Great Britain Will Control Future Policy of Palestine

Given Mandate by Supreme Council, while France Controls Syria; National Home of Jews to be Established

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
SAN REMO, April 26.—The Allies' Supreme Council has granted a mandate for Mesopotamia and Palestine to Great Britain and a mandate for Syria to France.

In Palestine under the British mandate the council will establish within the ancient limits of the Holy Land what is called the National Home of the Jews."

The terms of the mandate protects the national rights of Jewish citizens or citizens of other countries. That is to say, British, French or American or other nationality may claim his nationality, although he is also a citizen of Palestine. The rights of Arabs are protected, there being 600,000 in Palestine and 100,000 Jews.

British forces have been in occupation of Palestine since the departure of the Turkish forces by the British Field Marshal, Viscount Allenby.

LICIT TRADE IS INCREASING

Increase in Liquor Tax Receipts Reflects in Unlawful Manufacture.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
DUBLIN, April 26.—High duties on whiskey have led to the increased practice of moonshining and illicit liquor manufacture in various parts of Ireland. The police are on the hunt for hidden stills and heavy punishments are meted out to those running them when they are proven.

Excise customs and excise receipts show that in 1919 Dublin receipts totalled £8,750,000, an increase of nearly £4,500,000 over 1918 figures. The great increase is credited largely to the duties imposed during the year.

MUNITIONS, ARMS FOUND IN GERMANY

Supposed to Be for Use in Operations Against France.

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
PARIS, April 26.—Large quantities of arms and munitions were discovered by French cavalry entering Hanau, east of Frankfurt. The material was labelled "Army of the West."

Numerous plans relating to manoeuvres were also found purporting to cover military operations against France, through the zone occupied by the army at Coblenz. At Konigsburg in East Prussia 350 cannon were discovered by the inter-allied commission, according to advices received here.

BRITISH TO CONTROL OIL

Taking Big Interest in Shell Company in Order to Protect Interests.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

LONDON, April 26.—Negotiations are in progress between the Government and the Shell Transport and Trading Co. with a view to some form of Government control over the big oil firm. The reason given for this action is as a result of Great Britain's war experiences and the present feverish activity of American oil interests, the Government says that steps must be taken to insure that the vast interests of the Shell Company will never pass out of British control.

The negotiations involve a plan for the exchanging of Government stock for the Shell Company shares.

ALBERTA MINISTER OF HEALTH PASSES

EDMONTON, April 26.—Hon. G. Mackay, minister of health and of municipal affairs in the Alberta Government, died after an illness of less than two weeks. Heart failure was the cause.

FRENCH TROOPS IN MESOPOTAMIA LOST

CONSTANTINOPLE, April 26.—Five hundred French troops are reported wiped out in the evacuation of Urfa in the northwestern part of Mesopotamia. Details are lacking.

Winnipeg Falcons Sweep Everything

Canadians and Swedish in Finals Tonight for World's Amateur Championship at Antwerp

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Antwerp, April 26.—Canadian hockey players represented by Winnipeg Falcons at the Olympiad swept everything in front of them both today and Saturday when the Czecho-Slovaks were beaten by a 15-0 score and the United States by 2-0. The ice stretch is much narrower than the Canadians are accustomed to but excellent defence and steady forward work proved overwhelmingly superior to anything either opponents could show.

On Saturday the United States All-Stars absolutely overwhelmed Switzerland, piling up the huge score of 20-0.

Canada and Sweden will play tonight for the amateur hockey championship of the world. Canada qualified by beating the United States and Sweden by defeating the French puck chasers. The score in the game between Sweden and France was 4-0.

MORE SHOOTING IN IRELAND DEMONSTRATIONS IN LONDON

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

BELFAST, April 26.—Sergeant Cornelius Crane and Constable McGoldrick, both of Belfast, were shot and instantly killed Saturday night near Bandon county, to which the Sinn Feiners allege the police who are reported to have departed who assassinated Lord Mayor McCurtain of Cork.

