Fish Wharf is Badly Needed.

Prince Rupert, Canada's greatest fishing port, has nothing in the way of accommodation for the fishing boats except a float provided by the Provincial Government at Coy Bay. A year ago we were told that the Dominion Government was going to build a dock, but now there is doubt about, it.

As has often been pointed out, it is not the work of the Provincial Government to build docks. The Dominion Government has a department of marine that looks after the work.

It has been suggested that the reason for the delay in building the local dock is due to the fact that the elections have been postponed for a couple of years. There is no reason to please the people here just now, but it would be better to give them the dock just before the election. We can hardly believe that. At anyrate we hope it is not true. We need the dock now and hope that nothing will be allowed to hinder the work.

Iron and Steel to Be Discussed

When the Minister of Mines visits Prince Rupert next month, the mining committee of the Board of Trade will be ready to meet him and discuss fully the matter of the establishment of iron and steel works in this neighborhood. Already an immense amount of data has been collected in regard to the matter and this will be assembled in such a way as to show ? that this is the logical point for the establishment of the industry. 2

This is the crucial time and the matter should be taken up with vigor and no stone left unturned in the effort to show that this is the place. In the meantime it is to be hoped that private interests will take the matter up and undertake the work independent of the Government, except that they will earn the bonus of three dollars a ton offered by the Provincial Government.

Work on School To Go Ahead.

The mass of the people of Prince Rupert will concur in the decision of the school board to go ahead with the erection of the new school building. It is difficult in a place this size to eliminate personalities in dealing with a local question. There are so many antagonisms and so little appreciation of local talent. We know each other too well.

If the work on the school starts now, the building should be complete or nearly so by the end of the year and the children will then have the advantage of more modern conditions in their education.
