Policy of Government is Outlined

POLITICAL MEETING AT VANCOUVER DEVELOPS SOME INTERESTING PHASES

Hon. T. D. Pattullo Addresses Local Liberal Association

Member is Optimistic over Future of City and District and Urges Co-operation of all Citizens; Reviews Government Policy

"During the war it was necessary to conserve the resources of the country and bend all energies to war purposes, but now that the war is over the Government has a program of expansion. This year good appropriations have been made and Prince Rupert has obtained a good share. I have no hesitation in saying that the representatives from the north lack in numbers they make up in aggressiveness. The appropriations were given irrespective of who was the representative, for Prince George, represented by Mr. Ross, an opposition member, received one of the largest comparative votes of any in the province." This is an extract from an address delivered last night by Hon. T. D. Pattullo at the Liberal Association annual meeting.

Locally there is a first vote for Government Buildings which are to be built in units, the first unit to cost from \$350,000 to \$50,000 more. The member for Omineca, who is also our speaker, did invaluable service in supporting the vote for Prince Rupert. The other votes \$60,000 for the school, \$80,000 for the wharf, and the amounts for the bridge and hospital were ones which were needed, but hard to get. At Terrace the bridge will be commenced and that would satisfy the people there. The Queen Charlotte Islands a site was put through for the construction of a road from Port Clements to Tel-eh. Mr. Pattullo mentioned these things incidentally toward the end of his address, but they are of particular interest to people here.

People's Government.

In opening, the member for the district mentioned that this government was the people's government. Conditions had changed late years. Things that were once considered cleverness were now contrary to the law of the land. The whole viewpoint of the people had changed. Some were disheartened over the present condition, the unrest and selfishness that appeared on the surface, but he believed the world was better than had ever been before.

When the Government assumed office there was a period of depression following the good times when there was plenty of money coming in. The speculative period was followed by war conditions. The Government found an empty treasury and the province millions in debt. Also there was the P. G. E. mess to be cleaned up. The P. G. E. would pay some if they believed, but in the meantime it was a heavy drain on the country. Of the fourteen millions in the estimates two million dollars went to carry the P. G. E. The former government had secured income from the sale of the assets of the province. This could not continue. The only thing to do was to increase the

Activity at Terrace is Evident in Many Lines

Land being Cleared, New Crops being put in, Houses being Built, and Lumber Mills are Active

During this spring the thriving town of Terrace has shown phenomenal progress. All branches of industry have advanced as new families have been coming in to take up land. More than ever is Terrace and its hinterland being recognized as a really fertile and valuable farming community. Just now there are interested people from as far away as Michigan in the district looking over possible areas with a view to settling.

Strawberries and garden truck are being recognized as staple crops at Terrace. More than ever the farmers are realizing the value of planting more ground to berries and many acres additional are under cultivation this year in order to meet the great demand both of the coast and the prairies. Land clearing is becoming a recognized business and as a result of the activities of the clearers new tracts are being broken up and planted for next year's bearing. The market for berries being a stable one the growers are looking ahead with confidence.

Lumbering.

Logging for the sawmills is assuming an important place in the Terrace district. The Giggy Little Co., George Little's mill, and the Davis Portable sawmill are all working with a large output for local trade and export. It is hoped in the near future that Terrace lumber will be able to meet the demands.

The building trade has been lively of late and a few houses are rapidly nearing completion, with prospects of many more to follow. G. A. Waite has completed the erection of a garage and a house and Mrs. Mary Greig's new residence will be finished soon. A new two-storey building is being built on the ground between the Bank of Montreal and Lazelle's by George Little. This will be occupied on the main floor by a butcher's shop and the post office.

ELLIOTT STANDS PAT ON CHARGE

Tries to Take Refuge from Fact that Matter was Before Legislature

REPEATS CHARGE IN REGARD TO PREMIER

VICTORIA, May 15.—R. T. Elliott, K.C., yesterday filed his statement of defense in the libel action brought against him by John Oliver, premier of British Columbia, in connection with telegrams sent by Elliott during the dying hours of the Legislature, when the Dolly Varden Act was put through giving the Taylor Engineering Company possession of the mine.

to meet, said the speaker, and either the taxes must go up or people must be brought in to help pay. The population was increasing fast and he believed there were 500,000 in the province today. The resources were worth nothing without population.

