EDITORIAL

ON ONE OF DISTRICT

British Columbia will never be a great province until she secures her own iron and with which to build her. She has the raw material, the next step is to manufacture. The capital required for business is immense and the deterring factor.

Provincial Government is to bonus such an industry to the extent of \$3 a ton on pig iron manufactured. It was made two years ago up to the present time no one has come along and asked for it.

The Government is determined as to where the iron is located, as long as it is in the province. Prince Rupert is as good an opportunity as any other place, better, for she has the iron all assembled within a very small radius.

There are two important grades of iron. One of these is used for ship purposes and is often referred to as Bessemer grade; the other is known as open hearth grade, and is used in sulphur and phosphorus processes into Bessemer processes into open hearth processes in this district is of the Bessemer

Scale in Quantities

There are large quantities of iron ore along the coast of British Columbia. The southern Vancouver Island is a rich boundary, but this is a great deal of fuel to be used in the electric process it is estimated that it can be done. The power required is not great. In order to make it necessary to use another grade of iron ore as limonite or hematite. The big deposit at Copper River is almost pure sulphur and quite free from phosphorus. That means the Bessemer grade.

Contracts Let for School Building

Trustees Decide to go ahead with Work placing Lieut.-Col. McMordie in Charge of Construction on Commission Basis

At the special meeting of the school board last night it was decided to go ahead with the school building at once and the work will commence immediately. Lieut.-Colonel McMordie will be retained as supervisor, he to receive ten per cent on work for which no contracts are let, amounting approximately to \$90,000, and four per cent on the contract work, amounting to about \$80,000.

The resolution to go ahead with the work on this basis was moved by L. W. Patmore and seconded by Fred Shaw and was supported by all the members of the board except J. C. McLennan who vigorously opposed it.

Tenders were accepted for part of the work. For plumbing, sheet metal and roofing, heating and ventilation the contract will be let to Steen & Longwill for \$40,896.

The contract for electric work goes to Pattinson & Ling, the price being \$3,810.

Stone masonry, concrete to the joists of the first floor, will be done by V. Basso-Bert for \$26,127.

The tenders for painting and glazing were not accepted.

The solicitor will confer with the architect and draw up the contracts at once and work will commence without any unnecessary delay. Already the excavation work is almost finished.

The architect's estimate of the total cost of the building is \$470,000.

Charles William Hess Killed When Gasoline Flywheel Throws Back

A gruesome discovery was made last night by a man named Swanson at Shawatlans Passage when Charles William Hess, a well-known fisherman, was found cold and stiff lying in a pool of blood beside the engine of his gasoline boat, the Nadu. Immediately after the discovery a phone message was received by Chief Minty of the provincial police at 9 o'clock. Dr. McNeill was summoned and accompanied Chief Minty to the scene of the tragedy.

Arriving there at 10:20, Hess was found alongside the engine with a hole through his head from the left eye right through the brain and out the back of his head. On examination it was found that in cranking his engine with a long steel spike the engine had backfired, throwing the unfortunate man over onto the spike, thus piercing his head. When the police arrived the victim had been dead at least 24 hours.

Mr. Hess was a well known figure along the waterfront and was just in the prime of life. He has been in the city for four or five years engaged in the fishing business and was well liked by all with whom he became associated. He was a Swedish American and was a naturalized Canadian. His age is not definitely known but is generally believed to be about 35 years. A sister, Bertha Hess, lives in Spokane and she is being communicated with.

PROVINCE WILL HAVE NEW FISH INSPECTOR

B. C. Manufacturers at Vancouver Notified of Pickled Fish

VANCOUVER, April 28.—A meeting of the B. C. Manufacturers held here last night endorsed a resolution asking for the establishment of a Fisheries Board in British Columbia. The meeting was advised by a letter from the Department of Marine and Fisheries at Ottawa that a pickled fish inspector would be appointed this year.

SCALED WALLS OF STATE PEN AND SNEAKED BACK TO PRISON ORDER TO BEAT COST LIVING

JOLIET, Ill., April 27.—Robert Needham paroled three weeks ago after serving part of a sentence for burglary, scaled the walls of the state penitentiary from the outside early this morning and sneaked back into prison, because he found himself unable to cope with the high cost of living as a free man.

