FURTHER LIGHT McDUFF MYSTERY

Wire Has Been Received From
Justice of Peace at Queen
Charlotte Telling of
Letter Found.

More light has been shed on the
mystery of the McDuff, the sal-
mon troll boat which ran on the
rocks with sails unfurled near
Queen Charlotte City last week,
in a telegram which was this
morning received at the provin-
cial police office from J. L. Barge,
justice of the peace at Queen
Charlotte City.

The message tells of the find-
ing of a letter on board the craft
addressed to the mother of Abel
Edwards, 176 Burgess Street,
Grimsby, England. It tells of a
broken rudder and engine with
the boat drifting in a gale of wind
in Hecate Straits. "Remember
me to all, goodbye for evermore,"
are the tragic words of farewell.

The boat left Queen Charlotte
City on April 16 for this port in
charge of an Indian, Thomas
Crosby.

WILL TRY TO RAISE PRINCESS SOPHIA

Crew of Men Gone North to Make
Preparations for the Work.

A crew of men has gone north
to prepare for the attempt to
raise the Princess Sophia from
Vanderbilt Reef, Lynn Canal, this
year. The Deep Sea Salvage Com-
pany, of Seattle, has undertaken
the task, and last year gathered
equipment near the wreck for an
attempt.

The Deep Sea Salvage Company
claims that it will also investi-
gate the chances of raising the
Islander, which sank near Juneau
with gold bullion aboard.

Apparatus for raising the So-
phia has been designed by a Se-
attle house-mover. It consists of
two scows joined by a bridgework
from which cables will go down
to the wreck. The high tides are
expected to give the necessary lift
once the cables are tightened
around the hull. A series of lifts
of this kind would allow the wreck
to be moved into shallow water
near shore and there repaired.

