No Progress Made Towards Settling the Big Strike

Meeting Refuses to Take Action to End Unauthorized Walkout in Chicago District; Negotiations Refused by Other Side

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
CHICAGO, April 24.—Several thousand striking railroad workers mass meeting refused to take action to end the unauthorized walkout, now in its fourth week, in the Chicago terminal district. The meeting called by John Grunau, president of the outlaw Chicago Railwaymen's Association "to clear up the entire situation" adjourned 15 minutes after being convened with no progress towards settling the difficulties. Representatives of the railroad general association and the government ignored the invitation and announced that they would enter into no negotiations with the insurgents.

Former French President Sentenced to Prison, but Later Set Free by Order

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
PARIS, April 24.—Joseph Caillaux, former premier, has been sentenced to three years' imprisonment and to a fine of 100,000 francs for having defied the law of commerce and correspondence with the enemy, but later set free. It is understood that at a secret meeting of the High Court prior to the reading of the terms of the verdict against Caillaux it was decided that the time he had spent in prison and in hospital shall be deducted from the three years' imprisonment term imposed and that before Caillaux would be liberated today. In addition to the three years, Caillaux is given five years forced labor in a town to be selected by the Minister of the Interior and a loss of political rights, with inability to hold office.

ASTING AND DANCING MARK ENGLAND'S DAY

George's Anniversary is Duly Honored by Prince Rupert Sons of England.
England's sons in Prince Rupert celebrated the anniversary of George the Fourth last evening at the Fourth Annual Banquet and Dance held under the joint auspices of the Sons of England and the Daughters and Maids. The 175 persons sat down to the festive feast at the Knights of Pythias hall. The affair was voted by all to be the best yet. It was characterized by that spirit of friendship and good fellowship that is characteristic of the Sons of England but is so very often lacking elsewhere.
The banquet table, neatly set and artistically decorated, was laden with all manner of good things to tempt the most fastidious tastes. The outstanding feature of all was that all the dishes, cold meats, salads, pies, puddings and desserts, had been personally prepared by members of the ladies' branch of the order.

It is sufficient to say that the supper was a credit to them and the ladies of England gave proof positive that, when it comes to cooking, they can easily hold their own with any of the rest.

President Myhill Jones presided and drew attention to the fact besides the eatables, every item on the coast list was by a member of the lodge and they had not gone outside their membership for any part of it. Will Edmunds gave a cello solo, "The Broken Melody," in his own excellent style. Geo. Waddell, a tenor who is not often heard, sang "My Land, Thy Land" and was persistently applauded. No less well appreciated was that grand old English song "The Deathless Army" sung by Meth Davies. In a trick song "The Gazoo", Will Edmunds added just enough humor to touch off the seriousness of the program. W. Vaughan Davies played the accompaniments.

Canon Rix.
Canon G. A. Rix, in responding to the toast "The Day We Celebrate," proved to be the speaker of the evening. In humorous vein he led up to his subject and emphasized, no less seriously, the three principles of St. George which had formed a necessary part of the British life ever since the time of the patron saint, namely, chivalry, patriotism and religion. None of these alone could maintain a nation's welfare but, under the three, Britain had grown to be the world's greatest nation. He admonished the dominions to uphold and maintain the cardinal principles of the motherland.

FINED FIFTY FOR ASSAULT

Magistrate McMordie Gives Jock Morrison Some Timely Advice in Police Court.

I also want to emphasize to you that I could send you down for 60 days without option of fine. Try to bear this in mind, leave strong drink alone, and be the man that I know you can be."

At the meeting of the School Board last night a telegram was read from Hon. T. D. Pattullo saying that if the cost of the new school was \$150,000 the Government grant would be at least \$50,000 and he was trying to get it increased to \$90,000.

L. W. Patmore was authorized to explain the condition to Mr. Pattullo and try to get the grant increased.

School Building Source of Worry

Trustees Unable to Accept J. R. Morgan Co. Tender, but Take Time to Consider Position; Either Sub-Contract System or Temporary Building

The members of the school board are in a quandary as to what to do about the new school. They have not enough money to build according to the plans drawn by the architect and they need a school immediately. The only proposals now before them are either to drop the scheme altogether and erect temporary wooden structures, or to go ahead with the building on the sub-contract system and eliminate part of the work if it is found that it cannot be done for the money they have in hand. L. W. Patmore supported the latter system and J. C. McLennan the former.

It was explained at the meeting that the matter of reducing the tender by eliminating part of the work had been discussed with J. R. Morgan Co., but it was found that only \$16,000 reduction could be secured in this way. After allowing for discount on the bonds, architect's fees, excavation and other expenses they would require \$215,000, whereas there would be not more than \$188,000 available. The chairman explained that under those circumstances it was impossible to let the contract.