Prison officials said it was the first time a convict had climbed the walls to get back into the penitentiary.

"The only way to beat the high cost of living, is to be in prison," said Needham, when asked his reason for returning to jail.

CITY ENGINEER ON STREET WORK

Says That When Ready for Permanent Paving Concrete Would be Best Locally.

City Engineer Clements favors concrete for permanent streets in this city. Mr. Clements bases his opinion on the fact that the other processes, asphalt, tarvia and bitulithic, are so-called hot processes and would practically be impossible here on account of the damp climatic conditions. The engineer points out that the difficulty with these processes would arise in the laying down as once set they would stand up under the rain. The bitulithic and tarvia processes, involving the use of tar, are especially difficult.

For present purposes, however, Mr. Clements is of the opinion that hard surfacing by the concentration of local rock such as that from Smith Island or Tye would be most advisable until a permanent sewer system has been laid. The Smith Island and Tye rock would differ altogether from that now on the streets. The present rock surfacing is of shale rock taken right off the townsite and it is not a good street rock. The rock from the two quarries contains all the elements for good hard surfacing and would be quite satisfactory.

Reasons for Failure.

Aeroplane Chased Vancouver Train

Aviator Trim Takes Actor Who Missed Train to Agassiz Junction where He Joins Rest of Company

VANCOUVER, April 28.—A dramatic chase of the C. P. R. transcontinental train took place out of Vancouver this morning when Lieut. Trim, an airman of this city, flying with Patrick Ludlow, a leading actor in "The Luck of the Navy" company, caught the train at Agassiz 70 miles from here where it was held.

Ludlow crossed from Victoria with his company on the night boat and the steward forgot to call him until thirteen minutes before the train left for Calgary where the company, who left without him, plays on Thursday night. As there is no understudy for Ludlow his presence there was imperative.

On being awakened Ludlow rushed to the Hotel Vancouver, where he was speeded out to Minoru Park by an auto, and left there at a few minutes after 11 o'clock with Aviator Trim. Arrangements were made to hold the train at Agassiz Junction a few minutes to allow Ludlow to leave the plane and climb aboard.

CANADA IS INDEPENDENT

So Says Member of British House of Commons in Debate.

LONDON, April 28.—The question of Canadian representation at Washington was raised in the House of Commons on the vote for the Colonial Office by Colonel Arthur Murray, who said that while he believed Canadians generally were favorable to the idea, many saw the position would be an anomalous one, as Canada was an independent country and the authority of her representative would be impaired if it were subordinate to that of the British ambassador.

IRISHMEN ENGLAND ARE THREATENING

Say They Will Strike and Tie Up Industries if Prisoners are Not Liberated.

LIVERPOOL, April 28.—The Lord Mayor yesterday received a deputation representing Irish societies, who threatened that unless the Sinn Fein prisoners were released from Wormwood Scrubbs prison within 48 hours, the port of Liverpool and the industries would be held up by a strike of Irish workers. These workers in Liverpool number 117,000.

Similar action is being taken at other ports.

JAPAN TURNED DOWN BY POWERS

New Press Failed When Half Through Job.

Yesterday the new Duplex Press was used for the first time for printing the Daily News and when something over seven hundred papers were off, the web broke and it was found impossible to complete the run in time for a number of the delivery boys to take their routes. We were sorry to disappoint those who always look for the News but the failure was no fault of ours. Within a few days the press should be running well and we do not anticipate much further trouble.

The press is a first class machine and needs only a little adjusting and tuning up to make it do the work. If a similar failure should occur within the next few days subscribers will understand the reason. We have the best expert on the coast in charge of the machine and the failure is something that often happens under similar circumstances.

Council Anxious To Serve Citizens.

The City Council seems anxious to serve the citizens. They are making every effort to find a solution of the Morse Creek bridge difficulty. It is sure that there is a demand for the building of the bridge and it seems equally sure that the Council will see that the work is done. While we have to exercise care in the matter of civic expenditures, that does not mean that all work is to be left in abeyance.

Cannot Understand Prince Rupert People.