Dublin, April 26.—A man named Behan, keeper of a tavern, was shot late Saturday night and seriously wounded. His assailants escaped. Constable Swenton was wounded by a revolver shot at Ennis, County Claire, Saturday. Three suspects were arrested.

LONDON, April 26.—Among the 250 prisoners in Wormwood Scrubs prison a large number have been on a hunger strike since Wednesday as a protest against detention without charge or trial. One of the men was released unconditionally Friday night in a state of collapse.

LONDON, April 26.—Branches of the Self-determination League organized a big demonstration outside the prison. Thousands responded and last night indulged in manifestations similar to those recently carried out at Mount Joy prison, Dublin. The crowd sang songs and burned flares.

RAILROADERS ARE EXPELLED FROM UNION

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

NEW YORK, April 26.—More than 2,000 local railroad workers have been expelled from the Brotherhood of Trainmen for participating in the unauthorized strike, according to Edward M. O. Hugh, chairman of the strikers' executive committee. Charters of four local unions were revoked.

Commemoration of Second Battle of Ypres when the Canadians Saved the Day

"The Canadians Saved the Day." That is why the second battle of Ypres was commemorated last night. Colonel McMordie, who is familiar with the memorable occasion, told something of the battle at the theatre last night when a service was held with Colonel McMordie and Canon Rix as speakers.

Colonel McMordie explained that this battle was sometimes called the battle of St. Julien. We celebrated it because it was the first important engagement in which a Canadian division as a unit took part. On that occasion 5,000 allied soldiers died defending the road to Calais.

The Colonel told of the ancient glories of Ypres and of its condition at the time of the engagement. It was the middle of April when the Canadians took over about five miles of trenches. They were commanded by General Alderson. Amateur Canadian soldiers were opposed by highly trained Germans who looked on their opponents with disdain.

The Battle.

On April 22, 1915, the Germans started an intense bombardment but instead of following it up with an attack they used the deadly poisonous gas for the first time. The French Moroccan troops who held the lines next to the Canadians threw down their arms and fled. The fighting continued through Friday, Saturday and Sunday and then the lines were established, the Canadians had saved the day. At this engagement the Germans learned such respect for Canadian soldiers that it was used as a punishment to put a German in the line opposite the Canadians.

"Canadian people should be proud of their men and try to make the world a better place to live in," concluded the Colonel. "They should cherish for all time the memory of the dead heroes."

Canon Rix said that now people were getting away from the war danger they were forgetting some things connected with the war. After the heat was over people were saying things they were not allowed to say during war time. They were saying that the war was brought on from selfish motives. This idea the Canon corrected. The men had stood for freedom against a great menace, for national freedom against national slavery.

The men went away to fight with staunch hearts and the people here cheered them and had confidence in them, and that confidence was justified. They were untried men but they stood the test. The canon told of some of the things the men had to endure but they proved themselves as gallant as any in the Empire. They died as bravely as any. Many came back but others did not return. "We cannot add to their honor. The honor is to us not to them. In our own church there were thirty men who gave their lives and the church is forever honored by the fact," he said.

The speaker spoke of the value of a life as not in the number of years lived. He urged the men who did not go, to make the supreme sacrifice here. He urged them not to lose faith in God and in this way to raise a memorial to the dead.

Collection \$150.
J. H. Kelly, president of the G. W. V. A., spoke of the objects of the association and of the memorial they were about to erect. As a result of the collection he was able to announce an addition of \$150 to the funds.

Songs were rendered by Mrs. D. B. Morkill and J. S. Pudney, and the pipe band and theatre orchestra each played selections. Scripture was read by Rev. T. H. Nuttall and Rev. James Dunlop, while Dr. Grant led in prayer. Hymns were sung by the audience and at the conclusion the last post was sounded by Will Edmunds.

The chairman thanked the management of the theatre and the orchestra for their services, also the pipe band, the singers and J. F. Maguire who had given up the theatre for that night and had helped in the arrangements. The theatre was beautifully draped in bunting.

FIUME AGAIN IS BLOCKADED

is Punishment for Stealing of 45 Horses From Regular Troops.