"A government is a very small factor in the success of a community," said Mr. Pattullo. "On the people themselves rests the responsibility for success or failure." He spoke of the success the little town of Usk was achieving. The government had helped a little but the people did most. So in Prince Rupert, it was the energy of the people that made the city what it was. Governments were all impotent without co-operation.

Land Policy.

Mr. Pattullo went on to review the land policy of the Government. Settlement had been arranged for under the Land Settlement and Development Act. It was thought by many that the idea of the law was to force owners to turn their land back to the Government. The real object was, however, to force those not using the land to either sell it or use it. The policy had been most successful. One large land holder along the G. T. P. had marketed 40,000 acres last year and had said he expected to sell 200,000 acres this year. The object of the measure was thus being accomplished and thousands of new people were settling in the province. While some people felt disheartened, he could tell them that things were moving quickly. The development of these outside resources would tend to make the cities prosperous.

Can't Stop Growth.

"With the development of the mineral resources, fisheries, land and timber the great basic resources, you can't stop this town growing. The large interests have knocked it but in spite of everything it is going ahead and will continue to do so because we have the resources," said the minister.

Mr. Pattullo spoke of the working of the Water Act in the dry belt of the province. Even the opposition had favored it and it went through in half an hour. The law made it possible to deal, not only with irrigation problems, but with hydro-electric concerns. While there was not much interest taken in these matters here, they were of great importance to the province, and the hydro-electric provision may be useful here. The minister also dealt with the grazing policy of the government and spoke of the fine country along the line of the P. G. E. The Government was anxious to develop all the resources of the country.

Timber Outlook.

The timber business was very prosperous just now and the Government had taken steps to conserve the market. A campaign was being conducted in Ontario to popularize B. C. woods and create a demand for the timber. He also spoke of the pulp and paper industry and of its value to the country.

Speaking of steel works, Mr. Pattullo said the establishment of the industry was nearer than many people thought. It would bring with it a thousand and one allied industries.

Highways.

The Highway Act, the speaker said, was designed to handle the road building on a scientific basis. Eventually they would be able to drive from Prince Rupert to Prince George and on to Vancouver in a motor car. There would be no actual work on this end of it this year as there were other expenditures more vital. The road was being built from Terrace to Usk, however, and from Hazelton to Prince George.

Only recently the Premier had told him that the Government had to take care of the settlers that were coming in to northern British Columbia. The people of the south were beginning to wake up to the importance of the north. The Dominion Government was preparing, with the co-operation of the Provincial Government, to develop Mount Robson Park.

The social legislation of the Government was dealt with at some length and Mr. Pattullo was followed by W. E. Williams, A. H. Allison and L. W. Patmore, after which a vote of confidence was passed in the member and the meeting adjourned.

LIVING COST MAY BE CUT

Labor Leaders in England Will Try to Solve Vexed Problem.

LONDON, May 14.—Continuous demands for higher wages in one trade after another are beginning to alarm labor leaders themselves and they are realizing that they can only lead to disaster. The executive committee of "the triple alliance" of miners and transport workers, has embarked upon a determined effort to break the vicious circle of high wages and the increased cost of living. A committee representing the Trades Union Congress, the Labor Party and the co-operative movement are to be called upon to join the alliance in exhaustive inquiry into reasons for the high cost of living and to evolve a plan for its reduction. Members of the alliance discussed this question, which they regard as "most vital, affecting our social life."

Their views, when formulated will be submitted to the government with a view to taking "such action as will substantially reduce present high costs."

In the Letter Box

ART EXHIBITION

To the Editor.—The "horrors of war" are at last brought home to Prince Rupert. The etchings exhibited in the Frizzell building may be the last word in art to the connoisseur, but to the more ordinary ex-private of the "servant class" they seem to transcend all the horrors over seen in France or Belgium. If the Canadian Government has money to burn, let them burn it, so long as they burn these atrocities at the same time.