Col. McMillan of the Cassiar Cannery cannot understand the people of Prince Rupert interfering in the fisheries when they have no interest in the canneries. He says the fishermen come from the south and equipment is purchased elsewhere.

We could tell the Colonel those are the reasons why we are interested. We want the fishermen to come from here, we want to sell equipment and supplies, if not to the canneries at least to the fishermen. It is because the canners have ignored Prince Rupert and purchased their supplies elsewhere that Prince Rupert people have become so insistent that there be a change. It is because the fishermen of Prince Rupert have been ignored and handicapped that they have used all their influence to secure open fisheries to which so much exception is taken by the canners. Let the canners treat the people of this city fairly and they will find local citizens always ready to reciprocate. The fisheries are ours. They are in our district and we cannot allow outsiders from Vancouver and other points to come in here and monopolize them and carry away all the spoils. The fish belong to the local fishermen as much as to the canners, and in most cases more so, for the fishermen live in the district while the cannerymen do not.

Visiting Season Will Be Here Soon.

The visiting season for public men will soon be here. We shall have representatives of all parties coming to the city this summer and the more the merrier, for if we are to expect any consideration we must get into personal touch with the ministers. We must show them what we have, and assemble the facts in connection with our possibilities.

One announcement that has already been made is that W. L. Mackenzie King is coming west. The Calgary Herald, sensing the fact that the visit of the leader of the opposition is likely to prove very popular in the west, warns Mr. King that he must not take it as a sign that the west is with him.

Another visit that is suggested is that of Premier Oliver, and other ministers of the Provincial Government. The minister of lands is our member and of course he will be here. In every case we must take the opportunity of laying our views on public matters before these men. We must not assume that even because a man is our member that he is conversant with all our needs and problems. Personal grievances and requests for personal advantage have no place on the program, but matters of public interest should be thoroughly canvassed.

BILL TO REGULATE COAST NAVIGATION

New Regulations May Be Promulgated by Council

A new bill before Parliament now in session at Ottawa provides that steamboat regulations may be made and promulgated by the Governor General in Council and may be changed from time to time as may be found necessary. This measure will make possible such changes as may be desired to allow gasoline launches to operate from Prince Rupert or other ports.

The same bill gives power to the cabinet to fix a yearly tax on all steamboats registered in Canada.

Capt. Freeman has been very active in requesting that some change be made in the navigation laws which would permit the operation of gasoline launches which could carry freight and passengers. The bill if passed will make it possible for the department of marine to comply with these requests.

MAGYAR REBELLION SUBOTITSA DISTRICT

(Special via G. T. P. Telegrams.) BELGRADE, April 27.—A message from Subotitsa reports that on April 19 a revolt broke out among the inhabitants of Subotitsa, an internal district which formerly belonged to Hungary. A crowd attacked the municipal police guards, killing two of them and seriously wounding five others.

The revolt is believed to have been started by several hundred Magyar propagandists connected with the Soviet League for the integrity of Hungary, the headquarters of which is at Budapest.

POWER PROBLEM IN PRODUCTION STEEL AND IRON

Dominion Advisory Council Will Continue Investigations in Northern B. C. and also in the South.

ELECTRIC IRON SMELTING PROVEN MOST EFFICIENT

Aside from the need for power that is felt locally for municipal and industrial purposes, the matter is also giving considerable food for thought to mining experts and especially to those interested in the development and operation of steel production. A committee consisting of British Columbia mining men was appointed last May by the Honorary Advisory Council for Scientific and Industrial Research of Canada and recently, in their report, they embodied their discoveries from research into the power possibilities in various parts of the Province.

As electric smelting of iron in the manufacturing of steel is considered the most efficient and economical process the need of quantities of power can be readily seen. Some of the numerous power sites on the British Columbia coast will eventually have to be developed for this special purpose. There are a number of these sites in the immediate vicinity of Prince Rupert and some of these sites are located at tide-water where ore, limestone, coke and other raw materials necessary for steel production can be delivered at low cost and the products can be shipped from the works in ocean going vessels at any time of the year.

Large Investment.

