

# Amundsen the Explorer has Reached the Pacific Ocean

## Wireless Message Received at Nome says he is at Anadir on Coast of Siberia; Tried for Pole

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
NOME, April 23.—A wireless message from Anadir, east of Siberia, announces the presence there of Roald Amundsen, explorer.  
Last August Amundsen was reported drifting in the ice-locked moose Maud, somewhere north of Western Siberia. Nothing has been heard from him since September 1, 1918, when the moose was reported at Dixson Island, a White Sea point. From the White Sea Amundsen expected to drift east with the ice to the New Siberian Islands which lie in the Arctic.  
From the New Siberian Islands it was believed the drift would carry him toward, if not across, the north pole.  
The explorer is reported to have carried two aeroplanes as part of his equipment. He expected to use these if he found the ice would not carry him across the "Top of the Earth."

# Taking Sinn Feiners Away From Ireland in Warships

## Warships in Dublin Bay and Transports with Destroyer are Reported; Last Hunger Striker Leaves Mount Joy

DUBLIN, April 23.—Another crisis in the Irish problem appears at hand. Advance parties of cavalry have arrived in Dublin during the past few days, while the main body is expected tonight. There are warships in Dublin Bay and the arrival of transports with a destroyer is reported.  
BELFAST, April 23.—The removal of fifteen Sinn Fein prisoners from Belfast and a large number from Queenstown on three destroyers leads to the belief that the authorities are planning taking all Sinn Fein prisoners from Ireland.  
DUBLIN, April 23.—Many raids were made last evening by the military in villages around Dublin and also in town. No arrests are reported. The last hunger striker was removed from Mount Joy prison. He was taken to a hospital.

# RESOLUTION TO COLONEL PECK

## Meeting Last Night Discusses Alleged Difference at Drydock.

A meeting of Canadians called by the Sons of Canada to discuss an alleged difference in regard to the management of the drydock and shipyard was held last night, the president, W. E. Thompson, in the chair.  
C. O. Rowe was the first speaker. He dealt with published data in regard to a difference between the general manager, E. S. Rust, and a representative of the railway company, and advised that the meeting take some action in regard thereto.  
S. M. Newton spoke at some length explaining that the information he gave had been obtained at first hand. He said the difference of opinion at the drydock had hampered operations and suggested that an appeal be made to the Dominion Government to intervene. The difference had to do largely with signing cheques.  
A number of others in the audience were called upon to speak. W. E. Williams said as he understood it the power of signing checks was left with anyone Mr. Erb might appoint.  
A resolution moved by Mr. Rowe and seconded by Mr. Newton asking Col. C. W. Peck to intervene to straighten out the friction was passed without opposition.

# Rush of Settlers From the States

## Five Hundred Inquiries in Five Days Received in Winnipeg; Personally Conducted Tour of 200 to Come Here

WINNIPEG, April 23.—A rush of settlers to Canada from the United States is expected soon, according to R. C. W. Lett of the G. T. P. colonization office. About 500 inquiries have been received in five days.  
Among parties expected shortly are 22 eastern Montana farmers who are coming to take possession of land which they bought in B. C.  
A personally conducted tour over the G. T. P. from Winnipeg to Prince Rupert and Victoria is being arranged for persons interested in agriculture, mining, business and professional openings in the west. The number of the party will be limited to 200, most of whom will be from North Dakota. They will leave Winnipeg by special train on July 6.

# JOCK MORRISON WAS COMMITTED

## Will Stand Trial for Theft of Liquor and Pleading Guilty to Assault.

John Morrison, charged with the theft of liquor and a police officer, appeared in court this morning for the latter charge and pleaded guilty and was committed to the B. C. Penitentiary. Judgment was reserved in the assault case.  
The taking of evidence in the theft case took the best part of the morning and a number of witnesses were examined. City Solicitor Hooper made his first appearance in the prosecution and Alex. Manson acted for the defence.  
Those giving evidence were Oliver Besner, from whom the theft was made, John D. Stone, dairymen, Warden Bailey, Constables McGlinchy and Macdonald, Chief Vickers, Mrs. Stacca Matovich, Jack Lindsay and the accused himself. From the evidence it was adduced that Morrison had been hired by two strangers, a short dark man and a tall fair one to haul the liquor from the warehouse. It had been dropped on the Section 2 bridge. Nearly all the witnesses attested to the honesty of the accused, although when under the influence of liquor he was liable to be mean.  
In dealing with the assault case, City Solicitor Hooper pointed out that a man could be arrested without a warrant on a theft charge.