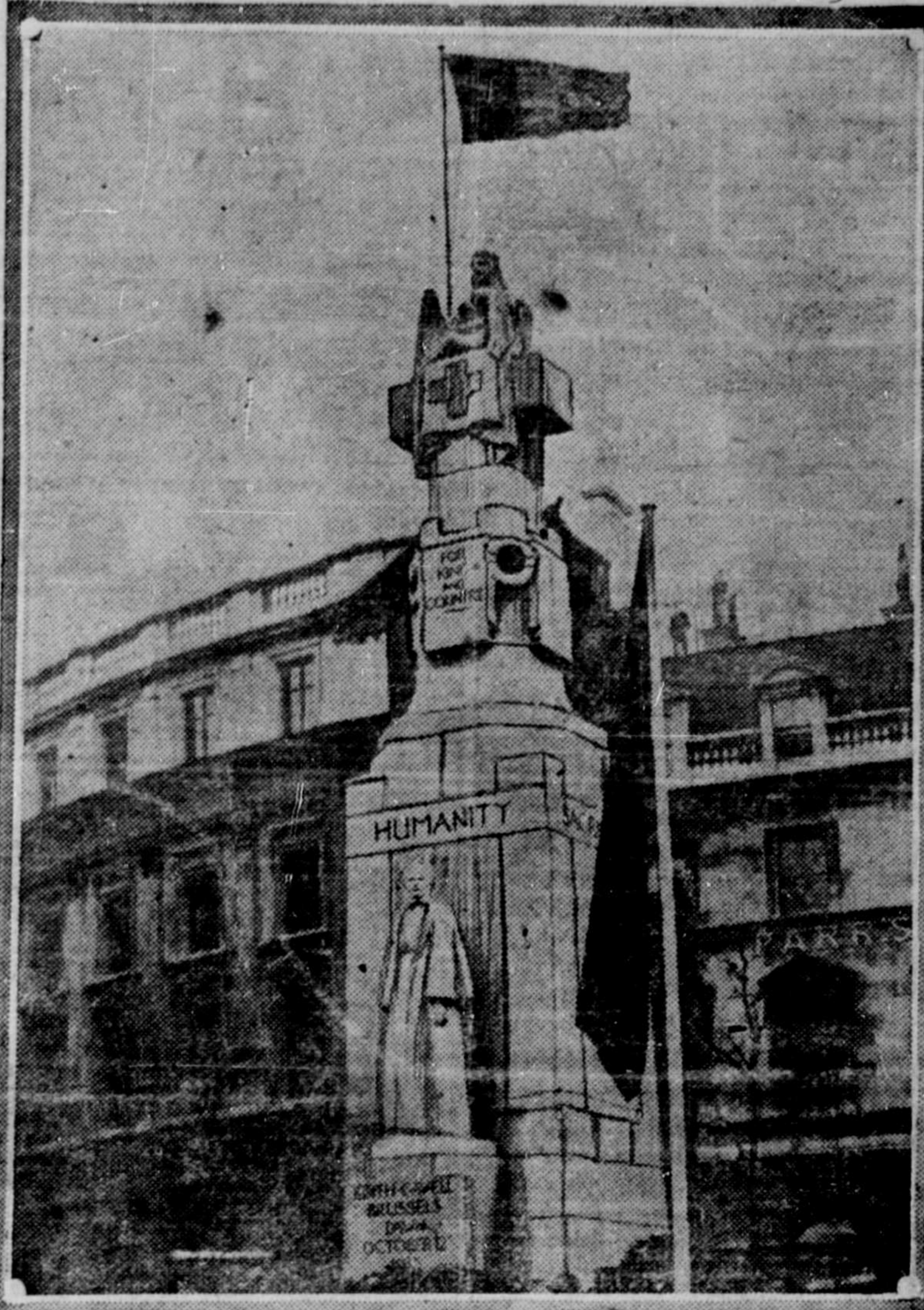
OFFICIALS GO SOUTH

Big Death List in Wake of Tornado

Reports from Southern States give
Number Dead at 4,000 and Property
Loss of Many Millions

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
BIRMINGHAM, Ala., April 21.—A death list of 4,000 and
property loss of many million dollars is the toll exacted by a
tornado which swept towns and villages and isolated farms in
eastern Mississippi, northwestern Alabama and the southern
counties of Tennessee. Communication with the stricken dis-
trict is difficult but fragmentary reports are agreed that the tor-
nado swept down with suddenness, obliterating everything that
lay in its path.

In at least one case, that of Rose Hill, Miss., practically the
entire town is destroyed, and in several instances all the members
of a family are reported to have been killed.

MORRISON IS CHARGED WITH TWO OFFENCES

Assault on Police Officer and
Theft of Liquor—Was
Given Bail.

John Morrison, charged with

Appreciation of Work of Amateurs.

Last Sunday night the Prince Rupert Symphony Orchestra completed a most successful season, and last night and Monday the Amateur Dramatic Society put on a most successful comedy, the third of a series. In each case good work was done and the people here were provided with good clean entertainment by their own people.

The Symphony Orchestra was a boon to the community, for it not only provided entertainment but helped to develop the musical taste of the community and to create an interest in instrumental music. The Amateur Dramatic Society has done something the same for the histrionic art. The work in the play just shown was in many respects first rate. It is to be hoped that next season these two organizations will again take up the work that the city will benefit.

Plebiscite on Prohibition.

The Provincial Government has arranged for a plebiscite to be taken on the Prohibition Act. The people will decide whether or not they will continue as at present or have the government sell liquor in sealed bottles. If the people decide for continuation of prohibition, the prohibition leaders in the south say they will try to have a petition sent to the Dominion Government asking for a bone dry measure, somewhat similar to that in force during the war. It is now up to the people. The plebiscite to be taken will be on the following form:—

WHICH DO YOU PREFER?

(1) The present "Prohibition Act"?

or

(2) An Act to provide for Government Control and Sale in Sealed Packages of Spirituous and Malt Liquors?

(Mark a X in square opposite one you prefer.)

Trouble Between China and Japan.

China takes exception to the position that she has to negotiate with Japan in regard to the return of Shantung, the place which was taken from Germany during the war. Three million students are reported to have gone on strike as a protest against such action. The argument is that the territory is China's and she should not be obliged to negotiate in order to get it. It should have been a part of the treaty. It was not in the treaty because it was understood that Japan would surrender it voluntarily. That was to protect the Japanese pride.

It is probable that Japan will give up the territory, but China feel that it is demeaning to have to ask for it.