FIUME, April 26.—Fiume is again severely blockaded by land and sea, following a raid by D'Annunzio's soldiers on Abbazia, west of this city, where 40 horses were stolen from regular troops.

The blockade is intended as a punishment by General Foirace against the military commander of Fiume.

MAHOOD PLEASED AT BRITISH INTEREST

Coming of English Capital to Stewart Marks New Era of Development.

"The coming in of the Canadian British Exploration Co. for active development in the Stewart district this season will bring the first English capital to that section," said Grand Mahood to the News on Saturday afternoon, "and the success of that development will be of inestimable value to the country in encouraging the investment of English capital. So far all the money invested there is American, with the exception of the Belgian-Algonquin Co. The Selukwe, which is behind the Canadian British Exploration Co., is one of the strongest mining companies in the world and has properties in the Rand, South Africa, South America and Australia. Although they are heavily interested in our mines, Mr. Bush and myself still have a controlling interest."

FARMERS' STORE TO BE ESTABLISHED IN C. H. THOMAS' GROCERY

The Northern Interior Co-operative Association will open its market in this city next Monday morning in the C. H. Thomas store which they have bought out. It was expected to have established the farmers' store in the City Market, but satisfactory arrangements could not be reached with the present incumbent by the association.

Mr. Thomas will remain in the store for a time winding up his own business. No manager has yet been appointed.

Remember the Men Who Fought for Us.

The commemorative service at the theatre brought home the fact that people are fast forgetting the sacrifices which were made by the noble men who responded immediately at the call of their country and who fought for the liberties of those who remained at home. It is so easy to forget. We are getting back to the old way of living except that we are bothered somewhat with the high cost.

It is well that the local memorial building is to be pushed ahead now. This is the time to secure the funds and get the building under way. It is to be hoped that nothing will delay it further and that everyone will give the collectors a glad welcome when they come with the list.

There is one more thing to do. The pension fund becomes every day more inadequate as the cost of living rises. The women who have lost their means of support are still struggling against odds. Some men who are unable to help themselves are still unprovided for. It should be urged yet more strongly on the Dominion Government that something must be done for these people. Everyone should back the veterans in their demands along these lines.

Morse Creek Bridge Is Badly Needed.

The Morse Creek bridge is badly needed and it is to be hoped that some method of carrying the work through will be found. It is difficult for anyone on the outside to know the difficulties of those who conduct the affairs of the city, but this must be remembered. The people who recently built houses in Section Two, did so on the understanding that the bridge would be built. They have in many cases invested their all in a home, and the city now must do its part.

Beef Shortage Likely Soon.

Owing to the fact that so many of the cattle on the prairies had to be sacrificed last winter, there is likely to be a beef shortage soon and people will have to eat less meat. That will not be a hardship for many eat too much meat and not enough fish. Because we have the fish right here we do not value it as we should. There is plenty can be caught by the users if they so wish.

Any beef shortage on the prairies will help the British Columbia cattle ranches, for the prices will tend upward and there will be a ready sale for all the cattle that are ready for the market.

CANADIAN TRADE IS ON THE INCREASE

Large Increase for Month of March Over Previous Years.

OTTAWA, April 26.—Figures for the fiscal year ending March 31 last show an increase in the grand total of Canadian trade amounting to \$165,980,266, as compared with the figures for the previous year. The total value of goods exported from and imported into Canada during the year just ended was \$2,351,003,140. During the year ending March 31, 1919, the total value of imports and exports was \$2,185,194,162.

IS ACQUITTED OF TIPPERARY MURDER

Jury Trial Releases John Madden on Sergeant Brady Murder Affair.

DUBLIN, April 24.—John Madden, charged with the murder of Sergeant Brady at Lorry, Tipperary, last September, was acquitted by the court today, the Lord Chief Justice expressing his approval of the jury's verdict. A remarkable demonstration followed the announcement of the court's action. County Tipperary was placed under martial law for some months as a result of this murder.

NOT DECIDED IF OFFICIALS WILL BE TRIED

Irish Attorney-General Does not Commit Himself on Question.

