Loses His Job, Attacks Government

FIRST INDICATION OF ANY ATTEMPT MADE TO BREAK FIREMEN'S STRIKE

Major Retallack After Government

Loses Job when Utilities Commission Dissolved and Thinks Government was getting at him; Farris says Opposition Voted for Bill

VANCOUVER, May 12.—Major Retallack, head of the Public Utilities Commission which has been killed by an act of legislation, delivered a hot attack before the Board of Trade here last night, alleging that the government had been using the Board as a political plaything.

At the conclusion of the meeting the Attorney-General called charges "damnable, mean and miserable insinuations."

Major Retallack said that the act to repeal the commission was aimed at the board, but at himself as he was not sufficiently active to suit the government's plans.

The Premier had told him that he was not wanted when the appointment was offered to a civilian, Mayor Gale, and the veterans had threatened to raid parliament if this was tried out.

Charges Government. Retallack claimed that the government had blocked the commission's work. They wanted a more workable board so that the commission could be used at election time for big corporations. There was an abundance of work for the board to protect the public interest in the cities and the province.

Under the repeal the commission would be reviewed with new officers.

Farris Replies. Attorney-General Farris denied the charges as "absolutely false."

These members of the legislature had voted against the bill to abolish the commission. The government had had no assurance from the B. C. Electric Railway Company back under provincial jurisdiction. The country could not do as well without the commission as it had done in the past and no obligation to Retallack could result on the change of office.

Peck Returns to Pensions Committee. OTTAWA, May 12.—Following the apology of General McLean in regard to the remarks he made to the effect that the wives of privates in the Canadian army were of the servant class and that increasing their pensions would encourage them in idleness, Lieut.-Col. C. W. Peck has returned to the Pensions Committee.

START WORK ON RAILWAY SOON

Belgian Corporation Will Repair Bridges and Gas Locomotives Will be Operated at Stewart.

It has been officially announced by the Algonquin Development Co., Ltd., at Stewart that an arrangement has been made with the Canadian Northeastern Railway Co. (the old Portland Canal Shortline) whereby the railway will be used for the transportation of supplies and equipment to the Fitzgerald property on Goose Creek.

Necessary construction work to make the railway available for transportation will begin about the middle of May. The Canadian Northeastern Railway Co. will operate the road. A fifteen-ton gasoline locomotive will be used.

Tenders are being called by the Algonquin Company for the reconstruction of the Bitter Creek and Bear River bridges, right-of-way and clearing, trestle approach at the beach and various trestle-work.

FRANCHISE ACT IS UNDER FIRE

Opposition Develops to Section of Measure Dealing with Women

MOTION TO DELETE A WHOLE SECTION

OTTAWA, May 12.—The battle over the new Franchise Act was resumed last night in the House of Commons over the section regarding the enfranchisement of women, naturalized by marriage. Opposition to the Government proposals developed, not only among the opposition, but in the ranks of the progressives on the Government side.

W. D. Euler of North Waterloo moved that the whole section be deleted. Under the section it was claimed that Negroes would be enfranchised, while an educated Frenchwoman, married to a British subject, would be denied the right to vote.

EXHIBITION IS NOW OPEN

Canadian War Memorial Collection on View in Vacant Store Adjoining Frizzell's.

The collection of Canadian War Memorials war etchings, drypoints and lithographs is now on view in the vacant store adjoining Frizzell's Meat Market. The exhibition is free to the public, and will remain open during the day and evening until Friday noon, when Captain Percy F. Godenrath, the officer in charge, leaves for Vancouver. Already a large number of returned men have seen the collection but the general public should not miss the opportunity to see this portion of Canada's collection of war art. The War Memorials Commission is indebted to George Frizzell for the use of the store premises and to Parkin & Ward for the loan of electric lights, enabling the public to view the etchings in the evening.

CENTENNIAL OF "LADY OF LAMP"

World is Today Honoring Memory of Wonderful British Nurse, Florence Nightingale.

VANCOUVER, May 12.—Today being the one hundredth anniversary of the birth of Florence Nightingale, "The Lady of the Lamp," centennial celebrations are being made worldwide.