Boycott is Powerful Weapon.

As soon as the treaty was signed, China brought about a boycott of Japanese goods. That is her great weapon. She has used it before with good effect. On more than one occasion the boycott has been brought into force and as a result not a pound of Chinese freight was carried on a Japanese vessel and not a single Chinese passenger would travel on a Japanese ship.

The Chinese are well organized in some respects. There are many secret societies that have a wide influence and through these it is possible to carry out a virtual blockade of goods of any nation that offends.

The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson. The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

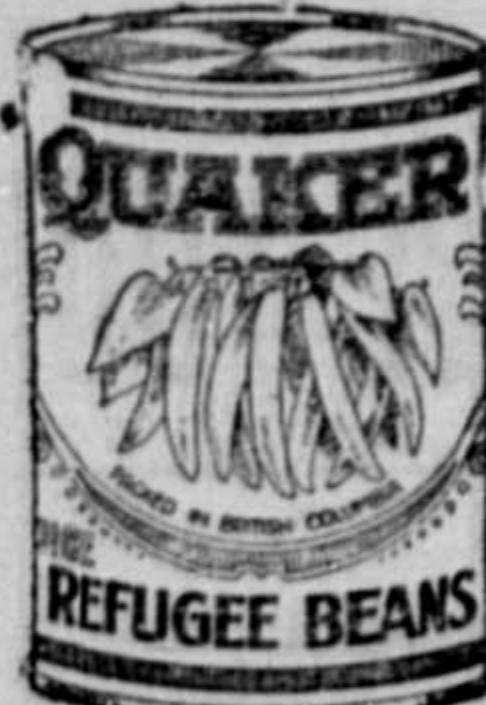

Dominion of Canada



Department of Finance

ALL persons residing in Canada, employed in Canada, or carrying on business in Canada, are liable to a tax on income, as follows:—

1. Every unmarried person, or widow, or widower, without dependants as defined by the Act, who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$1,000 or more.
2. All other individuals who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$2,000 or more.
3. Every corporation and joint stock company whose profits exceeded \$2,000 during the fiscal year ended in 1919.

Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 30th of April, 1920.

ALL INDIVIDUALS other than farmers and ranchers must use Form T 1.

FARMERS AND RANCHERS must use Form T 1A.

CORPORATIONS and joint stock companies must use Form T 2.

Penalty

Every person required to make a return, who fails to do so within the time limit, shall be subject to a penalty of Twenty-five per centum of the amount of the tax payable.

Any person, whether taxable, or otherwise, who fails to make a return or provide information duly required according to the provision of the Act, shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty of \$100 for each day during which the default continues. Also any person making a false statement in any return or in any information required by the Minister, shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding \$10,000, or to six months' imprisonment or to both fine and imprisonment.

General Instructions.

Obtain Forms from the Inspectors or Assistant Inspectors of Taxation or from Postmasters.

Read carefully all instructions on Form before filling it in.

Tomorrow.

