Supreme Council Will Take Military Action in Germany

Three Big Generals to have Charge of Forces to Compel Fulfilment of Conditions of Treaty

10,000 Allied Troops Within Turkish Empire

Supplementary Naval Plans also Approved as Explained by Admiral Beatty and French Admiral

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
SAN REMO, April 22.—The Supreme Council of the Allies fully prepared to take drastic action, by military means if necessary, to compel Germany to fulfil the conditions of the Versailles Treaty. A plan was accepted today for the employment of the world armies by Marshal Foch, General Balmogo, and Sir Henry Wilson, British Chief of Staff.
 Allied troops numbering 210,000 are now strategically disposed within the borders of the Turkish Empire and these forces will be increased to any essential number if Turkish resistance develops formidably. Greece will probably supply the largest number of troops.
 Supplementary naval plans were also approved by the Council. These were explained in person by Baron Admiral Beatty, Commander of the British Grand Fleet, and Admiral Levasseur, assistant to the chief of the French Navy.
 The treaty does not include final arrangements for mandatory territories. They will simply be cut apart from Turkey and disposed of by the Supreme Council.

THIRD READING OF GRAND TRUNK BILL, THEN STANDS OVER

OTTAWA, April 22.—After another protracted session on the proposed ratification of the Grand Trunk agreement, the House of Commons put the bill through the committee stage but agreed to allow the third reading to stand over.

OBJECT TO GEDDES

American Irish Send Telegram of Protest at Recognition.

NEWARK, N. Y., April 22.—A telegram protesting against the recognition of Sir Auckland Geddes, the new British ambassador as "Ambassador from Ireland" was sent today to Secretary of State Colby by Major Eugene F. Minkhead of Jersey City, chairman of the New Jersey state committee for Irish independence, which claims a membership of 600,000.

New Irish Policy Is Now Suggested

"Daily Sketch" says Wider Measure of Home Rule will be Given and Clean Sweep Made of Officials

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
LONDON, April 22.—England's new Irish policy may be something broader than the existing Home Rule scheme and not unlike Dominion home rule, says the Daily Sketch. Sir Hamar Greenwood, who was recently named chief secretary for Ireland, and General Sir Cecil F. N. MacCreedy, the newly appointed military commander there, is said to favor moderation and are making attempts to determine just what the Sinn Fein wants.
 A favorable atmosphere is being created and the Government newspapers say it will "go further toward reaching a settlement than is generally believed."
 Viscount Field Marshal French, Lord Lieutenant for Ireland, will resign, says Sketch, and a clean sweep will be made of officials in Dublin Castle; who are charged with being largely responsible for errors which have led to the present situation.

BRITISH LABOR TO VISIT RUSSIA

Delegation Leaving Next Sunday to Study Conditions.

LONDON, April 22.—A delegation of British labor men is going to Russia to study conditions there. It will be composed of three representatives of the Trades Unions and four representatives of the political labor party. The delegation will leave London next Sunday.

SCHOOL TENDER IS VERY HIGH

Only Offer for Erection of Proposed School is Nearly \$200,000 — Morgan Co.

PARTIAL TENDERS ON VARIOUS DETAILS

The tenders for the erection of the new Hays Cove Circle School were opened at the meeting of the School Board last night and consideration of the matter has been left over till Friday night. Only one tender, that of J. R. Morgan & Co. for the sum of \$198,700, was offered for the whole job of erection. The Morgan Co. offered to do the work on the ten per cent force account basis with a limit of \$175,000 over which figure there would be no commission. A very indefinite offer to do the work on a force account basis was also received from McDougall, Trainor & McNeill, of Calgary. A considerable number of partial tenders were also received.

Turn All Down.
 Trustee L. W. Patmore said that he would be willing to turn all the tenders down as the only complete one was away over their means. It might be possible that the building could be partially completed within the specified \$150,000 and such a building would suffice for some years.