Favors Proceeding.
L. W. Patmore contended that it came down to one of two things, the cost-plus system or temporary buildings. He favored going ahead with the building. They had tenders on which contracts for much of the work could be let at once under supervision of the architect. The estimate was that by eliminating certain features they could erect the building in that way for \$170,000. There was \$12,000 already covered by contracts.

Fred Shaw thought if it could be done the best method would be to let a contract for the whole work. He was not in favor of curtailing on the building. Mrs. Kirkpatrick said Mr. Potter's scheme looked good to her. She would not like to see the work curtailed if it could be helped.

Temporary Buildings.
J. C. McLennan opposed going ahead with the building and advocated putting up temporary structures. He read a report on the proposals in Vancouver and said such a scheme would save money for the ratepayers. The present building would add from \$175,000 to \$180,000 to the debt, even if they received \$50,000 from the government. He was opposed to letting the work on the building piecemeal. The city was crying for streets and sewers.

Mr. Patmore: "If you had supported the hydro-electric then the city would have had money enough."
Mr. McLennan: "There was something trying to be put over at that time which I would not stand for. I would vote for a good hydro-electric proposal."

Mandate From People.
Dr. Kergin called the erring members to order and explained that they had a mandate from the people to build the school. The money had been voted and the time was come when they should have a big permanent school. The town was growing rapidly and they would be in a critical position shortly.

Mr. Patmore again urged that they go ahead, return the check, and put Colonel McMordie in charge of the work. If they found it impossible to complete it, they could leave some of the work unfinished. In any case they would have enough rooms to go on with. It was then decided to return the check of J. R. Morgan Co. but to lay the other tenders on the table until Tuesday night when they would again meet.

"CURLEY" M'GINNIS GETS OFF MURDER CHARGE

Associate, "Blackie Ford, However, Found Guilty of Manslaughter.

Word has just been received from Vancouver that "Curley" McGinnis, who was charged with the murder of Andy Grovan in that city last fall, has been acquitted. "Blackie" Ford, who was associated with him, has, however, been found guilty of manslaughter.

McGinnis was known in police circles here and has a bad record having been sent down eighteen months ago for six months when found guilty of the theft of blankets from the Empress Hotel.
At the school board meeting last night, J. R. Morgan handed a letter to the secretary assigning all interest in their school tender to Col. McMordie.

Canadian Book by Canadian Writer.

A Canadian book by a Canadian writer, that is not only interesting from cover to cover, but contains bits of philosophy here and there which make it of value even beyond its story interest. That book is the "Cow Puncher" written by Robert J. C. Stead. It gives pictures of some phases of Canadian life that are true. As an example of its philosophy one of the characters is made to say: "I am disposed to think that many a philanthropist, if weighed in the balance would be found to have a debit side bigger than the credit. No matter how much wealth a man may amass or how wisely he may distribute it, we cannot credit him with success if he has oppressed the hireling or dealt unfairly with his competitors or the public. Such a man is not a success; he is a failure. In his own soul he knows he is a failure, that is provided he has a soul, and if not, he is a greater failure still."

Read to Save the Trouble of Thinking.

A young man without education is taken into a library where he sees the rows upon rows of books. He wonders if he should try to read them all, but his older friend who accompanies him says: "When you go into a fruit store you do not stand and say, 'I can never eat all of that fruit; crates and crates of it, and carloads more in the warehouse.' Of course you don't. You eat enough for the good of your system, and let it go at that. Now, just apply the same sense to your reading. Read enough to keep your mind fresh and alert and vigorous; give it one new thought to wrestle with every day, and let the rest go. Oh, I know there is a certain school which holds that unless you have read this author or that author or this book or that book, you are hopelessly uninformed or behind the times. That's literary snobbery. Let them talk. A mind that consumes more than it can assimilate is morally on a par with a stomach that swallows more than it can digest. Gluttons, both of them. Read as much as you can think about, and no more. The trouble with many of our people is that they do not read to think, but to save themselves the trouble of thinking. The mind left to itself, insists upon activity. So they chloroform it."

Sorrow and Joy Matter of Moods.

"I have a theory," says a character in the same book, "that the world's sorrow is largely a matter of moods. I don't deny the sorrow nor the need for sorrow, nor the reality of it, but I do believe there is a mood of happiness which even the deepest sorrows cannot suppress. And the more you study people, the more you will understand moods, and perhaps be master of your own. And the man who can, by force of his own will, determine the mood in which he will live, is master of the world."

