April 17.—After revoking the charters of three lodges of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, two in Chicago and one in San Francisco, A. F. Whitney, vice-president of the brotherhood, ordered all striking members of the organization to return to work by midnight, or suffer expulsion from the union and lose seniority.

FORBIDDEN STRIKE ON MONTREAL HERALD

MONTREAL, April 17.—The Montreal Star appears today in curtailed size owing to the fact that the typographical staff struck without warning. Enough men decided not to go out to enable the paper to be printed. The work was supplemented by type set on instructions of officials of the Typographical Union, who have forbidden the strike, at other printing offices here.

New State of Sonora Will Ask Recognition from U.S.; Troops Invade Sinaloa

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegrams.)
AGUA PREITA, Sonora, April 17.—The state of Sonora will apply to the United States for recognition as a belligerent. The republic of Sonora troops today continued marching toward Culiacan, the capital of the adjoining state of Sinaloa, by which move they wrestled the aggressive Carranza troops sent to force Sonora's re-entry into the Mexican federation of states. Military authorities say that Sonora success in Sinaloa would give the seceding state the military power necessary to overcome any force President Carranza might send against them. Four towns in Sinaloa have fallen before the invading Sonora troops.

TROLLING BOAT ON THE ROCKS AT SKIDEGATE

Nobody Aboard the Little Craft "Macduff" but Name Abel Edwards in Papers.

Chief Minty of the provincial police department received a telegram this morning from the telegraph operator at Queen Charlotte City as follows:—"Trolling boat Macduff found on rocks near Aliford Bay with no one on board. She sailed in from direction of Rupert this morning with sails set and was found on rocks about noon." Some papers with name Abel Edwards were found and clock had been recently wound, and it appears that whoever was aboard had fallen overboard, as everything is intact, including dory and anchor.

W.A.A.C.S DID NOT LIKE COLLEGE LIFE

Refused to Work as Domestic Servants at Guelph Institutions.
GUELPH, Ont., April 17.—Expressing complete dissatisfaction with their lot at Macdonald Hall, nine of sixteen English W.A.A.C.S. who recently arrived here under contract to work at the local ladies' college in return for tuition, left the city for Toronto, where they will seek more congenial employment. They refused to act as domestic servants at the college.

\$12,500,000 IS PROPOSED FOR CIVIL SERVICE

One Sixth of Amount voted and Matter Will Come up for Further Discussion.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegrams.)
OTTAWA, April 16.—A motion to provide \$12,500,000 for civil service bonuses was introduced into the House of Commons by the minister of finance, Hon. N. W. Rowell said it was designed to meet the abnormally high cost of living due to the war. He also stated that the time was coming soon when the bonus system would have to be stopped and salaries paid in one sum. After a long discussion, in which the increases were criticized, the House agreed to the passing of one-sixth of the amount, the custom followed in regard to ordinary estimates. This leaves the matter open for further discussion.

PENSIONS ARE DISCUSSED IN OTTAWA HOUSE

Col. Peck Emphasizes Importance of Caring for Pensioners' Children.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegrams.)
OTTAWA, April 17.—The special House Committee on pensions and Soldiers' Re-establishment held its first sitting at which Col. John Thompson, chairman of the Pensions Board, made a general statement. In 1919 Canada's pension bill was over \$16,500,000 and by March, 1920, the total was \$23,000,000. In all 175,906 people were receiving pensions. Of these, 70,950 were disabled soldiers and 41,283 children of disabled soldiers. Dependents of disabled soldiers excluding children number 17,725. The number of totally disabled soldiers pensioned was 2,370 in class one disability. Soldiers down with affections of the respiratory system numbered about 10,000 and these were 100 per cent tubercular. Allowances were made to a pensioner's children while he lived. They should be continued after the pensioner met death. Col. Peck said the point raised was very important. He told of a man who married after being discharged from the English army. He died, but his wife received no pension.

NEW SCALE ANNOUNCED

Ottawa Reports Receipt of Finding of Local Board.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegrams.)
OTTAWA, April 17.—A new scale of wages for employees of the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co., Prince Rupert, B. C., is recommended in a report of the Board of Conciliation, which investigated the demands of the men. The Board recommends 67½ cents per hour for an eight-hour day instead of 60c, 80c an hour for overtime instead of 70 cents, and 85 cents an hour for Sundays and holidays instead of 75 cents. The increases take place as from February 24, 1920. In addition the Board recommends payment of a bonus of \$1 per week to employees working in freezers and cold storage rooms.