Dr. Kergin remarked that the tenders were far from satisfactory and "put the board in the air." He suggested force account work with a limit, but Mr. McLennan said that he was doubtful if the board could be safeguarded that way. Fred. Shaw spoke on the difficulties of tendering these days with the material market so unsteady.

Eighty dollars is the sum a clergyman of a Hungarian Baptist church in New York city sets aside in his monthly household budget for food for his family of ten. Formerly he allowed \$135 for this purpose until he found that from \$80 to \$90 was all that was necessary. As proof that his family are all properly nourished and unusually strong and healthy, the clergyman volunteers that in the last seven years he has spent less than \$20 for medical care. He finds that shoes are a great problem. Little meat is consumed by the family, vegetables being a great help in lowering the cost.

TAX ON LUXURIES PROPOSED BY DOMINION GOVERNMENT.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
OTTAWA, April 22.—The imposition of an excise tax on luxuries is in contemplation by the Minister of Finance. Under it individuals purchasing goods or articles in excess of a certain price will be compelled to pay a percentage over and above towards the Canadian treasury. Such a tax is in force in the United States at the present time and is said to act, not only as a revenue producer, but as a restriction on extravagant lines.

Under the proposed plan, lines of articles would be established including wearing apparel, boots and shoes and it would be provided that a percentage be added to each individual article above a common price.

WILDE OUTCLASSED BATTLING MURRAY

Knocked Down Opponent Three Times by Short Left Hooks.

CAMDEN, N. J., April 22.—Jimmy Wilde, British flyweight champion, so badly outclassed Battling Murray of Philadelphia in an eight-round bout, that commissioner John S. Smith of the New Jersey Boxing Commission stopped the contest in the last round.
 Murray had been knocked down three times by short left hooks to the jaw. He was up without taking count but was in such a battered condition that a clear knockout defeat appeared certain when commissioner Smith intervened.
 Murray had the honors in the early rounds. He knocked Wilde down with the left hook to the jaw, less than a minute after the fight started.
 Wilde outboxed Murray at long range in the opening round, while the Philadelphian was trying to slug.

MEN WOUNDED NEAR BUTTE

Feeling Runs High Over Strike Clash Between Police and I. W. W.

BUTTE, Montana, April 22.—Fourteen men, believed to be Industrial Workers of the World strike pickets, and one policeman are in the local hospitals suffering from gunshot wounds sustained in a battle on the Anaconda Road near the Neverswet mine. The striking miners are massed in Finlay Hall and in front of the building feeling runs high. Police reserves have been called out.

ENGLAND HELPS SOUTH AMERICA

Argentine Republic Shows Its Appreciation of Its "Indulgent Mecca."

BUENOS AYRES, April 22.—Commenting on the fact that the British Government is loaning Argentina \$50,000,000 to pay off a loan of the same amount from New York bankers, newspapers of the republic say that this means Argentina, in future, will turn to England in financial matters. England is described as "the traditional indulgent Mecca of our country."
 The lack of indulgence on the part of American bankers is criticized.

Archbishop on The Bridge of Truth.

The principle of the cantilever bridge may be applied with good effect not only to a material structure to span some Niagara gorge, but also to a mental structure to bridge the chasm between the finite and the infinite.

Taking our stand on the left bank of the river, we watch the construction. There is, first, the work of excavating to get a firm foundation as far out in the river as possible. Then there is the massive concrete pier erected on this foundation. Then the steel fabric pivoted on this pier with one end securely anchored to the shore, and the other stretching into the air midway across the chasm. It seems to lead nowhere but into space.

Chasm Between Finite and Infinite.

In trying to span the chasm between the finite and the infinite it is best for us to begin on the human side. We must first dig deep to get a firm foundation. Let us begin with what we can prove to be true in our personal experience. This we shall find out not so much through metaphysical reasoning as through studying the working of the human mind and the developing of human society. Through the scientific observation of repeated experience we arrive at a practical certainty regarding the laws of the human mind and the principles of social life. Here we have a mental structure built upon the firm foundation of experienced fact; but, as we follow in the direction indicated by these principles and laws of human personality and human society, they seem to lead us out of ourselves to something beyond ourselves. All great psychologists frankly admit this tendency of the human mind to externalize and objectify inward feelings and desires; but they stop here, for this is as far as the human side will take us.