Such power, however, cannot be economically developed unless the plant is built to the fullest possible capacity at the start. This, usually, involves an investment that is too large for any small commercial undertaking. If, however, there could be established, a group of industries for the electric smelting of iron, ferromanganese and other metal products, for the production of nitrates, calcium carbide and other electro-chemical products, a sufficient demand for power would be created to make it possible to take full advantage of the economical value of the power sites in the district.

Further Investigation.

Owing to the summer engagements of the members of the committee appointed they had little to report last year. It is clear that a great deal more expensive scientific investigation will have to be undertaken before any practical consideration of the establishment of the steel and iron industry can be taken up. It appears that such an undertaking might be quite possible on a commercial basis and further investigation is to be made by the committee during the coming season. Dr. A. Stansfield, professor of metallurgy, McGill University, came to British Columbia in June to make an investigation of the whole subject and when his report is made there will be further light thrown upon the problem and the committee will be able to see more clearly the direction in which it may make effective investigations.

The B. C. committee consists of Dr. D. McIntosh, Professor J. J. M. Turnbull, H. R. McMillan, J. J. Warren, R. H. Stewart and R. F. Hayward.

Building permits were yesterday granted to H. C. Landry and Alex. Macdonald under the Soldiers' Housing Scheme. The former will have a \$2,400 cottage built on Graham Avenue, Section 2, by J. S. Nelson. Mr. Macdonald's residence, which is valued at \$2,500, will be built on Atlin Ave., Section 2, by Bernard Paulsen.

The new bylaw passed by the city council at Monday night's meeting provides for local improvements and general taxes becoming payable on the same date in future, the date being June 30.

G. Williscroft arrived from Alice Arm on the Chelohsin yesterday morning and is registered at the Hotel Prince Rupert.

Sam H. Pearce, storekeeper at Inverness Cannery, arrived in town yesterday afternoon.

SALVAGE SALE SATISFACTORY

Big Crowd Present and Many Buyers—Total of \$2,500 Realized.

Yesterday's salvage sale of damaged goods from the wrecked steamer Prince John was considered quite successful by those in charge. The goods ranged from tea to pianos and included, among other things, canned fruit, milk, molasses, canned vegetables and gramophones. The canned stuff was little damaged and brought good enough prices. Two pianos and three gramophones, however, were in bad shape and sold for next to nothing.

The crowd of people at No. 1 shed, where the sale was conducted by George Leek, was large and representative. Among the purchasers were J. R. Morgan, W. E. Williams, Thos. McMeekin, J. C. Gavigan, Geo. Munro and Mrs. Peter Black. A total of \$2,500 was realized on the sale.

NEW GAME ACT AND FUR TRADE

Provides for Licensing of Trappers, Keeping of Records and Making Returns.

The new Game Act, which was passed at the last session of the B. C. legislature, makes several new provisions for regulation of fur trading in the North. The enforcement of the Act will come under the jurisdiction of the provincial police.

A resident fur trader's license costs \$25, a non-resident's \$10 and an agent's \$200. The license may be obtained from the provincial game warden and expires on May 31, following date of issue. A separate license is required for each established place of business in the province.

On certain skins and pelts a royalty must be paid and to this end the trader is required to keep a record book of all the pelts and skins purchased or acquired. This book is to be open at all times to the inspection of the game warden and in August a complete return must be made to the provincial game warden. Any offence against the act is punishable by a fine of not less than \$50 or more than \$300, or a term of imprisonment not exceeding thirty days, or both.

"WESTERN BAPTIST" ON LOCAL CLERGYMAN

Rev. James Dunlop Has Had Interesting Career in Ministry.

Rev. James Dunlop called at our office on his way to Prince Rupert, says the Western Baptist of Winnipeg. Mr. Dunlop left Vancouver over a year ago to visit relatives in the Old Country. Many of these had suffered keenly through the great war. For about nine months he has been preaching in England, Scotland, and the East.

Mr. Dunlop came into the B. C. Convention from California where he was pastor of Tenth Avenue Church, Oakland—one of the best equipped churches in north California.

