

Remember the Men Who Fought for Us.

The commemorative service at the theatre brought home the fast that people are fast forgetting the sacrifices which were made by the noble men who responded immediately at the call of their country and who fought for the liberties of those who remained at home. It is so easy to forget. We are getting back to the old way of living except that we are bothered somewhat with the high cost.

It is well that the local memorial building is to be pushed ahead now. This is the time to secure the funds and get the building under way. It is to be hoped that nothing will delay it further and that everyone will give the collectors a glad welcome when they come with the list.

There is one more thing to do. The pension fund becomes every day more inadequate as the cost of living rises. The women who have lost their means of support are still struggling against odds. Some men who are unable to help themselves are still unprovided for. It should be urged yet more strongly on the Dominion Government that something must be done for these people. Everyone should back the veterans in their demands along these lines.

The Morse Creek bridge is badly needed and it is to be hoped that some method of carrying the work through will be found. It is difficult for anyone on the outside to know the difficulties of those who conduct the affairs of the city, but this must be remembered. 