Laws of Mind are Laws of God.

There are some religious enthusiasts who want to stake everything upon the principle of authority—"Believe this because the Church says so," or "Believe this because the Bible says so." If this principle of authority is sufficient for them, let them rejoice in it, but let them not be so foolish as to think that they can convert the world to their way of thinking either by declamation of dogma or by denunciation of criticism.

The principle of bare authority unsupported by human reason is not sufficient for a vast number of thinking men and women in this age of intelligence. The laws of the human mind are the laws of God, and by following up in the direction these laws lead us we can best appreciate the Divine truths which correspond to our human needs.

No words can express how much Christianity will gain by this rehabilitation of religious faith through the psychological approach. Many are now crossing by this bridge.

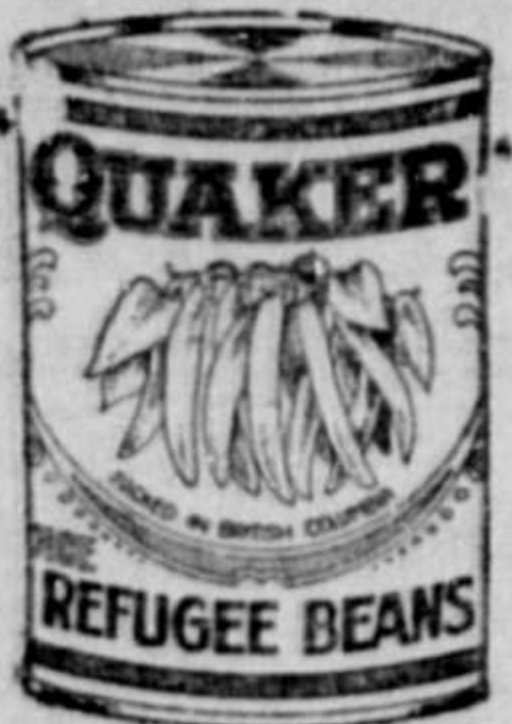

IS BOOSTER FOR TERRACE

R. C. Lett Gives Out Interview at Winnipeg on Prospects of Central B. C. Valleys.

WINNIPEG, April 22.—"In agriculture, mining and lumbering," said R. C. W. Lett, industrial and colonization agent of the G. T. P. Railway, "no part of Canada is enjoying more prosperity than Central British Columbia. The government of that province is now about to throw open five new land settlement areas adjacent to the Grand Trunk Pacific line. Each of these areas will be of approximately fifty thousand acres and are situated in the Bulkley and Nechako valleys. It is conservatively estimated that 20,000 settlers will go into this territory during 1920. The preponderance of these settlers will come from the United States, as the American farmers are appreciating more every year the opportunities offered in the opening up of these areas where land is available at a low valuation. The British Columbia Government is assisting these settlers by taking in stock. No less than thirty-eight hundred head were taken in and sold to settlers last year."

As to climatic conditions, Mr. Lett said: "It is excellent; they have winter weather of course, but no long periods of extreme cold. As the coast is approached at Terrace district for instance, destined to be an immense fruit and vegetable country, the climate is ideal. I can justify my statement by telling you that out of the twenty-nine days of February nineteen days of bright sunshine were experienced. I consider this a record hard to equal in America."

"There are reasons for Terrace having this delightful climate," said Mr. Lett. "It is situated only 95 miles from the Pacific coast, on the Skeena River, and of course, the Japan Current being at its best just off this portion of the coast, the temperatures are sure to be moderate. The Kitsumkalum Valley, to the north, and the Lakelse Valley to the south, are only separated from salt water by low divides, and thus fresh air currents are always moving, and do not allow for low temperature."

