Vireless Message Received at Nome says he is at Anadir on Coast of Siberia; Tried for Pole

NOME, April 23 .- A wireless message from Anadir, east of beria, announces the presence there of Roald Amundsen, ex-

Last August Amundsen was reported drifting in the ice-locked hooner Mand, somewhere north of Western Siberia. Nothing s been heard from him since September 1, 1918, when the hooner wa sreported at Dixsob Island, a White Sea point. From While Sea Amundsen expected to drift east with the ice to New Siberian Islands which lie in the Arctic.

From the New Siberian Islands it was believed the drift would rry him toward, if not across, the north pole.

The explorer is reported to have carried two aeroplanes as rt of his equipment. He expected to-use these if he found the ift would not carry him across the "Top of the Earth."



#### Impasse Regarding School Building.

The school must be built at once and if possible it should be built by a local firm. All must be agreed on that. No one would countenance sending out of the city for work which can be done on similar terms or at the same price at home. Local industry must be encouraged wherever possible.

It was anticipated that tenders for the new school building would be high. Had the work not been delayed last summer, it 722 Second Ave., Prince Rupert would have cost the city many thousands of dollars less. As it is, there is grave doubt as to what step should be taken. Possibly the plans and specifications can be pruned as to bring the cost down without seriously injuring the usefulness of the building. It may be possible to erect a smaller building, or a part of the larger building at present. These are matters for the school board. The people of Prince Rupert are anxious to have the work proceed, so that the most of it may be done this summer. They also will certainly demand that if possible the work shall be done by local people.

#### Hotel Needed at This Point.

For a number of years the Prince Rupert has catered most effectively to the business of this city as a high class hotel. Now it is found that the business is growing to such an extent that more accommodation will be needed. The Grand Trunk Pacific Railway once made preparations to commence construction of a hotel building. Then came the hard times when such work was impossible. With the revival of business here the need has again arisen and with Government ownersh p comes responsibility in regard to these improvements. Whether the Government should build a hotel or lease the site is not certain. The difficulty would be to get private capital to finance anything so big as a first class hotel suitable for the business that will be offering here.