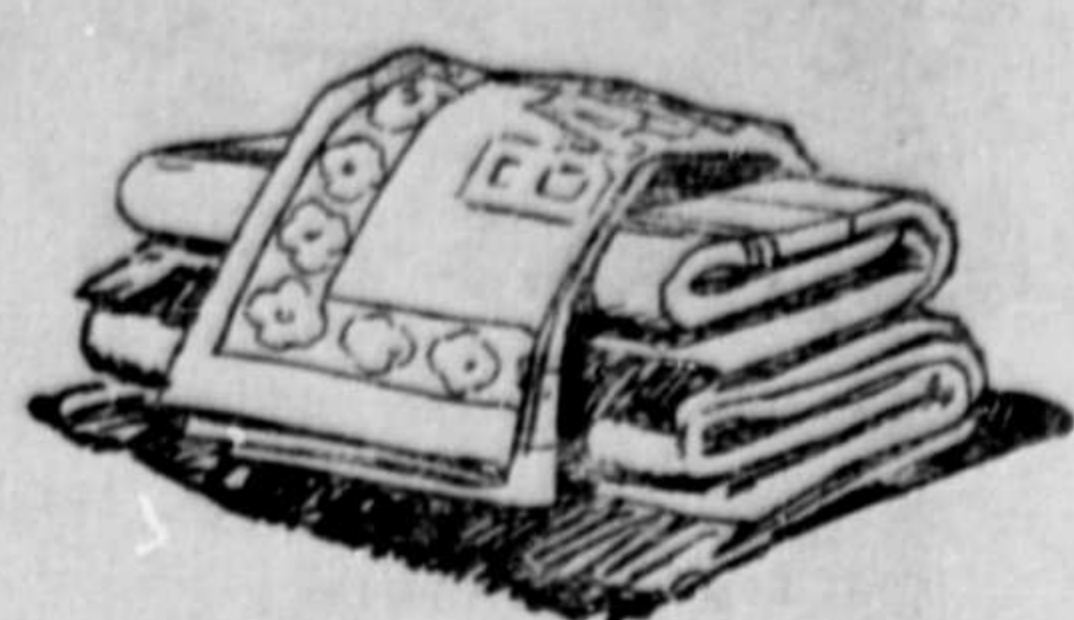

OTTAWA, April 21.—Sir Geo. E. Foster in the House of Commons reminded the members that Thursday would be the anniversary of the battle of St. Julien. "I propose," he said, "with the consent of the House, to ask that after prayers on Thursday, members of the chamber stand for a minute or two in silent prayer in commemoration of the battle and of the bravery and heroism of Canadian troops which upheld the honor of Canada and made Canada the admiration and gave it the respect of the whole world."

TRAWLERS TO BE OPERATED

Commander Slingsby Organizing
Company of Returned Soldiers
for Fishing.

VICTORIA, April 20.—A number of influential British Columbia men, all of whom have seen service overseas, are at the present time endeavoring to organize a company to operate steam trawlers in the fishing business off the British Columbia coast. The Federal Government is being approached with a view to obtaining some of the vessels used during the war on the Atlantic Coast for patrol and minesweeping work. These boats, it is understood, are still lying in Halifax unused. It is hoped by the men behind the scheme that the Ottawa authorities will see fit to either lend or lease the boats.

The organizers plan to eventually fish on a large scale off Vancouver Island and on other parts of the coast. They believe that there are hitherto untouched fishing banks where trawlers could profitably operate. Returned naval and army veterans would man the boats and would also be employed in the ice making and fish curing plants which it is planned to operate ashore in conjunction with the trawlers. In this way a large number of men would be employed, if present plans materialize. In making the necessary equipment, such as nets, others would be employed. Commander C. H. R. Slingsby, R. N., is one of the prime movers in the new venture. During part of his overseas service he was stationed at Grimsby and saw the methods used by the trawlers there. He points out that in places such as that the majority of the populace depend upon the fishing industry for a living. The other trawl would be used on this coast. He states, as well as other methods which would be developed to suit conditions in this part of the world. The capital employed in the company will be British Columbia money. Commander Slingsby believes that fish which have been seen little on the market in the past or not at all will be procured by the traw-

LAKELSE HATCHERY IS NOT FAVORED BY SOME CANNERYMEN

Speaking on the subject of salmon hatcheries, Peter Wallace, the well-known canneryman, expressed himself this morning as in accord with the statement emanating from W. A. Found, superintendent of the Dominion Fisheries, in a recent letter to W. G. McQuarrie, M. P., in which Mr. Found advocated a return to natural spawning conditions, says the Vancouver Province. The Royal City's federal representative is also an earnest supporter of the policy of incubating salmon eggs in their natural environment as opposed to the artificial system now in vogue in the government hatcheries.

"It is now thirty years since the Bon Accord hatchery was built on the Fraser River," said Mr. Wallace, "certainly a sufficient time to arrive at accurate results. When large numbers of salmon were spawning, no doubt, it was a difficult matter to gather reliable data and in the past the hatcheries were possibly given credit for greater results than they really attained."

"The B. C. sockeye salmon has been seriously depleted during recent years and while this has been going on the hatcheries have been stripping the spawning grounds of salmon eggs. Consequently we find today that the sockeye is very scarce and is almost counted as a luxury, and it was only a few years ago when the sockeye was within the reach of the most humble citizen. Are we going to continue in the old rut and keep on stripping the spawning grounds?"

