The Seamen's Strike at Vancouver

PRINCE RUPERT POLICE WILL CONTINUE IN CHARGE OF CHIEF W. H. VICKERS

Chief Vickers' Resignation Withdrawn This Morning

Unanimous Request of Commissioners that he should not relinquish Charge of Local Police Force

On the request of the Police Commission this morning Chief W. H. Vickers has withdrawn his resignation as the head of the force. The motion asking the withdrawal was made by Commissioner Hill who stated that he was fully satisfied with the conduct of the chief and his management of the force.

Commissioner Myhill-Jones, in seconding the motion, stated that the only criticism he had to offer was that the chief was too free and easy and too much of a "good fellow." He would require that the chief be a little stricter in his dealings both with his officers and with the public generally. "There is not a straighter man in this city than Chief Vickers," concluded the commissioner.

The remarks of the mayor were along the same lines as those of Commissioner Myhill-Jones. The mayor urged that the police work be carried on upon more metropolitan lines, in which personal friendship did not enter.

WIRE PECK TO STICK TO GUNS

Army and Navy Veterans at Vancouver Back up Member for Skeena.

VANCOUVER, May 7.—"Stick to your guns. We're proud of you," wired Colonel Cooper on behalf of the Army and Navy Veterans Association yesterday to Colonel Peck. The wire had reference to the attitude of Colonel Peck in resigning from the parliamentary committee on pensions and re-establishment as a protest against remarks made by Brigadier-General McLean relative to women pensioners.

The General is reported to have said that to increase the pensions would be to encourage the women in idleness.

DRUNKENNESS ON INCREASE

Police Chief in Submitting Report Attributes Cause to Inter-Provincial Traffic.

The police chief's report for the month of April submitted at the police commission meeting this morning showed a total number of cases during the month of 43 with \$829 paid in fines. Thirty-seven cases were convictions, one dismissal and five are still pending. Of the total 43 cases, 21 were for drunkenness and the chief reported this condition on the increase. The cause is attributed to the facility of getting liquor with the inter-provincial traffic.

Coal and bread weights were examined during the month and all had been found satisfactory.

PRINCE GEORGE LEFT ON TIME FOR THIS PORT

Word was received in the city this morning by R. Beaumont, superintendent of the Grand Trunk Pacific Coast Steamships, that the steamer Prince George left on time last night and is expected to arrive here tomorrow morning with passengers and freight.

NEW POLICE BOAT ARRIVES

Capt. Alex. Saint Brings New Craft From Victoria for Provincial Service.

The fine little power boat Myfanwy arrived last night in charge of Constable Capt. Saint and will be used as a provincial police patrol out of this port. She is a new boat purchased recently for the work and was named the Luelco.

The boat is 38 ft. 6 in. long with a 9 ft. 6 in. beam and equipped with a 15 horse power British Atlas engine. She makes good speed and is admirably adapted for the purpose.

Constable Alex. Saint will remain in charge of the boat but she will be at the disposal of the Provincial Police headed by Chief Minty. Prince Rupert will be her home port.

COURT CASE OVER POOL ROOM LEASE

Sidney Fowler Suing Helgerson, Ltd., for \$1,000 Damages.

Evidence was taken this morning in the county court in the case of Sidney Fowler versus H. G. Helgerson, Ltd., and argument will be heard by Judge Young on Monday. The case arises out of the failure of the defendant to deliver a lease of the poolroom in the Helgerson Block after the plaintiff had paid a deposit. A claim of \$1,000 damages is entered by Fowler.

L. W. Patmore is handling the case for the plaintiff and W. E. Fisher for the defence.

MAY HAVE VICTORIA DAY CELEBRATION

New Westminster Holds May Fete Immense Crowd Gathered at Queens Park where Miss McMaster was Crowned Queen; Celebrating Fiftieth Event

NEW WESTMINSTER, May 7.—In golden sunshine a record crowd yesterday held the annual May Day celebration in this city. There were many thousands of people present from Vancouver and different points up the Fraser valley and even from Vancouver Island. Thirty former queens in automobiles were among those who rode and marched to Queens Park where Miss Eva McMaster was crowned Queen of the May.

Special efforts were made this year to mark the event which was an important one as it was the fiftieth May Day fete held in the city.

With the exception of those who catered to the needs of the visitors, no work was done in the city, a public holiday having been proclaimed.

STUDENTS AT UNIVERSITY

At Least Three Local Students Do Well at Vancouver.

The first results of the University examinations have arrived in the city but no details are available.

Miss Katherine Pillsbury has successfully passed her finals in the fourth year.

James Mitchell has passed his third year Arts, with two supplemental examinations which will be taken in September before entering the final year.

Maurice Shockley who is taking a course in the faculty of science has made excellent standing and ranks fourth in his class. He has attended the university for two years now but next term he hopes to get admission to an eastern university where he can get further training along the same lines.

POLICE FORCE IS INCREASED

Two New Regular Men Will Be Named by Chief Vickers.

