Another Dolly Varden Bill Passed by the Legislature

Ownership of the Mine Vested in the Taylor Engineering Co.; House Prorogues on Saturday after Completing Work

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

VICTORIA, April 19.—The passing of a resolution asking the federal government to at once take steps to secure an adequate supply of sugar for the use of the people and for the fruit and vegetable industries of Canada, was one of the last acts of the fourth session of the fourteenth legislature of British Columbia, which prorogued on Saturday.

During the session just closed 116 bills were introduced. The famous Dolly Varden mine property was vested in the Taylor Engineering Co. in a bill put through its final stages at the session of the House on Saturday. This legislation seems to be for the purpose of heading off the actions which have been commenced in the courts. It is said that the power of the legislature to pass this legislation will be contested by the former owners of the mine.

EX-RULERS SEE PATH TO POWER IN BOLSHEVISM

Says Sir Hall Caine After Tour of Europe.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

LONDON, April 19.—In a remarkable statement on the "spectacle" of the present social and economic unrest in Central Europe by Sir Hall Caine, who has just returned from a three months' tour of the continent of Europe, the British author warns against what he describes as "a complete spiritual overthrow of the Central Powers." Sir Hall Caine says the ex-rulers of Europe are building their hopes on Bolshevism as the red path through which they are to gain power into their own and warns that Germany is a ready subject for the autocracy of soviets.

5,000 WATCHED SCOTTISH GAME

Play Was Very Fast But Kilmarnock Was Easily Best Team

GLASGOW, April 19.—In the football game for the Scottish Cup played on Saturday in which Kilmarnock defeated the Aberdeen Rovers, thus winning the championship by a score of 3 to 2, there were 95,000 spectators present, a record for Scottish Cup games.

The play throughout was fast and Kilmarnock showed better football, particularly in the forward division. In the first half Aberdeen scored for the Rovers and they for Kilmarnock. Short and Smith added two more for Kilmarnock in the second half and Gilhouse scored for the Rovers. In the final stages the players on both sides were excited and fouls were frequent, but Kilmarnock to finish were always more dangerous and thoroughly deserved the victory.

PLANE HERE FIRST WEEK NEXT MONTH

Roy C. Price, who is at the head of the hydroplane scheme for the Stewart mines, leaves for the south in a few days and will return about the first week in May aboard one of the new Boeing C-14-S planes. The machine will be piloted by one of the well-known aviators in the south and will drop in Prince Rupert harbor on the way to Stewart. Pictures of the machines are now on exhibition in the office of the Free Miners' League.

PAY BIG PRICE FOR CAR LOTS

Shipped Fish to Chicago—Cars Still Wanted—Embargo Meant Loss.

Eighteen cents was paid at yesterday's fish sale for car lots of fish. This fish is shipped to Chicago but shipment east of that point is not yet assured. Three express refrigerators arrived by last night's train.

It is estimated that between 150,000 and 200,000 pounds of halibut has been diverted to Ketchikan during the past few days on account of the two days' embargo on express shipments of fish out of this port. It is very doubtful if the fishermen gained anything by taking their catches to Ketchikan, however.

Worldwide Shortage Of Wheat Reported

Russia Doing Little to Relieve Bad Condition and Europe looking to Other Countries for Supplies

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

WASHINGTON, April 19.—Indications of a world wide shortage of wheat this year and a world wide increase in the demand is reported by the American Agricultural Trade Commissioner at London, who said bread was selling in England at what was generally considered the highest prices the workingman would tolerate without grave disorders.

With Russia still in a chaotic state there is little to be expected from that country in wheat exports, and Europe naturally turns to Canada, Australia, India, the United States and Argentina.

The British Government has announced a maximum price for the 1920 crop to be the average price of imported wheat of similar quality, provided the price so paid the home grower shall not exceed \$2.98 a bushel. The United States imports, the commissioner reported, were ranging from \$3.04 to \$4.11 or an average of \$3.46 a bushel.