LONDON, April 26.—The question has been raised in Commons as to whether the persons accused of murder in the jury's verdict over the body of Lord Mayor MacCurtain will be brought to trial or not. Speaking on the question, Right Honorable Denis Henry, the Irish attorney-general, said that he would consider the matter as soon as a report of the evidence submitted before the coroner was made.

Mr. Henry said that as it was a matter affecting public service, he could give no further information as to whether the government had proof that Mayor MacCurtain was murdered by his secret secretary if this evidence was not produced at the inquest.

Charges of wilful murder were brought in by the coroner's jury investigating the death against Lord French, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, Ian MacPherson, late secretary treasurer for Ireland, Acting Inspector General Smith, of the Royal Ship Constabulary, and other officials.

NEW POLICY FOR IRELAND

Sir Hamar Greenwood to Make Clean Sweep at Dublin Castle.

LONDON, April 26.—It is stated again that shortly after Lloyd George's return from San Remo a new policy will be initiated in regard to Ireland which will have as its primary object the creation of more peaceful and friendly relations.

Starting with the resignation of Lord French, a clean sweep will be made in Dublin Castle of officialdom. Sir Hamar Greenwood, the new secretary, is regarded as the exponent of a new policy of conciliation.

Speaking at Sunderland, Sir Hamar said: "I have the fullest powers the chief secretary ever enjoyed." It is said he is out to employ the jails, not to fill them.

WAS UNABLE TO GET POST

Despite Long Service and Recommendations Dr. Inglis Could Not Re-establish.

(Special via G. T. P. Tele-graphs.)
OTTAWA, April 24.—The session of the special committee on pensions and re-establishment was today featured by a clash between the Director of Medical Services in the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment and several members of the committee.

Dr. A. S. Inglis, in the stand, stated that he was refused a position with the re-establishment bureau in Vancouver because the unit officials there did not want him appointed. This was in spite of the fact of his claim that he had been recommended by Sir James Loughheed, the minister of that department.

Dr. Inglis had a wide experience in X-ray work and had served four and a half years overseas. Returning to Canada he found difficulty in getting re-established and sought vainly for a position with the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment and a pension.

WOMEN UNDER THIRTY WILL NOT YET OBTAIN ENGLISH FRANCHISE

(Special via G. T. P. Tele-graphs.)

LONDON, April 26.—By a vote of 13 to 9, the committee of the House of Commons have laid on the table the Labor party's Franchise Bill under which women would be given the vote at the age of 21, the same as men. This bill passed its second reading on February 27, with a unanimous vote. According to political procedure the bill then went to the committee for amendment.

Under the provision of the bill, the present voting age of women, which is 30 years, would have been reduced to 21, adding five million more voters to the register.

IS GOING FARMING NEAR OOTSA LAKE

John Morrison, Old Timer and War Veteran, Left for Interior This Morning.

John Morrison, who has been working for the city as a blacksmith for the past two years, left this morning for Ootsa Lake where he has taken up land and intends to farm. Before his departure Mr. Morrison was made the recipient of a handsome silver mounted pipe by the city employees and the G. W. V. A. jointly. He replied suitably and expressed his appreciation to the mayor, city council and employees and particularly to Road Foreman Malcolm McLeod, whom he mentioned as always doing the right thing by the returned men.

Mr. Morrison is a real old timer of the North, having been engaged on the G. T. P. in early construction. In 1915 he enlisted in this city with the 72nd battalion, C. E. F. and served throughout the war. He has made a wide circle of friends and has always been held in high regard with all those whom he came in touch with.

He is confident of the future of Prince Rupert and the North generally and, though a man of middle age, he has decided to stake all in the North and with that object in view is going farming in the Ootsa valley.

FOLLOWERS OF FATHER DUNCAN ARE RETURNING

Have Made Formal Application to Be Taken Back to Church Missionary Society.

