Allies Will Force Germany To Carry Out Peace Treaty

Difference of Opinion as to What Means to Take; Probably Ultimatum will be Sent with Threat of Compulsion in Case of Failure to Comply

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
SAN REMO, April 20.—The Inter-Allied Supreme Council in its formal sessions yesterday. There seems no doubt that the premiers are agreed that a joint declaration must be sent to Germany requesting her to fulfill the conditions of the Versailles Treaty and if she does not do so the Allies will take measures to compel her. The premiers, however, have not yet agreed upon the form of pressure to be used should Germany prove negligent.
Premier Lloyd George suggested economic pressure, depriving Germany of food, raw materials and intercourse with allied countries.
Premier Millerand is declared as having said that such pressure without the use of naval or military forces would in effect be no pressure at all.
Premier Lloyd George resisted this conclusion and Premier Clemenceau is inclined towards the Prime Minister's view for the present. A compromise may take the form of an ultimatum to Germany with the threat of applying effective compulsion without indicating what form the compulsion might take.
The Turkish treaty was approved by the council in the general session in which it was drawn by the council of foreign ministers in London. It was decided to request the Turkish plenipotentiaries to present themselves in London on May 10 to receive the treaty.
BERLIN, April 20.—The Allied reply to President Wilson's note on Turkey will say the Allies cannot withdraw any of the conditions they have reached regarding the Ottoman powers.

THE UNIVERSITY AT POINT GREY

Work is to Proceed This Year up to Half Million Dollars.

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
VICTORIA, April 20.—The British Columbia Government has decided on Point Grey at Vancouver as the permanent site for the provincial university and has secured 3,000 acres of land for the purpose.
The undertaking will be financed by means of a \$3,000,000 loan and construction work to the extent of at least \$500,000 is to be proceeded with this year.

Fears Invasion of Her Constitution

Quebec Members Refuse to Adopt Proposal to Establish Educational Bureau for Whole Country; Flank Attack

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
OTTAWA, April 20.—"That it is the opinion of this House that a Bureau of Education should be established at Ottawa," was a motion proposed by Dr. Edwards of Frontenac that gave rise to a debate in the House of Commons yesterday, which monopolized the proceedings and eventually ended in the withdrawal of the resolution.
Dr. Edwards urged the establishment of such a bureau as a central clearing house of information on education.
Dr. Clark, temporarily leading the third party, was in general agreement with the resolution, but it met with strong opposition from Quebec members. They took the ground that it was a flank attack on the constitutional rights of the provinces to control their own educational policy.
Capt. C. G. Power of Quebec South said Quebec held her autonomy in education sacred and would not change one comma of her magna charta.

JAPS IN SIBERIA

WASHINGTON, April 20.—The Japanese military are negotiating for co-operation with the remnant of Admiral Kolchak's forces to safeguard their position in Siberia.

Miss Jacqueline Van Til, a Dutch trained nurse, of Brussels, and associate of the martyred British woman, has arrived in America to make her home. Miss Van Til was imprisoned with Miss Edith Cavell by the Germans.

Three Million Students in China on Strike Against Direct Dealing with Japan

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
SHANGHAI, April 20.—Three million students throughout the fourteen northern provinces of China are on strike in protest against direct negotiation with Japan on the Shantung question. The students paraded the streets of the principal cities seeking to enlist the support of China's hundred million trade unionists. Abrogation of all secret treaties are demanded by students who have promised they will not molest foreigners.

PERLEY AT PARIS

Represents Canada at Conference on Credits of Allies to Central Europe.

LONDON, April 20.—Sir George Perley has gone to Paris as Canadian representative at a conference regarding allied credits for Central Europe.

NOT RESPONSIBLE

A report from the secretary and matron of the general hospital stating that the officials of the institution were not responsible for the disappearance of Balde-mero Salinas, was read at last night's council meeting. The letter explained that Salinas had entered the institution under a physician's care and the doctor had given him freedom to move in and out of the institution at his pleasure. His disappearance had been reported to the physician in charge.

MORSE CREEK BRIDGE BIDS

Lowest Tender Exceeds Estimated Cost by \$12,000—Referred to Board of Works.