QUARTER OF MILLION THREATEN TO STRIKE

BLACKBURN, England, April 19.—A meeting of delegates representing every section of the weaving branch of the Lancashire cotton industry decided to tender notices to force compliance of the demand for a sixty per cent increase in wages.

A quarter of a million operatives are affected.

JONES MOTION IS LEFT OVER

is to be Discussed at Special Meeting and Brought up at Next Regular One.

Owing to the lateness of the month, the Jones motion calling for the dismissal of the entire police force is left over until the next meeting of the commission on May 7. Monday Sermonette, What Do We Work For?

What do you work for? Why do you not live the same as the man you pity, who never has a bean and who has to draw on his day's pay in order to buy his lunch? Is it any advantage to work and to try to do the work well? These are questions which the pause of Sunday gives time to think about. These are a few of the questions that are passed on as suitable for meditation next Sunday.

Most men work for wages. They are after the money there is in it. No matter whether it be employer or employed, the monetary reward is what we are reaching out after. It is necessary to have money to live and the more money the better the life, in reason.

There is more in work than the money reward, however. Money is simply the incentive and not the end. When a football team plays for a cup, the members look to the reward, but after all the reward is nothing. It is the development of the men when seeking the reward that really counts. So it is with the work of life. Work spells development; idleness spells degradation. Work is absolutely necessary for every man, if he is to develop or even to hold his own.

The average man who stops work after making his pile dies. He has nothing more to live for. There are a few, however, who have hobbies who turn to those when they give up business, and the hobby provides the incentive.

Making money is a poor aim in life, but it is better than none. The aimless man gets nowhere and his life is usually miserable. To be care free is to revert to the jellyfish condition.

The Poor Fools, Why do They Work?

In an effort to be fair to readers of this paper and from a spirit of curiosity, the foregoing screed which was written on Saturday afternoon was shown to the laziest man in Prince Rupert with rather startling results. It is impossible to reproduce exactly what he said but it was something like this:

"Say, cut it! You guys make me sick. What's the use of working? Where does it get you anyway? If it makes you live longer, is the world any better for that and are you any better? Why want to live? Why want to evolve or develop? I suppose you are right that a man should have an aim in life. Mine is to have as easy a time as possible. That is what I live for."

"Talk about your jellyfish with contempt if you like, but give me a jellyfish any day rather than the modern businessman. The jellyfish let me tell you enjoys life, but the modern B.M., how can he enjoy anything? He hasn't time to enjoy even a roast turkey. He has to bolt his food because it is a waste of time to eat it properly. He talks shop all the time and thinks of nothing but profits, as represented by dollars. He is a nervous machine chasing a shadow. Get rid of the idea that there is any merit in living like that. It isn't life, it's the raving of a crazy man expressed in action."

"If all people were like you would have them, what would become of art? Who would make your beautiful pictures or express themselves in beautiful music? Life under your conditions is nothing but a fox trot with boastly jazz from beginning to end."

"Let us alone, do. Give us time to live. You editors and businessmen and reformers are all alike. You want to drive us all to hades when we want to remain in heaven. What is the good of sunshine if you have no time to enjoy it? Why have beauty if you have no appreciation of it? Do you ever look up the harbor from the waterfront and see the clouds rolling over the glacier in the distance and think of the loveliness of the scene? No, you only think of rain when you see a cloud. You only think of so many kilowatts of energy when you see a waterfall, you think only of medicinal herbs when you see a flower. Why not forget these things sometimes and get a little appreciation into your barren soul and remember that there is something in life besides chasing dollars, besides building cities, besides sewers and streets, besides railroads and steamships. Your utilities are mostly futilities. Go to your aunt, you sluggard, borrow another dollar and enjoy yourself. Let the fools who know no better worry over the present and the future. Most of your worries are really things that never will happen. Life might well be one long dream, but you make it one long screeching scream."