"As a result of this combination, Terrace is rapidly becoming famous, not only for its climate, but for the excellence of its farm products. Strawberries and other fruits reach perfection, and when I say that potatoes yield over six hundred bushels per acre, I am not exaggerating. One farmer in that district, who has had considerable success in the growing of tomatoes, is completing arrangements for the planting of several acres this year."

ASK FOR BAN ON HEARST PAPERS

Canadian Club at Meeting Yesterday Passes Resolution Requesting Action.

At the annual meeting of the Canadian Club held yesterday afternoon the following resolution was unanimously passed:

"The Canadian Club of Prince Rupert strongly protests against the distribution in Canada of the Hearst publications, news services and film exhibitions and respectfully requests the Association of Canadian Clubs to take such steps necessary to have banned by the Dominion Government the publications, news services and film exhibitions issued and distributed in Canada by the Hearst interests."

The resolution was moved by Alderman Dybhavn and seconded by Rev. W. E. Collison. Judge Young said that the matter was viewed with alarm and the Canadian Clubs throughout the country were taking it up. He did not think it should be necessary to draw attention of the government to such a matter as this, as they must be aware of it.

The case of Rex vs. John Morrison, assault on a police officer, was adjourned until tomorrow morning in the police court today. M. Gonzales, appearing for Morrison, asked for adjournment the accused being indisposed. Morrison is out on bail.

Dominion of Canada



Department of Finance

ALL persons residing in Canada, employed in Canada, or carrying on business in Canada, are liable to a tax on income, as follows:—

- 1. Every unmarried person, or widow, or widower, without dependants as defined by the Act, who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$1,000 or more.
2. All other individuals who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$2,000 or more.
3. Every corporation and joint stock company whose profits exceeded \$2,000 during the fiscal year ended in 1919.

Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 30th of April, 1920.

ALL INDIVIDUALS other than farmers and ranchers must use Form T 1.

FARMERS AND RANCHERS must use Form T 1A.

CORPORATIONS and joint stock companies must use Form T 2.

Penalty

Every person required to make a return, who fails to do so within the time limit, shall be subject to a penalty of Twenty-five per centum of the amount of the tax payable.

Any person, whether taxable, or otherwise, who fails to make a return or provide information duly required according to the provision of the Act, shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty of \$100 for each day during which the default continues. Also any person making a false statement in any return or in any information required by the Minister, shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding \$10,000, or to six months' imprisonment or to both fine and imprisonment.

WORK OF LOCAL LABOR BUREAU

Scope Wide—Supply and Demand About Balance Each Other Now.

NO UNEMPLOYMENT IN THIS DISTRICT

The importance and value of the Provincial Labor Bureau in this city in keeping labor and employment in touch may not be fully appreciated by the general public. The facility with which it operates and the confusion it avoids mean a lot to the progress of industry in the district. At almost any time of the working day and even after it is a busy place between the many visitors calling each day who seek either information or employment. It is the only recognized employment agency in the city and, as such, it is in touch with both the big and small employers who rely a good deal on it.

Soldiers and Civilians.

A point that is often misunderstood is that this agency is alike for returned soldiers and civilians. The Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment office is merely working in conjunction with it, H. F. Wearmouth conducting the soldiers' part and J. M. Campbell the general bureau. Mr. Wearmouth's duties comprise more strictly the settlement of soldiers' questions in the matter of gratuities and information.