In the name of public decency and commonsense why should any able-bodied citizen be touring round the country at the public expense with a portfolio of sketches which could be just as well mailed to headquarters of the G. W. V. A.—if they are worth the cost of postage.

In Prince Rupert we know of at least one glaring case of a man disabled in war being denied one solitary nickel of pension for his disablement. The broken men, the widows and orphans, find it hard enough to live on the doles meted out to them. Yet the country can waste money in ways such as this so-called "art exhibit." A large part of the war expenditure was wasted on "cushy" jobs and still the pedigree carry on. The writer had a claim made for three cents overpaid on his army pay, while thousands of dollars are flung away on stunts like this exhibit without question.



PLANNING FINE INDIAN SCHOOL

Department of Indian Affairs to Erect Modern Four-Room Structure Near Stuart Lake.

Costing approximately \$100,000 a four-story boys and girls' industrial school at Stuart Lake on the Se-A-Bunkut Indian Reserve, is to be built by the Department of Indian Affairs. It will be on the south side of Stuart Lake, on the main line of the G. T. P.

The structure is to be of either wood or brick veneer construction. The basement will accommodate the boys' manual training room, recreation rooms, and the dining room. There will also be a laundry and adequate heating, lighting and plumbing facilities. The ground floor will be devoted principally to the class-rooms, of which there will be four, and will include staff rooms and a reception room. Off the main part of the building will be a very fine chapel for devotional services. The remaining floors will be subdivided into dormitories.

Work on the new school will start this summer and it is expected that the building will be finished by the end of the year. Then the Fort Fraser Indian school, which cares for the Indian children in that district, will be done away with, and the pupils and teachers transferred to Stuart Lake.

PRESIDENT CARRANZA WILL STAND TRIAL

AGUA PRIETA, Sonora, Mexico, May 15.—President Carranza, deposed head of the Mexican government, has been assured trial under the laws of Mexico for any of his offences is the statement issued by General P. Elias Calles, war minister of the revolutionary government. Calles declared Carranza would not be executed.

"It is my belief that a man who violates the law, should be tried under the law," he said. "Villa must not become a political or military factor in the revolution, or in Mexico," Calles declared.

If Carranza succeeds in getting out of Mexico, the revolutionists will be pleased, however, General Calles said.

SMITHERS

A compressor plant and two drills have reached Burns Lake for the Talpallin mine. It is expected that the mine will be shipping by July 1.

J. S. Brayfield has arrived from North Dakota to take charge of the first Anglican church at Telkwa.

The board of management of the Methodist Church at Telkwa and Smithers this year comprise James Stockman, secretary-treasurer; A. Kilpatrick, C. L. Dimock, George Oulton, William Mitchell, and W. J. Foster. The financial position for last year shows that \$1,745 had been raised, practically balancing the outlay for the period.

Miss Gertrude Owen of Telkwa has left for Burns Lake where she will take a position in the Royal Bank.

VICTORIA MEN GO TO BISLEY

Sergeant-Major E. J. Read and Major F. Richardson will represent B.C.

To Victoria is accorded the honor of representing British Columbia this year in the national shooting at Bisley, England. Fifteen contestants, duly qualified, entered the lists on Saturday at the Richmond Range, Lulu Island, under the supervision of Brig.-Gen. J. Duff Stuart, and the auspices of the Vancouver Rifle Association. Sergeant-Major E. J. Read, of the headquarters staff, Victoria, headed the list with a score of 219 out of a possible 255. F. Richardson of Victoria, formerly of the 16th Battalion, came second with a score of 217. The names of these two men will be forwarded to Ottawa as the recommendation of General Stuart, and after being approved by the militia authorities, will be entered on the list of Canadians who will compete. The Canadian team sails June 19 for England. Major T. F. Elmitt, of Ottawa, is in charge.

Those next on the list as a result of Saturday's trial were Lieutenant Smelzer and Major R. M. Blair, of Vancouver. In the morning the contestants were given seven shots from a range of 200, 500 and 600 yards. In the afternoon ten shots were allowed at longer ranges, making the possible 255. The wind was fair, the comparatively low scoring due to the fact that the ordinary issue of Lee-Enfield with regulation sight was used.