"In the face of all this the department is preparing to build a new hatchery at Lakelse Lake, near the Skeena River, which will cost when completed \$50,000. This money could be employed to much better advantage in opening up streams and removing obstructions. The department should set aside \$10,000 or \$15,000 for the purpose of making a survey of British Columbia streams and spawning grounds of the salmon and in this work an investigation of the sockeye situation should be the principal consideration. Photographs should be taken showing waterfalls and log jams. The condition could then be dealt with in a proper and adequate manner."

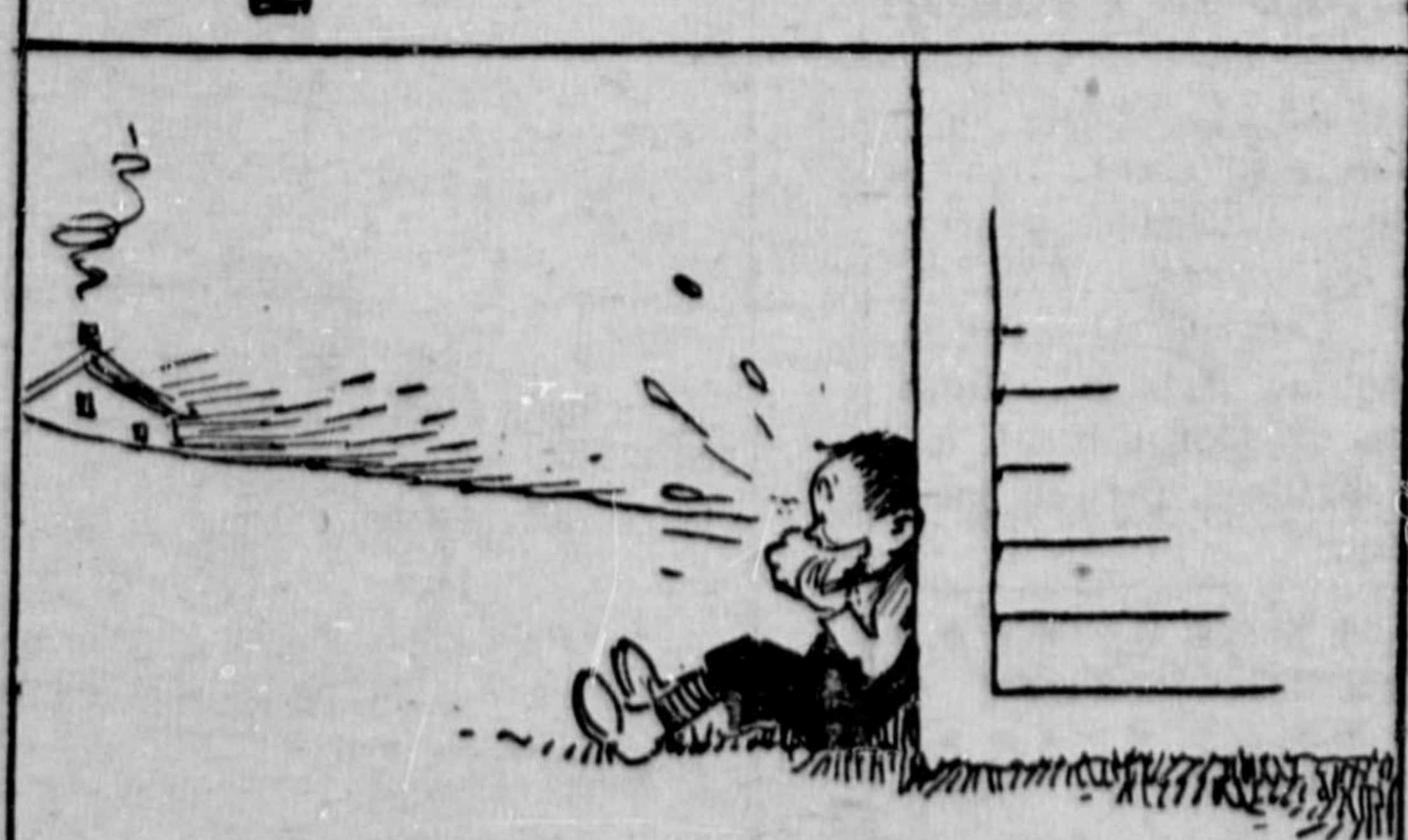
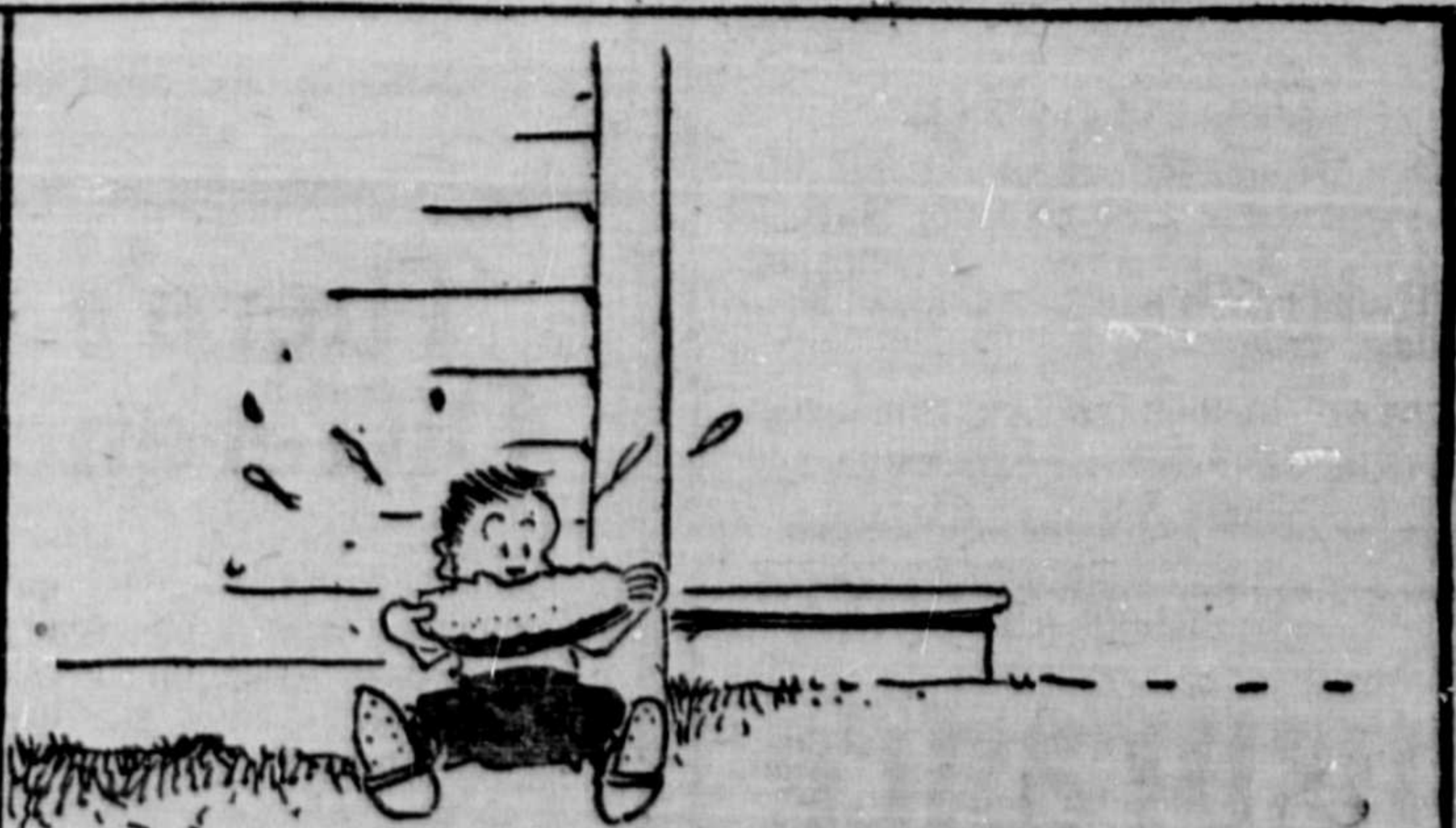