HAD BEAVER SKINS IN HIS POSSESSION

Ole Samuelson Has to Pay Fine of \$500 for Offence.

DAWSON, Y. T., April 17.—A fine of \$500 was imposed on Ole Samuelson by Judge McAuley for having in his possession 22 beaver skins. Samuelson arrived from Leduc district of White River with about \$25,000 worth of skins including beaver, some foxes and 230 marten. It is illegal to kill beaver in Yukon Territory.

Garde States Alice Arm and Stewart Should have Mechanical Ore Samplers

"If there was one thing that was emphasized to me more than anything else on my recent trip to Alice Arm, it was the need for government controlled ore samplers at that point and Stewart," said A. C. Garde, M. E., to a News representative yesterday afternoon.

"The question is an old one. There is not a mining camp of any importance in North America, indeed the world, that has not one and why these places should not have them is more than I can see. They have the same relative effect to mining as grain elevators have to grain growing.

"These mechanical ore samplers would be even more important to the small miners than the large companies. The latter are always able to take care of themselves. It is a fact that the small mine operators are at the mercy of the smelters and the returns are, in many cases, far from satisfactory. The miner would be able to take his ore, high grade or low grade, and in any quantities and have it tested and the smelters, having representatives at the samplers, would buy the ore up at prices fixed by the government examination.

Case in Point

"While I was at Alice Arm one especial case was brought to my notice where a small shipment was sent to a smelter. The returns were far from satisfactory and had a disastrous result on the miner thus affected. If ore samplers were in operation, such cases as this would be entirely avoided. I am speaking not from hearsay but from actual facts gained at first hand.

Mr. Garde is still confident in the future of the Alice Arm district. He looked for a prosperous season there this year and predicts great things for the camp, not from a "bonanza" standpoint only, but from the steady development of average ores.

Steel Industry.

Mr. Garde also states, speaking of the Copper River iron and coal question, that mining men in authority as well as the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway and the governments are getting together and are beginning to realize the potential possibilities, both for the railroad and this city, involved in the development and operation of these mining fields, more especially in regard to the establishment of the steel industry near Prince Rupert.

Sport Briefs

Sir Thomas Lipton will sail for New York at the end of May to supervise the final preparations for the forthcoming America Cup races. The veteran sportsman will not divulge his plans but he expects to lift the cup this time.

The weights being used for the Olympic boxing matches are as follows: Flyweight, 110 1/2 lbs.; bantamweight, 116 1/2 lbs.; featherweight, 125 1/2 lbs.; lightweight, 134 1/2 lbs.; welterweight, 145 1/2 lbs.; middleweight, 158 1/2 lbs.; and heavyweight, 174 1/2 lbs.

Miss Violet Routley, 12 years of age, is showing in the Victoria dog show this week the smallest dog in the world—a toy black and tan Pomeranian weighing half a pound. Miss Routley is also exhibiting 12 other remarkable dogs.

Plans are being made by the Vancouver Sportsmen's Club to have Jimmy Wilde, world's flyweight champion, and Pal Moore, American champion, to battle for the world's title in Vancouver late next month.

Daniel J. Kelly, once a famous amateur athlete, died at Fernie last week. He broke several world's records for sprinting and took second place in the broad jump at the Olympic races in London in 1908.

Speaking of how Carpentier and Dempsey can hit, Gunboat Smith recently said: "That Frenchie can soak, make no mistake about that, but Dempsey is just naturally poison. Mining News

Streets at Hyder.
Improvement on the tide flat area of Hyder is proceeding at a rapid pace and building foundations are springing up in every direction, and with the lumber situation relieved, that section is on the verge of a building boom unprecedented in the North. A sidewalk 1,900 feet long is being built that will link up the most of the buildings. Several side streets are also in course of construction.

Mayo Will Ship.
Work has been carried on at Keno Hill in the Mayo district all through the winter and with the first waters of the spring the far north district will ship many hundreds of tons of ore to the smelters. Prospectors and small mine operators in the district state that they expect great development during the coming summer.

Nelson Active.
Mining in the Nelson district will take a boom this spring, according to reports from that section. The Mining Corporation of Canada has taken up its bond on the Yankee Girl mine at Ymir and the manager, W. T. McDowell, has been instructed to get the mine in shape for development on a large scale. A new company is to be formed, incorporated under the name of the Texas Yankee Girl Mining Co. A new ore body containing native and ruby silver has been opened out on the drift at the Phyllis and Gwennie property at Riondel. This property is well equipped with machinery and it is expected that the ore taken out will pay for the development.