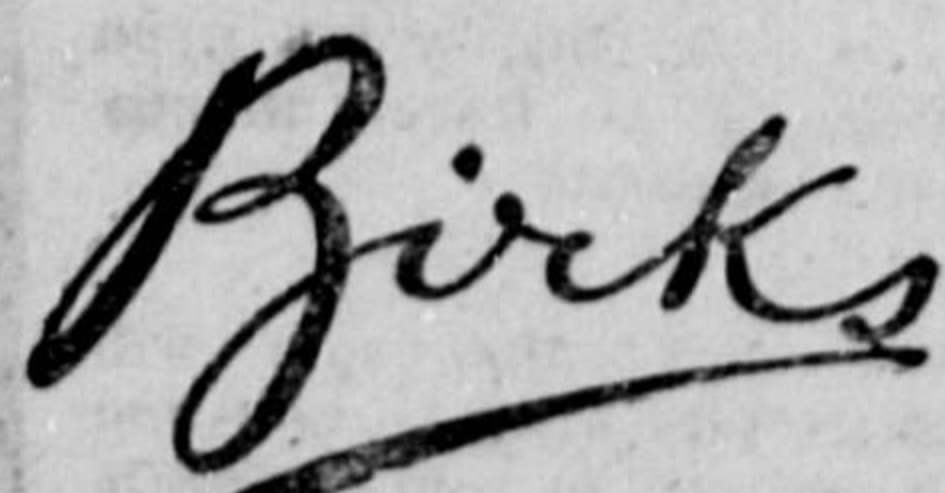

Dominion of Canada



Department of Finance

ALL persons residing in Canada, employed in Canada, or carrying on business in Canada, are liable to a tax on income, as follows:—

1. Every unmarried person, or widow, or widower, without dependants as defined by the Act, who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$1,000 or more.
2. All other individuals who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$2,000 or more.
3. Every corporation and joint stock company whose profits exceeded \$2,000 during the fiscal year ended in 1919.

Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 30th of April, 1920.

ALL INDIVIDUALS other than farmers and ranchers must use Form T 1.

FARMERS AND RANCHERS must use Form T 1A.

CORPORATIONS and joint stock companies must use Form T 2.

Penalty

Every person required to make a return, who fails to do so within the time limit, shall be subject to a penalty of Twenty-five per centum of the amount of the tax payable.

Any person, whether taxable, or otherwise, who fails to make a return or provide information duly required according to the provision of the Act, shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty of \$100 for each day during which the default continues. Also any person making a false statement in any return or in any information required by the Minister, shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding \$10,000, or to six months' imprisonment or to both fine and imprisonment.

INDIANS AND PROPOSED LAW

Do Not Like Idea of Being Made Equal to Whites—Fear Loss of Lands.

OTTAWA, April 15.—Beware of the Greeks when they come bearing gifts." Such is the attitude of the Indians of Canada in objecting to compulsory enfranchisement and education. In two memorials placed before the special committee the Six Nations of Brantford, the Mohawks of Tyendinaga, Stegis and Caughnawaga, near Montreal, the Iroquois Indians of Oka, and the allied Indian tribes of British Columbia, presented arguments to show that these fair gifts would destroy their tribes, throw their lands into the hands of outsiders, and scatter them through Canada without any of the economic rights secured to them by treaties in earlier days.

They claimed that such an act was ultra vires so far as the Parliament of Canada is concerned, and that at Confederation no such sweeping powers were granted the Dominion Government as those assumed by the Federal authorities. A. E. O'Meara appeared for the British Columbia Indians, and a number of Indians were present as well.

Treated as Serfs.

Both the Eastern and the Western Indians contended that it was illogical to say that the Indians were so intelligent and advanced that they should have the franchise and then refuse to consult them about it. This was treating them as "serfs" and that such enfranchisement took the Indian from the community of his relatives as a member of the band or troop by a simple report of an "officer or person" who might have a dislike to him.