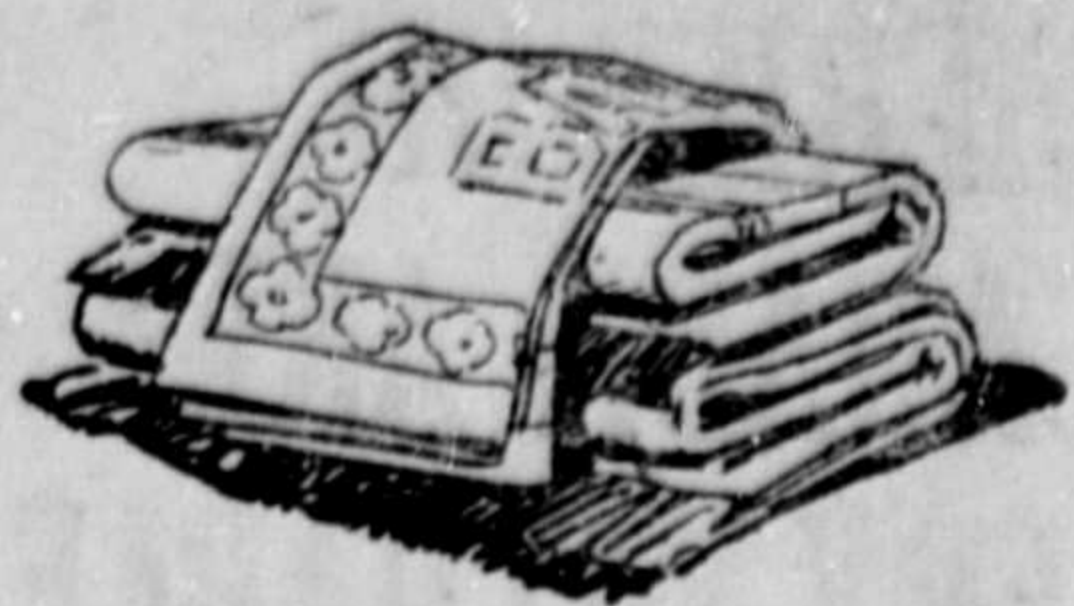
It is a slow day that not more than 100 persons call at the office for various purposes. The men seeking employment register and thus they are kept track of by the agency and are notified when opportunities for them arise. As a rule the time between their application and when they are given employment is brief. The agency is alike commended by the employers and employed. Last week, which was a slow one, saw 39 men placed through the medium of the office.

Wide Scope.

The geographical area supplied from this office is wide in its boundaries. Men are sent as far east as Burns Lake, north to Whitehorse, west to the Islands and south to Surf Inlet. The main industries supplied are lumbering, mining, fishing and various forms of construction work. At the present time there are no men in the city who need to be out of employment as the demand is equal to the supply. When mining activity commences in three weeks or so it is expected that the demand will greatly exceed the supply. The logging camps and mills are constantly sending in for men and in a few weeks the demands from Stewart and Alice Arm will be quite large.

FISHERIES OF CANADA ARE VERY VALUABLE

Two of World's Most Important Fishing Grounds are off Her Coast.

Evidence that the most enthusiastic amateur fisherman is pitifully lacking in imagination compared with the confirmed statistician, is provided by Captain F. W. Wallace, of Montreal, writing in the Journal of the Canadian Bankers' Association. Where his amateur rivals deal in ounces, Captain Wallace speaks calmly of hundreds of millions of pounds.

"According to the latest available statistics," he says, "the value of Canada's fisheries amounted to \$52,350,000. Of this amount, British Columbia claims a fishery value of \$21,518,595, or 41 per cent. of the total. The annual value of the fisheries in the other provinces are as follows:—

"These figures are based upon the value of the fish as landed on the dock—the price paid to the first handlers—the fishermen and by no means represents the total value of the prepared product, which, of course, varies according to the class of preparation and the labor expended on it. At the present time, about 100,000 persons are engaged directly in our fisheries and the capital invested is between thirty-six and thirty-eight million dollars."

The size of the fleet engaged in this work he gives as follows:—200 steam vessels; 1,300 sail and motor driven vessels of the larger size; 14,000 small motor boats, and 27,000 sail and row boats—a total of 42,500.

The figures for weight are quite as impressive. Cod are given as totalling 180,000,000 pounds per year; salmon, more than 147,000,000 pounds. Of the latter, 80,000,000 cars were packed and shipped in Canada during 1918.

"The world's most important fishing grounds are only four in number," the writer concludes, "and all lie in the northern hemisphere and mainly north of the fortieth parallel of latitude. Out of these four prolific fishing areas Canada is singularly fortunate in having two adjacent to her Atlantic and Pacific coasts, and is thus endowed with the greatest fishery resources in the world."
