### Victoria Not

Needing Money. Victoria does not need money for building houses. There is no demand there. Of the small allotment of \$180,000 only about \$90,000 has been taken up.

Prince Rupert needs more houses. The money may be available for some place where people are willing to take it. Why not another allotment for this city? We know nothing about whether or not we might get the money, but, if we can, it would be an advantage to the city to have the houses built even if there is some expense doing so. The crying need of the city is houses.

Those who have visited the West End recently must have been particularly struck with the progress that section of the city is making. Handy little houses are going up and people are moving there. Very soon the population will double what it is today. All this improvement has been brought about by the loans received from the Government. It is difficult to appreciate the conditions that would have obtained if there had been no loan.

In loaning almost the full value of the house and lot, there must naturally be some risk. The city bears that risk. Possibly it would be better to build up the city without incurring the risk, but how is it to be done? Can anyone suggest a better method? If not, then the thing to do is to incur a little more risk. It does not amount to very much even if the whole amount is lost,

### Sugar Situation

Somewhat Difficult.

There is a scarcity of sugar in the world. Also other commodities are scarce. Of sugar, however, there is a very serious shortage and very soon we may have to do without a good deal of the sweetness of life. The Royal Bank review of trade conlitions says of it:-

"Realization of the sugar situation is becoming more general, the facts of the case having been brought home to the majority by sharp rises in the retail price. The world's beet sugar production this year will be about one-third of 1914, Cuban crop estimates have been heavily cut down, and it can be definitely seen that a world shortage exists.

"Before the war, Europe produced its own requirements of sugar, and was able to export as well. Its beet sugar crop in the season 1913-1914 was eight and a half million tons, as compared to a crop for 1919-20 which will probably not exceed three million. Owing to the prevailing chaos, lack of fertilizers and fuel, and greater inducement to raise grain, the prospects for early recovery are not good. There is no immediate relief to be had in the eastern markets. British India does not produce enough to supply its own wants. Java's crop will be increased next year, but for the present season is about 25 per cent below normal. This means that France, England, Italy and many other countries are turning to the Western markets, and more especially to Cuba, for supplies. Owing to the drought, this season's crop in Cuba will be less than the last, early estimates of 4,400,000 tons having been reduced to 3,900,000 tons.

"The situation does not improve when viewed from the standpoint of consumption. In Europe, rationing or restriction are found almost everywhere. The demand is ready to rise sharply on any relaxation of control, and must be, potentially, very large. In England, the ration of sugar, which was raised from eight to twelve ounces per week in January, 1919, was reduced ration and an open market for sugar were fast exhausting the It is counted from 0 to 24 hours, HYMEN HOLDS SWAY country's stocks and were contributing to raise the price The decree prohibiting all private dealings in sugar has been revoked this month.