Florence Nightingale, was a noted figure in the Crimean War; where she organized a band of nurses which did great service in relieving the suffering of the soldiers. Her system was adopted and developed in all parts of the world and she was honored with a testimonial of £50,000 which she applied to the founding of a Nightingale Home for Nurses. She was a Lady of Grace of the Order of St. John of Jerusalem. The German Emperor conferred an order upon her in 1907 and she was given the freedom of the city of London. In 1907 she was awarded the Order of Merit. She died in 1910 at the great age of 90.

Prince George Due to Arrive Here Saturday

Superintendent Beaumont received word this morning from Vancouver that the steamer Prince George will leave for Prince Rupert on time Thursday evening and should arrive as usual on Saturday morning. She will be operated by a crew of officers of the fleet and it is expected that she will give a regular weekly service to northern ports until the strike is over.

The Prince George is scheduled to leave this port for Anyox on Saturday night and before returning to this port will visit Stewart. She will sail for the south on Monday at 10 a. m.

The Fish Catch for April Is Valued at \$125,792.00

J. H. Conlon, Government Expert, coming West to Convention and will Visit all Fishery Centres

VANCOUVER, May 12.—Stormy weather during April seriously affected the fish catch in district Number 2, which includes the coast of Vancouver Island. The catch aggregated 135 tons valued at \$10,901.

The total valuation of the catch in District Number 3, comprising Prince Rupert, Skeena, and Naas, was placed at \$125,792, which makes a good showing in comparison with the month of March.

It is announced here today that J. H. Conlon, government expert at Ottawa, is coming to the fisheries convention here in June. He will discuss the problems of transportation of fish to the east and will visit the fishery centres.

Steamers will Be Run by Grand Trunk Regularly

Stewards Stand by Ship Despite Strike Call; Employees Found to man C.P.R. Boats which are on Schedule

VANCOUVER, May 12.—The Grand Trunk Pacific here announced today that the service from this city to Prince Rupert, Anyox, and Stewart would not be interrupted, although one instead of two boats a week would be run for the present. The Prince George will be sent north tomorrow night.

This attempt to operate the Prince George with a pick-up crew is the first indication of any attempt to break the strike of firemen, oilers and deck hands.

The stewards are standing by the ship despite the strike call of Tuesday. Other employees have been found to man the vessels of the C. P. R. which will continue to run on schedule unless interrupted.

REASON C.P.R. IS NOT TIED UP

Refuses Joint Conference With Unions and Makes Negotiations Direct With Men.

VICTORIA, May 11.—The C. P. R. it is reported, has declined to take part in any joint conference of steamship companies and the union officials over the present requests for wage increases and alterations in working conditions on the boats, preferring to deal with its own employees. Further, it is stated, the company has negotiated through delegates from the different ships instead of through union officials alone. The latter say they were invited to be present, but refused. The request for increases, etc., came from the unions in the first place. The unions are looking upon the company's stand as contrary to their interests, and the officials state that the question is developing into one of recognition of the unions.

Company's Offer. It is understood that the company has presented agreements to the men, giving the following wage increases: Coal firemen, \$100 instead of \$90; oil firemen, \$90 instead of \$80; oilers, \$100 instead of \$90; wipers, \$60 instead of \$55; stewards, \$65 instead of \$55. It is understood that the firemen, oilers and stewards asked in the first place for \$15 increase. It appears from talk on the waterfront that many of the men in the different classifications have signed these agreements presented by the company.

The scale agreed upon by the deckhands and the C. P. R. divides the men into three classes, and makes certain concessions in working conditions. The wage scale is \$95 per month for the first-class, \$90 for the second and \$85 for the third, with board included. This is said to be the highest rate paid on the Pacific Coast. Negotiations are still going on in Victoria between the stewards and firemen.

MUST NOT SELL GERMAN SHIPS

Perpetual Injunction by Supreme Court of Canada Against Shipping Board.

HEARST WINS OUT IN FIGHT FOR GERMAN SHIPS

WASHINGTON, May 12.—The United States Shipping Board, under a decree signed by Mr. Justice Bailey in the district supreme court, is perpetually enjoined from selling 29 former German liners seized by the United States when that country entered the war.