New Time at Trail.
The Consolidated Mining and Smelting Co. at Trail have decided to make daylight saving effective at their plant and Thursday the clocks were turned forward one hour there. "As the trains passing through the smelter town are running on old time it will add a little to the mental strain but it may have a tendency to take

Dominion of Canada



Department of Finance

ALL persons residing in Canada, employed in Canada, or carrying on business in Canada, are liable to a tax on income, as follows:—

1. Every unmarried person, or widow, or widower, without dependants as defined by the Act, who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$1,000 or more.
2. All other individuals who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$2,000 or more.
3. Every corporation and joint stock company whose profits exceeded \$2,000 during the fiscal year ended in 1919.

Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 30th of April, 1920.

ALL INDIVIDUALS other than farmers and ranchers must use Form T 1.

FARMERS AND RANCHERS must use Form T 1A.

CORPORATIONS and joint stock companies must use Form T 2.

Penalty

Every person required to make a return, who fails to do so within the time limit, shall be subject to a penalty of Twenty-five per centum of the amount of the tax payable.

Any person, whether taxable, or otherwise, who fails to make a return or provide information duly required according to the provision of the Act, shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty of \$100 for each day during which the default continues. Also any person making a false statement in any return or in any information required by the Minister, shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding \$10,000, or to six months' imprisonment or to both fine and imprisonment.

General Instructions.

Obtain Forms from the Inspectors or Assistant Inspectors of Taxation or from Postmasters.

Read carefully all instructions on Form before filling it in.

PENSIONS FOR NEEDY MOTHERS

Aid Provided for Those with Children to be Granted by Province

The Bill providing for pensions to mothers which is a Government measure before the Legislature provides for aid for indigent mothers up to \$42.50 a month where there is one child under sixteen years of age and an additional \$7.50 for each other child.

In discussing the bill on its second reading, Hon. J. D. McLean, who is in charge of it, pointed to the consensus of opinion among social workers that the hitherto accepted institutional methods of caring for neglected and dependent children is not desirable, but rather must the child be permitted to have the care of its mother. He referred to the difficult position a widow with a family finds herself in in facing the world following the death of the breadwinner. She could either send her children to an institution while she herself went into the labor market to earn a living, she could give her children away by permitting them to be adopted, or she might resort to doubtful methods of gaining a livelihood for herself and them. It was in the interests of the state that a mother so situated should be permitted to retain her control over her family and bring them up in a manner that would make of them future respectable citizens.

DOLLY VARDEN SUITS ENTERED

Announcement of Refusal to Disallow Provincial Act Followed by Litigation

VANCOUVER, April 17.—Litigation in the British Columbia courts to have the Dolly Varden Mines Railway Act of 1919 declared ultra vires and of no effect was launched within a few hours of publication of the Dominion Government's refusal to disallow the act. Two writs were issued from the office of Burns & Walkem, local solicitors, on instructions from R. T. Elliott, K. C., legal adviser of the Dolly Varden Mines Company, original owner of the valuable mine which came into the hands of the Taylor Engineering Company under the terms of the provincial legislation which it is now sought to have set aside.

One writ asks for a series of declarations setting aside the act and all proceedings taken under its provisions. The other writ asks for damages for alleged trespass and for payment to the plaintiff of all money realized from ores produced at the mine.

The Taylor Engineering Company and the Taylor Mines Company are named as defendants in both actions. In the damage action the names of the incorporators of the Taylor Mines Company are added as defendants. These are: A. J. Taylor, H. C. Chine, John Anderson, C. M. Rolston, J. F. Tener and R. P. Butchart.

In the action which raises the constitutional question about the validity of the Legislature's act, C. M. Rolston is the only personal defendant in addition to the two Taylor companies. The first declaration sought is that the Dolly Varden Act is ultra vires of the Legislature and invalid and of no force and effect. The second declaration asked is the setting aside of all acts, documents and proceedings under the said act as invalid, unlawful and void, together with the delivery and cancellation of all documents and registrations affecting the alleged rights, titles and claims of the plaintiff.

Setting aside of all proceedings before Justices Clement and Murphy under the act is asked. Another order asked is that the defendants be required to execute and deliver to the plaintiff company all documents and writing necessary to reinstate the plaintiff company in the position it occupied before the passing of the act.