With muffled ejaculations and whistles of surprise, the tenders for the erection of the Morse Creek bridge were opened at the council meeting last night and hastily referred to the Board of Works and city engineer for report, on the motion of Alderman Perry, seconded by Alderman Dybhavn. The lowest tender of the three presented bid \$29,900 on the work, \$14,900 more than the original estimate. This was the tender of George F. MacDonald, W. J. Greer, A. C. Beatty and W. Douglas.
The city tender based on day labor was for \$41,000 more or less. The other tender, which was for \$36,350, was from D. H. Morrison. No tenders were received from the outside.

Roads Discussed by City Council and Proposal to Dismiss Foreman Defeated

A petition from George Frizzell and 361 others drawing attention to the unsatisfactory and dangerous condition of the main thoroughfare of the city was presented at last night's council meeting and was referred to the Board of Works for consideration. The petition, which was called a "safety first" measure, asked for the macadamizing of approaches to main streets and approaches to wharves and the repair of main plank roads. Stating that roads had sunk already where they had been repaired quite recently, the petition also asked for a more capable road foreman. The petition was the cause of much discussion and the aldermen spent well over an hour talking on various points raised by it.

The discussion was somewhat lengthy and first one feature and then another was brought forward. The mayor drew attention to the financial difficulties and stated that the money market was not in good condition for the marketing of further bonds. He knew that the work was necessary and fully appreciated the need and felt that it would not be a bad idea for George Frizzell and the 261 others as well as the public generally to get behind the city and buy its bonds like they had bought Victory bonds.

Aldermen Discuss.
Alderman Casey was in sympathy with the petitioners and realized that the streets were in an alarming condition. The time had come for the city council to take a definite stand, undertake a certain amount of work and try to sell the bonds. If this was done the council would exonerate itself. But if the policy of talking things over and getting no further was going to continue, then the people were right in protesting.
Alderman Perry stated that the formulating of a policy was up to the Board of Works. They should prepare a by-law and present it to the council. He claimed that the Board of Works was as dead as the chairman of that board gave the council credit with being.

ANOTHER BIG LIQUOR THEFT

Nine Hundred Dollars' Worth Stolen From Olier Besner's Warehouse.

WARRANT IS ISSUED FOR JOCK MORRISON

The theft of 21 cases of liquor valued at \$900, was reported to the police this morning by Olier Besner and a warrant for the arrest of Jock Morrison, a well known teamster, was issued at noon in connection with the affair. An attempt to arrest Morrison was made this morning on the street without a warrant but he would not be arrested and challenged the officers.
Up to a few minutes before going to press he had not been located this afternoon.
On the report of the theft, Warden Bailey made investigations at Besner's bonded warehouse, the old Knox Pool Room, from where the liquor was taken. It was found that a window had been forced and the back door opened with a crow-bar. The liquor was loaded on to one of the Lindsay Cartage wagons on Second Ave., evidently driven by Morrison. It was learned that the time of the theft was between the hours of 2:45 and 4:30 this morning.

According to the police the liquor alleged to have been stolen is kept by Besner in the bonded warehouse for export, he having a license to carry on that business.

Contract Awarded This Morning to Wallace Yards—No Local Tender.

At ten o'clock this morning the tenders for the repairs to the steamer Prince John were opened and the contract awarded to the Wallace Shipyards of Vancouver, the lowest bidder.
Captain Nicholson announced some temporary repairs would be made to the patch toward the ship would then be repaired and would leave tomorrow.
The contract for the completion of the repairs within 31 running days, means that she should be ready for commission again by the end of the month.
Other firms that tendered on the job were the B. C. Marine, of Vancouver, and the Victoria Machinery Depot and Yards, Ltd., of Esquimalt. No local tender was put in.
Capt. Nicholson leaves tonight for Vancouver on the Chelohsin.

ROCK SLIDE DELAYS TRAIN

Mail and Passengers from East Will Not Arrive Until Tomorrow.

The regular passenger train from the east will not arrive tonight, but a local from Prince George will pick up the mail and passengers between that point and this city. The transcontinental is tied up by a rockslide at Geikie, just over the border in Alberta not far from Jasper Park.
The first slide occurred just as Saturday's Number 2 was passing Geikie on Sunday night. There was some damage to the baggage, mail and colonist cars, but no one was injured. The passenger cars escaped and were taken back to Lucerne.
During the night more debris came down the mountain and last night there was another slide at the same place. A gang is working, clearing away and it should be all clear tonight or tomorrow morning. In the meantime the passengers and mail have been transferred and will arrive here tomorrow evening.

