Fisheries Occupy Centre of Stage

DOMINION FAIR WAGE OFFICER MAKES ATTEMPT END STRIKE AT VANCOUVER

Fisheries Convention to Discuss Matters Vital to Prince Rupert

Question of Appointment of an Administrative Board for Local Control will be Discussed and Protection and Propagation of Salmon also to the fore

Proposal to Form Selling Organization for Overseas

Protection of Smaller Streams and Restocking and Distributing of Salmon Eggs to be brought up

VANCOUVER, May 18.—Among the important questions being discussed before the Fisheries Convention here in June will be the question of local administration of the fisheries. Vancouver officials say that it will be argued in the convention that it is desirable for the fisheries of this province to be administered from headquarters 3,000 miles away. They will ask for an administrative board in British Columbia that will be thoroughly familiar with the local conditions.

In addition to the question of local control, the convention will consider such matters as the best methods of protection and propagation of the salmon throughout the province's thousand streams with a view to building up the business apart from big centres like the Skeena, Naas, Fraser and Rivers Inlet. It will be argued that the fishing of the smaller streams means extermination of the runs unless commercial depletion is checked by restocking with salmon eggs and the building up and maintaining of a retaining pond for fry with proper distributing.

Another question will be a proposal to establish an authoritative fisheries body overseas for the development of a proper distribution system for the marketable product.

At this convention there will be fishery men from all parts of the country, and it is clear that the recommendations of the convention will have a large influence on the Government.

Fisheries Protection in Northern British Columbia

Approval to be Transferred Today and Armentieres and Givenchy both to Operate in Northern Waters

VANCOUVER, May 18.—There are further indications of the change in administrative policy in regard to police protection of fisheries in tidal waters following the declaration of the policy in open fisheries in northern waters. The transfer of the Thiepval from the Esquimalt naval yard to join the Thomas Crosby under Prince Rupert inspectorate is expected today. The Armentieres, a sister ship of the Thiepval, is already in the north in fisheries service, and the Givenchy left a few days ago.

All three boats were built by Vickers of Montreal during the war and were used in the Atlantic coast service. They are 130 ft. long, with 25 ft. beam and they draw 14 ft. 4 in. of water. The vessels are built of steel and are valued at over half a million dollars. Each carries a crew complement of 22.

500,000 FT. SPRUCE ORDER

Order to be Shipped from Prince Rupert Mill to Montreal for Europe.

The Prince Rupert Lumber Co. has just received an order to ship 500,000 ft. of Sitka spruce lumber to the old country. The first lot will go in about 30 days from now and from time on in regular shipments of thirty days.

The lumber goes east over the coast to Montreal and is to be shipped at that port.

It is understood that the reputation of the Sitka spruce and its fine qualities has travelled to Europe, and it was because of this reputation the order came.

TEACHERS ACCENT SALARY SCHEDULE

Have Decided to Take Offer of School Trustees.

VANCOUVER, May 18.—The city teachers' salary question was finally settled last night. The acceptance by the teachers of the trustees' schedule represents an advance of over \$140,000 in teachers' salaries for the year.

The schedule of teachers' salaries in Prince Rupert has been pending a settlement of the Vancouver question. The local school board has promised 15 per cent more than that prevailing in Vancouver.

STEAMER ARTIGIS ON WAY TO COAST

Will Load Lumber and Return to Atlantic Ports

VANCOUVER, May 18.—The Steamer Artigis of the newly formed North Atlantic and Western Steamship Company is on her way from Boston to this port, inaugurating a new service between Atlantic and Pacific ports. She is a vessel of 7,800 tons and is due here about the middle of June.

The Artigis will load lumber on this coast and return to Atlantic ports.

CHIEF JUSTICE HUNTER TO PRESIDE AT ASSIZES

VICTORIA, May 18.—Chief Justice Hunter will be the presiding judge at the forthcoming assizes at Prince Rupert. He has gone to Cariboo to hold court and it is expected he will go from there to Prince Rupert.