The decree resulted from an injunction brought against the Shipping Board by W. Randolph Hearst, proprietor of the New York American, and dozens of other newspapers throughout the United States.

Hearst has for many months been carrying on a campaign in favor of Germany and particularly directed against Great Britain. He has political aspirations, and it is understood that he is seeking the favor of the German element in the United States, which is still very powerful, with a view to political honors.

POLES, UKRAINIANS CAPTURED ODESSA

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 12.—The Russian embassy reports that the Poles and Ukrainians captured Odessa, an important seaport on the Black Sea. This followed the ousting of the Reds from Kiev by the Polish army.

Hearst Wins Out In Ship Injunction.

When the United States entered the war against Germany, all German ships in United States ports were seized. After the war was over the United States Shipping Board prepared to sell the ships, but an injunction to restrain them was secured by William Randolph Hearst, the champion of Germany.

Just what she will do with the ships does not appear. If they cannot be sold, will they be operated by the nation or returned to the former owners? There seems to be no other alternative.

Japan Joins With States and Britain.

A new treaty has been formed. It is not a formal one but it is bound to have all the effect of a treaty. It is a pact between the United States, Japan and Great Britain in regard to loans to China and is known officially as a "Consortium."

Considering the aggressiveness of the little island kingdom across the Pacific, the new arrangement tends to bring Japan in line and make possible a lengthy peace. On the other hand it gives Japan one more reason why she should receive equal treatment for her citizens in all parts of the world.

Cut Ships in Two After Being Built.

The wire brought word yesterday of the launching of a ship at Port Arthur for ocean services. This ship will have to be cut in two before it can be taken through the Welland Canal and then the parts riveted together again.

An effort is being made to induce the Dominion to give out more contracts. If this is done, Prince Rupert should be in line for a share of the business. We have all the facilities and every effort should be made to keep the yards busy.

Clean Up Week In This City.

The city officials are trying to induce people to carry out a clean up week, a most laudable movement. There is a tendency here to neglect the little amenities which make for improvement of the appearance of the city.

There are some places where work is going on, that cannot be kept tidy immediately, but what is meant by the clean up suggestion is that all who possibly can, shall clean back yards and adjoining vacant lots in order that the city may make a presentable appearance.