Mr. Dunlop speaks of the great dearth of men for the ministry both at home and abroad. He was invited to relieve Rev. T. Ruth of Melbourne, Australia, one of the most important charges on the continent. Later he was invited to Parkside Church, Adelaide. Around Adelaide Mr. Dunlop speaks of five suburban churches at present pastorless. Mr. Dunlop was invited to the pastorate of Zion Baptist Church, Bolton, England, where he had been visiting during the winter. Within a radius of four miles in Lancashire, there were four pastorless churches. Opportunities in the ministry, he thinks, are boundless and he has not met one pastor with a positive message, character and the will to work who has not made good.

Mr. Dunlop thinks the spirit of the West has made it impossible for him to live and be happy anywhere else. He looks forward with hope and joy to sharing the fellowship and toil of the little church in Prince Rupert. He hopes also to have time for some literary work in which he is especially interested.

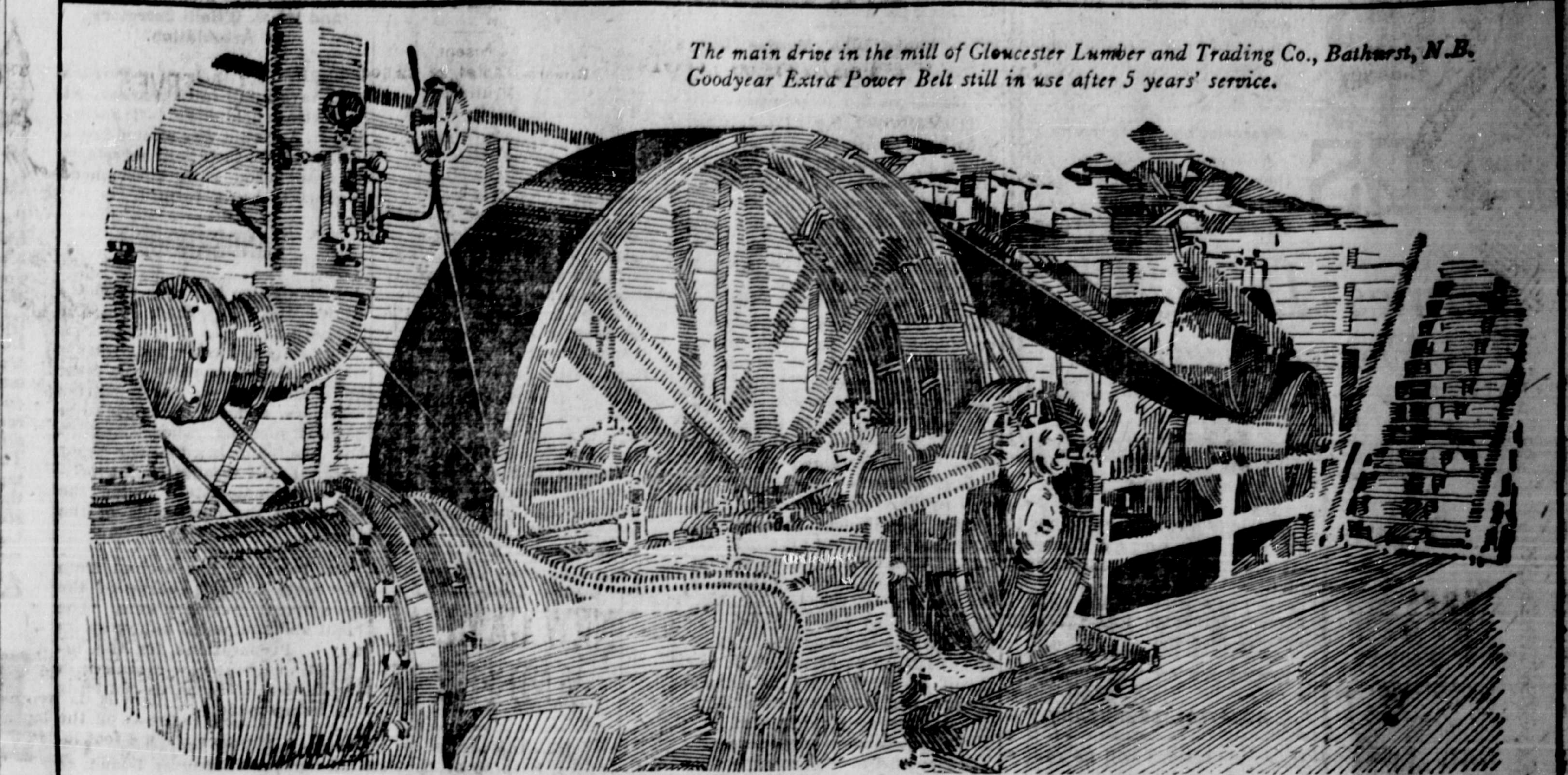

BODY FOUND IN A CELLAR

What Looks Like Murder Discovered at Toronto

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs)
TORONTO, April 27.—Rotting away in a shallow grave in the cellar of the house at 159 Wolseley Street where he had roomed, the body of Ramouh Hassan, aged 30, a Macedonian, was discovered about six o'clock on Saturday afternoon by friends who had been searching for him for more than a month. On