Discoveries of Newspaper Reporter.

One more bit in the same book that rings true is the discovery of a young newspaper reporter. "He became aware of the fact that in every community there are two communities, one on the surface, respectable, discreet, conventional, and one beneath the surface, to which these terms would not apply. He found that the province of the police was not to enforce morality, but to prevent immorality becoming obnoxious. Anything, almost, might go on so long as its effects were confined to the voluntary participants. Underneath the sham of good behavior was a world, known to the police and the newspapermen and a few others, which refused to accept standard conventions and lived according to its own impulse. And this world included so-called best citizens of both sexes. And they were good citizens. It seemed the community had two natures, a sort of Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde on a community basis. Splendid qualities; large heartedness, generosity, were mingled and streaked through degrees of selfishness and lust, running down into positive crime. And the wonder was not what the papers printed but what they left untold."

MODERN DANCE IS CRITICIZED

Caustic Comment on "Vulgar Affectations" by Newspaper Editor.

In view of the keen interest taken in dancing in this city, it will prove of interest to note what a newspaper editor, in another town thinks of the modern manifestations. He says:—

Nobody grudges the boys and girls their good times. The young people of today had five years of suppression, five years when their natural, healthy, animal spirits have been frowned upon or have just naturally died from the tragedy with which the air was filled.

But now that the war is over and peace is actually with us, we are all glad to see the young things enjoy their festal hour. The dance is the order of the night and we believe that dancing properly conducted and supervised, is as natural and healthy a diversion as walking or skating.

But—sometimes when one watches modern youth indulging in modern dancing, one longs to murmur in the ears of the dancers those well-known lines of Burns: "Oh, wad some power the giftie gie us To see ourselves as others see us."

The girl who waltzes about the room with her eyes closed and her head laid on the man's chest or shoulder, may fancy she is having a delightfully romantic time, but she is providing a delightfully amusing jest for all the onlookers.

The "Strangle Hold."

The girl who places her arm about the neck of the young man with whom she is dancing, in what he is apt to irreverently designate as a "strangle hold;" the girl who places her head closely against his cheek—may think she is being up-to-date, but she completely ruins the effect of her dancing, no matter how good that may be.

These affectations are as vulgar as holding hands in the electric car; or any other variety of "spooning" in public, which is always a sign of ill-breeding.

The position approved by the best dancing masters is the one which is gracefully correct. The right hand is placed lightly in the man's left hand, and the girl's left hand is placed upon the man's right shoulder. This allows enough proximity for good dancing, but not enough to become objectionable to good taste.

You've heard that trite expression: "position is everything," used of many things. Think of it when you dance and don't make yourself ridiculous, cheap or common by your attitude.

years this great navy had kept the nation inviolate and protected the commercial and financial channels of the world. Mr. Newton drew attention to the statement of Marshal Foch that Britain had been the backbone of the Allies during the recent great war and was largely responsible for ultimate victory. He emphasized the necessity of supporting the Dominion Government in its work of reconstruction and, more especially, in the forming of a Canadian adjunct to the British navy.

Other Speakers.

T. Silverside also spoke briefly in response to the same toast and mentioned the prowess of England in war, commerce and civilization. Wars were not liked but sometimes they had great reforming effects on nations. The toast to the ladies was responded to by Dr. A. H. Bayne who emphasized the importance of the gentleman, not the weaker, sex in world's work today. The toast to "Kindred Societies" was answered briefly and to the point by W. E. Thompson, of the Sons of Canada and Wm. Reid of the St. Andrew's Society.

A most pleasant feature of the evening was the presentation to Mr. and Mrs. Myhill Jones by E. R. Tabrum, on behalf of the Sons of England, a silver casserole and pie server. COURT MARTIAL AT JERUSALEM

Arabs and Jews Convicted and Sentenced to Imprisonment for Rioting.

(Special by G. T. P. Telegrams.) JERUSALEM, April 23.—The British commander has confirmed the sentences passed by a court martial, mainly under the Ottoman penal code, on several Arabs and Jews in connection with recent rioting.

The sentences ranged from 15 years imprisonment downward. The Jews kept their shops closed on Tuesday morning as a protest, but reopened them on the Government's order.

The total casualties in the rioting are announced as 198.