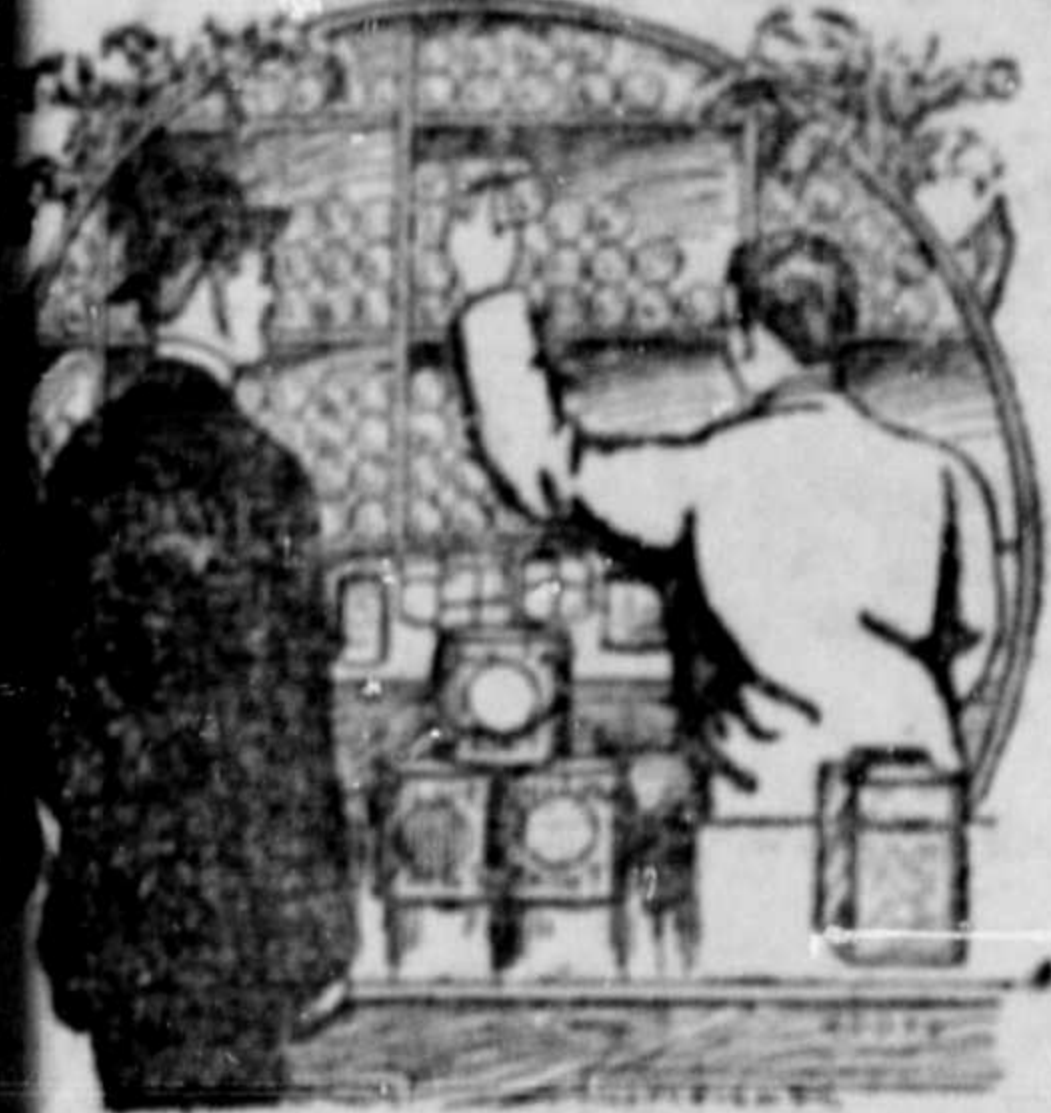

ASK DOMINION CONTINUE WORK

Would Give Employment to Returned Men in Shipyard.

OTTAWA, May 12.—Asking the Dominion Government to continue with a substantial shipbuilding program in order to give as much work as possible for men now employed in the various yards of the Dominion, a deputation of over 100 waited on Sir George E. Foster and the cabinet yesterday.

MAKE INSPECTION FISH HATCHERIES

VANCOUVER, May 12.—J. A. Robb, Dominion superintendent of fish culture, has arrived here. For the next three weeks he will conduct an inspection of fish hatcheries along the coast.

Mining News

Big Tunnel in Alaska.

Backed by eastern capital, work has started under the direction of W. S. Pekovitch on a thousand-foot tunnel at Funter, Alaska, where the Pekovitch interests have been developing for some time. J. D. Williams, a Seattle mining engineer, has been at the property several weeks outlining the work. Pekovitch was in Seattle in February on his return from the east and ordered machinery and supplies for the Funter property. He purchased at Seattle some very modern mining machinery.

Granby Mines Issue.

An issue of \$2,500,000 of the Granby Consolidated Mining, Smelting and Power Co. is being offered in New York. The bonds are for five years and interest at 8 per cent, and being offered at par give the investor a yield of 8 per cent. The Granby owns copper ore reserves estimated at over 22,000,000 tons, also smelting plants having a capacity of 3,000,000 pounds of copper per month, making it the largest copper producer in Canada.—Financial Post.

Ketchikan to Anyox.

Over two thousand tons of ore was shipped from the Rush and Brown mine near Kasaan, Ketchikan district, last month, according to advices from Ketchikan and Seattle. The property is working steadily and has a substantial payroll. The mine has been in operation for years and although the ore is low grade it was rich enough and in sufficient quantity to warrant its operation when many other properties were forced to suspend on account of high costs. Judge Rush, or Kasaan, is sole owner of the property.

Promise for Atlin.