PLAINTIFF GETS DAMAGES

Judgment was handed down for \$50 damages in favor of the plaintiff in the action of Sidney Fowler vs. H. G. Helgeson, Ltd., by Judge Young yesterday afternoon. The claim was for \$1000 arising from an alleged statement to lease a pool room. L. W. Patmore acted for the plaintiff and W. E. Fisher for the defendant.

ANNOUNCES FINE BONUS

Hudson's Bay Employees to Get Month's Free Pay if Over a Year in Service.

NORTHERN MINES FIGURE IN HANDSOME MEMENTO

VANCOUVER, May 18.—Eight hundred persons attended the staff banquet of the Hudson's Bay Company in the Hotel Vancouver last night in celebration of the 250th anniversary of the founding of the great company. Sir Robert Kindersley, governor, who was the guest of honor, announced that a one month's salary bonus would be given to all employees of over a year's service and a medal would be presented in recognition of long service. The big store closed for business at 1:30 in the afternoon.

As a memento of British Columbia a massive inkstand was presented to Sir Robert. The stand comprised Anyox copper, Barkerville gold nuggets and a panel of Dolly Varden silver, with a base of Texada Island marble.

Pension Scheme.
VANCOUVER, May 18.—Today Sir Robert Kindersley announced that the directors were appropriating \$1,225,000 for a new pension scheme that would especially benefit the fur trade employees.

CITY COUNCIL URGES ACTION

Gets Behind Board of Trade in Appeal to Colonel Peck Regarding Fish Wharf and Car Shortage.

The City Council has joined hands with the Board of Trade in its appeal to Colonel Peck regarding the construction of the fish wharf at Seal Cove and the disastrous effects of the prevailing car shortage, and last night decided to send a night letter to the member endorsing the attitude of the Board and setting forth the condition existing here. This action was recommended to the council in a report of the Fisheries Committee which consists of Mayor McClymont and Aldermen Dybhavn and Casey and the report was adopted unanimously on motion of Aldermen Dybhavn and Perry. The member is urged to do something about the matters if it is at all possible.

City of London Yesterday Paid Tribute to Admiral Jellicoe and Viscount French.

Mediation Started in Shipping Strike

Fair Wage Officer gets Representative Group of Men together to Attempt Conciliation Project; Action Today

VANCOUVER, May 18.—Mediation has started with a view to settlement of the coast shipping strike. Dominion Fair Wage Officer T. D. Bulger yesterday got J. H. McVety, the labor leader, and Messrs. Reed and Arthur, engineers, along with Captain Best of the Merchant Service Guild to meet and discuss the situation. They decided to get a statement of terms today from the striking seamen, firemen and stewards and then to visit the Grand Trunk Pacific, Union Steamship Co. and Canadian Pacific Co. and see what could be done.

FOUR CARS ARE NOW ON THE WAY

Pacific and Booth Bought Today for Shipment East on Train Tomorrow.

Booth Fisheries and Pacific Fisheries were buyers for eastern shipment at the fish exchange this morning; the latter company coming to life after not having bought for many weeks. Enough fish to fill four cars arriving on the train was bought around 17c, while the balance struck the bottom for cold storage at 10c. Shipments east will be made tomorrow morning.

St. Eloi sold 1,500 pounds to the Royal Fisheries at 13.2c and 8c.

Norland sold 32,000 pounds to Cold Storage at 10c and 6c.

Elids, 400 salmon, Peggy 1,100 and Boulder 300, sold to Cold Storage, Royal and Atlin at 15c and 5c.

The Chief Skugaid arrived with 45,000 lbs. of halibut and 15,000 lbs. of black cod for the Cold Storage.

The Panama arrived last night with 65,000 pounds but cleared for Seattle, not satisfied with market prospects.

STOP DESTRUCTION WEST COAST SEALS

Reports Have Reached Vancouver That Natives Use Power Boats and Guns.

VANCOUVER, May 18.—Complaints have reached the Dominion Fisheries here that the Indians on the West Coast of Vancouver Island are using power boats and modern weapons in the catching of seals.

The Department is despatching a patrol to investigate and stop the practice.