Two new regular policemen are to be added to the city force at once, according to the decision of the Police Commission on motion of Commissioners Hill and Jones this morning. This action is taken on the request of the chief, as well as the men, for an increased force. It is felt now that the work cannot be adequately handled by the present force and the addition is necessary. The selection is left in the hands of Chief Vickers.

The increase, strictly speaking, means only the addition of one man, as Constable Leek has been doing special duty for some months. It is probable that Constable Leek will be appointed permanently and one new man be taken on. From remarks made at the commission meeting this morning the force may be re-adjusted at a special meeting to be held in the near future.

Among those arriving in the city on the train last evening was E. Cavenaile of Terrace who was formerly a well-known grocer here. For the past few years Mr. Cavenaile has been busy at his ranch in the vicinity of Terrace and holds out great promise for a thriving centre there. He is returning to the interior tomorrow morning.

HOME COOKING SALE

The Ladies' Auxiliary of the General Hospital will hold a sale of home cooking in the Red Cross hut tomorrow, Saturday, May 8th, from 12 to 6. It is hoped the public will respond generously to this appeal and send in contributions early.

VANCOUVER, May 7.—Despite the gradual tieup on the coast boats taking place today as the vessels arrive, following the expiration of the 48 hours' notice due to non-settlement of the men's demands for an increase of wages, for changed working conditions and for recognition of the union, the Prince George sailed last night under a company crew arrangement. The Chelohsin is expected to get away tonight for Prince Rupert and other northern points.

The Seaman's union meeting this afternoon to discuss the board advanced by Hon. Gideon Robertson, minister of labor, through T. D. Bulger, the fair wage officer here.

INCREASE FOR POLICE FORCE

Request Was Favorably Received At This Morning's Meeting of Commission.

A special conference of the police commissioners will take place early in the week for the purpose of framing a new salary schedule for the police department. This is as a result of a letter received from the force at this morning's commission meeting where the men are asking as well as a salary increase, new overcoats and raincoats, boots, and a day off a week.

Both Commissioner Hill and Jones were unanimous in their feeling that the present wages were not adequate and from the one of the meeting it would appear that the request of the men will be favorably received.

Pilotage Might Be Considered.

Now that the question of pilotage is being considered, it might be wise to consider the position of Prince Rupert in regard to it. There are no licensed pilots here now, but when a steamer comes a Vancouver pilot has to make the journey with her or else come here to meet her.

It has been suggested that application should be made to the Dominion Government Department of Marine to have a pilotage district defined to include everything north of Vancouver Island. This would be done by Dominion Order-in-Council.

The advantage of having a pilotage commission and pilots here would be that the men who do the work would live here and we should be in readiness to handle transpacific business when it offered.

LONDON, May 7.—It is announced that the reburial of Sir Starr Jameson in the Matopos, beside Cecil Rhodes, will take place on May 22. The Duke of Abercorn, a director of the Chartered Company, will be present.

Sir Starr Jameson died in November, 1917, and his body was placed, temporarily, in a vault at Kensal Green, it being then stated that after the war it would be removed to Rhodesia and placed beside that of his former chief.