YARROWS GET ALBERT JOB

Tenders for Repair of Steamer Opened Today—Will Take Twelve Days.

The tenders for the repairs to the G.T.P. steamer Prince Albert were opened at noon today and the tender of Yarrows, Ltd., of Esquimalt was accepted. The firms tendering were the Prince Rupert Dry Dock and Engineering Co., Ltd.; The Victoria Machinery Co., Ltd.; Wallace's Shipyards, Ltd.; B. C. Marine, Ltd., and Yarrows. The last mentioned firm was awarded the contract, as their tender was the lowest.
The "Albert" will continue on the run until the repairs to the Prince John are completed and when the latter ship is again handling traffic, the Albert will lie up. Her repairs will take twelve days.

The time used is Pacific Standard, for the 120th Meridian west. It is counted from 0 to 24 hours, from midnight to midnight. The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson. The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

"It began in discussing the public works estimates and the \$100,000 for the government buildings there. She comes naturally by her football keenness, being a sister of Harry Kinghorn, of the Sheffield Wednesday Club, and Abe Kinghorn, the well known local player.

A box score for wrestling—that is the latest to be sprung on the public. It was kept at the bout between Strangler Lewis and Joe Stecher last Friday night, when the latter was winner. Stecher was put to the mat 29 times for 22 minutes, while Lewis was down 35 times for 29 minutes. Stecher's scissors lock was effective in winning the match.

CONSTRUCTION OF RAILROAD

Great Activity in Connection with P. G. E. Near Prince George.

FIFTY CAR LOADS OF STEEL HAVE ARRIVED

One hundred and thirty-eight carloads of steel rails were recently cleared at the American boundary for tracklaying on the Pacific Great Eastern south of Prince George. Last week fifty carloads were unloaded at Prince George. Besides this there are several carloads of various supplies including spikes, tie plates and bridge stringers.

At the present time there are about 150 men engaged near Prince George on railway construction but this number will be largely augmented as soon as the frost leaves the ground. Hundreds of thousands of yards of material will have to be excavated and, eventually, it will be necessary to obtain a quarry for rock with which to do rip-rapping.

The mill which has been running at Stone Creek has cut 700,000 feet of bridge timber and is about to move to Red Rock, 16 miles south of Prince George. At this point a million feet of timber will be cut. The mill at Bednesti, 19 miles west of Prince George, on the line of the G. T. P. has already cut a million feet.

CONTRACTS MAY BE ENFORCED

Proposed Legislation in Regard to Agreements Between Labor Unions and Employers.

(Special by G. T. P. Telegrams.)
OTTAWA, April 19.—Legislation to place agreements between labor organizations and employers in the same class as legal contracts enforceable by the courts, is talked of here as a result of certain outlaw strikes. Those strikes are in violation of agreements and contrary to the wishes of international executives. For instance, in Montreal the printers have walked out although their agreement has some time yet to run and wages have been supplemented by bonuses and although their action has been disapproved by the executive officers of their international organization.

Dominion of Canada



Department of Finance

ALL persons residing in Canada, employed in Canada, or carrying on business in Canada, are liable to a tax on income, as follows:—

1. Every unmarried person, or widow, or widower, without dependants as defined by the Act, who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$1,000 or more.
2. All other individuals who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$2,000 or more.
3. Every corporation and joint stock company whose profits exceeded \$2,000 during the fiscal year ended in 1919.

Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 30th of April, 1920.

ALL INDIVIDUALS other than farmers and ranchers must use Form T 1.

FARMERS AND RANCHERS must use Form T 1A.

CORPORATIONS and joint stock companies must use Form T 2.

Penalty

Every person required to make a return, who fails to do so within the time limit, shall be subject to a penalty of Twenty-five per centum of the amount of the tax payable.

Any person, whether taxable, or otherwise, who fails to make a return or provide information duly required according to the provision of the Act, shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty of \$100 for each day during which the default continues. Also any person making a false statement in any return or in any information required by the Minister, shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding \$10,000, or to six months' imprisonment or to both fine and imprisonment.

CAPT. RACKET WAS SUCCESS LAST NIGHT

Plenty of Humor and Action in Three-Act Comedy and the Characters Were Excellently Sustained.