PLANNING FOR CELEBRATION

Ben Self and W. E. Thompson Ask City Council for Grant; Band, Carnival and Baseball

Soliciting aid from the City Council in the form of a grant to further the Dominion Day Celebration, a delegation from the Sons of Canada and the baseball association, consisting of W. E. Thompson and Ben Self, appeared in the council chamber last night.

Mr. Thompson told of the joint plans of the Sons of Canada, Baseball Association and Daughters of the Empire. The celebration, it is hoped, will be the most pretentious yet. The Greenville Band will be brought here as they have volunteered to come if their expenses are paid. The Kethikan ball club would be here and the Daughters of the Empire were staging a carnival. Financial assistance would be necessary. Ben Self supported the attitude of Mr. Thompson and drew attention to the unselfish offer of the bandsmen in the middle of the fishing season.

Shipping Lumber Profitably Overland.
 An order for a million and a half feet of Sitka spruce lumber is to be filled by the Prince Rupert Lumber Co., the same to be shipped overland to Montreal and from there transhipped to the Old Country. We have no knowledge of what the cost of transportation will be, but this we know that water transportation would be very much less than rail.

This is the point. If lumber can be shipped profitably to England by rail and steamer, how much more might it be shipped by water by way of the Panama Canal. From this, we take it, if we had transportation facilities by water, we could easily compete with other parts of the world. We are in a position to cater to the needs of the world in Sitka spruce, a commodity which cannot be obtained in quantities anywhere outside of British Columbia and a part of Alaska.

Before we can do anything, however, it is necessary to have docks for loading and discharging cargo. The government has already built large concrete docks at Victoria, which at the present are very little used. All we ask here is that we be given docks sufficient to handle the traffic developing from time to time. We must have a place for ships to handle cargo before we can think of doing a shipping business.

This trial shipment of spruce overland has taught us that there must be a demand for our product. It has also made us look to our shipping facilities and we find them almost wholly lacking. It is a hard fight to get anything from the powers that be, but we must keep on making ourselves heard and let the world know that Prince Rupert is on the map and cannot be forever ignored.

Fishermen Lose Much From Car Shortage.

Yesterday there was a good example of the losses the fishermen sustain through the car shortage. Only two cars were available and the fish sufficient to fill those sold at 17 cents a pound. The remainder of the fish sold at 11 cents. One boat, the Eagle, brought in about 16,000 lbs. and sold at the lower rate. Had there been cars she would have received \$960 more for her cargo. The condition illustrated here has been in existence for a long time. The men have been very patient, although naturally they are very discontented. The Board of Trade has taken the matter up and last night the City Council passed a resolution backing the action of the Board of Trade. Possibly a mass meeting of fishermen might help, but the difficulty is that the fishermen are never in port long and a mass meeting does not make much of a showing. We believe that every influence possible should be brought to bear on the authorities to have the abuse remedied. Our member cannot do everything. He must be backed up to the limit on matters of this kind. Let us forget politics and get after this car supply as a unit.

Prince Rupert Gave Freely.

When the war was on Prince Rupert gave freely of her best men and she suffered all the slights imaginable in order to forward the cause of the country. Now the war is over she is deserving of at least decent treatment. Docks and cars are necessary to her existence. There can be no compromise over these things. They are the means by which we all live. The fishing business must be encouraged, both for the sake of the fishermen and for the sake of the city.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

NEW COMPANY FOR FLYING ON VANCOUVER ISD.

Landing Grounds Secured at Comox, Courtenay and Victoria.

COURTENAY, May 18.—W. H. Brown, secretary of the Aerial League, and N. A. Goddard, of Courtenay, have purchased the Pathfinder II from the Victoria branch of the Aerial League and will commence commercial flying operations under the name of the Vancouver Island Aerial Service. The new company has secured rights to landing grounds at Comox, Courtenay and Victoria, and will operate the Curtiss aeroplane both as a seaplane and an aeroplane. Special floats are to be constructed that will permit of the change from land to sea craft being made within a few minutes by changing the undercarriage of wheels for a set of floats.