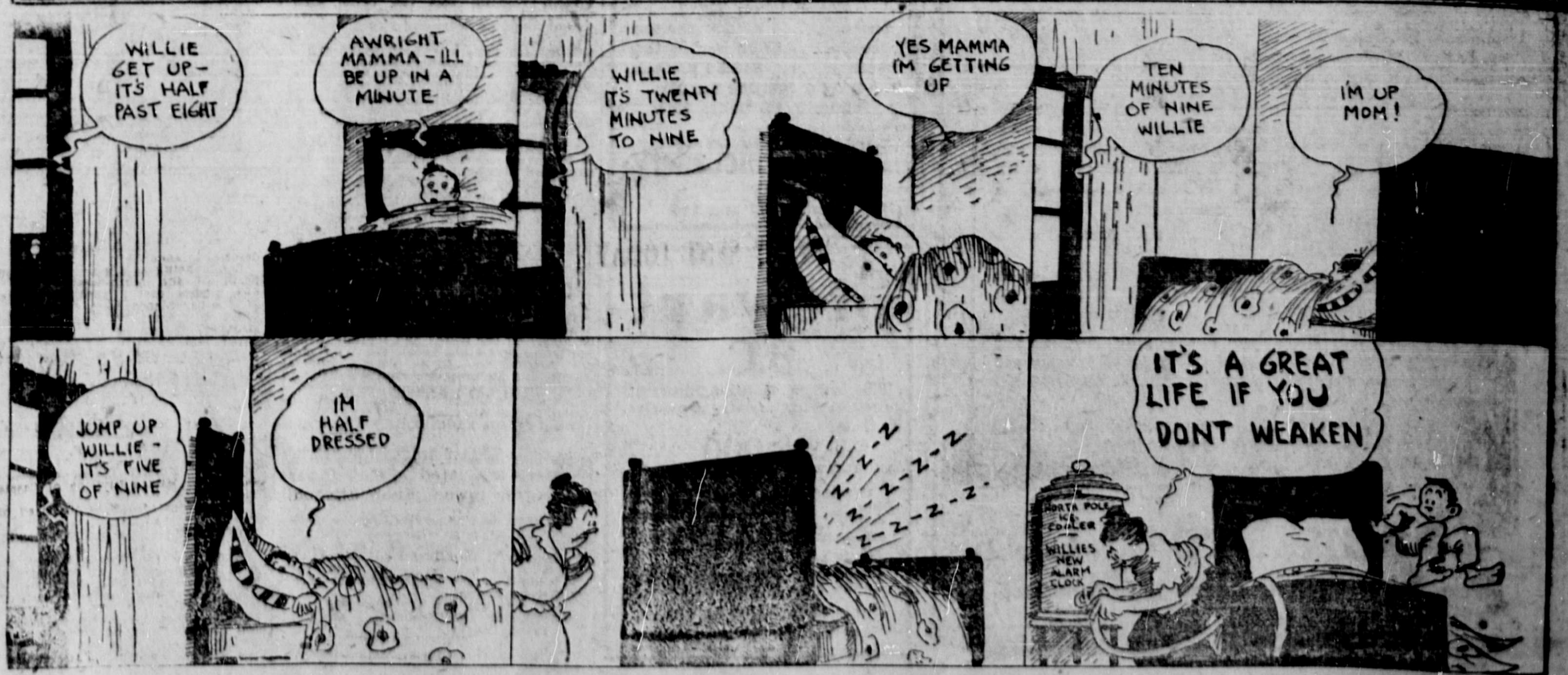

BILL TO REGULATE RENTS IN ENGLAND

Restrictions on Advance to Last for Three Years

LONDON, May 7.—The Government will introduce in the next few weeks a Bill to extend the operation of the Rent Restriction Acts. The Bill will be based on the recommendations of the Salisbury Committee.

This Committee recommend three matters of first importance. The first is that the Rent Restriction Acts shall be continued for three years—until March 25, 1924. The second is that the houses to be included in the scope of the Acts shall be extended to rentals of three times the figure laid down in the 1915 Act—\$525 in London, \$450 in Scotland, and \$390 in England and Wales outside London. The Acts as amended last year, apply to houses then rented at \$350 in London, \$300 in Scotland, and \$260 in England and Wales outside London.

Thirdly, it is proposed that there shall be a graduated increase in net pre-war rents not exceeding 40 per cent while the Acts are in operation.

The Committee make three other recommendations. They are of opinion that evictions shall not be allowed except in cases in which reasonable alternative accommodation is provided. They insist that the execution of necessary repairs within a reasonable time shall be a sine qua non of increases of rent. They find that no case has been made out for the extension of the Acts to shops and other business premises.

It is unlikely that these proposals will meet with opposition from any considerable section of either House of Parliament. It may, therefore, be accepted that a Bill on these lines will be passed into law before July 1.

PROPOSED PLAN OF DIPLOMACY

Standing of Canadian Vice-Ambassador at Washington Under New Arrangement.

WASHINGTON, May 7.—The proposed "independent" Canadian diplomatic representation soon to be established in Washington will mark an epoch-making innovation in the inter-Imperial relations existing between Great Britain and her overseas Dominions. The outstanding feature of the projected arrangement is the fact that henceforward whoever is British Ambassador to the United States will be one who is fully agreeable to Canada. He will substantially be selected and appointed by the British Foreign Office in co-operation with the Government of Canada. It is presumed that Sir Auckland Geddes was sent to Washington as the first embodiment of the principle that in future is to govern British-Canadian diplomatic affairs in this country.

Vice-Ambassador.

The corollary feature of the scheme is that Canada will send a staff of Canadian diplomatic officials to Washington to be attached to the British Embassy. They will be headed by a man who will have the full rank of a Minister Plenipotentiary, and be second in command of the entire Embassy. He will, in fact, be Vice-Ambassador. In the absence of the Ambassador from Washington or from the United States the Canadian Minister Plenipotentiary will function as Acting Ambassador. While the Ambassador is at the Embassy the Canadian Minister and the Canadian staff will be part and parcel of the British Embassy, though of course forming a separate Canadian division hereof.

Handled by Canadians.

Thus Canadian affairs, as far as the United States Government is concerned, will continue to be transacted in Washington through the British Embassy. But the actual effect of the new plan will be that they will be handled and conducted, as has not been the case hitherto, by Canadians directly, deriving their authority and instructions directly from the Dominion Government at Ottawa.

The arrangement as outlined is entirely satisfactory to both the British and Canadian Governments. While it has not yet fully and formally received the sanction of the United States Government, no reasons are conceived by the parties at interest why it should not eventually do so.

Minister at Ottawa.

The State Department is less clear on another phase of the project, namely, to what extent, if any, United States representation in Canada will require to be revised. At present the United States maintains there only Consuls-General and Consuls. It has not yet been determined whether the United States will have to station a Minister at Ottawa, or perhaps only raise its more important Canadian Consular officers to the rank of diplomatic agents, such as have long been maintained, for example, in Egypt.