The three-act comedy "Captain Racket" given last night at the Westholme Theatre was one of the best amateur events that has been staged here. The play was humorous and lively throughout, the players knew their parts or at any rate gave no evidence of need of prompting, and there was a large and appreciative audience giving psychological help. As a result the players were at their best and the audience went away pleased. The result should be another bumper house tonight, for the fame of a good thing travels as fast as that of a bad one.

Jealousy the Motif.

The play is not of the usual type, for whereas it is usual for love to be the motive power in manipulating the characters, in this case it is jealousy that does the work. Mrs. Tolman is jealous of her husband. Anyone who has seen jealousy at work in real life does not need to be told of the possibilities. Mrs. T. C. Duncan carries off this part wonderfully well. Anyone not knowing her would almost imagine she must be to the manner born. She is the life of the play and the centre for all the comedy. A. W. Barr makes an excellent Captain Racket. His assurance and nonchalance are inimitable. He is the star prevaricator of the troupe. Rip Boyd as the poor henpecked husband gets drunk as if these were pre-prohibition days and his excellent characterization throughout was the subject of remark from everyone. Miss Edmonds as Clarice exhibits unexpected ability along hitherto unsuspected lines. That kick in which the Captain's hat is removed is certainly a work of art. She played her part very well.

Tootsy the Best.

Of the more or less minor parts Jack Frost was a first rate Uncle from Japan who would like to have married his nephew's wife; J. G. Dalziel could not have been improved on as Mrs. Tolman's father, and J. Stuart Pudney, director of the organization, to whom much of the success of the event was due, had the very minor part of a cafe waiter. Miss Gladys Kemp was sweet and coy as a mischievous maid, but the character that was best sustained of all was that taken by Stuart Grant Moore the infant son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Moore, who made his debut on the stage as Tootsy the "kid," Tim's olive branch. If there was any criticism to make it was that the climax was a little weak, but that is the fault of the play rather than of the actor. Suffice it that everyone came away thoroughly pleased. The management and caste may be congratulated on the excellent entertainment they provided.

LANDS AND LOANS TO RETURNED SOLDIERS

OTTAWA, April 19.—Up to April 3, the Soldiers Settlement Board of Canada has issued soldier grant entries to 6,396 returned men. A soldier grant entry comprises 160 acres of free Dominion lands, but these beneficiaries are entitled to a homestead of 160 acres as well as the soldier grant.

Approximately one half of the number who have taken up soldier grant entries have also taken up homesteads, which means an aggregate of well over one and a half million acres of free lands granted to returned soldiers. These settlers are entitled to loans amounting to a maximum of \$3,000 for equipment and improvements. Up to March 6, the Soldier Settlement Board had loaned nearly four million dollars to such settlers.



ROADS DISCUSSED BY CITY COUNCIL

(Continued From Page One.)

street man to evolve a system of permanent street work.

Alderman Rochester agreed with Ald. Dybhavn that an experienced man should be brought in but not until it was decided to go ahead with the permanent work.

Alderman McLennan said that the time had certainly come for the permanent work on the main streets such as paving, asphaltting or putting on bitulithic. The policy must be formulated, the work must be financed and then carried out. The proposition was staggering but it must be done.

Not Fire Foreman.

The question of the replacing of the road foreman was then taken up. Ald. Casey reported the recommendation of the Board of Works that the city engineer be given 30 days to find a competent successor to Road Foreman McLeod and moved its adoption. This was seconded by Ald. Kerr. On being questioned by the other aldermen, Ald. Casey admitted that the reason for the dismissal was incompetence. The question then resolved itself into debate and the report was bitterly opposed by several of the aldermen.

The point taken by those opposing was that the work of Foreman McLeod had been satisfactory and that as long as the policy was not altered he was quite capable of taking care of the street work. If the work was not satisfactory then the city engineer or the Board of Works was responsible, as Foreman McLeod should be working under their supervision. Ald. Perry stated that he wanted to see the right person "lose his head."

The report recommending the dismissal of Foreman McLeod was lost on a 3-4 division, Aldermen Casey, Kerr and Dybhavn voting in favor of it, with Aldermen Rochester, McLennan, Perry and Murray against it. Alderman Currie was not present.