The company will commence commercial flying immediately and will handle all classes of passenger carrying and special survey work. Running from Courtenay north into the less accessible country the seaplane will be able to reach any point with the minimum of time, Mr. Brown contends, and that the Aerial Service will undertake every conceivable type of work that might be done by air. His new activities will take Mr. Brown away from the Aerial League, of which he was one of the founders and a very popular secretary for some time. His record as a scout pilot in France, which won for him the coveted M. C. was ably borne out by his flying achievements here, and the local League is experiencing a loss of one of its most useful members.

The Aerial Service has applied for license to the Air Board for landing ground, seabases, machine license and pilots' certificates which will, it is stated, be forthcoming in time. Already registered, the Vancouver Island Aerial Service will commence flying operations immediately, using the Curtiss as a land machine, and later when the floats have been constructed, as a seaplane. Mr. Goddard was a well known technical man, who was interested in aviation long before the war; and has acquired a reputation for safe and conservative mechanical knowledge.

ABOUT TO MAKE TEST OF STONE

Smith Island Rock Has Arrived; Will be Laid at First Ave. and Second Street.

Forty tons of granite having arrived from Smith Island last week for experiment as hard surfacing for the city streets, the laying of the stone will be commenced by Road Foreman McLeod under the supervision of City Engineer Clements next week. The rock will be used at the intersection of First Avenue and Second Street where heavy traffic to the wharf passes over. An area of 24 feet by 100 feet will be covered to a depth of four inches, using all the 40 tons as the stone runs about three yards to four tons.

The Smith Island rock is properly known as grano-diorite. It is said to be of a hard composition and one that will stand up well under heavy usage. It is made up of a large proportion of felspar, quartz, hornblende and a little biotite, all of which are hard metals. To the touch it has a sandy feeling but it is difficult to break and the crystals are quite hard. Compared with the Tyee granite it is said to be inferior, but very slightly so, and the city engineer says that any inferiority cannot equalize the increased cost of bringing the rock the greater distance from Tyee. The City Council has not yet authorized any further test.

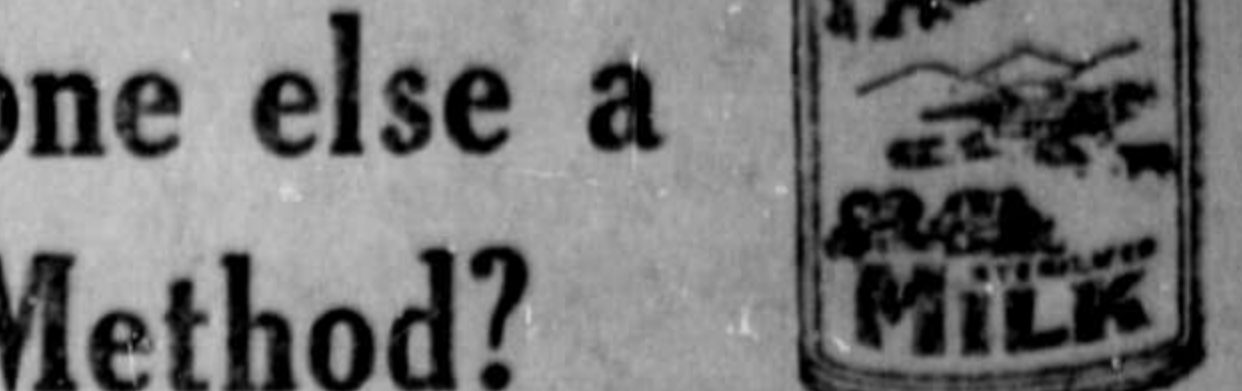

FLIERS AWAIT MOUNTAIN THAW

Ernie Hall will Bring First Flying Boat Soon as Weather Conditions Right.

ROY PRICE NOW HAS EVERYTHING READY

Ice and Snow on Lakes of Interior Cause Delay in Commencing Business.

The season is not yet far enough advanced for air planes to be used at Stewart. The lakes of the interior are still covered with ice and snow and landing with an air boat would be extremely difficult. So says Roy Price, the head of the air company that is preparing to operate from Stewart and other points this summer. His machine has been ready for two months past and as soon as the weather is right, Pilot Ernie Hall will bring it north, making, it is expected, a continuous flight from Seattle to Prince Rupert.