TO NEW METLAKATLA ABOUT 32 YEARS AGO

That the Indians of the Tsimpsean tribe who broke away from the Church Missionary Society with "Father" William Duncan some 32 years ago and went to New Metlakatla, where an independent mission was established, are returning as a body to the fold of that society under Archbishop Du Vernet and Archdeacon Collison is the word that is brought from the Kincolith Mission.

During Easter week a large number of these natives belonging to the Salvation Army, the Epworth League, Church Army and other organizations came down to Kincolith Mission where a number of services were held. While there formal application for their reception into the Church Missionary Society was made and, it is understood, that this reception will be granted.

Great Celebration.

Great was the celebration among the visitors and the hosts during this reunion. Services were held in plenty and a general feeling of rejoicing was rife among them. Great enthusiasm was manifested in their singing and their devotion to Christianity as taught them by the hardy and brave missionaries of many denominations half a century ago would indeed be a source of gratification to them, could they have seen it.

The story of how the village of New Metlakatla was founded over thirty years ago by "Father" Duncan has been the subject of many stories and the influence he had over the Indians was remarkable. With his death in August, 1918, they have been left without a leader, practically, and their return to the original missionary society is a matter that is of great gratification to the recognized society but could, at the same time, have been expected after "Father" Duncan's death.

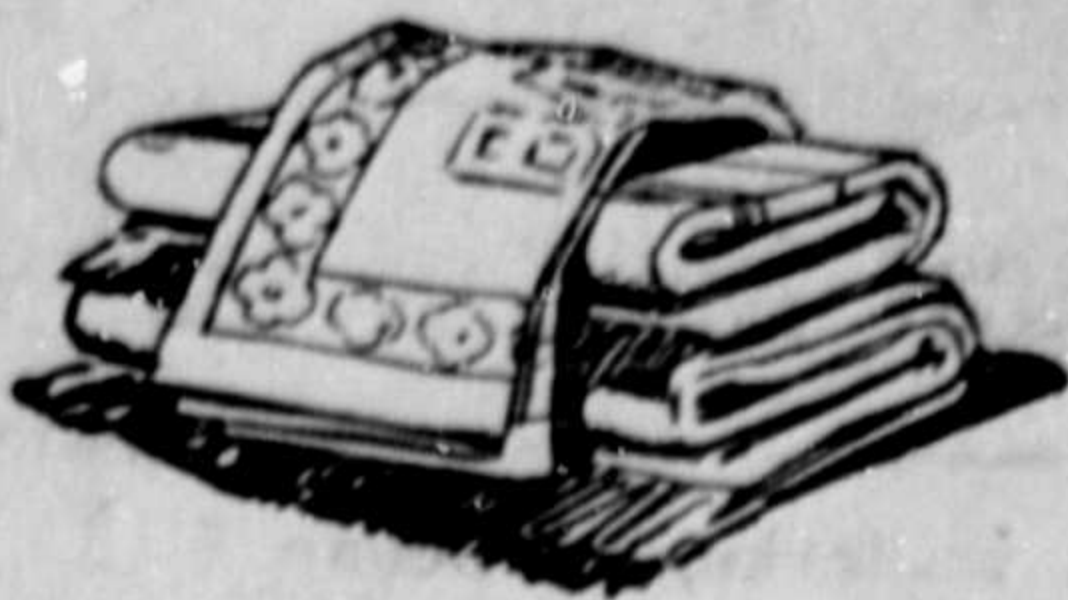
For the occasion of the reunion the new electric light plant at Kincolith was turned on for the first time. It is now permanently established and operating.

