## Income Tax Return on or before the 30th of April, 1920.



**Department of Finance** 

ALL persons residing in Canada, employed in Canada, or carrying on business in Canada, are liable to a tax on income, as follows:-

Monday, April 19, 1920

1. Every unmarried person, or widow, or widower, without dependants as defined by the Act, who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$1,000 or more.

2. All other individuals who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$2,000 or more.

#### Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 30th of April, 1920.

**ALL INDIVIDUALS** other than farmers and ranchers must use Form T 1.

FARMERS AND RANCHERS must use Form T 1A.

**CORPORATIONS** and joint stock companies must use Form Т 2.

#### Penalty

Every person required to make a return, who fails to do so within the time limit, shall be subject to a penalty of Twenty-five per centum of the amount of the tas payable.

Any person, whether taxable, or otherwise. who fails to make a return or provide information duly required according to the provision of the Act, shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty of \$100 for each day during which the default continues. Also any person making a false statement in any return or in any information required by the Minister, shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding \$10,000, or to six months' imprison ment or to both fine and imprisonment.

Read carefully all instructions on Form before filling it in.