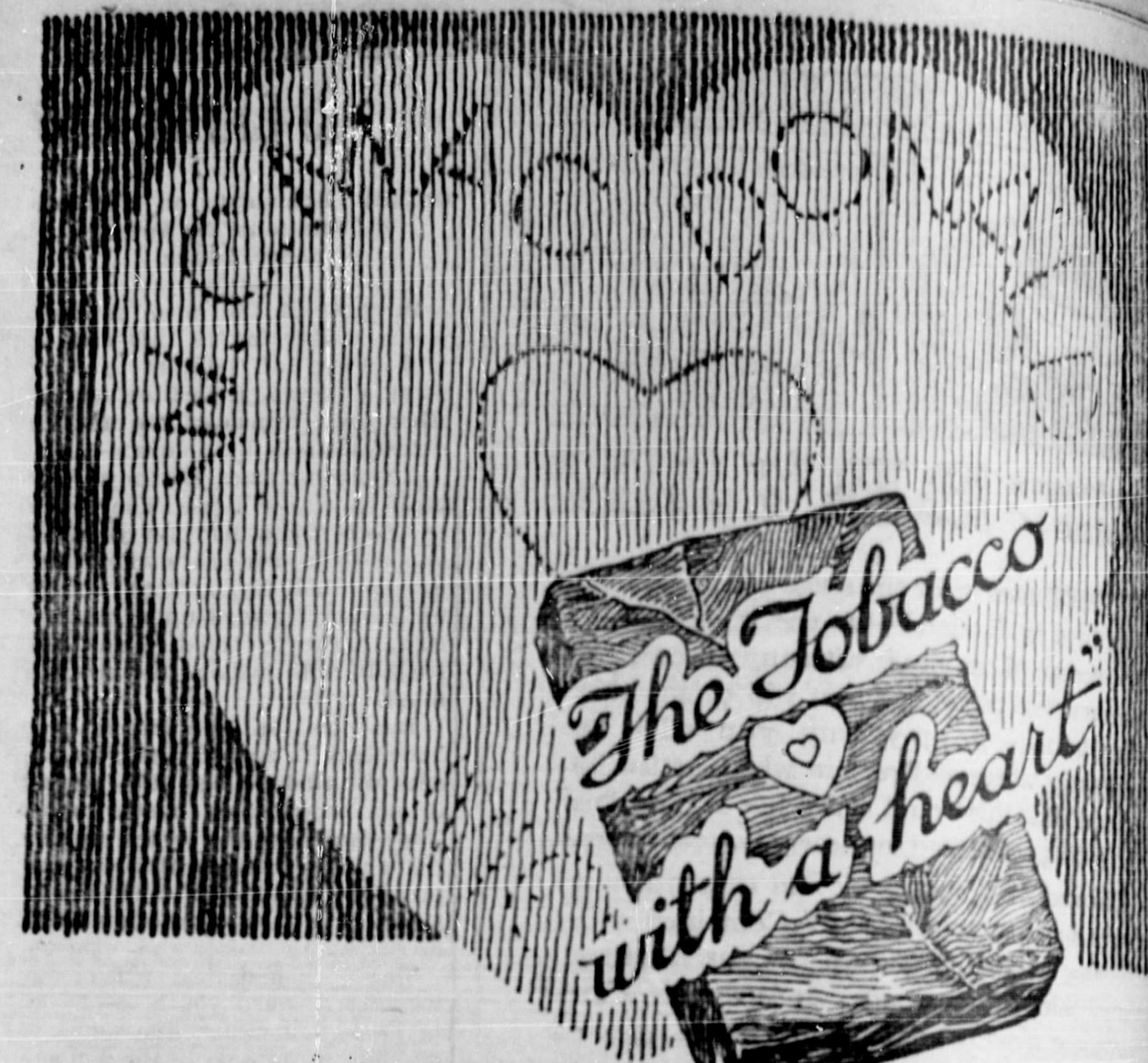

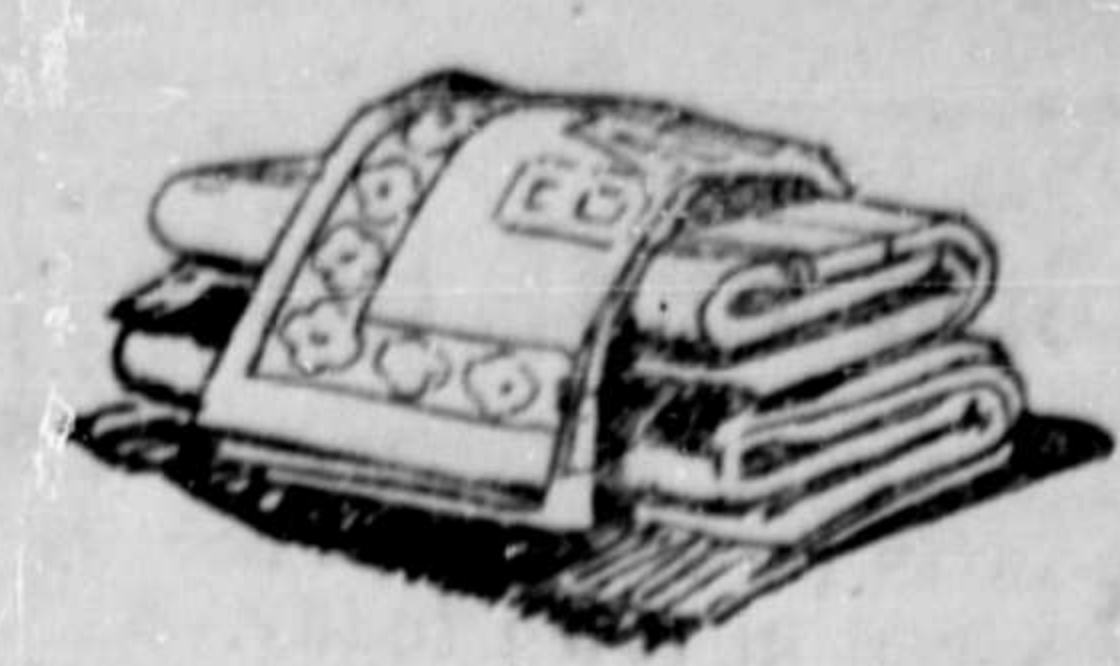