## Impasse Regarding School Building.

The school must be built at once and if possible it should be built by a local firm. All must be agreed on that. No one would countenance sending out of the city for work which can be done on similar terms or at the same price at home. Local industry must be encouraged wherever possible.

It was anticipated that tenders for the new school building would be high. Had the work not been delayed last summer, it would have cost the city many thousands of dollars less. As it is, there is grave doubt as to what step should be taken. Possibly the plans and specifications can be pruned as to bring the cost down without seriously injuring the usefulness of the building. It may be possible to erect a smaller building, or a part of the larger building at present. These are matters for the school board. The people of Prince Rupert are anxious to have the work proceed, so that the most of it may be done this summer. They also will certainly demand that if possible the work shall be done by local people.

## Build Ships for Trade From This Port.

The Government Railway is proposing the calling of tenders for the building of two boats to ply on the triangular run between Vancouver, Victoria and Seattle. This route is already well served by the C. P. R., a twice a day service with modern boats, and at times a three times a day service has been maintained between Vancouver and Victoria. It would be no particular service to the country to put a boat on that route, especially in view of the fact that the steamer Canora was recently brought to the coast for service on that route.

It would seem like a wise course for the Government to forget the triangular run and prepare instead to cater to the transpacific trade by way of Prince Rupert. To put fast steamers on this route and to provide for good local services to Alaska and other points from this port would open up new business and would serve Canada much better than to try to compete with a railway corporation that is already giving very good service at reasonable rates.

## Hotel Needed at This Point.

For a number of years the Prince Rupert has catered most effectively to the business of this city as a high class hotel. Now it is found that the business is growing to such an extent that more accommodation will be needed. The Grand Trunk Pacific Railway once made preparations to commence construction of a hotel building. Then came the hard times when such work was impossible. With the revival of business here the need has again arisen and with Government ownership comes responsibility in regard to these improvements. Whether the Government should build a hotel or lease the site is not certain. The difficulty would be to get private capital to finance anything so big as a first class hotel suitable for the business that will be offering here.