Up to the present no experiments have been made in landing with the flying boat on snow or ice. Mr. Price thinks it quite feasible, however, and possibly another winter this will be done, but in the meantime he is contenting himself with waiting for the mountain lakes to open.

Mr. Price has three government built hydroplanes in the south, which he bought for service in British Columbia and Alaska. These are smaller than the flying boat and suitable only for carrying one or two passengers. Instead of the body of the machine resting on the water as with the larger machine, these planes stand on pontoons when in the water.

There is a company in Vancouver that has purchased two similar airboats to that which is to come here. It will operate out of Vancouver and will co-operate with the local concern.

VANCOUVER, May 18.—The sale of the old Methodist mission steamer Thomas Crosby to the Federal Fisheries Department was consummated yesterday. The price of the vessel is \$25,000 and she will be used for patrol work in northern waters, plying out of Prince Rupert.

The Thomas Crosby is an oil burner. She is 100 feet long and is a nifty little craft. She is well known in the north where she has been used for fisheries purposes for several seasons under charter from the former owners. Her purchase this year was necessitated by the extra protection needed consequent on the introduction of the open fisheries policy of the government.

The Crosby leaves today for Prince Rupert.

BY-LAW REGARDING SALE OF NEAR BEER

Recent Legislation Strengthens Hands of Municipalities Regulating Sale

The mayor intimated at last night's council meeting that the city solicitor had been instructed to draw up a by-law for the licensing of near-beer sale and also governing who shall dispense it. This is a follow-up of the legislation enacted at the recent session of the legislature, restricting the sale of near beer. The municipalities are given a much stronger hand in regulating the business under the new laws.

A by-law on the rates in the waterworks department is also to be brought in. Both by-laws will be in effect by July 1.

The contract for the printing of the new telephone directory was let by the City Council last night to the News Publishing Co. at a tender of \$230.65. A. O. Franks bid \$235 for the work.

On the inquiry of Alderman Perry, at last night's council meeting, the city solicitor explained that he was looking up cases in regard to the Hays Block sewer claim before arriving at a decision.

Sport Briefs

Sues Hockey Arena.

Claiming \$5,000 damages for injuries received at a hockey game in the Vancouver Arena on February 16, J. B. Foster of Vancouver has issued a writ against the Vancouver Arena Company. The plaintiff, it is contended, was hit on the head by a flying puck during the progress of the game.

Crow's Nest League.

A football league has been organized in the Crow's Nest Pass district. The season commenced last Sunday and will be concluded on August 1 with 12 games played every Sunday. The league consists of the three towns, Fernie, Michel and Coal Creek.

Anti Gambling.

The arrest of two gamblers at San Francisco last week featured the campaign of William P. McCarthy, president of the Pacific Coast League, to eliminate gambling on baseball. Roy Hurlburt was arrested on an assault and battery charge and Arthur Martin on vagrancy. Both had been barred by McCarthy from the league parks. Hurlburt is a club owner in San Francisco. The league directors have placed the finances of the association at the disposal of McCarthy to be used in the ridding the parks of gambling.

Fly Fishing.

The question arises very often when is the best time to strike when fly-fishing. Authorities say that this should be done immediately, for the trout, when finding the fly is artificial, will immediately try to get rid of it. Henry Van Dyke, one of the few American writers on fly fishing contends: "An altogether original fly, unheard of, startling, will often do great execution in an overfished pool. Fish are sometimes like human beings, something strange will attract a crowd and there are always some more venturesome than others."