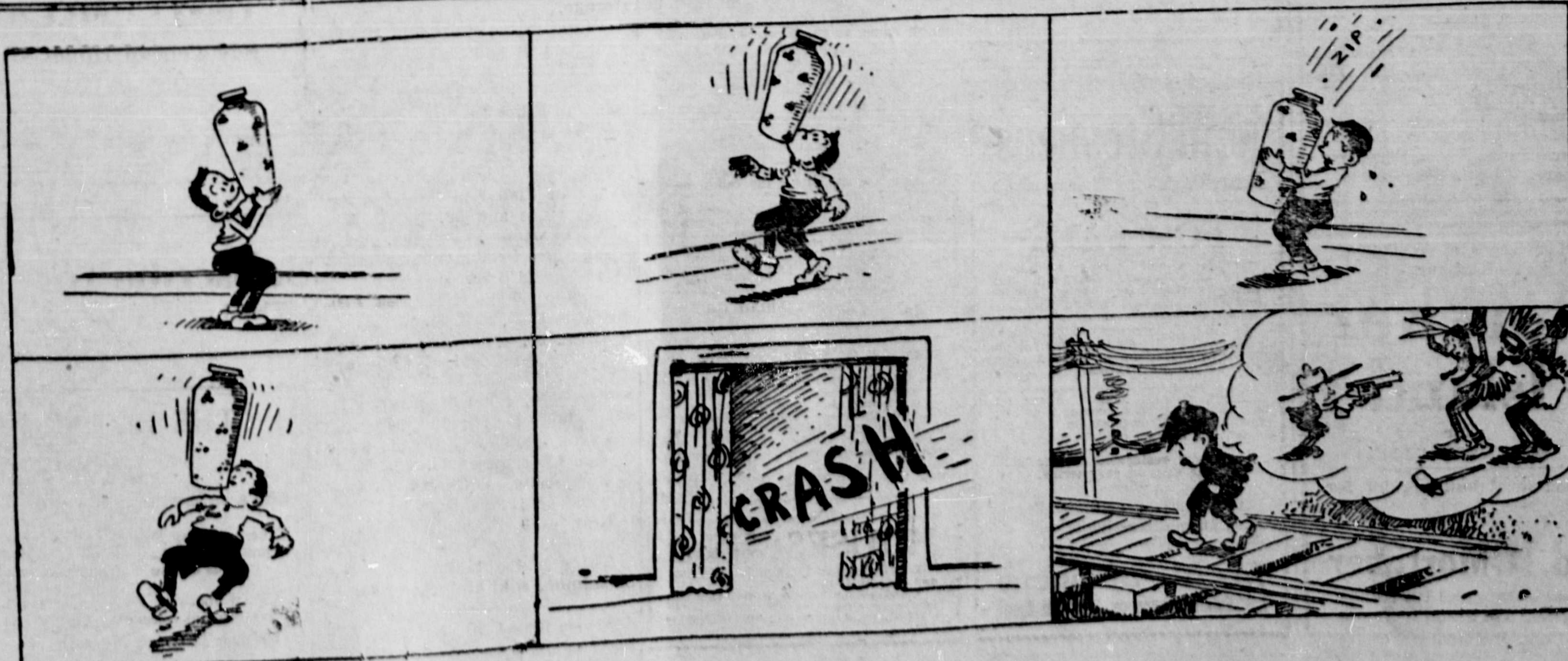

PREMIER MAY SUE SENDER OF TELEGRAMS

No Official Announcement Yet But Action is Expected.

VICTORIA, April 26.—Final disposition of the Dolly Varden "affair" and the two sensational telegrams sent to Premier Oliver by R. T. Elliott on behalf of the Chicago Dolly Varden Mining Co.—in so far as the provincial Legislature is concerned this year—when the act respecting the Taylor Engineering Company was passed. What promised to be an uneventful ending to a prolonged legislative session was changed into a whirlwind finish through consideration of this bill and the causes leading up to its introduction.

There was little discussion of the bill during its committee stage, since the chief arguments for and against were made during the debate on the second reading of the proposed measure. The bill vests in the Taylor Engineering Company title to all the property in the Province formerly owned by the Dolly Varden Mines and the Dolly Varden shipping companies; also the Dolly Varden Railway, which extends from Alice Arm up the Kitsault River to the mines.

Although the Legislature apparently expressed its intention of ignoring the attack upon Premier Oliver as unworthy of official notice, and too kthis stand by voting down the resolution to hail the sender of the telegrams, R. T. Elliott, K. C., before the bar of the House, still it is stated in legislative circles that the last of the affair has not been heard. Rumor has it that official proceedings against the despatcher of the telegrams may be taken by Premier Oliver.