Governor's Medal.

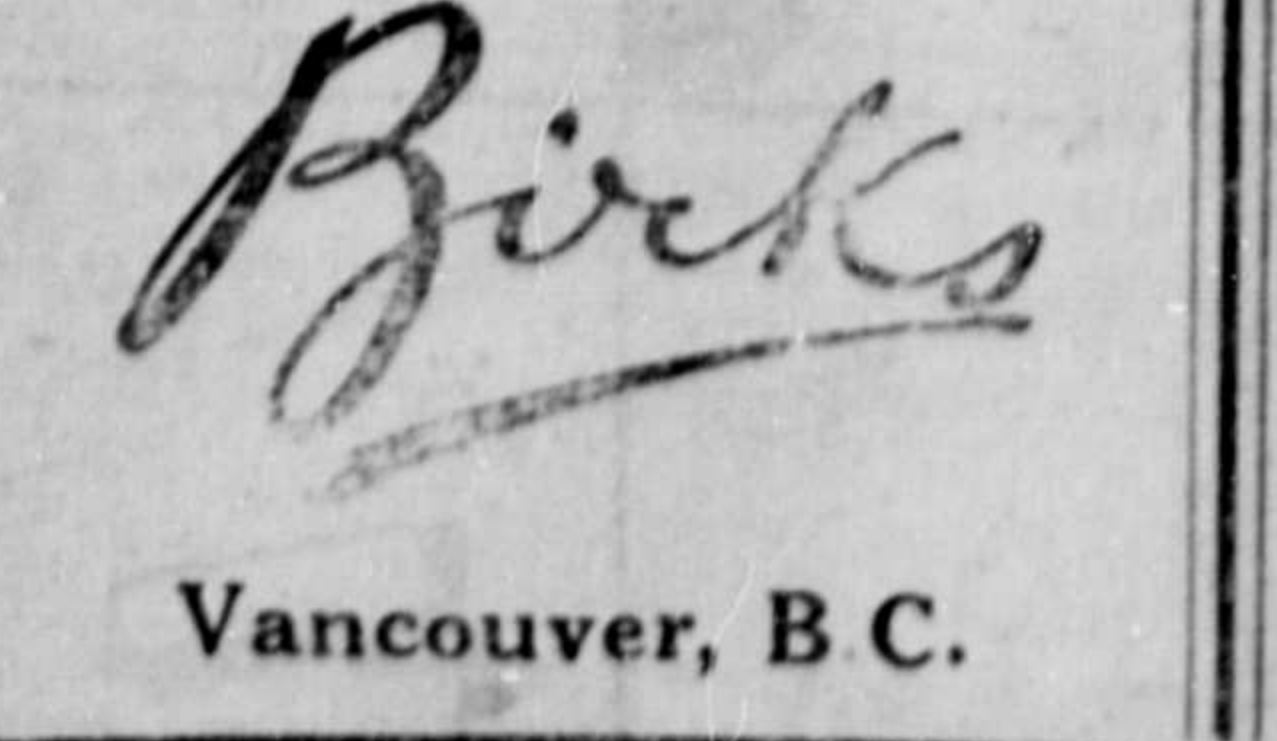