FATHER NEPTUNE HOLDS COURT

Boards Famous Battleship Renowned as Vessel Crosses Equatorial Bound for Australia

PRINCE OF WALES IS PROPERLY INITIATED
Invested with Order of "Equatorial Bath"; Officers are also Given Titles

The Prince of Wales has had one experience which was memorable, for when crossing the line Father Neptune gave him a special drubbing on board the Renown. The Old One hailed on the night of the 16th, writes a correspondent. The captain, after a megaphoned conversation from the bridge, stopped the ship and let him aboard. A shower of rockets flew skyward from the fore'side, jets of water leapt up from the capstan, and a searchlight disclosed the barnacled and hairy king of sharks and whales advancing to meet the Prince of Wales. It was reported that Neptune, with two bears, two guards, and a secretary, came through the hawsepipe, and he has taught everyone on board to disbelieve such reports at their peril.

Holds Court

Neptune was satisfied for that night with a drink of whisky on the bridge, but next morning he appeared with full court to demand the homage of the Prince and of others who had not previously entered his domain. Neptune was ferocious and crusty, but decidedly henpecked by a leggy, rope-skirted Amphitrite, and the aged and rouge-cheeked mermaid who attended her had a backing of 50 stout sailors—otherwise heralds, secretaries, clerks, barbers, police and bears, all dressed with the most spectacular absurdity, due to a happy mixture of paint, old clothes and tow. Here was a judge ready to condemn anybody without a hearing, a doctor with an appalling collection of soapy pills and bitter potions, trumpeters able to blow anyone else dumb, and bears who showed their mood by singing, when they met the Prince:

Shave him and bash him,
Duck him and splash him,
Torture and smash him,
And don't let him go.

In view of the ship's company, which crowded the guns, turrets and superstructure like an amphitheatre, Neptune held an investiture, bestowing on the Prince the Order of the Equatorial Bath, tying a miniature tub round his neck. Admiral Halsey got the Order of the Old Sea Dog, with appropriate verses; Captain Dudley North became a Knight of the Aged Cod; an Australian lieutenant was given the Order of the Crusted Barnacle, in virtue of innumerable crossings of the line; and Commander James Campbell, the navigator, was made a Knight of the Soused Herring in view of his "wonderful brain, which runs the ship like a train with unrivalled punctuality, before which we bow".

Everything in Rhyme

The proceedings were in rhyme and the Prince recited a verse of his own composition, welcoming the King and Queen of the deep. A great stately procession passed along the deck to a platform ending abruptly in a long seawater bath, and here the real business occurred, novices being seized in turn and subjected to the beastly attentions of Neptune's doctors and barbers, who forced on them medicines, lathered their heads with many colored mixtures, shaved them and tipped them backwards into the water, where the bears' seaweedy embraces awaited them.

Prince Initiated

The Prince was the first to be initiated while Neptune spouted an oration over him. He slipped off his uniform, disclosing a bathing costume, and was given a nasty pill which, when the barbers were not looking, he craftily thrust out of his mouth. They lathered him pink, white and black, seizing his nose to shave him, then, amidst the delighted roar of the crew, over he went and was ducked three times three, Captain Dudley North acting as chief bear.

Christened

Neptune then carried out the condign punishment of Lieutenant Colonel Grigg and Sub-Lieutenant Lord Louis Mountbatten on a charge of stirring up

strife against him by forging wireless message from the Archbishop of Canterbury suggesting that as he used the Christian calendar he must have been converted to Christianity and should himself be christened and immersed.

The affair was on an unprecedented scale, and the book of words will be published. It was the result of a considerable amount of research into old customs and the use of the clever rhymsters among the ship's company. The sailors took great delight in the ceremonies, everybody, from admiral to cook's boy, paying due deference and homage to his Oceanic Majesty.

LONDON, May 18.—The Bank of England, known the world over as "The Old Lady of Threadneedle Street," is to be rebuilt. The new structure, according to expectations, will be many stories high and embrace some wonderful architecture.



GREAT WORK RECLAIMING AFTER WAR

Half of Devastated Area is Being Cultivated and Immense Work Carried on.

PARIS, May 18.—Great progress has been achieved in restoration work in this country during the past eighteen months. Of the 400,000 acres which were completely useless, nearly half will be under cultivation in 1920 and this year the crop should yield 300,000 bushels of grain.

No less than 27,000,000 square yards of trench holes have been filled in and 11,000,000 square yards of barb wire entanglements removed.