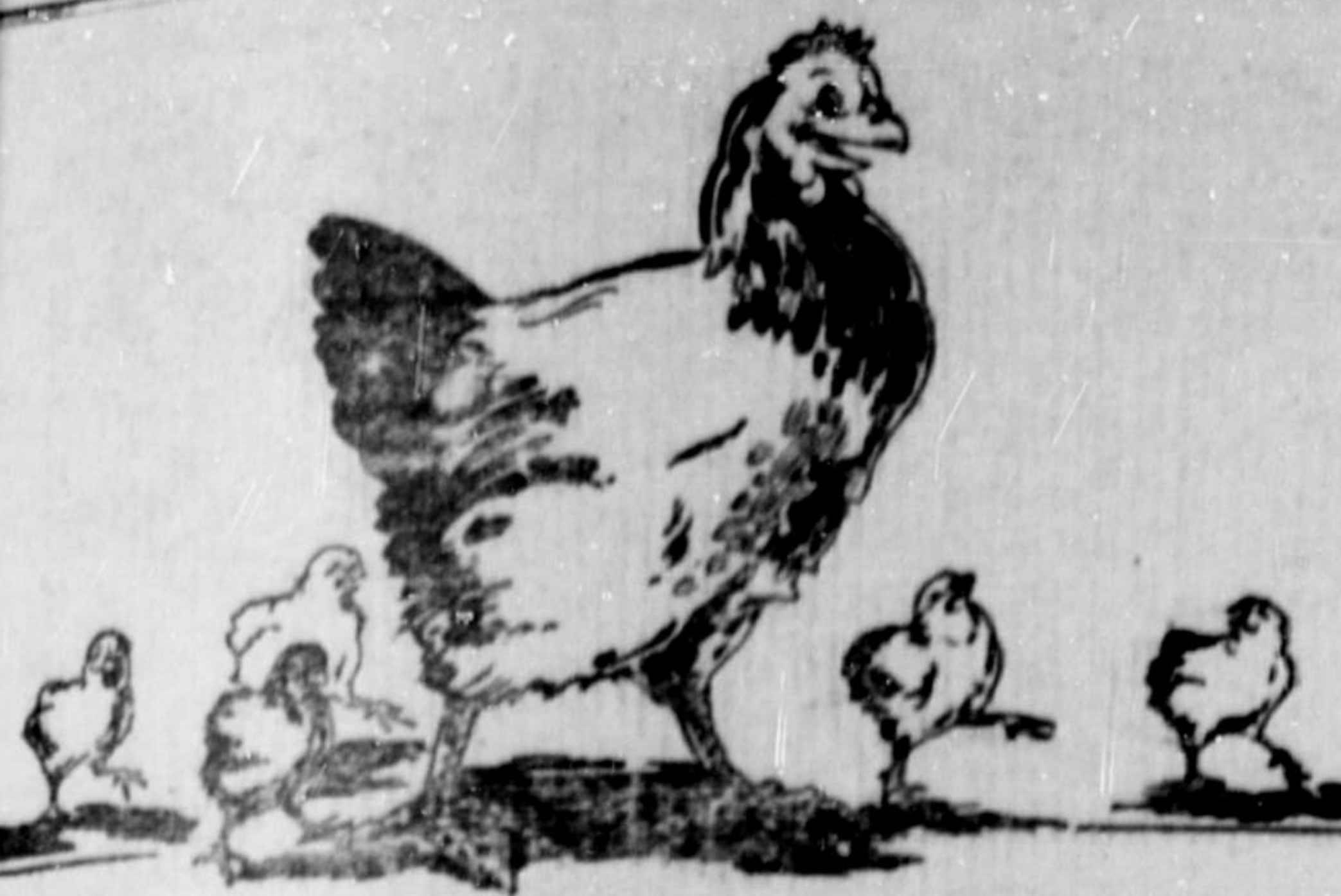

## A. M. Manson, Member for Omineca, Reviews Session Provincial Legislature

Alex. Manson, member for Omineca and Deputy Speaker of the B. C. Legislature, who returned from Victoria Wednesday morning, brings back word of good work accomplished at the session of the legislature just concluded and states his pleasure at being home after a session that proved to be the longest and heaviest in the history of the present government. The session was characterized by a number of new and progressive policies

in addition to the usual grist of necessary amendments to existing legislation.

"Among the important bills passed," said Mr. Manson to the News yesterday afternoon, "was the new Highway Act, which not only changes the rule of the road in the major portion of the province on July 15, but establishes as a natural sequence to the policy adopted by Hon. Dr. King, a system of grouping the highways of the province into three classes, primary, secondary and local. The main trunk roads of the province will be comprised in primary class the cost of these being maintained by the province, 75 per cent by the province and 25 per cent by municipalities. Roads of less importance to which the province contributes in a lesser degree will form the secondary and local classes.

### Link up Roads.

"The minister of public works, speaking on the budget, presented a map in colors of the existing system of provincial roads. The map showed many missing links in the system. The department is to direct its attention towards coupling up these links so that the system may be more complete. Special appropriations were made for settlers' roads so that transportation facilities may keep pace with settlement. The roads, trails and bridges budget was the biggest in the history of the province.

"The minister of lands, Mr. Pattullo, proved as always one of the most aggressive ministers in the House and his legislation was well in hand. His new Water Act included a comprehensive policy for assisting and putting on a proper basis the irrigation system so necessary to the south-

ern interior of the province. The bill called forth the commendation of even opposition members from the interior.

"The minister was on the alert for the interests of the North, and despite opposition was able to give good reasons for the granting of \$100,000 towards the commencement of a provincial building in this city.

### Provincial Steel Mills.

"The bill providing for iron boundaries met with the approval of the legislature. After reviewing the negotiations he had had last year with those interested in the establishment of the steel industry, the minister of mines stated that if private enterprise was not willing to negotiate on a more substantial basis, then the Mines Department was prepared to consider the establishing of the industry itself. It was pointed out that those who had negotiated had wanted so great provincial assistance that if the industry was to be carried on with Government credit, then the Government should carry it on itself.