one side of his head was a deep wound no doubt, from its appearance, inflicted by some heavy, blunt instrument. Across his throat, almost from ear to ear, stretched a cut, while rubbed into the shoulders of his coat and shirt were clots of blood-colored earth.

Over a month ago—the date is said by his friends to have been March 4—Hassan disappeared. He did not appear at his work; his room remained unoccupied at night, and as the days passed by his comrades became anxious. They searched every conceivable haunt; they notified the police, and on March 24 even went to the extent of publishing the man's picture and a notice requesting information concerning him.

Fellow-Roomer Disappears
Meanwhile, in the excitement of anxious searching, a fellow-roomer made a hurried departure from the city. With him he took all his earthly possessions and presumably fled across the line. New York, it is believed, was his immediate destination.

The second man's sudden departure suggested foul play to the dead man's searchers. Accordingly they redoubled their efforts. They searched his room; they went over every inch of the house, but not a single thing was found to bear out a theory that he had been murdered. Then, on Saturday afternoon, Ahmad Adoxy, King Street West, who was the man who had instigated the search, with two of his countrymen, Abraham Selim and Kayum Fraif, conceived the idea of searching the cellar. There they found him.

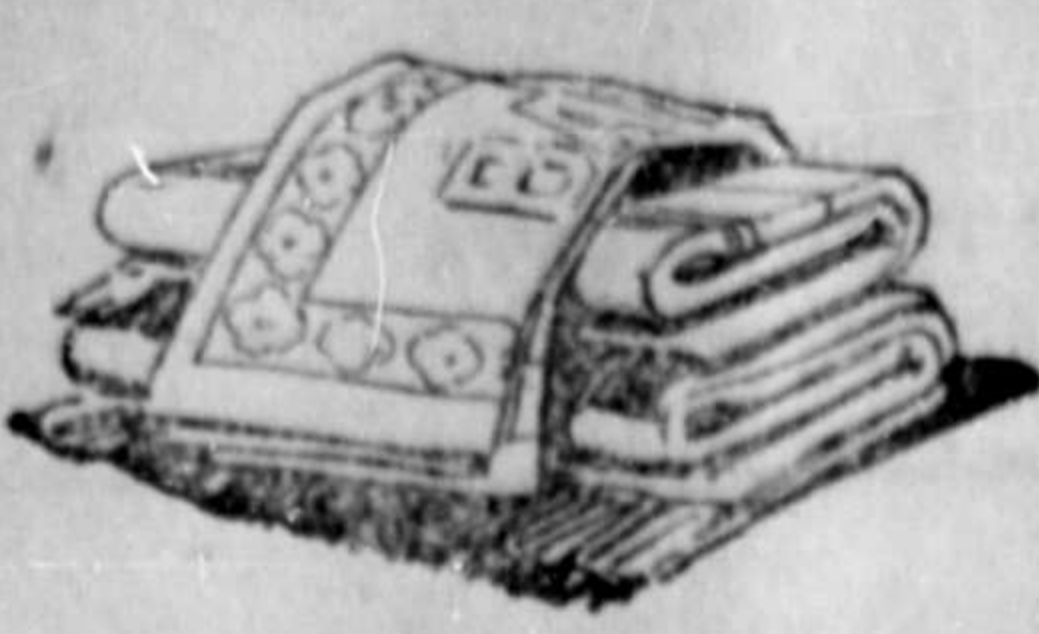