Recommendations of Game Conservation Board to Lieut.-Governor.

Dr. A. R. Baker, chairman of the B. C. Game Conservation Board, announces that the following open season for big game has been recommended to the lieutenant-governor-in-council:—

Moose—In the districts of Atlin, Fort George, Omineca and Cariboo, September 1 to December 15, for three years, 1920, 1921 and 1922. In Columbia District, October 1 to November 15.

Caribou—Throughout the province except on Kaien and Queen Charlotte Islands and southeast of the main line of the C. N. R., September 1 to December 15 for 1920, 1921 and 1922.

Mountain Sheep—North of the G. T. P., September 1 to November 15. Columbia District, October 1 to November 15.

Mountain Goat—Throughout the province, September 1 to December 15 for 1920, 1921 and 1922.

Reduction in sheep limit—Only 2 sheep may be killed north of the G. T. P. and only 1 in East Kootenay.

COL. PECK'S LETTER TO GENERAL M'LEAN

Full Text Now to Hand Regarding Recent Disagreeable Incident

The full text of Col. Peck's letter in connection with the widows of soldiers' incident is now to hand and is as follows:—

Mr. Hume Cronyn, Chairman, Committee on Pensions and Re-establishment, House of Commons.

My Dear Sir.—In view of the recent occurrences and regarding the statements of Gen. McLean, I feel that it is my imperative duty to resign from your committee.

While I do not pretend that my membership is of any great importance, I cannot consent to being a party to what has taken place.

I therefore resign, not only to protest in the name of the widows of the hundreds of brave men whom I had the honor of leading in the late war, but as a protest against a deplorable attempt on two successive days to camouflage the incident, and also as a protest in the name of common respect and decency. I cannot bring myself to believe that actions such as have taken place are a credit to the committee or Parliament.

While no one claims there is any discredit in being described as "of the servant class" (because it is honorable to work, and we all should work), the statement made was an invidious attempt to discredit the widows of our soldiers.

I claim that the statement made by Mr. G. Grant MacNeill was correct. No attempt has been made to press this matter, and had General McLean seen fit to apologize to the widows of our brave men no further attention would have been paid to the incident.

I regret that, according to the rules of Parliament, I cannot go further into this matter publicly. I wish it to be distinctly understood that I do not wish to reflect on your committee as a whole, or on your Chairmanship, which has always been fair, generous and impartial.

PURCHASES HAY FROM ONTARIO

Farmers of Alberta are Supplied Through Government Agency.

Hon. Duncan Marshall, minister of agriculture in the Alberta cabinet, who has spent a great deal of time during the past winter in Ontario arranging for the shipment of hay to Alberta, where cattle food has been exceedingly scarce because of the great shortage last fall, is about to leave for the West, says the Toronto Globe. Mr. Marshall says that the situation in Alberta would have been very much more serious even than it was had arrangements not been made for the purchase during December, January and February of large quantities of hay in the province of Ontario and Quebec. Altogether 3,600 cars containing about 50,000 tons of hay, have been shipped from Ontario and Quebec to Alberta to relieve the shortage. Much of this hay was bought at rates ranging from \$28 to \$31 per ton.

The Canadian Pacific, upon being appealed to for co-operation, put into force a rate of \$10 per ton from Ontario to Lethbridge, Calgary, Edmonton and other distributing centres throughout Alberta. In addition to the cost and freight, from \$1 to \$3 had to be charged in cases where there was a short haul from the shipping centres to the point where hay was required or where unloading had to be done. The price of the hay brought in by the government ranged from about \$35 to \$46 per ton, whereas the few local dealers and others in Alberta who had hay to sell were charging from \$60 to \$75 per ton, while some conscienceless profiteers, because of the necessities of others, obtained as high as \$90.

TIME FOR ENROLLMENT IN AERIAL MILITIA IS GROWING SHORTER

OTTAWA, May 18.—May 24 has been fixed as the final date upon which applications may be posted to the Air Board for membership in Canada's new flying militia.

It is expected that about 1,000 officers of the Royal Air Force will have enrolled and that the total will number about 5,000 men.

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
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