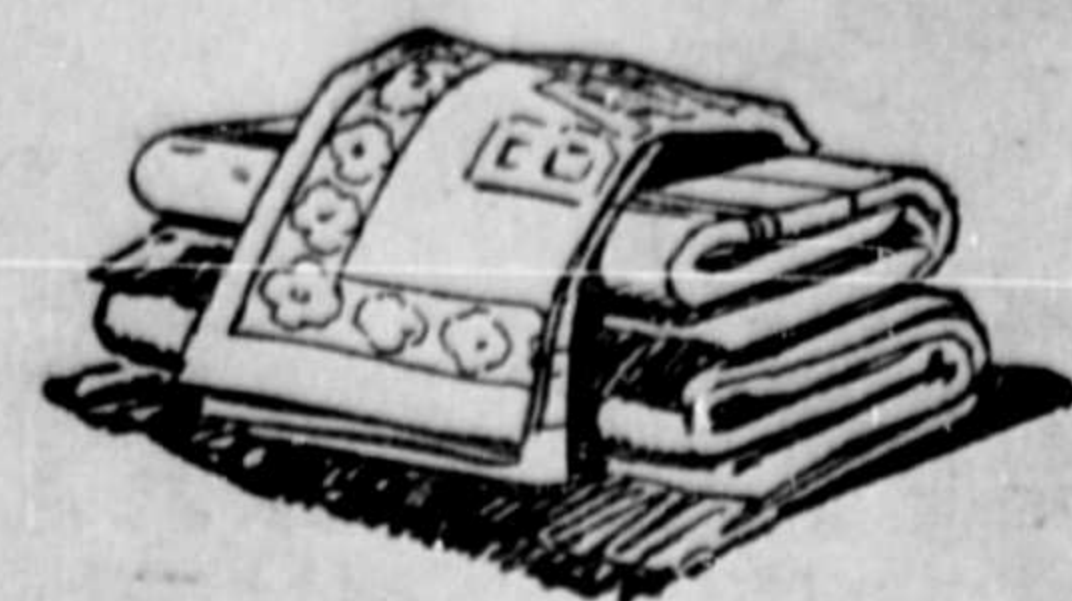
"It is feared," says the Eastern memorial, "that the effect will be that if an agent finds an intelligent Indian asserting any right the agent will be able to get rid of him by encompassing his compulsory enfranchisement."

By the same arbitrary process the Indians fear the lands or moneys of a band or tribe can be broken into, and that custodians of lands or moneys of the minor children may be arbitrarily selected. They state that under the proposed act a whole community can be compulsory enfranchised and its lands and property sold to outsiders without any of the owners being in any way consulted.

The allied Indians of British Columbia relate a history of fifty years of injustice, during which time they fought a losing battle against those who wanted to shift them to less fertile portions of the province, contract their reserves, eliminate their hunting and fishing privileges and deny the rights they claimed. They see in the new act an effort to "break up the tribes of British Columbia," destroying their status and preventing them obtaining recognition of the tribal rights guaranteed them by Imperial enactment.

Seeking to Take Rights.

"In this bill we see no genuine attempt to build us up materially, intellectually and morally, thus placing us on our feet preparatory to our becoming citizens, but, instead, an unjust attempt to tear us down by a Government posing as our guardian, and taking advantage of our weakness. We now see more clearly than ever

that the real position of the Government of Canada is not that of a guardian protecting our rights, but that of an interested party owning greater tracts of land in British Columbia and controlling vast fisheries on that coast, and because of these interests seeking to take away our rights."

DEATH SENTENCES WERE COMMUTED IN EVERY PROVINCE

(Special via G. T. P. Telegrams.)
OTTAWA, April 17.—Forty-six death sentences have been commuted by the Department of Justice in the last four years. Forty of the condemned are now serving life sentences, five are serving terms of from ten to twenty years and one was granted a new trial which is now pending.

Of the cases mentioned nine were in Manitoba, six in Quebec, six in Alberta, five in British Columbia, four in Saskatchewan, 3 in Nova Scotia, and one each in New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and the Yukon.

The only change in either big league this winter was when George Gibson was signed to succeed Hugo Bezdek as manager of the Pittsburgh Pirates.

Jimmie Wilde, the English atom, doesn't go much on the American boxing game. He says it isn't run right. When a boxer wins a title in his class he seems to think it's a life legacy and will not endanger it to challengers. He says there should be a governing board in America that would make title holders defend their titles at least once a year.