### Mothers' Pensions.

"From the provincial secretary, Hon. Dr. McLean, emanated the Mothers' Pension Bill and the New University Bill. The Mothers' Pension Bill commanded the unanimous support of all the parties in the house. It had a splendid reception and on its second reading the galleries were crowded with women from Vancouver and Victoria.

"The University Loan Bill forms a new basis for financing an institution which has suffered from its very inception for lack of adequate finances. Some years ago the late government reserved 2,000,000 acres of land for university purposes. This reserve stood in the way of settlement and the sale of these lands now would not suffice for the university requirements. It was deemed wise to cancel the reserve and, instead, develop a university city at Point Grey where substantial acreage, highly improved, could be sold. Thus, next year, the university could be put on a sound financial basis, adequate for the institution that is increasing in enrollment more rapidly than any other such establishment in Canada.

"The Government, through the Premier, again introduced a Pacific Great Eastern Loan Bill to

complete the railway to Prince  
George.

**Co-operation.**

"The Co-operative Society legis-  
lation was consolidated and re-  
vised, it being introduced into the  
house by the minister of agricul-  
ture, Hon. E. D. Barrow, as was  
also the Agricultural Society Act.  
Amendments to the Land Settle-  
ment Act which brought such  
revolution to land settlement in  
the province was also introduced  
by the minister. A comprehen-  
sive report presented by the select  
committee on agriculture was also  
adopted. Each session sees more  
and more attention paid to agri-  
culture in the house.

"From the attorney-general's  
department emanated amend-  
ments to the Prohibition Act re-  
stricting the quantity that may  
be given for prescriptions to eight  
ounces, limiting the number of  
prescriptions per month and  
abolishing permits. In speaking  
to the amendments, Hon. Mr.  
Farris made it clear that if the  
province was to have a prohibi-  
tion act it should be such a one  
to enable its administration to be  
put beyond reproach.

**Plebiscite in August.**

"At the same time the success-  
ful administration depends on  
substantial public opinion. The  
present act was under a cloud so,  
to clearly settle it, a bill was  
brought in calling for a plebiscite  
in August as to whether the peo-  
ple wanted prohibition or the sale  
of liquor under government con-  
trol in sealed packages. After  
that, the province may go further  
and ask the Dominion for a plebi-  
scite on the importation question.

"The last 24 hours of the ses-  
sion was somewhat dramatic. R.  
T. Elliott, K.C., of Victoria, re-  
cently applied to Ottawa for dis-  
allowance of last session's Dolly  
Varden Railway Bill which was  
refused. On April 12, thirteen  
months after the bill had been  
passed, writs were issued against  
the Taylor Engineering Co. and  
its associates on behalf of the  
Dolly Varden Mines Co. Previous  
to the issuing of the writs the  
government had been considering  
legislation vesting the railway  
and mine in the Taylor company.

"Included in the important  
legislation brought down through  
the attorney-general's depart-  
ment were the Game Amendment  
Act and the Testator's Family  
Maintenance Act. The latter pro-  
vides for better care of families  
after the death of the heads re-  
gardless of wills.

**Abusive Telegram.**

"On the eve of prorogation, Mr.  
Elliott, in an attempt to frighten  
the Premier, sent a most abusive  
telegram of 1 1/2 pages stating the  
Taylor people had carried on im-  
proper lobbying for further legis-  
lation. It was 11:30 at night  
when this message was received  
and the Premier read it to the  
house and introduced the vesting  
legislation. He treated the tele-  
gram with the contempt it de-  
served.

"In the morning a telegram  
even more abusive and threaten-  
ing was received from Mr. Elliott  
but it was of no avail for the  
Socialists, Soldiers and lady mem-  
ber joined with the government  
in passing the bill vesting the

"In a way the session was a  
tragic one. The death of Mr.  
Mobley was received by the house  
with much regret and later the  
death of Mr. Fell, K.C., clerk for  
33 successive sessions in the  
house, removed a figure that was  
valued and respected indeed.

**Partizan Views.**

"It was a long and hard session  
and the opposition was not bitter  
although Mr. Bowser, at times,  
gave vent to his partizan views.  
The soldiers supported the gov-  
ernment in nearly all its legisla-  
tion and one feels that the work  
done at the fourth session of this  
parliament was characterized by  
much that will be of considerable  
amount of good to the citizens of  
British Columbia."