Jules M. Ruffner, a well known mining man of Atlin, who passed through here a few weeks ago on his return to Atlin, stated that everything pointed to that district developing into one of the best camps of the north. Mr. Ruffner, who has considerable interest in those parts, said that development work would be started on some of his mines at once and the best sorting ore would be shipped out. Just as soon as sufficient development work is done to warrant it, Mr. Ruffner states that a concentrating plant will be installed at the Malloy group. Roads have always been a drawback at Atlin but with the government taking this matter up and conditions becoming more settled it is thought that Atlin may once again develop into a big silver-lead camp.

Looking for Oil.

In an address delivered before the Kiwanis Club at Edmonton last week, A. E. Halverston, a well known authority, expressed the opinion that present oil sources were petering out and that before long the big companies would have to be looking to other fields and particularly in the northwest. The fields of northern Alberta and the Peace River are drawing attention at the present time and development work is surely, if quietly, going on at the Queen Charlotte Islands. These large companies are watching and when something materializes in one of the new fields they will rush to them with all their wealth and organization.

Sport Briefs

The boys who are behind the Prince George Athletic Association are a live bunch of hustlers. A splendid athletic park is being prepared and the work is being largely done by voluntary labor. The city has promised a grant of \$250 towards getting the grounds in shape and the park is to be used for all athletic fixtures and in afternoons will be free for school children. The Athletic Association is to be formed with a capitalization of \$25,000 and the executive proposes forming two baseball and two football teams. The association is also trying to secure a suitable site for curling next winter.

Vanderhoof is also busy, the citizens being fully aware of the fact that a town of the importance of Vanderhoof should make a showing when all the other communities in the north are more enthusiastic about sport than they ever were before. Last week the work of organization was commenced when a meeting with a goodly attendance of players and fans gathered. Warren Johnson was elected manager, H. V. 

ALL SET FOR BOXING MATCH

McCarthy Enters Ring With Slight Advantage, But Neff Has Popular Support.

Everything is set for the Canadian championship boxing contest between Chet Neff and Charley McCarthy at the Westholme Theatre tonight. Scenery has been shifted at the theatre, the squared circle is being built as well as the ringside seats and the appearance of the stage is considerably changed. The choice seats are pretty well booked up and the promise is for a record-breaking crowd.

McCarthy, the champion, is heralded as a clean-working sport of the kind that the public is clamoring for in all parts of the country. His recent string of victories makes him a formidable opponent and Chet Neff will have to extend himself to the limit and be on the lookout from start to finish for Charley holds a wicked little knockout that more than one of his opponents has felt lately.

Chet Neff, himself, has a reputation that many would envy, as in the last 28 fights he has engaged in he has won 21 and drawn six. He is the favorite from a sentimental standpoint, for he has almost become a Rupert boy and has forged a lot of friends among the fans here. They are all unanimous in the opinion that Chet is one of the squarest little fighters that has ever entered the ring here.

On being asked his opinion he smiled and said: "Throw up a coin and call it and you will have as good a chance to pick the winner."

COMMISSION ON MINING MAKES REPORT

The royal commission sitting on labor laws in Ottawa have made the following recommendations in regard to mining laws in the Dominion:

- 1—That 14 be the minimum age for boys working about mines.
- 2—That no boy under 18 be in charge of mining machinery.
- 3—That a mining day be no more than 9 hours.
- 4—That wage payments be semi-weekly.
- 5—That all persons working on a mine have lien privileges thereon.
- 6—That no amount may be deducted from a miner's wages except for debts in connection with his work.
- 7—That competency examination boards for mine managers and pit bosses consist of Government inspector, working miner and mine manager where required.
- 8—That pit bosses and mine managers be at least 23 years of age and hold necessary character, credentials.
- 9—That a mine inspector shall hold a mine manager's certificate and have seven years' experience and be in no way connected with mines in his district.
- 10—That the decisions of a mine inspector be subject to ratification by a tribunal consisting of a judge and representatives of interested parties.
- 11—That adequate ventilation of mines shall constantly be maintained.
- 12—That the health of men in mining camps be regularly inspected.
- 13—That the mining laws be extended to all parts of the Dominion where they are not now in force.
- 14—That first aid and rescue work be maintained at all mines.
